FIRST SESSION—THIRTY-SEVENTH PARLIAMENT.

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ADMINISTRATION AND PROBATE (AMENDMENT): Bill to amend the law relating to the administration of the estates of deceased persons—(Mr. Oldham).— Initiated and read a first time, 28 April, 1948, p. 48; motion, That this Bill be now read a second time—debate adjourned, 6 May, p. 55; debate resumed—Bill read a second time and passed remaining stages without amendment; concurrence of the Legislative Council desired, 15 June, p. 62; the Council's agreement notified, 14 July, p. 78. (Assented to 26 July, 1948. Act No. 5277.)

ADMINISTRATION AND PROBATE DUTIES: Bill to continue the operation of Part III. of the Finance Act 1930— (Mr. Hollway).—Initiated on resolution from Committee of Ways and Means and read a first time, 3 Dec., 1947, p. 15; motion, That this Bill be now read a second time—debate adjourned, 9 Dec., p. 21; debate resumed—Bill read a second time and passed remaining stages without amendment; concurrence of the Legislative Council desired, 9 Dec., p. 23; the Council's agreement notified, 16 Dec., p. 28. (Assented to 23 December, 1947. Act No. 5241.)

ADMINISTRATION AND PROBATE DUTIES (BILL No. 2): Bill to continue the operation of Part III. of the Finance Act 1930—(Mr. Hollway).—Initiated on resolution from Committee of Ways and Means and passed without amendment; concurrence of the Legislative Council desired, 30 Nov., 1948, p. 156; the Council's agreement notified, 1 Dec., p. 159. (Assented to 7 December, 1948. Act No. 5339.)

ALPHINGTON TO EAST PRESTON RAILWAY CONSTRUCTION: Bill to authorize the construction of a line of railway from Alphington to East Preston—(Colonel Kent Hughes).—Initiated and read a first time, 1 Dec., 1948, p. 159; read a second time and passed remaining stages without amendment; concurrence of the Legislative Council desired, 8 Dec., p. 162; the Council's agreement notified, 8 Dec., p. 165. (Assented to 21 December, 1948. Act No. 5345.)

APPROPRIATION: Bill to apply a sum out of the Consolidated Revenue to the service of the year ending on the 30th day of June, 1948, and to appropriate supplies granted in this and the last two preceding sessions of Parliament—(Mr. Hollway).—Initiated on resolution from Committee of Ways and Means and read a first time; read a second time and committed; considered in Committee and reported without amendment, 18 Dec., 1947, p. 32; Bill read the third time; concurrence of the Legislative Council desired; the Council's agreement notified, 19 Dec., p. 36. (Assented to 23 December, 1947. Act No. 5262.)

APPROPRIATION (BILL No. 2): Bill to apply a sum out of the Consolidated Revenue to the service of the year ending on the 30th day of June, 1949, and to appropriate the supplies granted in this session of Parliament—(Mr. Hollway).—Initiated on resolution from Committee of Ways and Means and read a first time, time, 8 Dec., 1948, p. 165; That this Bill be now read a motion made, second time; amendment proposed, That all the words after the word "That" be omitted with the view of inserting in place thereof the words "this House is of the opinion that the Government, in place of the Appropriation Bill, should introduce a Supply Bill providing for Supply sufficient to cover its obligations up to the 31st day of March, 1949, with a view to the holding of an election of Members of the Legislative Assembly before that date because—(a) with the disappearence of the Coalition Government none of the three parties can command a majority in the Assembly, and (b) the people should be given the opportunity at the earliest possible date to elect a new Parliament which can effectively deal with the many now long delayed urgent problems confronting the State"; amendment negatived, on division; Bill read a second time and passed remaining stages without amendment; concurrence of the Legislative Council desired, 9 Dec., p. 168; the Council's agreement notified, 10 Dec., p. 169. (Assented to 21 December, 1948. Act No. 5360.)

AUDITOR-GENERAL'S SALARY: Bill to increase the salary of the Auditor-General—(Mr. Oldham).—Message from His Excellency the Governor (No. 15) recommending an appropriation from the Consolidated Revenue for the purposes of the Bill; considered in Committee; resolution reported and agreed to, and Bill ordered thereupon; Bill initiated and passed without amendment; concurrence of the Legislative Council desired, 9 Dec., 1947, p. 21; the Council's agreement notified, 10 Dec., p. 25. (Assented to 16 December, 1947. Act No. 5234.)

BALLAARAT LAND: Bill to provide for the revocation of the Crown grant and reservation as a site for a town hall of certain land in the Parish of Ballaarat, the reservation of such land for educational and other public purposes, and the acquisition of certain other land by the Minister of Public Instruction—(Mr.McDonald, Shepparton).—Initiated and read a first time, 10 Dec., 1947, p. 23; read a second time and committed; Message from His Excellency the Governor (No. 16) recommending an appropriation from the Consolidated Revenue for the purposes of the Bill; considered in Committee; resolution reported and agreed to; Bill considered in Committee and reported without amendment; read the third time; concurrence of the Legislative Council desired, 10 Dec., p. 24; the Council's agreement notified, 16 Dec., p. 28. (Assented to 23 December, 1947. Act No. 5244.)

Barley Marketing: Bill relating to the marketing of barley and other matters incidental thereto—(Lieut.-Col. Dennett).—Initiated and read a first time, 23 June, 1948, p. 66; motion, That this Bill be now read a second time—debate adjourned, 10 Aug., p. 96; debate resumed—Bill read a second time and committed; considered in Committee and reported with an amendment; as amended, considered, and amendment agreed to; Bill read the third time; concurrence of the Legislative Council desired, 25-6 Aug., p. 114; the Council's agreement to the Bill with an amendment notified; amendment considered and agreed to, 1 Sept., p. 119. (Assented to 7 September, 1948. Act No. 5320).

BUILDING OPERATIONS (AMENDMENT): Bill intituled "An Act to further amend the Building Operations and Building Materials Control Acts"—(Mr. Oldham).—Brought from the Legislative Council and read a first time, 17 Nov., 1948, p. 144; motion, That this Bill be now read a second time—debate adjourned, 25 Nov., p. 154; debate resumed—Bill read a second time and committed; considered in Committee, 8 Dec., p. 162; further considered in Committee and reported without amendment; read the third time, 9 Dec., p. 166. (Assented to 21 December, 1948. Act No. 5347.)

BUILDING OPERATIONS AND BUILDING MATERIALS CONTROL (AMENDMENT): Bill intituled "An Act to amend Sections Three and Twenty-three of the Building Operations and Building Materials Control Act 1946'"—(Mr. Oldham).—Brought from the Legislative Council and read a first time, 18 Dec., 1947, p. 33; motion, That this Bill be now read a second time—debate adjourned; debate resumed and adjourned, 18 Dec., p. 34; debate continued—Bill read a second time and passed remaining stages without amendment, 19 Dec., p. 36. (Assented to 23 December, 1947. Act No. 5259).

BUILDING OPERATIONS AND BUILDING MATERIALS CONTROL (AMENDMENT) (BILL No. 2): Bill intituled "An Act to amend the Building Operations and Building Materials Control Acts"—(Mr. Oldham).—Brought from the Legislative Council and read a first time, 16 June, 1948, p. 63; motion, That this Bill be now read a second time—debate adjourned, 16 June, p. 64; debate resumed—Bill read a second time and passed remaining stages without amendment, 29-30 June, pp. 70-1. (Assented to 30 June, 1948. Act No. 5271.)

Building Operations Control (Amendment): Bill intituled "An Act to amend Section Six of the Building Operations and Building Materials Control Act 1946'"—(Mr. Oldham).—Brought from the Legislative Council and read a first time, 14 July, 1948, p. 77; motion, That this Bill be now read a second time—debate adjourned, 21 July, p. 82; debate resumed—Bill read a second time, on division, and committed; considered in Committee, 3 Aug., p. 91; further considered in Committee and reported without amendment; Bill read the third time, 4 Aug., p. 93. (Assented to 13 August, 1948. Act No. 5288.)

CAMBERWELL LANDS: Bill to provide, upon the transfer and surrender to His Majesty of certain land at Burwood, for the reservation of that land as a site for a public park and children's playground, for the excision of a part of certain land at Camberwell permanently reserved as a site for public gardens and for the reservation of the land so excised, together with the land forming the existing town hall site at Camberwell, as a site for

a town hall and for municipal purposes—(Mr. McDonald, Shepparton).—Initiated, by leave, and read a first time, 27 April, 1948, p. 43; motion, That this Bill be now read a second time—debate adjourned, 6 May, p. 53; debate resumed—Bill read a second time and passed remaining stages without amendment; concurrence of the Legislative Council desired, 15 June, p. 62; the Council's agreement notified, 23 June, p. 66. (Assented to 30 June, 1948. Act No. 5268.)

CANCER INSTITUTE: Bill relating to the establishment and management of a cancer institute for the purposes of research into and treatment of cancer and allied conditions, and for other purposes—(Sir Albert Dunstan).—Initiated and read a first time, 20 Oct., 1948, p. 124; motion, That this Bill be now read a second time—debate adjourned, 17 Nov., p. 146; Message from His Excellency the Governor (No. 58) recommending an appropriation from the Consolidated Revenue for the purposes of the Bill; considered in Committee; resolution reported and agreed to, 30 Nov., p. 155; debate on second reading resumed—Bill read a second time and passed remaining stages without amendment; concurrence of the Legislative Council desired, 30 Nov., p. 156; the Council's agreement notified, 7 Dec., p. 161. (Assented to 13 December, 1948. Act No. 5341.)

CARRIERS AND INNKEEPERS: Bill to amend the Carriers and Innkeepers Act 1928—(Mr. Oldham).—Initiated and read a first time, 28 April, 1948, p. 48; motion, That this Bill be now read a second time—debate adjourned, 6 May, p. 54; debate resumed—Bill read a second time and passed remaining stages without amendment; concurrence of the Legislative Council desired, 15 June, p. 62; the Council's agreement notified, 22 June, p. 66. (Assented to 29 June, 1948. Act No. 5267.)

CINEMATOGRAPH FILMS: Bill to amend Part II. of the Theatres Act 1928, and section 14 of the Cinematograph Films (Australian Quota) Act 1935—(Mr. Dodgshun).—Initiated and read a first time, 28 April, 1948, p. 48; motion, That this Bill be now read a second time—debate adjourned, 22 June, p. 66; debate resumed and adjourned, 20 Oct., p. 125; 27 Oct., p. 130; 3 Nov., p. 132.—Bill lapsed.

CLOSER SETTLEMENT (DISPOSAL OF LAND): Bill to amend section 26 of the Closer Settlement Act 1938—(Lieut.-Col. Dennett).—Initiated and read a first time, 28 April, 1948, p. 48; motion, That this Bill be now read a second time—debate adjourned, 6 May, p. 53; debate resumed—Bill read a second time and passed remaining stages without amendment; concurrence of the Legislative Council desired, 15 June, p. 62; the Council's agreement notified, 20 July, p. 81. (Assented to 26 July, 1948. Act No. 5281.)

COAL MINE WORKERS PENSIONS: Bill to amend the Coal Mine Workers Pensions Act 1942—(Mr. Hollway).—Message from His Excellency the Governor (No. 49) recommending an appropriation from the Consolidated Revenue for the purposes of the Bill; considered in Committee; resolution reported and agreed to, and Bill ordered thereupon; Bill initiated and read a first time, 25 Aug., 1948, p. 113; read a second time and passed remaining stages without amendment; concurrence of the Legislative Council desired, 25 Aug., p. 114; the Council's agreement notified, 31 Aug., p. 118. (Assented to 7 September, 1948. Act No. 5313.)

COAL (OVERSEAS PURCHASE) LOAN AND APPLICATION: Bill to authorize the raising of money towards the purchase and delivery of coal from overseas and to sanction the issue and application for such purposes of the money so raised or of money in the State Loans Repayment Fund, and for other purposes-(Mr. Hollway).—Message from His Excellency the Governor (No. 62) recommending an appropriation from the Consolidated Revenue for the purposes of the Bill; considered in Committee; resolution reported and agreed to, and Bill ordered thereupon; Bill initiated and read a first time, 30 Nov., 1948, p. 158; motion, That this Bill be now read a second time—debate adjourned, 7 Dec., p. 161; debate resumed—Bill read a second time and passed remaining stages without amendment; concurrence of the Legislative Council desired, 8 Dec., p. 162; the Council's agreement notified, 10 Dec., p. 169. (Assented to 21 December, 1948. Act No. 5351.)

COMMONWEALTH TRANSFERRED OFFICERS: Bill relating to the application of the Superannuation Acts and of section 64 of the Public Service Act 1946 to certain officers transferred from the service of the Commonwealth—(Mr. McDonald, Shepparton).— Initiated and read a first time, 27 July, 1948, p. 86; motion, That this Bill be now read a second time—debate adjourned, 3 Aug., p. 90; debate resumed—Bill read a second time and passed remaining stages without amendment; concurrence of the Legislative Council desired, 10 Aug., p. 96; the Council's agreement notified, 18 Aug., p. 105. (Assented to 24 August, 1948. Act No. 5294.)

CONSOLIDATED REVENUE (BILL No. 1): Bill to apply out of the Consolidated Revenue the sum of £1,441,455 to the service of the year 1947-48—(Mr. Hollway).—Initiated on resolution from Committee of Ways and Means and passed without amendment; concurrence of the Legislative Council desired, 2 Dec., 1947, p. 12; the Council's agreement notified, 9 Dec., p. 23. (Assented to 16 December, 1947. Act No. 5229.)

CONSOLIDATED REVENUE (BILL No. 2): Bill to apply out of the Consolidated Revenue the sum of £5,437,317 to the service of the year 1948-49—(Mr. Hyland).—Initiated on resolution from Committee of Ways and Means and passed without amendment; concurrence of the Legislative Council desired, 23 June, 1948, p. 68; the Council's agreement notified, 30 June, p. 71. (Assented to 30 June, 1948. Act No. 5269.)

CONSOLIDATED REVENUE (BILL No. 3): Bill to apply out of the Consolidated Revenue the sum of £11,197,737 to the services of the year 1948-49—(Mr. Hollway).—Initiated on resolution from Committee of Ways and Means and passed without amendment; concurrence of the Legislative Council desired, 17 Aug., 1948, p. 104; the Council's agreement notified, 26 Aug., p. 114. (Assented to 31 August, 1948. Act No. 5305.)

CONSOLIDATED REVENUE (BILL No. 4): Bill to apply out of the Consolidated Revenue the sum of £759,666 to the service of the year 1947-48—(Mr. Dodgshun).—Initiated on resolution from Committee of Ways and Means and passed without amendment; concurrence of the Legislative Council desired, 18 Aug., 1948, p. 107; the Council's agreement notified, 26 Aug., p. 114. (Assented to 31 August, 1948. Act No. 5306.)

Co-operative Housing Societies: Bill to amend the Co-operative Housing Societies Act 1944—(Mr. McDonald, Shepparton).—Initiated and read a first

time, 9 Nov., 1948, p. 135; motion, That this Bill be now read a second time—debate adjourned, 10 Nov., p. 136; Message from His Excellency the Governor (No. 56) recommending an appropriation from the Consolidated Revenue for the purposes of the Bill; considered in Committee; resolution reported and agreed to, 24 Nov., p. 152; debate resumed—Bill read a second time and committed; considered in Committee, 25 Nov., p. 154; further considered in Committee and reported with amendments; as amended, considered, and amendments agreed to; Bill read the third time; concurrence of the Legislative Council desired, 8 Dec., p. 165; the Council's agreement notified, 10 Dec., p. 169. (Assented to 21 December, 1948. Act No. 5357.)

CORANDERRK LANDS: Bill to validate the Crown grants of certain lands at Coranderrk in the Parish of Gracedale and to revoke the permanent reservation of certain other land thereat as a site for the use of the aborigines, and for other purposes—(Mr. McDonald, Shepparton).—Initiated, by leave, and read a first time, 27 April, 1948, p. 44; motion, That this Bill be now read a second time—debate adjourned, 6 May, p. 53; debate resumed—Bill read a second time and passed remaining stages without amendment; concurrence of the Legislative Council desired, 6 July, p. 73; the Council's agreement notified, 14 July, p. 78. (Assented to 20 July, 1948. Act No. 5274.)

CORONERS (MEDICAL WITNESSES): Bill to amend section 29 of the *Coroners Act* 1928—(Mr. Oldham.)—Initiated and read a first time, 28 April, 1948, p. 48; motion, That this Bill be now read a second time—debate adjourned—6 May, p. 54; debate resumed—Bill read a second time and passed remaining stages without amendment; concurrence of the Legislative Council desired, 15 June, p. 62; the Council's agreement notified, 14 July, p. 78. (Assented to 20 July, 1948. Act No. 5275.)

COUNTRY ROADS: Bill intituled "An Act to extend the Application of the Provisions of the 'Local Government (Streets) Act 1948' to State Highways Main Roads Development Roads Tourists' Roads and Forest Roads"—(Mr. Hyland).—Brought from the Legislative Council and read a first time, 5 May, 1948, p. 52; motion, That this Bill be now read a second time-debate adjourned, 6 May, p. 54; debate resumed—Bill read a second time and committed; considered in Committee, 30 June, p. 72; further considered in Committee and reported with amendments and with an amended title, viz.:—"An Act to make Provision with respect to the Application of the Provisions of the 'Local Government (Streets) Act 1948 'to State Highways Main Roads Developmental Roads Tourists' Roads and Forest Roads"; as amended, considered, and amendments agreed to; Bill read the third time; concurrence of the Legislative Council with the Assembly's amendments desired, 14 July, p. 77; the Council's agreement to the Assembly's amendments notified, 4 Aug., p. 93. (Assented to 13 August, 1948. Act No. 5290.)

COUNTRY ROADS BOARD FUND (AMENDMENT) (BILL No. 2): Bill to further amend the Country Roads Board Fund Act 1932 (No. 2)—(Mr. Hyland).— Message from His Excellency the Lieutenant-Governor, as Deputy for the Governor (No. 51) recommending an appropriation from the Consolidated Revenue for the purposes of the Bill; considered in Committee; resolution reported and agreed to, and Bill ordered thereupon; Bill initiated and read a first time, 31 Aug., 1948, p. 117; motion, That this Bill be now read a second time—debate adjourned, 19 Oct., p. 122; debate resumed—Bill read a second time and passed remaining stages without amendment; concurrence of the Legislative Council desired, 26 Oct., p. 128; the Council's agreement notified, 9 Nov., p. 136. (Assented to 16 November, 1948. Act No. 5326.)

COUNTRY ROADS (BY-LAWS): Bill intituled "An Act to amend Section Sixty of the Country Roads Act 1928'"—(Mr. Hyland).—Brought from the Legislative Council and read a first time, 31 Aug., 1948, p. 118.—Bill lapsed.

COUNTRY ROADS (PERMANENT WORKS): Bill to reduce the liabilities of municipalities in respect of permanent works on main roads and State highways—(Mr. Hyland).—Initiated and read a first time, 28 April, 1948, p. 49; motion, That this Bill be now read a second time—debate adjourned, 6 May, p. 53; debate resumed—Bill read a second time and passed remaining stages without amendment; concurrence of the Legislative Council desired, 30 June, p. 72; the Council's agreement notified, 14 July, p. 78. (Assented to 26 July, 1948. Act No. 5278).

COUNTRY ROADS (WORKS AND EVIDENCE): Bill intituled "An Act to authorize the Country Roads Board to undertake additional Works, and relating to Evidence for the purposes of the Country Roads Acts"—(Mr. Hyland).—Brought from the Legislative Council and read a first time, 4 Nov., 1948, p. 133; motion, That this Bill be now read a second time—debate adjourned, 9 Nov., p. 136; debate resumed—Bill read a second time and passed remaining stages without amendment, 30 Nov., p. 158. (Assented to 7 December, 1948. Act No. 5335.)

COUNTRY SEWERAGE LOAN AND APPLICATION: Bill to authorize the raising of money for sewerage works in country districts and to sanction the issue and application of the money so raised and of other money available for the purpose under Loan Acts or in the State Loans Repayment Fund, and for the other purposes—(Mr. McDonald, Shepparton).—Message from His Excellency the Governor (No. 14) recommending an appropriation from the Consolidated Revenue for the purposes of the Bill; considered in Committee; resolution reported and agreed to, and Bill ordered thereupon; Bill initiated and read a first time, 9 Dec., 1947, p. 20; motion, That this Bill be now read a second time—debate adjourned, 10 Dec., p. 24; debate resumed—Bill read a second time and passed remaining stages without amendment; concurrence of the Legislative Council desired, 16 Dec., p. 28; the Council's agreement notified, 18 Dec., p. 34. (Assented to 23 December, 1947. Act No. 5256.)

CRIMES: Bill to amend the law relating to crimes and criminal offenders—(Mr. Oldham).—Initiated and read a first time, 28 April, 1948, p. 48; motion, That this Bill be now read a second time—debate adjourned, 6 May, p. 54.—Bill lapsed.

DROUGHT RELIEF (AMENDMENT): Bill to amend section 3 of the *Drought Relief Act* 1947—(Mr. Mc-Donald, Shepparton).—Message from His Excellency the Governor (No. 2) recommending an appropriation from the Consolidated Revenue for the purposes of the Bill; considered in Committee; resolution reported and agreed to, and Bill ordered thereupon; Bill initiated and read a first time, 2 Dec., 1947, p. 8; read a second time and passed remaining stages without amendment; concurrence of the Legislative Council desired, 2 Dec., p. 11; the Council's agreement notified, 10 Dec., p. 24. (Assented to 16 December, 1947. Act No. 5235.)

ESSENTIAL SERVICES: Bill to make provision with respect to the protection of the community against the interruption or dislocation of essential services — (Mr. Oldham).—Message from His Excellency the Lieutenant-Governor, as Deputy for the Governor (No. 20) recommending an appropriation from the Consolidated Revenue for the purposes of the Bill; Bill declared an urgent Bill; motion, That the Bill be considered an urgent Bill, agreed to, on division; motion, That the time allotted in connection with the Bill be as follows:— (a) For the initial stages of the Bill (including any motion or resolution preliminary to the introduction of the Bill) up to but not inclusive of the second reading of the Bill until 8.30 p.m. this day, (b) for the second reading of the Bill until 9.15 p.m. this day, (c) for the Committee stage of the Bill until 9.40 p.m. this day, (d) for the remaining stages of the Bill until 9.45 p.m. this day, agreed to, on division; His Excellency's Message considered in Committee; resolution reported and agreed to, and Bill ordered thereupon; Bill initiated and read a first time; read a second time, on division, and committed; considered in Committee and reported without amendment; Bill read the third time, on division; concurrence of the Legislative Council desired, on division; the Council's agreement to the Bill with amendments notified; amendments considered and agreed to, 15-16 Jan., 1948, pp. 38-41. sented to 20 January, 1948. Act No. 5263.)

ESSENTIAL SERVICES (AMENDMENT): Bill to amend the Essential Services Act 1948—(Mr. Oldham).— Initiated and read a first time, 24 Nov., 1948, p. 152.—Bill lapsed.

FACTORIES AND SHOPS (BREAD): Bill to amend the provisions of the Factories and Shops Acts relating to the making baking and delivery of bread—(Mr. Hyland).—Initiated and read a first time, 2 Dec., 1947, p. 6; read a second time and passed remaining stages without amendment; concurrence of the Legislative Council desired, 2 Dec., p. 11; the Council's agreement to the Bill with an amendment notified, 10 Dec., p. 23; amendment considered and agreed to, 10 Dec., p. 25. (Assented to 16 December, 1947. Act No. 5238.)

FACTORIES AND SHOPS (DETERMINATIONS): Bill to amend section 171 of the Factories and Shops Act 1928 and section 22 of the Factories and Shops Act 1941—(Mr. Hyland).—Initiated, by leave, and passed without amendment; concurrence of the Legislative Council desired; the Council's agreement notified, 19 Dec., 1947, p. 36. (Assented to 23 December, 1947. Act No. 5261.)

2. Message from Commissioner.—The following Message from the Commissioner appointed by His Excellency the Governor to open the Parliament was delivered by the Usher of the Legislative Council:—

MEMBERS OF THE LEGISLATIVE ASSEMBLY:

The Commissioner from His Excellency the Governor requests the presence of the Members of the Legislative Assembly in the Legislative Council Chamber to hear the Commission read for the commencement and holding of this present Session of Parliament.

Accordingly, the Members of the Legislative Assembly went to the Legislative Council Chamber, where the Honorable Mr. Justice O'Bryan said—

Mr. President and Honorable Members of the Legislative Council:

MEMBERS OF THE LEGISLATIVE ASSEMBLY:

His Excellency the Governor, not thinking fit to be present in person, has been pleased to cause Letters Patent to issue, under the Seal of the State, constituting me his Commissioner to do in his name all that is necessary to be performed in this Parliament. Mr. President and Honourable Members of the Legislative Council:

Mr. Speaker and Members of the Legislative Assembly:

I have called you together as early as practicable after the recent General Election of Members of the Legislative Assembly for the consideration of public business which requires your immediate attention.

I did not expect to have this further opportunity of meeting you before leaving Victoria. Subject, however, to the approval of His Majesty the King, I have agreed, at the joint request of the Premier and the Leader of the Opposition, to delay my departure.

Mr. Speaker and Members of the Legislative Assembly:

A Supply Bill for the period 16th December to 31st December will be introduced to-day.

The Estimates of Revenue and Expenditure for the financial year 1947-1948 will be placed before you at an early date.

Upon assuming office my Advisers are faced with a very serious budgetary position the result, on the one hand, of the existing financial dependency of the State upon the Commonwealth and, on the other hand, of rising costs due mainly to increased nominal wages and shorter working hours.

During the Parliamentary recess, my Ministers will examine the whole administration of the State in an attempt to avoid unnecessary expenditure while developing the whole of the resources of the State.

MR. PRESIDENT AND HONOURABLE MEMBERS OF THE LEGISLATIVE COUNCIL:

Mr. Speaker and Members of the Legislative Assembly:

In view of the limited number of sitting days available before the Christmas adjournment, my Advisers propose that only legislation of an urgent nature should be dealt with immediately.

A Bill will be introduced to place the Justices of the Supreme Court in a comparable position with the Judges of other jurisdictions. Provision will also be made for the Judges of the County Court.

Legislation to increase superannuation payments to retired Government servants by an amount of twenty-five per cent. will be introduced. This is considered necessary in all fairness to those who, in their time, have rendered loyal and devoted service to the State.

During the present short Session other urgent Bills to be introduced will include the following measures:—

State Forests Loan Application.
Land Tax.
Administration and Probate Duties.
Stamps (Increased Duty Continuance).
University (Mildura Branch).
Public Works Loan and Application.
Water Supply Loan and Application.
Officials in Parliament.
Factories and Shops (Bread).
Vegetation Diseases (Fruit Fly).
Railways Loan and Application.
Morwell Brown Coal.
Building Materials Control.
Police Regulation.
Water Act (Amendment).

Bills to give effect to the Government's major programme will be submitted when Parliament reassembles in 1948.

I now leave you to your deliberations, in the earnest hope that, with the blessing of the Almighty, your work may result in the advancement of the welfare of all classes of the community.

then without any further or other authority than this section an easement of way or of drainage or for such supply or services as aforesaid (as the case requires), so far as is necessary for the reasonable enjoyment of the dominant tenement, shall on and from the deposit of the Commission's certificate with the Registrar of Titles be deemed to exist in favour of and appurtenant to the dominant tenement on over or under the land appropriated or set apart for the appropriate purpose on the said plan of subdivision.

(2) Where any dominant tenement referred to in the last preceding sub-section lies within or abuts on the boundaries of the land subdivided and to which the deposited plan relates, that dominant tenement may be numbered consecutively with the allotments in the said subdivision as though it were included therein and for the purposes of sub-section (1) of section two hundred and twelve of the *Transfer of Land Act* 1928 shall be deemed to be an allotment in the said sub-division.

 - (b) any member of the Council or the Assembly who is for the time being recognized as the Parliamentary Secretary of the Cabinet shall be entitled to receive out of the consolidated revenue (in addition to reimbursement of his expenses in relation to his attendance in the discharge of his parliamentary duties) an allowance at the rate of Two hundred and fifty pounds per annum in consideration of his services as such Secretary—

and this section shall not extend or apply to any member of the Council or the Assembly receiving any such allowance."

- (2) In section twenty-seven of the Principal Act as amended by any Act-
 - (a) for the expression "(3) No responsible Minister" there shall be substituted the expression "(4) No responsible Minister"; and
 - (b) for the expression "(4) Notwithstanding" there shall be substituted the expression "(5) Notwithstanding".
- (3) In section twenty-five and sub-section (1) of section twenty-seven of the Principal Act after the expression "sub-section (2)" there shall be inserted the expression "or sub-section (3)".

No. 1.—Police Offences (Race-meetings) Bill.—Clause 2 as amended.

(1) For section one hundred and fifty-one of the Principal Act as amended by any Act there shall be substituted the following section:—

"151. (1) No race-meeting shall be held except on a race-course which is licensed under this Act for horse races or for trotting races and except between the hours of ten o'clock before noon and seven o'clock in the evening:

Provided that the provisions of this sub-section relating to the hours for holding trotting races shall not apply with respect to any trotting races held at the annual show of any agricultural society approved for the purpose by the Chief Secretary or, in the case of other trotting races, to the extent specified in the licence of the race-course concerned.

[Sub-sections (2) to (12) inclusive not printed.]

- (13) (a) Notwithstanding anything in this Act the Chief Secretary may permit the owners or trustees of any race-course within thirty miles of the General Post Office Melbourne to hold race-meetings on such race-course, in excess of the statutory number, for any charitable or benevolent purpose but not exceeding three in the whole for all such race-courses in any one year.
- (b) The Charities Board of Victoria shall on or before the first day of August in each year forward to the Chief Secretary a list of institutions to participate in the distribution of the profits from such meetings, and the proportion in which eacy should share:—

Provided that at least fifty per centum of such profits shall be distributed amongst institutions which are situated not less than twenty miles from the General Post Office Melbourne.

- (c) The net profit from any such meeting shall be paid by the racing club conducting it within a period of two months from the date on which it was held into a fund to be kept in the Treasury and, prior to the thirty-first day of July in each year, the amount in such fund shall be paid in accordance with the proportion set forth in the relevant list aforesaid.
- (d) The Victoria Racing Club may hold one race-meeting in each year on any of such race-courses in excess of the statutory number for such race-courses and the net revenue of such race-meetings shall be paid into the funds of the association known as The Victoria Racing Club Benevolent Fund Association.
- (14) In the construction of this Division a year shall be deemed to commence on the first day of August and the words 'the General Post Office Melbourne' shall be deemed to mean the post office at the corner of Bourke and Elizabeth Streets Melbourne.

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- (15) Except in the case of two race-meetings in any year for horse races held on the Werribee race-course and of trotting races held by an agricultural society pursuant to the *Police Offences* (*Trotting Races*) Act 1931, no race-meeting shall be held within thirty miles of the General Post Office Melbourne on any day other than-
 - (a) a Saturday; or
 - (b) a day which is declared or appointed by or under section sixty-seven of the Public Service Act 1946 to be a public holiday throughout Victoria or within the municipalities referred to in the Sixth Schedule to that Act; or
 - (c) in the case of horse-races on the Flemington race-course conducted by The Victoria Racing Club-

 - (i) the Thursday following the first Tuesday in November; and (ii) one Wednesday, approved by the Chief Secretary, in the last week of February or the first week of March; or
 - (d) in the case of horse-races conducted by hunt clubs referred to in the First Schedule to the *Police Offences (Race-meetings) Act* 1929, one Wednesday, approved by the Chief Secretary, in July; or
 - (e) in the case of horse-races on the Caulfield race-course conducted by the Victoria Amateur Turf Club, the Wednesday preceding the Caulfield Cup in October:

Provided that, where the Chief Secretary is satisfied that owing to circumstances beyond the control of the club authorized to hold any race-meeting referred to in paragraphs (c) (d) or (e) of this sub-section it is not possible to hold such meeting on the day appointed therefor, he may authorize the meeting to be held on a later day, whether or not a day referred to in this sub-section.

- (16) Not more than a total number of—
 - (a) four hundred race-meetings for horse races; or
 - (b) seventy-five race-meetings for trotting races—

shall be held in any year on all race-courses in the area comprising all parts of Victoria which are not within thirty miles of the General Post Office Melbourne:

Provided that in calculating the number of such race-meetings picnic racemeetings and mixed sports gatherings shall not be taken into account.

 - (i) In sub-section (1) for the words "made prior" there shall be substituted the words "in force immediately prior";
 (ii) For sub-sections (2) and (3) there shall be substituted the following
 - sub-section:
 - "(2) All applications to and other proceedings before the Commonwealth Rent Controller or a Fair Rents Board under the said Commonwealth Regulations which are pending at the commencement of Part II. may be continued before and determined by the appropriate Board under this Act and any perding application for a determination shall be deemed to be an application to the appropriate Board under this Act for a determination, and the provisions of this Act shall so far as applicable apply to those applications and proceedings as if they were applications to or proceedings before the appropriate Board under this Act:

Provided that in the case of any pending proceedings by way of appeal before a Fair Rents Board under the said Commonwealth Regulations, the appropriate Board under this Act shall have the same powers duties and jurisdiction as a Fair Rents Board had under the said Commonwealth Regulations and any determination of the Board in relation to such proceedings shall have effect accordingly";

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(e) For section seven and the heading immediately above the said section there shall be substituted the following heading and section:—

"DIVISION 1.—ADMINISTRATION.

- 7. (1) The Governor in Council for the purposes of this Act may by Order published in the *Government Gazette* constitute Fair Rents Boards at such places and in respect of premises in such areas as he thinks fit.
- (2) The Governor in Council may by like Order abolish any Fair Rents Board and by the same or any subsequent order make provision for the transfer of pending proceedings before such Board to some other Board, and proceedings so transferred may be heard and determined by such other Board.
- (3) Each Board shall consist of a police magistrate who is for the time being assigned by the Governor in Council for the purpose.
- (4) The Covernor in Council by Order published in the Government Gazette may make rules relating to proceedings before Boards for the purposes of this Act.
- (5) Notwithstanding anything in the Public Service Acts, if a Board is constituted in relation to the Metropolitan Area (however described) the police magistrates constituting such Board shall be entitled to be paid such additional emolument as the Governor in Council determines";
- (f) In section eight for the word "Controller" (wherever occurring) there shall be substituted the words "Minister or an authorized officer";
- (g) In section nine-
 - (i) for the word "Controller" there shall be substituted the expression "Minister any authorized officer and (within the area of its jurisdiction) each Board";
 - (ii) for the word "him" there shall be substituted the words "him or it respectively";
- (h) For section ten there shall be substituted the following section:-
 - "10. (1) The Governor in Council may appoint such officers and inspectors as are necessary for the administration of this Act.
 - (2) Every such appointment shall be for such period and on such terms and conditions and with entitlement to such remuneration and travelling and other expenses as the Governor in Council determines.
 - (3) No person so appointed shall in respect of his office be subject to the provisions of the Public Service Acts, but if any such person is at the time of his appointment an officer of the public service he shall, subject to the said Acts, continue to be an officer of the public service.
 - (4) If any person so appointed is at the time of his appointment an officer within the meaning of the Superannuation Acts he shall, subject to those Acts, continue to be an officer within the meaning of those Acts.
 - (5) (a) The State may arrange with the Commonwealth for the employment by the State of Commonwealth officers and employés for the purposes of this Act.
 - (b) Any such arrangement may make provision for any matter necessary or expedient to be provided in relation to the administration of this Act and the employment of such officers and employés";
- (i) In section eleven for the word "Controller" (wherever occurring) there shall be substituted the words "Minister or any Board";
- (j) For sections fourteen to twenty there shall be substituted the following sections:—
 - "14. The lessor, or a lessee who has paid or has offered (either to the lessor personally or to the person to whom the rent is ordinarily paid) the money payable for all rent due and payable under the lease up to a date not earlier than twenty-eight days before the date of the application, of any prescribed premises (not being prescribed premises in relation to which a Board is not authorized to exercise the powers conferred by this Part) or the owner of any such premises which are vacant or not let may apply in writing to the appropriate Board to have the fair rent of the prescribed premises determined by such Board.
 - 15. (1) The applicant shall give at least seven days' notice in writing of the time date and place of the hearing of the application to the lessor or lessee (as the case may be) of the prescribed premises.
 - (2) Where an application is made by a mesne lessor or mesne lessee or by a sub-lessor or a sub-lessee the lessor shall give at least seven days notice in writing of the time date and place of the hearing of the application to his superior lessor and such superior lessor shall be entitled to be a party to the application.

- (3) Where a superior lessor to whom notice is given under the last preceding sub-section or under this sub-section is himself a lessee mesne lessee or sub-lessee the lessor shall give at least seven days' notice in writing of the time date and place of the hearing of the application to his superior lessor and such superior lessor shall be entitled to be a party to the application.
- (4) Where any prescribed premises in respect of which an application is made are the subject of a mortgage the lessor shall give at least seven days' notice in writing of the time date and place of the hearing of the application to the mortgagee, who shall be entitled to be a party to the application.
- 16. (1) Where an application has been made for the determination of the fair rent of any prescribed premises a Board may after making such inquiries and obtaining such reports (if any) as it considers necessary and after considering any representations made by any person whose rights may be affected by the determination, determine the fair rent of the prescribed premises or refrain from making a determination.
- (2) A Board shall not be bound by legal forms or solemnities or by any rules of evidence but may inform itself in such manner as it thinks fit.
- (3) Any person who is a party to any proceedings before a Board may with the approval of the Board be represented by counsel solicitor or agent who may examine witnesses and address the Board on that person's behalf.
- (4) (a) Except as provided in this sub-section every determination of a Board shall be final and without appeal.
- (b) There shall be an appeal, but only as to questions of law, to the Supreme Court from any determination of a Board.
- 17. (1) Every determination of the fair rent of prescribed premises made by a Board shall come into force on a date fixed by the Board, but the date so fixed shall not be earlier than the date of the application.
- (2) After making any determination the Board shall give notice in writing thereof and of the date fixed as the date on which the determination shall come into force to the lessor and lessee and the lessor shall give similar notice to any other persons to whom notices are required to be given by any party under this Part.
- 18. (1) A Board may of its own motion after inquiry determine the fair rent of any prescribed premises.
- (2) The Board shall give to the lessor and lessee of the prescribed premises notice of its intention to determine the fair rent of the premises, and the notice so given to the lessor shall for the purposes of this Part be deemed to be an application by the lessor.
- (3) In determining the fair rent of prescribed premises under this section the Board shall have the same powers as it has in connexion with an application, and any determination so made by the Board shall have the same effect for all purposes as a determination made upon an application.
- 19. A Board may if it thinks fit cause any prescribed premises to be inspected in connexion with the determination of the fair rent of the premises.
 - 20. No costs shall be allowed in any proceedings before a Board";

 - (b) For the purpose of calculating any entitlement under this sub-section, in any case where a transferred officer receives from the Commonwealth pay in lieu of long service leave for a period exceeding six months-
 - (i) the period shall be deemed to be six months;
 - (ii) the Commonwealth pay in lieu of leave shall be deemed to be reduced proportionately.

No. 3.—Prices Regulation Bill—Clause 25.

- (1) No person shall-
 - (a) sell or offer for sale any declared goods or supply or offer to supply any declared service at a greater price or rate than the maximum price or rate fixed in relation thereto by or under this Part for the sale of those goods or the supply of that service; or
 - (b) without the prior approval of the Commissioner sell or offer for sale any declared goods or supply or offer to supply any declared service upon terms or conditions different from the terms or conditions upon which substantially identical goods or services were sold or supplied by him on the prescribed date if such sale or offer for sale or supply or offer to supply upon such terms and conditions would result directly or indirectly—

 (i) in a greater price or rate than the maximum price or rate fixed in

 - relation thereto being obtained; or

 (ii) in any other manner to the advantage of the seller or supplier.
- (2) In addition to any other penalty that may be imposed for a contravention of sub-section (1) of this section the court may order the defendant to refund to the purchaser of the goods or to the person receiving the service the difference between the maximum price or rate so fixed and the price or rate at which the goods were sold or the service supplied, and the like proceedings may be taken upon the order as if the order had been an order of the court in favour of the purchaser.

(3) A certificate by the Commissioner specifying the difference between the maximum price or rate fixed in relation to the goods or service the sale or supply of which is the subject of any proceedings under sub-section (1) of this section and the price or rate at which the goods were sold or the service supplied shall, for the purposes of the last preceding subsection, be *prima facie* evidence of the matters stated therein.

- (2) The chairman and the member representing the Government of Victoria shall be appointed by the Governor in Council and the member representing the officers and employés of or in the Mental Hygiene Branch shall be a person who is elected by officers of the said Branch in the manner prescribed by regulations made under this section.
- (3) If there is no candidate for an election of the elected member of the Tribunal or if for any reason no person is elected at an election the Governor in Council may without election appoint a person as the elected member.
- (4) The members of the Tribunal shall hold office for such term, not exceeding three years, as is fixed by the Governor in Council before election or appointment (as the case may be) and shall be eligible for re-election or re-appointment and the members of the Tribunal shall be severally entitled to receive such fees and travelling expenses as are fixed by the Governor in Council.

(7) The Tribunal may determine the scales of salaries and wages (including where the Tribunal thinks fit provision for minimum annual increments) in respect of classes and grades of offices or employment in the Mental Hygiene Branch and the salaries and wages paid in accordance with such scales shall be subject to automatic adjustment according to variations in the cost of living prescribed for officers and employés in the public service by or under the Public Service Act 1946.

- (1) The State Rivers and Water Supply Commission shall prepare a provisional return of permanent officers of the Water Supply Department.
 - (2) Such return-
 - (a) shall set out-
 - (i) the names of such officers; and
 - (ii) a classification of each such officer (including the rate of salary or emolument payable to each such officer); and
