Read a second time and committed; considered in Committee and reported with amendments; recommitted in respect of clause 104; reconsidered in Committee and re-reported with a further amendment; report, by leave, considered and adopted; Bill read the third time and passed, 6th December, p. 98.

Message from the Assembly notifying that they have agreed to some of the amendments of the Council, have disagreed with others, have agreed to one of the said amendments with an amendment, and have disagreed with one amendment in clause 4, line 11, but have made a consequential amendment, 8th December, p. 105.

1965.)

LOAN CONVERSION BILL.—Bill intituled "An Act to authorize the raising of Money for the Redemption or Payment of certain Treasury Bonds and for other purposes."—(Hon. J. M. Davies.)—Brought from the Legislative Assembly and read a first time, 16th November, 1905, p. 79.

Read a second time and committed; considered in Committee, 21st November, p. 81.

Reported with the following suggested amendments, viz.:—

Clause 7, line 41, omit "of twenty thousand pounds," and insert "equal to one per centum of the amount borrowed under this Act."

Clause 7, lines 44-5, omit "a sum of seven hundred thousand pounds has been paid into the said fund under the provisions of this Act," and insert "the amount so borrowed is paid off or redeemed."

In Item 1 of the Schedule, omit "Any portion of the sum provided for Item 1 which is not required for the said purpose of redemption shall be added to and be available for the purposes of Item 2 of this Schedule";

-report adopted, 21st November, p. 81.

McAnulty Superannuation Allowance Bill.—Bill intituled "An Act to provide a Superannuation Allowance to Paul Anthony McAnulty."—(Hon. J. M. Davies.)—Brought from the Legislative Assembly and read a first time, 10th October, 1905, p. 64.

Read a second time and committed; considered in Committee, 17th October, p. 66.

Further considered in Committee, 31st October, p. 69.

Reported with the following suggested amendments, viz.:—

Clause 1, lines 9-12, omit "shall as from such day receive under Part VI. of the Act No. 160 a superannuation allowance computed at the same rate as if he had on such day actually attained the age of sixty years, and he," substitute "there shall as from the said day be paid in the manner hereinafter provided as a superannuation allowance such monthly sum as is equal to the monthly rate of a superannuation allowance to the said Paul Anthony McAnulty computed under Part VI. of the Act No. 160 as if he had on the said day actually attained the age of sixty years, and the said Paul Anthony McAnulty."

Clause 1, line 15, after "Act" add—"Out of each monthly sum so payable Twenty pounds sixteen shillings and eight pence shall during the lifetime of said Paul Anthony McAnulty be paid to his wife Mrs. Bridget Cecilia McAnulty and after her death to her executors or administrators for the support and maintenance of the said Paul Anthony McAnulty and his infant children if any and the balance of the said monthly sum shall be paid to the said Paul Anthony McAnulty";

—report adopted, 31st October, pp. 69-70.

MELBOURNE AND METROPOLITAN BOARD OF WORKS ACTS AMENDMENT BILL.—Bill intituled "An Act to amend the Melbourne and Metropolitan Board of Works Acts."—(Hon. J. M. Davies.)—Brought from the Legislative Assembly, and read a first time, 8th December, 1905, p. 107.

MINUTES OF THE PROCEEDINGS

OF THE

LEGISLATIVE COUNCIL.

TUESDAY, 27TH JUNE, 1905.

1. The Council met pursuant to the Proclamation of His Excellency the Governor, bearing date the 11th day of May, 1905, which Proclamation was read by the Clerk, and is as follows:

FIXING THE TIME FOR HOLDING THE SECOND SESSION OF THE TWENTIETH PARLIAMENT OF VICTORIA.

PROCLAMATION

By His Excellency the Honorable Sir Reginald Arthur James Talbot, Knight Commander of the Most Honorable Order of the Bath, Governor of the State of Victoria and its Dependencies in the Commonwealth of Australia, &c., &c., &c.

Whereas The Parliament of Victoria stands prorogued until Tuesday, the 16th day of May, 1905: Now I, the Governor of the State of Victoria, in the Commonwealth of Australia, do by this my Proclamation further prorogue the said Parliament of Victoria until Tuesday, the 27th day of June, 1905; and I do hereby fix Tuesday, the 27th day of June, 1905, aforesaid, as the time for the commencement and holding of the next Session of the said Parliament of Victoria, for the despatch of business, at the hour of Two o'clock in the afternoon, in the State Parliament Houses, situate in the Carlton Gardens, in the City of Melbourne: And the Honorable the Members of the Legislative Council and the Members of the Legislative Assembly are hereby required to give their attendance at the said time and place accordingly.

Given under my Hand and the Seal of the State of Victoria aforesaid, at Melbourne, this eleventh day of May, in the year of our Lord One thousand nine hundred and five, and in the fifth year of His Majesty's reign.

2. Approach of His Excellency the Governor.—The approach of His Excellency the Governor was announced by the Usher.

His Excellency came into the Council Chamber, and commanded the immediate attendance of the Legislative Assembly, who being come with their Speaker, His Excellency was pleased to speak as follows:—

Mr. President and Honorable Gentlemen of the Legislative Council:

Mr. Speaker and Gentlemen of the Legislative Assembly:

I have called you together for the purpose of seeking your advice and assistance with regard to various important matters.

It affords me great pleasure to be able to inform you that the finances of the State continue in a satisfactory condition, and that the accounts for the year ending on the 30th instant will show

a substantial surplus.

Upon the recommendation of the Lands Purchase and Management Board, appointed under the provisions of the Closer Settlement Act, My Advisers have purchased several estates suitable for the purposes of the Act. The work of surveying and subdividing those estates is proceeding as rapidly as possible, and it is hoped that within a short time the lands will be available for settlement. You will be gratified to learn that, owing to the buoyancy of the revenue, it has been possible to defray a large portion of the cost of the purchase of the estates out of the ordinary income of the

During the recess a Conference of Federal and State Ministers was held in Hobart, at which Victoria was represented. Many subjects of importance were discussed, notably the questions of the taking over by the Federal Government of the debts of the States, the continuation for a further period of the provisions of the clause in the Commonwealth Constitution for the return to the States of three-fourths of the Customs and Excise Revenue, the payments to be made to the various States on account of properties transferred to the Commonwealth, and the steps to be taken for promoting the commercial and agricultural interests of Australia. The representatives of New South Wales, South Australia, and Victoria also conferred on the important subject of the control and distribution of the waters of the River Murray. Though finality was not arrived at on those questions, yet a distinct advance was made towards a satisfactory settlement.

The investigations of the Royal Commission on the Butter Industry have thrown light upon the manner in which that business has been conducted. The report of the Commission has shown the necessity for legislation dealing with certain abuses, and with the removal of obstacles to the development of the industry. To remedy one of the chief evils disclosed by the inquiry, My Advisers have prepared, and will lay before you, a measure dealing with the subject of Secret Commissions. The other matters referred to in the report are receiving careful consideration.

In connexion with the Butter Industry, you will also be glad to know that such a substantial reduction in the charges for freight has been secured from the shipping companies as will materially assist in developing the export trade by enabling producers to compete in the markets of the world on terms more favorable than hitherto.

The important Bill to consolidate and amend the Water Acts, and to declare the law as to private rights in natural waters, which was under your consideration last session, will be again submitted to you, and will, My Advisers trust, be placed upon the Statute-Book.

With the view of improving the Port of Geelong, it is proposed to increase the depth of the Hopetoun Channel, and to provide an increase of berthage. Trading vessels of a greater draught will be thus enabled to enter the port, discharge their cargoes, and reload, with safety and despatch. A Bill to make provision for these works will be laid before you.

The work of deepening the entrance to Port Phillip Heads is being steadily proceeded with, and, in order to provide additional accommodation for ocean shipping, My Advisers propose to submit a scheme for constructing a new dock at Port Melbourne.

The important matter of insuring that the food of the people shall be pure and wholesome, has been carefully considered, and Bills have been prepared for preventing its adulteration, and for securing the proper supervision of dairies and of the sale of milk.

The recently appointed Inspector-General of the Insane is now in charge of the various asylums of the State, and is being consulted by My Advisers with reference to the adoption of such measures of improvement as may be found to be practicable.

The care and the treatment of persons suffering from consumption have received earnest consideration, and My Advisers have established sanatoria at Broadmeadows and Point Nepean, where such cases are being dealt with according to the best methods known to medical science. Arrangements have also been made for the admission of similar cases into several of the country hospitals.

Mr. Speaker and Gentlemen of the Legislative Assembly:

The Estimates of Expenditure will be submitted to you, and, while providing for the requirements of the State, they will be found to have been prepared with due regard to economy.

Mr. President and Honorable Gentlemen of the Legislative Council:

Mr. Speaker and Gentlemen of the Legislative Assembly:

The work of codifying the Criminal Law has been completed, and a measure has been prepared, and will be laid before you, to give effect to this desirable reform. A Bill providing for the imposition of indeterminate sentences in criminal cases will also be laid before you.

You will also be asked to consider a Bill to consolidate and make permanent the law relating to Factories and Shops.

In order to improve the standard of efficiency in the schools of the State, a measure dealing with the status and remuneration of teachers will be submitted to you containing provisions for the more ready recognition and reward of those who prove themselves the most meritorious.

During the recess a Continuation School was established wherein teachers, and those intending to become teachers, may acquire the valuable art of imparting instruction to the young. This special Institution will also form a connecting link between the State School and the University for those pupils who win distinctions in the State Schools.

You will be asked to consider measures providing for the re-organization of the Forests Department, and for the better management of the valuable timber-producing areas of the State.

In furtherance of their policy of developing the Mining Resources of the State, My Advisers have arranged to advance a sum of £5,000 to the South Star Gold Mining Company on the Sebastopol Plateau, Ballarat, for the purpose of sinking its shaft (already the deepest in the district) to 3,000 feet, and cross-cutting for the lodes at this depth, thus assisting to prove the mineral resources of this important gold-field at a much greater depth than hitherto.

The results of the working of the Railways for the past year are most satisfactory, both the gross receipts and the net revenue being the largest ever earned by the Department. Full details of the accounts of the year, and of the manner in which it is intended to deal with the surplus shown in those accounts will be duly submitted to you.

My Advisers intend to lay before you a number of other measures, including Bills providing for compulsory voting, for the prevention of disorderly conduct at public meetings, for the protection of securities belonging to Friendly Societies, for amending the Land Act and the Land Tax Act, and for removing certain anomalies in the Public Service Acts; also Bills relating to Stock Foods, Stamp Duties, and the improvement of the Carrum Swamp.

I now leave you to your deliberations, the result of which will, I trust, under the blessing

of Divine Providence, conduce to the prosperity and happiness of the people.

Which, being concluded, a copy of the Speech was delivered to the President, and a copy to Mr. Speaker, and His Excellency the Governor left the Chamber.

The Legislative Assembly then withdrew.

- 3. The President took the Chair and read the Prayer.

An Act to apply out of the Consolidated Revenue the sum of Fifty-nine thousand four hundred and eighty-one pounds to the service of the year One thousand nine hundred and four and One thousand nine hundred and five.

3. Fetitions.—The Honorable T. H. Payne presented a Petition from George Godfrey, barrister and solicitor, praying that the Council would take into consideration the case of the Petitioner, and that the Petition presented on the 29th November last may be dealt with by the Elections and Qualifications Committee as originally ordered by the Council, and that the Petitioner may be heard at the Bar of the Council in support of his rights.

The Petition was read and is as follows:-

To the Honorable the President and Members of the Legislative Council of the State of Victoria.

The humble Petition of George Godfrey, of Collins-street, Melbourne, in the State of Victoria, Barrister and Solicitor:

DESPECTELLIA SHEWETH...

That on the 1st day of June, 1904, an election was held for two Members to serve in the Legislative Council of the State of Victoria to represent the Melbourne South Province.

That your Petitioner was a candidate at the said election.

That Thomas Henry Payne, Esquire, Thomas Luxton, Esquire, and Nathaniel Levi,

Esquire, were the only other candidates at the said election.

That, as the result of the said election, the Returning Officer announced that Thomas Henry Payne had received 3,951 votes, that Thomas Luxton had received 3,699 votes, that Nathaniel Levi had received 1,512 votes, and that your Petitioner had received 3,665 votes, and thereupon the said Returning Officer publicly declared that the said Thomas Henry Payne and Thomas Luxton had received the majority of votes and were duly elected as Members as aforesaid, and such Returning Officer made his return accordingly.

That the said Thomas Luxton was guilty of an illegal practice at the said election under the sixth section of the *Election Expenses Limitation Act* 1903, in that he did not make a true return in the form set forth in the Second Schedule to that Act, or to the like effect, containing a statement of all electoral expenses, together with all bills and receipts respecting the same, accompanied by a statutory declaration in the form of the Third Schedule to that Act, or to the like

effect.

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That the said Thomas Luxton was also guilty of an illegal practice at the said election under the third section of the said Act, in that he knowingly incurred electoral expenses in excess of the maximum amount in that behalf specified in Part 2 of the Schedule to the said Act.

That the evidence and facts relating to the said illegal practices committed by the said Thomas Luxton above set forth were not known to your Petitioner till the end of September last, when your Petitioner at once took proceedings under the said Act against the said Thomas Luxton,

in the Court of Petty Sessions.

That on the 18th day of October last the said Thomas Luxton was in the Court of Petty Sessions, at Melbourne, fined for the illegal practice under the said sixth section of the said Act in the sum of Ten pounds, and Ten pounds ten shillings costs, which fine and costs were paid by the said Thomas Luxton.

That on the 29th day of November last your Petitioner in terms of the 302nd section of The Constitution Act Amendment Act 1890 presented his Petition to the President of the Legislative Council setting forth the above facts and praying that the Petition of your Petitioner might be referred to a Committee of the said Council, duly authorized to receive, inquire into, and report upon the same according to law, and further praying that in the event of the said Committee reporting that the said Thomas Luxton was guilty of illegal practices at the said Election a new Writ might issue for the holding of another Election for the said Province for a member in the place of the said Thomas Luxton.

That on the 30th day of November last your Honorable House, upon the motion of the Attor-

ney-General, referred the said Petition to the Elections and Qualifications Committee.

That your Petitioner is informed and believes that your Honorable House, on the 11th day of July last, referred certain questions arising in connexion with the said Petition to the Standing Orders Committee of your Honorable House.

That your Petitioner is further informed and believes that on the 18th day of July last the Hon. the Attorney-General presented the report of the Standing Orders Committee, whereby the said Committee had agreed to the following resolution:—"That, in the opinion of this Committee the time for dealing with the Petition of Mr. George Godfrey against the return of the Hon. Thomas Luxton had expired"; and the said Attorney-General moved—"That the said report be laid on the Table, and that it be taken into consideration the next day of meeting."

That on the 25th day of July last your Honorable House adopted the said report of the said

Committee.

That your Petitioner respectfully submits that the said Petition was presented in due time, and was properly referred in the last session of Parliament to the Elections and Qualifications Committee.

That the Elections and Qualifications Committee is different from all other Committees of your Honorable House, and does not come to an end with the Session, although changes are made at the commencement of each Session in the personnel of the Committee; it is also appointed by the President, and not by the Council.

That your Petitioner respectfully submits that after the Petition was referred as aforesaid to the Elections and Qualifications Committee there was no power in the Council to refer the consideration of matters relating to the Petition to the Standing Orders Committee until the Elections and Qualifications Committee had the Petition before them, and sought the opinion of the Standing Orders Committee, and that the action of the Council and of the Standing Orders Committee is contrary to Constitutional Law, prejudicial to your Petitioner, and a denial of his rights.

Your Petitioner therefore prays that your Honorable House will take into consideration the case of your Petitioner, and that the Petition presented on the 29th November last may be dealt with by the Elections and Qualifications Committee as originally ordered by your Honorable House, and that your Petitioner may be heard at the Bar of your Honorable House in support of his rights.

- "An Act to provide for the Transfer of Victorian Government Inscribed Stock or Consolidated Inscribed Stock or Debentures from London Registers to Melbourne Registers.'

"An Act to amend the 'Drainage Areas Act 1898."

- "An Act to prohibit the Smoking of Opium and for other purposes."
- "An Act to authorize the Sale of certain Crown Land to the City of South Melbourne."

"An Act to amend the 'Education Act 1901."

- "An Act to amend the Law relating to State School Teachers."
- "An Act to amend the Melbourne and Metropolitan Board of Works Acts."

- "An Act to amend the 'Factories and Shops Act 1905.'"

- "An Act to regulate the Production and Sale of Milk and Dairy Produce and for other purposes."
- "An Act to provide for the Construction of Works in connexion with the Harbor at Geelong."
- "An Act to provide for the Registration of Teachers and Schools."
- 3. Approach of His Excellency the Governor.—The approach of His Excellency the Governor was announced by the Usher.
- 4. ROYAL ASSENT TO BILLS.—His Excellency the Governor came into the Council Chamber and commanded the Usher to desire the attendance of the Legislative Assembly, who, being come with their Speaker, he, after a short speech to His Excellency, delivered the Appropriation Bill to the Clerk of the Parliaments, who brought it to the Table.

His Excellency was then pleased to assent to the following Bills:-

" An Act to apply a sum out of the Consolidated Revenue to the Service of the year ending on the thirtieth day of June One thousand nine hundred and six and to appropriate the Supplies granted in this Session of Parliament."

"An Act to provide for the Incorporation and Government of The Talbot Colony for Epileptics and for other purposes."

" An Act to consolidate and amend the Laws relating to the Conservation and Supply of Water to declare the Law relating to certain Rights in Natural Waters the property in the beds and banks containing the same and for other purposes."

To these Bills the Royal Assent was pronounced severally by the Clerk of the Parliaments in these words:—

"In the name and on behalf of His Majesty I assent to this Act."

5. His Excellency was then pleased to speak as follows:—

Mr. President and Honorable Gentlemen of the Legislative Council:

Mr. Speaker and Gentlemen of the Legislative Assembly:

It affords me pleasure to release you from the duties of the Session, and to congratulate you upon the excellence of the work which you have accomplished.

The measures you have passed include some Acts of great importance to the people of the State—notably that which consolidates and amends the Water Acts. That measure will greatly facilitate the work of water conservation, and will permit of the irrigation of districts in which the rainfall is inadequate to render the soil fertile. By these means the possibilities of production and the capabilities of the land for supporting a larger population will be greatly enhanced.

You have consolidated, and thereby simplified, the law relating to Factories and Shops, and have placed permanently upon the Statute-book a measure embodying those principles of industrial legislation which have been found, as the result of experience, to be of advantage both to employers and employes. You have also passed a further Act extending the scope of this law in several important particulars.

The Act for the prohibition of the giving or receiving of Secret Commissions on business transactions will, it is hoped, prevent the continuance of such abuses as were disclosed in the Report of the Royal Commission on the Butter Industry, and tend to promote a higher standard of commercial morality.

It is a matter for congratulation that the finances of the State are still in a most satisfactory condition, and that you have been able, out of a Surplus Revenue of £526,000, to substantially reduce the State's indebtedness to the Trust Funds, and to provide for extensive and useful public works.

The Loan Conversion Act and the Treasury Bonds Act will place My Advisers in a strong position with regard to the conversion of any maturing loans, by giving every facility for placing issues either locally or in London, as may be deemed most advantageous.

The measures providing respectively for the transfer of Government stock or debentures from the London to the Melbourne registers, and for the conversion of debentures into stock, will prove of material advantage to investors in Government securities.

The Milk Supervision Act will place the dairying industry on a better basis, by providing

The Milk Supervision Act will place the dairying industry on a better basis, by providing for improved inspection, and by educating the people in the most approved modern methods. By these means it is hoped that not only will the quality of milk for numan consumption be greatly improved, but that all preventable disease in dairy stock will be eradicated.

The Pure Food Act also will turnish a guarantee to the public that articles offered for sale for human consumption are free from admixture with deleterious or foreign substances, and that the labels on such articles indicate truly their nature or composition.

Mr. Speaker and Gentlemen of the Legislative Assembly:

In His Majesty's name, I thank you for the liberal provision you have made for the necessary services of the State.

Mr. President and Honorable Gentlemen of the Legislative Council:

Mr. Speaker and Gentlemen of the Legislative Assembly:

You have authorized the appointment of a Commission to carry out a comprehensive scheme for the improvement of the Port of Geelong, including the deepening of the Hopetoun Channel, and the provision of further wharfage accommodation. The better facilities thus afforded for shipping will benefit and stimulate the producing industry over the very large portion of the State which is commanded by the railway system leading to that port.

The work of surveying, sub-dividing, and allotting to applicants the estates which have been purchased for the purposes of Closer Settlement is still being actively proceeded with, and My Advisers expect that before long the whole of the lands so acquired will be occupied by settlers of a desirable class.

The State School Teachers Act, while removing anomalies in the administration of the Department of Public Instruction, will provide for the proper reward of able and meritorious service, and thereby offer a greater stimulus to the large number of men and women engaged in the educational work of the State. The Registration of Teachers and Schools Act will, it is hoped, in course of time, raise the standard of teaching in private schools. The measure dealing with truancy provides better machinery for carrying out the compulsory attendance clauses of the Education Acts.

You have also passed a number of other useful and beneficial measures, amongst which may be mentioned the Act dealing with the prevalent vice of Opium Smoking and Eating; the Act to amend the Probate Charges Act; the Act to amend the Melbourne and Metropolitan Board of Works Act; the Poisons Act Amendment Act; and the Victorian Railways Motor Act.

I now, in His Majesty's name, declare this Parliament to be prorogued until Tuesday, the

6th day of February, 1906, and it is prorogued accordingly.

The expression "the applicants" in relation to any proposal to construct waterworks includes

such council councils or councillors as the case may require.

The term "waterworks" in this Division includes works for the supply of water to any lands or tenements and also works for the drainage and removal of surplus or excess water from any lands or tenements.—(Hon. J. M. Davies.)

Amendment proposed—That the following new paragraph be inserted after line 10:--" When a number not being less than five persons being ratepayers in any municipal district or districts desire to form themselves into a trust for the construction maintenance and continuance at their own expense of waterworks having for object only works for the drainage and removal of surplus or excess water from any lands or tenements such persons may make application to the Minister for that purpose under the provisions hereinafter made for applications for construction of waterworks by any council councils or councillors wherever such provisions are applicable."—(Hon. No. 2.—Water Acts Consolidation and Amendment Bill.—Clause 325:—

For the purpose of enforcing any such charge proceedings may be had and taken by the Authority in the Supreme Court or in any county court and the court may order the sale of the whole or any part of the lands and tenements subject to the charge.

For such purpose any county court shall have jurisdiction and shall exercise all the powers and authorities of the Supreme Court in all proceedings under Part I. of the Trusts Act 1890 not-withstanding that the trust estate or fund to which the proceeding relates may exceed in amount

or value the sum of Five hundred pounds.

Where for such purposes any decree or order of any county court is made relating to land under the Transfer of Land Act 1890 such decree or order shall for all the purposes of such Act have the same force and effect and shall be received dealt with and given effect to in all respects thereunder as if it were a decree or order of the Supreme Court and the said Act and any Schedule thereto shall be deemed to be amended accordingly.—(Hon. J. M. Davies.)

Amendment proposed—That the following new paragraph be inserted after line 3:—"In the event of the Authority obtaining one or more orders in a Court of Petty Sessions the Authority may remove such order or orders by a certificate in the form or to the effect contained in Form No. 57 of the Second Schedule to the Justices Act 1890 by substituting the words 'County Court' for the words 'Supreme Court' in such Schedule and which certificates may contain any number of such orders and such certificates shall be issued upon similar terms to those applicable to a certificate to the Supreme Court under section one hundred and fifteen of the Justices Act 1890, and the County Court shall make upon such certificate an order for the sale of the whole or any part of the land subject to the charge and shall provide for notice of the intended sale being put on the land and published in a newspaper circulating in the locality of the land and also in a daily newspaper published in Melbourne three months prior to such sale and also within one week of such sale, and providing for all costs and charges incidental to such proceedings being a first charge on the proceeds of the sale and any residue of the proceeds of such sale shall be dealt with in manner herein provided for in reference to the residue of rents from lands taken possession of by the Authority under section three hundred and thirty-one of this Act."—(Hon. No. 4.—Water Acts Consolidation and Amendment Bill.—Clause 5:—

Where any river creek stream or water-course or any lake forms the boundary or part of the boundary of an allotment of land heretofore alienated by the Crown the bed and banks thereof shall be deemed to have remained the property of the Crown and not to have passed with the land so alienated.

Where any river creek stream or water-course or any lake lagoon swamp or marsh shall form the boundary or part of the boundary of an allotment of land hereafter alienated by the Crown the bed and banks thereof shall notwithstanding such alienation remain the property of the Crown and shall not pass with the land so alienated.

In any such case whether of land heretofore or hereafter alienated by the Crown such bed and banks shall be and remain the property of the Crown notwithstanding that one and the same person has been or is the owner of the lands adjacent to both banks or holds or obtains a consolidated

certificate under the Transfer of Land Act 1890 in respect of such lands.

But nothing in this section shall be deemed to affect any rights of the Melbourne and Metropolitan Board of Works or of the Melbourne Harbor Trust Commissioners or of the Victorian Railways Commissioners or of the Corporation of the city of Melbourne in the bed soil and banks of the River Yarra Yarra and of all other public rivers creeks and water-courses within the metropolis as defined in the Melbourne and Metropolitan Board of Works Act 1890 as amended by the Melbourne and Metropolitan Board of Works Act 1893.—(Hon. (1) If in the opinion of the Chairman of the Board there is reasonable ground for suspecting that any person is in possession of for the purposes of sale or for manufacturing or preparing for sale of any article of food or drug or appliance or substance in contravention of the provisions of the Health Acts he may require such person to produce for his inspection or to produce to any the nearth Acts he may require such person to produce for his inspection or to produce to any specially authorized officer any books for inspection relating to his business.

(2) The Chairman may make or cause to be made copies of or extracts from any such books and if in his opinion it is advisable he may impound and retain or cause to be impounded

and retained any such books as evidence in the event of prosecution.

(3) Any person refusing to comply with any provision of this section shall be guilty of an offence against this Act.

(4) Any officer who does not maintain and aid in maintaining the secrecy of all matters which come to his knowledge in the performance of his official duties under this section or who communicates any such matter to any person whatsoever except for the purpose of carrying into effect the provisions of the Health Acts shall be guilty of an offence and shall be liable on conviction to a penalty not exceeding Fifty pounds.—(Hon. Except in the case of any package of any article of food which shall have been exempted from any or all of the provisions of this section by regulations made on the recommendation of the Food Standards Committee there shall be legibly and durably printed stencilled impressed or marked on or attached to every package of any article of food packed or enclosed for sale a label or tag or statement indicating the trade name or description the net weight or number or true measure or volume of the contents thereof and the name and address of the vendor or maker thereof or agent therefor or of the owner of rights of manufacture; and no person shall after the thirtieth day of June One thousand nine hundred and six sell in a package any article of food unless such a label or tag or statement is printed stencilled impressed or attached to or marked on such package as required by this section.—(Hon. Notwithstanding any provision of the Adulteration of Wine Act 1900 no person shall sell wine which contains an amount of—

(a) soluble chlorides exceeding half-a-gramme per litre or thirty-five grains per gallon calculated as sodium chloride, or

(b) soluble sulphates which calculated as potassium sulphate exceeds two grammes per litre or one hundred and forty grains per gallon, or

(c) free sulphurous acid exceeding twenty milligrammes per litre or one and four-tenths grains per gallon, or

(d) total sulphurous acid (free and combined) exceeding two hundred milligrammes per litre or fourteen grains per gallon, or

(e) any foreign substance specified under section six of the said Act provided that this prohibition shall not apply to such amounts of ethers boron compounds or glycerine as may be normally contained therein and are not in excess of any restrictive regulation made under this Act.—(Hon. No. 9.—Pure Food Bill.—Clause 26:—

(1) After the thirtieth day of June One thousand nine hundred and six no person shall unles s so prescribed by regulations under this Act sell or use in the manufacture preserving storage or conducting of any article of food for sale any cooking utensil or any appliance—

(a) consisting wholly or in part of lead or of any metal alloy containing more than ten per centum by weight of lead, or

(b) soldered (where in contact with any article of food) with a metal alloy containing more than ten per centum by weight of lead, or

(c) tinned inside with a metal alloy containing more than one per centum by weight of lead, or

(d) containing enamel or glaze or india-rubber or gutta-percha which on boiling for thirty minutes with vinegar containing four per centum by weight of acetic acid yields lead to the latter, or

(e) containing more than one-fourth of one grain of arsenicum per pound of metal alloy or enamel or glaze or india-rubber or gutta-percha.

(2) Nothing in this section shall prevent the packing of or sale of tea in packages made of or lined with lead.—(Hon. A. O. Sachse.)

REVENUE SURPLUS

PETITION.

To the Honorable the President and other Members of the Legislative Council of Victoria IN PARLIAMENT ASSEMBLED:

The Petition of The Melbourne Tramway and Omnibus Company Limited

HUMBLY SHEWETH:

1. That in pursuance of the provisions of the Act No. 765, which was passed on 12th October, 1883, your Petitioners have constructed the system of tramways for Melbourne and the surrounding Municipalities authorized by that Act and other Acts amending the same, and they now hold a Lease thereof which will expire in June, 1916.

2. That immediately the Act No. 765 was passed, it was discovered that no provision had been made therein for adequately securing your Petitioners against opposition during their tenancy of the tramways, and Parliament accordingly, on 3rd November, 1883, passed the Act No. 786, Section 51 of

which is as follows, viz. :-

"Tramways may be constructed in any Municipal District including the Town of Geelong, except the Municipal Districts of Fitzroy, Collingwood, Prahran, Richmond, South Melbourne, Hotham, St. Kilda, Brunswick, Kew, Hawthorn, and Sandridge, when authorized as provided in the Second Schedule, and all the Regulations in such Schedule shall take effect as if contained in this Act."

That Section is still in force—See the Tranways Act 1890, Section 3.

3. That your Petitioners are bound by the said Act No. 765 and amending Acts and by the Lease granted to them to pay the entire cost of construction of the said system of tramways, as well as the interest on all moneys borrowed by the Melbourne Tramways Trust for such construction, and to maintain and repair such tramways until June, 1916, and then to hand the same over to the Municipalities free of cost.

4. That, in reliance on the protection afforded by the said Act 786, the sum of £1,200,000 was

borrowed for the purpose of constructing the said tramways, and a very large part thereof is still unpaid.

5. That your Petitioners also, in reliance on the said Act 786, entered into agreements with the Melbourne Tramways Trust to construct certain branch lines and extensions not included in the Act

765, and which involved a further liability of £450,000.

6. That part of the system of tramways constructed by and leased to your Petitioners consists of a line in the Municipality of St. Kilda, leading from the "Vi lage Belle," in Acland-street, along Fitzroy-street in that Municipality, and passing the St. Kilda Railway Station, and of another line in the same Municipality leading from Grosvenor-street, in St. Kilda, along the Brighton and St. Kilda roads to

7. That, on 30th November, 1904, Parliament passed the Act No. 1956, known as the St. Kilda and Brighton Electric Street Railway Act 1904, authorizing the construction of an electric tramway between Grosvenor-street, in the Municipality of Brighton, and the terminus of your Petitioners' said tramway

line at the "Village Belle" aforesaid.

8. That before the last-mentioned Act was passed, and while the measure was under the consideration of Parliament, your Petitioners, at the request of the Honorable the P emier, agreed with him to carry the passengers from the "Village Belle" terminus to the Railway Station at St. Kilda for One penny, and, relying on that agreement, your Petitioners did not oppose the passage of the said Measure.

9. That in the Surplus Revenue Bill which passed the Legislative Assembly on the 9th day of August

instant a sum of £8,000 has been allocated for the construction of an extension of the said St. Kilda and Brighton Electric Railway from the terminus at the "Village Belle" to the St. Kilda Railway Station by a route running nearly midway between the two lines of your Petitioners, mentioned in paragraph 5 hereof, and within a short distance from each line.

10. That the construction of such last-mentioned extension would seriously prejudice your Petitioners, and would, in the judgment of your Petitioners, be opposed to the spirit of the Act No. 786, and tend to lessen the confidence of those who have lent their moneys on the security of the said tramways.

Your Petitioners therefore humbly pray that your Honorable House will not approve of the construction of the proposed extension of the said tramway in the Municipality of St. Kilda.

And your Petitioners as in duty bound will ever pray.

SURPLUS REVENUE BILL

PETITION.

To the Honorable the President and other Members of the Legislative Council of Victoria. The Petition of the undersigned Brickmakers in Victoria.

HUMBLY SHEWETH:

1. That your Petitioners are respectively engaged in the manufacture and sale of bricks, and have invested a very large amount of money in the purchase of land and in providing buildings, machinery, and plant for the conduct of their respective businesses.

2. That your Petitioners have observed that a Bill has passed the Honorable the Legislative Assembly intituled the "Surplus Revenue Bill," in which a grant of Nine thousand six hundred pounds is proposed to be made for the erection of Brickworks and the purchase of land therefor.

3 That such grant, though ostensibly made for the requirements of some State Department, is in reality intended to provide certain private persons with the means of competing with your Petitioners in

business, and of earning profits for themselves.

4. That your Petitioners have for many years past carried on their several businesses, in some instances at great loss, and in others at a very low return on their capital, and they are now not earning more than a very moderate profit thereon, and they respectfully submit that it is not right that a Government should, under the pretext of obtaining a supply of goods for one of its Departments, practically provide certain persons with capital out of the public funds to compete with private individuals in the conduct of their businesses.

5. That if your Honorable House were to pass the said Grant, a precedent will thereby be established which, in the opinion of your Petitioners, will impair public confidence in the affairs of the State and

seriously affect all private enterprise, apart from the injury it may do to your Petitioners.

Your Petitioners therefore humbly pray that your Honorable House will be pleased to withhold its sanction to the Grant of Nine thousand six hundred pounds for the purpose of the erection of Brickworks and the purchase of land therefor.

And your Petitioners as in duty bound will ever pray.
