### WEDNESDAY, 15TH JUNE, 1955

1. The Council met pursuant to the Proclamation of His Excellency the Governor, bearing date the seventh day of June, 1955, which Proclamation was read by the Clerk and is as follows:—

FIXING THE TIME FOR HOLDING THE FIRST SESSION OF THE FORTIETH PARLIAMENT OF VICTORIA.

#### PROCLAMATION

By His Excellency the Governor of the State of Victoria and its Dependencies in the Commonwealth of Australia, &c., &c.

THE Governor of the State of Victoria, in the Commonwealth of Australia, do by this my Proclamation fix, Wednesday, the fifteenth day of June, 1955, as the time for the commencement and holding of the First Session of the Fortieth Parliament of Victoria, for the despatch of business, at the hour of Eleven o'clock in the forenoon, in the Parliament Houses, situate in Spring-street, in the City of Melbourne: And the Honorable the Members of the Legislative Council and the Members of the Legislative Assembly are hereby required to give their attendance at the said time and place accordingly.

Given under my Hand and the Seal of the State of Victoria aforesaid, at Melbourne, this seventh day of June, in the year of our Lord One thousand nine hundred and fifty-five, and in the fourth year of the reign of Her Majesty Queen Elizabeth II.

#### GOD SAVE THE QUEEN!

The Honorable Mr. Justice Sholl, the Commissioner from His Excellency the Governor appointed to open the Parliament, having been introduced to the Council Chamber by the Usher of the Black Rod, His Honour desired the Usher of the Black Rod to request the presence of the Members of the Legislative Assembly to hear the Commission read for the commencement and holding of this present Session of the Parliament.

The Members of the Legislative Assembly having presented themselves, the Honorable Mr. Justice Sholl said—

Mr. President and Honorable Members of the Legislative Council:

MEMBERS OF THE LEGISLATIVE ASSEMBLY:

His Excellency the Governor, not thinking fit to be present in person, has been pleased to cause Letters Patent to issue under the Seal of the State constituting me his Commissioner to do in his name all that is necessary to be performed in this Parliament. This will more fully appear from the Letters Patent which will now be read by the Clerk.

Then the said Letters Patent were read by the Clerk, as follows, viz.:-

ELIZABETH THE SECOND by the Grace of God of the United Kingdom, Australia and Her other Realms and Territories, Queen, Head of the Commonwealth, Defender of the Faith:

Whereas by Proclamation issued the seventh day of June, One thousand nine hundred and fifty-five, by His Excellency General Sir Reginald Alexander Dallas Brooks, Knight Commander of Our Most Honorable Order of the Bath, Knight Commander of Our Most Distinguished Order of Saint Michael and Saint George, Knight Commander of Our Royal Victorian Order, Companion of Our Distinguished Service Order, Governor of Our State of Victoria and its Dependencies in the Commonwealth of Australia, &c., &c., &c., Wednesday, the fifteenth day of June, One thousand nine hundred and fifty-five, was fixed as the time for the commencement and holding of the next Session of Our Parliament of Victoria, at the hour of Eleven o'clock in the forenoon, in the Parliament Houses, in the City of Melbourne: And forasmuch as for certain causes the said Sir Reginald Alexander Dallas Brooks cannot conveniently be present in person in Our said Parliament at that time: Now know ye that We, trusting in the discretion, fidelity, and care of Our trusty and well-beloved the Honorable Reginald Richard Sholl, Judge of Our Supreme Court of the State of Victoria, do give and grant by the tenor of these presents unto the said Reginald Richard Sholl, full power in Our name to begin and hold the said Session of Our said Parliament, and to do everything which for and by Us, or the said Sir Reginald Alexander Dallas Brooks, shall be there to be done; commanding also by the tenor of these presents all whom it may concern to meet Our said Parliament, and the said Reginald Richard Sholl that he diligently attend in the premises and form aforesaid. In testimony whereof We have caused the Seal of Our said State to be hereunto affixed.

Witness Our trusty and well-beloved General Sir Reginald Alexander Dallas Brooks, Knight Commander of Our Most Honorable Order of the Bath, Knight Commander of Our Most Distinguished Order of Saint Michael and Saint George, Knight Commander of Our Royal Victorian Order, Companion of Our Distinguished Service Order, Governor of Our State of Victoria and its Dependencies in the Commonwealth of Australia, &c., &c., &c., at Melbourne in Our said State this seventh day of June, One thousand nine hundred and fifty-five, and in the fourth year of Our reign.

Then the Honorable Mr. Justice Sholl said-

Mr. President and Honorable Members of the Legislative Council:

MEMBERS OF THE LEGISLATIVE ASSEMBLY:

I have it in command from His Excellency to let you know that, later this day, His Excellency will declare to you in person, in this place, the causes of his calling this Parliament together; and, Members of the Legislative Assembly, as it is necessary before you proceed to the despatch of business that a Speaker of the Legislative Assembly be chosen, His Excellency requests that you, in your Chamber, will proceed to the choice of a proper person to be Speaker.

The Members of the Legislative Assembly then withdrew.

The Commissioner withdrew.

- 2. The President took the Chair and read the Prayer.
- 3. APPROACH OF HIS EXCELLENCY THE GOVERNOR.—The approach of His Excellency the Governor was announced by the Usher of the Black Rod.

His Excellency came into the Council Chamber, and commanded the Usher of the Black Rod to desire the immediate attendance of the Legislative Assembly, who being come with their Speaker, His Excellency was pleased to speak as follows:—

Mr. President and Honorable Members of the Legislative Council:

Mr. Speaker and Members of the Legislative Assembly:

I have taken the earliest opportunity, after the recent General Election, of calling you together for the despatch of public business.

My Advisers look forward with confidence to the co-operation of Members of both Houses of Parliament in the enactment of legislation which will promote the interests of all sections of the community.

Mr. Speaker and Members of the Legislative Assembly:

A measure to make preliminary provision for the services of the next financial year will be laid before you without delay.

Mr. President and Honorable Members of the Legislative Council:

Mr. Speaker and Members of the Legislative Assembly:

My Ministers consider that the provision of housing is still one of the State's major problems. To give effect to its policy the Government will introduce legislation to enable the Treasurer to guarantee loans made by approved financial institutions for housing purposes. Such guarantees will not exceed 95 per centum of the fair value of the home.

In addition, legislative authority will be sought to enable the Commissioners of the State Savings Bank, if they so desire, to increase to £4,000 the amount of housing loans to persons of limited means.

The housing settlement at Camp Pell will be abolished as rapidly as possible.

A Social Rehabilitation Advisory Committee will be appointed to assist the Government in providing satisfactory accommodation for the present residents of Camp Pell and other temporary centres

The Housing Commission will be directed to expedite slum abolition.

Increased powers will be given to the Minister of Transport to co-ordinate all forms of transport.

A Uniform Traffic Authority will be established.

An Advisory Board will be appointed to review and recommend improvements in the use of the Crown Lands of the State.

Every effort will be made to complete the settlement of ex-servicemen under the Soldier Settlement Scheme.

The services and activities of the Department of Agriculture and of the Soil Conservation Authority will be extended.

In accordance with its policy of providing full educational facilities for all children, the Government will give the highest priority to the building of schools and the training of teachers.

The Mental Hygiene Acts will be revised with a view to improving the machinery of administration and removing many of the archaic and objectionable features of the present legislation. My Ministers will co-operate fully with the Commonwealth Government with the object of raising the standard of existing hospitals for the mentally ill.

When the Supply Bill has been passed my Ministers propose that there should be an adjournment for a short period to enable them to prepare their legislative programme for the remainder of the Session

I now leave you to your deliberations and fervently pray that, under the blessing of Divine Providence, your labours may result in the advancement of the well-being of the people and the prosperity of the State.

Which being concluded, a copy of the Speech was delivered to the President, and a copy to Mr. Speaker, and His Excellency the Governor left the Chamber.

these are the important words-

that these objects are cognate to its general purposes.

The general purpose of this Bill, undoubtedly, is to appoint a committee of parliamentary members and all that this instruction will do is to extend the personnel of that committee to include members of this House. It is for the Committee to act upon the instruction and, if it thinks fit, to amend the measure accordingly. Another aspect is that this Bill contains a clause providing for the expenditure of public moneys, but amendments may be so framed in Committee, pursuant to this instruction, that they will not increase public expenditure and will not place any further charge or burden upon the people. I think it desirable to make these statements, lest it be thought that those aspects have not been given proper attention.

  - (3) Where at any time after the commencement of this Act any application is made to a Board to determine the fair rent of any prescribed premises to which this section applies, whether or not the fair rent thereof has previously been fixed by service of a notice pursuant to this section, the Board shall determine the fair rent of the premises to be such amount as in all the circumstances of the case it considers equitable having regard to the matters referred to in section twenty-one of the Landlord and Tenant Act 1948 except that, in lieu of the capital value referred to in paragraph (a) of the said section twenty-one, the Board shall have regard to a capital value which is Twenty-five per centum in excess of the capital value so referred to.

## No. 6.—Landlord and Tenant (Amendment) Bill.—Clause 8 (as amended)—

- 8. (1) This section shall apply with respect to all prescribed premises (not being premises to which section four of the Landlord and Tenant Act 1954 applies).

    - (a) to any prescribed premises to which this section applies; or

then, if the existing fair rent of the premises was fixed by or pursuant to the Landlord and Tenant Acts prior to the making of those alterations or additions, the lessor and the lessee may make an agreement in writing with respect to the rent of the premises, and where such an agreement is made the amount specified in that behalf in the agreement shall for all purposes be the fair rent of the premises as from the date specified in that behalf therein (not being earlier than the day on which the agreement is entered into) and no further proceedings for the fixing of the fair rent of those premises, except on the ground referred to in paragraph (b) or paragraph (c) of section twenty-five of the Landlord and Tenant Act 1948, shall be commenced by either of the parties to the agreement during the period specified in that behalf in the agreement or, if no such period is specified, during the period of six months next after the day from which the fair rent is altered by the agreement.

- No. 7.—LANDLORD AND TENANT (AMENDMENT) BILL.—Clause 11 (as amended)—
  - 11. (1) For paragraph (a) of sub-section (6) of section forty-five of the Landlord and Tenant Act 1948 as amended by any Act there shall be substituted the following paragraph:—
    - "(a) that neither the lessor nor his or her spouse, if living with him or her-

        - (ii) to reconstruct the premises by structural alterations involving the expenditure of a sum of not less than One hundred per centum of the capital value of the existing premises at the date of the application—

and has made or will be able to make suitable financial arrangements for that purpose; and

- (b) that the lessor either—
  - (i) has given to the lessee not less than six months' notice to quit and has executed or will execute under seal an undertaking to lease to the lessee, in the premises when built or reconstructed as aforesaid, premises not less suitable, in nature and extent, for the lessee's purposes than those occupied by the lessee at the date of the notice to quit, and within such time and at such rent and on such terms as the court thinks reasonable; or
  - (ii) has given to the lessee not less than two years' notice to quit and has paid or will pay to the lessee a sum, determined by the court, equalling the aggregate of the amounts of rent paid in respect of the premises during the period of two years immediately before the date of application—

and any order made in a case to which this sub-section applies may be conditioned upon execution of such an undertaking or payment of the sum so determined (as the case may be)."

- (3) In section twenty-one of the Landlord and Tenant Act 1953 as amended by any Act after the expression "sub-section (6)" there shall be inserted the expression "or sub-section (7)".
- (4) Any person who, having obtained an order for recovery of possession of or ejectment from any premises by virtue of the provisions of sub-section (7) of section forty-five of the Landlord and Tenant Act 1948, fails, without just cause or excuse (the proof whereof shall lie on him), to pay any sum of money undertaken or directed to be paid by him pursuant to the said sub-section (7) or to carry out any undertaking executed or directed to be executed by him pursuant to the said sub-section (7) shall, without affecting or abating any civil liability which may arise from such failure, be guilty of an offence against the Landlord and Tenant Act 1948 and liable to punishment accordingly.

- C. (1) Section four of the Landlord and Tenant Act 1954 is hereby amended as follows:—
  - (a) In sub-section (3) after the words "such amount" there shall be inserted the expression (not being more than Fifty per centum in excess of the rent of the premises at the thirty-first day of December One thousand nine hundred and forty, including the rent of any goods then leased therewith and the charge for any service then provided in connexion with the lease, which rent is in this section referred to as 'the base rent')";
  - (b) In sub-section (4) before the words "shall be for all purposes" there shall be inserted the expression "(not being more than Fifty per centum in excess of the base rent)".
- (2) Where before the commencement of this Act—
  - (a) any determination of a Board has been made pursuant to sub-section (3) of section four of the Landlord and Tenant Act 1954; or
- (b) any agreement has been entered into pursuant to sub-section (4) of the said section fourwhereby the fair rent of any premises has been fixed at any amount which is more than Fifty per centum in excess of the base rent referred to in the said section four as amended by the last preceding sub-section, then-
  - (i) the fair rent of the premises shall from the commencement of this Act by force of this Act be reduced to an amount which is Fifty per centum in excess of the said base rent and shall be deemed to be so fixed by a determination of a Board;
  - (ii) the determination or agreement referred to in paragraph (a) or paragraph (b) shall from the said commencement cease to have any force or effect whatever; and
  - (iii) if in consideration of the making of the agreement or of the making of the determination as aforesaid the lessor had granted a lease of the premises the rent expressed in the lease shall as from the said commencement be deemed and taken to be reduced as aforesaid, and, if the lease was for a term of more than six months, the lessor may by notice in writing served on the lessee within one month after the said commencement cancel the lease from the day specified in the notice in that behalf (not being earlier than the day on which the notice is served on the lessee) but without prejudice to the lessee's rights as a lessee under the Landlord and Tenant Acts.
- (3) Where a lessor so cancels a lease the lessee, if he was lessee of the premises before that lease was granted, shall from the date on which the cancellation of the lease takes effect hold the premises on the same tenure and subject to the same terms (otherwise than as to the amount of rent) as obtained immediately before the lease came into effect.
- (4) Notwithstanding anything in section four of the Landlord and Tenant Act 1954 or in the foregoing provisions of this section any lessor of premises to which the said section four applies may pursuant to the provisions of Division 2 of Part II. of the Landlord and Tenant Act 1948 apply to a Board for determination of the fair rent of those premises without reference to the said section four and in any such case the application by the lessor shall be determined in all respects as if the said section four did not apply to those premises, but no such application shall be made within six months after the fair rent thereof was last fixed, whether by determination or agreement.

- No. 1.—Soldier Settlement (Amendment) Bill.—Clause 2 (as amended)—
  - 2. (1) For section fourteen of the Principal Act as re-enacted by section fifty of the Land Settlement Act 1953 there shall be substituted the following section:—
    - "14. (1) With the approval of the Governor in Council the Commission may-
      - (a) appoint and at any time remove a secretary and a deputy secretary to the Commission (either of whom may on behalf of the Commission accept service of any document or sign any document to be issued by the Commission);
      - (b) employ for such periods as the Commission thinks fit as many persons as the Commission considers necessary to be employed—
        - (i) as inspectors valuers and supervisors of properties which have been or are to be acquired or made available or on which advances have been or are to be made pursuant to this Act or any other Act conferring functions upon the Commission; or
        - (ii) in any other capacity-
        - in order that the purpose of any such Act may be expeditiously and fully carried into effect.
    - (2) The said secretary and deputy secretary and all such persons so employed shall hold their office or employment upon such terms and subject to such conditions and shall receive such remuneration for their services as the Commission with the approval of the Governor in Council determines and shall not in respect of such office or employment be subject to the provisions of the Public Service Acts.
    - (3) (a) Subject to paragraph (b) of this sub-section if any secretary or deputy secretary so appointed or person so employed was, immediately before his appointment or employment by the Commission, an officer of the public service he shall (while being or continuing to be employed by the Commission or on ceasing to be employed by the Commission) be eligible to be appointed to such office in the public service as the Public Service Board determines with a classification and emolument corresponding with or higher than that which he held in the public service immediately before his appointment or employment by the Commission as if the period of his service in the employment of the Commission had been service in the public service.
      - (b) Any secretary deputy secretary or officer-
        - (i) who is referred to in paragraph (a) of this sub-section; or
        - (ii) who at the commencement of the Soldier Settlement (Amendment) Act 1955 was an officer within the meaning of the Superannuation Acts—

and who ceases to be employed by the Commission on his office becoming redundant by reason of the functions or activities of the Commission being reduced or ceasing shall, on ceasing to be so employed, be by virtue of this Act transferred to the public service as a permanent officer with a classification which is determined by the Governor in Council after considering a report by the Public Service Board as being a proper classification in the circumstances.

- (4) If any secretary or deputy secretary so appointed or person so employed was, immediately before his appointment or employment by the Commission, an officer within the meaning of the Superannuation Acts he shall notwithstanding such appointment or employment be deemed to continue subject to those Acts to be an officer within the meaning of those Acts."
- (2) In section fifteen of the Principal Act as amended by any Act for the expression "(b) the Commission" there shall be substituted the expression—
  - "(a) the Governor in Council may direct that the services of any of the officers and employés of the public service in the Department of Crown Lands and Survey shall be available to and may be made use of by the Commission;
  - (b) in addition the Commission".

In this sub-section the expression "found offending" extends to the case of a person found committing any act or behaving or conducting himself in such a manner or in such circumstances that the person so finding him believes on reasonable grounds that the person so found has in respect of that act behaviour or conduct committed or attempted to commit an offence against the foregoing provisions of this section.

- (4) Where on the trial of a person for feloniously stealing a motor car the jury are not satisfied that he is guilty of the felony but are satisfied that he is guilty of the misdemeanour referred to in sub-section (2) of this section they may return as their verdict that he is not guilty of the felony but is guilty of the misdemeanour and he shall be liable to punishment accordingly.
- (5) In this section "motor car" has the same meaning as in section three of the Motor Car Act 1951.
  - (6) Section eighty-five of the Motor Car Act 1951 is hereby repealed.

  - "Licence" means a licence under Part I. and in force, and "licensed" has a corresponding interpretation.
  - "Load capacity" in the case of a motor car or trailer means-
    - (a) the load capacity thereof as shown in the certificate of registration issued in respect thereof under the Motor Car Acts or under any corresponding legislation or ordinance of any State or Territory of the Commonwealth; or
    - (b) where in such certificate there is shown the maximum permissible gross weight of the motor car or trailer together with the load which may be carried thereon and also the tare weight of the motor car or trailer, the difference between such gross weight and tare weight; or
    - (c) where no such load capacity or weights are shown in such certificate or no such certificate is in force, the load capacity aforesaid of a similar motor car or trailer registered under the Motor Car Acts:

Provided that where a motor car or trailer travels under the authority of a special permit issued in accordance with the provisions of Division two of Part IV. of the *Motor Car Act* 1951 the load capacity shall be deemed to be the weight allowed under such special permit.

- "Motor car" means motor car within the meaning of the Motor Car Act 1951.
- "Operate" means (in the case of any vehicle) carry goods for hire or reward or for any consideration or in the course of any trade or business whatsoever, and "operation" has a corresponding interpretation.
- "Owner" includes every person who is the owner or joint owner or part owner of a commercial goods vehicle and any person who has the use of any such vehicle under a hiring or hire purchase agreement, and includes any person in whose name a vehicle is registered under the Motor Car Acts or under any corresponding legislation or ordinance of any State or Territory of the Commonwealth, but does not include an unpaid vendor of such a vehicle under a hire purchase agreement.

- "Part" means Part of this Act.
- "Permit" means a permit under Part I. and in force.
- "Prescribed" means prescribed by Part I. or by the regulations.
- "Primary producer" means any person engaged solely or substantially in agricultural horticultural viticultural dairying pastoral or other like pursuits and "primary production" has a corresponding interpretation.
- "Public highway" means any street road lane bridge thoroughfare or place open to or used by the public for passage with vehicles.
- "Regulations" means regulations under Part I.
- "Schedule" means Schedule to this Act.
- "Tare weight" in the case of a motor car or trailer means-
  - (a) the tare weight or weight unladen thereof as shown in the certificate of registration issued in respect thereof under the Motor Car Acts or under any corresponding legislation or ordinance of any State or Territory of the Commonwealth; or
  - (b) where no such tare weight or weight unladen is shown in such certificate or no such certificate is in force, the actual weight unladen of the motor car or trailer.

  - 11. The carriage of wool to any wharf from a distance of not more than twenty-five miles from such wharf.
- 12. Essential emergency transport of goods in the case of failure break-down or stoppage of the ordinary goods transport service in cases where the facts relating to such emergency transport are reported by the owner of the vehicle so used to the Board within seven days after the act of transport is completed.

#### THIRD SCHEDULE.

- 1. The carriage of berries and other soft fruits, unprocessed market garden and orchard produce (other than potatoes and onions), milk, cream, butter, eggs, meat, fish or flowers, and, on the return trip, any empty containers used on the outward trip for the carriage of any such commodity.
- 2. The carriage of live stock to or from agricultural shows or exhibitions, or direct from farm to market or from market to farm or from farm to farm or to or from agistment.

#### FOURTH SCHEDULE.

- 1. The rate of the charge to be paid in respect of every vehicle shall be one-third of a penny per ton of the sum of-
  - (a) the tare weight of the vehicle; and

"Division 6.—Trespass to Farms.

223. (1) Except with the consent express or implied of the occupier of the land concerned or of some person apparently authorized to act on behalf of such occupier, no person shall—

(a) use or discharge any firearm in such a manner that any shot bullet or missile is discharged therefrom on to or across any land which is used in connexion with primary production; or

(b) carry or have in his possession any firearm while he is on any such land:

Provided that it shall be a defence to any prosecution for an offence against paragraph (b) of this sub-section if the defendant satisfies the court that he was approaching the residence of the occupier of the land along a defined or customary path for the purpose of applying for such consent.

- (2) Any person who contravenes any of the provisions of the last preceding sub-section shall be guilty of an offence and liable for a first offence to a penalty of not more than Twenty pounds or to imprisonment for a term of not more than one month and for a second or any subsequent offence to a penalty of not more than Fifty pounds or imprisonment for a term of not more than six months.
- (3) Any member of the police force who has reasonable grounds for believing that a person has committed an offence under this section may—
  - (a) search such person or any vehicle in the possession or control of such person;

- 2. In this Act unless inconsistent with the context or subject-matter—
  - "Goods" includes all chattels personal, and includes any fixture severable from the realty.
  - "Hire-purchase agreement" means agreement for the bailment of goods under which the bailee may buy the goods or under which the property in the goods may pass to the bailee, and where by virtue of two or more agreements (none of which by itself constitutes a hire-purchase agreement) there is such a bailment of goods the agreements shall be treated as a single agreement; but does not include any agreement under which the purchaser is a person who is engaged in the trade or business of selling goods of the same nature or description as the goods to which the agreement relates if the term of the bailment of the goods thereunder is not to exceed sixty days.
  - "Purchase price" means the total amount to be paid in money, and the value of any other consideration to be provided, under a hire-purchase agreement to entitle the purchaser to acquire property in the goods, including any amount payable by way of hire or purchase of the goods or by way of interest or for services or in respect of any matter whatsoever; but does not include deposit or other money or consideration paid by the purchaser to the vendor at or before the making of the agreement.
  - "Purchaser" means person to whom goods are bailed or sold or agreed to be bailed or sold under a hire-purchase agreement.
  - "Vendor" means person by whom goods are bailed or sold or agreed to be bailed or sold under a hire-purchase agreement.

## MINUTES OF THE PROCEEDINGS

OF THE

## JOINT SITTING

HELD IN THE

## LEGISLATIVE ASSEMBLY CHAMBER

TUESDAY, 28th AUGUST, 1956.

- The Members of the Legislative Council and the Members of the Legislative Assembly having, pursuant to resolutions of the two Houses, assembled in the Legislative Assembly Chamber—
- 1. ELECTION OF PRESIDENT.—The Honorable W. J. F. McDonald, Speaker of the Legislative Assembly, rose and moved—That the Honorable Sir Clifden Eager, President of the Legislative Council, be appointed President of this Joint Sitting, which motion, being seconded by the Premier, the Honorable H. E. Bolte, M.L.A., was resolved in the affirmative.
  - The Honorable Sir Clifden Eager, having expressed his acknowledgments for the honour conferred upon him by the Joint Sitting, then took the Chair.
- 2. Rules of Procedure.—The Premier, the Honorable H. E. Bolte, M.L.A., submitted the following rules of procedure for the consideration of Honorable Members, and moved that they be adopted as the rules of procedure of this Joint Sitting:—
  - 1. On any debate arising the same shall be conducted according to parliamentary usage.
  - 2. A Member, addressing himself to the President, shall propose a person to hold the vacant place in the Senate, and such proposal shall be duly seconded. When any person is so proposed his proposer shall state to the Members present that such person is willing to hold the vacant place if chosen.
  - 3. If only one person be proposed and seconded, the President shall declare—"That has been chosen to hold the place in the Senate rendered vacant by the resignation of Senator the Honorable John Armstrong Spicer."
  - 4. If more than one person be proposed and seconded, the person to hold the vacant place shall, subject to the following rules, be chosen by ballot.
  - 5. Before giving directions to proceed with the ballot, the President shall ask if any Member desires to propose any other person to hold the vacant place, and no other person being proposed, the ballot shall be proceeded with, after which no person shall be proposed.
  - 6. Each Member present shall be provided with a ballot-paper initialled by the Clerks of the two Houses, and shall write thereon the name of one of the persons duly proposed, and shall place his ballot-paper in the ballot-box.
  - 7. If two or more persons be proposed and seconded, the proposer of each of such persons shall name some Member present to be a scrutineer. The scrutineers, with the Clerks of the two Houses, shall retire and ascertain the number of votes for each person; and the scrutineers shall make a written report of the result to the President showing the number of votes for each person.
    - 8. No informal vote shall be taken into account.
  - 9. If on the first ballot no person shall have received an absolute majority of the votes polled, a second ballot shall be taken, and the name of the person who shall have received the fewest votes at the first ballot shall be excluded; but if at the first ballot the names of only two persons be submitted and the number of votes for such persons be equal, the scrutineers shall by drawing lots determine which of such persons shall be chosen to hold the vacant place, and the person whose name shall be first drawn shall be deemed to have been duly chosen.
  - 10. Until one of the persons proposed obtains an absolute majority of the votes polled, or (as the case may be) is chosen by lot to hold the vacant place, successive ballots shall be taken, and at each such ballot the name of the person who shall have received the fewest votes at the preceding ballot shall be excluded.

- 11. If on any ballot it shall be necessary to decide between two or more persons as to which one is to be excluded from a subsequent ballot through the number of votes for such persons being equal, a special ballot shall be taken at which the names of only those persons shall be submitted, and the name of the person having the fewest votes at such special ballot shall be excluded; but if on any special ballot it shall be necessary to decide between two or more persons as to which one is to be excluded from a subsequent ballot through the number of votes for such persons being equal, the scrutineers by drawing lots shall determine which one of such persons shall be excluded, and the name of the person last drawn shall be excluded.
- 12. If at any ballot, other than the first ballot or a special ballot hereinbefore provided for, the names of only two persons be submitted and the number of votes for such persons be equal, the scrutineers shall by drawing lots determine which of those persons shall be chosen to hold the vacant place, and the person whose name shall be first drawn shall be deemed to have been duly chosen.
- 13. As soon as any person obtains an absolute majority of the votes polled, or (as the case may be) is chosen by lot to hold the vacant place, the President shall declare— "That has been chosen to hold the place in the Senate rendered vacant by the resignation of Senator the Honorable John Armstrong Spicer."
  - 14. The President shall in all cases be entitled to a vote.
- 15. The records of the proceedings and the ballot-papers shall be retained by the Clerk of the Parliaments of the State of Victoria, who shall be the costodian thereof, and shall keep the ballot-papers safely for one year and thereafter destroy them.

Question—put and resolved in the affirmative.

- 3. Persons Proposed to Hold the Vacant Place in the Senate.—The President announced that, the rules having been adopted, he was now prepared to receive proposals from Honorable Members of persons to hold the place in the Senate rendered vacant by the resignation of Senator the Honorable John Armstrong Spicer.
  - The Premier, the Honorable H. E. Bolte, M.L.A., proposed George Conrad Hannan, Esquire, as the person to hold the vacant place, and stated that such person was willing to hold the vacant place, if chosen, and named E. R. Meagher, Esquire, M.L.A., to be a scrutineer, which proposal was seconded by the Honorable A. G. Rylah, M.L.A.
  - The Honorable F. R. Scully, M.L.A., proposed John Duncan Cameron, Esquire, as the person to hold the vacant place, and stated that such person was willing to hold the vacant place, if chosen, and named the Honorable A. J. Bailey, M.L.C., to be a scrutineer, which proposal was seconded by the Honorable J. A. Little, M.L.C.
- 4. Ballot.—The President having asked if any Honorable Member desired to propose any other person to hold the vacant place, and no other person being proposed, the President directed that the ballot be proceeded with, the names of the persons proposed, in the order in which they were proposed, being—

### HANNAN, GEORGE CONRAD. CAMERON, JOHN DUNCAN.

Ballot-papers, duly initialled by the Clerks of the two Houses, were issued to Honorable Members, and such ballot-papers when filled in were deposited in the ballot-box.

- At the conclusion of the ballot the scrutineers, with the Clerks of the two Houses, made a scrutiny of the votes received by each person, and the written report of the scrutineers was handed to the President.
- 5. Result of Ballot.—The President announced that the scrutineers had reported that at the ballot 86 votes were recorded by the Honorable Members present, and that the result of the ballot was as follows:—

George Conrad Hannan ... ... 71 votes
John Duncan Cameron ... ... 10 votes
Informal ... ... 5 votes

The President thereupon declared that George Conrad Hannan, Esquire, having obtained an absolute majority of the votes polled, had been chosen to hold the place in the Senate rendered vacant by the resignation of Senator the Honorable John Armstrong Spicer.

- 6. Notification to His Excellency the Governor.—The Premier, the Honorable H. E. Bolte, M.L.A., moved—That the President inform His Excellency the Governor that George Conrad Hannan, Esquire, has been chosen to hold the place in the Senate rendered vacant by the resignation of Senator the Honorable John Armstrong Spicer.
  - Question—put and resolved in the affirmative.
- 7. VOTE OF THANKS TO THE PRESIDENT.—The Premier, the Honorable H. E. Bolte, M.L.A., moved a vote of thanks to the President, which motion was seconded by the Honorable John Cain, M.L.A., and carried unanimously.

The President, having returned thanks, declared the Joint Sitting closed.
