

#### TUESDAY, 27TH MAY, 1902.

1. The Council met pursuant to the Proclamation of His Excellency the Governor, bearing date the thirteenth day of May instant, which Proclamation was read by the Clerk, and is as follows:—

### FIXING THE TIME FOR HOLDING THE THIRD SESSION OF THE EIGHTEENTH PARLIAMENT OF VICTORIA.

#### PROCLAMATION

By His Excellency Sir George Sydenham Clarke, Knight Commander of the Most Distinguished Order of Saint Michael and Saint George; Fellow of the Royal Society; Governor of the State of Victoria and its Dependencies in the Commonwealth of Australia, &c., &c., &c.

Whereas by The Constitution Act it was amongst other things enacted that it should be lawful for the Governor to fix such places within Victoria and, subject to the limitation therein contained, such times for holding the first and every other Session of the Council and Assembly, and to vary and alter the same respectively in such manner as he might think fit; and also from time to prorogue the said Council and Assembly, and to dissolve the said Assembly, by Proclamation or otherwise, whenever he should deem it expedient: And whereas the said Council and Assembly, called "The Parliament of Victoria," stand prorogued until Tuesday, the 27th day of May, 1902, and it is expedient to fix the time for holding the next Session thereof: Now therefore I, the Governor of the State of Victoria in the Commonwealth of Australia, in exercise of the power conferred by the said Act, do by this my Proclamation fix Tuesday, the 27th day of May, 1902, aforesaid, as the time for the commencement and holding of the next Session of the said Council and Assembly, called the Parliament of Victoria, for the despatch of business, at the hour of Two o'clock in the afternoon, in the State Parliament Houses, situate in the Carlton Gardens, in the City of Melbourne: And the Honorable the Members of the Legislative Council and the Members of the Legislative Assembly are hereby required to give their attendance at the said time and place accordingly.

Given under my Hand and the Seal of the State of Victoria aforesaid, at Melbourne, this thirteenth day of May, in the year of our Lord One thousand nine hundred and two, and in the second year of His Majesty's reign.

2. APPROACH OF HIS EXCELLENCY THE GOVERNOR.—The approach of His Excellency the Governor was announced by the Usher.

His Excellency came into the Council Chamber, and commanded the Usher to desire the immediate attendance of the Legislative Assembly, who, being come with their Speaker, His Excellency was pleased to speak as follows:—

I have called you together in order that I may have the benefit of your advice and assistance with regard to matters of importance which demand your serious attention.

The forthcoming Coronation of His Majesty King Edward the Seventh, and of His Royal Consort, at which ceremony representatives of the whole of the Empire will be in attendance, will once more forcibly demonstrate to the world the unity of the nation, and proclaim those sentiments of loyalty, devotion, and affection for the Throne which so strongly characterize the British people, not only in the Mother Country but in every part of His Majesty's Dominions.

The opening of the present session has been fixed at an earlier date than is usual in order that you may be enabled, before the close of the financial year, to consider and deal with the question of the finances of the State, regarding which, as was anticipated by My Advisers, considerable doubt still prevails, owing mainly to the uncertainty as to the amount that will be repaid by the Commonwealth Government to the Government of the State.

The question of Constitutional Reform, which has received careful consideration, will be at once submitted to you in order that an early decision may be arrived at. My Advisers have prepared measures providing for a reduction in the number of Ministers of the Crown and of Members of both branches of the Legislature; for an alteration in the qualification of Members of the Legislative Council; for Adult Suffrage; and for the settlement of differences between the two Chambers in a manner similar to that provided in the Constitution of the Commonwealth of Australia.

The severe drought which has unfortunately prevailed for some time past emphasizes the need for water conservation. The Railways Standing Committee has investigated and favorably reported upon the Lake Lonsdale and Glenwylln schemes of water supply for the southern and eastern portions of the Mallee District, which were submitted to it by the Department of Water Supply, and both works are being proceeded with as rapidly as possible. The Committee has also recommended a scheme for supplying a large part of the Mallee from the Goulburn River, including a scheme of pumping from Long Lake. Proposals will be submitted to you, at as early a date as possible, for giving effect to these recommendations so that the settlers in those arid districts may be assured of a sufficient supply of water for their stock and also for domestic purposes.

My Advisers have joined with the Governments of New South Wales and South Australia in the appointment of a Royal Commission to inquire as to the utilization of the waters of the River Murray, and instructions have been given to the Commission, by the Governments concerned, for the presentation of a report at an early date. It is confidently anticipated that such united action will ultimately lead to an adequate supply of water being available for irrigation purposes, and thus tend to render the farmers less dependent on the uncertain rainfall in the northern districts of the State.

The Factories and Shops Acts will expire at the close of the present Session, but as the Report of the Royal Commission which is now inquiring into the working of those Acts is not yet available, My Advisers will submit to you a measure continuing the operation of the Acts for a further period. As soon as the Report of the Commission is received, legislation permanently dealing with the subject will be submitted.

Railway construction is being energetically proceeded with. The lines from Lilydale to Warburton and from Colac to Beech Forest have been opened for traffic, and the line from Heidelberg to Eltham will be available for public business in the course of a few days. The construction of the line from Woomelang to Mildura is also being advanced as rapidly as possible. Additional rolling-stock and more powerful engines have been obtained, with the view of improving the accommodation for passenger and goods traffic. The railway facilities at Williamstown in connexion with the shipment of grain and fodder have been largely increased, and still further improvements are in progress.

It is the intention of the Government to further encourage Gold Mining development by assisting prospecting parties, and by providing, in some cases, batteries for ore reduction; also by carrying out boring in localities where the work may be regarded as of national importance. Having in view the value of an independent supply of coal within our borders, the Government intend to continue vigorously the work of defining the extent of the carbonaceous areas of the State.

A Bill for consolidating and amending the Teachers' Acts will be submitted to you, together with measures for providing a fixed scale of salaries for teachers, instead of the system of payment by results; for the appointment of a Consultative Council; for the registration of all persons engaged in tuition in Victoria; for establishing a Teachers' Superannuation Fund: and also for the imparting of Technical Instruction. The Department of Education has been thoroughly re-organized, and a Director has been appointed under the authority of the Act passed last Session.

#### MR. SPEAKER AND GENTLEMEN OF THE LEGISLATIVE ASSEMBLY:

The Estimates for the ensuing financial year, which will be submitted to you in due course, are being prepared with a careful regard to economy, while at the same time, full provision is being made for the requirements of the State.

MR. PRESIDENT AND HONORABLE GENTLEMEN OF THE LEGISLATIVE COUNCIL:

MR. SPEAKER AND GENTLEMEN OF THE LEGISLATIVE ASSEMBLY:

My Advisers are impressed with the necessity for the exercise of a strict supervision over the public expenditure, and every opportunity will be taken of preventing unnecessary outlay, and of limiting the cost of the Government Departments without impairing their efficiency.

The Old-age Pensions Act passed last Session, while providing for the relief of aged and deserving persons, has proved beneficial in checking abuses. For the present financial year the expenditure for such pensions has been larger than than was estimated, owing to the Act having been in force for only a part of that time, but it is certain that there will be a reduced expenditure in that connexion in the future.

The consolidation of the Land Acts, and of the Regulations thereunder, has proved most beneficial; the opening up of Crown lands for selection is being energetically pushed on; the Closer Settlement system of resumption and subdivision of private estates has been further extended, and will be continued; the classification of the Mallee has been completed, and every effort is being made to enable selectors to secure the full benefit of the recent legislation in their favour. A Bill for the survey and construction of roads, and for the settlement of large areas of the fertile but at present inaccessible parts of Gippsland will be laid before you. A Forests Bill dealing comprehensively with all matters relating to Forests and Timber Conservation will also be introduced for your consideration.

The development of the Agricultural Industries under the Director of Agriculture is being strenuously pushed forward, and steady progress is being made in the work of educating and encouraging producers. Further efforts are being made to foster the exportation of produce, and a measure providing for more effectual inspection and control will be submitted to you. In view of the increase in the requirements for the shipment of perishable products, special efforts are being made to provide ample accommodation and a regular service for the carriage of such produce. A Government Agent has been appointed in South Africa, where there are favorable prospects of increased trade. Measures will be taken with a view to increasing the Wine Export Trade; also for establishing a Dairy School and an Experimental Farm, and, in connexion with the latter, Experimental Plots in several country districts.

A Bill amending and consolidating the law relating to Local Government is being prepared, and will be proceeded with as soon as practicable.

Bills will be introduced for amending the Licensing Law, for simplifying the procedure in connexion with the preparation of Parliamentary Electoral Rolls, and for amending the Lunacy Act in order to bring the conditions of management of our Lunatic Asylums into harmony with the more advanced methods of treatment of the insane.

You will further be asked to consider Bills for amending the Justices Act and the Mines Act; also Bills for the Inspection and Regulation of Boilers and Scaffolding, for the Settlement of Industrial Disputes by means of Arbitration and Conciliation, for the Registration of Brands, and for the Prevention of the Adulteration of Beer.

I now leave you to your deliberations, which will, I trust, under the blessing of Divine Providence, materially conduce to the welfare of the people of this State.

Which being concluded, a copy of the Speech was delivered to the President, and a copy to Mr. Speaker, and His Excellency the Governor left the Chamber.

The Legislative Assembly then withdrew.



### SPECIAL BOARDS.

The names of these There are now thirty-eight Special Boards in existence. Boards and the trades affected are as follow:—

Under the Factories and Shops Act 1896 six Special Boards were brought These Boards were: into existence.

1. Bread Board.—To determine the lowest price or rate of payment for Breadmaking or Baking. Appointment authorized by Governor in Council 2nd November, 1896.

2. Boot Board.—To determine the lowest prices or rates which may be paid to any person for

wholly or partly preparing or manufacturing, either inside or outside a factory or work-room, boots, shoes, and slippers of every description. Appointment authorized by Governor in Council 2nd November, 1896.

3. CLOTHING BOARD.—To determine the lowest prices or rates which may be paid to any person

for wholly or partly preparing or manufacturing, either inside or outside a factory or work-room, the following articles of men's and boys' clothing or wearing apparel, namely:—Coats (including overcoats and cloaks of every description), vests, trousers, jackets, and knickerbockers, except indiarubber water-proof garments. Appointment authorized by Governor in Council 2nd November, 1896.

4. FURNITURE BOARD.—To determine the lowest prices or rates of payment payable to any person employed in wholly or partly preparing or manufacturing any articles of furniture usually made or partly preparing by cabinet-makers, chair and couch makers, upholsterers, wood-carvers, frenchpolishers, and wood-turners. This Board has also, by an Order in Council, been given power to fix the rates of payment for persons employed in the manufacture of overmantels and wood mantelpieces, other than wood mantels to be painted, such as are usually made in saw-mills; also mattresses or bedding. Appointment

authorized by Governor in Council and November, 1896.

5. Shirt Board.—To determine the lowest prices or rates which may be paid to any person or persons or classes of persons for wholly or partly preparing or manufacturing, either inside or outside a factory or work-room, any shirts, shirt-fronts, pyjamas, collars, and cuffs of every description. Appointment

authorized by Governor in Council 2nd November, 1896.

6. Underclothing Board.—To determine the lowest price or rate of payment for wholly or partly preparing or manufacturing the following articles or classes of articles of clothing and wearing apparel, that is to say:—All articles of women's and girls' underclothing (except stays and corsets), also night-gowns, blouses, pinafores, aprons, and infants' gowns and underclothing. Appointment authorized by Governor in Council 2nd November, 1896.

Under the provisions of the Factories and Shops Act 1900, the following Special Boards were authorized by Parliament during 1900:—

1. Butchers Board.—To determine the lowest prices or rates which may be paid to any person or persons or classes of persons employed in the process, trade, or business of a butcher or seller of meat, or maker or seller of small goods. Appointment authorized by Governor in Council 21st May, 1900.

2. Brick Trade Board.—To determine the lowest prices or rates which may be paid to any

person or persons or classes of persons employed in the process, trade, or business of brickmaking

(including clay-digging).—Resolution carried 25th September, 1900.

3. CARRIAGE TRADE BOARD .- To determine the lowest prices or rates which may be paid to any person or persons or classes of persons employed in the process, trade, or business connected with or incidental to the manufacturing or making of carriages, carts, and other vehicles (other than perambulators), or any part or parts thereof, such as the ironwork or bodies, hoods, cushions, springs, axles, wheels, tires, rims, hubs, or spokes.—Resolution carried 19th December, 1901.

4. CIGAR TRADE BOARD.—To determine the lowest prices or rates which may be paid to any person or persons or classes of persons employed in the process, trade, or business of cigarmaking.-Resolution carried 25th September, 1900.

5. Confectioners Board.—To determine the lowest prices or rates which may be paid to any person or persons or classes of persons employed in the process, trade, or business of a manufacturing confectioner.—Resolution carried 11th October, 1900.

6. Coopers Board.—To determine the lowest prices or rates which may be paid to any person or persons or classes of persons employed in the process, trade, or business of a cooper.—Resolution carried

4th September, 1900.

7. Engravers Board.—To determine the lowest prices or rates which may be paid to any person or persons or classes of persons employed in the process, trade, or business of an engraver or die-sinker. -Resolution carried 11th October, 1900.

8. Fellmongers Board.—To determine the lowest prices or rates which may be paid to any person or persons or classes of persons employed in the process, trade, or business of a fellmonger or wool-

scourer, or tanner of sheepskins.—Resolution carried 11th October, 1900.

9. Jam Trade Board.—To determine the lowest prices or rates which may be paid to any person or persons or classes of persons employed in the process, trade, or business of manufacturing jam, fruit jelly, pickles, and sauces.—Resolution carried 11th October, 1900.

10. Jewellers Board.—To determine the lowest prices or rates which may be paid to any person or persons or classes of persons employed in the process, trade, or business of a manufacturing jeweller .-

Resolution carried 11th October, 1900.

11. MILLET BROOM BOARD.—To determine the lowest prices or rates which may be paid to any person or persons or classes of persons employed in the process, trade, or business of millet broom making. Resolution carried 4th September, 1900.

12. PASTRY COOKS BOARD.—To determine the lowest prices or rates which may be paid to any person or persons or classes of persons employed in the process, trade, or business of a pastry cook.

Resolution carried 4th September, 1900.

- 13. PLATE GLASS BOARD.—To determine the lowest prices or rates which may be paid to any person or persons or classes of persons employed in the process, trade, or business of glazing or bevelling plate glass, or of silvering plate or sheet glass, or of embossing plate, sheet, or stained glass, or of cutting plate or stained glass, or of glazing stained glass in lead.—Resolution carried 11th October, 1900.
- 14. PRINTERS BOARD.—To determine the lowest prices or rates which may be paid to any person or persons or classes of persons employed in the process, trade, or business of printing (including book-

binding).—Resolution carried 4th September, 1900.

15. POTTERY TRADE BOARD.—To determine the lowest prices or rates which may be paid to any person or persons or classes of persons employed in the process, trade, or business of pottery-making, including the making of tiles and of drain and glazed pipes and the clay-digging in connexion therewith.-Resolution carried 25th September, 1900.

16. SADDLERY BOARD.—To determine the lowest prices or rates which may be paid to any person or persons or classes of persons employed in the process, trade, or business of manufacturing harness,

saddlery, and whipthongs.—Resolution carried 25th September, 1900.

17. STONE CUTTERS BOARD .- To determine the lowest prices or rates which may be paid to any person or persons or classes of persons employed in the process, trade, or business of cutting, carving, polishing, and letter-cutting in marble and stone.—Resolution carried 4th September, 1900.

18. TANNERS BOARD.—To determine the lowest prices or rates which may be paid to any person or persons or classes of persons employed in the process, trade, or business of a tanner, currier, or leather-

dresser, other than a tanner of sheepskins.—Resolution carried 11th October, 1900.

19. Tinsmiths Board.—To determine the lowest prices or rates which may be paid to any person or persons or classes of persons employed in the process, trade, or business of preparing or manufacturing articles made of tin-plate or other sheet metal, including the japanning of such articles .- Resolution carried 25th September, 1900.

20. Wood Workers Board.—To determine the lowest prices or rates which may be paid to any person or persons or classes of persons employed in the process, trade, or business carried on in a saw-mill,

timber yard, box factory, or joiner's workshop.—Resolution carried 4th September, 1900.

21. WOOLLEN TRADE BOARD. - To determine the lowest prices or rates which may be paid to any person or persons or classes of persons employed in the process, trade, or business carried on in a woollen mill.—Resolution carried 25th September, 1900.

The following additional Special Boards were authorized by Parliament last year:

22. AERATED WATER TRADE BOARD.—To determine the lowest prices or rates which may be paid to any person or persons or classes of persons employed in the process, trade, or business of an aerated water or cordial or non-intoxicating beer manufacturer.—Resolution carried 8th October, 1901.

23. ARTIFICIAL MANURE BOARD.—To determine the lowest prices or rates which may be paid to

any person or persons or classes of persons employed in the process, trade, or business of a maker of

bone-dust or other artificial manure.—Resolution carried 10th December, 1901.

24. BEDSTEAD MAKERS BOARD.—To determine the lowest prices or rates which may be paid to any person or persons or classes of persons (including the moulders of bedsteads and excluding the moulders of fenders) employed in the process, trade, or business of a maker of metal bedsteads, or fenders, or parts thereof.—Resolution carried 10th December, 1901.

25. Brassworkers Board.—To determine the lowest prices or rates which may be paid to any person or persons or classes of persons employed in the process, trade, or business of a brassfounder or brassfinisher, or in the process, trade, or business of a brassfounder or brassfinisher of any electrical

apparatus or machinery or parts thereof.—Resolution carried 10th December, 1901.

26. Brewers Board.—To determine the lowest prices or rates which may be paid to any person or persons or classes of persons employed in the process, trade, or business of a brewer, or in the process, trade, or business of a bottler of fermented liquors made from malt or a substitute for malt.—Resolution carried 31st October, 1901.

27. Brushmakers Board.—To determine the lowest prices or rates which may be paid to any person or persons or classes of persons employed in the process, trade, or business of a brushmaker.—

Resolution carried 8th October, 1901.

28. IRONMOULDERS BOARD.—To determine the lowest prices or rates which may be paid to any person or persons or classes of persons (other than moulders employed in moulding metal bedsteads) employed in the process, trade, or business of an ironmoulder.—Resolution carried 10th December, 1901.

- 29. LEATHER GOODS BOARD.—To determine the lowest prices or rates which may be paid to any person or persons or classes of persons employed in the process, trade, or business of a maker of portmanteaux or leather bags, or leather trunks, or leather goods of the class or kind of which the following are examples, viz.:—Braces, cap peaks, dog collars, dog leads, garters, holdalls, knapsacks, knife sheaths, leather belts (other than machine belts and belts used for harness or saddlery), leather cases of all descriptions, leggings, pocketbook covers, pouches, purses, valises, wallets.—Resolution carried 10th December,
- 30. Malt Board.—To determine the lowest prices or rates which may be paid to any person or persons or classes of persons employed in the process, trade, or business of a maltster.—Resolution carried 31st October, 1901.
- 31. Ovenmakers Board.—To determine the lowest prices or rates which may be paid to any person or persons or classes of persons (other than moulders) employed in the process, trade, or business of a maker of ovens, stoves, or ranges, or parts thereof.—Resolution carried 10th December, 1901.

32. WICKER BOARD.—To determine the lowest prices or rates which may be paid to any person or persons or classes of persons employed in the process, trade, or business of a manufacturer of bamboo or

wicker goods.—Resolution carried 31st October, 1901.

33. Dressmakers Board.—The appointment of this Board was authorized by the Governor in Council on the 22nd July, 1902, under the powers conferred by the Factories and Shops Act 1896, and continued in force by the Factories and Shops Act 1900.
