- 1 MR COOPER To move, That this House congratulates the Government on the reforms to public transport it has implemented and which it proposes to implement.
- 2 MR ELDER To move, That this House request the Government to end discrimination against gifted children and to develop programmes to enable them to use their talents to the full.
- 3 MR ELDER To move, That this House congratulates the Government on its initiatives concerning Schools for the Future and expresses its strong support for its concept and its implementation.

- 4 MR PERTON To move, That this House commends the Government for its commitment to restore balance to the Criminal Justice System and, in particular, to ensure that sentences for serious violent crime are in line with community expectations.
- 5 MR MAUGHAN To move, That this House commends the Government for its commitment to ensuring that Victorian women and girls receive a fair allocation of the State's resources.
- 6 MR JASPER To move, That the House commends the Government on the proposed policies for tourism for the State of Victoria recognising the economic development of Victoria will be revitalised and enhanced by a vibrant, expanding tourist industry.
- MR ROPER To move, That the House dissent from the ruling of Mr Speaker on the sitting of Thursday, 12 November 1992 affecting the manner of dealing with the amendments of the Legislative Council to the Employee Relations Bill and express the opinion that, in accordance with pre-existing custom and practice and precedent recorded in Hansard which confirms that in almost all if not all previous occasions on which any Member had sought any amendment or group of amendments to be dealt with as separate questions the Chair put the questions accordingly, "Legislative Assembly of Victoria Rulings from the Chair 1920-1984" which states at page 13 "Council Amendments where the House had no objection 29 amendments of the Council were permitted to be moved *in globo*, Vol. 290, pp. 4311-2, 23.4.1968 (Christie)", guidance provided by May's "Parliamentary Practice" and the practice of the Committee of the whole in dealing with clauses of Bills, amendments of the Legislative Council to Bills should be put separately or in groups if and as requested by a Member except that, by leave, they may be put *in globo*.
- 8 MR BAKER To move, That he have leave to bring in a Bill to amend the Audit Act 1958 and certain other Acts, to require the Auditor-General to investigate and report to Parliament on the implications for the State finances and for consumers of privatisation of Government Business Enterprises prior to sale and for other purposes.
- DR COGHILL To move, That the House condemns the Leader of the House, the Honourable Phillip Gude, MLA, for his - (a) support for budgetary provisions adversely affecting the effective operation of the Parliament including its Committees whilst enabling the restoration of extravagant and luxurious levels of Dining Room service available exclusively to Members; (b) support for provisions of the Parliamentary Committees (Amendment) Bill which were incompatible with basic principles of parliamentary government and the Westminster system; (c) support for the destruction of the time-honoured bi-partisan approach to parliamentary committees including the cessation of the practice of chairmanship being shared between Government and Opposition with all Chairmen now being Members of the senior party in the Coalition, the Liberal Party; (d) support for provisions of the Parliamentary Salaries and Superannuation (Further Amendment) Bill as introduced which undermined the recognition by the Parliament of the authority and status of the Speaker of the Legislative Assembly and the President of the Legislative Council and which made unjustified increases to the remuneration of many members of the Government Party including himself; (e) proposing and supporting motions for periods of adjournment of debate that have denied Members reasonable time in which to consider matters

before the House and that have denied people affected by or otherwise interested in such matters reasonable time in which to consider and comment on their implications; (f) proposing and supporting motions that bills be declared urgent and periods for debate of them limited with the effect of denying Members reasonable time in which to debate them; (g) imposition and support of sitting hours in October and November 1992 that were beyond those which could reasonably be expected to allow Members, staff and others associated with the functioning and reporting of the Parliament to carry out their responsibilities effectively and efficiently and that therefore militated against proper functioning and good decision-making; (h) failing to advise and consult Members and the Parliamentary parties on forthcoming legislation, arrangements for debates and other aspects of the parliamentary program in accordance with long-standing tradition and practice in the Parliament of Victoria and comparable parliaments; and (i) failing to provide leadership to Members including the Government in the observance and furtherance of acceptable standards of parliamentary conduct and practice.

- MR COLE To move, That he have leave to bring in a Bill to facilitate the efficient case management of complex fraud trials, to amend certain Rules of Evidence, to amend the Evidence Act 1958, the Judicial Proceedings Reports Act 1958 and the Bail Act 1977 and for other purposes.
- MS GARBUTT To move, That she have leave to bring in a Bill to make it compulsory for certain persons to notify the Secretary of the Department of Health and Community Services of any child they believe is in need of protection, as soon as practicable after forming such a belief, to amend certain Acts and for other purposes.
- 12 DR VAUGHAN To move, That the Law Reform Committee inquire into, consider and report on the former Law Reform Commission references which were (a) incomplete and not reported to the Attorney-General; or (b) which had been reported to the Attorney-General but not tabled in the Parliament.
- 13 MR BAKER To move, That this House condemns the Government for policy settings that have transferred the burden of taxation away from wealth and production towards consumption and families.
- MR ROPER To move, That each body constituted under the Ambulance Services Act 1986 including the Victorian Ambulance Board, Ambulance Officers' Training Centre, Ambulance Service Victoria Metropolitan Region, Ambulance Service Victoria North Eastern Region, Ambulance Service Victoria North Western Region, Ambulance Service Victoria South Western Region and Ambulance Service Victoria Western Region, be referred to the Public Bodies Review Committee for review.
- MS GARBUTT To move, That this House condemns the Government for its failure to continue the process of deinstitutionalisation of intellectually disabled people, through the closure of antiquated institutions and the provision of additional housing and support services in the community.

- MR LEIGHTON To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Small Business for his failure to assist small business as demonstrated by his scrapping of the Small Business Development Corporation despite his election promise to retain it and his defunding of the Local Enterprise Development Initiative Program.
- 17 DR COGHILL To move, That this House condemns the Leader of the House, the Honourable Phillip Gude, MLA, for proposing and supporting motions having the effect of reducing the opportunities for Members to speak during the Autumn Sittings 1993 on the question "That grievances be noted" from a total of 16 hours being four hours on each of four days as provided for under Standing Order No. 59 to a total of less than six hours being less than three hours on each of two days.
- 18 MR MAUGHAN To move, That this House condemns the Opposition for its failure while in Government to properly address the problems of social injustices.
- 19 MR MAUGHAN To move, That this House commends the Government for its commitment to assisting children with disabilities.
- 20 MRS ELLIOTT To move, That this House commends the Government for its commitment to assisting families in need.
- 21 MRS ELLIOTT To move, That this House commends the Government for its commitment to improving foster care programmes.
- 22 MR COOPER To move, That this House congratulates the Government on its initiatives to support and reform local government.
- 23 MR ROPER To move, That the use of electronic displays to assist in the delivery of debate be referred to the Standing Orders Committee for examination and report.
- DR COGHILL To move, That this House censures Mr Speaker for not allowing the Member for Werribee to complete the explanation of his point of order on Tuesday, 6 April 1993 relating to the admissibility of the notice of motion of the Minister for Industry and Employment relating to the suspension of Standing and Sessional Orders to permit the Minister for Finance to address Members of both Houses without allowing any opportunity for debate on the address and dissents from the ruling of Mr Speaker on the point of order.
- DR COGHILL To move, That this House condemns the Leader of the House for moving and supporting a motion having the effect of (a) providing for an unprecedented form of address by the Minister for Finance on Wednesday, 7 April 1993 rather than relying on the established customary practice of a Ministerial statement; (b) denying any other Member any opportunity to speak on the address; (c) denying the House any opportunity to debate or otherwise deal with the address; and (d) further eroding the essential privileges immunities and powers of Members and the House as defined by the Constitution Act 1975.
- 26 MR LEIGH To move, That this House condemns the Speaker of the Fifty-first Parliament, Dr K. Coghill, the Member for Werribee, for his - (a) inability to act impartially and protect the rights of all Members of the House; and (b) failure to control the House and for the protection he gave to the Kirner Government and its members.

- 27 MR ROPER To move, That this House condemns the Leader of the House for his action in moving to expel the Honourable Member for Springvale without seeking the apology of the named Member.
- MS MARPLE To move, That this House (a) calls on the Government to refer the status of the Chiltern Regional Park to the Land Conservation Council to be urgently reviewed in light of the importance of the remnant box and ironbark forest; and (b) revokes the consent to mineral exploration in Chiltern Park by CRA Exploration Pty Limited given by the Minister for Conservation and Environment, notice of which was tabled in this House on 16 March 1993 pursuant to section 40(5) of the National Parks Act 1975, so that there can be a moratorium on exploration while the Land Conservation Council considers the status of the Chiltern Regional Park.
- MR ROPER To move, That this House supports the Petition presented to this House by the Member for Coburg on 29 April 1993 seeking that the House take all necessary steps to maintain and expand funding for family planning services throughout the State in order to continue the wide range of advice and assistance particularly for young women living in isolated areas as adequate services cannot be provided by relying solely on general practitioners.
- 30 MR ROPER To move, That the Standing Orders Committee have power to inquire and report on the programming of government and general business of the House to provide for more efficient and effective use of parliamentary debating time and that the Committee report not later than the first sitting of the Spring 1993 sittings period.
- MR ROPER To move, That this House adopts in principle the following proposals to 31 alter Standing Orders outlined in the Ministerial Statement concerning Parliamentary Reform made by the former Premier in this House on 18 March 1992 to allow for: (a) The discretion to the Speaker to allow question time to be extended if opportunity for asking an adequate number of questions is not available; (b) The opportunity for a grievance debate to be held on a more regular and frequent basis (every third Thursday on which the Assembly sits); (c) Reduction of time limits on speeches in debate (with discretion to the Speaker to extend the time allowed if a Member's rights are unreasonably affected by interruptions); (d) Agreed times for the duration of debates; (e) The introduction of set times for the resumption of second reading debates; and (f) The adoption of the Australian Senate procedure relating to the protection of persons referred to in the House - and requires the Standing Orders Committee to prepare amendments to the relevant Standing Orders for adoption by the House based on the proposals and that the Committee report not later than the first sitting of the Spring 1993 sittings period.

## 32 MR ROPER - To move -

- 1 That a Joint Select Committee be appointed to further enquire into and report upon the administration and funding of the Parliament and into all issues contained in, and the recommendations of, the Strategic Management Review of the Parliament of Victoria, February 1991.
- 2 That the Committee shall consist of eight Members comprising not more than four Members of the Council and not more than four Members of the Assembly.
- 3 That five Members of the Committee shall constitute a quorum of the Committee.

- 4 That the Committee shall elect two of its Members to be Joint Chairmen.
- 5 That the Committee may sit in such places in Victoria as seems most convenient for the proper and speedy despatch of business.
- 6 That the Committee shall not sit while either House is actually sitting except by leave of that House and may not, while either House is actually sitting, sit in any place other than a place that is within the Parliament building.
- 7 That the Committee may send for persons, papers and records and report from time to time.
- 8 That the Committee shall, unless it otherwise resolves, take all evidence in public.
- 9 That the Committee shall keep a record of all evidence given before it and determinations made by it.
- That the Committee have power to authorize publication of any evidence given before it in public and any document presented to it.
- 11 That as soon as practicable after the completion of each day's proceedings a transcript of the evidence taken in public by the Committee shall be published.
- 12 That evidence taken before the previous Parliament of Victoria Committee shall be considered by the Committee as if that evidence had been given before and for the information and guidance of the Committee.
- 13 That the foregoing provisions of this resolution so far as they are inconsistent with the Standing Orders and practices of the Houses shall have effect notwithstanding anything contained in those Standing Orders.

## 33 DR COGHILL - To move -

- 1 That a Joint Select Committee be appointed to enquire into and report upon the operation of the parliamentary committee system and in particular to report on provision by statute for its monitoring and review of all portfolios and for bi-partisan functioning.
- 2 That the Committee shall consist of eight Members, four members nominated by the Premier of whom two must be Members of the Assembly and one must be a Member of the Council and four Members nominated by the Leader of the Opposition of whom two must be Members of the Assembly and one must a Member of the Council. The appointments shall be made by the relevant House.
- 3 That five Members of the Committee shall constitute a quorum of the Committee.
- 4 That the Committee shall elect two of its Members to be Joint Chairmen.
- 5 That the Committee may sit in such places in Victoria as seems most convenient for the proper and speedy despatch of business.
- That the Committee shall not sit while either House is actually sitting except by leave of that House and may not, while either House is actually sitting, sit in any place other than a place that is within the Parliament building.
- 7 That the Committee may send for persons, papers and records and report from time to time.
- 8 That the Committee shall, unless it otherwise resolves, take all evidence in public.
- 9 That the Committee shall keep a record of all evidence given before it and determinations made by it.

- 10 That the Committee have power to authorize publication of any evidence given before it in public and any document presented to it.
- 11 That as soon as practicable after the completion of each day's proceedings a transcript of the evidence taken in public by the Committee shall be published.
- 12 That the foregoing provisions of this resolution so far as they are inconsistent with the Standing Orders and practices of the Houses shall have effect notwithstanding anything contained in those Standing Orders.
- 34 DR COGHILL To move, That this House dissents from the actions of Mr Speaker in disallowing the use of lap top computers in the Chamber by Members and expresses the opinion that their use is acceptable subject to conditions similar to those applying in the other place.
- 35 MR SERCOMBE To move, That this House condemns the Premier and the Speaker for undermining the independence, integrity and respect for the Office of Speaker by their actions in delaying a decision on the date of the Broadmeadows By-election until immediately after the Premier's deliberately belated response to the Speaker's invitation to comment on the matter and the selection of the last practical date as preferred by the Premier for purely partisan political advantage contrary to the fundamental principle that the Speaker makes decisions on a non-partisan basis and the custom and practice of choosing the earliest practical dates for by-elections so as to minimise the period for which electors are unrepresented.
- 36 MR ROPER To move, That this House dissents from the ruling of Mr Speaker that the Adjournment Motion moved by the Member for Sunshine on the Government's Industry Statement was out of order on the grounds that the Statement was not a new matter and points out to Mr Speaker that the Government itself claimed that the Statement "signalled a second phase in the State Government's commitment to industry" and the Premier claimed it as "another Agenda 21 initiative" and regrets that the ruling prevented debate on the Statement and its significant shortcomings.
- 37 MR SANDON To move, That he have leave to bring in a Bill to amend the *Education Act* 1958 to provide for the establishment of School Closures Review Committees, to allow for public consultation in the closure of Government Schools and for other purposes.
- 38 MR DOLLIS To move, That he have leave to bring in a Bill to amend the *Building Control Act* 1981 and for other purposes.
- 39 MR ROPER To move, That this House dissents from the ruling of Mr Speaker that the Premier did not have to answer questions by the Leader of the Opposition on the statement regarding the use of public resources made as Premier on the Neil Mitchell Program on 3AW on 29 October 1993.
- MR LEIGH To move, That this House condemns the Member for Clayton for (a) his failure to repay to the State of Victoria within due time \$7595.41 advanced to the Member from the Education Ministry after his entering a studentship agreement; and (b) his offers to repay \$20 per month over a period of 18 years in spite of letters from the Victorian Government Solicitor threatening legal action unless he complied with arrangements which are contained in the studentship agreement that he entered into; despite the fact that during his time as a MLA for Glenhuntly and Clayton he received salary and electoral allowances of almost \$1.5 M. and this House further requests the Member to explain to the people why he failed to

- honour arrangements that were entered into by the Member in the studentship agreement which he made and which was honoured by the State of Victoria but not honoured by the Member for Clayton.
- 41 MR ROPER To move, That he have leave to bring in a Bill to amend the *Dental Technicians Act* 1972 and for other purposes.
- \*42 MR LEIGH To move, That this House condemns the Leader of the Opposition Mr J Brumby and Members of the Opposition for their failure to disassociate themselves from the activities of the Member for Clayton in his failure to repay in adequate time monies that he owed the Ministry of Education.
- \*43 DR COGHILL To move, That this House expresses the opinion that there is prima facie evidence of a contempt of the Parliament by the Honourable the Leader of the House in that he failed to make available for inspection all correspondence and other documents created since 26 October 1992, relating to any aspect of the review or reform of the structure, functioning, Standing Orders, procedures, practices or administration of the Legislative Assembly, the Legislative Council or the Parliament in any other respect including the rights and entitlements of Members received by him or sent by him or on his authority to the Speaker of the Legislative Assembly and the President of the Legislative Council either individually or jointly or any Officer or Officers of the Parliament, and all documents held by him relating to meetings, telephone conversations or other forms of communication or discussion in respect of the above matters in which he participated or which were held on his authority in response to Question No. 8 and that the matter be referred to the Privileges Committee for inquiry and report.

- MR SERCOMBE To move, That this House condemns the Premier and the Speaker for undermining the independence, integrity and respect for the Office of Speaker by their actions in delaying a decision on the date of the Broadmeadows By-election until immediately after the Premier's deliberately belated response to the Speaker's invitation to comment on the matter and the selection of the last practical date as preferred by the Premier for purely partisan political advantage contrary to the fundamental principle that the Speaker makes decisions on a non-partisan basis and the custom and practice of choosing the earliest practical dates for by-elections so as to minimise the period for which electors are unrepresented.

Standing Orders Committee to prepare amendments to the relevant Standing Orders for adoption by the House based on the proposals and that the Committee report not later than the first sitting of the Spring 1993 sittings period.

- 1 That a Joint Select Committee be appointed to further enquire into and report upon the administration and funding of the Parliament and into all issues contained in, and the recommendations of, the Strategic Management Review of the Parliament of Victoria, February 1991.

- MR SERCOMBE To move, That this House condemns the Premier and the Speaker for undermining the independence, integrity and respect for the Office of Speaker by their actions in delaying a decision on the date of the Broadmeadows By-election until immediately after the Premier's deliberately belated response to the Speaker's invitation to comment on the matter and the selection of the last practical date as preferred by the Premier for purely partisan political advantage contrary to the fundamental principle that the Speaker makes decisions on a non-partisan basis and the custom and practice of choosing the earliest practical dates for by-elections so as to minimise the period for which electors are unrepresented.
- MR ROPER To move, That this House dissents from the ruling of Mr Speaker that the Adjournment Motion moved by the Member for Sunshine on the Government's Industry Statement was out of order on the grounds that the Statement was not a new matter and points out to Mr Speaker that the Government itself claimed that the Statement "signalled a second phase in the State Government's commitment to industry" and the Premier claimed it as "another Agenda 21 initiative" and regrets that the ruling prevented debate on the Statement and its significant shortcomings.

- 6 MR ROPER To move, That the House dissent from the ruling of Mr Speaker on the sitting of Thursday, 12 November 1992 affecting the manner of dealing with the amendments of the Legislative Council to the Employee Relations Bill and express the opinion that, in accordance with pre-existing custom and practice and precedent recorded in Hansard which confirms that in almost all if not all previous occasions on which any Member had sought any amendment or group of amendments to be dealt with as separate questions the Chair put the questions accordingly, "Legislative Assembly of Victoria Rulings from the Chair 1920-1984" which states at page 13 "Council Amendments where the House had no objection 29 amendments of the Council were permitted to be moved *in globo*, Vol. 290, pp. 4311-2, 23.4.1968 (Christie)", guidance provided by May's "Parliamentary Practice" and the practice of the Committee of the whole in dealing with clauses of Bills, amendments of the Legislative Council to Bills should be put separately or in groups if and as requested by a Member except that, by leave, they may be put *in globo*.
- 7 MR BAKER To move, That he have leave to bring in a Bill to amend the Audit Act 1958 and certain other Acts, to require the Auditor-General to investigate and report to Parliament on the implications for the State finances and for consumers of privatisation of Government Business Enterprises prior to sale and for other purposes.

- DR COGHILL To move, That the House condemns the Leader of the House, the Honourable Phillip Gude, MLA, for his - (a) support for budgetary provisions adversely affecting the effective operation of the Parliament including its Committees whilst enabling the restoration of extravagant and luxurious levels of Dining Room service available exclusively to Members; (b) support for provisions of the Parliamentary Committees (Amendment) Bill which were incompatible with basic principles of parliamentary government and the Westminster system; (c) support for the destruction of the time-honoured bi-partisan approach to parliamentary committees including the cessation of the practice of chairmanship being shared between Government and Opposition with all Chairmen now being Members of the senior party in the Coalition, the Liberal Party; (d) support for provisions of the Parliamentary Salaries and Superannuation (Further Amendment) Bill as introduced which undermined the recognition by the Parliament of the authority and status of the Speaker of the Legislative Assembly and the President of the Legislative Council and which made unjustified increases to the remuneration of many members of the Government Party including himself; (e) proposing and supporting motions for periods of adjournment of debate that have denied Members reasonable time in which to consider matters before the House and that have denied people affected by or otherwise interested in such matters reasonable time in which to consider and comment on their implications; (f) proposing and supporting motions that bills be declared urgent and periods for debate of them limited with the effect of denying Members reasonable time in which to debate them; (g) imposition and support of sitting hours in October and November 1992 that were beyond those which could reasonably be expected to allow Members, staff and others associated with the functioning and reporting of the Parliament to carry out their responsibilities effectively and efficiently and that therefore militated against proper functioning and good decision-making; (h) failing to advise and consult Members and the Parliamentary parties on forthcoming legislation, arrangements for debates and other aspects of the parliamentary program in accordance with long-standing tradition and practice in the Parliament of Victoria and comparable parliaments; and (i) failing to provide leadership to Members including the Government in the observance and furtherance of acceptable standards of parliamentary conduct and practice.
- 9 MR COLE To move, That he have leave to bring in a Bill to facilitate the efficient case management of complex fraud trials, to amend certain Rules of Evidence, to amend the *Evidence Act* 1958, the *Judicial Proceedings Reports Act* 1958 and the *Bail Act* 1977 and for other purposes.
- MS GARBUTT To move, That she have leave to bring in a Bill to make it compulsory for certain persons to notify the Secretary of the Department of Health and Community Services of any child they believe is in need of protection, as soon as practicable after forming such a belief, to amend certain Acts and for other purposes.
- 11 **DR VAUGHAN** To move, That the Law Reform Committee inquire into, consider and report on the former Law Reform Commission references which were (a) incomplete and not reported to the Attorney-General; or (b) which had been reported to the Attorney-General but not tabled in the Parliament.
- 12 MR BAKER To move, That this House condemns the Government for policy settings that have transferred the burden of taxation away from wealth and production towards consumption and families.

- MR ROPER To move, That each body constituted under the Ambulance Services
  Act 1986 including the Victorian Ambulance Board, Ambulance Officers' Training
  Centre, Ambulance Service Victoria Metropolitan Region, Ambulance Service
  Victoria North Eastern Region, Ambulance Service Victoria North Western
  Region, Ambulance Service Victoria South Eastern Region, Ambulance Service
  Victoria South Western Region and Ambulance Service Victoria Western
  Region, be referred to the Public Bodies Review Committee for review.
- 14 MS GARBUTT To move, That this House condemns the Government for its failure to continue the process of deinstitutionalisation of intellectually disabled people, through the closure of antiquated institutions and the provision of additional housing and support services in the community.
- MR LEIGHTON To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Small Business for his failure to assist small business as demonstrated by his scrapping of the Small Business Development Corporation despite his election promise to retain it and his defunding of the Local Enterprise Development Initiative Program.
- 16 DR COGHILL To move, That this House condemns the Leader of the House, the Honourable Phillip Gude, MLA, for proposing and supporting motions having the effect of reducing the opportunities for Members to speak during the Autumn Sittings 1993 on the question "That grievances be noted" from a total of 16 hours being four hours on each of four days as provided for under Standing Order No. 59 to a total of less than six hours being less than three hours on each of two days.
- 17 MR MAUGHAN To move, That this House condemns the Opposition for its failure while in Government to properly address the problems of social injustices.
- 18 MR MAUGHAN To move, That this House commends the Government for its commitment to assisting children with disabilities.
- 19 MRS ELLIOTT To move, That this House commends the Government for its commitment to assisting families in need.
- 20 MRS ELLIOTT To move, That this House commends the Government for its commitment to improving foster care programmes.
- 21 MR COOPER To move, That this House congratulates the Government on its initiatives to support and reform local government.
- 22 MR ROPER To move, That the use of electronic displays to assist in the delivery of debate be referred to the Standing Orders Committee for examination and report.
- 23 DR COGHILL To move, That this House censures Mr Speaker for not allowing the Member for Werribee to complete the explanation of his point of order on Tuesday, 6 April 1993 relating to the admissibility of the notice of motion of the Minister for Industry and Employment relating to the suspension of Standing and Sessional Orders to permit the Minister for Finance to address Members of both Houses without allowing any opportunity for debate on the address and dissents from the ruling of Mr Speaker on the point of order.

- DR COGHILL To move, That this House condemns the Leader of the House for moving and supporting a motion having the effect of (a) providing for an unprecedented form of address by the Minister for Finance on Wednesday, 7 April 1993 rather than relying on the established customary practice of a Ministerial statement; (b) denying any other Member any opportunity to speak on the address; (c) denying the House any opportunity to debate or otherwise deal with the address; and (d) further eroding the essential privileges immunities and powers of Members and the House as defined by the Constitution Act 1975.
- 25 MR LEIGH To move, That this House condemns the Speaker of the Fifty-first Parliament, Dr K. Coghill, the Member for Werribee, for his (a) inability to act impartially and protect the rights of all Members of the House; and (b) failure to control the House and for the protection he gave to the Kirner Government and its members.
- MR ROPER To move, That this House condemns the Leader of the House for his action in moving to expel the Honourable Member for Springvale without seeking the apology of the named Member.
- MS MARPLE To move, That this House (a) calls on the Government to refer the status of the Chiltern Regional Park to the Land Conservation Council to be urgently reviewed in light of the importance of the remnant box and ironbark forest; and (b) revokes the consent to mineral exploration in Chiltern Park by CRA Exploration Pty Limited given by the Minister for Conservation and Environment, notice of which was tabled in this House on 16 March 1993 pursuant to section 40(5) of the National Parks Act 1975, so that there can be a moratorium on exploration while the Land Conservation Council considers the status of the Chiltern Regional Park.

- 33 DR COGHILL To move, That this House dissents from the actions of Mr Speaker in disallowing the use of lap top computers in the Chamber by Members and expresses the opinion that their use is acceptable subject to conditions similar to those applying in the other place.
- MR SERCOMBE To move, That this House condemns the Premier and the Speaker for undermining the independence, integrity and respect for the Office of Speaker by their actions in delaying a decision on the date of the Broadmeadows By-election until immediately after the Premier's deliberately belated response to the Speaker's invitation to comment on the matter and the selection of the last practical date as preferred by the Premier for purely partisan political advantage contrary to the fundamental principle that the Speaker makes decisions on a non-partisan basis and the custom and practice of choosing the earliest practical dates for by-elections so as to minimise the period for which electors are unrepresented.
- MR ROPER To move, That this House dissents from the ruling of Mr Speaker that the Adjournment Motion moved by the Member for Sunshine on the Government's Industry Statement was out of order on the grounds that the Statement was not a new matter and points out to Mr Speaker that the Government itself claimed that the Statement "signalled a second phase in the State Government's commitment to industry" and the Premier claimed it as "another Agenda 21 initiative" and regrets that the ruling prevented debate on the Statement and its significant shortcomings.
- 36 MR SANDON To move, That he have leave to bring in a Bill to amend the *Education Act* 1958 to provide for the establishment of School Closures Review Committees, to allow for public consultation in the closure of Government Schools and for other purposes.

- 37 MR DOLLIS To move, That he have leave to bring in a Bill to amend the *Building Control Act* 1981 and for other purposes.
- 38 MR ROPER To move, That this House dissents from the ruling of Mr Speaker that the Premier did not have to answer questions by the Leader of the Opposition on the statement regarding the use of public resources made as Premier on the Neil Mitchell Program on 3AW on 29 October 1993.
- 39 MR LEIGH To move, That this House condemns the Member for Clayton for (a) his failure to repay to the State of Victoria within due time \$7595.41 advanced to the Member from the Education Ministry after his entering a studentship agreement; and (b) his offers to repay \$20 per month over a period of 18 years in spite of letters from the Victorian Government Solicitor threatening legal action unless he complied with arrangements which are contained in the studentship agreement that he entered into; despite the fact that during his time as a MLA for Glenhuntly and Clayton he received salary and electoral allowances of almost \$1.5 M. and this House further requests the Member to explain to the people why he failed to honour arrangements that were entered into by the Member in the studentship agreement which he made and which was honoured by the State of Victoria but not honoured by the Member for Clayton.
- 40 MR ROPER To move, That he have leave to bring in a Bill to amend the *Dental Technicians Act* 1972 and for other purposes.
- 41 MR LEIGH To move, That this House condemns the Leader of the Opposition Mr J Brumby and Members of the Opposition for their failure to disassociate themselves from the activities of the Member for Clayton in his failure to repay in adequate time monies that he owed the Ministry of Education.
- DR COGHILL To move, That this House expresses the opinion that there is prima facie evidence of a contempt of the Parliament by the Honourable the Leader of the House in that he failed to make available for inspection all correspondence and other documents created since 26 October 1992, relating to any aspect of the review or reform of the structure, functioning, Standing Orders, procedures, practices or administration of the Legislative Assembly, the Legislative Council or the Parliament in any other respect including the rights and entitlements of Members received by him or sent by him or on his authority to the Speaker of the Legislative Assembly and the President of the Legislative Council either individually or jointly or any Officer or Officers of the Parliament, and all documents held by him relating to meetings, telephone conversations or other forms of communication or discussion in respect of the above matters in which he participated or which were held on his authority in response to Question No. 8 and that the matter be referred to the Privileges Committee for inquiry and report.

- 44 MR MICALLEF To move, That this House condemns the State Government for its continued failure to adequately secure the former Joseph Banks Secondary College site at Doveton, showing a disregard for the safety of local residents, allowing them to walk unhindered into an asbestos contaminated area and leaving a damage bill

- estimated at over \$60,000 some of which is to facilities which are to be retained by the community.
- 45 MR HAERMEYER To move, That this House notes with concern that as a result of Government policies fees at the Mordialloc Kindergarten have increased from \$50 per term in 1993 to \$110 per term in 1994, with parents expected to pay an additional \$30 levy for excursions, and consequently, enrolments at this kindergarten have decreased from 50 in 1993 to 30 in 1994 and this House urges the Minister to implement policies to ensure affordable and quality pre-schools are available to all families in the Mordialloc area.
- MS GARBUTT To move, That this House notes with concern that on average preschool fees on the Mornington Peninsular have doubled this year from \$49 to \$99 and further evidence suggests that at least 44 children have been excluded this year because parents cannot pay fees, 15 children have moved to day care as they can obtain fee relief, 20 children are on waiting lists due to reduced sessions and groups lost.
- 47 MS GARBUTT To move, That this House expresses its concerns at the failure of the Minister for Community Services to guarantee that all families living in Blackburn are able to afford to have their children attend pre-school, including those 15% of children who have not enrolled this year due to massive increase of 140% in pre-school fees at Blackburn North Pre-school.
- 48 MS MARPLE To move, That this House notes with concern the failure of the State Government to require an environmental effects statement for the proposed redevelopment of the Crib Point Oil Facility despite the companies involved indicating that works will not proceed during 1994.
- 49 MRS WILSON To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Fair Trading for her Government's actions in eroding the resources available to consumers for information and protection, through the closure of the regional offices of the Office of Fair Trading in Ringwood and Dandenong, thus making it difficult for people living in the outer suburbs to access these services.
- 50 MR SEITZ To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Community Services for Government policies which have lead to an increase of kindergarten fees at Indra Pre-school in Blackburn South from \$180 to \$500 a year, resulting in severe hardships being endured by families of Pre-school children in the Blackburn area.
- MR HAMILTON To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Public Transport for the appalling level of service for commuters travelling to Bairnsdale via Sale, since the abolition of the Rail Service between Bairnsdale and Sale, including the lack of shelter and passenger amenities at Bairnsdale and inconvenience caused by long delays in bus and train connections.
- 52 MR ANDRIANOPOULOS To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Public Transport for the premature introduction of driver only trains on the Alamein line, which because of 'blind spots' created by the design of station platforms along this line, has resulted in passengers being placed in great danger when boarding and alighting from trains, due to the inability of drivers to clearly see whether passengers are clear of the train before departing.

- \*56 MS MARPLE To move, That the House condemns the Minister for Community Services for his failure to provide an affordable pre-school at Croydon Central where due to the Minister's policies there has been a massive 88% increase in fees from \$160 in 1993 to \$300 in 1994.
- \*57 MR SHEEHAN To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Education who, with the support of the Member for Mordialloc, has implemented policies which have resulted in the loss of 20 teaching positions from schools in the Mordialloc Electorate, while enrolments have increased by in excess of 60.

- 39 MR LEIGH To move, That this House condemns the Member for Clayton for (a) his failure to repay to the State of Victoria within due time \$7595.41 advanced to the Member from the Education Ministry after his entering a studentship agreement; and (b) his offers to repay \$20 per month over a period of 18 years in spite of letters from the Victorian Government Solicitor threatening legal action unless he complied with arrangements which are contained in the studentship agreement that he entered into; despite the fact that during his time as a MLA for Glenhuntly and Clayton he received salary and electoral allowances of almost \$1.5 M. and this House further requests the Member to explain to the people why he failed to honour arrangements that were entered into by the Member in the studentship agreement which he made and which was honoured by the State of Victoria but not honoured by the Member for Clayton.
- 40 MR ROPER To move, That he have leave to bring in a Bill to amend the Dental Technicians Act 1972 and for other purposes.
- 41 MR LEIGH To move, That this House condemns the Leader of the Opposition Mr J Brumby and Members of the Opposition for their failure to disassociate themselves from the activities of the Member for Clayton in his failure to repay in adequate time monies that he owed the Ministry of Education.
- DR COGHILL To move, That this House expresses the opinion that there is prima facie evidence of a contempt of the Parliament by the Honourable the Leader of the House in that he failed to make available for inspection all correspondence and other documents created since 26 October 1992, relating to any aspect of the review or reform of the structure, functioning, Standing Orders, procedures, practices or

administration of the Legislative Assembly, the Legislative Council or the Parliament in any other respect including the rights and entitlements of Members received by him or sent by him or on his authority to the Speaker of the Legislative Assembly and the President of the Legislative Council either individually or jointly or any Officer or Officers of the Parliament, and all documents held by him relating to meetings, telephone conversations or other forms of communication or discussion in respect of the above matters in which he participated or which were held on his authority in response to Question No. 8 and that the matter be referred to the Privileges Committee for inquiry and report.

of the Parliamentary Committees (Amendment) Bill which were incompatible with basic principles of parliamentary government and the Westminster system; (c) support for the destruction of the time-honoured bi-partisan approach to parliamentary committees including the cessation of the practice of chairmanship being shared between Government and Opposition with all Chairmen now being Members of the senior party in the Coalition, the Liberal Party; (d) support for provisions of the Parliamentary Salaries and Superannuation (Further Amendment) Bill as introduced which undermined the recognition by the Parliament of the authority and status of the Speaker of the Legislative Assembly and the President of the Legislative Council and which made unjustified increases to the remuneration of many members of the Government Party including himself; (e) proposing and supporting motions for periods of adjournment of debate that have denied Members reasonable time in which to consider matters before the House and that have denied people affected by or otherwise interested in such matters reasonable time in which to consider and comment on their implications; (f) proposing and supporting motions that bills be declared urgent and periods for debate of them limited with the effect of denying Members reasonable time in which to debate them; (g) imposition and support of sitting hours in October and November 1992 that were beyond those which could reasonably be expected to allow Members, staff and others associated with the functioning and reporting of the Parliament to carry out their responsibilities effectively and efficiently and that therefore militated against proper functioning and good decision-making; (h) failing to advise and consult Members and the Parliamentary parties on forthcoming legislation, arrangements for debates and other aspects of the parliamentary program in accordance with long-standing tradition and practice in the Parliament of Victoria and comparable parliaments; and (i) failing to provide leadership to Members including the Government in the observance and furtherance of acceptable standards of parliamentary conduct and practice.

- 9 MR COLE To move, That he have leave to bring in a Bill to facilitate the efficient case management of complex fraud trials, to amend certain Rules of Evidence, to amend the Evidence Act 1958, the Judicial Proceedings Reports Act 1958 and the Bail Act 1977 and for other purposes.
- MS GARBUTT To move, That she have leave to bring in a Bill to make it compulsory for certain persons to notify the Secretary of the Department of Health and Community Services of any child they believe is in need of protection, as soon as practicable after forming such a belief, to amend certain Acts and for other purposes.
- 11 DR VAUGHAN To move, That the Law Reform Committee inquire into, consider and report on the former Law Reform Commission references which were (a) incomplete and not reported to the Attorney-General; or (b) which had been reported to the Attorney-General but not tabled in the Parliament.
- 12 MR BAKER To move, That this House condemns the Government for policy settings that have transferred the burden of taxation away from wealth and production towards consumption and families.

- MR ROPER To move, That each body constituted under the Ambulance Services Act 1986 including the Victorian Ambulance Board, Ambulance Officers' Training Centre, Ambulance Service Victoria Metropolitan Region, Ambulance Service Victoria North Eastern Region, Ambulance Service Victoria North Western Region, Ambulance Service Victoria South Western Region and Ambulance Service Victoria Western Region, be referred to the Public Bodies Review Committee for review.
- 14 MS GARBUTT To move, That this House condemns the Government for its failure to continue the process of deinstitutionalisation of intellectually disabled people, through the closure of antiquated institutions and the provision of additional housing and support services in the community.
- 15 MR LEIGHTON To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Small Business for his failure to assist small business as demonstrated by his scrapping of the Small Business Development Corporation despite his election promise to retain it and his defunding of the Local Enterprise Development Initiative Program.
- 16 DR COGHILL To move, That this House condemns the Leader of the House, the Honourable Phillip Gude, MLA, for proposing and supporting motions having the effect of reducing the opportunities for Members to speak during the Autumn Sittings 1993 on the question "That grievances be noted" from a total of 16 hours being four hours on each of four days as provided for under Standing Order No. 59 to a total of less than six hours being less than three hours on each of two days.
- 17 MR MAUGHAN To move, That this House condemns the Opposition for its failure while in Government to properly address the problems of social injustices.
- 18 MR MAUGHAN To move, That this House commends the Government for its commitment to assisting children with disabilities.
- 19 MRS ELLIOTT To move, That this House commends the Government for its commitment to assisting families in need.
- 20 MRS ELLIOTT To move, That this House commends the Government for its commitment to improving foster care programmes.
- 21 MR COOPER To move, That this House congratulates the Government on its initiatives to support and reform local government.
- 22 MR ROPER To move, That the use of electronic displays to assist in the delivery of debate be referred to the Standing Orders Committee for examination and report.
- 23 DR COGHILL To move, That this House censures Mr Speaker for not allowing the Member for Werribee to complete the explanation of his point of order on Tuesday, 6 April 1993 relating to the admissibility of the notice of motion of the Minister for Industry and Employment relating to the suspension of Standing and Sessional Orders to permit the Minister for Finance to address Members of both Houses without allowing any opportunity for debate on the address and dissents from the ruling of Mr Speaker on the point of order.

- DR COGHILL To move, That this House condemns the Leader of the House for moving and supporting a motion having the effect of (a) providing for an unprecedented form of address by the Minister for Finance on Wednesday, 7 April 1993 rather than relying on the established customary practice of a Ministerial statement; (b) denying any other Member any opportunity to speak on the address; (c) denying the House any opportunity to debate or otherwise deal with the address; and (d) further eroding the essential privileges immunities and powers of Members and the House as defined by the Constitution Act 1975.
- 25 MR LEIGH To move, That this House condemns the Speaker of the Fifty-first Parliament, Dr K. Coghill, the Member for Werribee, for his - (a) inability to act impartially and protect the rights of all Members of the House; and (b) failure to control the House and for the protection he gave to the Kirner Government and its members.
- 26 MR ROPER To move, That this House condemns the Leader of the House for his action in moving to expel the Honourable Member for Springvale without seeking the apology of the named Member.
- MS MARPLE To move, That this House (a) calls on the Government to refer the status of the Chiltern Regional Park to the Land Conservation Council to be urgently reviewed in light of the importance of the remnant box and ironbark forest; and (b) revokes the consent to mineral exploration in Chiltern Park by CRA Exploration Pty Limited given by the Minister for Conservation and Environment, notice of which was tabled in this House on 16 March 1993 pursuant to section 40(5) of the National Parks Act 1975, so that there can be a moratorium on exploration while the Land Conservation Council considers the status of the Chiltern Regional Park.
- 28 MR ROPER To move, That this House supports the Petition presented to this House by the Member for Coburg on 29 April 1993 seeking that the House take all necessary steps to maintain and expand funding for family planning services throughout the State in order to continue the wide range of advice and assistance particularly for young women living in isolated areas as adequate services cannot be provided by relying solely on general practitioners.
- 29 MR ROPER To move, That the Standing Orders Committee have power to inquire and report on the programming of government and general business of the House to provide for more efficient and effective use of parliamentary debating time and that the Committee report not later than the first sitting of the Spring 1993 sittings period.

- 1 That a Joint Select Committee be appointed to enquire into and report upon the operation of the parliamentary committee system and in particular to report on provision by statute for its monitoring and review of all portfolios and for bi-partisan functioning.
- 2 That the Committee shall consist of eight Members, four members nominated by the Premier of whom two must be Members of the Assembly and one must be a Member of the Council and four Members nominated by the Leader of the Opposition of whom two must be Members of the Assembly and one must a Member of the Council. - 11 That as soon as practicable after the completion of each day's proceedings a transcript of the evidence taken in public by the Committee shall be published.
- 12 That the foregoing provisions of this resolution so far as they are inconsistent with the Standing Orders and practices of the Houses shall have effect notwithstanding anything contained in those Standing Orders.
- 33 DR COGHILL To move, That this House dissents from the actions of Mr Speaker in disallowing the use of lap top computers in the Chamber by Members and expresses the opinion that their use is acceptable subject to conditions similar to those applying in the other place.
- MR SERCOMBE To move, That this House condemns the Premier and the Speaker for undermining the independence, integrity and respect for the Office of Speaker by their actions in delaying a decision on the date of the Broadmeadows By-election until immediately after the Premier's deliberately belated response to the Speaker's invitation to comment on the matter and the selection of the last practical date as preferred by the Premier for purely partisan political advantage contrary to the fundamental principle that the Speaker makes decisions on a non-partisan basis and the custom and practice of choosing the earliest practical dates for by-elections so as to minimise the period for which electors are unrepresented.
- 35 MR ROPER To move, That this House dissents from the ruling of Mr Speaker that the Adjournment Motion moved by the Member for Sunshine on the Government's Industry Statement was out of order on the grounds that the Statement was not a new matter and points out to Mr Speaker that the Government itself claimed that the Statement "signalled a second phase in the State Government's commitment to industry" and the Premier claimed it as "another Agenda 21 initiative" and regrets that the ruling prevented debate on the Statement and its significant shortcomings.
- 36 MR SANDON To move, That he have leave to bring in a Bill to amend the Education Act 1958 to provide for the establishment of School Closures Review Committees, to allow for public consultation in the closure of Government Schools and for other purposes.

- 37 MR DOLLIS To move, That he have leave to bring in a Bill to amend the Building Control Act 1981 and for other purposes.
- 38 MR ROPER To move, That this House dissents from the ruling of Mr Speaker that the Premier did not have to answer questions by the Leader of the Opposition on the statement regarding the use of public resources made as Premier on the Neil Mitchell Program on 3AW on 29 October 1993.
- 39 MR LEIGH To move, That this House condemns the Member for Clayton for (a) his failure to repay to the State of Victoria within due time \$7595.41 advanced to the Member from the Education Ministry after his entering a studentship agreement; and (b) his offers to repay \$20 per month over a period of 18 years in spite of letters from the Victorian Government Solicitor threatening legal action unless he complied with arrangements which are contained in the studentship agreement that he entered into; despite the fact that during his time as a MLA for Glenhuntly and Clayton he received salary and electoral allowances of almost \$1.5 M. and this House further requests the Member to explain to the people why he failed to honour arrangements that were entered into by the Member in the studentship agreement which he made and which was honoured by the State of Victoria but not honoured by the Member for Clayton.
- 40 MR ROPER To move, That he have leave to bring in a Bill to amend the Dental Technicians Act 1972 and for other purposes.
- 41 MR LEIGH To move, That this House condemns the Leader of the Opposition Mr J Brumby and Members of the Opposition for their failure to disassociate themselves from the activities of the Member for Clayton in his failure to repay in adequate time monies that he owed the Ministry of Education.
- DR COGHILL To move, That this House expresses the opinion that there is prima facie evidence of a contempt of the Parliament by the Honourable the Leader of the House in that he failed to make available for inspection all correspondence and other documents created since 26 October 1992, relating to any aspect of the review or reform of the structure, functioning, Standing Orders, procedures, practices or administration of the Legislative Assembly, the Legislative Council or the Parliament in any other respect including the rights and entitlements of Members received by him or sent by him or on his authority to the Speaker of the Legislative Assembly and the President of the Legislative Council either individually or jointly or any Officer or Officers of the Parliament, and all documents held by him relating to meetings, telephone conversations or other forms of communication or discussion in respect of the above matters in which he participated or which were held on his authority in response to Question No. 8 and that the matter be referred to the Privileges Committee for inquiry and report.
- 43 MR THOMSON (Pascoe Vale) To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Community Services for his action in cutting funding to the Dr Stanley Cochrane Pre-school in Mitcham, which has placed a heavy financial burden on many parents whose pre-school fees have risen from \$180 per year to \$480 per year.

- MR MICALLEF To move, That this House condemns the State Government for its continued failure to adequately secure the former Joseph Banks Secondary College site at Doveton, showing a disregard for the safety of local residents, allowing them to walk unhindered into an asbestos contaminated area and leaving a damage bill estimated at over \$60,000 some of which is to facilities which are to be retained by the community.
- 45 MR HAERMEYER To move, That this House notes with concern that as a result of Government policies fees at the Mordialloc Kindergarten have increased from \$50 per term in 1993 to \$110 per term in 1994, with parents expected to pay an additional \$30 levy for excursions, and consequently, enrolments at this kindergarten have decreased from 50 in 1993 to 30 in 1994 and this House urges the Minister to implement policies to ensure affordable and quality pre-schools are available to all families in the Mordialloc area.
- MS GARBUTT To move, That this House notes with concern that on average preschool fees on the Mornington Peninsular have doubled this year from \$49 to \$99 and further evidence suggests that at least 44 children have been excluded this year because parents cannot pay fees, 15 children have moved to day care as they can obtain fee relief, 20 children are on waiting lists due to reduced sessions and groups lost
- 47 MS GARBUTT To move, That this House expresses its concerns at the failure of the Minister for Community Services to guarantee that all families living in Blackburn are able to afford to have their children attend pre-school, including those 15% of children who have not enrolled this year due to massive increase of 140% in preschool fees at Blackburn North Pre-school.
- 48 MS MARPLE To move, That this House notes with concern the failure of the State Government to require an environmental effects statement for the proposed redevelopment of the Crib Point Oil Facility despite the companies involved indicating that works will not proceed during 1994.
- 49 MRS WILSON To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Fair Trading for her Government's actions in eroding the resources available to consumers for information and protection, through the closure of the regional offices of the Office of Fair Trading in Ringwood and Dandenong, thus making it difficult for people living in the outer suburbs to access these services.
- 50 MR SEITZ To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Community Services for Government policies which have lead to an increase of kindergarten fees at Indra Pre-school in Blackburn South from \$180 to \$500 a year, resulting in severe hardships being endured by families of Pre-school children in the Blackburn area.
- MR HAMILTON To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Public Transport for the appalling level of service for commuters travelling to Bairnsdale via Sale, since the abolition of the Rail Service between Bairnsdale and Sale, including the lack of shelter and passenger amenities at Bairnsdale and inconvenience caused by long delays in bus and train connections.

- MR ANDRIANOPOULOS To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Public Transport for the premature introduction of driver only trains on the Alamein line, which because of 'blind spots' created by the design of station platforms along this line, has resulted in passengers being placed in great danger when boarding and alighting from trains, due to the inability of drivers to clearly see whether passengers are clear of the train before departing.
- 53 MR THOMSON (Pascoe Vale) To move, That this House condemns the Government for its massive increases in class sizes at Antonio Park Primary School which have led to a reduced quality of education at that school.
- MR DOLLIS To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Planning for his intervention in the Knox Council decision regarding a proposed Fast Food Restaurant in Rowville as yet another example of this Government's overriding of Local Government Planning Schemes and decisions, thereby undermining the role of Local Government and showing complete disregard for the rights and wishes of Knox residents.
- 55 MR HAERMEYER To move, That this House condemns the Minister for School Education for Government Education Policies which have lead to massive increases in class sizes at Antonio Park Primary School whilst teaching staff numbers have been significantly reduced, resulting in dislocation of students and the inability of staff to provide the optimum level of quality education that Antonio Park Primary students so richly deserve.
- 56 MS MARPLE To move, That the House condemns the Minister for Community Services for his failure to provide an affordable pre-school at Croydon Central where due to the Minister's policies there has been a massive 88% increase in fees from \$160 in 1993 to \$300 in 1994.
- 57 MR SHEEHAN To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Education who, with the support of the Member for Mordialloc, has implemented policies which have resulted in the loss of 20 teaching positions from schools in the Mordialloc Electorate, while enrolments have increased by in excess of 60.
- 58 MR MILDENHALL To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Youth Affairs for cutting funding to the Nunawading Youth Adult Bureau by \$16,000, resulting in reduced outreach services to youth in the Nunawading area at a time when charitable organisations in Nunawading are experiencing a 100% increase in demand for their services, and youth unemployment remains at disastrously high levels.
- 59 MR SERCOMBE To move, That this House condemns the Government for its education policies which have denied children in Monbulk a quality education due to massive increases in class sizes at the Monbulk Primary School.
- 60 MS GARBUTT To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Community Services for Government policies that have led to a 88% increase in fees from \$45 to \$115 per term at the Greenhills Pre-school, resulting in severe financial hardship for many parents with pre-school children in the Greensborough and Eltham communities.

- 61 MR ANDRIANOPOULOS To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Education for failing to provide quality education to students at Bendigo Senior Secondary College due directly to government policies that have resulted in stopping the construction of a library and new classrooms at the school.
- 62 MRS WILSON To move, That this House notes with concern that the Minister for Education has failed to ensure a quality education for children at Cranbourne West Primary School, due to massive increases in class sizes at this school.
- 63 MR PANDAZOPOULOS To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Education for denying children at the Cranbourne South Primary School a quality education due to massive increases in class sizes at the school.
- \*64 DR COGHILL To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Employment and Industry for failing to introduce a job creation scheme for people in the Bendigo area as promised before the election where the Bendigo District share of Jobs created under the said scheme would be over 800, such jobs providing a much needed stimulus to the Bendigo economy at a time when 8,444 people were receiving unemployment benefits from Social Security offices in Bendigo and Kangaroo Flat in February, 1994 being 14.73% more than in February, 1993.
- \*65 MR HAMILTON To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Youth Affairs for cutting totally funding to the Barwon Youth Information Service which has resulted in less information reaching young people in the Barwon area who are in desperate need of advice and support.
- \*66 MR MILDENHALL To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Community Services for his action in cutting funding to the Gisborne Kindergarten, which has placed a heavy financial burden on many parents in the Gisborne area whose pre-school fees have risen by \$450 per child.
- \*67 MR PANDAZOPOULOS To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Community Services for Government policies that have cut funding to the Ontos Pre-school, which has lead to an increase in fees from \$30 per term to \$130 per term, resulting in severe hardship being endured by families for pre-school children in the Buchan Community.
- \*68 MS GARBUTT To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Community Services for his failure to provide an affordable pre-school at Mordialloc where due to the Minister's policies there has been a massive 100% increase in fees at the Elenora Pre-school causing extreme financial hardship for parents of pre-school children in the Mordialloc area.

- 41 MR LEIGH To move, That this House condemns the Leader of the Opposition Mr J Brumby and Members of the Opposition for their failure to disassociate themselves from the activities of the Member for Clayton in his failure to repay in adequate time monies that he owed the Ministry of Education.
- DR COGHILL To move, That this House expresses the opinion that there is prima facie evidence of a contempt of the Parliament by the Honourable the Leader of the House in that he failed to make available for inspection all correspondence and other documents created since 26 October 1992, relating to any aspect of the review or reform of the structure, functioning, Standing Orders, procedures, practices or administration of the Legislative Assembly, the Legislative Council or the Parliament in any other respect including the rights and entitlements of Members received by him or sent by him or on his authority to the Speaker of the Legislative Assembly and the President of the Legislative Council either individually or jointly or any Officer or Officers of the Parliament, and all documents held by him relating to meetings, telephone conversations or other forms of communication or discussion in respect of the above matters in which he participated or which were held on his authority in response to Question No. 8 and that the matter be referred to the Privileges Committee for inquiry and report.
- 43 MR THOMSON (Pascoe Vale) To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Community Services for his action in cutting funding to the Dr Stanley Cochrane Pre-school in Mitcham, which has placed a heavy financial burden on many parents whose pre-school fees have risen from \$180 per year to \$480 per year.
- 44 MR MICALLEF To move, That this House condemns the State Government for its continued failure to adequately secure the former Joseph Banks Secondary College site at Doveton, showing a disregard for the safety of local residents, allowing them to walk unhindered into an asbestos contaminated area and leaving a damage bill estimated at over \$60,000 some of which is to facilities which are to be retained by the community.
- MR HAERMEYER To move, That this House notes with concern that as a result of Government policies fees at the Mordialloc Kindergarten have increased from \$50 per term in 1993 to \$110 per term in 1994, with parents expected to pay an additional \$30 levy for excursions, and consequently, enrolments at this kindergarten have decreased from 50 in 1993 to 30 in 1994 and this House urges the Minister to implement policies to ensure affordable and quality pre-schools are available to all families in the Mordialloc area.

- DR COGHILL To move, That the House condemns the Leader of the House, the Honourable Phillip Gude, MLA, for his - (a) support for budgetary provisions adversely affecting the effective operation of the Parliament including its Committees whilst enabling the restoration of extravagant and luxurious levels of Dining Room service available exclusively to Members; (b) support for provisions of the Parliamentary Committees (Amendment) Bill which were incompatible with basic principles of parliamentary government and the Westminster system; (c) support for the destruction of the time-honoured bi-partisan approach to parliamentary committees including the cessation of the practice of chairmanship being shared between Government and Opposition with all Chairmen now being Members of the senior party in the Coalition, the Liberal Party; (d) support for provisions of the Parliamentary Salaries and Superannuation (Further Amendment) Bill as introduced which undermined the recognition by the Parliament of the authority and status of the Speaker of the Legislative Assembly and the President of the Legislative Council and which made unjustified increases to the remuneration of many members of the Government Party including himself; (e) proposing and supporting motions for periods of adjournment of debate that have denied Members reasonable time in which to consider matters before the House and that have denied people affected by or otherwise interested in such matters reasonable time in which to consider and comment on their implications; (f) proposing and supporting motions that bills be declared urgent and periods for debate of them limited with the effect of denying Members reasonable time in which to debate them; (g) imposition and support of sitting hours in October and November 1992 that were beyond those which could reasonably be expected to allow Members, staff and others associated with the functioning and reporting of the Parliament to carry out their responsibilities effectively and efficiently and that therefore militated against proper functioning and good decision-making; (h) failing to advise and consult Members and the Parliamentary parties on forthcoming legislation, arrangements for debates and other aspects of the parliamentary program in accordance with long-standing tradition and practice in the Parliament of Victoria and comparable parliaments; and (i) failing to provide leadership to Members including the Government in the observance and furtherance of acceptable standards of parliamentary conduct and practice.
- 9 MR COLE To move, That he have leave to bring in a Bill to facilitate the efficient case management of complex fraud trials, to amend certain Rules of Evidence, to amend the Evidence Act 1958, the Judicial Proceedings Reports Act 1958 and the Bail Act 1977 and for other purposes.
- MS GARBUTT To move, That she have leave to bring in a Bill to make it compulsory for certain persons to notify the Secretary of the Department of Health and Community Services of any child they believe is in need of protection, as soon as practicable after forming such a belief, to amend certain Acts and for other purposes.

- 11 DR VAUGHAN To move, That the Law Reform Committee inquire into, consider and report on the former Law Reform Commission references which were (a) incomplete and not reported to the Attorney-General; or (b) which had been reported to the Attorney-General but not tabled in the Parliament.
- 12 MR BAKER To move, That this House condemns the Government for policy settings that have transferred the burden of taxation away from wealth and production towards consumption and families.
- 13 MR ROPER To move, That each body constituted under the Ambulance Services Act 1986 including the Victorian Ambulance Board, Ambulance Officers' Training Centre, Ambulance Service Victoria Metropolitan Region, Ambulance Service Victoria North Eastern Region, Ambulance Service Victoria North Western Region, Ambulance Service Victoria South Eastern Region, Ambulance Service Victoria Western Region, be referred to the Public Bodies Review Committee for review.
- 14 MS GARBUTT To move, That this House condemns the Government for its failure to continue the process of deinstitutionalisation of intellectually disabled people, through the closure of antiquated institutions and the provision of additional housing and support services in the community.
- 15 MR LEIGHTON To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Small Business for his failure to assist small business as demonstrated by his scrapping of the Small Business Development Corporation despite his election promise to retain it and his defunding of the Local Enterprise Development Initiative Program.
- 16 DR COGHILL To move, That this House condemns the Leader of the House, the Honourable Phillip Gude, MLA, for proposing and supporting motions having the effect of reducing the opportunities for Members to speak during the Autumn Sittings 1993 on the question "That grievances be noted" from a total of 16 hours being four hours on each of four days as provided for under Standing Order No. 59 to a total of less than six hours being less than three hours on each of two days.
- 17 MR MAUGHAN To move, That this House condemns the Opposition for its failure while in Government to properly address the problems of social injustices.
- 18 MR MAUGHAN To move, That this House commends the Government for its commitment to assisting children with disabilities.
- 19 MRS ELLIOTT To move, That this House commends the Government for its commitment to assisting families in need.
- 20 MRS ELLIOTT To move, That this House commends the Government for its commitment to improving foster care programmes.
- 21 MR COOPER To move, That this House congratulates the Government on its initiatives to support and reform local government.
- 22 MR ROPER To move, That the use of electronic displays to assist in the delivery of debate be referred to the Standing Orders Committee for examination and report.

- DR COGHILL To move, That this House censures Mr Speaker for not allowing the Member for Werribee to complete the explanation of his point of order on Tuesday, 6 April 1993 relating to the admissibility of the notice of motion of the Minister for Industry and Employment relating to the suspension of Standing and Sessional Orders to permit the Minister for Finance to address Members of both Houses without allowing any opportunity for debate on the address and dissents from the ruling of Mr Speaker on the point of order.
- DR COGHILL To move, That this House condemns the Leader of the House for moving and supporting a motion having the effect of (a) providing for an unprecedented form of address by the Minister for Finance on Wednesday, 7 April 1993 rather than relying on the established customary practice of a Ministerial statement; (b) denying any other Member any opportunity to speak on the address; (c) denying the House any opportunity to debate or otherwise deal with the address; and (d) further eroding the essential privileges immunities and powers of Members and the House as defined by the Constitution Act 1975.
- 25 MR LEIGH To move, That this House condemns the Speaker of the Fifty-first Parliament, Dr K. Coghill, the Member for Werribee, for his (a) inability to act impartially and protect the rights of all Members of the House; and (b) failure to control the House and for the protection he gave to the Kirner Government and its members.
- 26 MR ROPER To move, That this House condemns the Leader of the House for his action in moving to expel the Honourable Member for Springvale without seeking the apology of the named Member.
- MS MARPLE To move, That this House (a) calls on the Government to refer the status of the Chiltern Regional Park to the Land Conservation Council to be urgently reviewed in light of the importance of the remnant box and ironbark forest; and (b) revokes the consent to mineral exploration in Chiltern Park by CRA Exploration Pty Limited given by the Minister for Conservation and Environment, notice of which was tabled in this House on 16 March 1993 pursuant to section 40(5) of the National Parks Act 1975, so that there can be a moratorium on exploration while the Land Conservation Council considers the status of the Chiltern Regional Park.

- 12 That evidence taken before the previous Parliament of Victoria Committee shall be considered by the Committee as if that evidence had been given before and for the information and guidance of the Committee.
- 13 That the foregoing provisions of this resolution so far as they are inconsistent with the Standing Orders and practices of the Houses shall have effect notwithstanding anything contained in those Standing Orders.

## 32 DR COGHILL - To move -

- 1 That a Joint Select Committee be appointed to enquire into and report upon the operation of the parliamentary committee system and in particular to report on provision by statute for its monitoring and review of all portfolios and for bi-partisan functioning.
- 2 That the Committee shall consist of eight Members, four members nominated by the Premier of whom two must be Members of the Assembly and one must be a Member of the Council and four Members nominated by the Leader of the Opposition of whom two must be Members of the Assembly and one must a Member of the Council. - 7 That the Committee may send for persons, papers and records and report from time to time.
- 8 That the Committee shall, unless it otherwise resolves, take all evidence in public.
- 9 That the Committee shall keep a record of all evidence given before it and determinations made by it.
- 10 That the Committee have power to authorize publication of any evidence given before it in public and any document presented to it.
- 11 That as soon as practicable after the completion of each day's proceedings a transcript of the evidence taken in public by the Committee shall be published.
- 12 That the foregoing provisions of this resolution so far as they are inconsistent with the Standing Orders and practices of the Houses shall have effect notwithstanding anything contained in those Standing Orders.
- 33 DR COGHILL To move, That this House dissents from the actions of Mr Speaker in disallowing the use of lap top computers in the Chamber by Members and expresses the opinion that their use is acceptable subject to conditions similar to those applying in the other place.
- MR SERCOMBE To move, That this House condemns the Premier and the Speaker for undermining the independence, integrity and respect for the Office of Speaker by their actions in delaying a decision on the date of the Broadmeadows By-election until immediately after the Premier's deliberately belated response to the Speaker's invitation to comment on the matter and the selection of the last practical date as preferred by the Premier for purely partisan political advantage contrary to the fundamental principle that the Speaker makes decisions on a non-partisan basis and the custom and practice of choosing the earliest practical dates for by-elections so as to minimise the period for which electors are unrepresented.

- 35 MR ROPER To move, That this House dissents from the ruling of Mr Speaker that the Adjournment Motion moved by the Member for Sunshine on the Government's Industry Statement was out of order on the grounds that the Statement was not a new matter and points out to Mr Speaker that the Government itself claimed that the Statement "signalled a second phase in the State Government's commitment to industry" and the Premier claimed it as "another Agenda 21 initiative" and regrets that the ruling prevented debate on the Statement and its significant shortcomings.
- 36 MR SANDON To move, That he have leave to bring in a Bill to amend the Education Act 1958 to provide for the establishment of School Closures Review Committees, to allow for public consultation in the closure of Government Schools and for other purposes.
- 37 MR DOLLIS To move, That he have leave to bring in a Bill to amend the *Building Control Act* 1981 and for other purposes.
- 38 MR ROPER To move, That this House dissents from the ruling of Mr Speaker that the Premier did not have to answer questions by the Leader of the Opposition on the statement regarding the use of public resources made as Premier on the Neil Mitchell Program on 3AW on 29 October 1993.
- 39 MR LEIGH To move, That this House condemns the Member for Clayton for (a) his failure to repay to the State of Victoria within due time \$7595.41 advanced to the Member from the Education Ministry after his entering a studentship agreement; and (b) his offers to repay \$20 per month over a period of 18 years in spite of letters from the Victorian Government Solicitor threatening legal action unless he complied with arrangements which are contained in the studentship agreement that he entered into; despite the fact that during his time as a MLA for Glenhuntly and Clayton he received salary and electoral allowances of almost \$1.5 M. and this House further requests the Member to explain to the people why he failed to honour arrangements that were entered into by the Member in the studentship agreement which he made and which was honoured by the State of Victoria but not honoured by the Member for Clayton.
- 40 MR ROPER To move, That he have leave to bring in a Bill to amend the *Dental Technicians Act* 1972 and for other purposes.
- 41 MR LEIGH To move, That this House condemns the Leader of the Opposition Mr J Brumby and Members of the Opposition for their failure to disassociate themselves from the activities of the Member for Clayton in his failure to repay in adequate time monies that he owed the Ministry of Education.
- 42 DR COGHILL To move, That this House expresses the opinion that there is prima facie evidence of a contempt of the Parliament by the Honourable the Leader of the House in that he failed to make available for inspection all correspondence and other documents created since 26 October 1992, relating to any aspect of the review or reform of the structure, functioning, Standing Orders, procedures, practices or administration of the Legislative Assembly, the Legislative Council or the Parliament in any other respect including the rights and entitlements of Members received by him or sent by him or on his authority to the Speaker of the Legislative Assembly and the President of the Legislative Council either individually or jointly or any Officer or Officers of the Parliament, and all documents held by him relating to meetings, telephone conversations or other forms of communication or

- discussion in respect of the above matters in which he participated or which were held on his authority in response to Question No. 8 and that the matter be referred to the Privileges Committee for inquiry and report.
- 43 MR THOMSON (Pascoe Vale) To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Community Services for his action in cutting funding to the Dr Stanley Cochrane Pre-school in Mitcham, which has placed a heavy financial burden on many parents whose pre-school fees have risen from \$180 per year to \$480 per year.
- 44 MR MICALLEF To move, That this House condemns the State Government for its continued failure to adequately secure the former Joseph Banks Secondary College site at Doveton, showing a disregard for the safety of local residents, allowing them to walk unhindered into an asbestos contaminated area and leaving a damage bill estimated at over \$60,000 some of which is to facilities which are to be retained by the community.
- 45 MR HAERMEYER To move, That this House notes with concern that as a result of Government policies fees at the Mordialloc Kindergarten have increased from \$50 per term in 1993 to \$110 per term in 1994, with parents expected to pay an additional \$30 levy for excursions, and consequently, enrolments at this kindergarten have decreased from 50 in 1993 to 30 in 1994 and this House urges the Minister to implement policies to ensure affordable and quality pre-schools are available to all families in the Mordialloc area.
- MS GARBUTT To move, That this House notes with concern that on average preschool fees on the Mornington Peninsular have doubled this year from \$49 to \$99 and further evidence suggests that at least 44 children have been excluded this year because parents cannot pay fees, 15 children have moved to day care as they can obtain fee relief, 20 children are on waiting lists due to reduced sessions and groups lost.
- 47 MS GARBUTT To move, That this House expresses its concerns at the failure of the Minister for Community Services to guarantee that all families living in Blackburn are able to afford to have their children attend pre-school, including those 15% of children who have not enrolled this year due to massive increase of 140% in preschool fees at Blackburn North Pre-school.
- 48 MS MARPLE To move, That this House notes with concern the failure of the State Government to require an environmental effects statement for the proposed redevelopment of the Crib Point Oil Facility despite the companies involved indicating that works will not proceed during 1994.
- 49 MRS WILSON To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Fair Trading for her Government's actions in eroding the resources available to consumers for information and protection, through the closure of the regional offices of the Office of Fair Trading in Ringwood and Dandenong, thus making it difficult for people living in the outer suburbs to access these services.
- 50 MR SEITZ To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Community Services for Government policies which have lead to an increase of kindergarten fees at Indra Pre-school in Blackburn South from \$180 to \$500 a year, resulting in severe hardships being endured by families of Pre-school children in the Blackburn area.

- 51 MR HAMILTON To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Public Transport for the appalling level of service for commuters travelling to Bairnsdale via Sale, since the abolition of the Rail Service between Bairnsdale and Sale, including the lack of shelter and passenger amenities at Bairnsdale and inconvenience caused by long delays in bus and train connections.
- 52 MR ANDRIANOPOULOS To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Public Transport for the premature introduction of driver only trains on the Alamein line, which because of 'blind spots' created by the design of station platforms along this line, has resulted in passengers being placed in great danger when boarding and alighting from trains, due to the inability of drivers to clearly see whether passengers are clear of the train before departing.
- 53 MR THOMSON (Pascoe Vale) To move, That this House condemns the Government for its massive increases in class sizes at Antonio Park Primary School which have led to a reduced quality of education at that school.
- MR DOLLIS To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Planning for his intervention in the Knox Council decision regarding a proposed Fast Food Restaurant in Rowville as yet another example of this Government's overriding of Local Government Planning Schemes and decisions, thereby undermining the role of Local Government and showing complete disregard for the rights and wishes of Knox residents.
- MR HAERMEYER To move, That this House condemns the Minister for School Education for Government Education Policies which have lead to massive increases in class sizes at Antonio Park Primary School whilst teaching staff numbers have been significantly reduced, resulting in dislocation of students and the inability of staff to provide the optimum level of quality education that Antonio Park Primary students so richly deserve.
- 56 MS MARPLE To move, That the House condemns the Minister for Community Services for his failure to provide an affordable pre-school at Croydon Central where due to the Minister's policies there has been a massive 88% increase in fees from \$160 in 1993 to \$300 in 1994.
- 57 MR SHEEHAN To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Education who, with the support of the Member for Mordialloc, has implemented policies which have resulted in the loss of 20 teaching positions from schools in the Mordialloc Electorate, while enrolments have increased by in excess of 60.
- MR MILDENHALL To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Youth Affairs for cutting funding to the Nunawading Youth Adult Bureau by \$16,000, resulting in reduced outreach services to youth in the Nunawading area at a time when charitable organisations in Nunawading are experiencing a 100% increase in demand for their services, and youth unemployment remains at disastrously high levels.
- \*59 MR SERCOMBE To move, That this House condemns the Government for its education policies which have reduced the quality of education for children in the Monbulk electorate.

- 60 MS GARBUTT To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Community Services for Government policies that have led to a 88% increase in fees from \$45 to \$115 per term at the Greenhills Pre-school, resulting in severe financial hardship for many parents with pre-school children in the Greensborough and Eltham communities.
- 61 MR ANDRIANOPOULOS To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Education for failing to provide quality education to students at Bendigo Senior Secondary College due directly to government policies that have resulted in stopping the construction of a library and new classrooms at the school.
- 62 MRS WILSON To move, That this House notes with concern that the Minister for Education has failed to ensure a quality education for children at Cranbourne West Primary School, due to massive increases in class sizes at this school.
- 63 MR PANDAZOPOULOS To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Education for denying children at the Cranbourne South Primary School a quality education due to massive increases in class sizes at the school.
- DR COGHILL To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Employment and Industry for failing to introduce a job creation scheme for people in the Bendigo area as promised before the election where the Bendigo District share of Jobs created under the said scheme would be over 800, such jobs providing a much needed stimulus to the Bendigo economy at a time when 8,444 people were receiving unemployment benefits from Social Security offices in Bendigo and Kangaroo Flat in February, 1994 being 14.73% more than in February, 1993.
- 65 MR HAMILTON To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Youth Affairs for cutting totally funding to the Barwon Youth Information Service which has resulted in less information reaching young people in the Barwon area who are in desperate need of advice and support.
- 66 MR MILDENHALL To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Community Services for his action in cutting funding to the Gisborne Kindergarten, which has placed a heavy financial burden on many parents in the Gisborne area whose pre-school fees have risen by \$450 per child.
- 67 MR PANDAZOPOULOS To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Community Services for Government policies that have cut funding to the Ontos Pre-school, which has lead to an increase in fees from \$30 per term to \$130 per term, resulting in severe hardship being endured by families for pre-school children in the Buchan Community.
- 68 MS GARBUTT To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Community Services for his failure to provide an affordable pre-school at Mordialloc where due to the Minister's policies there has been a massive 100% increase in fees at the Elenora Pre-school causing extreme financial hardship for parents of pre-school children in the Mordialloc area.
- 69 MS MARPLE To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Community Services for his actions in cutting funding to kindergartens in Bendigo which has placed an extra financial burden on parents whose fees have doubled at the Bendigo Kindergarten in 1994.

- 70 MR BATCHELOR To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Public Transport for his failure to provide an adequate frequency of tram services from the City to West Preston and Mont Albert which has resulted in long delays for customers, as evidenced by patrons on Victoria Parade waiting up to 17 minutes for trams to the City on the Mont Albert route during the morning peak-hour on Thursday 17 March and Friday 18 March, 1994.
- 71 MR PANDAZOPOULOS To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Public Transport for failing to ensure that services operated by the National Bus Company on route No. 256 between the City and La Trobe University run on time, as evidenced by delays of more than an hour between services on the afternoon of Thursday March 17, 1994.
- 72 MS GARBUTT To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Health for her failure to ensure that all mothers and babies in Bayswater are guaranteed a minimum of 5 days in maternity care if they need it following the birth of a child.
- 73 MR ANDRIANOPOULOS To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Education for his failure to provide a second Government school V.C.E. facility in Bendigo despite a pre-election promise of the Government to have a second V.C.E. facility "for the start of 1993" and his subsequent failure to have the said facility operational at the commencement of the 1994 school year.
- 74 MR SANDON To move, That this House condemns the Government for its failure to ensure all children at the Le Page School in Cheltenham are guaranteed a quality education due to massive increases in class sizes at the school.
- 75 MR MILDENHALL To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Community Services for ordering closed the only two reception facilities for emergency child abuse cases in the Western Suburbs, namely Buckland House and St Joseph's, in the face of his department's figures showing a 159% increase in child abuse notifications since the introduction of mandatory reporting.
- \*76 MR THOMSON (Pascoe Vale) To move, That this House censures Mr Speaker for his failure to allow the Member for Sunshine and other Honourable Members to raise matters on the Adjournment Debate on Thursday 24 March 1994, in breach of the entitlements of Honourable Members provided for by the Sessional Orders.
- \*77 MR COOPER To move, That this House censures the Honourable Member for Bundoora for attempting to use the abuse and death of Daniel Valerio to score cheap political points, and calls on the Honourable Member for Bundoora to apologise to this House, the family of Daniel Valerio and the Victorian Community for her inconsiderate and insensitive behaviour.
- \*78 MR BATCHELOR To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Public Transport for reducing the size of the Bendigo Railway Workshops workforce from 270 in October, 1992 to under 180 causing job positions to be lost in Bendigo, notwithstanding pre-election comments by representatives of the current Government that the workforce would increase.
- \*79 MR THWAITES To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Health for Government policies that have put mothers and babies in Boronia at risk due to their early release from hospital following childbirth.

- \*80 MR MICALLEF To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Public Transport for his failure to ensure residents in Carrum Downs have access to adequate public transport in order to travel to their municipal base in Cranbourne.
- \*81 MR MILDENHALL To move, That this House condemns the State Government for its failure to recognise the concerns of residents in Merinda Park regarding the Government's proposal for a Merinda Park Railway Station.

- DR COGHILL To move, That this House condemns the Leader of the House for moving and supporting a motion having the effect of (a) providing for an unprecedented form of address by the Minister for Finance on Wednesday, 7 April 1993 rather than relying on the established customary practice of a Ministerial statement; (b) denying any other Member any opportunity to speak on the address; (c) denying the House any opportunity to debate or otherwise deal with the address; and (d) further eroding the essential privileges immunities and powers of Members and the House as defined by the Constitution Act 1975.

- 24 MR LEIGH To move, That this House condemns the Speaker of the Fifty-first Parliament, Dr K. Coghill, the Member for Werribee, for his (a) inability to act impartially and protect the rights of all Members of the House; and (b) failure to control the House and for the protection he gave to the Kirner Government and its members.
- 25 MR ROPER To move, That this House condemns the Leader of the House for his action in moving to expel the Honourable Member for Springvale without seeking the apology of the named Member.
- MS MARPLE To move, That this House (a) calls on the Government to refer the status of the Chiltern Regional Park to the Land Conservation Council to be urgently reviewed in light of the importance of the remnant box and ironbark forest; and (b) revokes the consent to mineral exploration in Chiltern Park by CRA Exploration Pty Limited given by the Minister for Conservation and Environment, notice of which was tabled in this House on 16 March 1993 pursuant to section 40(5) of the National Parks Act 1975, so that there can be a moratorium on exploration while the Land Conservation Council considers the status of the Chiltern Regional Park.

- 33 MR SERCOMBE To move, That this House condemns the Premier and the Speaker for undermining the independence, integrity and respect for the Office of Speaker by their actions in delaying a decision on the date of the Broadmeadows By-election until immediately after the Premier's deliberately belated response to the Speaker's invitation to comment on the matter and the selection of the last practical date as preferred by the Premier for purely partisan political advantage contrary to the fundamental principle that the Speaker makes decisions on a non-partisan basis and the custom and practice of choosing the earliest practical dates for by-elections so as to minimise the period for which electors are unrepresented.

- 37 MR ROPER To move, That this House dissents from the ruling of Mr Speaker that the Premier did not have to answer questions by the Leader of the Opposition on the statement regarding the use of public resources made as Premier on the Neil Mitchell Program on 3AW on 29 October 1993.

- 38 MR LEIGH To move, That this House condemns the Member for Clayton for (a) his failure to repay to the State of Victoria within due time \$7595.41 advanced to the Member from the Education Ministry after his entering a studentship agreement; and (b) his offers to repay \$20 per month over a period of 18 years in spite of letters from the Victorian Government Solicitor threatening legal action unless he complied with arrangements which are contained in the studentship agreement that he entered into; despite the fact that during his time as a MLA for Glenhuntly and Clayton he received salary and electoral allowances of almost \$1.5 M. and this House further requests the Member to explain to the people why he failed to honour arrangements that were entered into by the Member in the studentship agreement which he made and which was honoured by the State of Victoria but not honoured by the Member for Clayton.
- 39 MR ROPER To move, That he have leave to bring in a Bill to amend the Dental Technicians Act 1972 and for other purposes.
- 40 MR LEIGH To move, That this House condemns the Leader of the Opposition Mr J Brumby and Members of the Opposition for their failure to disassociate themselves from the activities of the Member for Clayton in his failure to repay in adequate time monies that he owed the Ministry of Education.
- DR COGHILL To move, That this House expresses the opinion that there is prima facie evidence of a contempt of the Parliament by the Honourable the Leader of the House in that he failed to make available for inspection all correspondence and other documents created since 26 October 1992, relating to any aspect of the review or reform of the structure, functioning, Standing Orders, procedures, practices or administration of the Legislative Assembly, the Legislative Council or the Parliament in any other respect including the rights and entitlements of Members received by him or sent by him or on his authority to the Speaker of the Legislative Assembly and the President of the Legislative Council either individually or jointly or any Officer or Officers of the Parliament, and all documents held by him relating to meetings, telephone conversations or other forms of communication or discussion in respect of the above matters in which he participated or which were held on his authority in response to Question No. 8 and that the matter be referred to the Privileges Committee for inquiry and report.

- 43 MR MICALLEF To move, That this House condemns the State Government for its continued failure to adequately secure the former Joseph Banks Secondary College site at Doveton, showing a disregard for the safety of local residents, allowing them to walk unhindered into an asbestos contaminated area and leaving a damage bill estimated at over \$60,000 some of which is to facilities which are to be retained by the community.

- MR HAERMEYER To move, That this House notes with concern that as a result of Government policies fees at the Mordialloc Kindergarten have increased from \$50 per term in 1993 to \$110 per term in 1994, with parents expected to pay an additional \$30 levy for excursions, and consequently, enrolments at this kindergarten have decreased from 50 in 1993 to 30 in 1994 and this House urges the Minister to implement policies to ensure affordable and quality pre-schools are available to all families in the Mordialloc area.
- MS GARBUTT To move, That this House notes with concern that on average preschool fees on the Mornington Peninsular have doubled this year from \$49 to \$99 and further evidence suggests that at least 44 children have been excluded this year because parents cannot pay fees, 15 children have moved to day care as they can obtain fee relief, 20 children are on waiting lists due to reduced sessions and groups lost.
- 46 MS GARBUTT To move, That this House expresses its concerns at the failure of the Minister for Community Services to guarantee that all families living in Blackburn are able to afford to have their children attend pre-school, including those 15% of children who have not enrolled this year due to massive increase of 140% in preschool fees at Blackburn North Pre-school.
- 47 MS MARPLE To move, That this House notes with concern the failure of the State Government to require an environmental effects statement for the proposed redevelopment of the Crib Point Oil Facility despite the companies involved indicating that works will not proceed during 1994.
- 48 MRS WILSON To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Fair Trading for her Government's actions in eroding the resources available to consumers for information and protection, through the closure of the regional offices of the Office of Fair Trading in Ringwood and Dandenong, thus making it difficult for people living in the outer suburbs to access these services.
- 49 MR SEITZ To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Community Services for Government policies which have lead to an increase of kindergarten fees at Indra Pre-school in Blackburn South from \$180 to \$500 a year, resulting in severe hardships being endured by families of Pre-school children in the Blackburn area.
- 50 MR HAMILTON To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Public Transport for the appalling level of service for commuters travelling to Bairnsdale via Sale, since the abolition of the Rail Service between Bairnsdale and Sale, including the lack of shelter and passenger amenities at Bairnsdale and inconvenience caused by long delays in bus and train connections.
- MR ANDRIANOPOULOS To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Public Transport for the premature introduction of driver only trains on the Alamein line, which because of 'blind spots' created by the design of station platforms along this line, has resulted in passengers being placed in great danger when boarding and alighting from trains, due to the inability of drivers to clearly see whether passengers are clear of the train before departing.
- 52 MR THOMSON (Pascoe Vale) To move, That this House condemns the Government for its massive increases in class sizes at Antonio Park Primary School which have led to a reduced quality of education at that school.

- 53 MR DOLLIS To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Planning for his intervention in the Knox Council decision regarding a proposed Fast Food Restaurant in Rowville as yet another example of this Government's overriding of Local Government Planning Schemes and decisions, thereby undermining the role of Local Government and showing complete disregard for the rights and wishes of Knox residents.
- 54 MR HAERMEYER To move, That this House condemns the Minister for School Education for Government Education Policies which have lead to massive increases in class sizes at Antonio Park Primary School whilst teaching staff numbers have been significantly reduced, resulting in dislocation of students and the inability of staff to provide the optimum level of quality education that Antonio Park Primary students so richly deserve.
- 55 MS MARPLE To move, That the House condemns the Minister for Community Services for his failure to provide an affordable pre-school at Croydon Central where due to the Minister's policies there has been a massive 88% increase in fees from \$160 in 1993 to \$300 in 1994.
- 56 MR SHEEHAN To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Education who, with the support of the Member for Mordialloc, has implemented policies which have resulted in the loss of 20 teaching positions from schools in the Mordialloc Electorate, while enrolments have increased by in excess of 60.
- 57 MR MILDENHALL To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Youth Affairs for cutting funding to the Nunawading Youth Adult Bureau by \$16,000, resulting in reduced outreach services to youth in the Nunawading area at a time when charitable organisations in Nunawading are experiencing a 100% increase in demand for their services, and youth unemployment remains at disastrously high levels.
- 58 MR SERCOMBE To move, That this House condemns the Government for its education policies which have reduced the quality of education for children in the Monbulk electorate.
- MS GARBUTT To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Community Services for Government policies that have led to a 88% increase in fees from \$45 to \$115 per term at the Greenhills Pre-school, resulting in severe financial hardship for many parents with pre-school children in the Greensborough and Eltham communities.
- 60 MR ANDRIANOPOULOS To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Education for failing to provide quality education to students at Bendigo Senior Secondary College due directly to government policies that have resulted in stopping the construction of a library and new classrooms at the school.
- 61 MRS WILSON To move, That this House notes with concern that the Minister for Education has failed to ensure a quality education for children at Cranbourne West Primary School, due to massive increases in class sizes at this school.
- 62 MR PANDAZOPOULOS To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Education for denying children at the Cranbourne South Primary School a quality education due to massive increases in class sizes at the school.

- DR COGHILL To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Employment and Industry for failing to introduce a job creation scheme for people in the Bendigo area as promised before the election where the Bendigo District share of Jobs created under the said scheme would be over 800, such jobs providing a much needed stimulus to the Bendigo economy at a time when 8,444 people were receiving unemployment benefits from Social Security offices in Bendigo and Kangaroo Flat in February, 1994 being 14.73% more than in February, 1993.
- 64 MR HAMILTON To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Youth Affairs for cutting totally funding to the Barwon Youth Information Service which has resulted in less information reaching young people in the Barwon area who are in desperate need of advice and support.
- 65 MR MILDENHALL To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Community Services for his action in cutting funding to the Gisborne Kindergarten, which has placed a heavy financial burden on many parents in the Gisborne area whose pre-school fees have risen by \$450 per child.
- MR PANDAZOPOULOS To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Community Services for Government policies that have cut funding to the Ontos Pre-school, which has lead to an increase in fees from \$30 per term to \$130 per term, resulting in severe hardship being endured by families for pre-school children in the Buchan Community.
- 67 MS GARBUTT To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Community Services for his failure to provide an affordable pre-school at Mordialloc where due to the Minister's policies there has been a massive 100% increase in fees at the Elenora Pre-school causing extreme financial hardship for parents of pre-school children in the Mordialloc area.

- 71 MS GARBUTT To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Health for her failure to ensure that all mothers and babies in Bayswater are guaranteed a minimum of 5 days in maternity care if they need it following the birth of a child.

- MR ANDRIANOPOULOS To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Education for his failure to provide a second Government school V.C.E. facility in Bendigo despite a pre-election promise of the Government to have a second V.C.E. facility "for the start of 1993" and his subsequent failure to have the said facility operational at the commencement of the 1994 school year.

- 76 MR COOPER To move, That this House censures the Honourable Member for Bundoora for attempting to use the abuse and death of Daniel Valerio to score cheap political points, and calls on the Honourable Member for Bundoora to apologise to this House, the family of Daniel Valerio and the Victorian Community for her inconsiderate and insensitive behaviour.
- 77 MR BATCHELOR To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Public Transport for reducing the size of the Bendigo Railway Workshops workforce from 270 in October, 1992 to under 180 causing job positions to be lost in Bendigo, notwithstanding pre-election comments by representatives of the current Government that the workforce would increase.

- 9 That the Committee shall keep a record of all evidence given before it and determinations made by it.
- 10 That the Committee have power to authorize publication of any evidence given before it in public and any document presented to it.
- 11 That as soon as practicable after the completion of each day's proceedings a transcript of the evidence taken in public by the Committee shall be published.
- 12 That the foregoing provisions of this resolution so far as they are inconsistent with the Standing Orders and practices of the Houses shall have effect notwithstanding anything contained in those Standing Orders.

- 33 MR HAERMEYER To move, That this House notes with concern that as a result of Government policies fees at the Mordialloc Kindergarten have increased from \$50 per term in 1993 to \$110 per term in 1994, with parents expected to pay an additional \$30 levy for excursions, and consequently, enrolments at this kindergarten have decreased from 50 in 1993 to 30 in 1994 and this House urges the Minister to implement policies to ensure affordable and quality pre-schools are available to all families in the Mordialloc area.

- 37 MRS WILSON To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Fair Trading for her Government's actions in eroding the resources available to consumers for information and protection, through the closure of the regional offices of the Office of Fair Trading in Ringwood and Dandenong, thus making it difficult for people living in the outer suburbs to access these services.
- 38 MR SEITZ To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Community Services for Government policies which have lead to an increase of kindergarten fees at Indra Pre-school in Blackburn South from \$180 to \$500 a year, resulting in severe hardships being endured by families of Pre-school children in the Blackburn area.

- 3 MR MAUGHAN To move, That this House commends the Government for its commitment to ensuring that Victorian women and girls receive a fair allocation of the State's resources.
- 4 MR JASPER To move, That the House commends the Government on the proposed policies for tourism for the State of Victoria recognising the economic development of Victoria will be revitalised and enhanced by a vibrant, expanding tourist industry.
- MR BAKER To move, That he have leave to bring in a Bill to amend the Audit Act 1958 and certain other Acts, to require the Auditor-General to investigate and report to Parliament on the implications for the State finances and for consumers of privatisation of Government Business Enterprises prior to sale and for other purposes.
- DR COGHILL To move, That the House condemns the Leader of the House, the Honourable Phillip Gude, MLA, for his - (a) support for budgetary provisions adversely affecting the effective operation of the Parliament including its Committees whilst enabling the restoration of extravagant and luxurious levels of Dining Room service available exclusively to Members; (b) support for provisions of the Parliamentary Committees (Amendment) Bill which were incompatible with basic principles of parliamentary government and the Westminster system; (c) support for the destruction of the time-honoured bi-partisan approach to parliamentary committees including the cessation of the practice of chairmanship being shared between Government and Opposition with all Chairmen now being Members of the senior party in the Coalition, the Liberal Party; (d) support for provisions of the Parliamentary Salaries and Superannuation (Further Amendment) Bill as introduced which undermined the recognition by the Parliament of the authority and status of the Speaker of the Legislative Assembly and the President of the Legislative Council and which made unjustified increases to the remuneration of many members of the Government Party including himself; (e) proposing and supporting motions for periods of adjournment of

debate that have denied Members reasonable time in which to consider matters before the House and that have denied people affected by or otherwise interested in such matters reasonable time in which to consider and comment on their implications; (f) proposing and supporting motions that bills be declared urgent and periods for debate of them limited with the effect of denying Members reasonable time in which to debate them; (g) imposition and support of sitting hours in October and November 1992 that were beyond those which could reasonably be expected to allow Members, staff and others associated with the functioning and reporting of the Parliament to carry out their responsibilities effectively and efficiently and that therefore militated against proper functioning and good decision-making; (h) failing to advise and consult Members and the Parliamentary parties on forthcoming legislation, arrangements for debates and other aspects of the parliamentary program in accordance with long-standing tradition and practice in the Parliament of Victoria and comparable parliaments; and (i) failing to provide leadership to Members including the Government in the observance and furtherance of acceptable standards of parliamentary conduct and practice.

- 7 MR COLE To move, That he have leave to bring in a Bill to facilitate the efficient case management of complex fraud trials, to amend certain Rules of Evidence, to amend the Evidence Act 1958, the Judicial Proceedings Reports Act 1958 and the Bail Act 1977 and for other purposes.
- 8 MS GARBUTT To move, That she have leave to bring in a Bill to make it compulsory for certain persons to notify the Secretary of the Department of Health and Community Services of any child they believe is in need of protection, as soon as practicable after forming such a belief, to amend certain Acts and for other purposes.
- 9 DR VAUGHAN To move, That the Law Reform Committee inquire into, consider and report on the former Law Reform Commission references which were (a) incomplete and not reported to the Attorney-General; or (b) which had been reported to the Attorney-General but not tabled in the Parliament.
- 10 MR BAKER To move, That this House condemns the Government for policy settings that have transferred the burden of taxation away from wealth and production towards consumption and families.
- MS GARBUTT To move, That this House condemns the Government for its failure to continue the process of deinstitutionalisation of intellectually disabled people, through the closure of antiquated institutions and the provision of additional housing and support services in the community.
- 12 MR LEIGHTON To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Small Business for his failure to assist small business as demonstrated by his scrapping of the Small Business Development Corporation despite his election promise to retain it and his defunding of the Local Enterprise Development Initiative Program.

- 13 DR COGHILL To move, That this House condemns the Leader of the House, the Honourable Phillip Gude, MLA, for proposing and supporting motions having the effect of reducing the opportunities for Members to speak during the Autumn Sittings 1993 on the question "That grievances be noted" from a total of 16 hours being four hours on each of four days as provided for under Standing Order No. 59 to a total of less than six hours being less than three hours on each of two days.
- 14 MR MAUGHAN To move, That this House condemns the Opposition for its failure while in Government to properly address the problems of social injustices.
- 15 MR MAUGHAN To move, That this House commends the Government for its commitment to assisting children with disabilities.
- 16 MRS ELLIOTT To move, That this House commends the Government for its commitment to assisting families in need.
- 17 MRS ELLIOTT To move, That this House commends the Government for its commitment to improving foster care programmes.
- 18 MR COOPER To move, That this House congratulates the Government on its initiatives to support and reform local government.
- 19 DR COGHILL To move, That this House censures Mr Speaker for not allowing the Member for Werribee to complete the explanation of his point of order on Tuesday, 6 April 1993 relating to the admissibility of the notice of motion of the Minister for Industry and Employment relating to the suspension of Standing and Sessional Orders to permit the Minister for Finance to address Members of both Houses without allowing any opportunity for debate on the address and dissents from the ruling of Mr Speaker on the point of order.
- DR COGHILL To move, That this House condemns the Leader of the House for moving and supporting a motion having the effect of (a) providing for an unprecedented form of address by the Minister for Finance on Wednesday, 7 April 1993 rather than relying on the established customary practice of a Ministerial statement; (b) denying any other Member any opportunity to speak on the address; (c) denying the House any opportunity to debate or otherwise deal with the address; and (d) further eroding the essential privileges immunities and powers of Members and the House as defined by the Constitution Act 1975.
- 21 MR LEIGH To move, That this House condemns the Speaker of the Fifty-first Parliament, Dr K. Coghill, the Member for Werribee, for his (a) inability to act impartially and protect the rights of all Members of the House; and (b) failure to control the House and for the protection he gave to the Kirner Government and its members.
- MS MARPLE To move, That this House (a) calls on the Government to refer the status of the Chiltern Regional Park to the Land Conservation Council to be urgently reviewed in light of the importance of the remnant box and ironbark forest; and (b) revokes the consent to mineral exploration in Chiltern Park by CRA Exploration Pty Limited given by the Minister for Conservation and Environment, notice of which was tabled in this House on 16 March 1993 pursuant to section 40(5) of the National Parks Act 1975, so that there can be a moratorium on exploration while the Land Conservation Council considers the status of the Chiltern Regional Park.

#### 23 DR COGHILL - To move -

- 1 That a Joint Select Committee be appointed to enquire into and report upon the operation of the parliamentary committee system and in particular to report on provision by statute for its monitoring and review of all portfolios and for bi-partisan functioning.
- 2 That the Committee shall consist of eight Members, four members nominated by the Premier of whom two must be Members of the Assembly and one must be a Member of the Council and four Members nominated by the Leader of the Opposition of whom two must be Members of the Assembly and one must a Member of the Council. The appointments shall be made by the relevant House.
- 3 That five Members of the Committee shall constitute a quorum of the Committee.
- 4 That the Committee shall elect two of its Members to be Joint Chairmen.
- 5 That the Committee may sit in such places in Victoria as seems most convenient for the proper and speedy despatch of business.
- 6 That the Committee shall not sit while either House is actually sitting except by leave of that House and may not, while either House is actually sitting, sit in any place other than a place that is within the Parliament building.
- 7 That the Committee may send for persons, papers and records and report from time to time.
- 8 That the Committee shall, unless it otherwise resolves, take all evidence in public.
- 9 That the Committee shall keep a record of all evidence given before it and determinations made by it.
- 10 That the Committee have power to authorize publication of any evidence given before it in public and any document presented to it.
- 11 That as soon as practicable after the completion of each day's proceedings a transcript of the evidence taken in public by the Committee shall be published.
- 12 That the foregoing provisions of this resolution so far as they are inconsistent with the Standing Orders and practices of the Houses shall have effect notwithstanding anything contained in those Standing Orders.
- 24 DR COGHILL To move, That this House dissents from the actions of Mr Speaker in disallowing the use of lap top computers in the Chamber by Members and expresses the opinion that their use is acceptable subject to conditions similar to those applying in the other place.
- MR SERCOMBE To move, That this House condemns the Premier and the Speaker for undermining the independence, integrity and respect for the Office of Speaker by their actions in delaying a decision on the date of the Broadmeadows By-election until immediately after the Premier's deliberately belated response to the Speaker's invitation to comment on the matter and the selection of the last practical date as preferred by the Premier for purely partisan political advantage contrary to the fundamental principle that the Speaker makes decisions on a non-partisan basis and the custom and practice of choosing the earliest practical dates for by-elections so as to minimise the period for which electors are unrepresented.

- 26 MR SANDON To move, That he have leave to bring in a Bill to amend the Education Act 1958 to provide for the establishment of School Closures Review Committees, to allow for public consultation in the closure of Government Schools and for other purposes.
- 27 MR DOLLIS To move, That he have leave to bring in a Bill to amend the *Building Control Act* 1981 and for other purposes.
- MR LEIGH To move, That this House condemns the Member for Clayton for (a) his failure to repay to the State of Victoria within due time \$7595.41 advanced to the Member from the Education Ministry after his entering a studentship agreement; and (b) his offers to repay \$20 per month over a period of 18 years in spite of letters from the Victorian Government Solicitor threatening legal action unless he complied with arrangements which are contained in the studentship agreement that he entered into; despite the fact that during his time as a MLA for Glenhuntly and Clayton he received salary and electoral allowances of almost \$1.5 M. and this House further requests the Member to explain to the people why he failed to honour arrangements that were entered into by the Member in the studentship agreement which he made and which was honoured by the State of Victoria but not honoured by the Member for Clayton.
- 29 MR LEIGH To move, That this House condemns the Leader of the Opposition Mr J Brumby and Members of the Opposition for their failure to disassociate themselves from the activities of the Member for Clayton in his failure to repay in adequate time monies that he owed the Ministry of Education.
- DR COGHILL To move, That this House expresses the opinion that there is prima facie evidence of a contempt of the Parliament by the Honourable the Leader of the House in that he failed to make available for inspection all correspondence and other documents created since 26 October 1992, relating to any aspect of the review or reform of the structure, functioning, Standing Orders, procedures, practices or administration of the Legislative Assembly, the Legislative Council or the Parliament in any other respect including the rights and entitlements of Members received by him or sent by him or on his authority to the Speaker of the Legislative Assembly and the President of the Legislative Council either individually or jointly or any Officer or Officers of the Parliament, and all documents held by him relating to meetings, telephone conversations or other forms of communication or discussion in respect of the above matters in which he participated or which were held on his authority in response to Question No. 8 and that the matter be referred to the Privileges Committee for inquiry and report.
- 31 MR THOMSON (Pascoe Vale) To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Community Services for his action in cutting funding to the Dr Stanley Cochrane Pre-school in Mitcham, which has placed a heavy financial burden on many parents whose pre-school fees have risen from \$180 per year to \$480 per year.
- MR MICALLEF To move, That this House condemns the State Government for its continued failure to adequately secure the former Joseph Banks Secondary College site at Doveton, showing a disregard for the safety of local residents, allowing them to walk unhindered into an asbestos contaminated area and leaving a damage bill estimated at over \$60,000 some of which is to facilities which are to be retained by the community.

- 33 MR HAERMEYER To move, That this House notes with concern that as a result of Government policies fees at the Mordialloc Kindergarten have increased from \$50 per term in 1993 to \$110 per term in 1994, with parents expected to pay an additional \$30 levy for excursions, and consequently, enrolments at this kindergarten have decreased from 50 in 1993 to 30 in 1994 and this House urges the Minister to implement policies to ensure affordable and quality pre-schools are available to all families in the Mordialloc area.
- 34 MS GARBUTT To move, That this House notes with concern that on average preschool fees on the Mornington Peninsular have doubled this year from \$49 to \$99 and further evidence suggests that at least 44 children have been excluded this year because parents cannot pay fees, 15 children have moved to day care as they can obtain fee relief, 20 children are on waiting lists due to reduced sessions and groups lost.
- MS GARBUTT To move, That this House expresses its concerns at the failure of the Minister for Community Services to guarantee that all families living in Blackburn are able to afford to have their children attend pre-school, including those 15% of children who have not enrolled this year due to massive increase of 140% in preschool fees at Blackburn North Pre-school.
- 36 MS MARPLE To move, That this House notes with concern the failure of the State Government to require an environmental effects statement for the proposed redevelopment of the Crib Point Oil Facility despite the companies involved indicating that works will not proceed during 1994.
- 37 MRS WILSON To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Fair Trading for her Government's actions in eroding the resources available to consumers for information and protection, through the closure of the regional offices of the Office of Fair Trading in Ringwood and Dandenong, thus making it difficult for people living in the outer suburbs to access these services.
- 38 MR SEITZ To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Community Services for Government policies which have lead to an increase of kindergarten fees at Indra Pre-school in Blackburn South from \$180 to \$500 a year, resulting in severe hardships being endured by families of Pre-school children in the Blackburn area.
- 39 MR HAMILTON To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Public Transport for the appalling level of service for commuters travelling to Bairnsdale via Sale, since the abolition of the Rail Service between Bairnsdale and Sale, including the lack of shelter and passenger amenities at Bairnsdale and inconvenience caused by long delays in bus and train connections.
- 40 MR ANDRIANOPOULOS To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Public Transport for the premature introduction of driver only trains on the Alamein line, which because of 'blind spots' created by the design of station platforms along this line, has resulted in passengers being placed in great danger when boarding and alighting from trains, due to the inability of drivers to clearly see whether passengers are clear of the train before departing.
- 41 MR THOMSON (Pascoe Vale) To move, That this House condemns the Government for its massive increases in class sizes at Antonio Park Primary School which have led to a reduced quality of education at that school.

- 42 MR DOLLIS To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Planning for his intervention in the Knox Council decision regarding a proposed Fast Food Restaurant in Rowville as yet another example of this Government's overriding of Local Government Planning Schemes and decisions, thereby undermining the role of Local Government and showing complete disregard for the rights and wishes of Knox residents.
- 43 MR HAERMEYER To move, That this House condemns the Minister for School Education for Government Education Policies which have lead to massive increases in class sizes at Antonio Park Primary School whilst teaching staff numbers have been significantly reduced, resulting in dislocation of students and the inability of staff to provide the optimum level of quality education that Antonio Park Primary students so richly deserve.
- 44 MS MARPLE To move, That the House condemns the Minister for Community Services for his failure to provide an affordable pre-school at Croydon Central where due to the Minister's policies there has been a massive 88% increase in fees from \$160 in 1993 to \$300 in 1994.
- 45 MR SHEEHAN To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Education who, with the support of the Member for Mordialloc, has implemented policies which have resulted in the loss of 20 teaching positions from schools in the Mordialloc Electorate, while enrolments have increased by in excess of 60.
- 46 MR MILDENHALL To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Youth Affairs for cutting funding to the Nunawading Youth Adult Bureau by \$16,000, resulting in reduced outreach services to youth in the Nunawading area at a time when charitable organisations in Nunawading are experiencing a 100% increase in demand for their services, and youth unemployment remains at disastrously high levels.
- 47 MR SERCOMBE To move, That this House condemns the Government for its education policies which have reduced the quality of education for children in the Monbulk electorate.
- 48 MS GARBUTT To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Community Services for Government policies that have led to a 88% increase in fees from \$45 to \$115 per term at the Greenhills Pre-school, resulting in severe financial hardship for many parents with pre-school children in the Greensborough and Eltham communities.
- 49 MR ANDRIANOPOULOS To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Education for failing to provide quality education to students at Bendigo Senior Secondary College due directly to government policies that have resulted in stopping the construction of a library and new classrooms at the school.
- 50 MRS WILSON To move, That this House notes with concern that the Minister for Education has failed to ensure a quality education for children at Cranbourne West Primary School, due to massive increases in class sizes at this school.
- 51 MR PANDAZOPOULOS To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Education for denying children at the Cranbourne South Primary School a quality education due to massive increases in class sizes at the school.

- DR COGHILL To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Employment and Industry for failing to introduce a job creation scheme for people in the Bendigo area as promised before the election where the Bendigo District share of Jobs created under the said scheme would be over 800, such jobs providing a much needed stimulus to the Bendigo economy at a time when 8,444 people were receiving unemployment benefits from Social Security offices in Bendigo and Kangaroo Flat in February, 1994 being 14.73% more than in February, 1993.
- 53 MR HAMILTON To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Youth Affairs for cutting totally funding to the Barwon Youth Information Service which has resulted in less information reaching young people in the Barwon area who are in desperate need of advice and support.
- 54 MR MILDENHALL To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Community Services for his action in cutting funding to the Gisborne Kindergarten, which has placed a heavy financial burden on many parents in the Gisborne area whose pre-school fees have risen by \$450 per child.
- 55 MR PANDAZOPOULOS To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Community Services for Government policies that have cut funding to the Ontos Pre-school, which has lead to an increase in fees from \$30 per term to \$130 per term, resulting in severe hardship being endured by families for pre-school children in the Buchan Community.
- MS GARBUTT To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Community Services for his failure to provide an affordable pre-school at Mordialloc where due to the Minister's policies there has been a massive 100% increase in fees at the Elenora Pre-school causing extreme financial hardship for parents of pre-school children in the Mordialloc area.
- 57 MS MARPLE To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Community Services for his actions in cutting funding to kindergartens in Bendigo which has placed an extra financial burden on parents whose fees have doubled at the Bendigo Kindergarten in 1994.
- 58 MR BATCHELOR To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Public Transport for his failure to provide an adequate frequency of tram services from the City to West Preston and Mont Albert which has resulted in long delays for customers, as evidenced by patrons on Victoria Parade waiting up to 17 minutes for trams to the City on the Mont Albert route during the morning peak-hour on Thursday 17 March and Friday 18 March, 1994.
- 59 MR PANDAZOPOULOS To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Public Transport for failing to ensure that services operated by the National Bus Company on route No. 256 between the City and La Trobe University run on time, as evidenced by delays of more than an hour between services on the afternoon of Thursday March 17, 1994.
- 60 MS GARBUTT To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Health for her failure to ensure that all mothers and babies in Bayswater are guaranteed a minimum of 5 days in maternity care if they need it following the birth of a child.

- MR ANDRIANOPOULOS To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Education for his failure to provide a second Government school V.C.E. facility in Bendigo despite a pre-election promise of the Government to have a second V.C.E. facility "for the start of 1993" and his subsequent failure to have the said facility operational at the commencement of the 1994 school year.
- 62 MR SANDON To move, That this House condemns the Government for its failure to ensure all children at the Le Page School in Cheltenham are guaranteed a quality education due to massive increases in class sizes at the school.
- 63 MR MILDENHALL To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Community Services for ordering closed the only two reception facilities for emergency child abuse cases in the Western Suburbs, namely Buckland House and St Joseph's, in the face of his department's figures showing a 159% increase in child abuse notifications since the introduction of mandatory reporting.
- 64 MR THOMSON (Pascoe Vale) To move, That this House censures Mr Speaker for his failure to allow the Member for Sunshine and other Honourable Members to raise matters on the Adjournment Debate on Thursday 24 March 1994, in breach of the entitlements of Honourable Members provided for by the Sessional Orders.
- MR COOPER To move, That this House censures the Honourable Member for Bundoora for attempting to use the abuse and death of Daniel Valerio to score cheap political points, and calls on the Honourable Member for Bundoora to apologise to this House, the family of Daniel Valerio and the Victorian Community for her inconsiderate and insensitive behaviour.
- 66 MR BATCHELOR To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Public Transport for reducing the size of the Bendigo Railway Workshops workforce from 270 in October, 1992 to under 180 causing job positions to be lost in Bendigo, notwithstanding pre-election comments by representatives of the current Government that the workforce would increase.
- 67 MR THWAITES To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Health for Government policies that have put mothers and babies in Boronia at risk due to their early release from hospital following childbirth.
- 68 MR MICALLEF To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Public Transport for his failure to ensure residents in Carrum Downs have access to adequate public transport in order to travel to their municipal base in Cranbourne.
- 69 MR MILDENHALL To move, That this House condemns the State Government for its failure to recognise the concerns of residents in Merinda Park regarding the Government's proposal for a Merinda Park Railway Station.
- 70 MS MARPLE To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Health for her failure to ensure that mothers and babies in Croydon are able to stay at least 5 days in maternity care following the birth of their child.

- MR COOPER To move, That this House notes the involvement of the Honourable Member for Thomastown, in his then role as State Secretary of the Australian Labor Party, to manipulate the result of the Nunawading Province re-election in 1985 and his subsequent refusal to co-operate with the police investigation of this scandal, and calls on the Honourable Member for Thomastown to disclose the full facts of his and other Australian Labor Party members involvement.
- 72 MS MARPLE To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Agriculture for his lack of commitment to unemployed people in Bendigo by failing to relocate the Department of Agriculture to Bendigo and thus provide 130 jobs in Bendigo as promised by the Government.
- 73 MR ROWE To move, That this House commends the Minister for Education for responding to the education needs of the Botany Park/Skye community in that he has recognised the need for additional facilities in the provision of additional building to the value of \$180,000, and commenced the process for the future expansion and rebuilding of Skye Primary School.
- 74 MR ROWE To move, That this House commends the Minister for Education for responding to the education needs of the Cranbourne South Community by the provision of \$180,000 in a new building which had not been provided by the previous government.
- 75 MR ROWE To move, That this House commends the Minister for Education for responding to the education needs of the Cranbourne community in addressing the urgent need for \$100,000 of maintenance works at the Lyndhurst Secondary College being part of the black hole backlog of maintenance totalling millions of dollars left by the previous Labor government.
- 76 MRS WILSON To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Local Government for the lack of input residents of the Borough of Eaglehawk have had into the proposed Local Government restructure, despite the fact that 70% of residents in Eaglehawk voted in the poll on the proposal and over 90% voted against amalgamation.
- MR PANDAZOPOULOS To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Local Government for his failure to take account of the overwhelming 70% vote by the Bendigo community against council amalgamations on 29 January 1994 and forcing amalgamation of the five municipalities in the Bendigo area.
- 78 MR LEIGHTON To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Ivanhoe, the Honourable Vin Heffernan, for his failure to honour his commitment that the Liberal Government would restore full disadvantaged school program funding to schools in his electorate such as West Heidelberg Primary School and his advice to a parent of that school that there are no votes in West Heidelberg.
- 79 MR THWAITES To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Health for her failure to ensure that mothers and babies in Knox are able to stay at least 5 days in maternity care following the birth of their child thus placing at risk the health and future well-being of these mothers and babies.

- 80 MR THWAITES To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Health for her failure to ensure that mothers and babies in Ringwood are able to stay at least 5 days in maternity care following the birth of their child to ensure that the health and future well being of the mother and baby is not at risk.
- MR COOPER To move, That this House calls on all members of the Opposition to disassociate themselves from the actions of the Honourable Member for Thomastown who, in his then role as State Secretary of the Australian Labor Party, orchestrated a campaign to mislead and defraud voters in the re-election for the Nunawading Province in 1985, and requests that all Opposition members publicly support the demand that the Honourable Member for Thomastown disclose to the House all of the facts relating to his involvement in this scandal.
- 82 MS GARBUTT To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Community Services for failing to guarantee to parents in Ringwood an affordable and quality respite service for those children who have a disability.
- 83 MS GARBUTT To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Community Services for failing to guarantee to parents in Blackburn access to an affordable and quality respite service for children with a disability resulting in considerable financial hardship for these parents.
- MR HAERMEYER To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Police and Emergency Services for failing to provide sufficient funds to enable the Victorian Police to properly service the municipalities of Knox, Ringwood, Croydon, Sherbrooke, Healesville, Lilydale and Upper Yarra, particularly noting that the local community is being asked to foot the bill for a \$120,000 police caravan to adequately serve the very obvious policing needs of these communities.

- DR COGHILL To move, That this House censures Mr Speaker for not allowing the Member for Werribee to complete the explanation of his point of order on Tuesday, 6 April 1993 relating to the admissibility of the notice of motion of the Minister for Industry and Employment relating to the suspension of Standing and Sessional Orders to permit the Minister for Finance to address Members of both Houses without allowing any opportunity for debate on the address and dissents from the ruling of Mr Speaker on the point of order.
- DR COGHILL To move, That this House condemns the Leader of the House for moving and supporting a motion having the effect of (a) providing for an unprecedented form of address by the Minister for Finance on Wednesday, 7 April 1993 rather than relying on the established customary practice of a Ministerial statement; (b) denying any other Member any opportunity to speak on the address; (c) denying the House any opportunity to debate or otherwise deal with the address; and (d) further eroding the essential privileges immunities and powers of Members and the House as defined by the Constitution Act 1975.
- 20 MR LEIGH To move, That this House condemns the Speaker of the Fifty-first Parliament, Dr K. Coghill, the Member for Werribee, for his (a) inability to act impartially and protect the rights of all Members of the House; and (b) failure to control the House and for the protection he gave to the Kirner Government and its members.

MS MARPLE - To move, That this House - (a) calls on the Government to refer the status of the Chiltern Regional Park to the Land Conservation Council to be urgently reviewed in light of the importance of the remnant box and ironbark forest; and (b) revokes the consent to mineral exploration in Chiltern Park by CRA Exploration Pty Limited given by the Minister for Conservation and Environment, notice of which was tabled in this House on 16 March 1993 pursuant to section 40(5) of the National Parks Act 1975, so that there can be a moratorium on exploration while the Land Conservation Council considers the status of the Chiltern Regional Park.

#### 22 DR COGHILL - To move -

- 1 That a Joint Select Committee be appointed to enquire into and report upon the operation of the parliamentary committee system and in particular to report on provision by statute for its monitoring and review of all portfolios and for bi-partisan functioning.
- 2 That the Committee shall consist of eight Members, four members nominated by the Premier of whom two must be Members of the Assembly and one must be a Member of the Council and four Members nominated by the Leader of the Opposition of whom two must be Members of the Assembly and one must a Member of the Council. The appointments shall be made by the relevant House.
- 3 That five Members of the Committee shall constitute a quorum of the Committee.
- 4 That the Committee shall elect two of its Members to be Joint Chairmen.
- 5 That the Committee may sit in such places in Victoria as seems most convenient for the proper and speedy despatch of business.
- That the Committee shall not sit while either House is actually sitting except by leave of that House and may not, while either House is actually sitting, sit in any place other than a place that is within the Parliament building.
- 7 That the Committee may send for persons, papers and records and report from time to time.
- 8 That the Committee shall, unless it otherwise resolves, take all evidence in public.
- 9 That the Committee shall keep a record of all evidence given before it and determinations made by it.
- 10 That the Committee have power to authorize publication of any evidence given before it in public and any document presented to it.
- 11 That as soon as practicable after the completion of each day's proceedings a transcript of the evidence taken in public by the Committee shall be published.
- 12 That the foregoing provisions of this resolution so far as they are inconsistent with the Standing Orders and practices of the Houses shall have effect notwithstanding anything contained in those Standing Orders.

- 23 DR COGHILL To move, That this House dissents from the actions of Mr Speaker in disallowing the use of lap top computers in the Chamber by Members and expresses the opinion that their use is acceptable subject to conditions similar to those applying in the other place.
- MR SERCOMBE To move, That this House condemns the Premier and the Speaker for undermining the independence, integrity and respect for the Office of Speaker by their actions in delaying a decision on the date of the Broadmeadows By-election until immediately after the Premier's deliberately belated response to the Speaker's invitation to comment on the matter and the selection of the last practical date as preferred by the Premier for purely partisan political advantage contrary to the fundamental principle that the Speaker makes decisions on a non-partisan basis and the custom and practice of choosing the earliest practical dates for by-elections so as to minimise the period for which electors are unrepresented.
- 25 MR SANDON To move, That he have leave to bring in a Bill to amend the Education Act 1958 to provide for the establishment of School Closures Review Committees, to allow for public consultation in the closure of Government Schools and for other purposes.
- 26 MR DOLLIS To move, That he have leave to bring in a Bill to amend the *Building Control Act* 1981 and for other purposes.
- MR LEIGH To move, That this House condemns the Member for Clayton for (a) his failure to repay to the State of Victoria within due time \$7595.41 advanced to the Member from the Education Ministry after his entering a studentship agreement; and (b) his offers to repay \$20 per month over a period of 18 years in spite of letters from the Victorian Government Solicitor threatening legal action unless he complied with arrangements which are contained in the studentship agreement that he entered into; despite the fact that during his time as a MLA for Glenhuntly and Clayton he received salary and electoral allowances of almost \$1.5 M. and this House further requests the Member to explain to the people why he failed to honour arrangements that were entered into by the Member in the studentship agreement which he made and which was honoured by the State of Victoria but not honoured by the Member for Clayton.
- 28 MR LEIGH To move, That this House condemns the Leader of the Opposition Mr J Brumby and Members of the Opposition for their failure to disassociate themselves from the activities of the Member for Clayton in his failure to repay in adequate time monies that he owed the Ministry of Education.
- DR COGHILL To move, That this House expresses the opinion that there is prima facie evidence of a contempt of the Parliament by the Honourable the Leader of the House in that he failed to make available for inspection all correspondence and other documents created since 26 October 1992, relating to any aspect of the review or reform of the structure, functioning, Standing Orders, procedures, practices or administration of the Legislative Assembly, the Legislative Council or the Parliament in any other respect including the rights and entitlements of Members received by him or sent by him or on his authority to the Speaker of the Legislative Assembly and the President of the Legislative Council either individually or jointly or any Officer or Officers of the Parliament, and all documents held by him relating to meetings, telephone conversations or other forms of communication or discussion in respect of the above matters in which he participated or which were

- held on his authority in response to Question No. 8 and that the matter be referred to the Privileges Committee for inquiry and report.
- 30 MR THOMSON (Pascoe Vale) To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Community Services for his action in cutting funding to the Dr Stanley Cochrane Pre-school in Mitcham, which has placed a heavy financial burden on many parents whose pre-school fees have risen from \$180 per year to \$480 per year.
- 31 MR MICALLEF To move, That this House condemns the State Government for its continued failure to adequately secure the former Joseph Banks Secondary College site at Doveton, showing a disregard for the safety of local residents, allowing them to walk unhindered into an asbestos contaminated area and leaving a damage bill estimated at over \$60,000 some of which is to facilities which are to be retained by the community.
- 32 MR HAERMEYER To move, That this House notes with concern that as a result of Government policies fees at the Mordialloc Kindergarten have increased from \$50 per term in 1993 to \$110 per term in 1994, with parents expected to pay an additional \$30 levy for excursions, and consequently, enrolments at this kindergarten have decreased from 50 in 1993 to 30 in 1994 and this House urges the Minister to implement policies to ensure affordable and quality pre-schools are available to all families in the Mordialloc area.
- 33 MS GARBUTT To move, That this House notes with concern that on average preschool fees on the Mornington Peninsular have doubled this year from \$49 to \$99 and further evidence suggests that at least 44 children have been excluded this year because parents cannot pay fees, 15 children have moved to day care as they can obtain fee relief, 20 children are on waiting lists due to reduced sessions and groups lost.
- 34 MS GARBUTT To move, That this House expresses its concerns at the failure of the Minister for Community Services to guarantee that all families living in Blackburn are able to afford to have their children attend pre-school, including those 15% of children who have not enroled this year due to massive increase of 140% in preschool fees at Blackburn North Pre-school.
- 35 MS MARPLE To move, That this House notes with concern the failure of the State Government to require an environmental effects statement for the proposed redevelopment of the Crib Point Oil Facility despite the companies involved indicating that works will not proceed during 1994.
- MRS WILSON To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Fair Trading for her Government's actions in eroding the resources available to consumers for information and protection, through the closure of the regional offices of the Office of Fair Trading in Ringwood and Dandenong, thus making it difficult for people living in the outer suburbs to access these services.
- 37 MR SEITZ To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Community Services for Government policies which have lead to an increase of kindergarten fees at Indra Pre-school in Blackburn South from \$180 to \$500 a year, resulting in severe hardships being endured by families of Pre-school children in the Blackburn area.

- 38 MR HAMILTON To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Public Transport for the appalling level of service for commuters travelling to Bairnsdale via Sale, since the abolition of the Rail Service between Bairnsdale and Sale, including the lack of shelter and passenger amenities at Bairnsdale and inconvenience caused by long delays in bus and train connections.
- 39 MR ANDRIANOPOULOS To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Public Transport for the premature introduction of driver only trains on the Alamein line, which because of 'blind spots' created by the design of station platforms along this line, has resulted in passengers being placed in great danger when boarding and alighting from trains, due to the inability of drivers to clearly see whether passengers are clear of the train before departing.
- 40 MR THOMSON (Pascoe Vale) To move, That this House condemns the Government for its massive increases in class sizes at Antonio Park Primary School which have led to a reduced quality of education at that school.
- 41 MR DOLLIS To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Planning for his intervention in the Knox Council decision regarding a proposed Fast Food Restaurant in Rowville as yet another example of this Government's overriding of Local Government Planning Schemes and decisions, thereby undermining the role of Local Government and showing complete disregard for the rights and wishes of Knox residents.
- 42 MR HAERMEYER To move, That this House condemns the Minister for School Education for Government Education Policies which have lead to massive increases in class sizes at Antonio Park Primary School whilst teaching staff numbers have been significantly reduced, resulting in dislocation of students and the inability of staff to provide the optimum level of quality education that Antonio Park Primary students so richly deserve.
- 43 MS MARPLE To move, That the House condemns the Minister for Community Services for his failure to provide an affordable pre-school at Croydon Central where due to the Minister's policies there has been a massive 88% increase in fees from \$160 in 1993 to \$300 in 1994.
- 44 MR SHEEHAN To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Education who, with the support of the Member for Mordialloc, has implemented policies which have resulted in the loss of 20 teaching positions from schools in the Mordialloc Electorate, while enrolments have increased by in excess of 60.
- 45 MR MILDENHALL To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Youth Affairs for cutting funding to the Nunawading Youth Adult Bureau by \$16,000, resulting in reduced outreach services to youth in the Nunawading area at a time when charitable organisations in Nunawading are experiencing a 100% increase in demand for their services, and youth unemployment remains at disastrously high levels.
- 46 MR SERCOMBE To move, That this House condemns the Government for its education policies which have reduced the quality of education for children in the Monbulk electorate.

- MS GARBUTT To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Community Services for Government policies that have led to a 88% increase in fees from \$45 to \$115 per term at the Greenhills Pre-school, resulting in severe financial hardship for many parents with pre-school children in the Greensborough and Eltham communities.
- 48 MR ANDRIANOPOULOS To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Education for failing to provide quality education to students at Bendigo Senior Secondary College due directly to government policies that have resulted in stopping the construction of a library and new classrooms at the school.
- 49 MRS WILSON To move, That this House notes with concern that the Minister for Education has failed to ensure a quality education for children at Cranbourne West Primary School, due to massive increases in class sizes at this school.
- 50 MR PANDAZOPOULOS To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Education for denying children at the Cranbourne South Primary School a quality education due to massive increases in class sizes at the school.
- DR COGHILL To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Employment and Industry for failing to introduce a job creation scheme for people in the Bendigo area as promised before the election where the Bendigo District share of Jobs created under the said scheme would be over 800, such jobs providing a much needed stimulus to the Bendigo economy at a time when 8,444 people were receiving unemployment benefits from Social Security offices in Bendigo and Kangaroo Flat in February, 1994 being 14.73% more than in February, 1993.
- MR HAMILTON To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Youth Affairs for cutting totally funding to the Barwon Youth Information Service which has resulted in less information reaching young people in the Barwon area who are in desperate need of advice and support.
- 53 MR MILDENHALL To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Community Services for his action in cutting funding to the Gisborne Kindergarten, which has placed a heavy financial burden on many parents in the Gisborne area whose pre-school fees have risen by \$450 per child.
- MR PANDAZOPOULOS To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Community Services for Government policies that have cut funding to the Ontos Pre-school, which has lead to an increase in fees from \$30 per term to \$130 per term, resulting in severe hardship being endured by families for pre-school children in the Buchan Community.
- MS GARBUTT To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Community Services for his failure to provide an affordable pre-school at Mordialloc where due to the Minister's policies there has been a massive 100% increase in fees at the Elenora Pre-school causing extreme financial hardship for parents of pre-school children in the Mordialloc area.
- MS MARPLE To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Community Services for his actions in cutting funding to kindergartens in Bendigo which has placed an extra financial burden on parents whose fees have doubled at the Bendigo Kindergarten in 1994.

- 57 MR BATCHELOR To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Public Transport for his failure to provide an adequate frequency of tram services from the City to West Preston and Mont Albert which has resulted in long delays for customers, as evidenced by patrons on Victoria Parade waiting up to 17 minutes for trams to the City on the Mont Albert route during the morning peak-hour on Thursday 17 March and Friday 18 March, 1994.
- 58 MR PANDAZOPOULOS To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Public Transport for failing to ensure that services operated by the National Bus Company on route No. 256 between the City and La Trobe University run on time, as evidenced by delays of more than an hour between services on the afternoon of Thursday March 17, 1994.
- 59 MS GARBUTT To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Health for her failure to ensure that all mothers and babies in Bayswater are guaranteed a minimum of 5 days in maternity care if they need it following the birth of a child.
- 60 MR ANDRIANOPOULOS To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Education for his failure to provide a second Government school V.C.E. facility in Bendigo despite a pre-election promise of the Government to have a second V.C.E. facility "for the start of 1993" and his subsequent failure to have the said facility operational at the commencement of the 1994 school year.
- 61 MR SANDON To move, That this House condemns the Government for its failure to ensure all children at the Le Page School in Cheltenham are guaranteed a quality education due to massive increases in class sizes at the school.
- 62 MR MILDENHALL To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Community Services for ordering closed the only two reception facilities for emergency child abuse cases in the Western Suburbs, namely Buckland House and St Joseph's, in the face of his department's figures showing a 159% increase in child abuse notifications since the introduction of mandatory reporting.
- 63 MR THOMSON (Pascoe Vale) To move, That this House censures Mr Speaker for his failure to allow the Member for Sunshine and other Honourable Members to raise matters on the Adjournment Debate on Thursday 24 March 1994, in breach of the entitlements of Honourable Members provided for by the Sessional Orders.
- MR COOPER To move, That this House censures the Honourable Member for Bundoora for attempting to use the abuse and death of Daniel Valerio to score cheap political points, and calls on the Honourable Member for Bundoora to apologise to this House, the family of Daniel Valerio and the Victorian Community for her inconsiderate and insensitive behaviour.
- MR BATCHELOR To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Public Transport for reducing the size of the Bendigo Railway Workshops workforce from 270 in October, 1992 to under 180 causing job positions to be lost in Bendigo, notwithstanding pre-election comments by representatives of the current Government that the workforce would increase.
- 66 MR THWAITES To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Health for Government policies that have put mothers and babies in Boronia at risk due to their early release from hospital following childbirth.

- 67 MR MICALLEF To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Public Transport for his failure to ensure residents in Carrum Downs have access to adequate public transport in order to travel to their municipal base in Cranbourne.
- 68 MR MILDENHALL To move, That this House condemns the State Government for its failure to recognise the concerns of residents in Merinda Park regarding the Government's proposal for a Merinda Park Railway Station.
- 69 MS MARPLE To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Health for her failure to ensure that mothers and babies in Croydon are able to stay at least 5 days in maternity care following the birth of their child.
- MR COOPER To move, That this House notes the involvement of the Honourable Member for Thomastown, in his then role as State Secretary of the Australian Labor Party, to manipulate the result of the Nunawading Province re-election in 1985 and his subsequent refusal to co-operate with the police investigation of this scandal, and calls on the Honourable Member for Thomastown to disclose the full facts of his and other Australian Labor Party members involvement.
- 71 MS MARPLE To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Agriculture for his lack of commitment to unemployed people in Bendigo by failing to relocate the Department of Agriculture to Bendigo and thus provide 130 jobs in Bendigo as promised by the Government.
- 72 MR ROWE To move, That this House commends the Minister for Education for responding to the education needs of the Botany Park/Skye community in that he has recognised the need for additional facilities in the provision of additional building to the value of \$180,000, and commenced the process for the future expansion and rebuilding of Skye Primary School.
- 73 MR ROWE To move, That this House commends the Minister for Education for responding to the education needs of the Cranbourne South Community by the provision of \$180,000 in a new building which had not been provided by the previous government.
- 74 MR ROWE To move, That this House commends the Minister for Education for responding to the education needs of the Cranbourne community in addressing the urgent need for \$100,000 of maintenance works at the Lyndhurst Secondary College being part of the black hole backlog of maintenance totalling millions of dollars left by the previous Labor government.
- 75 MRS WILSON To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Local Government for the lack of input residents of the Borough of Eaglehawk have had into the proposed Local Government restructure, despite the fact that 70% of residents in Eaglehawk voted in the poll on the proposal and over 90% voted against amalgamation.
- 76 MR PANDAZOPOULOS To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Local Government for his failure to take account of the overwhelming 70% vote by the Bendigo community against council amalgamations on 29 January 1994 and forcing amalgamation of the five municipalities in the Bendigo area.

- MR LEIGHTON To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Ivanhoe, the Honourable Vin Heffernan, for his failure to honour his commitment that the Liberal Government would restore full disadvantaged school program funding to schools in his electorate such as West Heidelberg Primary School and his advice to a parent of that school that there are no votes in West Heidelberg.
- 78 MR THWAITES To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Health for her failure to ensure that mothers and babies in Knox are able to stay at least 5 days in maternity care following the birth of their child thus placing at risk the health and future well-being of these mothers and babies.
- 79 MR THWAITES To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Health for her failure to ensure that mothers and babies in Ringwood are able to stay at least 5 days in maternity care following the birth of their child to ensure that the health and future well being of the mother and baby is not at risk.
- MR COOPER To move, That this House calls on all members of the Opposition to disassociate themselves from the actions of the Honourable Member for Thomastown who, in his then role as State Secretary of the Australian Labor Party, orchestrated a campaign to mislead and defraud voters in the re-election for the Nunawading Province in 1985, and requests that all Opposition members publicly support the demand that the Honourable Member for Thomastown disclose to the House all of the facts relating to his involvement in this scandal.
- 81 MS GARBUTT To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Community Services for failing to guarantee to parents in Ringwood an affordable and quality respite service for those children who have a disability.
- 82 MS GARBUTT To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Community Services for failing to guarantee to parents in Blackburn access to an affordable and quality respite service for children with a disability resulting in considerable financial hardship for these parents.
- 83 MR HAERMEYER To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Police and Emergency Services for failing to provide sufficient funds to enable the Victorian Police to properly service the municipalities of Knox, Ringwood, Croydon, Sherbrooke, Healesville, Lilydale and Upper Yarra, particularly noting that the local community is being asked to foot the bill for a \$120,000 police caravan to adequately serve the very obvious policing needs of these communities.
- MR HAERMEYER To move, That this House condemns the Member for Bayswater for failing to represent the interests of his constituents and to live up to his promise to "provide the Victorian Police with the resources it needs to protect the community", noting: (a) The member's failure to stand up for his community when his Government cancelled the contract to provide a new police station for Bayswater; and (b) The member's failure to act on behalf of the local community in response to demands that the local community foot the bill for a \$120,000 mobile police caravan that the community urgently needs.
- MR DOLLIS To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Planning for not consulting with Eltham residents or allowing them direct input into the Government's decision whether to allow 24 hour trading in residential areas, thereby further lessening the rights of Eltham residents to participate in planning

- issues which will affect their amenities and living conditions, as well as altering the nature of their neighbourhoods.
- MR LONEY To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Sport, Recreation and Racing for his lack of commitment to ensure that people with an intellectual disability have access to appropriate sport and recreation activities as shown by the total defunding of the Victorian Sport and Recreation Association of Persons with an Intellectual Disability leaving people with an intellectual disability without a voice and a means to ensure that sport and recreation is available to all.
- 87 MR BATCHELOR To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Public Transport for failing to provide an adequate level of public transport services over the Easter Holiday period as evidenced by customers being required to wait more than 45 minutes for a city-bound tram on the East Malvern route on the morning of Monday, April 4 1994.
- MR THOMSON (Pascoe Vale) To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Public Transport for his failure to ensure an adequate level of service for PTC customers who use the Broadmeadows railway line, as evidenced by the events of March 29, 1994 in relation to the 7.33 a.m. service from the City, when passengers were told when the train arrived at Essendon Station to board a bus for the rest of the trip, but passengers waiting at unstaffed stations further down the line were not told the train was not coming and had been replaced by a bus, and were left waiting on train platforms.
- 89 MR THWAITES To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Health for placing at risk the health of mothers and babies in Mitcham as a result of their early discharge from hospital following childbirth.
- 90 MS GARBUTT To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Health for her failure to ensure that mothers and babies in Oakleigh South are able to stay at least five days in maternity care following the birth of their baby thus placing at risk the health and future well being of these Oakleigh South mothers and babies.
- \*91 MR LEIGH To move, That this House condemns the Member for Springvale for his involvement in the previous Labor Government's decision to purchase a tip in Springvale South which is now owned by the Ministry of Planning and Development but which had been owned by Waverley Council and managed by Springvale Council and further condemns the Member for his involvement in ensuring that Victorian taxpayers would be responsible for the costs of containing and cleaning up the pollution caused by the Council's disgraceful management practices.
- \*92 MR LEIGH To move, That this House calls on the Leader of the Opposition to sack his political adviser Mr P Reed, the Mayor of Springvale, for his attempts to pump polluted tip waters into Melbourne Water's Braeside Park thereby putting the park at risk.
- \*93 MR HAERMEYER To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Health for her failure to ensure that mothers and babies in Knoxfield are able to stay at least five days in maternity care following the birth of their baby thus placing at risk the health and future well being of these Knoxfield mothers and babies.

- \*94 MR SANDON To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Education for his cuts to education funding at the Richmond West Primary School that have resulted in the loss of 9.5 teachers, an 18% increase in average class sizes, a 50% reduction in specialist programs, a 50% cut in reading recovery program and reduced professional development and program evaluation.
- \*95 MR LEIGHTON To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Community Services for closure of cottage homes which has led to an increased demand for foster places in Blackburn, without also addressing the need for an increase in reimbursement rates for potential foster parents in the Blackburn area, described by the Children's Welfare Association of Victoria as being totally inadequate, thus leaving children without permanent placement.
- \*96 MS GARBUTT To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Community Services for budget cuts which have seen services to physically and intellectually disabled people severely reduced at Kew Cottages, with recreation programs cut by more than half and the staff-client ratio falling to dangerous levels with plans for more reductions, resulting in poor staff morale and increased trauma and stress for long suffering parents at Kew Cottages.
- \*97 MR PANDAZOPOULOS To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Community Services for his Government policies that have led to a massive 100% increase in fees at the All Saints Pre-School which has denied children from migrant and low income families in the Nunawading area access to pre-school.
- \*98 MR LEIGHTON To move, That this House refers to the Privileges Committee for examination and report the matter of whether the Minister for Industry and Employment, the Honourable Phillip Gude, has committed a contempt in that he deliberately misled the House in that -

  - The response by the Minister for Industry and Employment on the adjournment debate of 31 March 1994 to the matter raised by the Member for Preston, where the Minister failed to alter the substance of his earlier response to the Leader of the Opposition.

- DR COGHILL To move, That this House expresses the opinion that there is prima facie evidence of a contempt of the Parliament by the Honourable the Leader of the House in that he failed to make available for inspection all correspondence and other documents created since 26 October 1992, relating to any aspect of the review or reform of the structure, functioning, Standing Orders, procedures, practices or administration of the Legislative Assembly, the Legislative Council or the Parliament in any other respect including the rights and entitlements of Members received by him or sent by him or on his authority to the Speaker of the Legislative Assembly and the President of the Legislative Council either individually or jointly or any Officer or Officers of the Parliament, and all documents held by him relating to meetings, telephone conversations or other forms of communication or discussion in respect of the above matters in which he participated or which were held on his authority in response to Question No. 8 and that the matter be referred to the Privileges Committee for inquiry and report.
- 30 MR THOMSON (Pascoe Vale) To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Community Services for his action in cutting funding to the Dr Stanley Cochrane Pre-school in Mitcham, which has placed a heavy financial burden on many parents whose pre-school fees have risen from \$180 per year to \$480 per year.
- MR MICALLEF To move, That this House condemns the State Government for its continued failure to adequately secure the former Joseph Banks Secondary College site at Doveton, showing a disregard for the safety of local residents, allowing them to walk unhindered into an asbestos contaminated area and leaving a damage bill estimated at over \$60,000 some of which is to facilities which are to be retained by the community.
- 32 MR HAERMEYER To move, That this House notes with concern that as a result of Government policies fees at the Mordialloc Kindergarten have increased from \$50 per term in 1993 to \$110 per term in 1994, with parents expected to pay an additional \$30 levy for excursions, and consequently, enrolments at this kindergarten have decreased from 50 in 1993 to 30 in 1994 and this House urges the Minister to implement policies to ensure affordable and quality pre-schools are available to all families in the Mordialloc area.
- 33 MS GARBUTT To move, That this House notes with concern that on average preschool fees on the Mornington Peninsular have doubled this year from \$49 to \$99 and further evidence suggests that at least 44 children have been excluded this year because parents cannot pay fees, 15 children have moved to day care as they can obtain fee relief, 20 children are on waiting lists due to reduced sessions and groups lost.

- 34 MS GARBUTT To move, That this House expresses its concerns at the failure of the Minister for Community Services to guarantee that all families living in Blackburn are able to afford to have their children attend pre-school, including those 15% of children who have not enroled this year due to massive increase of 140% in pre-school fees at Blackburn North Pre-school.
- 35 MS MARPLE To move, That this House notes with concern the failure of the State Government to require an environmental effects statement for the proposed redevelopment of the Crib Point Oil Facility despite the companies involved indicating that works will not proceed during 1994.
- MRS WILSON To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Fair Trading for her Government's actions in eroding the resources available to consumers for information and protection, through the closure of the regional offices of the Office of Fair Trading in Ringwood and Dandenong, thus making it difficult for people living in the outer suburbs to access these services.
- 37 MR SEITZ To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Community Services for Government policies which have lead to an increase of kindergarten fees at Indra Pre-school in Blackburn South from \$180 to \$500 a year, resulting in severe hardships being endured by families of Pre-school children in the Blackburn area.
- 38 MR HAMILTON To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Public Transport for the appalling level of service for commuters travelling to Bairnsdale via Sale, since the abolition of the Rail Service between Bairnsdale and Sale, including the lack of shelter and passenger amenities at Bairnsdale and inconvenience caused by long delays in bus and train connections.
- 39 MR ANDRIANOPOULOS To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Public Transport for the premature introduction of driver only trains on the Alamein line, which because of 'blind spots' created by the design of station platforms along this line, has resulted in passengers being placed in great danger when boarding and alighting from trains, due to the inability of drivers to clearly see whether passengers are clear of the train before departing.
- 40 MR THOMSON (Pascoe Vale) To move, That this House condemns the Government for its massive increases in class sizes at Antonio Park Primary School which have led to a reduced quality of education at that school.
- MR DOLLIS To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Planning for his intervention in the Knox Council decision regarding a proposed Fast Food Restaurant in Rowville as yet another example of this Government's overriding of Local Government Planning Schemes and decisions, thereby undermining the role of Local Government and showing complete disregard for the rights and wishes of Knox residents.
- 42 MR HAERMEYER To move, That this House condemns the Minister for School Education for Government Education Policies which have lead to massive increases in class sizes at Antonio Park Primary School whilst teaching staff numbers have been significantly reduced, resulting in dislocation of students and the inability of staff to provide the optimum level of quality education that Antonio Park Primary students so richly deserve.

- 43 MS MARPLE To move, That the House condemns the Minister for Community Services for his failure to provide an affordable pre-school at Croydon Central where due to the Minister's policies there has been a massive 88% increase in fees from \$160 in 1993 to \$300 in 1994.
- 44 MR SHEEHAN To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Education who, with the support of the Member for Mordialloc, has implemented policies which have resulted in the loss of 20 teaching positions from schools in the Mordialloc Electorate, while enrolments have increased by in excess of 60.
- MR MILDENHALL To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Youth Affairs for cutting funding to the Nunawading Youth Adult Bureau by \$16,000, resulting in reduced outreach services to youth in the Nunawading area at a time when charitable organisations in Nunawading are experiencing a 100% increase in demand for their services, and youth unemployment remains at disastrously high levels.
- 46 MR SERCOMBE To move, That this House condemns the Government for its education policies which have reduced the quality of education for children in the Monbulk electorate.
- 47 MS GARBUTT To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Community Services for Government policies that have led to a 88% increase in fees from \$45 to \$115 per term at the Greenhills Pre-school, resulting in severe financial hardship for many parents with pre-school children in the Greensborough and Eltham communities.
- 48 MR ANDRIANOPOULOS To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Education for failing to provide quality education to students at Bendigo Senior Secondary College due directly to government policies that have resulted in stopping the construction of a library and new classrooms at the school.
- 49 MRS WILSON To move, That this House notes with concern that the Minister for Education has failed to ensure a quality education for children at Cranbourne West Primary School, due to massive increases in class sizes at this school.
- MR PANDAZOPOULOS To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Education for denying children at the Cranbourne South Primary School a quality education due to massive increases in class sizes at the school.
- DR COGHILL To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Employment and Industry for failing to introduce a job creation scheme for people in the Bendigo area as promised before the election where the Bendigo District share of Jobs created under the said scheme would be over 800, such jobs providing a much needed stimulus to the Bendigo economy at a time when 8,444 people were receiving unemployment benefits from Social Security offices in Bendigo and Kangaroo Flat in February, 1994 being 14.73% more than in February, 1993.
- MR HAMILTON To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Youth Affairs for cutting totally funding to the Barwon Youth Information Service which has resulted in less information reaching young people in the Barwon area who are in desperate need of advice and support.

- 53 MR MILDENHALL To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Community Services for his action in cutting funding to the Gisborne Kindergarten, which has placed a heavy financial burden on many parents in the Gisborne area whose pre-school fees have risen by \$450 per child.
- MR PANDAZOPOULOS To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Community Services for Government policies that have cut funding to the Ontos Pre-school, which has lead to an increase in fees from \$30 per term to \$130 per term, resulting in severe hardship being endured by families for pre-school children in the Buchan Community.
- MS GARBUTT To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Community Services for his failure to provide an affordable pre-school at Mordialloc where due to the Minister's policies there has been a massive 100% increase in fees at the Elenora Pre-school causing extreme financial hardship for parents of pre-school children in the Mordialloc area.
- MS MARPLE To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Community Services for his actions in cutting funding to kindergartens in Bendigo which has placed an extra financial burden on parents whose fees have doubled at the Bendigo Kindergarten in 1994.
- 57 MR BATCHELOR To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Public Transport for his failure to provide an adequate frequency of tram services from the City to West Preston and Mont Albert which has resulted in long delays for customers, as evidenced by patrons on Victoria Parade waiting up to 17 minutes for trams to the City on the Mont Albert route during the morning peak-hour on Thursday 17 March and Friday 18 March, 1994.
- MR PANDAZOPOULOS To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Public Transport for failing to ensure that services operated by the National Bus Company on route No. 256 between the City and La Trobe University run on time, as evidenced by delays of more than an hour between services on the afternoon of Thursday March 17, 1994.
- 59 MS GARBUTT To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Health for her failure to ensure that all mothers and babies in Bayswater are guaranteed a minimum of 5 days in maternity care if they need it following the birth of a child.
- 60 MR ANDRIANOPOULOS To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Education for his failure to provide a second Government school V.C.E. facility in Bendigo despite a pre-election promise of the Government to have a second V.C.E. facility "for the start of 1993" and his subsequent failure to have the said facility operational at the commencement of the 1994 school year.
- 61 MR SANDON To move, That this House condemns the Government for its failure to ensure all children at the Le Page School in Cheltenham are guaranteed a quality education due to massive increases in class sizes at the school.
- 62 MR MILDENHALL To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Community Services for ordering closed the only two reception facilities for emergency child abuse cases in the Western Suburbs, namely Buckland House and St Joseph's, in the face of his department's figures showing a 159% increase in child abuse notifications since the introduction of mandatory reporting.

- 63 MR THOMSON (Pascoe Vale) To move, That this House censures Mr Speaker for his failure to allow the Member for Sunshine and other Honourable Members to raise matters on the Adjournment Debate on Thursday 24 March 1994, in breach of the entitlements of Honourable Members provided for by the Sessional Orders.
- MR COOPER To move, That this House censures the Honourable Member for Bundoora for attempting to use the abuse and death of Daniel Valerio to score cheap political points, and calls on the Honourable Member for Bundoora to apologise to this House, the family of Daniel Valerio and the Victorian Community for her inconsiderate and insensitive behaviour.
- MR BATCHELOR To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Public Transport for reducing the size of the Bendigo Railway Workshops workforce from 270 in October, 1992 to under 180 causing job positions to be lost in Bendigo, notwithstanding pre-election comments by representatives of the current Government that the workforce would increase.
- MR THWAITES To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Health for Government policies that have put mothers and babies in Boronia at risk due to their early release from hospital following childbirth.
- 67 MR MICALLEF To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Public Transport for his failure to ensure residents in Carrum Downs have access to adequate public transport in order to travel to their municipal base in Cranbourne.
- 68 MR MILDENHALL To move, That this House condemns the State Government for its failure to recognise the concerns of residents in Merinda Park regarding the Government's proposal for a Merinda Park Railway Station.
- 69 MS MARPLE To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Health for her failure to ensure that mothers and babies in Croydon are able to stay at least 5 days in maternity care following the birth of their child.
- MR COOPER To move, That this House notes the involvement of the Honourable Member for Thomastown, in his then role as State Secretary of the Australian Labor Party, to manipulate the result of the Nunawading Province re-election in 1985 and his subsequent refusal to co-operate with the police investigation of this scandal, and calls on the Honourable Member for Thomastown to disclose the full facts of his and other Australian Labor Party members involvement.
- MS MARPLE To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Agriculture for his lack of commitment to unemployed people in Bendigo by failing to relocate the Department of Agriculture to Bendigo and thus provide 130 jobs in Bendigo as promised by the Government.
- 72 MR ROWE To move, That this House commends the Minister for Education for responding to the education needs of the Botany Park/Skye community in that he has recognised the need for additional facilities in the provision of additional building to the value of \$180,000, and commenced the process for the future expansion and rebuilding of Skye Primary School.

- 73 MR ROWE To move, That this House commends the Minister for Education for responding to the education needs of the Cranbourne South Community by the provision of \$180,000 in a new building which had not been provided by the previous government.
- 74 MR ROWE To move, That this House commends the Minister for Education for responding to the education needs of the Cranbourne community in addressing the urgent need for \$100,000 of maintenance works at the Lyndhurst Secondary College being part of the black hole backlog of maintenance totalling millions of dollars left by the previous Labor government.
- 75 MRS WILSON To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Local Government for the lack of input residents of the Borough of Eaglehawk have had into the proposed Local Government restructure, despite the fact that 70% of residents in Eaglehawk voted in the poll on the proposal and over 90% voted against amalgamation.
- MR PANDAZOPOULOS To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Local Government for his failure to take account of the overwhelming 70% vote by the Bendigo community against council amalgamations on 29 January 1994 and forcing amalgamation of the five municipalities in the Bendigo area.
- MR LEIGHTON To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Ivanhoe, the Honourable Vin Heffernan, for his failure to honour his commitment that the Liberal Government would restore full disadvantaged school program funding to schools in his electorate such as West Heidelberg Primary School and his advice to a parent of that school that there are no votes in West Heidelberg.
- 78 MR THWAITES To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Health for her failure to ensure that mothers and babies in Knox are able to stay at least 5 days in maternity care following the birth of their child thus placing at risk the health and future well-being of these mothers and babies.
- MR THWAITES To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Health for her failure to ensure that mothers and babies in Ringwood are able to stay at least 5 days in maternity care following the birth of their child to ensure that the health and future well being of the mother and baby is not at risk.
- MR COOPER To move, That this House calls on all members of the Opposition to disassociate themselves from the actions of the Honourable Member for Thomastown who, in his then role as State Secretary of the Australian Labor Party, orchestrated a campaign to mislead and defraud voters in the re-election for the Nunawading Province in 1985, and requests that all Opposition members publicly support the demand that the Honourable Member for Thomastown disclose to the House all of the facts relating to his involvement in this scandal.
- 81 MS GARBUTT To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Community Services for failing to guarantee to parents in Ringwood an affordable and quality respite service for those children who have a disability.
- 82 MS GARBUTT To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Community Services for failing to guarantee to parents in Blackburn access to an affordable and quality respite service for children with a disability resulting in considerable financial hardship for these parents.

- 83 MR HAERMEYER To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Police and Emergency Services for failing to provide sufficient funds to enable the Victorian Police to properly service the municipalities of Knox, Ringwood, Croydon, Sherbrooke, Healesville, Lilydale and Upper Yarra, particularly noting that the local community is being asked to foot the bill for a \$120,000 police caravan to adequately serve the very obvious policing needs of these communities.

- MR LONEY To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Sport, Recreation and Racing for his lack of commitment to ensure that people with an intellectual disability have access to appropriate sport and recreation activities as shown by the total defunding of the Victorian Sport and Recreation Association of Persons with an Intellectual Disability leaving people with an intellectual disability without a voice and a means to ensure that sport and recreation is available to all.
- 87 MR BATCHELOR To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Public Transport for failing to provide an adequate level of public transport services over the Easter Holiday period as evidenced by customers being required to wait more than 45 minutes for a city-bound tram on the East Malvern route on the morning of Monday, April 4 1994.
- 88 MR THOMSON (Pascoe Vale) To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Public Transport for his failure to ensure an adequate level of service for PTC customers who use the Broadmeadows railway line, as evidenced by the events of March 29, 1994 in relation to the 7.33 a.m. service from the City, when passengers were told when the train arrived at Essendon Station to board a bus for the rest of the trip, but passengers waiting at unstaffed stations further down the line were not told the train was not coming and had been replaced by a bus, and were left waiting on train platforms.
- 89 MR THWAITES To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Health for placing at risk the health of mothers and babies in Mitcham as a result of their early discharge from hospital following childbirth.
- 90 MS GARBUTT To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Health for her failure to ensure that mothers and babies in Oakleigh South are able to stay at least five days in maternity care following the birth of their baby thus placing at risk the health and future well being of these Oakleigh South mothers and babies.

- 91 MR LEIGH To move, That this House condemns the Member for Springvale for his involvement in the previous Labor Government's decision to purchase a tip in Springvale South which is now owned by the Ministry of Planning and Development but which had been owned by Waverley Council and managed by Springvale Council and further condemns the Member for his involvement in ensuring that Victorian taxpayers would be responsible for the costs of containing and cleaning up the pollution caused by the Council's disgraceful management practices.

- 4 Notes of the briefing to statutory authority heads of 15 March 1994 made available to the State Opposition which record the briefing given by Ian Douglas, QC on the Federal Legislation; and
- The response by the Minister for Industry and Employment on the adjournment debate of 31 March 1994 to the matter raised by the Member for Preston, where the Minister failed to alter the substance of his earlier response to the Leader of the Opposition.
- \*99 MR THOMSON (Pascoe Vale) To move, That this House notes with concern that the Government has spent more money on advertising campaigns and self-promotion involving the Minister for Industry and Employment than it plans to spend on assistance for the Snow Brand Pty Ltd, milk products company in its investment in a new plant at Tatura.
- \*100 MRS WILSON To move, That this House congratulates Vizy Board's \$50 million expansion of a Cardboard Box Factory at Dandenong which will create new jobs for people living in Dandenong, one of the hardest hit areas by unemployment.
- \*101 MR LONEY To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Education for cuts in education funding which have led to reduced learning opportunities for students in Geelong North and a wastage of library resources in primary schools in Geelong North.

- 32 MR HAERMEYER To move, That this House notes with concern that as a result of Government policies fees at the Mordialloc Kindergarten have increased from \$50 per term in 1993 to \$110 per term in 1994, with parents expected to pay an additional \$30 levy for excursions, and consequently, enrolments at this kindergarten have decreased from 50 in 1993 to 30 in 1994 and this House urges the Minister to implement policies to ensure affordable and quality pre-schools are available to all families in the Mordialloc area.

- MR DOLLIS To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Planning for his intervention in the Knox Council decision regarding a proposed Fast Food Restaurant in Rowville as yet another example of this Government's overriding of Local Government Planning Schemes and decisions, thereby undermining the role of Local Government and showing complete disregard for the rights and wishes of Knox residents.
- 42 MR HAERMEYER To move, That this House condemns the Minister for School Education for Government Education Policies which have lead to massive increases in class sizes at Antonio Park Primary School whilst teaching staff numbers have been significantly reduced, resulting in dislocation of students and the inability of staff to provide the optimum level of quality education that Antonio Park Primary students so richly deserve.
- 43 MS MARPLE To move, That the House condemns the Minister for Community Services for his failure to provide an affordable pre-school at Croydon Central where due to the Minister's policies there has been a massive 88% increase in fees from \$160 in 1993 to \$300 in 1994.

- MR PANDAZOPOULOS To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Community Services for Government policies that have cut funding to the Ontos Pre-school, which has lead to an increase in fees from \$30 per term to \$130 per term, resulting in severe hardship being endured by families for pre-school children in the Buchan Community.

- 87 MR BATCHELOR To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Public Transport for failing to provide an adequate level of public transport services over the Easter Holiday period as evidenced by customers being required to wait more than 45 minutes for a city-bound tram on the East Malvern route on the morning of Monday, April 4 1994.
- MR THOMSON (Pascoe Vale) To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Public Transport for his failure to ensure an adequate level of service for PTC customers who use the Broadmeadows railway line, as evidenced by the events of March 29, 1994 in relation to the 7.33 a.m. service from the City, when passengers were told when the train arrived at Essendon Station to board a bus for the rest of the trip, but passengers waiting at unstaffed stations further down the line were not told the train was not coming and had been replaced by a bus, and were left waiting on train platforms.
- 89 MR THWAITES To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Health for placing at risk the health of mothers and babies in Mitcham as a result of their early discharge from hospital following childbirth.
- 90 MS GARBUTT To move. That this House condemns the Minister for Health for her failure to ensure that mothers and babies in Oakleigh South are able to stay at least five days in maternity care tollowing the birth of their baby thus placing at risk the health and future well being of these Oakleigh South mothers and babies.
- 91 MR LEIGH To move, That this House condemns the Member for Springvale for his involvement in the previous Labor Government's decision to purchase a tip in Springvale South which is now owned by the Ministry of Planning and Development but which had been owned by Waverley Council and managed by Springvale Council and further condemns the Member for his involvement in ensuring that Victorian taxpayers would be responsible for the costs of containing

- 30 MR THOMSON (Pascoe Vale) To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Community Services for his action in cutting funding to the Dr Stanley Cochrane Pre-school in Mitcham, which has placed a heavy financial burden on many parents whose pre-school fees have risen from \$180 per year to \$480 per year.
- MR MICALLEF To move, That this House condemns the State Government for its continued failure to adequately secure the former Joseph Banks Secondary College site at Doveton, showing a disregard for the safety of local residents, allowing them to walk unhindered into an asbestos contaminated area and leaving a damage bill estimated at over \$60,000 some of which is to facilities which are to be retained by the community.
- MR HAERMEYER To move, That this House notes with concern that as a result of Government policies fees at the Mordialloc Kindergarten have increased from \$50 per term in 1993 to \$110 per term in 1994, with parents expected to pay an additional \$30 levy for excursions, and consequently, enrolments at this kindergarten have decreased from 50 in 1993 to 30 in 1994 and this House urges the Minister to implement policies to ensure affordable and quality pre-schools are available to all families in the Mordialloc area.

- 33 MS GARBUTT To move, That this House notes with concern that on average preschool fees on the Mornington Peninsular have doubled this year from \$49 to \$99 and further evidence suggests that at least 44 children have been excluded this year because parents cannot pay fees, 15 children have moved to day care as they can obtain fee relief, 20 children are on waiting lists due to reduced sessions and groups lost.
- 34 MS GARBUTT To move, That this House expresses its concerns at the failure of the Minister for Community Services to guarantee that all families living in Blackburn are able to afford to have their children attend pre-school, including those 15% of children who have not enrolled this year due to massive increase of 140% in preschool fees at Blackburn North Pre-school.
- 35 MS MARPLE To move, That this House notes with concern the failure of the State Government to require an environmental effects statement for the proposed redevelopment of the Crib Point Oil Facility despite the companies involved indicating that works will not proceed during 1994.

- DR COGHILL To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Employment and Industry for failing to introduce a job creation scheme for people in the Bendigo area as promised before the election where the Bendigo District share of Jobs created under the said scheme would be over 800, such jobs providing a much needed stimulus to the Bendigo economy at a time when 8,444 people were receiving unemployment benefits from Social Security offices in Bendigo and Kangaroo Flat in February, 1994 being 14.73% more than in February, 1993.

- 52 MR HAMILTON To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Youth Affairs for cutting totally funding to the Barwon Youth Information Service which has resulted in less information reaching young people in the Barwon area who are in desperate need of advice and support.
- 53 MR MILDENHALL To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Community Services for his action in cutting funding to the Gisborne Kindergarten, which has placed a heavy financial burden on many parents in the Gisborne area whose pre-school fees have risen by \$450 per child.
- MR PANDAZOPOULOS To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Community Services for Government policies that have cut funding to the Ontos Pre-school, which has lead to an increase in fees from \$30 per term to \$130 per term, resulting in severe hardship being endured by families for pre-school children in the Buchan Community.
- MS GARBUTT To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Community Services for his failure to provide an affordable pre-school at Mordialloc where due to the Minister's policies there has been a massive 100% increase in fees at the Elenora Pre-school causing extreme financial hardship for parents of pre-school children in the Mordialloc area.
- 56 MS MARPLE To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Community Services for his actions in cutting funding to kindergartens in Bendigo which has placed an extra financial burden on parents whose fees have doubled at the Bendigo Kindergarten in 1994.
- 57 MR BATCHELOR To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Public Transport for his failure to provide an adequate frequency of tram services from the City to West Preston and Mont Albert which has resulted in long delays for customers, as evidenced by patrons on Victoria Parade waiting up to 17 minutes for trams to the City on the Mont Albert route during the morning peak-hour on Thursday 17 March and Friday 18 March, 1994.

- 34 MS MARPLE To move, That this House notes with concern the failure of the State Government to require an environmental effects statement for the proposed redevelopment of the Crib Point Oil Facility despite the companies involved indicating that works will not proceed during 1994.

- 43 MR SHEEHAN To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Education who, with the support of the Member for Mordialloc, has implemented policies which have resulted in the loss of 20 teaching positions from schools in the Mordialloc Electorate, while enrolments have increased by in excess of 60.
- 44 MR MILDENHALL To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Youth Affairs for cutting funding to the Nunawading Youth Adult Bureau by \$16,000, resulting in reduced outreach services to youth in the Nunawading area at a time when charitable organisations in Nunawading are experiencing a 100% increase in demand for their services, and youth unemployment remains at disastrously high levels.
- 45 MR SERCOMBE To move, That this House condemns the Government for its education policies which have reduced the quality of education for children in the Monbulk electorate.
- 46 MS GARBUTT To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Community Services for Government policies that have led to a 88% increase in fees from \$45 to \$115 per term at the Greenhills Pre-school, resulting in severe financial hardship for many parents with pre-school children in the Greensborough and Eltham communities.
- 47 MR ANDRIANOPOULOS To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Education for failing to provide quality education to students at Bendigo Senior Secondary College due directly to government policies that have resulted in stopping the construction of a library and new classrooms at the school.
- 48 MRS WILSON To move, That this House notes with concern that the Minister for Education has failed to ensure a quality education for children at Cranbourne West Primary School, due to massive increases in class sizes at this school.
- 49 MR PANDAZOPOULOS To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Education for denying children at the Cranbourne South Primary School a quality education due to massive increases in class sizes at the school.
- DR COGHILL To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Employment and Industry for failing to introduce a job creation scheme for people in the Bendigo area as promised before the election where the Bendigo District share of Jobs created under the said scheme would be over 800, such jobs providing a much needed stimulus to the Bendigo economy at a time when 8,444 people were receiving unemployment benefits from Social Security offices in Bendigo and Kangaroo Flat in February, 1994 being 14.73% more than in February, 1993.
- 51 MR HAMILTON To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Youth Affairs for cutting totally funding to the Barwon Youth Information Service which has resulted in less information reaching young people in the Barwon area who are in desperate need of advice and support.

- 52 MR MILDENHALL To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Community Services for his action in cutting funding to the Gisborne Kindergarten, which has placed a heavy financial burden on many parents in the Gisborne area whose pre-school fees have risen by \$450 per child.
- 53 MR PANDAZOPOULOS To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Community Services for Government policies that have cut funding to the Ontos Pre-school, which has lead to an increase in fees from \$30 per term to \$130 per term, resulting in severe hardship being endured by families for pre-school children in the Buchan Community.
- MS GARBUTT To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Community Services for his failure to provide an affordable pre-school at Mordialloc where due to the Minister's policies there has been a massive 100% increase in fees at the Elenora Pre-school causing extreme financial hardship for parents of pre-school children in the Mordialloc area.
- 55 MS MARPLE To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Community Services for his actions in cutting funding to kindergartens in Bendigo which has placed an extra financial burden on parents whose fees have doubled at the Bendigo Kindergarten in 1994.
- 56 MR BATCHELOR To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Public Transport for his failure to provide an adequate frequency of tram services from the City to West Preston and Mont Albert which has resulted in long delays for customers, as evidenced by patrons on Victoria Parade waiting up to 17 minutes for trams to the City on the Mont Albert route during the morning peak-hour on Thursday 17 March and Friday 18 March, 1994.
- 57 MR PANDAZOPOULOS To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Public Transport for failing to ensure that services operated by the National Bus Company on route No. 256 between the City and La Trobe University run on time, as evidenced by delays of more than an hour between services on the afternoon of Thursday March 17, 1994.
- 58 MS GARBUTT To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Health for her failure to ensure that all mothers and babies in Bayswater are guaranteed a minimum of 5 days in maternity care if they need it following the birth of a child.
- 59 MR ANDRIANOPOULOS To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Education for his failure to provide a second Government school V.C.E. facility in Bendigo despite a pre-election promise of the Government to have a second V.C.E. facility "for the start of 1993" and his subsequent failure to have the said facility operational at the commencement of the 1994 school year.
- 60 MR SANDON To move, That this House condemns the Government for its failure to ensure all children at the Le Page School in Cheltenham are guaranteed a quality education due to massive increases in class sizes at the school.
- 61 MR MILDENHALL To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Community Services for ordering closed the only two reception facilities for emergency child abuse cases in the Western Suburbs, namely Buckland House and St Joseph's, in the face of his department's figures showing a 159% increase in child abuse notifications since the introduction of mandatory reporting.

- 63 MR COOPER To move, That this House censures the Honourable Member for Bundoora for attempting to use the abuse and death of Daniel Valerio to score cheap political points, and calls on the Honourable Member for Bundoora to apologise to this House, the family of Daniel Valerio and the Victorian Community for her inconsiderate and insensitive behaviour.
- 64 MR BATCHELOR To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Public Transport for reducing the size of the Bendigo Railway Workshops workforce from 270 in October, 1992 to under 180 causing job positions to be lost in Bendigo, notwithstanding pre-election comments by representatives of the current Government that the workforce would increase.
- 65 MR THWAITES To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Health for Government policies that have put mothers and babies in Boronia at risk due to their early release from hospital following childbirth.
- 66 MR MICALLEF To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Public Transport for his failure to ensure residents in Carrum Downs have access to adequate public transport in order to travel to their municipal base in Cranbourne.
- 67 MR MILDENHALL To move, That this House condemns the State Government for its failure to recognise the concerns of residents in Merinda Park regarding the Government's proposal for a Merinda Park Railway Station.
- 68 MS MARPLE To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Health for her failure to ensure that mothers and babies in Croydon are able to stay at least 5 days in maternity care following the birth of their child.

- 71 MR ROWE To move, That this House commends the Minister for Education for responding to the education needs of the Botany Park/Skye community in that he has recognised the need for additional facilities in the provision of additional building to the value of \$180,000, and commenced the process for the future expansion and rebuilding of Skye Primary School.
- 72 MR ROWE To move, That this House commends the Minister for Education for responding to the education needs of the Cranbourne South Community by the

- provision of \$180,000 in a new building which had not been provided by the previous government.
- 73 MR ROWE To move, That this House commends the Minister for Education for responding to the education needs of the Cranbourne community in addressing the urgent need for \$100,000 of maintenance works at the Lyndhurst Secondary College being part of the black hole backlog of maintenance totalling millions of dollars left by the previous Labor government.
- 74 MRS WILSON To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Local Government for the lack of input residents of the Borough of Eaglehawk have had into the proposed Local Government restructure, despite the fact that 70% of residents in Eaglehawk voted in the poll on the proposal and over 90% voted against amalgamation.
- 75 MR PANDAZOPOULOS To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Local Government for his failure to take account of the overwhelming 70% vote by the Bendigo community against council amalgamations on 29 January 1994 and forcing amalgamation of the five municipalities in the Bendigo area.
- 76 MR LEIGHTON To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Ivanhoe, the Honourable Vin Heffernan, for his failure to honour his commitment that the Liberal Government would restore full disadvantaged school program funding to schools in his electorate such as West Heidelberg Primary School and his advice to a parent of that school that there are no votes in West Heidelberg.
- 77 MR THWAITES To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Health for her failure to ensure that mothers and babies in Knox are able to stay at least 5 days in maternity care following the birth of their child thus placing at risk the health and future well-being of these mothers and babies.
- 78 MR THWAITES To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Health for her failure to ensure that mothers and babies in Ringwood are able to stay at least 5 days in maternity care following the birth of their child to ensure that the health and future well being of the mother and baby is not at risk.
- MR COOPER To move, That this House calls on all members of the Opposition to disassociate themselves from the actions of the Honourable Member for Thomastown who, in his then role as State Secretary of the Australian Labor Party, orchestrated a campaign to mislead and defraud voters in the re-election for the Nunawading Province in 1985, and requests that all Opposition members publicly support the demand that the Honourable Member for Thomastown disclose to the House all of the facts relating to his involvement in this scandal.
- 80 MS GARBUTT To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Community Services for failing to guarantee to parents in Ringwood an affordable and quality respite service for those children who have a disability.
- 81 MS GARBUTT To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Community Services for failing to guarantee to parents in Blackburn access to an affordable and quality respite service for children with a disability resulting in considerable financial hardship for these parents.

- 82 MR HAERMEYER To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Police and Emergency Services for failing to provide sufficient funds to enable the Victorian Police to properly service the municipalities of Knox, Ringwood, Croydon, Sherbrooke, Healesville, Lilydale and Upper Yarra, particularly noting that the local community is being asked to foot the bill for a \$120,000 police caravan to adequately serve the very obvious policing needs of these communities.

- 85 MR LONEY To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Sport, Recreation and Racing for his lack of commitment to ensure that people with an intellectual disability have access to appropriate sport and recreation activities as shown by the total defunding of the Victorian Sport and Recreation Association of Persons with an Intellectual Disability leaving people with an intellectual disability without a voice and a means to ensure that sport and recreation is available to all.
- 86 MR BATCHELOR To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Public Transport for failing to provide an adequate level of public transport services over the Easter Holiday period as evidenced by customers being required to wait more than 45 minutes for a city-bound tram on the East Malvern route on the morning of Monday, April 4 1994.
- 87 MR THOMSON (Pascoe Vale) To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Public Transport for his failure to ensure an adequate level of service for PTC customers who use the Broadmeadows railway line, as evidenced by the events of March 29, 1994 in relation to the 7.33 a.m. service from the City, when passengers were told when the train arrived at Essendon Station to board a bus for the rest of the trip, but passengers waiting at unstaffed stations further down the line were not told the train was not coming and had been replaced by a bus, and were left waiting on train platforms.
- 88 MR THWAITES To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Health for placing at risk the health of mothers and babies in Mitcham as a result of their early discharge from hospital following childbirth.
- 89 MS GARBUTT To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Health for her failure to ensure that mothers and babies in Oakleigh South are able to stay at least five days in maternity care following the birth of their baby thus placing at risk the health and future well being of these Oakleigh South mothers and babies.

- 90 MR LEIGH To move, That this House condemns the Member for Springvale for his involvement in the previous Labor Government's decision to purchase a tip in Springvale South which is now owned by the Ministry of Planning and Development but which had been owned by Waverley Council and managed by Springvale Council and further condemns the Member for his involvement in ensuring that Victorian taxpayers would be responsible for the costs of containing and cleaning up the pollution caused by the Council's disgraceful management practices.
- 91 MR LEIGH To move, That this House calls on the Leader of the Opposition to sack his political adviser Mr P Reed, the Mayor of Springvale, for his attempts to pump polluted tip waters into Melbourne Water's Braeside Park thereby putting the park at risk.
- 92 MR HAERMEYER To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Health for her failure to ensure that mothers and babies in Knoxfield are able to stay at least five days in maternity care following the birth of their baby thus placing at risk the health and future well being of these Knoxfield mothers and babies.
- 93 MR SANDON To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Education for his cuts to education funding at the Richmond West Primary School that have resulted in the loss of 9.5 teachers, an 18% increase in average class sizes, a 50% reduction in specialist programs, a 50% cut in reading recovery program and reduced professional development and program evaluation.
- 94 MR LEIGHTON To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Community Services for closure of cottage homes which has led to an increased demand for foster places in Blackburn, without also addressing the need for an increase in reimbursement rates for potential foster parents in the Blackburn area, described by the Children's Welfare Association of Victoria as being totally inadequate, thus leaving children without permanent placement.
- 95 MS GARBUTT To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Community Services for budget cuts which have seen services to physically and intellectually disabled people severely reduced at Kew Cottages, with recreation programs cut by more than half and the staff-client ratio falling to dangerous levels with plans for more reductions, resulting in poor staff morale and increased trauma and stress for long suffering parents at Kew Cottages.
- 96 MR PANDAZOPOULOS To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Community Services for his Government policies that have led to a massive 100% increase in fees at the All Saints Pre-School which has denied children from migrant and low income families in the Nunawading area access to pre-school.
- 97 MR LEIGHTON To move, That this House refers to the Privileges Committee for examination and report the matter of whether the Minister for Industry and Employment, the Honourable Phillip Gude, has committed a contempt in that he deliberately misled the House in that -
  - In a question without notice on 31 March 1994 the Leader of the Opposition referred the Minister to a briefing to heads of statutory authorities at which Mr Ian Douglas, QC outlined the State Government's position on changes to the Federal Industrial Relations Act;

- In answer the Minister for Industry and Employment stated in part that the meeting was not to provide a briefing on changes to the Federal Industrial Legislation nor was any reference made to any major changes to the Federal Industrial Relations Act;
- The agenda of the briefing to statutory authority heads which shows under item 2 "Employee Relations Minister for Industry and Employment" at 2(ii) "The Federal Legislation Implications and Options Ian Douglas";
- 4 Notes of the briefing to statutory authority heads of 15 March 1994 made available to the State Opposition which record the briefing given by Ian Douglas, QC on the Federal Legislation; and
- The response by the Minister for Industry and Employment on the adjournment debate of 31 March 1994 to the matter raised by the Member for Preston, where the Minister failed to alter the substance of his earlier response to the Leader of the Opposition.
- 98 MR THOMSON (Pascoe Vale) To move, That this House notes with concern that the Government has spent more money on advertising campaigns and self-promotion involving the Minister for Industry and Employment than it plans to spend on assistance for the Snow Brand Pty Ltd, milk products company in its investment in a new plant at Tatura.
- 99 MRS WILSON To move, That this House congratulates Vizy Board's \$50 million expansion of a Cardboard Box Factory at Dandenong which will create new jobs for people living in Dandenong, one of the hardest hit areas by unemployment.
- 100 MR LONEY To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Education for cuts in education funding which have led to reduced learning opportunities for students in Geelong North and a wastage of library resources in primary schools in Geelong North.

- 103 MS GARBUTT To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Community Services for his failure to provide to parents in Frankston access to an affordable and quality facility-based respite service for their children who have a disability thus placing financial pressures on these Frankston families.

- 104 MR BATCHELOR To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Public Transport for failing to ensure the co-ordination of rail and bus services in the Watsonia area, as evidenced by local buses that stop at the Watsonia railway station not meeting trains arriving at the station, and drivers refusing to wait for disembarking passengers who wish to catch the bus.

- 9 That the Committee shall keep a record of all evidence given before it and determinations made by it.
- 10 That the Committee have power to authorize publication of any evidence given before it in public and any document presented to it.
- 11 That as soon as practicable after the completion of each day's proceedings a transcript of the evidence taken in public by the Committee shall be published.
- 12 That the foregoing provisions of this resolution so far as they are inconsistent with the Standing Orders and practices of the Houses shall have effect notwithstanding anything contained in those Standing Orders.

- 27 MR LEIGH To move, That this House condemns the Leader of the Opposition Mr J Brumby and Members of the Opposition for their failure to disassociate themselves from the activities of the Member for Clayton in his failure to repay in adequate time monies that he owed the Ministry of Education.

- 29 MR THOMSON (Pascoe Vale) To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Community Services for his action in cutting funding to the Dr Stanley Cochrane Pre-school in Mitcham, which has placed a heavy financial burden on many parents whose pre-school fees have risen from \$180 per year to \$480 per year.
- 30 MR MICALLEF To move, That this House condemns the State Government for its continued failure to adequately secure the former Joseph Banks Secondary College site at Doveton, showing a disregard for the safety of local residents, allowing them to walk unhindered into an asbestos contaminated area and leaving a damage bill estimated at over \$60,000 some of which is to facilities which are to be retained by the community.
- 31 MR HAERMEYER To move, That this House notes with concern that as a result of Government policies fees at the Mordialloc Kindergarten have increased from \$50 per term in 1993 to \$110 per term in 1994, with parents expected to pay an additional \$30 levy for excursions, and consequently, enrolments at this kindergarten have decreased from 50 in 1993 to 30 in 1994 and this House urges the Minister to implement policies to ensure affordable and quality pre-schools are available to all families in the Mordialloc area.
- 32 MS GARBUTT To move, That this House notes with concern that on average preschool fees on the Mornington Peninsular have doubled this year from \$49 to \$99 and further evidence suggests that at least 44 children have been excluded this year because parents cannot pay fees, 15 children have moved to day care as they can obtain fee relief, 20 children are on waiting lists due to reduced sessions and groups lost.
- 33 MS GARBUTT To move, That this House expresses its concerns at the failure of the Minister for Community Services to guarantee that all families living in Blackburn are able to afford to have their children attend pre-school, including those 15% of children who have not enrolled this year due to massive increase of 140% in preschool fees at Blackburn North Pre-school.
- 34 MS MARPLE To move, That this House notes with concern the failure of the State Government to require an environmental effects statement for the proposed redevelopment of the Crib Point Oil Facility despite the companies involved indicating that works will not proceed during 1994.

- 35 MRS WILSON To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Fair Trading for her Government's actions in eroding the resources available to consumers for information and protection, through the closure of the regional offices of the Office of Fair Trading in Ringwood and Dandenong, thus making it difficult for people living in the outer suburbs to access these services.
- 36 MR SEITZ To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Community Services for Government policies which have lead to an increase of kindergarten fees at Indra Pre-school in Blackburn South from \$180 to \$500 a year, resulting in severe hardships being endured by families of Pre-school children in the Blackburn area.
- 37 MR HAMILTON To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Public Transport for the appalling level of service for commuters travelling to Bairnsdale via Sale, since the abolition of the Rail Service between Bairnsdale and Sale, including the lack of shelter and passenger amenities at Bairnsdale and inconvenience caused by long delays in bus and train connections.
- 38 MR ANDRIANOPOULOS To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Public Transport for the premature introduction of driver only trains on the Alamein line, which because of 'blind spots' created by the design of station platforms along this line, has resulted in passengers being placed in great danger when boarding and alighting from trains, due to the inability of drivers to clearly see whether passengers are clear of the train before departing.
- 39 MR THOMSON (Pascoe Vale) To move, That this House condemns the Government for its massive increases in class sizes at Antonio Park Primary School which have led to a reduced quality of education at that school.
- 40 MR DOLLIS To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Planning for his intervention in the Knox Council decision regarding a proposed Fast Food Restaurant in Rowville as yet another example of this Government's overriding of Local Government Planning Schemes and decisions, thereby undermining the role of Local Government and showing complete disregard for the rights and wishes of Knox residents.
- 41 MR HAERMEYER To move, That this House condemns the Minister for School Education for Government Education Policies which have lead to massive increases in class sizes at Antonio Park Primary School whilst teaching staff numbers have been significantly reduced, resulting in dislocation of students and the inability of staff to provide the optimum level of quality education that Antonio Park Primary students so richly deserve.
- 42 MS MARPLE To move, That the House condemns the Minister for Community Services for his failure to provide an affordable pre-school at Croydon Central where due to the Minister's policies there has been a massive 88% increase in fees from \$160 in 1993 to \$300 in 1994.
- 43 MR SHEEHAN To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Education who, with the support of the Member for Mordialloc, has implemented policies which have resulted in the loss of 20 teaching positions from schools in the Mordialloc Electorate, while enrolments have increased by in excess of 60.

- 44 MR MILDENHALL To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Youth Affairs for cutting funding to the Nunawading Youth Adult Bureau by \$16,000, resulting in reduced outreach services to youth in the Nunawading area at a time when charitable organisations in Nunawading are experiencing a 100% increase in demand for their services, and youth unemployment remains at disastrously high levels.
- 45 MR SERCOMBE To move, That this House condemns the Government for its education policies which have reduced the quality of education for children in the Monbulk electorate.
- 46 MS GARBUTT To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Community Services for Government policies that have led to a 88% increase in fees from \$45 to \$115 per term at the Greenhills Pre-school, resulting in severe financial hardship for many parents with pre-school children in the Greensborough and Eltham communities.
- 47 MR ANDRIANOPOULOS To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Education for failing to provide quality education to students at Bendigo Senior Secondary College due directly to government policies that have resulted in stopping the construction of a library and new classrooms at the school.
- 48 MRS WILSON To move, That this House notes with concern that the Minister for Education has failed to ensure a quality education for children at Cranbourne West Primary School, due to massive increases in class sizes at this school.
- 49 MR PANDAZOPOULOS To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Education for denying children at the Cranbourne South Primary School a quality education due to massive increases in class sizes at the school.
- 50 DR COGHILL To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Employment and Industry for failing to introduce a job creation scheme for people in the Bendigo area as promised before the election where the Bendigo District share of Jobs created under the said scheme would be over 800, such jobs providing a much needed stimulus to the Bendigo economy at a time when 8,444 people were receiving unemployment benefits from Social Security offices in Bendigo and Kangaroo Flat in February, 1994 being 14.73% more than in February, 1993.
- 51 MR HAMILTON To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Youth Affairs for cutting totally funding to the Barwon Youth Information Service which has resulted in less information reaching young people in the Barwon area who are in desperate need of advice and support.
- 52 MR MILDENHALL To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Community Services for his action in cutting funding to the Gisborne Kindergarten, which has placed a heavy financial burden on many parents in the Gisborne area whose pre-school fees have risen by \$450 per child.
- MR PANDAZOPOULOS To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Community Services for Government policies that have cut funding to the Ontos Pre-school, which has lead to an increase in fees from \$30 per term to \$130 per term, resulting in severe hardship being endured by families for pre-school children in the Buchan Community.

- MS GARBUTT To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Community Services for his failure to provide an affordable pre-school at Mordialloc where due to the Minister's policies there has been a massive 100% increase in fees at the Elenora Pre-school causing extreme financial hardship for parents of pre-school children in the Mordialloc area.
- 55 MS MARPLE To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Community Services for his actions in cutting funding to kindergartens in Bendigo which has placed an extra financial burden on parents whose fees have doubled at the Bendigo Kindergarten in 1994.

- 57 MR PANDAZOPOULOS To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Public Transport for failing to ensure that services operated by the National Bus Company on route No. 256 between the City and La Trobe University run on time, as evidenced by delays of more than an hour between services on the afternoon of Thursday March 17, 1994.
- 58 MS GARBUTT To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Health for her failure to ensure that all mothers and babies in Bayswater are guaranteed a minimum of 5 days in maternity care if they need it following the birth of a child.
- 59 MR ANDRIANOPOULOS To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Education for his failure to provide a second Government school V.C.E. facility in Bendigo despite a pre-election promise of the Government to have a second V.C.E. facility "for the start of 1993" and his subsequent failure to have the said facility operational at the commencement of the 1994 school year.
- 60 MR SANDON To move, That this House condemns the Government for its failure to ensure all children at the Le Page School in Cheltenham are guaranteed a quality education due to massive increases in class sizes at the school.

- 63 MR COOPER To move, That this House censures the Honourable Member for Bundoora for attempting to use the abuse and death of Daniel Valerio to score cheap political points, and calls on the Honourable Member for Bundoora to apologise to this House, the family of Daniel Valerio and the Victorian Community for her inconsiderate and insensitive behaviour.

- 64 MR BATCHELOR To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Public Transport for reducing the size of the Bendigo Railway Workshops workforce from 270 in October, 1992 to under 180 causing job positions to be lost in Bendigo, notwithstanding pre-election comments by representatives of the current Government that the workforce would increase.
- 65 MR THWAITES To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Health for Government policies that have put mothers and babies in Boronia at risk due to their early release from hospital following childbirth.
- 66 MR MICALLEF To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Public Transport for his failure to ensure residents in Carrum Downs have access to adequate public transport in order to travel to their municipal base in Cranbourne.
- 67 MR MILDENHALL To move, That this House condemns the State Government for its failure to recognise the concerns of residents in Merinda Park regarding the Government's proposal for a Merinda Park Railway Station.
- 68 MS MARPLE To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Health for her failure to ensure that mothers and babies in Croydon are able to stay at least 5 days in maternity care following the birth of their child.

- 77 MR THWAITES To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Health for her failure to ensure that mothers and babies in Knox are able to stay at least 5 days in maternity care following the birth of their child thus placing at risk the health and future well-being of these mothers and babies.
- 78 MR THWAITES To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Health for her failure to ensure that mothers and babies in Ringwood are able to stay at least 5 days in maternity care following the birth of their child to ensure that the health and future well being of the mother and baby is not at risk.
- 79 MR COOPER To move, That this House calls on all members of the Opposition to disassociate themselves from the actions of the Honourable Member for Thomastown who, in his then role as State Secretary of the Australian Labor Party, orchestrated a campaign to mislead and defraud voters in the re-election for the Nunawading Province in 1985, and requests that all Opposition members publicly support the demand that the Honourable Member for Thomastown disclose to the House all of the facts relating to his involvement in this scandal.
- 80 MS GARBUTT To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Community Services for failing to guarantee to parents in Ringwood an affordable and quality respite service for those children who have a disability.

- 86 MR BATCHELOR To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Public Transport for failing to provide an adequate level of public transport services over the Easter Holiday period as evidenced by customers being required to wait more than 45 minutes for a city-bound tram on the East Malvern route on the morning of Monday, April 4 1994.
- 87 MR THOMSON (Pascoe Vale) To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Public Transport for his failure to ensure an adequate level of service for PTC customers who use the Broadmeadows railway line, as evidenced by the events of March 29, 1994 in relation to the 7.33 a.m. service from the City, when passengers were told when the train arrived at Essendon Station to board a bus for the rest of the trip, but passengers waiting at unstaffed stations further down the line were not told the train was not coming and had been replaced by a bus, and were left waiting on train platforms.
- 88 MR THWAITES To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Health for placing at risk the health of mothers and babies in Mitcham as a result of their early discharge from hospital following childbirth.
- 89 MS GARBUTT To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Health for her failure to ensure that mothers and babies in Oakleigh South are able to stay at least five days in maternity care following the birth of their baby thus placing at risk the health and future well being of these Oakleigh South mothers and babies.
- 90 MR LEIGH To move, That this House condemns the Member for Springvale for his involvement in the previous Labor Government's decision to purchase a tip in Springvale South which is now owned by the Ministry of Planning and Development but which had been owned by Waverley Council and managed by Springvale Council and further condemns the Member for his involvement in ensuring that Victorian taxpayers would be responsible for the costs of containing

- and cleaning up the pollution caused by the Council's disgraceful management practices.
- 91 MR LEIGH To move, That this House calls on the Leader of the Opposition to sack his political adviser Mr P Reed, the Mayor of Springvale, for his attempts to pump polluted tip waters into Melbourne Water's Braeside Park thereby putting the park at risk.
- 92 MR HAERMEYER To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Health for her failure to ensure that mothers and babies in Knoxfield are able to stay at least five days in maternity care following the birth of their baby thus placing at risk the health and future well being of these Knoxfield mothers and babies.
- 93 MR SANDON To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Education for his cuts to education funding at the Richmond West Primary School that have resulted in the loss of 9.5 teachers, an 18% increase in average class sizes, a 50% reduction in specialist programs, a 50% cut in reading recovery program and reduced professional development and program evaluation.

- 96 MR PANDAZOPOULOS To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Community Services for his Government policies that have led to a massive 100% increase in fees at the All Saints Pre-School which has denied children from migrant and low income families in the Nunawading area access to pre-school.
- 97 MR LEIGHTON To move, That this House refers to the Privileges Committee for examination and report the matter of whether the Minister for Industry and Employment, the Honourable Phillip Gude, has committed a contempt in that he deliberately misled the House in that -
  - In a question without notice on 31 March 1994 the Leader of the Opposition referred the Minister to a briefing to heads of statutory authorities at which Mr Ian Douglas, QC outlined the State Government's position on changes to the Federal Industrial Relations Act;
  - In answer the Minister for Industry and Employment stated in part that the meeting was not to provide a briefing on changes to the Federal Industrial Legislation nor was any reference made to any major changes to the Federal Industrial Relations Act;
  - The agenda of the briefing to statutory authority heads which shows under item 2 "Employee Relations Minister for Industry and Employment" at 2(ii) "The Federal Legislation Implications and Options Ian Douglas";

- 4 Notes of the briefing to statutory authority heads of 15 March 1994 made available to the State Opposition which record the briefing given by Ian Douglas, QC on the Federal Legislation; and
- The response by the Minister for Industry and Employment on the adjournment debate of 31 March 1994 to the matter raised by the Member for Preston, where the Minister failed to alter the substance of his earlier response to the Leader of the Opposition.
- 98 MRTHOMSON (Pascoe Vale) To move, That this House notes with concern that the Government has spent more money on advertising campaigns and self-promotion involving the Minister for Industry and Employment than it plans to spend on assistance for the Snow Brand Pty Ltd, milk products company in its investment in a new plant at Tatura.
- 99 MRS WILSON To move, That this House congratulates Vizy Board's \$50 million expansion of a Cardboard Box Factory at Dandenong which will create new jobs for people living in Dandenong, one of the hardest hit areas by unemployment.
- 100 MR LONEY To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Education for cuts in education funding which have led to reduced learning opportunities for students in Geelong North and a wastage of library resources in primary schools in Geelong North.

- 37 MR HAMILTON To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Public Transport for the appalling level of service for commuters travelling to Bairnsdale via Sale, since the abolition of the Rail Service between Bairnsdale and Sale, including the lack of shelter and passenger amenities at Bairnsdale and inconvenience caused by long delays in bus and train connections.
- 38 MR ANDRIANOPOULOS To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Public Transport for the premature introduction of driver only trains on the Alamein line, which because of 'blind spots' created by the design of station platforms along this line, has resulted in passengers being placed in great danger when boarding and alighting from trains, due to the inability of drivers to clearly see whether passengers are clear of the train before departing.
- 39 MR THOMSON (Pascoe Vale) To move, That this House condemns the Government for its massive increases in class sizes at Antonio Park Primary School which have led to a reduced quality of education at that school.
- 40 MR DOLLIS To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Planning for his intervention in the Knox Council decision regarding a proposed Fast Food Restaurant in Rowville as yet another example of this Government's overriding of Local Government Planning Schemes and decisions, thereby undermining the role of Local Government and showing complete disregard for the rights and wishes of Knox residents.
- 41 MR HAERMEYER To move, That this House condemns the Minister for School Education for Government Education Policies which have lead to massive increases in class sizes at Antonio Park Primary School whilst teaching staff numbers have been significantly reduced, resulting in dislocation of students and the inability of staff to provide the optimum level of quality education that Antonio Park Primary students so richly deserve.
- 42 MS MARPLE To move, That the House condemns the Minister for Community Services for his failure to provide an affordable pre-school at Croydon Central where due to the Minister's policies there has been a massive 88% increase in fees from \$160 in 1993 to \$300 in 1994.

- 43 MR SHEEHAN To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Education who, with the support of the Member for Mordialloc, has implemented policies which have resulted in the loss of 20 teaching positions from schools in the Mordialloc Electorate, while enrolments have increased by in excess of 60.
- MR MILDENHALL To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Youth Affairs for cutting funding to the Nunawading Youth Adult Bureau by \$16,000, resulting in reduced outreach services to youth in the Nunawading area at a time when charitable organisations in Nunawading are experiencing a 100% increase in demand for their services, and youth unemployment remains at disastrously high levels.
- 45 MR SERCOMBE To move, That this House condemns the Government for its education policies which have reduced the quality of education for children in the Monbulk electorate.
- 46 MS GARBUTT To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Community Services for Government policies that have led to a 88% increase in fees from \$45 to \$115 per term at the Greenhills Pre-school, resulting in severe financial hardship for many parents with pre-school children in the Greensborough and Eltham communities.
- 47 MR ANDRIANOPOULOS To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Education for failing to provide quality education to students at Bendigo Senior Secondary College due directly to government policies that have resulted in stopping the construction of a library and new classrooms at the school.
- 48 MRS WILSON To move, That this House notes with concern that the Minister for Education has failed to ensure a quality education for children at Cranbourne West Primary School, due to massive increases in class sizes at this school.
- 49 MR PANDAZOPOULOS To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Education for denying children at the Cranbourne South Primary School a quality education due to massive increases in class sizes at the school.
- DR COGHILL To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Employment and Industry for failing to introduce a job creation scheme for people in the Bendigo area as promised before the election where the Bendigo District share of Jobs created under the said scheme would be over 800, such jobs providing a much needed stimulus to the Bendigo economy at a time when 8,444 people were receiving unemployment benefits from Social Security offices in Bendigo and Kangaroo Flat in February, 1994 being 14.73% more than in February, 1993.
- MR HAMILTON To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Youth Affairs for cutting totally funding to the Barwon Youth Information Service which has resulted in less information reaching young people in the Barwon area who are in desperate need of advice and support.
- 52 MR MILDENHALL To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Community Services for his action in cutting funding to the Gisborne Kindergarten, which has placed a heavy financial burden on many parents in the Gisborne area whose pre-school fees have risen by \$450 per child.

- MR PANDAZOPOULOS To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Community Services for Government policies that have cut funding to the Ontos Pre-school, which has lead to an increase in fees from \$30 per term to \$130 per term, resulting in severe hardship being endured by families for pre-school children in the Buchan Community.
- MS GARBUTT To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Community Services for his failure to provide an affordable pre-school at Mordialloc where due to the Minister's policies there has been a massive 100% increase in fees at the Elenora Pre-school causing extreme financial hardship for parents of pre-school children in the Mordialloc area.
- MS MARPLE To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Community Services for his actions in cutting funding to kindergartens in Bendigo which has placed an extra financial burden on parents whose fees have doubled at the Bendigo Kindergarten in 1994.
- MR BATCHELOR To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Public Transport for his failure to provide an adequate frequency of tram services from the City to West Preston and Mont Albert which has resulted in long delays for customers, as evidenced by patrons on Victoria Parade waiting up to 17 minutes for trams to the City on the Mont Albert route during the morning peak-hour on Thursday 17 March and Friday 18 March, 1994.
- 57 MR PANDAZOPOULOS To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Public Transport for failing to ensure that services operated by the National Bus Company on route No. 256 between the City and La Trobe University run on time, as evidenced by delays of more than an hour between services on the afternoon of Thursday March 17, 1994.
- 58 MS GARBUTT To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Health for her failure to ensure that all mothers and babies in Bayswater are guaranteed a minimum of 5 days in maternity care if they need it following the birth of a child.
- 59 MR ANDRIANOPOULOS To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Education for his failure to provide a second Government school V.C.E. facility in Bendigo despite a pre-election promise of the Government to have a second V.C.E. facility "for the start of 1993" and his subsequent failure to have the said facility operational at the commencement of the 1994 school year.
- 60 MR SANDON To move, That this House condemns the Government for its failure to ensure all children at the Le Page School in Cheltenham are guaranteed a quality education due to massive increases in class sizes at the school.
- 61 MR MILDENHALL To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Community Services for ordering closed the only two reception facilities for emergency child abuse cases in the Western Suburbs, namely Buckland House and St Joseph's, in the face of his department's figures showing a 159% increase in child abuse notifications since the introduction of mandatory reporting.
- 62 MR THOMSON (Pascoe Vale) To move, That this House censures Mr Speaker for his failure to allow the Member for Sunshine and other Honourable Members to raise matters on the Adjournment Debate on Thursday 24 March 1994, in breach of the entitlements of Honourable Members provided for by the Sessional Orders.

- 63 MR COOPER To move, That this House censures the Honourable Member for Bundoora for attempting to use the abuse and death of Daniel Valerio to score cheap political points, and calls on the Honourable Member for Bundoora to apologise to this House, the family of Daniel Valerio and the Victorian Community for her inconsiderate and insensitive behaviour.
- MR BATCHELOR To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Public Transport for reducing the size of the Bendigo Railway Workshops workforce from 270 in October, 1992 to under 180 causing job positions to be lost in Bendigo, notwithstanding pre-election comments by representatives of the current Government that the workforce would increase.
- 65 MR THWAITES To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Health for Government policies that have put mothers and babies in Boronia at risk due to their early release from hospital following childbirth.
- 66 MR MICALLEF To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Public Transport for his failure to ensure residents in Carrum Downs have access to adequate public transport in order to travel to their municipal base in Cranbourne.
- 67 MR MILDENHALL To move, That this House condemns the State Government for its failure to recognise the concerns of residents in Merinda Park regarding the Government's proposal for a Merinda Park Railway Station.
- 68 MS MARPLE To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Health for her failure to ensure that mothers and babies in Croydon are able to stay at least 5 days in maternity care following the birth of their child.
- MR COOPER To move, That this House notes the involvement of the Honourable Member for Thomastown, in his then role as State Secretary of the Australian Labor Party, to manipulate the result of the Nunawading Province re-election in 1985 and his subsequent refusal to co-operate with the police investigation of this scandal, and calls on the Honourable Member for Thomastown to disclose the full facts of his and other Australian Labor Party members involvement.
- 70 MS MARPLE To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Agriculture for his lack of commitment to unemployed people in Bendigo by failing to relocate the Department of Agriculture to Bendigo and thus provide 130 jobs in Bendigo as promised by the Government.
- 71 MR ROWE To move, That this House commends the Minister for Education for responding to the education needs of the Botany Park/Skye community in that he has recognised the need for additional facilities in the provision of additional building to the value of \$180,000, and commenced the process for the future expansion and rebuilding of Skye Primary School.
- 72 MR ROWE To move, That this House commends the Minister for Education for responding to the education needs of the Cranbourne South Community by the provision of \$180,000 in a new building which had not been provided by the previous government.

- 73 MR ROWE To move, That this House commends the Minister for Education for responding to the education needs of the Cranbourne community in addressing the urgent need for \$100,000 of maintenance works at the Lyndhurst Secondary College being part of the black hole backlog of maintenance totalling millions of dollars left by the previous Labor government.
- 74 MRS WILSON To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Local Government for the lack of input residents of the Borough of Eaglehawk have had into the proposed Local Government restructure, despite the fact that 70% of residents in Eaglehawk voted in the poll on the proposal and over 90% voted against amalgamation.
- 75 MR PANDAZOPOULOS To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Local Government for his failure to take account of the overwhelming 70% vote by the Bendigo community against council amalgamations on 29 January 1994 and forcing amalgamation of the five municipalities in the Bendigo area.
- 76 MR LEIGHTON To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Ivanhoe, the Honourable Vin Heffernan, for his failure to honour his commitment that the Liberal Government would restore full disadvantaged school program funding to schools in his electorate such as West Heidelberg Primary School and his advice to a parent of that school that there are no votes in West Heidelberg.
- 77 MR THWAITES To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Health for her failure to ensure that mothers and babies in Knox are able to stay at least 5 days in maternity care following the birth of their child thus placing at risk the health and future well-being of these mothers and babies.
- 78 MR THWAITES To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Health for her failure to ensure that mothers and babies in Ringwood are able to stay at least 5 days in maternity care following the birth of their child to ensure that the health and future well being of the mother and baby is not at risk.
- MR COOPER To move, That this House calls on all members of the Opposition to disassociate themselves from the actions of the Honourable Member for Thomastown who, in his then role as State Secretary of the Australian Labor Party, orchestrated a campaign to mislead and defraud voters in the re-election for the Nunawading Province in 1985, and requests that all Opposition members publicly support the demand that the Honourable Member for Thomastown disclose to the House all of the facts relating to his involvement in this scandal.
- 80 MS GARBUTT To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Community Services for failing to guarantee to parents in Ringwood an affordable and quality respite service for those children who have a disability.
- 81 MS GARBUTT To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Community Services for failing to guarantee to parents in Blackburn access to an affordable and quality respite service for children with a disability resulting in considerable financial hardship for these parents.

- 82 MR HAERMEYER To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Police and Emergency Services for failing to provide sufficient funds to enable the Victorian Police to properly service the municipalities of Knox, Ringwood, Croydon, Sherbrooke, Healesville, Lilydale and Upper Yarra, particularly noting that the local community is being asked to foot the bill for a \$120,000 police caravan to adequately serve the very obvious policing needs of these communities.
- MR HAERMEYER To move, That this House condemns the Member for Bayswater for failing to represent the interests of his constituents and to live up to his promise to "provide the Victorian Police with the resources it needs to protect the community", noting: (a) The member's failure to stand up for his community when his Government cancelled the contract to provide a new police station for Bayswater; and (b) The member's failure to act on behalf of the local community in response to demands that the local community foot the bill for a \$120,000 mobile police caravan that the community urgently needs.
- MR DOLLIS To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Planning for not consulting with Eltham residents or allowing them direct input into the Government's decision whether to allow 24 hour trading in residential areas, thereby further lessening the rights of Eltham residents to participate in planning issues which will affect their amenities and living conditions, as well as altering the nature of their neighbourhoods.
- MR LONEY To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Sport, Recreation and Racing for his lack of commitment to ensure that people with an intellectual disability have access to appropriate sport and recreation activities as shown by the total defunding of the Victorian Sport and Recreation Association of Persons with an Intellectual Disability leaving people with an intellectual disability without a voice and a means to ensure that sport and recreation is available to all.
- MR BATCHELOR To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Public Transport for failing to provide an adequate level of public transport services over the Easter Holiday period as evidenced by customers being required to wait more than 45 minutes for a city-bound tram on the East Malvern route on the morning of Monday, April 4 1994.
- MR THOMSON (Pascoe Vale) To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Public Transport for his failure to ensure an adequate level of service for PTC customers who use the Broadmeadows railway line, as evidenced by the events of March 29, 1994 in relation to the 7.33 a.m. service from the City, when passengers were told when the train arrived at Essendon Station to board a bus for the rest of the trip, but passengers waiting at unstaffed stations further down the line were not told the train was not coming and had been replaced by a bus, and were left waiting on train platforms.
- 88 MR THWAITES To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Health for placing at risk the health of mothers and babies in Mitcham as a result of their early discharge from hospital following childbirth.
- 89 MS GARBUTT To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Health for her failure to ensure that mothers and babies in Oakleigh South are able to stay at least five days in maternity care following the birth of their baby thus placing at risk the health and future well being of these Oakleigh South mothers and babies.

- 90 MR LEIGH To move, That this House condemns the Member for Springvale for his involvement in the previous Labor Government's decision to purchase a tip in Springvale South which is now owned by the Ministry of Planning and Development but which had been owned by Waverley Council and managed by Springvale Council and further condemns the Member for his involvement in ensuring that Victorian taxpayers would be responsible for the costs of containing and cleaning up the pollution caused by the Council's disgraceful management practices.
- 91 MR LEIGH To move, That this House calls on the Leader of the Opposition to sack his political adviser Mr P Reed, the Mayor of Springvale, for his attempts to pump polluted tip waters into Melbourne Water's Braeside Park thereby putting the park at risk.
- 92 MR HAERMEYER To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Health for her failure to ensure that mothers and babies in Knoxfield are able to stay at least five days in maternity care following the birth of their baby thus placing at risk the health and future well being of these Knoxfield mothers and babies.
- 93 MR SANDON To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Education for his cuts to education funding at the Richmond West Primary School that have resulted in the loss of 9.5 teachers, an 18% increase in average class sizes, a 50% reduction in specialist programs, a 50% cut in reading recovery program and reduced professional development and program evaluation.
- 94 MR LEIGHTON To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Community Services for closure of cottage homes which has led to an increased demand for foster places in Blackburn, without also addressing the need for an increase in reimbursement rates for potential foster parents in the Blackburn area, described by the Children's Welfare Association of Victoria as being totally inadequate, thus leaving children without permanent placement.
- 95 MS GARBUTT To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Community Services for budget cuts which have seen services to physically and intellectually disabled people severely reduced at Kew Cottages, with recreation programs cut by more than half and the staff-client ratio falling to dangerous levels with plans for more reductions, resulting in poor staff morale and increased trauma and stress for long suffering parents at Kew Cottages.
- 96 MR PANDAZOPOULOS To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Community Services for his Government policies that have led to a massive 100% increase in fees at the All Saints Pre-School which has denied children from migrant and low income families in the Nunawading area access to pre-school.
- 97 MR LEIGHTON To move, That this House refers to the Privileges Committee for examination and report the matter of whether the Minister for Industry and Employment, the Honourable Phillip Gude, has committed a contempt in that he deliberately misled the House in that -
  - In a question without notice on 31 March 1994 the Leader of the Opposition referred the Minister to a briefing to heads of statutory authorities at which Mr Ian Douglas, QC outlined the State Government's position on changes to the Federal Industrial Relations Act;

- In answer the Minister for Industry and Employment stated in part that the meeting was not to provide a briefing on changes to the Federal Industrial Legislation nor was any reference made to any major changes to the Federal Industrial Relations Act;
- The agenda of the briefing to statutory authority heads which shows under item 2 "Employee Relations Minister for Industry and Employment" at 2(ii) "The Federal Legislation Implications and Options Ian Douglas";
- Notes of the briefing to statutory authority heads of 15 March 1994 made available to the State Opposition which record the briefing given by Ian Douglas, QC on the Federal Legislation; and
- The response by the Minister for Industry and Employment on the adjournment debate of 31 March 1994 to the matter raised by the Member for Preston, where the Minister failed to alter the substance of his earlier response to the Leader of the Opposition.
- 98 MR THOMSON (Pascoe Vale) To move, That this House notes with concern that the Government has spent more money on advertising campaigns and self-promotion involving the Minister for Industry and Employment than it plans to spend on assistance for the Snow Brand Pty Ltd, milk products company in its investment in a new plant at Tatura.
- 99 MRS WILSON To move, That this House congratulates Vizy Board's \$50 million expansion of a Cardboard Box Factory at Dandenong which will create new jobs for people living in Dandenong, one of the hardest hit areas by unemployment.
- 100 MR LONEY To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Education for cuts in education funding which have led to reduced learning opportunities for students in Geelong North and a wastage of library resources in primary schools in Geelong North.
- 101 MR BATCHELOR To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Public Transport for his failure to provide adequate rail service to country Victoria over the Easter holiday period as evidenced by the poor level of service on the Melbourne-Swan Hill train including on the 1.30 p.m. service from Swan Hill on April 4th the air conditioning was not working properly so that it was extremely hot in passenger carriages and passengers were repeatedly told en route that the train would not stop at Sunshine, however it did, resulting in needless inconvenience for many passengers who had been led to believe that their only alternative was to disembark at St Albans or Spencer Street.
- MR ANDRIANOPOULOS To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Health for not addressing the urgent need for more funds to be made available for child and adolescent psychiatric services at the Maroondah Hospital Psychiatric Unit which has resulted in a 9 month waiting period for patients causing untold strain and risk on families in the outer east.
- 103 MS GARBUTT To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Community Services for his failure to provide to parents in Frankston access to an affordable and quality facility-based respite service for their children who have a disability thus placing financial pressures on these Frankston families.

- 104 MR BATCHELOR To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Public Transport for failing to ensure the co-ordination of rail and bus services in the Watsonia area, as evidenced by local buses that stop at the Watsonia railway station not meeting trains arriving at the station, and drivers refusing to wait for disembarking passengers who wish to catch the bus.
- MS MARPLE To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Community Services for his policies that have led to massive increases in fees at the Merinda Park Pre-school and that have left children at the pre-school without milk or excursions.

- 107 MR DOLLIS To move, That this House condemns the State Government for its failure to ensure the completion of beach restoration works at McCrae and notes that without immediate action the future of the Rosebud Lifesaving Club is at risk and a long standing tradition of service to the Southern Peninsular community may end.
- MR SANDON To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Education for cuts to education funding that has reduced the allocation of L.O.T.E. staffing from 3 to 2 at Abbotsford Primary School and has put at risk one of the leading school language programs in Victoria and thereby reducing educational opportunities to families in Abbotsford.
- 109 MR MILDENHALL To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Local Government for misleading residents of Prahran and part of Malvern in comments that amalgamation would result in cuts in rates for Prahran and Malvern residents when in fact a meeting of councillors of the City of Prahran on the 18th of April indicated that the rate reductions promised will not be achievable.
- MS MARPLE To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Community Services for failing to guarantee to parents caring for a child with a disability in Croydon access to an affordable facility based respite service which has resulted in severe financial hardship for parents in the Croydon area.

- 1 MANAGEMENT OF DEBT Resumption of debate on the question That this House congratulates the Government on the steps it is taking to deal with the high and increasing levels of debt and other liabilities which it faced upon taking office. (Mr Perrin).
- PUBLIC SERVICE EMPLOYMENT PACKAGES Resumption of debate on the question - That this House condemns the Government for its actions in secretly entering into employment packages and conditions for senior public service positions. (Mr Perton).

- 32 MS GARBUTT To move, That this House notes with concern that on average preschool fees on the Mornington Peninsular have doubled this year from \$49 to \$99 and further evidence suggests that at least 44 children have been excluded this year because parents cannot pay fees, 15 children have moved to day care as they can obtain fee relief, 20 children are on waiting lists due to reduced sessions and groups lost.
- 33 MS GARBUTT To move, That this House expresses its concerns at the failure of the Minister for Community Services to guarantee that all families living in Blackburn are able to afford to have their children attend pre-school, including those 15% of children who have not enrolled this year due to massive increase of 140% in preschool fees at Blackburn North Pre-school.
- 34 MS MARPLE To move, That this House notes with concern the failure of the State Government to require an environmental effects statement for the proposed redevelopment of the Crib Point Oil Facility despite the companies involved indicating that works will not proceed during 1994.
- 35 MRS WILSON To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Fair Trading for her Government's actions in eroding the resources available to consumers for information and protection, through the closure of the regional offices of the Office of Fair Trading in Ringwood and Dandenong, thus making it difficult for people living in the outer suburbs to access these services.
- 36 MR SEITZ To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Community Services for Government policies which have lead to an increase of kindergarten fees at Indra Pre-school in Blackburn South from \$180 to \$500 a year, resulting in severe hardships being endured by families of Pre-school children in the Blackburn area.

- 37 MR HAMILTON To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Public Transport for the appalling level of service for commuters travelling to Bairnsdale via Sale, since the abolition of the Rail Service between Bairnsdale and Sale, including the lack of shelter and passenger amenities at Bairnsdale and inconvenience caused by long delays in bus and train connections.
- 38 MR ANDRIANOPOULOS To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Public Transport for the premature introduction of driver only trains on the Alamein line, which because of 'blind spots' created by the design of station platforms along this line, has resulted in passengers being placed in great danger when boarding and alighting from trains, due to the inability of drivers to clearly see whether passengers are clear of the train before departing.
- 39 MR THOMSON (Pascoe Vale) To move, That this House condemns the Government for its massive increases in class sizes at Antonio Park Primary School which have led to a reduced quality of education at that school.
- 40 MR DOLLIS To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Planning for his intervention in the Knox Council decision regarding a proposed Fast Food Restaurant in Rowville as yet another example of this Government's overriding of Local Government Planning Schemes and decisions, thereby undermining the role of Local Government and showing complete disregard for the rights and wishes of Knox residents.
- 41 MR HAERMEYER To move, That this House condemns the Minister for School Education for Government Education Policies which have lead to massive increases in class sizes at Antonio Park Primary School whilst teaching staff numbers have been significantly reduced, resulting in dislocation of students and the inability of staff to provide the optimum level of quality education that Antonio Park Primary students so richly deserve.
- 42 MS MARPLE To move, That the House condemns the Minister for Community Services for his failure to provide an affordable pre-school at Croydon Central where due to the Minister's policies there has been a massive 88% increase in fees from \$160 in 1993 to \$300 in 1994.
- 43 MR SHEEHAN To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Education who, with the support of the Member for Mordialloc, has implemented policies which have resulted in the loss of 20 teaching positions from schools in the Mordialloc Electorate, while enrolments have increased by in excess of 60.
- 44 MR MILDENHALL To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Youth Affairs for cutting funding to the Nunawading Youth Adult Bureau by \$16,000, resulting in reduced outreach services to youth in the Nunawading area at a time when charitable organisations in Nunawading are experiencing a 100% increase in demand for their services, and youth unemployment remains at disastrously high levels.
- 45 MR SERCOMBE To move, That this House condemns the Government for its education policies which have reduced the quality of education for children in the Monbulk electorate.

- 46 MS GARBUTT To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Community Services for Government policies that have led to a 88% increase in fees from \$45 to \$115 per term at the Greenhills Pre-school, resulting in severe financial hardship for many parents with pre-school children in the Greensborough and Eltham communities.
- 47 MR ANDRIANOPOULOS To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Education for failing to provide quality education to students at Bendigo Senior Secondary College due directly to government policies that have resulted in stopping the construction of a library and new classrooms at the school.
- 48 MRS WILSON To move, That this House notes with concern that the Minister for Education has failed to ensure a quality education for children at Cranbourne West Primary School, due to massive increases in class sizes at this school.
- 49 MR PANDAZOPOULOS To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Education for denying children at the Cranbourne South Primary School a quality education due to massive increases in class sizes at the school.
- DR COGHILL To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Employment and Industry for failing to introduce a job creation scheme for people in the Bendigo area as promised before the election where the Bendigo District share of Jobs created under the said scheme would be over 800, such jobs providing a much needed stimulus to the Bendigo economy at a time when 8,444 people were receiving unemployment benefits from Social Security offices in Bendigo and Kangaroo Flat in February, 1994 being 14.73% more than in February, 1993.
- 51 MR HAMILTON To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Youth Affairs for cutting totally funding to the Barwon Youth Information Service which has resulted in less information reaching young people in the Barwon area who are in desperate need of advice and support.
- 52 MR MILDENHALL To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Community Services for his action in cutting funding to the Gisborne Kindergarten, which has placed a heavy financial burden on many parents in the Gisborne area whose pre-school fees have risen by \$450 per child.
- MR PANDAZOPOULOS To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Community Services for Government policies that have cut funding to the Ontos Pre-school, which has lead to an increase in fees from \$30 per term to \$130 per term, resulting in severe hardship being endured by families for pre-school children in the Buchan Community.
- MS GARBUTT To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Community Services for his failure to provide an affordable pre-school at Mordialloc where due to the Minister's policies there has been a massive 100% increase in fees at the Elenora Pre-school causing extreme financial hardship for parents of pre-school children in the Mordialloc area.
- MS MARPLE To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Community Services for his actions in cutting funding to kindergartens in Bendigo which has placed an extra financial burden on parents whose fees have doubled at the Bendigo Kindergarten in 1994.

- 56 MR BATCHELOR To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Public Transport for his failure to provide an adequate frequency of tram services from the City to West Preston and Mont Albert which has resulted in long delays for customers, as evidenced by patrons on Victoria Parade waiting up to 17 minutes for trams to the City on the Mont Albert route during the morning peak-hour on Thursday 17 March and Friday 18 March, 1994.
- 57 MR PANDAZOPOULOS To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Public Transport for failing to ensure that services operated by the National Bus Company on route No. 256 between the City and La Trobe University run on time, as evidenced by delays of more than an hour between services on the afternoon of Thursday March 17, 1994.
- 58 MS GARBUTT To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Health for her failure to ensure that all mothers and babies in Bayswater are guarantied a minimum of 5 days in maternity care if they need it following the birth of a child.
- 59 MR ANDRIANOPOULOS To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Education for his failure to provide a second Government school V.C.E. facility in Bendigo despite a pre-election promise of the Government to have a second V.C.E. facility "for the start of 1993" and his subsequent failure to have the said facility operational at the commencement of the 1994 school year.
- 60 MR SANDON To move, That this House condemns the Government for its failure to ensure all children at the Le Page School in Cheltenham are guarantied a quality education due to massive increases in class sizes at the school.
- 61 MR MILDENHALL To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Community Services for ordering closed the only two reception facilities for emergency child abuse cases in the Western Suburbs, namely Buckland House and St Joseph's, in the face of his department's figures showing a 159% increase in child abuse notifications since the introduction of mandatory reporting.
- 62 MR THOMSON (Pascoe Vale) To move, That this House censures Mr Speaker for his failure to allow the Member for Sunshine and other Honourable Members to raise matters on the Adjournment Debate on Thursday 24 March 1994, in breach of the entitlements of Honourable Members provided for by the Sessional Orders.
- 63 MR COOPER To move, That this House censures the Honourable Member for Bundoora for attempting to use the abuse and death of Daniel Valerio to score cheap political points, and calls on the Honourable Member for Bundoora to apologise to this House, the family of Daniel Valerio and the Victorian Community for her inconsiderate and insensitive behaviour.
- 64 MR BATCHELOR To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Public Transport for reducing the size of the Bendigo Railway Workshops workforce from 270 in October, 1992 to under 180 causing job positions to be lost in Bendigo, notwithstanding pre-election comments by representatives of the current Government that the workforce would increase.
- 65 MR THWAITES To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Health for Government policies that have put mothers and babies in Boronia at risk due to their early release from hospital following childbirth.

- 66 MR MICALLEF To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Public Transport for his failure to ensure residents in Carrum Downs have access to adequate public transport in order to travel to their municipal base in Cranbourne.
- 67 MR MILDENHALL To move, That this House condemns the State Government for its failure to recognise the concerns of residents in Merinda Park regarding the Government's proposal for a Merinda Park Railway Station.
- 68 MS MARPLE To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Health for her failure to ensure that mothers and babies in Croydon are able to stay at least 5 days in maternity care following the birth of their child.
- MR COOPER To move, That this House notes the involvement of the Honourable Member for Thomastown, in his then role as State Secretary of the Australian Labor Party, to manipulate the result of the Nunawading Province re-election in 1985 and his subsequent refusal to co-operate with the police investigation of this scandal, and calls on the Honourable Member for Thomastown to disclose the full facts of his and other Australian Labor Party members involvement.
- 70 MS MARPLE To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Agriculture for his lack of commitment to unemployed people in Bendigo by failing to relocate the Department of Agriculture to Bendigo and thus provide 130 jobs in Bendigo as promised by the Government.
- MR ROWE To move, That this House commends the Minister for Education for responding to the education needs of the Botany Park/Skye community in that he has recognised the need for additional facilities in the provision of additional building to the value of \$180,000, and commenced the process for the future expansion and rebuilding of Skye Primary School.
- 72 MR ROWE To move, That this House commends the Minister for Education for responding to the education needs of the Cranbourne South Community by the provision of \$180,000 in a new building which had not been provided by the previous government.
- 73 MR ROWE To move, That this House commends the Minister for Education for responding to the education needs of the Cranbourne community in addressing the urgent need for \$100,000 of maintenance works at the Lyndhurst Secondary College being part of the black hole backlog of maintenance totalling millions of dollars left by the previous Labor government.
- 74 MRS WILSON To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Local Government for the lack of input residents of the Borough of Eaglehawk have had into the proposed Local Government restructure, despite the fact that 70% of residents in Eaglehawk voted in the poll on the proposal and over 90% voted against amalgamation.
- 75 MR PANDAZOPOULOS To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Local Government for his failure to take account of the overwhelming 70% vote by the Bendigo community against council amalgamations on 29 January 1994 and forcing amalgamation of the five municipalities in the Bendigo area.

- 76 MR LEIGHTON To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Ivanhoe, the Honourable Vin Heffernan, for his failure to honour his commitment that the Liberal Government would restore full disadvantaged school program funding to schools in his electorate such as West Heidelberg Primary School and his advice to a parent of that school that there are no votes in West Heidelberg.
- 77 MR THWAITES To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Health for her failure to ensure that mothers and babies in Knox are able to stay at least 5 days in maternity care following the birth of their child thus placing at risk the health and future well-being of these mothers and babies.
- 78 MR THWAITES To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Health for her failure to ensure that mothers and babies in Ringwood are able to stay at least 5 days in maternity care following the birth of their child to ensure that the health and future well being of the mother and baby is not at risk.
- 79 MR COOPER To move, That this House calls on all members of the Opposition to disassociate themselves from the actions of the Honourable Member for Thomastown who, in his then role as State Secretary of the Australian Labor Party, orchestrated a campaign to mislead and defraud voters in the re-election for the Nunawading Province in 1985, and requests that all Opposition members publicly support the demand that the Honourable Member for Thomastown disclose to the House all of the facts relating to his involvement in this scandal.
- 80 MS GARBUTT To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Community Services for failing to guarantee to parents in Ringwood an affordable and quality respite service for those children who have a disability.
- 81 MS GARBUTT To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Community Services for failing to guarantee to parents in Blackburn access to an affordable and quality respite service for children with a disability resulting in considerable financial hardship for these parents.
- 82 MR HAERMEYER To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Police and Emergency Services for failing to provide sufficient funds to enable the Victorian Police to properly service the municipalities of Knox, Ringwood, Croydon, Sherbrooke, Healesville, Lilydale and Upper Yarra, particularly noting that the local community is being asked to foot the bill for a \$120,000 police caravan to adequately serve the very obvious policing needs of these communities.
- 83 MR HAERMEYER To move, That this House condemns the Member for Bayswater for failing to represent the interests of his constituents and to live up to his promise to "provide the Victorian Police with the resources it needs to protect the community", noting: (a) The member's failure to stand up for his community when his Government cancelled the contract to provide a new police station for Bayswater; and (b) The member's failure to act on behalf of the local community in response to demands that the local community foot the bill for a \$120,000 mobile police caravan that the community urgently needs.

- MR DOLLIS To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Planning for not consulting with Eltham residents or allowing them direct input into the Government's decision whether to allow 24 hour trading in residential areas, thereby further lessening the rights of Eltham residents to participate in planning issues which will affect their amenities and living conditions, as well as altering the nature of their neighbourhoods.
- MR LONEY To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Sport, Recreation and Racing for his lack of commitment to ensure that people with an intellectual disability have access to appropriate sport and recreation activities as shown by the total defunding of the Victorian Sport and Recreation Association of Persons with an Intellectual Disability leaving people with an intellectual disability without a voice and a means to ensure that sport and recreation is available to all.
- 86 MR BATCHELOR To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Public Transport for failing to provide an adequate level of public transport services over the Easter Holiday period as evidenced by customers being required to wait more than 45 minutes for a city-bound tram on the East Malvern route on the morning of Monday, April 4 1994.
- MR THOMSON (Pascoe Vale) To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Public Transport for his failure to ensure an adequate level of service for PTC customers who use the Broadmeadows railway line, as evidenced by the events of March 29, 1994 in relation to the 7.33 a.m. service from the City, when passengers were told when the train arrived at Essendon Station to board a bus for the rest of the trip, but passengers waiting at unstaffed stations further down the line were not told the train was not coming and had been replaced by a bus, and were left waiting on train platforms.
- 88 MR THWAITES To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Health for placing at risk the health of mothers and babies in Mitcham as a result of their early discharge from hospital following childbirth.
- 89 MS GARBUTT To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Health for her failure to ensure that mothers and babies in Oakleigh South are able to stay at least five days in maternity care following the birth of their baby thus placing at risk the health and future well being of these Oakleigh South mothers and babies.
- 90 MR LEIGH To move, That this House condemns the Member for Springvale for his involvement in the previous Labor Government's decision to purchase a tip in Springvale South which is now owned by the Ministry of Planning and Development but which had been owned by Waverley Council and managed by Springvale Council and further condemns the Member for his involvement in ensuring that Victorian taxpayers would be responsible for the costs of containing and cleaning up the pollution caused by the Council's disgraceful management practices.
- 91 MR LEIGH To move, That this House calls on the Leader of the Opposition to sack his political adviser Mr P Reed, the Mayor of Springvale, for his attempts to pump polluted tip waters into Melbourne Water's Braeside Park thereby putting the park at risk.

- 92 MR HAERMEYER To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Health for her failure to ensure that mothers and babies in Knoxfield are able to stay at least five days in maternity care following the birth of their baby thus placing at risk the health and future well being of these Knoxfield mothers and babies.
- 93 MR SANDON To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Education for his cuts to education funding at the Richmond West Primary School that have resulted in the loss of 9.5 teachers, an 18% increase in average class sizes, a 50% reduction in specialist programs, a 50% cut in reading recovery program and reduced professional development and program evaluation.
- 94 MR LEIGHTON To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Community Services for closure of cottage homes which has led to an increased demand for foster places in Blackburn, without also addressing the need for an increase in reimbursement rates for potential foster parents in the Blackburn area, described by the Children's Welfare Association of Victoria as being totally inadequate, thus leaving children without permanent placement.
- MS GARBUTT To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Community Services for budget cuts which have seen services to physically and intellectually disabled people severely reduced at Kew Cottages, with recreation programs cut by more than half and the staff-client ratio falling to dangerous levels with plans for more reductions, resulting in poor staff morale and increased trauma and stress for long suffering parents at Kew Cottages.
- 96 MR PANDAZOPOULOS To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Community Services for his Government policies that have led to a massive 100% increase in fees at the All Saints Pre-School which has denied children from migrant and low income families in the Nunawading area access to pre-school.
- 97 MR LEIGHTON To move, That this House refers to the Privileges Committee for examination and report the matter of whether the Minister for Industry and Employment, the Honourable Phillip Gude, has committed a contempt in that he deliberately misled the House in that -
  - In a question without notice on 31 March 1994 the Leader of the Opposition referred the Minister to a briefing to heads of statutory authorities at which Mr Ian Douglas, QC outlined the State Government's position on changes to the Federal Industrial Relations Act;
  - In answer the Minister for Industry and Employment stated in part that the meeting was not to provide a briefing on changes to the Federal Industrial Legislation nor was any reference made to any major changes to the Federal Industrial Relations Act;
  - The agenda of the briefing to statutory authority heads which shows under item 2 "Employee Relations Minister for Industry and Employment" at 2(ii) "The Federal Legislation Implications and Options Ian Douglas";
  - 4 Notes of the briefing to statutory authority heads of 15 March 1994 made available to the State Opposition which record the briefing given by Ian Douglas, QC on the Federal Legislation; and
  - The response by the Minister for Industry and Employment on the adjournment debate of 31 March 1994 to the matter raised by the Member for Preston, where the Minister failed to alter the substance of his earlier response to the Leader of the Opposition.

- 98 MR THOMSON (Pascoe Vale) To move, That this House notes with concern that the Government has spent more money on advertising campaigns and self-promotion involving the Minister for Industry and Employment than it plans to spend on assistance for the Snow Brand Pty Ltd, milk products company in its investment in a new plant at Tatura.
- 99 MRS WILSON To move, That this House congratulates Vizy Board's \$50 million expansion of a Cardboard Box Factory at Dandenong which will create new jobs for people living in Dandenong, one of the hardest hit areas by unemployment.
- 100 MR LONEY To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Education for cuts in education funding which have led to reduced learning opportunities for students in Geelong North and a wastage of library resources in primary schools in Geelong North.
- 101 MR BATCHELOR To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Public Transport for his failure to provide adequate rail service to country Victoria over the Easter holiday period as evidenced by the poor level of service on the Melbourne-Swan Hill train including on the 1.30 p.m. service from Swan Hill on April 4th the air conditioning was not working properly so that it was extremely hot in passenger carriages and passengers were repeatedly told en route that the train would not stop at Sunshine, however it did, resulting in needless inconvenience for many passengers who had been led to believe that their only alternative was to disembark at St Albans or Spencer Street.
- 102 MR ANDRIANOPOULOS To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Health for not addressing the urgent need for more funds to be made available for child and adolescent psychiatric services at the Maroondah Hospital Psychiatric Unit which has resulted in a 9 month waiting period for patients causing untold strain and risk on families in the outer east.
- 103 MS GARBUTT To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Community Services for his failure to provide to parents in Frankston access to an affordable and quality facility-based respite service for their children who have a disability thus placing financial pressures on these Frankston families.
- 104 MR BATCHELOR To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Public Transport for failing to ensure the co-ordination of rail and bus services in the Watsonia area, as evidenced by local buses that stop at the Watsonia railway station not meeting trains arriving at the station, and drivers refusing to wait for disembarking passengers who wish to catch the bus.
- 105 MS MARPLE To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Community Services for his policies that have led to massive increases in fees at the Merinda Park Pre-school and that have left children at the pre-school without milk or excursions.
- 106 MR HAMILTON To move, That the Minister for Youth Affairs be condemned for failing to ensure that at least one Koori Youth Organisation was funded through the office of Youth Affairs Grants Program and given that currently two Koori Youth Programs have been de-funded, the Minister is further condemned for his discrimination against the most needy youth in our community.

- 107 MR DOLLIS To move, That this House condemns the State Government for its failure to ensure the completion of beach restoration works at McCrae and notes that without immediate action the future of the Rosebud Lifesaving Club is at risk and a long standing tradition of service to the Southern Peninsular community may end.
- MR SANDON To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Education for cuts to education funding that has reduced the allocation of L.O.T.E. staffing from 3 to 2 at Abbotsford Primary School and has put at risk one of the leading school language programs in Victoria and thereby reducing educational opportunities to families in Abbotsford.
- 109 MR MILDENHALL To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Local Government for misleading residents of Prahran and part of Malvern in comments that amalgamation would result in cuts in rates for Prahran and Malvern residents when in fact a meeting of councillors of the City of Prahran on the 18th of April indicated that the rate reductions promised will not be achievable.
- 110 MS MARPLE To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Community Services for failing to guarantee to parents caring for a child with a disability in Croydon access to an affordable facility based respite service which has resulted in severe financial hardship for parents in the Croydon area.

- 1 MANAGEMENT OF DEBT Resumption of debate on the question That this House congratulates the Government on the steps it is taking to deal with the high and increasing levels of debt and other liabilities which it faced upon taking office. (Mr Perrin).
- 2 PUBLIC SERVICE EMPLOYMENT PACKAGES Resumption of debate on the question - That this House condemns the Government for its actions in secretly entering into employment packages and conditions for senior public service positions. (Mr Perton).
- 3 CLINICAL SERVICES FUNDING Resumption of debate on the question That the House do now adjourn for the purpose of discussing a definite matter of urgent public importance, namely "The decision by the Minister for Health to discriminate against the majority of Victorian women by funding clinical services at only three of the State's family planning services and neglecting the need for the provision of clinical programmes at the majority of clinics." - 6 COMMONWEALTH FUNDING FOR HEALTH SERVICES Resumption of debate on the question That this House strongly supports the Minister for Health Services in her efforts to obtain a fair and equitable share of Commonwealth funding for health services in Victoria and on the amendment That the following words be added to the motion: "but condemns the Minister for her actions in significantly cutting Victorian Government funds for health services".
- 7 RESTORATION OF CONFIDENCE AND PROSPERITY TO VICTORIA Resumption of debate on the question That this House congratulates the Government on its policies and actions to restore confidence and prosperity to Victoria. (Mr Perrin).
- 8 STATE BUDGET DEFICIT Resumption of debate on the question That this House notes with concern the serious structural deficit in the State's Budget which the present Government has inherited and supports the measures being taken by the Government to put Victoria's finances on a sound basis. (Mr Baker).
- 9 PROPOSED FUNDING CUTS AND STRUCTURAL CHANGES FOR KINDERGARTENS - Petitions presented by the Members for Bundoora, Geelong and Geelong North praying that the Government not proceed with the proposed funding cuts and the recommended structural changes for kindergartens - To be considered.

- 35 MRS WILSON To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Fair Trading for her Government's actions in eroding the resources available to consumers for information and protection, through the closure of the regional offices of the Office of Fair Trading in Ringwood and Dandenong, thus making it difficult for people living in the outer suburbs to access these services.
- 36 MR SEITZ To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Community Services for Government policies which have lead to an increase of kindergarten fees at Indra Pre-school in Blackburn South from \$180 to \$500 a year, resulting in severe hardships being endured by families of Pre-school children in the Blackburn area.
- 37 MR HAMILTON To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Public Transport for the appalling level of service for commuters travelling to Bairnsdale via Sale, since the abolition of the Rail Service between Bairnsdale and Sale, including the lack of shelter and passenger amenities at Bairnsdale and inconvenience caused by long delays in bus and train connections.
- 38 MR ANDRIANOPOULOS To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Public Transport for the premature introduction of driver only trains on the Alamein line, which because of 'blind spots' created by the design of station platforms along this line, has resulted in passengers being placed in great danger when boarding and alighting from trains, due to the inability of drivers to clearly see whether passengers are clear of the train before departing.
- 39 MR THOMSON (Pascoe Vale) To move, That this House condemns the Government for its massive increases in class sizes at Antonio Park Primary School which have led to a reduced quality of education at that school.
- 40 MR DOLLIS To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Planning for his intervention in the Knox Council decision regarding a proposed Fast Food Restaurant in Rowville as yet another example of this Government's overriding of Local Government Planning Schemes and decisions, thereby undermining the role of Local Government and showing complete disregard for the rights and wishes of Knox residents.
- 41 MR HAERMEYER To move, That this House condemns the Minister for School Education for Government Education Policies which have lead to massive increases in class sizes at Antonio Park Primary School whilst teaching staff numbers have been significantly reduced, resulting in dislocation of students and the inability of staff to provide the optimum level of quality education that Antonio Park Primary students so richly deserve.
- 42 MS MARPLE To move, That the House condemns the Minister for Community Services for his failure to provide an affordable pre-school at Croydon Central where due to the Minister's policies there has been a massive 88% increase in fees from \$160 in 1993 to \$300 in 1994.

- 43 MR SHEEHAN To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Education who, with the support of the Member for Mordialloc, has implemented policies which have resulted in the loss of 20 teaching positions from schools in the Mordialloc Electorate, while enrolments have increased by in excess of 60.
- 44 MR MILDENHALL To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Youth Affairs for cutting funding to the Nunawading Youth Adult Bureau by \$16,000, resulting in reduced outreach services to youth in the Nunawading area at a time when charitable organisations in Nunawading are experiencing a 100% increase in demand for their services, and youth unemployment remains at disastrously high levels.
- 45 MR SERCOMBE To move, That this House condemns the Government for its education policies which have reduced the quality of education for children in the Monbulk electorate.
- 46 MS GARBUTT To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Community Services for Government policies that have led to a 88% increase in fees from \$45 to \$115 per term at the Greenhills Pre-school, resulting in severe financial hardship for many parents with pre-school children in the Greensborough and Eltham communities.
- 47 MR ANDRIANOPOULOS To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Education for failing to provide quality education to students at Bendigo Senior Secondary College due directly to government policies that have resulted in stopping the construction of a library and new classrooms at the school.
- 48 MRS WILSON To move, That this House notes with concern that the Minister for Education has failed to ensure a quality education for children at Cranbourne West Primary School, due to massive increases in class sizes at this school.
- 49 MR PANDAZOPOULOS To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Education for denying children at the Cranbourne South Primary School a quality education due to massive increases in class sizes at the school.
- DR COGHILL To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Employment and Industry for failing to introduce a job creation scheme for people in the Bendigo area as promised before the election where the Bendigo District share of Jobs created under the said scheme would be over 800, such jobs providing a much needed stimulus to the Bendigo economy at a time when 8,444 people were receiving unemployment benefits from Social Security offices in Bendigo and Kangaroo Flat in February, 1994 being 14.73% more than in February, 1993.
- MR HAMILTON To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Youth Affairs for cutting totally funding to the Barwon Youth Information Service which has resulted in less information reaching young people in the Barwon area who are in desperate need of advice and support.
- 52 MR MILDENHALL To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Community Services for his action in cutting funding to the Gisborne Kindergarten, which has placed a heavy financial burden on many parents in the Gisborne area whose pre-school fees have risen by \$450 per child.

- MR PANDAZOPOULOS To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Community Services for Government policies that have cut funding to the Ontos Pre-school, which has lead to an increase in fees from \$30 per term to \$130 per term, resulting in severe hardship being endured by families for pre-school children in the Buchan Community.
- MS GARBUTT To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Community Services for his failure to provide an affordable pre-school at Mordialloc where due to the Minister's policies there has been a massive 100% increase in fees at the Elenora Pre-school causing extreme financial hardship for parents of pre-school children in the Mordialloc area.
- 55 MS MARPLE To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Community Services for his actions in cutting funding to kindergartens in Bendigo which has placed an extra financial burden on parents whose fees have doubled at the Bendigo Kindergarten in 1994.
- 56 MR BATCHELOR To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Public Transport for his failure to provide an adequate frequency of tram services from the City to West Preston and Mont Albert which has resulted in long delays for customers, as evidenced by patrons on Victoria Parade waiting up to 17 minutes for trams to the City on the Mont Albert route during the morning peak-hour on Thursday 17 March and Friday 18 March, 1994.
- 57 MR PANDAZOPOULOS To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Public Transport for failing to ensure that services operated by the National Bus Company on route No. 256 between the City and La Trobe University run on time, as evidenced by delays of more than an hour between services on the afternoon of Thursday March 17, 1994.
- 58 MS GARBUTT To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Health for her failure to ensure that all mothers and babies in Bayswater are guarantied a minimum of 5 days in maternity care if they need it following the birth of a child.
- 59 MR ANDRIANOPOULOS To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Education for his failure to provide a second Government school V.C.E. facility in Bendigo despite a pre-election promise of the Government to have a second V.C.E. facility "for the start of 1993" and his subsequent failure to have the said facility operational at the commencement of the 1994 school year.
- 60 MR SANDON To move, That this House condemns the Government for its failure to ensure all children at the Le Page School in Cheltenham are guarantied a quality education due to massive increases in class sizes at the school.
- 61 MR MILDENHALL To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Community Services for ordering closed the only two reception facilities for emergency child abuse cases in the Western Suburbs, namely Buckland House and St Joseph's, in the face of his department's figures showing a 159% increase in child abuse notifications since the introduction of mandatory reporting.
- 62 MR THOMSON (Pascoe Vale) To move, That this House censures Mr Speaker for his failure to allow the Member for Sunshine and other Honourable Members to raise matters on the Adjournment Debate on Thursday 24 March 1994, in breach of the entitlements of Honourable Members provided for by the Sessional Orders.

- 63 MR COOPER To move, That this House censures the Honourable Member for Bundoora for attempting to use the abuse and death of Daniel Valerio to score cheap political points, and calls on the Honourable Member for Bundoora to apologise to this House, the family of Daniel Valerio and the Victorian Community for her inconsiderate and insensitive behaviour.
- MR BATCHELOR To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Public Transport for reducing the size of the Bendigo Railway Workshops workforce from 270 in October, 1992 to under 180 causing job positions to be lost in Bendigo, notwithstanding pre-election comments by representatives of the current Government that the workforce would increase.
- 65 MR THWAITES To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Health for Government policies that have put mothers and babies in Boronia at risk due to their early release from hospital following childbirth.
- 66 MR MICALLEF To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Public Transport for his failure to ensure residents in Carrum Downs have access to adequate public transport in order to travel to their municipal base in Cranbourne.
- 67 MR MILDENHALL To move, That this House condemns the State Government for its failure to recognise the concerns of residents in Merinda Park regarding the Government's proposal for a Merinda Park Railway Station.
- 68 MS MARPLE To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Health for her failure to ensure that mothers and babies in Croydon are able to stay at least 5 days in maternity care following the birth of their child.
- MR COOPER To move, That this House notes the involvement of the Honourable Member for Thomastown, in his then role as State Secretary of the Australian Labor Party, to manipulate the result of the Nunawading Province re-election in 1985 and his subsequent refusal to co-operate with the police investigation of this scandal, and calls on the Honourable Member for Thomastown to disclose the full facts of his and other Australian Labor Party members involvement.
- 70 MS MARPLE To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Agriculture for his lack of commitment to unemployed people in Bendigo by failing to relocate the Department of Agriculture to Bendigo and thus provide 130 jobs in Bendigo as promised by the Government.
- 71 MR ROWE To move, That this House commends the Minister for Education for responding to the education needs of the Botany Park/Skye community in that he has recognised the need for additional facilities in the provision of additional building to the value of \$180,000, and commenced the process for the future expansion and rebuilding of Skye Primary School.
- 72 MR ROWE To move, That this House commends the Minister for Education for responding to the education needs of the Cranbourne South Community by the provision of \$180,000 in a new building which had not been provided by the previous government.

- 73 MR ROWE To move, That this House commends the Minister for Education for responding to the education needs of the Cranbourne community in addressing the urgent need for \$100,000 of maintenance works at the Lyndhurst Secondary College being part of the black hole backlog of maintenance totalling millions of dollars left by the previous Labor government.
- 74 MRS WILSON To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Local Government for the lack of input residents of the Borough of Eaglehawk have had into the proposed Local Government restructure, despite the fact that 70% of residents in Eaglehawk voted in the poll on the proposal and over 90% voted against amalgamation.
- 75 MR PANDAZOPOULOS To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Local Government for his failure to take account of the overwhelming 70% vote by the Bendigo community against council amalgamations on 29 January 1994 and forcing amalgamation of the five municipalities in the Bendigo area.
- 76 MR LEIGHTON To move, That this House condemns the Member for Ivanhoe, the Honourable Vin Heffernan, for his failure to honour his commitment that the Liberal Government would restore full disadvantaged school program funding to schools in his electorate such as West Heidelberg Primary School and his advice to a parent of that school that there are no votes in West Heidelberg.
- 77 MR THWAITES To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Health for her failure to ensure that mothers and babies in Knox are able to stay at least 5 days in maternity care following the birth of their child thus placing at risk the health and future well-being of these mothers and babies.
- 78 MR THWAITES To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Health for her failure to ensure that mothers and babies in Ringwood are able to stay at least 5 days in maternity care following the birth of their child to ensure that the health and future well being of the mother and baby is not at risk.
- 79 MR COOPER To move, That this House calls on all members of the Opposition to disassociate themselves from the actions of the Honourable Member for Thomastown who, in his then role as State Secretary of the Australian Labor Party, orchestrated a campaign to mislead and defraud voters in the re-election for the Nunawading Province in 1985, and requests that all Opposition members publicly support the demand that the Honourable Member for Thomastown disclose to the House all of the facts relating to his involvement in this scandal.
- 80 MS GARBUTT To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Community Services for failing to guarantee to parents in Ringwood an affordable and quality respite service for those children who have a disability.
- 81 MS GARBUTT To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Community Services for failing to guarantee to parents in Blackburn access to an affordable and quality respite service for children with a disability resulting in considerable financial hardship for these parents.

- 82 MR HAERMEYER To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Police and Emergency Services for failing to provide sufficient funds to enable the Victorian Police to properly service the municipalities of Knox, Ringwood, Croydon, Sherbrooke, Healesville, Lilydale and Upper Yarra, particularly noting that the local community is being asked to foot the bill for a \$120,000 police caravan to adequately serve the very obvious policing needs of these communities.
- MR HAERMEYER To move, That this House condemns the Member for Bayswater for failing to represent the interests of his constituents and to live up to his promise to "provide the Victorian Police with the resources it needs to protect the community", noting: (a) The member's failure to stand up for his community when his Government cancelled the contract to provide a new police station for Bayswater; and (b) The member's failure to act on behalf of the local community in response to demands that the local community foot the bill for a \$120,000 mobile police caravan that the community urgently needs.
- 84 MR DOLLIS To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Planning for not consulting with Eltham residents or allowing them direct input into the Government's decision whether to allow 24 hour trading in residential areas, thereby further lessening the rights of Eltham residents to participate in planning issues which will affect their amenities and living conditions, as well as altering the nature of their neighbourhoods.
- MR LONEY To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Sport, Recreation and Racing for his lack of commitment to ensure that people with an intellectual disability have access to appropriate sport and recreation activities as shown by the total defunding of the Victorian Sport and Recreation Association of Persons with an Intellectual Disability leaving people with an intellectual disability without a voice and a means to ensure that sport and recreation is available to all.
- MR BATCHELOR To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Public Transport for failing to provide an adequate level of public transport services over the Easter Holiday period as evidenced by customers being required to wait more than 45 minutes for a city-bound tram on the East Malvern route on the morning of Monday, April 4 1994.
- MR THOMSON (Pascoe Vale) To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Public Transport for his failure to ensure an adequate level of service for PTC customers who use the Broadmeadows railway line, as evidenced by the events of March 29, 1994 in relation to the 7.33 a.m. service from the City, when passengers were told when the train arrived at Essendon Station to board a bus for the rest of the trip, but passengers waiting at unstaffed stations further down the line were not told the train was not coming and had been replaced by a bus, and were left waiting on train platforms.
- 88 MR THWAITES To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Health for placing at risk the health of mothers and babies in Mitcham as a result of their early discharge from hospital following childbirth.
- 89 MS GARBUTT To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Health for her failure to ensure that mothers and babies in Oakleigh South are able to stay at least five days in maternity care following the birth of their baby thus placing at risk the health and future well being of these Oakleigh South mothers and babies.

- 90 MR LEIGH To move, That this House condemns the Member for Springvale for his involvement in the previous Labor Government's decision to purchase a tip in Springvale South which is now owned by the Ministry of Planning and Development but which had been owned by Waverley Council and managed by Springvale Council and further condemns the Member for his involvement in ensuring that Victorian taxpayers would be responsible for the costs of containing and cleaning up the pollution caused by the Council's disgraceful management practices.
- 91 MR LEIGH To move, That this House calls on the Leader of the Opposition to sack his political adviser Mr P Reed, the Mayor of Springvale, for his attempts to pump polluted tip waters into Melbourne Water's Braeside Park thereby putting the park at risk.
- 92 MR HAERMEYER To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Health for her failure to ensure that mothers and babies in Knoxfield are able to stay at least five days in maternity care following the birth of their baby thus placing at risk the health and future well being of these Knoxfield mothers and babies.
- 93 MR SANDON To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Education for his cuts to education funding at the Richmond West Primary School that have resulted in the loss of 9.5 teachers, an 18% increase in average class sizes, a 50% reduction in specialist programs, a 50% cut in reading recovery program and reduced professional development and program evaluation.
- 94 MR LEIGHTON To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Community Services for closure of cottage homes which has led to an increased demand for foster places in Blackburn, without also addressing the need for an increase in reimbursement rates for potential foster parents in the Blackburn area, described by the Children's Welfare Association of Victoria as being totally inadequate, thus leaving children without permanent placement.

- 96 MR PANDAZOPOULOS To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Community Services for his Government policies that have led to a massive 100% increase in fees at the All Saints Pre-School which has denied children from migrant and low income families in the Nunawading area access to pre-school.
- 97 MR LEIGHTON To move, That this House refers to the Privileges Committee for examination and report the matter of whether the Minister for Industry and Employment, the Honourable Phillip Gude, has committed a contempt in that he deliberately misled the House in that -
  - In a question without notice on 31 March 1994 the Leader of the Opposition referred the Minister to a briefing to heads of statutory authorities at which Mr Ian Douglas, QC outlined the State Government's position on changes to the Federal Industrial Relations Act;

- In answer the Minister for Industry and Employment stated in part that the meeting was not to provide a briefing on changes to the Federal Industrial Legislation nor was any reference made to any major changes to the Federal Industrial Relations Act;
- The agenda of the briefing to statutory authority heads which shows under item 2 "Employee Relations Minister for Industry and Employment" at 2(ii) "The Federal Legislation Implications and Options Ian Douglas";
- 4 Notes of the briefing to statutory authority heads of 15 March 1994 made available to the State Opposition which record the briefing given by Ian Douglas, QC on the Federal Legislation; and
- The response by the Minister for Industry and Employment on the adjournment debate of 31 March 1994 to the matter raised by the Member for Preston, where the Minister failed to alter the substance of his earlier response to the Leader of the Opposition.
- MR THOMSON (Pascoe Vale) To move, That this House notes with concern that the Government has spent more money on advertising campaigns and self-promotion involving the Minister for Industry and Employment than it plans to spend on assistance for the Snow Brand Pty Ltd, milk products company in its investment in a new plant at Tatura.
- 99 MRS WILSON To move, That this House congratulates Vizy Board's \$50 million expansion of a Cardboard Box Factory at Dandenong which will create new jobs for people living in Dandenong, one of the hardest hit areas by unemployment.
- MR LONEY To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Education for cuts in education funding which have led to reduced learning opportunities for students in Geelong North and a wastage of library resources in primary schools in Geelong North.
- MR BATCHELOR To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Public Transport for his failure to provide adequate rail service to country Victoria over the Easter holiday period as evidenced by the poor level of service on the Melbourne-Swan Hill train including on the 1.30 p.m. service from Swan Hill on April 4th the air conditioning was not working properly so that it was extremely hot in passenger carriages and passengers were repeatedly told en route that the train would not stop at Sunshine, however it did, resulting in needless inconvenience for many passengers who had been led to believe that their only alternative was to disembark at St Albans or Spencer Street.
- MR ANDRIANOPOULOS To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Health for not addressing the urgent need for more funds to be made available for child and adolescent psychiatric services at the Maroondah Hospital Psychiatric Unit which has resulted in a 9 month waiting period for patients causing untold strain and risk on families in the outer east.
- 103 MS GARBUTT To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Community Services for his failure to provide to parents in Frankston access to an affordable and quality facility-based respite service for their children who have a disability thus placing financial pressures on these Frankston families.

- 104 MR BATCHELOR To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Public Transport for failing to ensure the co-ordination of rail and bus services in the Watsonia area, as evidenced by local buses that stop at the Watsonia railway station not meeting trains arriving at the station, and drivers refusing to wait for disembarking passengers who wish to catch the bus.
- 105 MS MARPLE To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Community Services for his policies that have led to massive increases in fees at the Merinda Park Pre-school and that have left children at the pre-school without milk or excursions.

- 107 MR DOLLIS To move, That this House condemns the State Government for its failure to ensure the completion of beach restoration works at McCrae and notes that without immediate action the future of the Rosebud Lifesaving Club is at risk and a long standing tradition of service to the Southern Peninsular community may end.
- 108 MR SANDON To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Education for cuts to education funding that has reduced the allocation of L.O.T.E. staffing from 3 to 2 at Abbotsford Primary School and has put at risk one of the leading school language programs in Victoria and thereby reducing educational opportunities to families in Abbotsford.
- 109 MR MILDENHALL To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Local Government for misleading residents of Prahran and part of Malvern in comments that amalgamation would result in cuts in rates for Prahran and Malvern residents when in fact a meeting of councillors of the City of Prahran on the 18th of April indicated that the rate reductions promised will not be achievable.
- 110 MS MARPLE To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Community Services for failing to guarantee to parents caring for a child with a disability in Croydon access to an affordable facility based respite service which has resulted in severe financial hardship for parents in the Croydon area.
- \*111 MR LEIGHTON To move, That this House in noting the outspoken comments in May 1992 by the Member for Ivanhoe, the Honourable Vin Heffernan MP, in support of continued state ownership of the historic Banyule Homestead in his Ivanhoe Electorate, including his statement that the people would have the final say at the next election, now condemns the Member for Ivanhoe for supporting the Government sale of the Banyule Homestead.

- 29 MR THOMSON (Pascoe Vale) To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Community Services for his action in cutting funding to the Dr Stanley Cochrane Pre-school in Mitcham, which has placed a heavy financial burden on many parents whose pre-school fees have risen from \$180 per year to \$480 per year.
- 30 MR MICALLEF To move, That this House condemns the State Government for its continued failure to adequately secure the former Joseph Banks Secondary College site at Doveton, showing a disregard for the safety of local residents, allowing them to walk unhindered into an asbestos contaminated area and leaving a damage bill estimated at over \$60,000 some of which is to facilities which are to be retained by the community.
- 31 MR HAERMEYER To move, That this House notes with concern that as a result of Government policies fees at the Mordialloc Kindergarten have increased from \$50 per term in 1993 to \$110 per term in 1994, with parents expected to pay an additional \$30 levy for excursions, and consequently, enrolments at this kindergarten have decreased from 50 in 1993 to 30 in 1994 and this House urges the Minister to implement policies to ensure affordable and quality pre-schools are available to all families in the Mordialloc area.

- 32 MS GARBUTT To move, That this House notes with concern that on average preschool fees on the Mornington Peninsular have doubled this year from \$49 to \$99 and further evidence suggests that at least 44 children have been excluded this year because parents cannot pay fees, 15 children have moved to day care as they can obtain fee relief, 20 children are on waiting lists due to reduced sessions and groups lost.
- MS GARBUTT To move, That this House expresses its concerns at the failure of the Minister for Community Services to guarantee that all families living in Blackburn are able to afford to have their children attend pre-school, including those 15% of children who have not enrolled this year due to massive increase of 140% in pre-school fees at Blackburn North Pre-school.
- 34 MS MARPLE To move, That this House notes with concern the failure of the State Government to require an environmental effects statement for the proposed redevelopment of the Crib Point Oil Facility despite the companies involved indicating that works will not proceed during 1994.
- 35 MRS WILSON To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Fair Trading for her Government's actions in eroding the resources available to consumers for information and protection, through the closure of the regional offices of the Office of Fair Trading in Ringwood and Dandenong, thus making it difficult for people living in the outer suburbs to access these services.
- 36 MR SEITZ To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Community Services for Government policies which have lead to an increase of kindergarten fees at Indra Pre-school in Blackburn South from \$180 to \$500 a year, resulting in severe hardships being endured by families of Pre-school children in the Blackburn area.
- 37 MR HAMILTON To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Public Transport for the appalling level of service for commuters travelling to Bairnsdale via Sale, since the abolition of the Rail Service between Bairnsdale and Sale, including the lack of shelter and passenger amenities at Bairnsdale and inconvenience caused by long delays in bus and train connections.
- MR ANDRIANOPOULOS To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Public Transport for the premature introduction of driver only trains on the Alamein line, which because of 'blind spots' created by the design of station platforms along this line, has resulted in passengers being placed in great danger when boarding and alighting from trains, due to the inability of drivers to clearly see whether passengers are clear of the train before departing.
- 39 MR THOMSON (Pascoe Vale) To move, That this House condemns the Government for its massive increases in class sizes at Antonio Park Primary School which have led to a reduced quality of education at that school.
- 40 MR DOLLIS To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Planning for his intervention in the Knox Council decision regarding a proposed Fast Food Restaurant in Rowville as yet another example of this Government's overriding of Local Government Planning Schemes and decisions, thereby undermining the role of Local Government and showing complete disregard for the rights and wishes of Knox residents.

- 41 MR HAERMEYER To move, That this House condemns the Minister for School Education for Government Education Policies which have lead to massive increases in class sizes at Antonio Park Primary School whilst teaching staff numbers have been significantly reduced, resulting in dislocation of students and the inability of staff to provide the optimum level of quality education that Antonio Park Primary students so richly deserve.
- 42 MS MARPLE To move, That the House condemns the Minister for Community Services for his failure to provide an affordable pre-school at Croydon Central where due to the Minister's policies there has been a massive 88% increase in fees from \$160 in 1993 to \$300 in 1994.
- 43 MR SHEEHAN To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Education who, with the support of the Member for Mordialloc, has implemented policies which have resulted in the loss of 20 teaching positions from schools in the Mordialloc Electorate, while enrolments have increased by in excess of 60.
- 44 MR MILDENHALL To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Youth Affairs for cutting funding to the Nunawading Youth Adult Bureau by \$16,000, resulting in reduced outreach services to youth in the Nunawading area at a time when charitable organisations in Nunawading are experiencing a 100% increase in demand for their services, and youth unemployment remains at disastrously high levels.
- 45 MR SERCOMBE To move, That this House condemns the Government for its education policies which have reduced the quality of education for children in the Monbulk electorate.
- 46 MS GARBUTT To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Community Services for Government policies that have led to a 88% increase in fees from \$45 to \$115 per term at the Greenhills Pre-school, resulting in severe financial hardship for many parents with pre-school children in the Greensborough and Eltham communities.
- 47 MR ANDRIANOPOULOS To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Education for failing to provide quality education to students at Bendigo Senior Secondary College due directly to government policies that have resulted in stopping the construction of a library and new classrooms at the school.
- 48 MRS WILSON To move, That this House notes with concern that the Minister for Education has failed to ensure a quality education for children at Cranbourne West Primary School, due to massive increases in class sizes at this school.
- 49 MR PANDAZOPOULOS To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Education for denying children at the Cranbourne South Primary School a quality education due to massive increases in class sizes at the school.
- DR COGHILL To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Employment and Industry for failing to introduce a job creation scheme for people in the Bendigo area as promised before the election where the Bendigo District share of Jobs created under the said scheme would be over 800, such jobs providing a much needed stimulus to the Bendigo economy at a time when 8,444 people were receiving unemployment benefits from Social Security offices in Bendigo and Kangaroo Flat in February, 1994 being 14.73% more than in February, 1993.

- 51 MR HAMILTON To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Youth Affairs for cutting totally funding to the Barwon Youth Information Service which has resulted in less information reaching young people in the Barwon area who are in desperate need of advice and support.
- 52 MR MILDENHALL To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Community Services for his action in cutting funding to the Gisborne Kindergarten, which has placed a heavy financial burden on many parents in the Gisborne area whose pre-school fees have risen by \$450 per child.
- MR PANDAZOPOULOS To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Community Services for Government policies that have cut funding to the Ontos Pre-school, which has lead to an increase in fees from \$30 per term to \$130 per term, resulting in severe hardship being endured by families for pre-school children in the Buchan Community.
- MS GARBUTT To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Community Services for his failure to provide an affordable pre-school at Mordialloc where due to the Minister's policies there has been a massive 100% increase in fees at the Elenora Pre-school causing extreme financial hardship for parents of pre-school children in the Mordialloc area.
- MS MARPLE To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Community Services for his actions in cutting funding to kindergartens in Bendigo which has placed an extra financial burden on parents whose fees have doubled at the Bendigo Kindergarten in 1994.
- MR BATCHELOR To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Public Transport for his failure to provide an adequate frequency of tram services from the City to West Preston and Mont Albert which has resulted in long delays for customers, as evidenced by patrons on Victoria Parade waiting up to 17 minutes for trams to the City on the Mont Albert route during the morning peak-hour on Thursday 17 March and Friday 18 March, 1994.
- 57 MR PANDAZOPOULOS To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Public Transport for failing to ensure that services operated by the National Bus Company on route No. 256 between the City and La Trobe University run on time, as evidenced by delays of more than an hour between services on the afternoon of Thursday March 17, 1994.
- 58 MS GARBUTT To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Health for her failure to ensure that all mothers and babies in Bayswater are guarantied a minimum of 5 days in maternity care if they need it following the birth of a child.
- MR ANDRIANOPOULOS To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Education for his failure to provide a second Government school V.C.E. facility in Bendigo despite a pre-election promise of the Government to have a second V.C.E. facility "for the start of 1993" and his subsequent failure to have the said facility operational at the commencement of the 1994 school year.
- 60 MR SANDON To move, That this House condemns the Government for its failure to ensure all children at the Le Page School in Cheltenham are guarantied a quality education due to massive increases in class sizes at the school.

- 61 MR MILDENHALL To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Community Services for ordering closed the only two reception facilities for emergency child abuse cases in the Western Suburbs, namely Buckland House and St Joseph's, in the face of his department's figures showing a 159% increase in child abuse notifications since the introduction of mandatory reporting.
- 62 MR THOMSON (Pascoe Vale) To move, That this House censures Mr Speaker for his failure to allow the Member for Sunshine and other Honourable Members to raise matters on the Adjournment Debate on Thursday 24 March 1994, in breach of the entitlements of Honourable Members provided for by the Sessional Orders.
- 63 MR COOPER To move, That this House censures the Honourable Member for Bundoora for attempting to use the abuse and death of Daniel Valerio to score cheap political points, and calls on the Honourable Member for Bundoora to apologise to this House, the family of Daniel Valerio and the Victorian Community for her inconsiderate and insensitive behaviour.
- 64 MR BATCHELOR To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Public Transport for reducing the size of the Bendigo Railway Workshops workforce from 270 in October, 1992 to under 180 causing job positions to be lost in Bendigo, notwithstanding pre-election comments by representatives of the current Government that the workforce would increase.
- 65 MR THWAITES To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Health for Government policies that have put mothers and babies in Boronia at risk due to their early release from hospital following childbirth.
- 66 MR MICALLEF To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Public Transport for his failure to ensure residents in Carrum Downs have access to adequate public transport in order to travel to their municipal base in Cranbourne.
- 67 MR MILDENHALL To move, That this House condemns the State Government for its failure to recognise the concerns of residents in Merinda Park regarding the Government's proposal for a Merinda Park Railway Station.
- 68 MS MARPLE To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Health for her failure to ensure that mothers and babies in Croydon are able to stay at least 5 days in maternity care following the birth of their child.
- MR COOPER To move, That this House notes the involvement of the Honourable Member for Thomastown, in his then role as State Secretary of the Australian Labor Party, to manipulate the result of the Nunawading Province re-election in 1985 and his subsequent refusal to co-operate with the police investigation of this scandal, and calls on the Honourable Member for Thomastown to disclose the full facts of his and other Australian Labor Party members involvement.
- 70 MS MARPLE To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Agriculture for his lack of commitment to unemployed people in Bendigo by failing to relocate the Department of Agriculture to Bendigo and thus provide 130 jobs in Bendigo as promised by the Government.

- 71 MR ROWE To move, That this House commends the Minister for Education for responding to the education needs of the Botany Park/Skye community in that he has recognised the need for additional facilities in the provision of additional building to the value of \$180,000, and commenced the process for the future expansion and rebuilding of Skye Primary School.
- 72 MR ROWE To move, That this House commends the Minister for Education for responding to the education needs of the Cranbourne South Community by the provision of \$180,000 in a new building which had not been provided by the previous government.
- 73 MR ROWE To move, That this House commends the Minister for Education for responding to the education needs of the Cranbourne community in addressing the urgent need for \$100,000 of maintenance works at the Lyndhurst Secondary College being part of the black hole backlog of maintenance totalling millions of dollars left by the previous Labor government.
- 74 MRS WILSON To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Local Government for the lack of input residents of the Borough of Eaglehawk have had into the proposed Local Government restructure, despite the fact that 70% of residents in Eaglehawk voted in the poll on the proposal and over 90% voted against amalgamation.
- 75 MR PANDAZOPOULOS To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Local Government for his failure to take account of the overwhelming 70% vote by the Bendigo community against council amalgamations on 29 January 1994 and forcing amalgamation of the five municipalities in the Bendigo area.
- 76 MR LEIGHTON To move, That this House condemns the Member for Ivanhoe, the Honourable Vin Heffernan, for his failure to honour his commitment that the Liberal Government would restore full disadvantaged school program funding to schools in his electorate such as West Heidelberg Primary School and his advice to a parent of that school that there are no votes in West Heidelberg.
- 77 MR THWAITES To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Health for her failure to ensure that mothers and babies in Knox are able to stay at least 5 days in maternity care following the birth of their child thus placing at risk the health and future well-being of these mothers and babies.
- 78 MR THWAITES To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Health for her failure to ensure that mothers and babies in Ringwood are able to stay at least 5 days in maternity care following the birth of their child to ensure that the health and future well being of the mother and baby is not at risk.
- MR COOPER To move, That this House calls on all members of the Opposition to disassociate themselves from the actions of the Honourable Member for Thomastown who, in his then role as State Secretary of the Australian Labor Party, orchestrated a campaign to mislead and defraud voters in the re-election for the Nunawading Province in 1985, and requests that all Opposition members publicly support the demand that the Honourable Member for Thomastown disclose to the House all of the facts relating to his involvement in this scandal.

- 80 MS GARBUTT To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Community Services for failing to guarantee to parents in Ringwood an affordable and quality respite service for those children who have a disability.
- 81 MS GARBUTT To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Community Services for failing to guarantee to parents in Blackburn access to an affordable and quality respite service for children with a disability resulting in considerable financial hardship for these parents.
- 82 MR HAERMEYER To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Police and Emergency Services for failing to provide sufficient funds to enable the Victorian Police to properly service the municipalities of Knox, Ringwood, Croydon, Sherbrooke, Healesville, Lilydale and Upper Yarra, particularly noting that the local community is being asked to foot the bill for a \$120,000 police caravan to adequately serve the very obvious policing needs of these communities.
- MR HAERMEYER To move, That this House condemns the Member for Bayswater for failing to represent the interests of his constituents and to live up to his promise to "provide the Victorian Police with the resources it needs to protect the community", noting: (a) The member's failure to stand up for his community when his Government cancelled the contract to provide a new police station for Bayswater; and (b) The member's failure to act on behalf of the local community in response to demands that the local community foot the bill for a \$120,000 mobile police caravan that the community urgently needs.
- MR DOLLIS To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Planning for not consulting with Eltham residents or allowing them direct input into the Government's decision whether to allow 24 hour trading in residential areas, thereby further lessening the rights of Eltham residents to participate in planning issues which will affect their amenities and living conditions, as well as altering the nature of their neighbourhoods.
- MR LONEY To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Sport, Recreation and Racing for his lack of commitment to ensure that people with an intellectual disability have access to appropriate sport and recreation activities as shown by the total defunding of the Victorian Sport and Recreation Association of Persons with an Intellectual Disability leaving people with an intellectual disability without a voice and a means to ensure that sport and recreation is available to all.
- MR BATCHELOR To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Public Transport for failing to provide an adequate level of public transport services over the Easter Holiday period as evidenced by customers being required to wait more than 45 minutes for a city-bound tram on the East Malvern route on the morning of Monday, April 4 1994.
- 87 MR THOMSON (Pascoe Vale) To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Public Transport for his failure to ensure an adequate level of service for PTC customers who use the Broadmeadows railway line, as evidenced by the events of March 29, 1994 in relation to the 7.33 a.m. service from the City, when passengers were told when the train arrived at Essendon Station to board a bus for the rest of the trip, but passengers waiting at unstaffed stations further down the line were not told the train was not coming and had been replaced by a bus, and were left waiting on train platforms.

- 88 MR THWAITES To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Health for placing at risk the health of mothers and babies in Mitcham as a result of their early discharge from hospital following childbirth.
- 89 MS GARBUTT To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Health for her failure to ensure that mothers and babies in Oakleigh South are able to stay at least five days in maternity care following the birth of their baby thus placing at risk the health and future well being of these Oakleigh South mothers and babies.
- MR LEIGH To move, That this House condemns the Member for Springvale for his involvement in the previous Labor Government's decision to purchase a tip in Springvale South which is now owned by the Ministry of Planning and Development but which had been owned by Waverley Council and managed by Springvale Council and further condemns the Member for his involvement in ensuring that Victorian taxpayers would be responsible for the costs of containing and cleaning up the pollution caused by the Council's disgraceful management practices.
- 91 MR LEIGH To move, That this House calls on the Leader of the Opposition to sack his political adviser Mr P Reed, the Mayor of Springvale, for his attempts to pump polluted tip waters into Melbourne Water's Braeside Park thereby putting the park at risk.
- 92 MR HAERMEYER To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Health for her failure to ensure that mothers and babies in Knoxfield are able to stay at least five days in maternity care following the birth of their baby thus placing at risk the health and future well being of these Knoxfield mothers and babies.
- 93 MR SANDON To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Education for his cuts to education funding at the Richmond West Primary School that have resulted in the loss of 9.5 teachers, an 18% increase in average class sizes, a 50% reduction in specialist programs, a 50% cut in reading recovery program and reduced professional development and program evaluation.

- 96 MR PANDAZOPOULOS To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Community Services for his Government policies that have led to a massive 100% increase in fees at the All Saints Pre-School which has denied children from migrant and low income families in the Nunawading area access to pre-school.

- 97 MR LEIGHTON To move, That this House refers to the Privileges Committee for examination and report the matter of whether the Minister for Industry and Employment, the Honourable Phillip Gude, has committed a contempt in that he deliberately misled the House in that -
  - In a question without notice on 31 March 1994 the Leader of the Opposition referred the Minister to a briefing to heads of statutory authorities at which Mr Ian Douglas, QC outlined the State Government's position on changes to the Federal Industrial Relations Act;
  - In answer the Minister for Industry and Employment stated in part that the meeting was not to provide a briefing on changes to the Federal Industrial Legislation nor was any reference made to any major changes to the Federal Industrial Relations Act;
  - The agenda of the briefing to statutory authority heads which shows under item 2 "Employee Relations Minister for Industry and Employment" at 2(ii) "The Federal Legislation Implications and Options Ian Douglas";
  - 4 Notes of the briefing to statutory authority heads of 15 March 1994 made available to the State Opposition which record the briefing given by Ian Douglas, OC on the Federal Legislation; and
  - The response by the Minister for Industry and Employment on the adjournment debate of 31 March 1994 to the matter raised by the Member for Preston, where the Minister failed to alter the substance of his earlier response to the Leader of the Opposition.
- 98 MR THOMSON (Pascoe Vale) To move, That this House notes with concern that the Government has spent more money on advertising campaigns and self-promotion involving the Minister for Industry and Employment than it plans to spend on assistance for the Snow Brand Pty Ltd, milk products company in its investment in a new plant at Tatura.
- 99 MRS WILSON To move, That this House congratulates Vizy Board's \$50 million expansion of a Cardboard Box Factory at Dandenong which will create new jobs for people living in Dandenong, one of the hardest hit areas by unemployment.
- 100 MR LONEY To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Education for cuts in education funding which have led to reduced learning opportunities for students in Geelong North and a wastage of library resources in primary schools in Geelong North.
- 101 MR BATCHELOR To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Public Transport for his failure to provide adequate rail service to country Victoria over the Easter holiday period as evidenced by the poor level of service on the Melbourne-Swan Hill train including on the 1.30 p.m. service from Swan Hill on April 4th the air conditioning was not working properly so that it was extremely hot in passenger carriages and passengers were repeatedly told en route that the train would not stop at Sunshine, however it did, resulting in needless inconvenience for many passengers who had been led to believe that their only alternative was to disembark at St Albans or Spencer Street.
- 102 MR ANDRIANOPOULOS To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Health for not addressing the urgent need for more funds to be made available for child and adolescent psychiatric services at the Maroondah Hospital Psychiatric Unit which has resulted in a 9 month waiting period for patients causing untold strain and risk on families in the outer east.

- 103 MS GARBUTT To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Community Services for his failure to provide to parents in Frankston access to an affordable and quality facility-based respite service for their children who have a disability thus placing financial pressures on these Frankston families.
- 104 MR BATCHELOR To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Public Transport for failing to ensure the co-ordination of rail and bus services in the Watsonia area, as evidenced by local buses that stop at the Watsonia railway station not meeting trains arriving at the station, and drivers refusing to wait for disembarking passengers who wish to catch the bus.
- MS MARPLE To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Community Services for his policies that have led to massive increases in fees at the Merinda Park Pre-school and that have left children at the pre-school without milk or excursions.
- MR HAMILTON To move, That the Minister for Youth Affairs be condemned for failing to ensure that at least one Koori Youth Organisation was funded through the office of Youth Affairs Grants Program and given that currently two Koori Youth Programs have been de-funded, the Minister is further condemned for his discrimination against the most needy youth in our community.
- MR DOLLIS To move, That this House condemns the State Government for its failure to ensure the completion of beach restoration works at McCrae and notes that without immediate action the future of the Rosebud Lifesaving Club is at risk and a long standing tradition of service to the Southern Peninsular community may end.
- MR SANDON To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Education for cuts to education funding that has reduced the allocation of L.O.T.E. staffing from 3 to 2 at Abbotsford Primary School and has put at risk one of the leading school language programs in Victoria and thereby reducing educational opportunities to families in Abbotsford.
- 109 MR MILDENHALL To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Local Government for misleading residents of Prahran and part of Malvern in comments that amalgamation would result in cuts in rates for Prahran and Malvern residents when in fact a meeting of councillors of the City of Prahran on the 18th of April indicated that the rate reductions promised will not be achievable.
- 110 MS MARPLE To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Community Services for failing to guarantee to parents caring for a child with a disability in Croydon access to an affordable facility based respite service which has resulted in severe financial hardship for parents in the Croydon area.
- MR LEIGHTON To move, That this House in noting the outspoken comments in May 1992 by the Member for Ivanhoe, the Honourable Vin Heffernan MP, in support of continued state ownership of the historic Banyule Homestead in his Ivanhoe Electorate, including his statement that the people would have the final say at the next election, now condemns the Member for Ivanhoe for supporting the Government sale of the Banyule Homestead.

- 2 PUBLIC SERVICE EMPLOYMENT PACKAGES Resumption of debate on the question That this House condemns the Government for its actions in secretly entering into employment packages and conditions for senior public service positions. (Mr Perton).

- 9 That the Committee shall keep a record of all evidence given before it and determinations made by it.
- 10 That the Committee have power to authorize publication of any evidence given before it in public and any document presented to it.
- 11 That as soon as practicable after the completion of each day's proceedings a transcript of the evidence taken in public by the Committee shall be published.
- 12 That the foregoing provisions of this resolution so far as they are inconsistent with the Standing Orders and practices of the Houses shall have effect notwithstanding anything contained in those Standing Orders.
- 22 DR COGHILL To move, That this House dissents from the actions of Mr Speaker in disallowing the use of lap top computers in the Chamber by Members and expresses the opinion that their use is acceptable subject to conditions similar to those applying in the other place.
- MR SERCOMBE To move, That this House condemns the Premier and the Speaker for undermining the independence, integrity and respect for the Office of Speaker by their actions in delaying a decision on the date of the Broadmeadows By-election until immediately after the Premier's deliberately belated response to the Speaker's invitation to comment on the matter and the selection of the last practical date as preferred by the Premier for purely partisan political advantage contrary to the fundamental principle that the Speaker makes decisions on a non-partisan basis and the custom and practice of choosing the earliest practical dates for by-elections so as to minimise the period for which electors are unrepresented.
- 24 MR SANDON To move, That he have leave to bring in a Bill to amend the Education Act 1958 to provide for the establishment of School Closures Review Committees, to allow for public consultation in the closure of Government Schools and for other purposes.

- 27 MR LEIGH To move, That this House condemns the Leader of the Opposition Mr J Brumby and Members of the Opposition for their failure to disassociate themselves from the activities of the Member for Clayton in his failure to repay in adequate time monies that he owed the Ministry of Education.

- 29 MR THOMSON (Pascoe Vale) To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Community Services for his action in cutting funding to the Dr Stanley Cochrane Pre-school in Mitcham, which has placed a heavy financial burden on many parents whose pre-school fees have risen from \$180 per year to \$480 per year.
- 30 MR MICALLEF To move, That this House condemns the State Government for its continued failure to adequately secure the former Joseph Banks Secondary College site at Doveton, showing a disregard for the safety of local residents, allowing them to walk unhindered into an asbestos contaminated area and leaving a damage bill estimated at over \$60,000 some of which is to facilities which are to be retained by the community.
- 31 MR HAERMEYER To move, That this House notes with concern that as a result of Government policies fees at the Mordialloc Kindergarten have increased from \$50 per term in 1993 to \$110 per term in 1994, with parents expected to pay an additional \$30 levy for excursions, and consequently, enrolments at this kindergarten have decreased from 50 in 1993 to 30 in 1994 and this House urges the Minister to implement policies to ensure affordable and quality pre-schools are available to all families in the Mordialloc area.
- 32 MS GARBUTT To move, That this House notes with concern that on average preschool fees on the Mornington Peninsular have doubled this year from \$49 to \$99 and further evidence suggests that at least 44 children have been excluded this year because parents cannot pay fees, 15 children have moved to day care as they can obtain fee relief, 20 children are on waiting lists due to reduced sessions and groups lost.

- MS GARBUTT To move, That this House expresses its concerns at the failure of the Minister for Community Services to guarantee that all families living in Blackburn are able to afford to have their children attend pre-school, including those 15% of children who have not enrolled this year due to massive increase of 140% in preschool fees at Blackburn North Pre-school.
- 34 MS MARPLE To move, That this House notes with concern the failure of the State Government to require an environmental effects statement for the proposed redevelopment of the Crib Point Oil Facility despite the companies involved indicating that works will not proceed during 1994.
- 35 MRS WILSON To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Fair Trading for her Government's actions in eroding the resources available to consumers for information and protection, through the closure of the regional offices of the Office of Fair Trading in Ringwood and Dandenong, thus making it difficult for people living in the outer suburbs to access these services.
- 36 MR SEITZ To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Community Services for Government policies which have lead to an increase of kindergarten fees at Indra Pre-school in Blackburn South from \$180 to \$500 a year, resulting in severe hardships being endured by families of Pre-school children in the Blackburn area.
- 37 MR HAMILTON To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Public Transport for the appalling level of service for commuters travelling to Bairnsdale via Sale, since the abolition of the Rail Service between Bairnsdale and Sale, including the lack of shelter and passenger amenities at Bairnsdale and inconvenience caused by long delays in bus and train connections.
- 38 MR ANDRIANOPOULOS To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Public Transport for the premature introduction of driver only trains on the Alamein line, which because of 'blind spots' created by the design of station platforms along this line, has resulted in passengers being placed in great danger when boarding and alighting from trains, due to the inability of drivers to clearly see whether passengers are clear of the train before departing.
- 39 MR THOMSON (Pascoe Vale) To move, That this House condemns the Government for its massive increases in class sizes at Antonio Park Primary School which have led to a reduced quality of education at that school.
- 40 MR DOLLIS To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Planning for his intervention in the Knox Council decision regarding a proposed Fast Food Restaurant in Rowville as yet another example of this Government's overriding of Local Government Planning Schemes and decisions, thereby undermining the role of Local Government and showing complete disregard for the rights and wishes of Knox residents.
- 41 MR HAERMEYER To move, That this House condemns the Minister for School Education for Government Education Policies which have lead to massive increases in class sizes at Antonio Park Primary School whilst teaching staff numbers have been significantly reduced, resulting in dislocation of students and the inability of staff to provide the optimum level of quality education that Antonio Park Primary students so richly deserve.

- 42 MS MARPLE To move, That the House condemns the Minister for Community Services for his failure to provide an affordable pre-school at Croydon Central where due to the Minister's policies there has been a massive 88% increase in fees from \$160 in 1993 to \$300 in 1994.
- 43 MR SHEEHAN To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Education who, with the support of the Member for Mordialloc, has implemented policies which have resulted in the loss of 20 teaching positions from schools in the Mordialloc Electorate, while enrolments have increased by in excess of 60.
- 44 MR MILDENHALL To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Youth Affairs for cutting funding to the Nunawading Youth Adult Bureau by \$16,000, resulting in reduced outreach services to youth in the Nunawading area at a time when charitable organisations in Nunawading are experiencing a 100% increase in demand for their services, and youth unemployment remains at disastrously high levels.
- 45 MR SERCOMBE To move, That this House condemns the Government for its education policies which have reduced the quality of education for children in the Monbulk electorate.
- MS GARBUTT To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Community Services for Government policies that have led to a 88% increase in fees from \$45 to \$115 per term at the Greenhills Pre-school, resulting in severe financial hardship for many parents with pre-school children in the Greensborough and Eltham communities.
- 47 MR ANDRIANOPOULOS To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Education for failing to provide quality education to students at Bendigo Senior Secondary College due directly to government policies that have resulted in stopping the construction of a library and new classrooms at the school.
- 48 MRS WILSON To move, That this House notes with concern that the Minister for Education has failed to ensure a quality education for children at Cranbourne West Primary School, due to massive increases in class sizes at this school.
- 49 MR PANDAZOPOULOS To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Education for denying children at the Cranbourne South Primary School a quality education due to massive increases in class sizes at the school.
- DR COGHILL To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Employment and Industry for failing to introduce a job creation scheme for people in the Bendigo area as promised before the election where the Bendigo District share of Jobs created under the said scheme would be over 800, such jobs providing a much needed stimulus to the Bendigo economy at a time when 8,444 people were receiving unemployment benefits from Social Security offices in Bendigo and Kangaroo Flat in February, 1994 being 14.73% more than in February, 1993.
- MR HAMILTON To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Youth Affairs for cutting totally funding to the Barwon Youth Information Service which has resulted in less information reaching young people in the Barwon area who are in desperate need of advice and support.

- 52 MR MILDENHALL To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Community Services for his action in cutting funding to the Gisborne Kindergarten, which has placed a heavy financial burden on many parents in the Gisborne area whose pre-school fees have risen by \$450 per child.
- MR PANDAZOPOULOS To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Community Services for Government policies that have cut funding to the Ontos Pre-school, which has lead to an increase in fees from \$30 per term to \$130 per term, resulting in severe hardship being endured by families for pre-school children in the Buchan Community.
- MS GARBUTT To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Community Services for his failure to provide an affordable pre-school at Mordialloc where due to the Minister's policies there has been a massive 100% increase in fees at the Elenora Pre-school causing extreme financial hardship for parents of pre-school children in the Mordialloc area.
- MS MARPLE To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Community Services for his actions in cutting funding to kindergartens in Bendigo which has placed an extra financial burden on parents whose fees have doubled at the Bendigo Kindergarten in 1994.
- 56 MR BATCHELOR To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Public Transport for his failure to provide an adequate frequency of tram services from the City to West Preston and Mont Albert which has resulted in long delays for customers, as evidenced by patrons on Victoria Parade waiting up to 17 minutes for trams to the City on the Mont Albert route during the morning peak-hour on Thursday 17 March and Friday 18 March, 1994.
- 57 MR PANDAZOPOULOS To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Public Transport for failing to ensure that services operated by the National Bus Company on route No. 256 between the City and La Trobe University run on time, as evidenced by delays of more than an hour between services on the afternoon of Thursday March 17, 1994.
- 58 MS GARBUTT To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Health for her failure to ensure that all mothers and babies in Bayswater are guarantied a minimum of 5 days in maternity care if they need it following the birth of a child.
- 59 MR ANDRIANOPOULOS To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Education for his failure to provide a second Government school V.C.E. facility in Bendigo despite a pre-election promise of the Government to have a second V.C.E. facility "for the start of 1993" and his subsequent failure to have the said facility operational at the commencement of the 1994 school year.
- 60 MR SANDON To move, That this House condemns the Government for its failure to ensure all children at the Le Page School in Cheltenham are guarantied a quality education due to massive increases in class sizes at the school.
- 61 MR MILDENHALL To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Community Services for ordering closed the only two reception facilities for emergency child abuse cases in the Western Suburbs, namely Buckland House and St Joseph's, in the face of his department's figures showing a 159% increase in child abuse notifications since the introduction of mandatory reporting.

- 62 MR THOMSON (Pascoe Vale) To move, That this House censures Mr Speaker for his failure to allow the Member for Sunshine and other Honourable Members to raise matters on the Adjournment Debate on Thursday 24 March 1994, in breach of the entitlements of Honourable Members provided for by the Sessional Orders.
- 63 MR COOPER To move, That this House censures the Honourable Member for Bundoora for attempting to use the abuse and death of Daniel Valerio to score cheap political points, and calls on the Honourable Member for Bundoora to apologise to this House, the family of Daniel Valerio and the Victorian Community for her inconsiderate and insensitive behaviour.
- 64 MR BATCHELOR To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Public Transport for reducing the size of the Bendigo Railway Workshops workforce from 270 in October, 1992 to under 180 causing job positions to be lost in Bendigo, notwithstanding pre-election comments by representatives of the current Government that the workforce would increase.
- 65 MR THWAITES To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Health for Government policies that have put mothers and babies in Boronia at risk due to their early release from hospital following childbirth.
- 66 MR MICALLEF To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Public Transport for his failure to ensure residents in Carrum Downs have access to adequate public transport in order to travel to their municipal base in Cranbourne.
- 67 MR MILDENHALL To move, That this House condemns the State Government for its failure to recognise the concerns of residents in Merinda Park regarding the Government's proposal for a Merinda Park Railway Station.
- 68 **MS MARPLE** To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Health for her failure to ensure that mothers and babies in Croydon are able to stay at least 5 days in maternity care following the birth of their child.
- MR COOPER To move, That this House notes the involvement of the Honourable Member for Thomastown, in his then role as State Secretary of the Australian Labor Party, to manipulate the result of the Nunawading Province re-election in 1985 and his subsequent refusal to co-operate with the police investigation of this scandal, and calls on the Honourable Member for Thomastown to disclose the full facts of his and other Australian Labor Party members involvement.
- 70 MS MARPLE To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Agriculture for his lack of commitment to unemployed people in Bendigo by failing to relocate the Department of Agriculture to Bendigo and thus provide 130 jobs in Bendigo as promised by the Government.
- 71 MR ROWE To move, That this House commends the Minister for Education for responding to the education needs of the Botany Park/Skye community in that he has recognised the need for additional facilities in the provision of additional building to the value of \$180,000, and commenced the process for the future expansion and rebuilding of Skye Primary School.

- 72 MR ROWE To move, That this House commends the Minister for Education for responding to the education needs of the Cranbourne South Community by the provision of \$180,000 in a new building which had not been provided by the previous government.
- 73 MR ROWE To move, That this House commends the Minister for Education for responding to the education needs of the Cranbourne community in addressing the urgent need for \$100,000 of maintenance works at the Lyndhurst Secondary College being part of the black hole backlog of maintenance totalling millions of dollars left by the previous Labor government.
- 74 MRS WILSON To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Local Government for the lack of input residents of the Borough of Eaglehawk have had into the proposed Local Government restructure, despite the fact that 70% of residents in Eaglehawk voted in the poll on the proposal and over 90% voted against amalgamation.
- 75 MR PANDAZOPOULOS To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Local Government for his failure to take account of the overwhelming 70% vote by the Bendigo community against council amalgamations on 29 January 1994 and forcing amalgamation of the five municipalities in the Bendigo area.
- 76 MR LEIGHTON To move, That this House condemns the Member for Ivanhoe, the Honourable Vin Heffernan, for his failure to honour his commitment that the Liberal Government would restore full disadvantaged school program funding to schools in his electorate such as West Heidelberg Primary School and his advice to a parent of that school that there are no votes in West Heidelberg.
- 77 MR THWAITES To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Health for her failure to ensure that mothers and babies in Knox are able to stay at least 5 days in maternity care following the birth of their child thus placing at risk the health and future well-being of these mothers and babies.
- 78 MR THWAITES To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Health for her failure to ensure that mothers and babies in Ringwood are able to stay at least 5 days in maternity care following the birth of their child to ensure that the health and future well being of the mother and baby is not at risk.
- MR COOPER To move, That this House calls on all members of the Opposition to disassociate themselves from the actions of the Honourable Member for Thomastown who, in his then role as State Secretary of the Australian Labor Party, orchestrated a campaign to mislead and defraud voters in the re-election for the Nunawading Province in 1985, and requests that all Opposition members publicly support the demand that the Honourable Member for Thomastown disclose to the House all of the facts relating to his involvement in this scandal.
- 80 **MS GARBUTT** To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Community Services for failing to guarantee to parents in Ringwood an affordable and quality respite service for those children who have a disability.
- 81 MS GARBUTT To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Community Services for failing to guarantee to parents in Blackburn access to an affordable and quality respite service for children with a disability resulting in considerable financial hardship for these parents.

- 82 MR HAERMEYER To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Police and Emergency Services for failing to provide sufficient funds to enable the Victorian Police to properly service the municipalities of Knox, Ringwood, Croydon, Sherbrooke, Healesville, Lilydale and Upper Yarra, particularly noting that the local community is being asked to foot the bill for a \$120,000 police caravan to adequately serve the very obvious policing needs of these communities.
- MR HAERMEYER To move, That this House condemns the Member for Bayswater for failing to represent the interests of his constituents and to live up to his promise to "provide the Victorian Police with the resources it needs to protect the community", noting: (a) The member's failure to stand up for his community when his Government cancelled the contract to provide a new police station for Bayswater; and (b) The member's failure to act on behalf of the local community in response to demands that the local community foot the bill for a \$120,000 mobile police caravan that the community urgently needs.
- MR DOLLIS To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Planning for not consulting with Eltham residents or allowing them direct input into the Government's decision whether to allow 24 hour trading in residential areas, thereby further lessening the rights of Eltham residents to participate in planning issues which will affect their amenities and living conditions, as well as altering the nature of their neighbourhoods.
- MR LONEY To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Sport, Recreation and Racing for his lack of commitment to ensure that people with an intellectual disability have access to appropriate sport and recreation activities as shown by the total defunding of the Victorian Sport and Recreation Association of Persons with an Intellectual Disability leaving people with an intellectual disability without a voice and a means to ensure that sport and recreation is available to all.
- 86 MR BATCHELOR To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Public Transport for failing to provide an adequate level of public transport services over the Easter Holiday period as evidenced by customers being required to wait more than 45 minutes for a city-bound tram on the East Malvern route on the morning of Monday, April 4 1994.
- MR THOMSON (Pascoe Vale) To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Public Transport for his failure to ensure an adequate level of service for PTC customers who use the Broadmeadows railway line, as evidenced by the events of March 29, 1994 in relation to the 7.33 a.m. service from the City, when passengers were told when the train arrived at Essendon Station to board a bus for the rest of the trip, but passengers waiting at unstaffed stations further down the line were not told the train was not coming and had been replaced by a bus, and were left waiting on train platforms.
- 88 MR THWAITES To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Health for placing at risk the health of mothers and babies in Mitcham as a result of their early discharge from hospital following childbirth.
- 89 MS GARBUTT To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Health for her failure to ensure that mothers and babies in Oakleigh South are able to stay at least five days in maternity care following the birth of their baby thus placing at risk the health and future well being of these Oakleigh South mothers and babies.

- 90 MR LEIGH To move, That this House condemns the Member for Springvale for his involvement in the previous Labor Government's decision to purchase a tip in Springvale South which is now owned by the Ministry of Planning and Development but which had been owned by Waverley Council and managed by Springvale Council and further condemns the Member for his involvement in ensuring that Victorian taxpayers would be responsible for the costs of containing and cleaning up the pollution caused by the Council's disgraceful management practices.
- 91 MR LEIGH To move, That this House calls on the Leader of the Opposition to sack his political adviser Mr P Reed, the Mayor of Springvale, for his attempts to pump polluted tip waters into Melbourne Water's Braeside Park thereby putting the park at risk.
- 92 MR HAERMEYER To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Health for her failure to ensure that mothers and babies in Knoxfield are able to stay at least five days in maternity care following the birth of their baby thus placing at risk the health and future well being of these Knoxfield mothers and babies.
- 93 MR SANDON To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Education for his cuts to education funding at the Richmond West Primary School that have resulted in the loss of 9.5 teachers, an 18% increase in average class sizes, a 50% reduction in specialist programs, a 50% cut in reading recovery program and reduced professional development and program evaluation.
- 94 MR LEIGHTON To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Community Services for closure of cottage homes which has led to an increased demand for foster places in Blackburn, without also addressing the need for an increase in reimbursement rates for potential foster parents in the Blackburn area, described by the Children's Welfare Association of Victoria as being totally inadequate, thus leaving children without permanent placement.
- 95 MS GARBUTT To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Community Services for budget cuts which have seen services to physically and intellectually disabled people severely reduced at Kew Cottages, with recreation programs cut by more than half and the staff-client ratio falling to dangerous levels with plans for more reductions, resulting in poor staff morale and increased trauma and stress for long suffering parents at Kew Cottages.
- 96 MR PANDAZOPOULOS To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Community Services for his Government policies that have led to a massive 100% increase in fees at the All Saints Pre-School which has denied children from migrant and low income families in the Nunawading area access to pre-school.
- 97 MR LEIGHTON To move, That this House refers to the Privileges Committee for examination and report the matter of whether the Minister for Industry and Employment, the Honourable Phillip Gude, has committed a contempt in that he deliberately misled the House in that -
  - In a question without notice on 31 March 1994 the Leader of the Opposition referred the Minister to a briefing to heads of statutory authorities at which Mr Ian Douglas, QC outlined the State Government's position on changes to the Federal Industrial Relations Act;
  - In answer the Minister for Industry and Employment stated in part that the meeting was not to provide a briefing on changes to the Federal Industrial

- Legislation nor was any reference made to any major changes to the Federal Industrial Relations Act;
- The agenda of the briefing to statutory authority heads which shows under item 2 "Employee Relations Minister for Industry and Employment" at 2(ii) "The Federal Legislation Implications and Options Ian Douglas";
- 4 Notes of the briefing to statutory authority heads of 15 March 1994 made available to the State Opposition which record the briefing given by Ian Douglas, QC on the Federal Legislation; and
- The response by the Minister for Industry and Employment on the adjournment debate of 31 March 1994 to the matter raised by the Member for Preston, where the Minister failed to alter the substance of his earlier response to the Leader of the Opposition.
- 98 MR THOMSON (Pascoe Vale) To move, That this House notes with concern that the Government has spent more money on advertising campaigns and self-promotion involving the Minister for Industry and Employment than it plans to spend on assistance for the Snow Brand Pty Ltd, milk products company in its investment in a new plant at Tatura.
- 99 MRS WILSON To move, That this House congratulates Vizy Board's \$50 million expansion of a Cardboard Box Factory at Dandenong which will create new jobs for people living in Dandenong, one of the hardest hit areas by unemployment.
- MR LONEY To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Education for cuts in education funding which have led to reduced learning opportunities for students in Geelong North and a wastage of library resources in primary schools in Geelong North.
- 101 MR BATCHELOR To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Public Transport for his failure to provide adequate rail service to country Victoria over the Easter holiday period as evidenced by the poor level of service on the Melbourne-Swan Hill train including on the 1.30 p.m. service from Swan Hill on April 4th the air conditioning was not working properly so that it was extremely hot in passenger carriages and passengers were repeatedly told en route that the train would not stop at Sunshine, however it did, resulting in needless inconvenience for many passengers who had been led to believe that their only alternative was to disembark at St Albans or Spencer Street.
- MR ANDRIANOPOULOS To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Health for not addressing the urgent need for more funds to be made available for child and adolescent psychiatric services at the Maroondah Hospital Psychiatric Unit which has resulted in a 9 month waiting period for patients causing untold strain and risk on families in the outer east.
- 103 MS GARBUTT To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Community Services for his failure to provide to parents in Frankston access to an affordable and quality facility-based respite service for their children who have a disability thus placing financial pressures on these Frankston families.

- 104 MR BATCHELOR To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Public Transport for failing to ensure the co-ordination of rail and bus services in the Watsonia area, as evidenced by local buses that stop at the Watsonia railway station not meeting trains arriving at the station, and drivers refusing to wait for disembarking passengers who wish to catch the bus.
- 105 MS MARPLE To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Community Services for his policies that have led to massive increases in fees at the Merinda Park Pre-school and that have left children at the pre-school without milk or excursions.
- 106 MR HAMILTON To move, That the Minister for Youth Affairs be condemned for failing to ensure that at least one Koori Youth Organisation was funded through the office of Youth Affairs Grants Program and given that currently two Koori Youth Programs have been de-funded, the Minister is further condemned for his discrimination against the most needy youth in our community.
- MR DOLLIS To move, That this House condemns the State Government for its failure to ensure the completion of beach restoration works at McCrae and notes that without immediate action the future of the Rosebud Lifesaving Club is at risk and a long standing tradition of service to the Southern Peninsular community may end.
- 108 MR SANDON To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Education for cuts to education funding that has reduced the allocation of L.O.T.E. staffing from 3 to 2 at Abbotsford Primary School and has put at risk one of the leading school language programs in Victoria and thereby reducing educational opportunities to families in Abbotsford.
- 109 MR MILDENHALL To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Local Government for misleading residents of Prahran and part of Malvern in comments that amalgamation would result in cuts in rates for Prahran and Malvern residents when in fact a meeting of councillors of the City of Prahran on the 18th of April indicated that the rate reductions promised will not be achievable.
- 110 **MS MARPLE** To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Community Services for failing to guarantee to parents caring for a child with a disability in Croydon access to an affordable facility based respite service which has resulted in severe financial hardship for parents in the Croydon area.
- 111 MR LEIGHTON To move, That this House in noting the outspoken comments in May 1992 by the Member for Ivanhoe, the Honourable Vin Heffernan MP, in support of continued state ownership of the historic Banyule Homestead in his Ivanhoe Electorate, including his statement that the people would have the final say at the next election, now condemns the Member for Ivanhoe for supporting the Government sale of the Banyule Homestead.
- MR THOMSON (Pascoe Vale) To move, That this House invites the Members of the Legislative Council to meet in the Legislative Assembly with the Members of this House on the first Wednesday following passage of this motion, at 6.00 p.m. for the purposes of electing six members of Parliament, two from each of the Liberal Party, National Party and Australian Labor Party, to represent the Parliament at lunches of the Rumour Tank, noting that this will enable the Parliament to obtain early notice of impending legislation and will help address the often discussed

imbalance between the executive and the Parliament, by enabling Parliamentarians to learn of the Government's intentions before Cabinet does.

- \*113 MR MILDENHALL To move, That this House condemns the Member for Oakleigh for allowing the State Government to reduce the subsidy paid to school crossing supervisors by 16% (approximately \$800 per supervisor), thus forcing the Oakleigh Council, for which she is also a Member, to dismiss 10 crossing supervisors while supporting the Government's decision to spend \$9.1 million upgrading the Premier's and the Treasurer's office.
- \*114 MR THWAITES To move, That this House condemns the Members for Bendigo East, Bendigo West and North Western Province for failing to secure funding for the Bendigo Hospital's \$5.2 million redevelopment project in the recent economic statement whilst supporting the Government's decision to spend \$9.1 million in upgrading the office of the Premier and Treasurer.
- \*115 MR HAERMEYER To move, That this House condemns the Member for Mooroolbark for allowing the Government to reduce the funding to the outer Eastern College of TAFE by \$1 million thus reducing the level of services to people in Lilydale and Croydon whilst supporting the Government's decision to spend \$9.1 million upgrading the Premier's and Treasurer's offices.
- \*116 MR PANDAZOPOULOS To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Planning for allowing the Government to reduce the funding to Minimbah Adult Training Centre by \$69,000 and threatening further cuts thus reducing the services available to the intellectually disabled within his south eastern growth corridor seat of Pakenham, whilst supporting the Government's decision to spend \$9.1 million upgrading the Premier's and Treasurer's office.

- 1 MANAGEMENT OF DEBT Resumption of debate on the question That this House congratulates the Government on the steps it is taking to deal with the high and increasing levels of debt and other liabilities which it faced upon taking office. (Mr Perrin).

- 19 MS MARPLE To move, That this House (a) calls on the Government to refer the status of the Chiltern Regional Park to the Land Conservation Council to be urgently reviewed in light of the importance of the remnant box and ironbark forest; and (b) revokes the consent to mineral exploration in Chiltern Park by CRA Exploration Pty Limited given by the Minister for Conservation and Environment, notice of which was tabled in this House on 16 March 1993 pursuant to section 40(5) of the National Parks Act 1975, so that there can be a moratorium on exploration while the Land Conservation Council considers the status of the Chiltern Regional Park.

### 20 DR COGHILL - To move -

- 1 That a Joint Select Committee be appointed to enquire into and report upon the operation of the parliamentary committee system and in particular to report on provision by statute for its monitoring and review of all portfolios and for bi-partisan functioning.
- 2 That the Committee shall consist of eight Members, four members nominated by the Premier of whom two must be Members of the Assembly and one must be a Member of the Council and four Members nominated by the Leader of the Opposition of whom two must be Members of the Assembly and one must be a Member of the Council. The appointments shall be made by the relevant House.
- 3 That five Members of the Committee shall constitute a quorum of the Committee.
- 4 That the Committee shall elect two of its Members to be Joint Chairmen.
- 5 That the Committee may sit in such places in Victoria as seems most convenient for the proper and speedy despatch of business.
- 6 That the Committee shall not sit while either House is actually sitting except by leave of that House and may not, while either House is actually sitting, sit in any place other than a place that is within the Parliament building.
- 7 That the Committee may send for persons, papers and records and report from time to time.
- 8 That the Committee shall, unless it otherwise resolves, take all evidence in public.
- 9 That the Committee shall keep a record of all evidence given before it and determinations made by it.
- 10 That the Committee have power to authorize publication of any evidence given before it in public and any document presented to it.
- 11 That as soon as practicable after the completion of each day's proceedings a transcript of the evidence taken in public by the Committee shall be published.
- 12 That the foregoing provisions of this resolution so far as they are inconsistent with the Standing Orders and practices of the Houses shall have effect notwithstanding anything contained in those Standing Orders.
- 21 **DR COGHILL** To move, That this House dissents from the actions of Mr Speaker in disallowing the use of lap top computers in the Chamber by Members and expresses the opinion that their use is acceptable subject to conditions similar to those applying in the other place.
- MR SERCOMBE To move, That this House condemns the Premier and the Speaker for undermining the independence, integrity and respect for the Office of Speaker by their actions in delaying a decision on the date of the Broadmeadows By-election until immediately after the Premier's deliberately belated response to the Speaker's invitation to comment on the matter and the selection of the last practical date as preferred by the Premier for purely partisan political advantage contrary to the fundamental principle that the Speaker makes decisions on a non-partisan basis and the custom and practice of choosing the earliest practical dates for by-elections so as to minimise the period for which electors are unrepresented.

- 23 MR SANDON To move, That he have leave to bring in a Bill to amend the *Education Act* 1958 to provide for the establishment of School Closures Review Committees, to allow for public consultation in the closure of Government Schools and for other purposes.
- 24 MR DOLLIS To move, That he have leave to bring in a Bill to amend the *Building Control Act* 1981 and for other purposes.
- MR LEIGH To move, That this House condemns the Member for Clayton for (a) his failure to repay to the State of Victoria within due time \$7595.41 advanced to the Member from the Education Ministry after his entering a studentship agreement; and (b) his offers to repay \$20 per month over a period of 18 years in spite of letters from the Victorian Government Solicitor threatening legal action unless he complied with arrangements which are contained in the studentship agreement that he entered into; despite the fact that during his time as a MLA for Glenhuntly and Clayton he received salary and electoral allowances of almost \$1.5 M. and this House further requests the Member to explain to the people why he failed to honour arrangements that were entered into by the Member in the studentship agreement which he made and which was honoured by the State of Victoria but not honoured by the Member for Clayton.
- 26 MR LEIGH To move, That this House condemns the Leader of the Opposition Mr J Brumby and Members of the Opposition for their failure to disassociate themselves from the activities of the Member for Clayton in his failure to repay in adequate time monies that he owed the Ministry of Education.
- DR COGHILL To move, That this House expresses the opinion that there is prima facie evidence of a contempt of the Parliament by the Honourable the Leader of the House in that he failed to make available for inspection all correspondence and other documents created since 26 October 1992, relating to any aspect of the review or reform of the structure, functioning, Standing Orders, procedures, practices or administration of the Legislative Assembly, the Legislative Council or the Parliament in any other respect including the rights and entitlements of Members received by him or sent by him or on his authority to the Speaker of the Legislative Assembly and the President of the Legislative Council either individually or jointly or any Officer or Officers of the Parliament, and all documents held by him relating to meetings, telephone conversations or other forms of communication or discussion in respect of the above matters in which he participated or which were held on his authority in response to Question No. 8 and that the matter be referred to the Privileges Committee for inquiry and report.
- 28 MR THOMSON (Pascoe Vale) To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Community Services for his action in cutting funding to the Dr Stanley Cochrane Pre-school in Mitcham, which has placed a heavy financial burden on many parents whose pre-school fees have risen from \$180 per year to \$480 per year.
- 29 MR MICALLEF To move, That this House condemns the State Government for its continued failure to adequately secure the former Joseph Banks Secondary College site at Doveton, showing a disregard for the safety of local residents, allowing them to walk unhindered into an asbestos contaminated area and leaving a damage bill estimated at over \$60,000 some of which is to facilities which are to be retained by the community.

- MR HAERMEYER To move, That this House notes with concern that as a result of Government policies fees at the Mordialloc Kindergarten have increased from \$50 per term in 1993 to \$110 per term in 1994, with parents expected to pay an additional \$30 levy for excursions, and consequently, enrolments at this kindergarten have decreased from 50 in 1993 to 30 in 1994 and this House urges the Minister to implement policies to ensure affordable and quality pre-schools are available to all families in the Mordialloc area.
- 31 MS GARBUTT To move, That this House notes with concern that on average preschool fees on the Mornington Peninsular have doubled this year from \$49 to \$99 and further evidence suggests that at least 44 children have been excluded this year because parents cannot pay fees, 15 children have moved to day care as they can obtain fee relief, 20 children are on waiting lists due to reduced sessions and groups lost.
- 32 MS GARBUTT To move, That this House expresses its concerns at the failure of the Minister for Community Services to guarantee that all families living in Blackburn are able to afford to have their children attend pre-school, including those 15% of children who have not enroled this year due to massive increase of 140% in preschool fees at Blackburn North Pre-school.
- 33 MS MARPLE To move, That this House notes with concern the failure of the State Government to require an environmental effects statement for the proposed redevelopment of the Crib Point Oil Facility despite the companies involved indicating that works will not proceed during 1994.
- 34 MRS WILSON To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Fair Trading for her Government's actions in eroding the resources available to consumers for information and protection, through the closure of the regional offices of the Office of Fair Trading in Ringwood and Dandenong, thus making it difficult for people living in the outer suburbs to access these services.
- 35 MR SEITZ To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Community Services for Government policies which have lead to an increase of kindergarten fees at Indra Pre-school in Blackburn South from \$180 to \$500 a year, resulting in severe hardships being endured by families of Pre-school children in the Blackburn area.
- 36 MR HAMILTON To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Public Transport for the appalling level of service for commuters travelling to Bairnsdale via Sale, since the abolition of the Rail Service between Bairnsdale and Sale, including the lack of shelter and passenger amenities at Bairnsdale and inconvenience caused by long delays in bus and train connections.
- 37 MR ANDRIANOPOULOS To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Public Transport for the premature introduction of driver only trains on the Alamein line, which because of 'blind spots' created by the design of station platforms along this line, has resulted in passengers being placed in great danger when boarding and alighting from trains, due to the inability of drivers to clearly see whether passengers are clear of the train before departing.
- 38 MR THOMSON (Pascoe Vale) To move, That this House condemns the Government for its massive increases in class sizes at Antonio Park Primary School which have led to a reduced quality of education at that school.

- 39 MR DOLLIS To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Planning for his intervention in the Knox Council decision regarding a proposed Fast Food Restaurant in Rowville as yet another example of this Government's overriding of Local Government Planning Schemes and decisions, thereby undermining the role of Local Government and showing complete disregard for the rights and wishes of Knox residents.
- 40 MR HAERMEYER To move, That this House condemns the Minister for School Education for Government Education Policies which have lead to massive increases in class sizes at Antonio Park Primary School whilst teaching staff numbers have been significantly reduced, resulting in dislocation of students and the inability of staff to provide the optimum level of quality education that Antonio Park Primary students so richly deserve.
- 41 MS MARPLE To move, That the House condemns the Minister for Community Services for his failure to provide an affordable pre-school at Croydon Central where due to the Minister's policies there has been a massive 88% increase in fees from \$160 in 1993 to \$300 in 1994.
- 42 MR SHEEHAN To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Education who, with the support of the Member for Mordialloc, has implemented policies which have resulted in the loss of 20 teaching positions from schools in the Mordialloc Electorate, while enrolments have increased by in excess of 60.
- 43 MR MILDENHALL To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Youth Affairs for cutting funding to the Nunawading Youth Adult Bureau by \$16,000, resulting in reduced outreach services to youth in the Nunawading area at a time when charitable organisations in Nunawading are experiencing a 100% increase in demand for their services, and youth unemployment remains at disastrously high levels.
- 44 MR SERCOMBE To move, That this House condemns the Government for its education policies which have reduced the quality of education for children in the Monbulk electorate.
- 45 MS GARBUTT To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Community Services for Government policies that have led to a 88% increase in fees from \$45 to \$115 per term at the Greenhills Pre-school, resulting in severe financial hardship for many parents with pre-school children in the Greensborough and Eltham communities.
- 46 MR ANDRIANOPOULOS To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Education for failing to provide quality education to students at Bendigo Senior Secondary College due directly to government policies that have resulted in stopping the construction of a library and new classrooms at the school.
- 47 MRS WILSON To move, That this House notes with concern that the Minister for Education has failed to ensure a quality education for children at Cranbourne West Primary School, due to massive increases in class sizes at this school.
- 48 MR PANDAZOPOULOS To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Education for denying children at the Cranbourne South Primary School a quality education due to massive increases in class sizes at the school.

- 49 DR COGHILL To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Employment and Industry for failing to introduce a job creation scheme for people in the Bendigo area as promised before the election where the Bendigo District share of Jobs created under the said scheme would be over 800, such jobs providing a much needed stimulus to the Bendigo economy at a time when 8,444 people were receiving unemployment benefits from Social Security offices in Bendigo and Kangaroo Flat in February, 1994 being 14.73% more than in February, 1993.
- MR HAMILTON To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Youth Affairs for cutting totally funding to the Barwon Youth Information Service which has resulted in less information reaching young people in the Barwon area who are in desperate need of advice and support.
- 51 MR MILDENHALL To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Community Services for his action in cutting funding to the Gisborne Kindergarten, which has placed a heavy financial burden on many parents in the Gisborne area whose pre-school fees have risen by \$450 per child.
- 52 MR PANDAZOPOULOS To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Community Services for Government policies that have cut funding to the Ontos Pre-school, which has lead to an increase in fees from \$30 per term to \$130 per term, resulting in severe hardship being endured by families for pre-school children in the Buchan Community.
- 53 MS GARBUTT To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Community Services for his failure to provide an affordable pre-school at Mordialloc where due to the Minister's policies there has been a massive 100% increase in fees at the Elenora Pre-school causing extreme financial hardship for parents of pre-school children in the Mordialloc area.
- MS MARPLE To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Community Services for his actions in cutting funding to kindergartens in Bendigo which has placed an extra financial burden on parents whose fees have doubled at the Bendigo Kindergarten in 1994.
- MR BATCHELOR To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Public Transport for his failure to provide an adequate frequency of tram services from the City to West Preston and Mont Albert which has resulted in long delays for customers, as evidenced by patrons on Victoria Parade waiting up to 17 minutes for trams to the City on the Mont Albert route during the morning peak-hour on Thursday 17 March and Friday 18 March, 1994.
- MR PANDAZOPOULOS To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Public Transport for failing to ensure that services operated by the National Bus Company on route No. 256 between the City and La Trobe University run on time, as evidenced by delays of more than an hour between services on the afternoon of Thursday March 17, 1994.
- 57 MS GARBUTT To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Health for her failure to ensure that all mothers and babies in Bayswater are guarantied a minimum of 5 days in maternity care if they need it following the birth of a child.
- 58 MR ANDRIANOPOULOS To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Education for his failure to provide a second Government school V.C.E. facility in

- Bendigo despite a pre-election promise of the Government to have a second V.C.E. facility "for the start of 1993" and his subsequent failure to have the said facility operational at the commencement of the 1994 school year.
- 59 MR SANDON To move, That this House condemns the Government for its failure to ensure all children at the Le Page School in Cheltenham are guarantied a quality education due to massive increases in class sizes at the school.
- 60 MR MILDENHALL To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Community Services for ordering closed the only two reception facilities for emergency child abuse cases in the Western Suburbs, namely Buckland House and St Joseph's, in the face of his department's figures showing a 159% increase in child abuse notifications since the introduction of mandatory reporting.
- 61 MR THOMSON (*Pascoe Vale*) To move, That this House censures Mr Speaker for his failure to allow the Member for Sunshine and other Honourable Members to raise matters on the Adjournment Debate on Thursday 24 March 1994, in breach of the entitlements of Honourable Members provided for by the Sessional Orders.
- 62 MR COOPER To move, That this House censures the Honourable Member for Bundoora for attempting to use the abuse and death of Daniel Valerio to score cheap political points, and calls on the Honourable Member for Bundoora to apologise to this House, the family of Daniel Valerio and the Victorian Community for her inconsiderate and insensitive behaviour.
- 63 MR BATCHELOR To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Public Transport for reducing the size of the Bendigo Railway Workshops workforce from 270 in October, 1992 to under 180 causing job positions to be lost in Bendigo, notwithstanding pre-election comments by representatives of the current Government that the workforce would increase.
- 64 MR THWAITES To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Health for Government policies that have put mothers and babies in Boronia at risk due to their early release from hospital following childbirth.
- 65 MR MICALLEF To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Public Transport for his failure to ensure residents in Carrum Downs have access to adequate public transport in order to travel to their municipal base in Cranbourne.
- 66 MR MILDENHALL To move, That this House condemns the State Government for its failure to recognise the concerns of residents in Merinda Park regarding the Government's proposal for a Merinda Park Railway Station.
- 67 MS MARPLE To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Health for her failure to ensure that mothers and babies in Croydon are able to stay at least 5 days in maternity care following the birth of their child.
- MR COOPER To move, That this House notes the involvement of the Honourable Member for Thomastown, in his then role as State Secretary of the Australian Labor Party, to manipulate the result of the Nunawading Province re-election in 1985 and his subsequent refusal to co-operate with the police investigation of this scandal, and calls on the Honourable Member for Thomastown to disclose the full facts of his and other Australian Labor Party members involvement.

- 69 MS MARPLE To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Agriculture for his lack of commitment to unemployed people in Bendigo by failing to relocate the Department of Agriculture to Bendigo and thus provide 130 jobs in Bendigo as promised by the Government.
- 70 MR ROWE To move, That this House commends the Minister for Education for responding to the education needs of the Botany Park/Skye community in that he has recognised the need for additional facilities in the provision of additional building to the value of \$180,000, and commenced the process for the future expansion and rebuilding of Skye Primary School.
- 71 MR ROWE To move, That this House commends the Minister for Education for responding to the education needs of the Cranbourne South Community by the provision of \$180,000 in a new building which had not been provided by the previous government.
- 72 MR ROWE To move, That this House commends the Minister for Education for responding to the education needs of the Cranbourne community in addressing the urgent need for \$100,000 of maintenance works at the Lyndhurst Secondary College being part of the black hole backlog of maintenance totalling millions of dollars left by the previous Labor government.
- 73 MRS WILSON To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Local Government for the lack of input residents of the Borough of Eaglehawk have had into the proposed Local Government restructure, despite the fact that 70% of residents in Eaglehawk voted in the poll on the proposal and over 90% voted against amalgamation.
- 74 MR PANDAZOPOULOS To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Local Government for his failure to take account of the overwhelming 70% vote by the Bendigo community against council amalgamations on 29 January 1994 and forcing amalgamation of the five municipalities in the Bendigo area.
- 75 MR LEIGHTON To move, That this House condemns the Member for Ivanhoe, the Honourable Vin Heffernan, for his failure to honour his commitment that the Liberal Government would restore full disadvantaged school program funding to schools in his electorate such as West Heidelberg Primary School and his advice to a parent of that school that there are no votes in West Heidelberg.
- 76 MR THWAITES To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Health for her failure to ensure that mothers and babies in Knox are able to stay at least 5 days in maternity care following the birth of their child thus placing at risk the health and future well-being of these mothers and babies.
- 77 MR THWAITES To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Health for her failure to ensure that mothers and babies in Ringwood are able to stay at least 5 days in maternity care following the birth of their child to ensure that the health and future well being of the mother and baby is not at risk.
- 78 MR COOPER To move, That this House calls on all members of the Opposition to disassociate themselves from the actions of the Honourable Member for Thomastown who, in his then role as State Secretary of the Australian Labor Party, orchestrated a campaign to mislead and defraud voters in the re-election for the Nunawading Province in 1985, and requests that all Opposition members publicly

- support the demand that the Honourable Member for Thomastown disclose to the House all of the facts relating to his involvement in this scandal.
- 79 MS GARBUTT To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Community Services for failing to guarantee to parents in Ringwood an affordable and quality respite service for those children who have a disability.
- 80 MS GARBUTT To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Community Services for failing to guarantee to parents in Blackburn access to an affordable and quality respite service for children with a disability resulting in considerable financial hardship for these parents.
- 81 MR HAERMEYER To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Police and Emergency Services for failing to provide sufficient funds to enable the Victorian Police to properly service the municipalities of Knox, Ringwood, Croydon, Sherbrooke, Healesville, Lilydale and Upper Yarra, particularly noting that the local community is being asked to foot the bill for a \$120,000 police caravan to adequately serve the very obvious policing needs of these communities.
- 82 MR HAERMEYER To move, That this House condemns the Member for Bayswater for failing to represent the interests of his constituents and to live up to his promise to "provide the Victorian Police with the resources it needs to protect the community", noting: (a) The member's failure to stand up for his community when his Government cancelled the contract to provide a new police station for Bayswater; and (b) The member's failure to act on behalf of the local community in response to demands that the local community foot the bill for a \$120,000 mobile police caravan that the community urgently needs.
- 83 MR DOLLIS To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Planning for not consulting with Eltham residents or allowing them direct input into the Government's decision whether to allow 24 hour trading in residential areas, thereby further lessening the rights of Eltham residents to participate in planning issues which will affect their amenities and living conditions, as well as altering the nature of their neighbourhoods.
- MR LONEY To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Sport, Recreation and Racing for his lack of commitment to ensure that people with an intellectual disability have access to appropriate sport and recreation activities as shown by the total defunding of the Victorian Sport and Recreation Association of Persons with an Intellectual Disability leaving people with an intellectual disability without a voice and a means to ensure that sport and recreation is available to all.
- MR BATCHELOR To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Public Transport for failing to provide an adequate level of public transport services over the Easter Holiday period as evidenced by customers being required to wait more than 45 minutes for a city-bound tram on the East Malvern route on the morning of Monday, April 4 1994.
- MR THOMSON (Pascoe Vale) To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Public Transport for his failure to ensure an adequate level of service for PTC customers who use the Broadmeadows railway line, as evidenced by the events of March 29, 1994 in relation to the 7.33 a.m. service from the City, when passengers were told when the train arrived at Essendon Station to board a bus for the rest of the trip, but passengers waiting at unstaffed stations further down the line were not

- told the train was not coming and had been replaced by a bus, and were left waiting on train platforms.
- 87 MR THWAITES To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Health for placing at risk the health of mothers and babies in Mitcham as a result of their early discharge from hospital following childbirth.
- 88 MS GARBUTT To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Health for her failure to ensure that mothers and babies in Oakleigh South are able to stay at least five days in maternity care following the birth of their baby thus placing at risk the health and future well being of these Oakleigh South mothers and babies.
- MR LEIGH To move, That this House condemns the Member for Springvale for his involvement in the previous Labor Government's decision to purchase a tip in Springvale South which is now owned by the Ministry of Planning and Development but which had been owned by Waverley Council and managed by Springvale Council and further condemns the Member for his involvement in ensuring that Victorian taxpayers would be responsible for the costs of containing and cleaning up the pollution caused by the Council's disgraceful management practices.
- 90 MR LEIGH To move, That this House calls on the Leader of the Opposition to sack his political adviser Mr P Reed, the Mayor of Springvale, for his attempts to pump polluted tip waters into Melbourne Water's Braeside Park thereby putting the park at risk.
- 91 MR HAERMEYER To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Health for her failure to ensure that mothers and babies in Knoxfield are able to stay at least five days in maternity care following the birth of their baby thus placing at risk the health and future well being of these Knoxfield mothers and babies.
- 92 MR SANDON To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Education for his cuts to education funding at the Richmond West Primary School that have resulted in the loss of 9.5 teachers, an 18% increase in average class sizes, a 50% reduction in specialist programs, a 50% cut in reading recovery program and reduced professional development and program evaluation.
- 93 MR LEIGHTON To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Community Services for closure of cottage homes which has led to an increased demand for foster places in Blackburn, without also addressing the need for an increase in reimbursement rates for potential foster parents in the Blackburn area, described by the Children's Welfare Association of Victoria as being totally inadequate, thus leaving children without permanent placement.
- 94 MS GARBUTT To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Community Services for budget cuts which have seen services to physically and intellectually disabled people severely reduced at Kew Cottages, with recreation programs cut by more than half and the staff-client ratio falling to dangerous levels with plans for more reductions, resulting in poor staff morale and increased trauma and stress for long suffering parents at Kew Cottages.

- 95 MR PANDAZOPOULOS To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Community Services for his Government policies that have led to a massive 100% increase in fees at the All Saints Pre-School which has denied children from migrant and low income families in the Nunawading area access to pre-school.
- 96 MR LEIGHTON To move, That this House refers to the Privileges Committee for examination and report the matter of whether the Minister for Industry and Employment, the Honourable Phillip Gude, has committed a contempt in that he deliberately misled the House in that -
  - 1 In a question without notice on 31 March 1994 the Leader of the Opposition referred the Minister to a briefing to heads of statutory authorities at which Mr Ian Douglas, QC outlined the State Government's position on changes to the Federal Industrial Relations Act;
  - In answer the Minister for Industry and Employment stated in part that the meeting was not to provide a briefing on changes to the Federal Industrial Legislation nor was any reference made to any major changes to the Federal Industrial Relations Act;
  - The agenda of the briefing to statutory authority heads which shows under item 2 "Employee Relations Minister for Industry and Employment" at 2(ii) "The Federal Legislation Implications and Options Ian Douglas";
  - 4 Notes of the briefing to statutory authority heads of 15 March 1994 made available to the State Opposition which record the briefing given by Ian Douglas, QC on the Federal Legislation; and
  - The response by the Minister for Industry and Employment on the adjournment debate of 31 March 1994 to the matter raised by the Member for Preston, where the Minister failed to alter the substance of his earlier response to the Leader of the Opposition.

- DR COGHILL To move, That the House condemns the Leader of the House, the 3 Honourable Phillip Gude, MLA, for his - (a) support for budgetary provisions adversely affecting the effective operation of the Parliament including its Committees whilst enabling the restoration of extravagant and luxurious levels of Dining Room service available exclusively to Members; (b) support for provisions of the Parliamentary Committees (Amendment) Bill which were incompatible with basic principles of parliamentary government and the Westminster system; (c) support for the destruction of the time-honoured bi-partisan approach to parliamentary committees including the cessation of the practice of chairmanship being shared between Government and Opposition with all Chairmen now being Members of the senior party in the Coalition, the Liberal Party; (d) support for provisions of the Parliamentary Salaries and Superannuation (Further Amendment) Bill as introduced which undermined the recognition by the Parliament of the authority and status of the Speaker of the Legislative Assembly and the President of the Legislative Council and which made unjustified increases to the remuneration of many members of the Government Party including himself; (e) proposing and supporting motions for periods of adjournment of debate that have denied Members reasonable time in which to consider matters before the House and that have denied people affected by or otherwise interested in such matters reasonable time in which to consider and comment on their implications; (f) proposing and supporting motions that bills be declared urgent and periods for debate of them limited with the effect of denying Members reasonable time in which to debate them; (g) imposition and support of sitting hours in October and November 1992 that were beyond those which could reasonably be expected to allow Members, staff and others associated with the functioning and reporting of the Parliament to carry out their responsibilities effectively and efficiently and that therefore militated against proper functioning and good decision-making; (h) failing to advise and consult Members and the Parliamentary parties on forthcoming legislation, arrangements for debates and other aspects of the parliamentary program in accordance with long-standing tradition and practice in the Parliament of Victoria and comparable parliaments; and (i) failing to provide leadership to Members including the Government in the observance and furtherance of acceptable standards of parliamentary conduct and practice.
- 4 MR COLE To move, That he have leave to bring in a Bill to facilitate the efficient case management of complex fraud trials, to amend certain Rules of Evidence, to amend the *Evidence Act* 1958, the *Judicial Proceedings Reports Act* 1958 and the *Bail Act* 1977 and for other purposes.
- 5 MS GARBUTT To move, That she have leave to bring in a Bill to make it compulsory for certain persons to notify the Secretary of the Department of Health and Community Services of any child they believe is in need of protection, as soon as practicable after forming such a belief, to amend certain Acts and for other purposes.
- 6 **DR VAUGHAN** To move, That the Law Reform Committee inquire into, consider and report on the former Law Reform Commission references which were (a) incomplete and not reported to the Attorney-General; or (b) which had been reported to the Attorney-General but not tabled in the Parliament.
- 7 MR BAKER To move, That this House condemns the Government for policy settings that have transferred the burden of taxation away from wealth and production towards consumption and families.

- 8 **MS GARBUTT** To move, That this House condemns the Government for its failure to continue the process of deinstitutionalisation of intellectually disabled people, through the closure of antiquated institutions and the provision of additional housing and support services in the community.
- 9 MR LEIGHTON To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Small Business for his failure to assist small business as demonstrated by his scrapping of the Small Business Development Corporation despite his election promise to retain it and his defunding of the Local Enterprise Development Initiative Program.
- 10 DR COGHILL To move, That this House condemns the Leader of the House, the Honourable Phillip Gude, MLA, for proposing and supporting motions having the effect of reducing the opportunities for Members to speak during the Autumn Sittings 1993 on the question "That grievances be noted" from a total of 16 hours being four hours on each of four days as provided for under Standing Order No. 59 to a total of less than six hours being less than three hours on each of two days.
- 11 MR MAUGHAN To move, That this House condemns the Opposition for its failure while in Government to properly address the problems of social injustices.
- 12 MR MAUGHAN To move, That this House commends the Government for its commitment to assisting children with disabilities.
- 13 MRS ELLIOTT To move, That this House commends the Government for its commitment to assisting families in need.
- 14 MRS ELLIOTT To move, That this House commends the Government for its commitment to improving foster care programmes.
- 15 MR COOPER To move, That this House congratulates the Government on its initiatives to support and reform local government.
- DR COGHILL To move, That this House censures Mr Speaker for not allowing the Member for Werribee to complete the explanation of his point of order on Tuesday, 6 April 1993 relating to the admissibility of the notice of motion of the Minister for Industry and Employment relating to the suspension of Standing and Sessional Orders to permit the Minister for Finance to address Members of both Houses without allowing any opportunity for debate on the address and dissents from the ruling of Mr Speaker on the point of order.
- 17 DR COGHILL To move, That this House condemns the Leader of the House for moving and supporting a motion having the effect of (a) providing for an unprecedented form of address by the Minister for Finance on Wednesday, 7 April 1993 rather than relying on the established customary practice of a Ministerial statement; (b) denying any other Member any opportunity to speak on the address; (c) denying the House any opportunity to debate or otherwise deal with the address; and (d) further eroding the essential privileges immunities and powers of Members and the House as defined by the Constitution Act 1975.

- 18 MR LEIGH To move, That this House condemns the Speaker of the Fifty-first Parliament, Dr K. Coghill, the Member for Werribee, for his (a) inability to act impartially and protect the rights of all Members of the House; and (b) failure to control the House and for the protection he gave to the Kirner Government and its members.
- 19 MS MARPLE To move, That this House (a) calls on the Government to refer the status of the Chiltern Regional Park to the Land Conservation Council to be urgently reviewed in light of the importance of the remnant box and ironbark forest; and (b) revokes the consent to mineral exploration in Chiltern Park by CRA Exploration Pty Limited given by the Minister for Conservation and Environment, notice of which was tabled in this House on 16 March 1993 pursuant to section 40(5) of the National Parks Act 1975, so that there can be a moratorium on exploration while the Land Conservation Council considers the status of the Chiltern Regional Park.

### 20 DR COGHILL - To move -

- 1 That a Joint Select Committee be appointed to enquire into and report upon the operation of the parliamentary committee system and in particular to report on provision by statute for its monitoring and review of all portfolios and for bi-partisan functioning.
- 2 That the Committee shall consist of eight Members, four members nominated by the Premier of whom two must be Members of the Assembly and one must be a Member of the Council and four Members nominated by the Leader of the Opposition of whom two must be Members of the Assembly and one must be a Member of the Council. The appointments shall be made by the relevant House.
- 3 That five Members of the Committee shall constitute a quorum of the Committee.
- 4 That the Committee shall elect two of its Members to be Joint Chairmen.
- 5 That the Committee may sit in such places in Victoria as seems most convenient for the proper and speedy despatch of business.
- That the Committee shall not sit while either House is actually sitting except by leave of that House and may not, while either House is actually sitting, sit in any place other than a place that is within the Parliament building.
- 7 That the Committee may send for persons, papers and records and report from time to time.
- 8 That the Committee shall, unless it otherwise resolves, take all evidence in public.
- 9 That the Committee shall keep a record of all evidence given before it and determinations made by it.
- 10 That the Committee have power to authorize publication of any evidence given before it in public and any document presented to it.
- 11 That as soon as practicable after the completion of each day's proceedings a transcript of the evidence taken in public by the Committee shall be published.
- 12 That the foregoing provisions of this resolution so far as they are inconsistent with the Standing Orders and practices of the Houses shall have effect notwithstanding anything contained in those Standing Orders.

- 21 DR COGHILL To move, That this House dissents from the actions of Mr Speaker in disallowing the use of lap top computers in the Chamber by Members and expresses the opinion that their use is acceptable subject to conditions similar to those applying in the other place.
- MR SERCOMBE To move, That this House condemns the Premier and the Speaker for undermining the independence, integrity and respect for the Office of Speaker by their actions in delaying a decision on the date of the Broadmeadows By-election until immediately after the Premier's deliberately belated response to the Speaker's invitation to comment on the matter and the selection of the last practical date as preferred by the Premier for purely partisan political advantage contrary to the fundamental principle that the Speaker makes decisions on a non-partisan basis and the custom and practice of choosing the earliest practical dates for by-elections so as to minimise the period for which electors are unrepresented.
- 23 MR SANDON To move, That he have leave to bring in a Bill to amend the *Education Act* 1958 to provide for the establishment of School Closures Review Committees, to allow for public consultation in the closure of Government Schools and for other purposes.
- 24 MR DOLLIS To move, That he have leave to bring in a Bill to amend the *Building Control Act* 1981 and for other purposes.
- MR LEIGH To move, That this House condemns the Member for Clayton for (a) his failure to repay to the State of Victoria within due time \$7595.41 advanced to the Member from the Education Ministry after his entering a studentship agreement; and (b) his offers to repay \$20 per month over a period of 18 years in spite of letters from the Victorian Government Solicitor threatening legal action unless he complied with arrangements which are contained in the studentship agreement that he entered into; despite the fact that during his time as a MLA for Glenhuntly and Clayton he received salary and electoral allowances of almost \$1.5 M. and this House further requests the Member to explain to the people why he failed to honour arrangements that were entered into by the Member in the studentship agreement which he made and which was honoured by the State of Victoria but not honoured by the Member for Clayton.
- MR LEIGH To move, That this House condemns the Leader of the Opposition Mr J Brumby and Members of the Opposition for their failure to disassociate themselves from the activities of the Member for Clayton in his failure to repay in adequate time monies that he owed the Ministry of Education.
- DR COGHILL To move, That this House expresses the opinion that there is prima facie evidence of a contempt of the Parliament by the Honourable the Leader of the House in that he failed to make available for inspection all correspondence and other documents created since 26 October 1992, relating to any aspect of the review or reform of the structure, functioning, Standing Orders, procedures, practices or administration of the Legislative Assembly, the Legislative Council or the Parliament in any other respect including the rights and entitlements of Members received by him or sent by him or on his authority to the Speaker of the Legislative Assembly and the President of the Legislative Council either individually or jointly or any Officer or Officers of the Parliament, and all documents held by him relating to meetings, telephone conversations or other forms of communication or discussion in respect of the above matters in which he participated or which were

- held on his authority in response to Question No. 8 and that the matter be referred to the Privileges Committee for inquiry and report.
- 28 MR THOMSON (Pascoe Vale) To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Community Services for his action in cutting funding to the Dr Stanley Cochrane Pre-school in Mitcham, which has placed a heavy financial burden on many parents whose pre-school fees have risen from \$180 per year to \$480 per year.
- 29 MR MICALLEF To move, That this House condemns the State Government for its continued failure to adequately secure the former Joseph Banks Secondary College site at Doveton, showing a disregard for the safety of local residents, allowing them to walk unhindered into an asbestos contaminated area and leaving a damage bill estimated at over \$60,000 some of which is to facilities which are to be retained by the community.
- 30 MR HAERMEYER To move, That this House notes with concern that as a result of Government policies fees at the Mordialloc Kindergarten have increased from \$50 per term in 1993 to \$110 per term in 1994, with parents expected to pay an additional \$30 levy for excursions, and consequently, enrolments at this kindergarten have decreased from 50 in 1993 to 30 in 1994 and this House urges the Minister to implement policies to ensure affordable and quality pre-schools are available to all families in the Mordialloc area.
- 31 MS GARBUTT To move, That this House notes with concern that on average preschool fees on the Mornington Peninsular have doubled this year from \$49 to \$99 and further evidence suggests that at least 44 children have been excluded this year because parents cannot pay fees, 15 children have moved to day care as they can obtain fee relief, 20 children are on waiting lists due to reduced sessions and groups lost.
- MS GARBUTT To move, That this House expresses its concerns at the failure of the Minister for Community Services to guarantee that all families living in Blackburn are able to afford to have their children attend pre-school, including those 15% of children who have not enrolled this year due to massive increase of 140% in pre-school fees at Blackburn North Pre-school.
- 33 MS MARPLE To move, That this House notes with concern the failure of the State Government to require an environmental effects statement for the proposed redevelopment of the Crib Point Oil Facility despite the companies involved indicating that works will not proceed during 1994.
- 34 MRS WILSON To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Fair Trading for her Government's actions in eroding the resources available to consumers for information and protection, through the closure of the regional offices of the Office of Fair Trading in Ringwood and Dandenong, thus making it difficult for people living in the outer suburbs to access these services.
- 35 MR SEITZ To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Community Services for Government policies which have lead to an increase of kindergarten fees at Indra Pre-school in Blackburn South from \$180 to \$500 a year, resulting in severe hardships being endured by families of Pre-school children in the Blackburn area.

- 36 MR HAMILTON To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Public Transport for the appalling level of service for commuters travelling to Bairnsdale via Sale, since the abolition of the Rail Service between Bairnsdale and Sale, including the lack of shelter and passenger amenities at Bairnsdale and inconvenience caused by long delays in bus and train connections.
- 37 MR ANDRIANOPOULOS To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Public Transport for the premature introduction of driver only trains on the Alamein line, which because of 'blind spots' created by the design of station platforms along this line, has resulted in passengers being placed in great danger when boarding and alighting from trains, due to the inability of drivers to clearly see whether passengers are clear of the train before departing.
- 38 MR THOMSON (Pascoe Vale) To move, That this House condemns the Government for its massive increases in class sizes at Antonio Park Primary School which have led to a reduced quality of education at that school.
- 39 MR DOLLIS To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Planning for his intervention in the Knox Council decision regarding a proposed Fast Food Restaurant in Rowville as yet another example of this Government's overriding of Local Government Planning Schemes and decisions, thereby undermining the role of Local Government and showing complete disregard for the rights and wishes of Knox residents.
- 40 MR HAERMEYER To move, That this House condemns the Minister for School Education for Government Education Policies which have lead to massive increases in class sizes at Antonio Park Primary School whilst teaching staff numbers have been significantly reduced, resulting in dislocation of students and the inability of staff to provide the optimum level of quality education that Antonio Park Primary students so richly deserve.
- 41 MS MARPLE To move, That the House condemns the Minister for Community Services for his failure to provide an affordable pre-school at Croydon Central where due to the Minister's policies there has been a massive 88% increase in fees from \$160 in 1993 to \$300 in 1994.
- 42 MR SHEEHAN To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Education who, with the support of the Member for Mordialloc, has implemented policies which have resulted in the loss of 20 teaching positions from schools in the Mordialloc Electorate, while enrolments have increased by in excess of 60.
- 43 MR MILDENHALL To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Youth Affairs for cutting funding to the Nunawading Youth Adult Bureau by \$16,000, resulting in reduced outreach services to youth in the Nunawading area at a time when charitable organisations in Nunawading are experiencing a 100% increase in demand for their services, and youth unemployment remains at disastrously high levels.
- 44 MR SERCOMBE To move, That this House condemns the Government for its education policies which have reduced the quality of education for children in the Monbulk electorate.

- 45 MS GARBUTT To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Community Services for Government policies that have led to a 88% increase in fees from \$45 to \$115 per term at the Greenhills Pre-school, resulting in severe financial hardship for many parents with pre-school children in the Greensborough and Eltham communities.
- 46 MR ANDRIANOPOULOS To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Education for failing to provide quality education to students at Bendigo Senior Secondary College due directly to government policies that have resulted in stopping the construction of a library and new classrooms at the school.
- 47 MRS WILSON To move, That this House notes with concern that the Minister for Education has failed to ensure a quality education for children at Cranbourne West Primary School, due to massive increases in class sizes at this school.
- 48 MR PANDAZOPOULOS To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Education for denying children at the Cranbourne South Primary School a quality education due to massive increases in class sizes at the school.
- 49 **DR COGHILL** To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Employment and Industry for failing to introduce a job creation scheme for people in the Bendigo area as promised before the election where the Bendigo District share of Jobs created under the said scheme would be over 800, such jobs providing a much needed stimulus to the Bendigo economy at a time when 8,444 people were receiving unemployment benefits from Social Security offices in Bendigo and Kangaroo Flat in February, 1994 being 14.73% more than in February, 1993.
- 50 MR HAMILTON To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Youth Affairs for cutting totally funding to the Barwon Youth Information Service which has resulted in less information reaching young people in the Barwon area who are in desperate need of advice and support.
- 51 MR MILDENHALL To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Community Services for his action in cutting funding to the Gisborne Kindergarten, which has placed a heavy financial burden on many parents in the Gisborne area whose pre-school fees have risen by \$450 per child.
- MR PANDAZOPOULOS To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Community Services for Government policies that have cut funding to the Ontos Pre-school, which has lead to an increase in fees from \$30 per term to \$130 per term, resulting in severe hardship being endured by families for pre-school children in the Buchan Community.
- MS GARBUTT To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Community Services for his failure to provide an affordable pre-school at Mordialloc where due to the Minister's policies there has been a massive 100% increase in fees at the Elenora Pre-school causing extreme financial hardship for parents of pre-school children in the Mordialloc area.
- MS MARPLE To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Community Services for his actions in cutting funding to kindergartens in Bendigo which has placed an extra financial burden on parents whose fees have doubled at the Bendigo Kindergarten in 1994.

- 55 MR BATCHELOR To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Public Transport for his failure to provide an adequate frequency of tram services from the City to West Preston and Mont Albert which has resulted in long delays for customers, as evidenced by patrons on Victoria Parade waiting up to 17 minutes for trams to the City on the Mont Albert route during the morning peak-hour on Thursday 17 March and Friday 18 March, 1994.
- MR PANDAZOPOULOS To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Public Transport for failing to ensure that services operated by the National Bus Company on route No. 256 between the City and La Trobe University run on time, as evidenced by delays of more than an hour between services on the afternoon of Thursday March 17, 1994.
- 57 MS GARBUTT To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Health for her failure to ensure that all mothers and babies in Bayswater are guarantied a minimum of 5 days in maternity care if they need it following the birth of a child.
- 58 MR ANDRIANOPOULOS To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Education for his failure to provide a second Government school V.C.E. facility in Bendigo despite a pre-election promise of the Government to have a second V.C.E. facility "for the start of 1993" and his subsequent failure to have the said facility operational at the commencement of the 1994 school year.
- 59 MR SANDON To move, That this House condemns the Government for its failure to ensure all children at the Le Page School in Cheltenham are guarantied a quality education due to massive increases in class sizes at the school.
- 60 MR MILDENHALL To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Community Services for ordering closed the only two reception facilities for emergency child abuse cases in the Western Suburbs, namely Buckland House and St Joseph's, in the face of his department's figures showing a 159% increase in child abuse notifications since the introduction of mandatory reporting.
- 61 MR THOMSON (Pascoe Vale) To move, That this House censures Mr Speaker for his failure to allow the Member for Sunshine and other Honourable Members to raise matters on the Adjournment Debate on Thursday 24 March 1994, in breach of the entitlements of Honourable Members provided for by the Sessional Orders.
- 62 MR COOPER To move, That this House censures the Honourable Member for Bundoora for attempting to use the abuse and death of Daniel Valerio to score cheap political points, and calls on the Honourable Member for Bundoora to apologise to this House, the family of Daniel Valerio and the Victorian Community for her inconsiderate and insensitive behaviour.
- 63 MR BATCHELOR To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Public Transport for reducing the size of the Bendigo Railway Workshops workforce from 270 in October, 1992 to under 180 causing job positions to be lost in Bendigo, notwithstanding pre-election comments by representatives of the current Government that the workforce would increase.
- 64 MR THWAITES To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Health for Government policies that have put mothers and babies in Boronia at risk due to their early release from hospital following childbirth.

- 65 MR MICALLEF To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Public Transport for his failure to ensure residents in Carrum Downs have access to adequate public transport in order to travel to their municipal base in Cranbourne.
- 66 MR MILDENHALL To move, That this House condemns the State Government for its failure to recognise the concerns of residents in Merinda Park regarding the Government's proposal for a Merinda Park Railway Station.
- 67 MS MARPLE To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Health for her failure to ensure that mothers and babies in Croydon are able to stay at least 5 days in maternity care following the birth of their child.
- MR COOPER To move, That this House notes the involvement of the Honourable Member for Thomastown, in his then role as State Secretary of the Australian Labor Party, to manipulate the result of the Nunawading Province re-election in 1985 and his subsequent refusal to co-operate with the police investigation of this scandal, and calls on the Honourable Member for Thomastown to disclose the full facts of his and other Australian Labor Party members involvement.
- 69 MS MARPLE To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Agriculture for his lack of commitment to unemployed people in Bendigo by failing to relocate the Department of Agriculture to Bendigo and thus provide 130 jobs in Bendigo as promised by the Government.
- 70 MR ROWE To move, That this House commends the Minister for Education for responding to the education needs of the Botany Park/Skye community in that he has recognised the need for additional facilities in the provision of additional building to the value of \$180,000, and commenced the process for the future expansion and rebuilding of Skye Primary School.
- 71 MR ROWE To move, That this House commends the Minister for Education for responding to the education needs of the Cranbourne South Community by the provision of \$180,000 in a new building which had not been provided by the previous government.
- 72 MR ROWE To move, That this House commends the Minister for Education for responding to the education needs of the Cranbourne community in addressing the urgent need for \$100,000 of maintenance works at the Lyndhurst Secondary College being part of the black hole backlog of maintenance totalling millions of dollars left by the previous Labor government.
- 73 MRS WILSON To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Local Government for the lack of input residents of the Borough of Eaglehawk have had into the proposed Local Government restructure, despite the fact that 70% of residents in Eaglehawk voted in the poll on the proposal and over 90% voted against amalgamation.
- 74 MR PANDAZOPOULOS To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Local Government for his failure to take account of the overwhelming 70% vote by the Bendigo community against council amalgamations on 29 January 1994 and forcing amalgamation of the five municipalities in the Bendigo area.

- 75 MR LEIGHTON To move, That this House condemns the Member for Ivanhoe, the Honourable Vin Heffernan, for his failure to honour his commitment that the Liberal Government would restore full disadvantaged school program funding to schools in his electorate such as West Heidelberg Primary School and his advice to a parent of that school that there are no votes in West Heidelberg.
- MR THWAITES To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Health for her failure to ensure that mothers and babies in Knox are able to stay at least 5 days in maternity care following the birth of their child thus placing at risk the health and future well-being of these mothers and babies.
- 77 MR THWAITES To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Health for her failure to ensure that mothers and babies in Ringwood are able to stay at least 5 days in maternity care following the birth of their child to ensure that the health and future well being of the mother and baby is not at risk.
- MR COOPER To move, That this House calls on all members of the Opposition to disassociate themselves from the actions of the Honourable Member for Thomastown who, in his then role as State Secretary of the Australian Labor Party, orchestrated a campaign to mislead and defraud voters in the re-election for the Nunawading Province in 1985, and requests that all Opposition members publicly support the demand that the Honourable Member for Thomastown disclose to the House all of the facts relating to his involvement in this scandal.
- 79 MS GARBUTT To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Community Services for failing to guarantee to parents in Ringwood an affordable and quality respite service for those children who have a disability.
- 80 MS GARBUTT To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Community Services for failing to guarantee to parents in Blackburn access to an affordable and quality respite service for children with a disability resulting in considerable financial hardship for these parents.
- MR HAERMEYER To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Police and Emergency Services for failing to provide sufficient funds to enable the Victorian Police to properly service the municipalities of Knox, Ringwood, Croydon, Sherbrooke, Healesville, Lilydale and Upper Yarra, particularly noting that the local community is being asked to foot the bill for a \$120,000 police caravan to adequately serve the very obvious policing needs of these communities.
- MR HAERMEYER To move, That this House condemns the Member for Bayswater for failing to represent the interests of his constituents and to live up to his promise to "provide the Victorian Police with the resources it needs to protect the community", noting: (a) The member's failure to stand up for his community when his Government cancelled the contract to provide a new police station for Bayswater; and (b) The member's failure to act on behalf of the local community in response to demands that the local community foot the bill for a \$120,000 mobile police caravan that the community urgently needs.

- MR DOLLIS To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Planning for not consulting with Eltham residents or allowing them direct input into the Government's decision whether to allow 24 hour trading in residential areas, thereby further lessening the rights of Eltham residents to participate in planning issues which will affect their amenities and living conditions, as well as altering the nature of their neighbourhoods.
- MR LONEY To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Sport, Recreation and Racing for his lack of commitment to ensure that people with an intellectual disability have access to appropriate sport and recreation activities as shown by the total defunding of the Victorian Sport and Recreation Association of Persons with an Intellectual Disability leaving people with an intellectual disability without a voice and a means to ensure that sport and recreation is available to all.
- MR BATCHELOR To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Public Transport for failing to provide an adequate level of public transport services over the Easter Holiday period as evidenced by customers being required to wait more than 45 minutes for a city-bound tram on the East Malvern route on the morning of Monday, April 4 1994.
- MR THOMSON (Pascoe Vale) To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Public Transport for his failure to ensure an adequate level of service for PTC customers who use the Broadmeadows railway line, as evidenced by the events of March 29, 1994 in relation to the 7.33 a.m. service from the City, when passengers were told when the train arrived at Essendon Station to board a bus for the rest of the trip, but passengers waiting at unstaffed stations further down the line were not told the train was not coming and had been replaced by a bus, and were left waiting on train platforms.
- 87 MR THWAITES To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Health for placing at risk the health of mothers and babies in Mitcham as a result of their early discharge from hospital following childbirth.
- 88 MS GARBUTT To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Health for her failure to ensure that mothers and babies in Oakleigh South are able to stay at least five days in maternity care following the birth of their baby thus placing at risk the health and future well being of these Oakleigh South mothers and babies.
- 89 MR LEIGH To move, That this House condemns the Member for Springvale for his involvement in the previous Labor Government's decision to purchase a tip in Springvale South which is now owned by the Ministry of Planning and Development but which had been owned by Waverley Council and managed by Springvale Council and further condemns the Member for his involvement in ensuring that Victorian taxpayers would be responsible for the costs of containing and cleaning up the pollution caused by the Council's disgraceful management practices.
- 90 MR LEIGH To move, That this House calls on the Leader of the Opposition to sack his political adviser Mr P Reed, the Mayor of Springvale, for his attempts to pump polluted tip waters into Melbourne Water's Braeside Park thereby putting the park at risk.

- 91 MR HAERMEYER To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Health for her failure to ensure that mothers and babies in Knoxfield are able to stay at least five days in maternity care following the birth of their baby thus placing at risk the health and future well being of these Knoxfield mothers and babies.
- 92 MR SANDON To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Education for his cuts to education funding at the Richmond West Primary School that have resulted in the loss of 9.5 teachers, an 18% increase in average class sizes, a 50% reduction in specialist programs, a 50% cut in reading recovery program and reduced professional development and program evaluation.
- 93 MR LEIGHTON To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Community Services for closure of cottage homes which has led to an increased demand for foster places in Blackburn, without also addressing the need for an increase in reimbursement rates for potential foster parents in the Blackburn area, described by the Children's Welfare Association of Victoria as being totally inadequate, thus leaving children without permanent placement.
- 94 MS GARBUTT To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Community Services for budget cuts which have seen services to physically and intellectually disabled people severely reduced at Kew Cottages, with recreation programs cut by more than half and the staff-client ratio falling to dangerous levels with plans for more reductions, resulting in poor staff morale and increased trauma and stress for long suffering parents at Kew Cottages.
- 95 MR PANDAZOPOULOS To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Community Services for his Government policies that have led to a massive 100% increase in fees at the All Saints Pre-School which has denied children from migrant and low income families in the Nunawading area access to pre-school.
- 96 MR LEIGHTON To move, That this House refers to the Privileges Committee for examination and report the matter of whether the Minister for Industry and Employment, the Honourable Phillip Gude, has committed a contempt in that he deliberately misled the House in that -
  - 1 In a question without notice on 31 March 1994 the Leader of the Opposition referred the Minister to a briefing to heads of statutory authorities at which Mr Ian Douglas, QC outlined the State Government's position on changes to the Federal Industrial Relations Act:
  - In answer the Minister for Industry and Employment stated in part that the meeting was not to provide a briefing on changes to the Federal Industrial Legislation nor was any reference made to any major changes to the Federal Industrial Relations Act;
  - The agenda of the briefing to statutory authority heads which shows under item 2 "Employee Relations Minister for Industry and Employment" at 2(ii) "The Federal Legislation Implications and Options Ian Douglas";
  - 4 Notes of the briefing to statutory authority heads of 15 March 1994 made available to the State Opposition which record the briefing given by Ian Douglas, QC on the Federal Legislation; and
  - The response by the Minister for Industry and Employment on the adjournment debate of 31 March 1994 to the matter raised by the Member for Preston, where the Minister failed to alter the substance of his earlier response to the Leader of the Opposition.

- 97 MR THOMSON (Pascoe Vale) To move, That this House notes with concern that the Government has spent more money on advertising campaigns and self-promotion involving the Minister for Industry and Employment than it plans to spend on assistance for the Snow Brand Pty Ltd, milk products company in its investment in a new plant at Tatura.
- 98 MRS WILSON To move, That this House congratulates Vizy Board's \$50 million expansion of a Cardboard Box Factory at Dandenong which will create new jobs for people living in Dandenong, one of the hardest hit areas by unemployment.

- 2 MR BAKER To move, That he have leave to bring in a Bill to amend the Audit Act 1958 and certain other Acts, to require the Auditor-General to investigate and report to Parliament on the implications for the State finances and for consumers of privatisation of Government Business Enterprises prior to sale and for other purposes.
- DR COGHILL To move, That the House condemns the Leader of the House, the Honourable Phillip Gude, MLA, for his - (a) support for budgetary provisions adversely affecting the effective operation of the Parliament including its Committees whilst enabling the restoration of extravagant and luxurious levels of Dining Room service available exclusively to Members; (b) support for provisions of the Parliamentary Committees (Amendment) Bill which were incompatible with basic principles of parliamentary government and the Westminster system; (c) support for the destruction of the time-honoured bi-partisan approach to parliamentary committees including the cessation of the practice of chairmanship being shared between Government and Opposition with all Chairmen now being Members of the senior party in the Coalition, the Liberal Party; (d) support for provisions of the Parliamentary Salaries and Superannuation (Further Amendment) Bill as introduced which undermined the recognition by the Parliament of the authority and status of the Speaker of the Legislative Assembly and the President of the Legislative Council and which made unjustified increases to the remuneration of many members of the Government Party including himself; (e) proposing and supporting motions for periods of adjournment of

debate that have denied Members reasonable time in which to consider matters before the House and that have denied people affected by or otherwise interested in such matters reasonable time in which to consider and comment on their implications; (f) proposing and supporting motions that bills be declared urgent and periods for debate of them limited with the effect of denying Members reasonable time in which to debate them; (g) imposition and support of sitting hours in October and November 1992 that were beyond those which could reasonably be expected to allow Members, staff and others associated with the functioning and reporting of the Parliament to carry out their responsibilities effectively and efficiently and that therefore militated against proper functioning and good decision-making; (h) failing to advise and consult Members and the Parliamentary parties on forthcoming legislation, arrangements for debates and other aspects of the parliamentary program in accordance with long-standing tradition and practice in the Parliament of Victoria and comparable parliaments; and (i) failing to provide leadership to Members including the Government in the observance and furtherance of acceptable standards of parliamentary conduct and practice.

- DR COGHILL To move, That this House condemns the Leader of the House for moving and supporting a motion having the effect of (a) providing for an unprecedented form of address by the Minister for Finance on Wednesday, 7 April 1993 rather than relying on the established customary practice of a Ministerial statement; (b) denying any other Member any opportunity to speak on the address; (c) denying the House any opportunity to debate or otherwise deal with the address; and (d) further eroding the essential privileges immunities and powers of Members and the House as defined by the Constitution Act 1975.
- 18 MR LEIGH To move, That this House condemns the Speaker of the Fifty-first Parliament, Dr K. Coghill, the Member for Werribee, for his (a) inability to act impartially and protect the rights of all Members of the House; and (b) failure to control the House and for the protection he gave to the Kirner Government and its members.
- 19 MS MARPLE To move, That this House (a) calls on the Government to refer the status of the Chiltern Regional Park to the Land Conservation Council to be urgently reviewed in light of the importance of the remnant box and ironbark forest; and (b) revokes the consent to mineral exploration in Chiltern Park by CRA Exploration Pty Limited given by the Minister for Conservation and Environment, notice of which was tabled in this House on 16 March 1993 pursuant to section 40(5) of the National Parks Act 1975, so that there can be a moratorium on exploration while the Land Conservation Council considers the status of the Chiltern Regional Park.

- 2 That the Committee shall consist of eight Members, four members nominated by the Premier of whom two must be Members of the Assembly and one must be a Member of the Council and four Members nominated by the Leader of the Opposition of whom two must be Members of the Assembly and one must be a Member of the Council. The appointments shall be made by the relevant House.
- 3 That five Members of the Committee shall constitute a quorum of the Committee.
- 4 That the Committee shall elect two of its Members to be Joint Chairmen.
- 5 That the Committee may sit in such places in Victoria as seems most convenient for the proper and speedy despatch of business.
- 6 That the Committee shall not sit while either House is actually sitting except by leave of that House and may not, while either House is actually sitting, sit in any place other than a place that is within the Parliament building.
- 7 That the Committee may send for persons, papers and records and report from time to time.
- 8 That the Committee shall, unless it otherwise resolves, take all evidence in public.
- **9** That the Committee shall keep a record of all evidence given before it and determinations made by it.
- 10 That the Committee have power to authorize publication of any evidence given before it in public and any document presented to it.
- 11 That as soon as practicable after the completion of each day's proceedings a transcript of the evidence taken in public by the Committee shall be published.
- 12 That the foregoing provisions of this resolution so far as they are inconsistent with the Standing Orders and practices of the Houses shall have effect notwithstanding anything contained in those Standing Orders.
- 21 DR COGHILL To move, That this House dissents from the actions of Mr Speaker in disallowing the use of lap top computers in the Chamber by Members and expresses the opinion that their use is acceptable subject to conditions similar to those applying in the other place.
- MR SERCOMBE To move, That this House condemns the Premier and the Speaker for undermining the independence, integrity and respect for the Office of Speaker by their actions in delaying a decision on the date of the Broadmeadows By-election until immediately after the Premier's deliberately belated response to the Speaker's invitation to comment on the matter and the selection of the last practical date as preferred by the Premier for purely partisan political advantage contrary to the fundamental principle that the Speaker makes decisions on a non-partisan basis and the custom and practice of choosing the earliest practical dates for by-elections so as to minimise the period for which electors are unrepresented.

- 23 MR SANDON To move, That he have leave to bring in a Bill to amend the *Education Act* 1958 to provide for the establishment of School Closures Review Committees, to allow for public consultation in the closure of Government Schools and for other purposes.
- 24 MR DOLLIS To move, That he have leave to bring in a Bill to amend the *Building Control Act* 1981 and for other purposes.
- MR LEIGH To move, That this House condemns the Member for Clayton for (a) his failure to repay to the State of Victoria within due time \$7595.41 advanced to the Member from the Education Ministry after his entering a studentship agreement; and (b) his offers to repay \$20 per month over a period of 18 years in spite of letters from the Victorian Government Solicitor threatening legal action unless he complied with arrangements which are contained in the studentship agreement that he entered into; despite the fact that during his time as a MLA for Glenhuntly and Clayton he received salary and electoral allowances of almost \$1.5 M. and this House further requests the Member to explain to the people why he failed to honour arrangements that were entered into by the Member in the studentship agreement which he made and which was honoured by the State of Victoria but not honoured by the Member for Clayton.
- 26 MR LEIGH To move, That this House condemns the Leader of the Opposition Mr J Brumby and Members of the Opposition for their failure to disassociate themselves from the activities of the Member for Clayton in his failure to repay in adequate time monies that he owed the Ministry of Education.
- DR COGHILL To move, That this House expresses the opinion that there is prima facie evidence of a contempt of the Parliament by the Honourable the Leader of the House in that he failed to make available for inspection all correspondence and other documents created since 26 October 1992, relating to any aspect of the review or reform of the structure, functioning, Standing Orders, procedures, practices or administration of the Legislative Assembly, the Legislative Council or the Parliament in any other respect including the rights and entitlements of Members received by him or sent by him or on his authority to the Speaker of the Legislative Assembly and the President of the Legislative Council either individually or jointly or any Officer or Officers of the Parliament, and all documents held by him relating to meetings, telephone conversations or other forms of communication or discussion in respect of the above matters in which he participated or which were held on his authority in response to Question No. 8 and that the matter be referred to the Privileges Committee for inquiry and report.
- 28 MR THOMSON (Pascoe Vale) To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Community Services for his action in cutting funding to the Dr Stanley Cochrane Pre-school in Mitcham, which has placed a heavy financial burden on many parents whose pre-school fees have risen from \$180 per year to \$480 per year.
- 29 MR MICALLEF To move, That this House condemns the State Government for its continued failure to adequately secure the former Joseph Banks Secondary College site at Doveton, showing a disregard for the safety of local residents, allowing them to walk unhindered into an asbestos contaminated area and leaving a damage bill estimated at over \$60,000 some of which is to facilities which are to be retained by the community.

- 30 MR HAERMEYER To move, That this House notes with concern that as a result of Government policies fees at the Mordialloc Kindergarten have increased from \$50 per term in 1993 to \$110 per term in 1994, with parents expected to pay an additional \$30 levy for excursions, and consequently, enrolments at this kindergarten have decreased from 50 in 1993 to 30 in 1994 and this House urges the Minister to implement policies to ensure affordable and quality pre-schools are available to all families in the Mordialloc area.
- 31 MS GARBUTT To move, That this House notes with concern that on average preschool fees on the Mornington Peninsular have doubled this year from \$49 to \$99 and further evidence suggests that at least 44 children have been excluded this year because parents cannot pay fees, 15 children have moved to day care as they can obtain fee relief, 20 children are on waiting lists due to reduced sessions and groups lost.
- 32 MS GARBUTT To move, That this House expresses its concerns at the failure of the Minister for Community Services to guarantee that all families living in Blackburn are able to afford to have their children attend pre-school, including those 15% of children who have not enroled this year due to massive increase of 140% in pre-school fees at Blackburn North Pre-school.
- 33 MS MARPLE To move, That this House notes with concern the failure of the State Government to require an environmental effects statement for the proposed redevelopment of the Crib Point Oil Facility despite the companies involved indicating that works will not proceed during 1994.
- MRS WILSON To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Fair Trading for her Government's actions in eroding the resources available to consumers for information and protection, through the closure of the regional offices of the Office of Fair Trading in Ringwood and Dandenong, thus making it difficult for people living in the outer suburbs to access these services.
- MR SEITZ To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Community Services for Government policies which have lead to an increase of kindergarten fees at Indra Pre-school in Blackburn South from \$180 to \$500 a year, resulting in severe hardships being endured by families of Pre-school children in the Blackburn area.
- MR HAMILTON To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Public Transport for the appalling level of service for commuters travelling to Bairnsdale via Sale, since the abolition of the Rail Service between Bairnsdale and Sale, including the lack of shelter and passenger amenities at Bairnsdale and inconvenience caused by long delays in bus and train connections.
- 37 MR ANDRIANOPOULOS To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Public Transport for the premature introduction of driver only trains on the Alamein line, which because of 'blind spots' created by the design of station platforms along this line, has resulted in passengers being placed in great danger when boarding and alighting from trains, due to the inability of drivers to clearly see whether passengers are clear of the train before departing.
- 38 MR THOMSON (Pascoe Vale) To move, That this House condemns the Government for its massive increases in class sizes at Antonio Park Primary School which have led to a reduced quality of education at that school.

- 39 MR DOLLIS To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Planning for his intervention in the Knox Council decision regarding a proposed Fast Food Restaurant in Rowville as yet another example of this Government's overriding of Local Government Planning Schemes and decisions, thereby undermining the role of Local Government and showing complete disregard for the rights and wishes of Knox residents.
- 40 MR HAERMEYER To move, That this House condemns the Minister for School Education for Government Education Policies which have lead to massive increases in class sizes at Antonio Park Primary School whilst teaching staff numbers have been significantly reduced, resulting in dislocation of students and the inability of staff to provide the optimum level of quality education that Antonio Park Primary students so richly deserve.
- 41 MS MARPLE To move, That the House condemns the Minister for Community Services for his failure to provide an affordable pre-school at Croydon Central where due to the Minister's policies there has been a massive 88% increase in fees from \$160 in 1993 to \$300 in 1994.
- 42 MR SHEEHAN To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Education who, with the support of the Member for Mordialloc, has implemented policies which have resulted in the loss of 20 teaching positions from schools in the Mordialloc Electorate, while enrolments have increased by in excess of 60.
- 43 MR MILDENHALL To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Youth Affairs for cutting funding to the Nunawading Youth Adult Bureau by \$16,000, resulting in reduced outreach services to youth in the Nunawading area at a time when charitable organisations in Nunawading are experiencing a 100% increase in demand for their services, and youth unemployment remains at disastrously high levels.
- 44 MR SERCOMBE To move, That this House condemns the Government for its education policies which have reduced the quality of education for children in the Monbulk electorate.
- 45 MS GARBUTT To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Community Services for Government policies that have led to a 88% increase in fees from \$45 to \$115 per term at the Greenhills Pre-school, resulting in severe financial hardship for many parents with pre-school children in the Greensborough and Eltham communities.
- MR ANDRIANOPOULOS To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Education for failing to provide quality education to students at Bendigo Senior Secondary College due directly to government policies that have resulted in stopping the construction of a library and new classrooms at the school.
- 47 MRS WILSON To move, That this House notes with concern that the Minister for Education has failed to ensure a quality education for children at Cranbourne West Primary School, due to massive increases in class sizes at this school.
- 48 MR PANDAZOPOULOS To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Education for denying children at the Cranbourne South Primary School a quality education due to massive increases in class sizes at the school.

- 49 DR COGHILL To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Employment and Industry for failing to introduce a job creation scheme for people in the Bendigo area as promised before the election where the Bendigo District share of Jobs created under the said scheme would be over 800, such jobs providing a much needed stimulus to the Bendigo economy at a time when 8,444 people were receiving unemployment benefits from Social Security offices in Bendigo and Kangaroo Flat in February, 1994 being 14.73% more than in February, 1993.
- 50 MR HAMILTON To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Youth Affairs for cutting totally funding to the Barwon Youth Information Service which has resulted in less information reaching young people in the Barwon area who are in desperate need of advice and support.
- 51 MR MILDENHALL To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Community Services for his action in cutting funding to the Gisborne Kindergarten, which has placed a heavy financial burden on many parents in the Gisborne area whose pre-school fees have risen by \$450 per child.
- MR PANDAZOPOULOS To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Community Services for Government policies that have cut funding to the Ontos Pre-school, which has lead to an increase in fees from \$30 per term to \$130 per term, resulting in severe hardship being endured by families for pre-school children in the Buchan Community.
- MS GARBUTT To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Community Services for his failure to provide an affordable pre-school at Mordialloc where due to the Minister's policies there has been a massive 100% increase in fees at the Elenora Pre-school causing extreme financial hardship for parents of pre-school children in the Mordialloc area.
- 54 MS MARPLE To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Community Services for his actions in cutting funding to kindergartens in Bendigo which has placed an extra financial burden on parents whose fees have doubled at the Bendigo Kindergarten in 1994.
- MR BATCHELOR To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Public Transport for his failure to provide an adequate frequency of tram services from the City to West Preston and Mont Albert which has resulted in long delays for customers, as evidenced by patrons on Victoria Parade waiting up to 17 minutes for trams to the City on the Mont Albert route during the morning peak-hour on Thursday 17 March and Friday 18 March, 1994.
- MR PANDAZOPOULOS To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Public Transport for failing to ensure that services operated by the National Bus Company on route No. 256 between the City and La Trobe University run on time, as evidenced by delays of more than an hour between services on the afternoon of Thursday March 17, 1994.
- 57 MS GARBUTT To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Health for her failure to ensure that all mothers and babies in Bayswater are guarantied a minimum of 5 days in maternity care if they need it following the birth of a child.

- 58 MR ANDRIANOPOULOS To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Education for his failure to provide a second Government school V.C.E. facility in Bendigo despite a pre-election promise of the Government to have a second V.C.E. facility "for the start of 1993" and his subsequent failure to have the said facility operational at the commencement of the 1994 school year.
- 59 MR SANDON To move, That this House condemns the Government for its failure to ensure all children at the Le Page School in Cheltenham are guarantied a quality education due to massive increases in class sizes at the school.
- 60 MR MILDENHALL To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Community Services for ordering closed the only two reception facilities for emergency child abuse cases in the Western Suburbs, namely Buckland House and St Joseph's, in the face of his department's figures showing a 159% increase in child abuse notifications since the introduction of mandatory reporting.
- 61 MR THOMSON (Pascoe Vale) To move, That this House censures Mr Speaker for his failure to allow the Member for Sunshine and other Honourable Members to raise matters on the Adjournment Debate on Thursday 24 March 1994, in breach of the entitlements of Honourable Members provided for by the Sessional Orders.
- 62 MR COOPER To move, That this House censures the Honourable Member for Bundoora for attempting to use the abuse and death of Daniel Valerio to score cheap political points, and calls on the Honourable Member for Bundoora to apologise to this House, the family of Daniel Valerio and the Victorian Community for her inconsiderate and insensitive behaviour.
- 63 MR BATCHELOR To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Public Transport for reducing the size of the Bendigo Railway Workshops workforce from 270 in October, 1992 to under 180 causing job positions to be lost in Bendigo, notwithstanding pre-election comments by representatives of the current Government that the workforce would increase.
- 64 MR THWAITES To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Health for Government policies that have put mothers and babies in Boronia at risk due to their early release from hospital following childbirth.
- 65 MR MICALLEF To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Public Transport for his failure to ensure residents in Carrum Downs have access to adequate public transport in order to travel to their municipal base in Cranbourne.
- 66 MR MILDENHALL To move, That this House condemns the State Government for its failure to recognise the concerns of residents in Merinda Park regarding the Government's proposal for a Merinda Park Railway Station.
- 67 MS MARPLE To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Health for her failure to ensure that mothers and babies in Croydon are able to stay at least 5 days in maternity care following the birth of their child.
- 68 MR COOPER To move, That this House notes the involvement of the Honourable Member for Thomastown, in his then role as State Secretary of the Australian Labor Party, to manipulate the result of the Nunawading Province re-election in 1985 and his subsequent refusal to co-operate with the police investigation of this

- scandal, and calls on the Honourable Member for Thomastown to disclose the full facts of his and other Australian Labor Party members involvement.
- 69 MS MARPLE To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Agriculture for his lack of commitment to unemployed people in Bendigo by failing to relocate the Department of Agriculture to Bendigo and thus provide 130 jobs in Bendigo as promised by the Government.
- 70 MR ROWE To move, That this House commends the Minister for Education for responding to the education needs of the Botany Park/Skye community in that he has recognised the need for additional facilities in the provision of additional building to the value of \$180,000, and commenced the process for the future expansion and rebuilding of Skye Primary School.
- 71 MR ROWE To move, That this House commends the Minister for Education for responding to the education needs of the Cranbourne South Community by the provision of \$180,000 in a new building which had not been provided by the previous government.
- 72 MR ROWE To move, That this House commends the Minister for Education for responding to the education needs of the Cranbourne community in addressing the urgent need for \$100,000 of maintenance works at the Lyndhurst Secondary College being part of the black hole backlog of maintenance totalling millions of dollars left by the previous Labor government.
- 73 MRS WILSON To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Local Government for the lack of input residents of the Borough of Eaglehawk have had into the proposed Local Government restructure, despite the fact that 70% of residents in Eaglehawk voted in the poll on the proposal and over 90% voted against amalgamation.
- 74 MR PANDAZOPOULOS To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Local Government for his failure to take account of the overwhelming 70% vote by the Bendigo community against council amalgamations on 29 January 1994 and forcing amalgamation of the five municipalities in the Bendigo area.
- 75 MR LEIGHTON To move, That this House condemns the Member for Ivanhoe, the Honourable Vin Heffernan, for his failure to honour his commitment that the Liberal Government would restore full disadvantaged school program funding to schools in his electorate such as West Heidelberg Primary School and his advice to a parent of that school that there are no votes in West Heidelberg.
- 76 MR THWAITES To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Health for her failure to ensure that mothers and babies in Knox are able to stay at least 5 days in maternity care following the birth of their child thus placing at risk the health and future well-being of these mothers and babies.
- 77 MR THWAITES To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Health for her failure to ensure that mothers and babies in Ringwood are able to stay at least 5 days in maternity care following the birth of their child to ensure that the health and future well being of the mother and baby is not at risk.

- MR COOPER To move, That this House calls on all members of the Opposition to disassociate themselves from the actions of the Honourable Member for Thomastown who, in his then role as State Secretary of the Australian Labor Party, orchestrated a campaign to mislead and defraud voters in the re-election for the Nunawading Province in 1985, and requests that all Opposition members publicly support the demand that the Honourable Member for Thomastown disclose to the House all of the facts relating to his involvement in this scandal.
- 79 MS GARBUTT To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Community Services for failing to guarantee to parents in Ringwood an affordable and quality respite service for those children who have a disability.
- 80 MS GARBUTT To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Community Services for failing to guarantee to parents in Blackburn access to an affordable and quality respite service for children with a disability resulting in considerable financial hardship for these parents.
- 81 MR HAERMEYER To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Police and Emergency Services for failing to provide sufficient funds to enable the Victorian Police to properly service the municipalities of Knox, Ringwood, Croydon, Sherbrooke, Healesville, Lilydale and Upper Yarra, particularly noting that the local community is being asked to foot the bill for a \$120,000 police caravan to adequately serve the very obvious policing needs of these communities.
- MR HAERMEYER To move, That this House condemns the Member for Bayswater for failing to represent the interests of his constituents and to live up to his promise to "provide the Victorian Police with the resources it needs to protect the community", noting: (a) The member's failure to stand up for his community when his Government cancelled the contract to provide a new police station for Bayswater; and (b) The member's failure to act on behalf of the local community in response to demands that the local community foot the bill for a \$120,000 mobile police caravan that the community urgently needs.
- MR DOLLIS To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Planning for not consulting with Eltham residents or allowing them direct input into the Government's decision whether to allow 24 hour trading in residential areas, thereby further lessening the rights of Eltham residents to participate in planning issues which will affect their amenities and living conditions, as well as altering the nature of their neighbourhoods.
- MR LONEY To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Sport, Recreation and Racing for his lack of commitment to ensure that people with an intellectual disability have access to appropriate sport and recreation activities as shown by the total defunding of the Victorian Sport and Recreation Association of Persons with an Intellectual Disability leaving people with an intellectual disability without a voice and a means to ensure that sport and recreation is available to all.
- MR BATCHELOR To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Public Transport for failing to provide an adequate level of public transport services over the Easter Holiday period as evidenced by customers being required to wait more than 45 minutes for a city-bound tram on the East Malvern route on the morning of Monday, April 4 1994.

- MR THOMSON (Pascoe Vale) To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Public Transport for his failure to ensure an adequate level of service for PTC customers who use the Broadmeadows railway line, as evidenced by the events of March 29, 1994 in relation to the 7.33 a.m. service from the City, when passengers were told when the train arrived at Essendon Station to board a bus for the rest of the trip, but passengers waiting at unstaffed stations further down the line were not told the train was not coming and had been replaced by a bus, and were left waiting on train platforms.
- 87 MR THWAITES To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Health for placing at risk the health of mothers and babies in Mitcham as a result of their early discharge from hospital following childbirth.
- 88 MS GARBUTT To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Health for her failure to ensure that mothers and babies in Oakleigh South are able to stay at least five days in maternity care following the birth of their baby thus placing at risk the health and future well being of these Oakleigh South mothers and babies.
- MR LEIGH To move, That this House condemns the Member for Springvale for his involvement in the previous Labor Government's decision to purchase a tip in Springvale South which is now owned by the Ministry of Planning and Development but which had been owned by Waverley Council and managed by Springvale Council and further condemns the Member for his involvement in ensuring that Victorian taxpayers would be responsible for the costs of containing and cleaning up the pollution caused by the Council's disgraceful management practices.
- 90 MR LEIGH To move, That this House calls on the Leader of the Opposition to sack his political adviser Mr P Reed, the Mayor of Springvale, for his attempts to pump polluted tip waters into Melbourne Water's Braeside Park thereby putting the park at risk.
- 91 MR HAERMEYER To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Health for her failure to ensure that mothers and babies in Knoxfield are able to stay at least five days in maternity care following the birth of their baby thus placing at risk the health and future well being of these Knoxfield mothers and babies.
- 92 MR SANDON To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Education for his cuts to education funding at the Richmond West Primary School that have resulted in the loss of 9.5 teachers, an 18% increase in average class sizes, a 50% reduction in specialist programs, a 50% cut in reading recovery program and reduced professional development and program evaluation.
- 93 MR LEIGHTON To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Community Services for closure of cottage homes which has led to an increased demand for foster places in Blackburn, without also addressing the need for an increase in reimbursement rates for potential foster parents in the Blackburn area, described by the Children's Welfare Association of Victoria as being totally inadequate, thus leaving children without permanent placement.
- 94 MS GARBUTT To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Community Services for budget cuts which have seen services to physically and intellectually disabled people severely reduced at Kew Cottages, with recreation programs cut by more than half and the staff-client ratio falling to dangerous levels with plans for

- more reductions, resulting in poor staff morale and increased trauma and stress for long suffering parents at Kew Cottages.
- 95 MR PANDAZOPOULOS To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Community Services for his Government policies that have led to a massive 100% increase in fees at the All Saints Pre-School which has denied children from migrant and low income families in the Nunawading area access to pre-school.
- 96 MR LEIGHTON To move, That this House refers to the Privileges Committee for examination and report the matter of whether the Minister for Industry and Employment, the Honourable Phillip Gude, has committed a contempt in that he deliberately misled the House in that -
  - In a question without notice on 31 March 1994 the Leader of the Opposition referred the Minister to a briefing to heads of statutory authorities at which Mr Ian Douglas, QC outlined the State Government's position on changes to the Federal Industrial Relations Act;
  - 2 In answer the Minister for Industry and Employment stated in part that the meeting was not to provide a briefing on changes to the Federal Industrial Legislation nor was any reference made to any major changes to the Federal Industrial Relations Act;
  - The agenda of the briefing to statutory authority heads which shows under item 2 "Employee Relations Minister for Industry and Employment" at 2(ii) "The Federal Legislation Implications and Options Ian Douglas";
  - 4 Notes of the briefing to statutory authority heads of 15 March 1994 made available to the State Opposition which record the briefing given by Ian Douglas, QC on the Federal Legislation; and
  - The response by the Minister for Industry and Employment on the adjournment debate of 31 March 1994 to the matter raised by the Member for Preston, where the Minister failed to alter the substance of his earlier response to the Leader of the Opposition.
- 97 MR THOMSON (Pascoe Vale) To move, That this House notes with concern that the Government has spent more money on advertising campaigns and self-promotion involving the Minister for Industry and Employment than it plans to spend on assistance for the Snow Brand Pty Ltd, milk products company in its investment in a new plant at Tatura.
- 98 MRS WILSON To move, That this House congratulates Vizy Board's \$50 million expansion of a Cardboard Box Factory at Dandenong which will create new jobs for people living in Dandenong, one of the hardest hit areas by unemployment.
- 99 MR LONEY To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Education for cuts in education funding which have led to reduced learning opportunities for students in Geelong North and a wastage of library resources in primary schools in Geelong North.
- 100 MR BATCHELOR To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Public Transport for his failure to provide adequate rail service to country Victoria over the Easter holiday period as evidenced by the poor level of service on the Melbourne-Swan Hill train including on the 1.30 p.m. service from Swan Hill on April 4th the air conditioning was not working properly so that it was extremely hot in passenger carriages and passengers were repeatedly told en route that the train would not stop at Sunshine, however it did, resulting in needless

- inconvenience for many passengers who had been led to believe that their only alternative was to disembark at St Albans or Spencer Street.
- MR ANDRIANOPOULOS To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Health for not addressing the urgent need for more funds to be made available for child and adolescent psychiatric services at the Maroondah Hospital Psychiatric Unit which has resulted in a 9 month waiting period for patients causing untold strain and risk on families in the outer east.
- MS GARBUTT To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Community Services for his failure to provide to parents in Frankston access to an affordable and quality facility-based respite service for their children who have a disability thus placing financial pressures on these Frankston families.
- 103 MR BATCHELOR To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Public Transport for failing to ensure the co-ordination of rail and bus services in the Watsonia area, as evidenced by local buses that stop at the Watsonia railway station not meeting trains arriving at the station, and drivers refusing to wait for disembarking passengers who wish to catch the bus.
- 104 MS MARPLE To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Community Services for his policies that have led to massive increases in fees at the Merinda Park Pre-school and that have left children at the pre-school without milk or excursions.

- 108 MR MILDENHALL To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Local Government for misleading residents of Prahran and part of Malvern in comments that amalgamation would result in cuts in rates for Prahran and Malvern residents when in fact a meeting of councillors of the City of Prahran on the 18th of April indicated that the rate reductions promised will not be achievable.
- 109 MS MARPLE To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Community Services for failing to guarantee to parents caring for a child with a disability in Croydon access to an affordable facility based respite service which has resulted in severe financial hardship for parents in the Croydon area.

- 30 MR HAERMEYER To move, That this House notes with concern that as a result of Government policies fees at the Mordialloc Kindergarten have increased from \$50 per term in 1993 to \$110 per term in 1994, with parents expected to pay an additional \$30 levy for excursions, and consequently, enrolments at this kindergarten have decreased from 50 in 1993 to 30 in 1994 and this House urges the Minister to implement policies to ensure affordable and quality pre-schools are available to all families in the Mordialloc area.
- MS GARBUTT To move, That this House notes with concern that on average preschool fees on the Mornington Peninsular have doubled this year from \$49 to \$99 and further evidence suggests that at least 44 children have been excluded this year because parents cannot pay fees, 15 children have moved to day care as they can obtain fee relief, 20 children are on waiting lists due to reduced sessions and groups lost.
- 32 MS GARBUTT To move, That this House expresses its concerns at the failure of the Minister for Community Services to guarantee that all families living in Blackburn are able to afford to have their children attend pre-school, including those 15% of children who have not enroled this year due to massive increase of 140% in preschool fees at Blackburn North Pre-school.
- 33 MS MARPLE To move, That this House notes with concern the failure of the State Government to require an environmental effects statement for the proposed redevelopment of the Crib Point Oil Facility despite the companies involved indicating that works will not proceed during 1994.
- 34 MRS WILSON To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Fair Trading for her Government's actions in eroding the resources available to consumers for information and protection, through the closure of the regional offices of the Office of Fair Trading in Ringwood and Dandenong, thus making it difficult for people living in the outer suburbs to access these services.

- 41 MS MARPLE To move, That the House condemns the Minister for Community Services for his failure to provide an affordable pre-school at Croydon Central where due to the Minister's policies there has been a massive 88% increase in fees from \$160 in 1993 to \$300 in 1994.
- 42 MR SHEEHAN To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Education who, with the support of the Member for Mordialloc, has implemented policies which have resulted in the loss of 20 teaching positions from schools in the Mordialloc Electorate, while enrolments have increased by in excess of 60.

- 46 MR ANDRIANOPOULOS To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Education for failing to provide quality education to students at Bendigo Senior Secondary College due directly to government policies that have resulted in stopping the construction of a library and new classrooms at the school.

- 49 DR COGHILL To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Employment and Industry for failing to introduce a job creation scheme for people in the Bendigo area as promised before the election where the Bendigo District share of Jobs created under the said scheme would be over 800, such jobs providing a much needed stimulus to the Bendigo economy at a time when 8,444 people were receiving unemployment benefits from Social Security offices in Bendigo and Kangaroo Flat in February, 1994 being 14.73% more than in February, 1993.
- MR HAMILTON To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Youth Affairs for cutting totally funding to the Barwon Youth Information Service which has resulted in less information reaching young people in the Barwon area who are in desperate need of advice and support.
- 51 MR MILDENHALL To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Community Services for his action in cutting funding to the Gisborne Kindergarten, which has placed a heavy financial burden on many parents in the Gisborne area whose pre-school fees have risen by \$450 per child.
- 52 MR PANDAZOPOULOS To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Community Services for Government policies that have cut funding to the Ontos Pre-school, which has lead to an increase in fees from \$30 per term to \$130 per term, resulting in severe hardship being endured by families for pre-school children in the Buchan Community.
- MS GARBUTT To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Community Services for his failure to provide an affordable pre-school at Mordialloc where due to the Minister's policies there has been a massive 100% increase in fees at the Elenora Pre-school causing extreme financial hardship for parents of pre-school children in the Mordialloc area.
- 54 MS MARPLE To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Community Services for his actions in cutting funding to kindergartens in Bendigo which has placed an extra financial burden on parents whose fees have doubled at the Bendigo Kindergarten in 1994.

- MR PANDAZOPOULOS To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Public Transport for failing to ensure that services operated by the National Bus Company on route No. 256 between the City and La Trobe University run on time, as evidenced by delays of more than an hour between services on the afternoon of Thursday March 17, 1994.
- 57 **MS GARBUTT** To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Health for her failure to ensure that all mothers and babies in Bayswater are guarantied a minimum of 5 days in maternity care if they need it following the birth of a child.

- 58 MR ANDRIANOPOULOS To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Education for his failure to provide a second Government school V.C.E. facility in Bendigo despite a pre-election promise of the Government to have a second V.C.E. facility "for the start of 1993" and his subsequent failure to have the said facility operational at the commencement of the 1994 school year.
- 59 MR SANDON To move, That this House condemns the Government for its failure to ensure all children at the Le Page School in Cheltenham are guarantied a quality education due to massive increases in class sizes at the school.
- 60 MR MILDENHALL To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Community Services for ordering closed the only two reception facilities for emergency child abuse cases in the Western Suburbs, namely Buckland House and St Joseph's, in the face of his department's figures showing a 159% increase in child abuse notifications since the introduction of mandatory reporting.
- 61 MR THOMSON (Pascoe Vale) To move, That this House censures Mr Speaker for his failure to allow the Member for Sunshine and other Honourable Members to raise matters on the Adjournment Debate on Thursday 24 March 1994, in breach of the entitlements of Honourable Members provided for by the Sessional Orders.
- 62 MR COOPER To move, That this House censures the Honourable Member for Bundoora for attempting to use the abuse and death of Daniel Valerio to score cheap political points, and calls on the Honourable Member for Bundoora to apologise to this House, the family of Daniel Valerio and the Victorian Community for her inconsiderate and insensitive behaviour.
- 63 MR BATCHELOR To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Public Transport for reducing the size of the Bendigo Railway Workshops workforce from 270 in October, 1992 to under 180 causing job positions to be lost in Bendigo, notwithstanding pre-election comments by representatives of the current Government that the workforce would increase.
- 64 MR THWAITES To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Health for Government policies that have put mothers and babies in Boronia at risk due to their early release from hospital following childbirth.
- 65 MR MICALLEF To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Public Transport for his failure to ensure residents in Carrum Downs have access to adequate public transport in order to travel to their municipal base in Cranbourne.
- 66 MR MILDENHALL To move, That this House condemns the State Government for its failure to recognise the concerns of residents in Merinda Park regarding the Government's proposal for a Merinda Park Railway Station.
- 67 MS MARPLE To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Health for her failure to ensure that mothers and babies in Croydon are able to stay at least 5 days in maternity care following the birth of their child.
- 68 MR COOPER To move, That this House notes the involvement of the Honourable Member for Thomastown, in his then role as State Secretary of the Australian Labor Party, to manipulate the result of the Nunawading Province re-election in 1985 and his subsequent refusal to co-operate with the police investigation of this

- MR LEIGHTON To move, That this House condemns the Member for Ivanhoe, the Honourable Vin Heffernan, for his failure to honour his commitment that the Liberal Government would restore full disadvantaged school program funding to schools in his electorate such as West Heidelberg Primary School and his advice to a parent of that school that there are no votes in West Heidelberg.
- 76 MR THWAITES To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Health for her failure to ensure that mothers and babies in Knox are able to stay at least 5 days in maternity care following the birth of their child thus placing at risk the health and future well-being of these mothers and babies.
- MR THWAITES To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Health for her failure to ensure that mothers and babies in Ringwood are able to stay at least 5 days in maternity care following the birth of their child to ensure that the health and future well being of the mother and baby is not at risk.

- 78 MR COOPER To move, That this House calls on all members of the Opposition to disassociate themselves from the actions of the Honourable Member for Thomastown who, in his then role as State Secretary of the Australian Labor Party, orchestrated a campaign to mislead and defraud voters in the re-election for the Nunawading Province in 1985, and requests that all Opposition members publicly support the demand that the Honourable Member for Thomastown disclose to the House all of the facts relating to his involvement in this scandal.

- MR LONEY To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Sport, Recreation and Racing for his lack of commitment to ensure that people with an intellectual disability have access to appropriate sport and recreation activities as shown by the total defunding of the Victorian Sport and Recreation Association of Persons with an Intellectual Disability leaving people with an intellectual disability without a voice and a means to ensure that sport and recreation is available to all.
- MR BATCHELOR To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Public Transport for failing to provide an adequate level of public transport services over the Easter Holiday period as evidenced by customers being required to wait more than 45 minutes for a city-bound tram on the East Malvern route on the morning of Monday, April 4 1994.

- MR THOMSON (Pascoe Vale) To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Public Transport for his failure to ensure an adequate level of service for PTC customers who use the Broadmeadows railway line, as evidenced by the events of March 29, 1994 in relation to the 7.33 a.m. service from the City, when passengers were told when the train arrived at Essendon Station to board a bus for the rest of the trip, but passengers waiting at unstaffed stations further down the line were not told the train was not coming and had been replaced by a bus, and were left waiting on train platforms.
- MR THWAITES To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Health for placing at risk the health of mothers and babies in Mitcham as a result of their early discharge from hospital following childbirth.
- 88 MS GARBUTT To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Health for her failure to ensure that mothers and babies in Oakleigh South are able to stay at least five days in maternity care following the birth of their baby thus placing at risk the health and future well being of these Oakleigh South mothers and babies.
- MR LEIGH To move, That this House condemns the Member for Springvale for his involvement in the previous Labor Government's decision to purchase a tip in Springvale South which is now owned by the Ministry of Planning and Development but which had been owned by Waverley Council and managed by Springvale Council and further condemns the Member for his involvement in ensuring that Victorian taxpayers would be responsible for the costs of containing and cleaning up the pollution caused by the Council's disgraceful management practices.
- 90 MR LEIGH To move, That this House calls on the Leader of the Opposition to sack his political adviser Mr P Reed, the Mayor of Springvale, for his attempts to pump polluted tip waters into Melbourne Water's Braeside Park thereby putting the park at risk.

- more reductions, resulting in poor staff morale and increased trauma and stress for long suffering parents at Kew Cottages.
- 95 MR PANDAZOPOULOS To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Community Services for his Government policies that have led to a massive 100% increase in fees at the All Saints Pre-School which has denied children from migrant and low income families in the Nunawading area access to pre-school.
- 96 MR LEIGHTON To move, That this House refers to the Privileges Committee for examination and report the matter of whether the Minister for Industry and Employment, the Honourable Phillip Gude, has committed a contempt in that he deliberately misled the House in that -
  - 1 In a question without notice on 31 March 1994 the Leader of the Opposition referred the Minister to a briefing to heads of statutory authorities at which Mr Ian Douglas, QC outlined the State Government's position on changes to the Federal Industrial Relations Act:
  - In answer the Minister for Industry and Employment stated in part that the meeting was not to provide a briefing on changes to the Federal Industrial Legislation nor was any reference made to any major changes to the Federal Industrial Relations Act;
  - The agenda of the briefing to statutory authority heads which shows under item 2 "Employee Relations Minister for Industry and Employment" at 2(ii) "The Federal Legislation Implications and Options Ian Douglas";
  - 4 Notes of the briefing to statutory authority heads of 15 March 1994 made available to the State Opposition which record the briefing given by Ian Douglas, QC on the Federal Legislation; and
  - The response by the Minister for Industry and Employment on the adjournment debate of 31 March 1994 to the matter raised by the Member for Preston, where the Minister failed to alter the substance of his earlier response to the Leader of the Opposition.
- 97 MR THOMSON (Pascoe Vale) To move, That this House notes with concern that the Government has spent more money on advertising campaigns and self-promotion involving the Minister for Industry and Employment than it plans to spend on assistance for the Snow Brand Pty Ltd, milk products company in its investment in a new plant at Tatura.
- 98 MRS WILSON To move, That this House congratulates Vizy Board's \$50 million expansion of a Cardboard Box Factory at Dandenong which will create new jobs for people living in Dandenong, one of the hardest hit areas by unemployment.
- 99 MR LONEY To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Education for cuts in education funding which have led to reduced learning opportunities for students in Geelong North and a wastage of library resources in primary schools in Geelong North.
- 100 MR BATCHELOR To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Public Transport for his failure to provide adequate rail service to country Victoria over the Easter holiday period as evidenced by the poor level of service on the Melbourne-Swan Hill train including on the 1.30 p.m. service from Swan Hill on April 4th the air conditioning was not working properly so that it was extremely hot in passenger carriages and passengers were repeatedly told en route that the train would not stop at Sunshine, however it did, resulting in needless

- inconvenience for many passengers who had been led to believe that their only alternative was to disembark at St Albans or Spencer Street.
- 101 MR ANDRIANOPOULOS To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Health for not addressing the urgent need for more funds to be made available for child and adolescent psychiatric services at the Maroondah Hospital Psychiatric Unit which has resulted in a 9 month waiting period for patients causing untold strain and risk on families in the outer east.
- 102 MS GARBUTT To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Community Services for his failure to provide to parents in Frankston access to an affordable and quality facility-based respite service for their children who have a disability thus placing financial pressures on these Frankston families.
- MR BATCHELOR To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Public Transport for failing to ensure the co-ordination of rail and bus services in the Watsonia area, as evidenced by local buses that stop at the Watsonia railway station not meeting trains arriving at the station, and drivers refusing to wait for disembarking passengers who wish to catch the bus.
- 104 MS MARPLE To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Community Services for his policies that have led to massive increases in fees at the Merinda Park Pre-school and that have left children at the pre-school without milk or excursions.
- MR HAMILTON To move, That the Minister for Youth Affairs be condemned for failing to ensure that at least one Koori Youth Organisation was funded through the office of Youth Affairs Grants Program and given that currently two Koori Youth Programs have been de-funded, the Minister is further condemned for his discrimination against the most needy youth in our community.
- 106 MR DOLLIS To move, That this House condemns the State Government for its failure to ensure the completion of beach restoration works at McCrae and notes that without immediate action the future of the Rosebud Lifesaving Club is at risk and a long standing tradition of service to the Southern Peninsular community may end.
- MR SANDON To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Education for cuts to education funding that has reduced the allocation of L.O.T.E. staffing from 3 to 2 at Abbotsford Primary School and has put at risk one of the leading school language programs in Victoria and thereby reducing educational opportunities to families in Abbotsford.
- 108 MR MILDENHALL To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Local Government for misleading residents of Prahran and part of Malvern in comments that amalgamation would result in cuts in rates for Prahran and Malvern residents when in fact a meeting of councillors of the City of Prahran on the 18th of April indicated that the rate reductions promised will not be achievable.
- MS MARPLE To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Community Services for failing to guarantee to parents caring for a child with a disability in Croydon access to an affordable facility based respite service which has resulted in severe financial hardship for parents in the Croydon area.

- 110 MR LEIGHTON To move, That this House in noting the outspoken comments in May 1992 by the Member for Ivanhoe, the Honourable Vin Heffernan MP, in support of continued state ownership of the historic Banyule Homestead in his Ivanhoe Electorate, including his statement that the people would have the final say at the next election, now condemns the Member for Ivanhoe for supporting the Government sale of the Banyule Homestead.

- **9** That the Committee shall keep a record of all evidence given before it and determinations made by it.
- 10 That the Committee have power to authorize publication of any evidence given before it in public and any document presented to it.
- 11 That as soon as practicable after the completion of each day's proceedings a transcript of the evidence taken in public by the Committee shall be published.
- 12 That the foregoing provisions of this resolution so far as they are inconsistent with the Standing Orders and practices of the Houses shall have effect notwithstanding anything contained in those Standing Orders.
- 21 DR COGHILL To move, That this House dissents from the actions of Mr Speaker in disallowing the use of lap top computers in the Chamber by Members and expresses the opinion that their use is acceptable subject to conditions similar to those applying in the other place.

- 23 MR SANDON To move, That he have leave to bring in a Bill to amend the *Education Act* 1958 to provide for the establishment of School Closures Review Committees, to allow for public consultation in the closure of Government Schools and for other purposes.

- agreement which he made and which was honoured by the State of Victoria but not honoured by the Member for Clayton.
- MR LEIGH To move, That this House condemns the Leader of the Opposition Mr J Brumby and Members of the Opposition for their failure to disassociate themselves from the activities of the Member for Clayton in his failure to repay in adequate time monies that he owed the Ministry of Education.
- DR COGHILL To move, That this House expresses the opinion that there is prima facie evidence of a contempt of the Parliament by the Honourable the Leader of the House in that he failed to make available for inspection all correspondence and other documents created since 26 October 1992, relating to any aspect of the review or reform of the structure, functioning, Standing Orders, procedures, practices or administration of the Legislative Assembly, the Legislative Council or the Parliament in any other respect including the rights and entitlements of Members received by him or sent by him or on his authority to the Speaker of the Legislative Assembly and the President of the Legislative Council either individually or jointly or any Officer or Officers of the Parliament, and all documents held by him relating to meetings, telephone conversations or other forms of communication or discussion in respect of the above matters in which he participated or which were held on his authority in response to Question No. 8 and that the matter be referred to the Privileges Committee for inquiry and report.
- 28 MR THOMSON (Pascoe Vale) To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Community Services for his action in cutting funding to the Dr Stanley Cochrane Pre-school in Mitcham, which has placed a heavy financial burden on many parents whose pre-school fees have risen from \$180 per year to \$480 per year.
- MR MICALLEF To move, That this House condemns the State Government for its continued failure to adequately secure the former Joseph Banks Secondary College site at Doveton, showing a disregard for the safety of local residents, allowing them to walk unhindered into an asbestos contaminated area and leaving a damage bill estimated at over \$60,000 some of which is to facilities which are to be retained by the community.
- 30 MR HAERMEYER To move, That this House notes with concern that as a result of Government policies fees at the Mordialloc Kindergarten have increased from \$50 per term in 1993 to \$110 per term in 1994, with parents expected to pay an additional \$30 levy for excursions, and consequently, enrolments at this kindergarten have decreased from 50 in 1993 to 30 in 1994 and this House urges the Minister to implement policies to ensure affordable and quality pre-schools are available to all families in the Mordialloc area.
- 31 MS GARBUTT To move, That this House notes with concern that on average preschool fees on the Mornington Peninsular have doubled this year from \$49 to \$99 and further evidence suggests that at least 44 children have been excluded this year because parents cannot pay fees, 15 children have moved to day care as they can obtain fee relief, 20 children are on waiting lists due to reduced sessions and groups lost.
- 32 MS GARBUTT To move, That this House expresses its concerns at the failure of the Minister for Community Services to guarantee that all families living in Blackburn are able to afford to have their children attend pre-school, including those 15% of

- children who have not enroled this year due to massive increase of 140% in preschool fees at Blackburn North Pre-school.
- 33 MS MARPLE To move, That this House notes with concern the failure of the State Government to require an environmental effects statement for the proposed redevelopment of the Crib Point Oil Facility despite the companies involved indicating that works will not proceed during 1994.
- 34 MRS WILSON To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Fair Trading for her Government's actions in eroding the resources available to consumers for information and protection, through the closure of the regional offices of the Office of Fair Trading in Ringwood and Dandenong, thus making it difficult for people living in the outer suburbs to access these services.
- 35 MR SEITZ To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Community Services for Government policies which have lead to an increase of kindergarten fees at Indra Pre-school in Blackburn South from \$180 to \$500 a year, resulting in severe hardships being endured by families of Pre-school children in the Blackburn area.
- 36 MR HAMILTON To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Public Transport for the appalling level of service for commuters travelling to Bairnsdale via Sale, since the abolition of the Rail Service between Bairnsdale and Sale, including the lack of shelter and passenger amenities at Bairnsdale and inconvenience caused by long delays in bus and train connections.
- 37 MR ANDRIANOPOULOS To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Public Transport for the premature introduction of driver only trains on the Alamein line, which because of 'blind spots' created by the design of station platforms along this line, has resulted in passengers being placed in great danger when boarding and alighting from trains, due to the inability of drivers to clearly see whether passengers are clear of the train before departing.
- 38 MR THOMSON (Pascoe Vale) To move, That this House condemns the Government for its massive increases in class sizes at Antonio Park Primary School which have led to a reduced quality of education at that school.
- 39 MR DOLLIS To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Planning for his intervention in the Knox Council decision regarding a proposed Fast Food Restaurant in Rowville as yet another example of this Government's overriding of Local Government Planning Schemes and decisions, thereby undermining the role of Local Government and showing complete disregard for the rights and wishes of Knox residents.
- 40 MR HAERMEYER To move, That this House condemns the Minister for School Education for Government Education Policies which have lead to massive increases in class sizes at Antonio Park Primary School whilst teaching staff numbers have been significantly reduced, resulting in dislocation of students and the inability of staff to provide the optimum level of quality education that Antonio Park Primary students so richly deserve.

- 41 MS MARPLE To move, That the House condemns the Minister for Community Services for his failure to provide an affordable pre-school at Croydon Central where due to the Minister's policies there has been a massive 88% increase in fees from \$160 in 1993 to \$300 in 1994.
- 42 MR SHEEHAN To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Education who, with the support of the Member for Mordialloc, has implemented policies which have resulted in the loss of 20 teaching positions from schools in the Mordialloc Electorate, while enrolments have increased by in excess of 60.
- 43 MR MILDENHALL To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Youth Affairs for cutting funding to the Nunawading Youth Adult Bureau by \$16,000, resulting in reduced outreach services to youth in the Nunawading area at a time when charitable organisations in Nunawading are experiencing a 100% increase in demand for their services, and youth unemployment remains at disastrously high levels.
- 44 MR SERCOMBE To move, That this House condemns the Government for its education policies which have reduced the quality of education for children in the Monbulk electorate.
- 45 MS GARBUTT To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Community Services for Government policies that have led to a 88% increase in fees from \$45 to \$115 per term at the Greenhills Pre-school, resulting in severe financial hardship for many parents with pre-school children in the Greensborough and Eltham communities.
- 46 MR ANDRIANOPOULOS To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Education for failing to provide quality education to students at Bendigo Senior Secondary College due directly to government policies that have resulted in stopping the construction of a library and new classrooms at the school.
- 47 MRS WILSON To move, That this House notes with concern that the Minister for Education has failed to ensure a quality education for children at Cranbourne West Primary School, due to massive increases in class sizes at this school.
- 48 MR PANDAZOPOULOS To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Education for denying children at the Cranbourne South Primary School a quality education due to massive increases in class sizes at the school.
- 49 DR COGHILL To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Employment and Industry for failing to introduce a job creation scheme for people in the Bendigo area as promised before the election where the Bendigo District share of Jobs created under the said scheme would be over 800, such jobs providing a much needed stimulus to the Bendigo economy at a time when 8,444 people were receiving unemployment benefits from Social Security offices in Bendigo and Kangaroo Flat in February, 1994 being 14.73% more than in February, 1993.
- MR HAMILTON To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Youth Affairs for cutting totally funding to the Barwon Youth Information Service which has resulted in less information reaching young people in the Barwon area who are in desperate need of advice and support.

- MR MILDENHALL To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Community Services for his action in cutting funding to the Gisborne Kindergarten, which has placed a heavy financial burden on many parents in the Gisborne area whose pre-school fees have risen by \$450 per child.
- MR PANDAZOPOULOS To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Community Services for Government policies that have cut funding to the Ontos Pre-school, which has lead to an increase in fees from \$30 per term to \$130 per term, resulting in severe hardship being endured by families for pre-school children in the Buchan Community.
- MS GARBUTT To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Community Services for his failure to provide an affordable pre-school at Mordialloc where due to the Minister's policies there has been a massive 100% increase in fees at the Elenora Pre-school causing extreme financial hardship for parents of pre-school children in the Mordialloc area.
- 54 MS MARPLE To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Community Services for his actions in cutting funding to kindergartens in Bendigo which has placed an extra financial burden on parents whose fees have doubled at the Bendigo Kindergarten in 1994.
- 55 MR BATCHELOR To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Public Transport for his failure to provide an adequate frequency of tram services from the City to West Preston and Mont Albert which has resulted in long delays for customers, as evidenced by patrons on Victoria Parade waiting up to 17 minutes for trams to the City on the Mont Albert route during the morning peak-hour on Thursday 17 March and Friday 18 March, 1994.
- MR PANDAZOPOULOS To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Public Transport for failing to ensure that services operated by the National Bus Company on route No. 256 between the City and La Trobe University run on time, as evidenced by delays of more than an hour between services on the afternoon of Thursday March 17, 1994.
- 57 **MS GARBUTT** To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Health for her failure to ensure that all mothers and babies in Bayswater are guarantied a minimum of 5 days in maternity care if they need it following the birth of a child.
- MR ANDRIANOPOULOS To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Education for his failure to provide a second Government school V.C.E. facility in Bendigo despite a pre-election promise of the Government to have a second V.C.E. facility "for the start of 1993" and his subsequent failure to have the said facility operational at the commencement of the 1994 school year.
- 59 MR SANDON To move, That this House condemns the Government for its failure to ensure all children at the Le Page School in Cheltenham are guarantied a quality education due to massive increases in class sizes at the school.

- 63 MR BATCHELOR To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Public Transport for reducing the size of the Bendigo Railway Workshops workforce from 270 in October, 1992 to under 180 causing job positions to be lost in Bendigo, notwithstanding pre-election comments by representatives of the current Government that the workforce would increase.
- 64 MR THWAITES To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Health for Government policies that have put mothers and babies in Boronia at risk due to their early release from hospital following childbirth.
- 65 MR MICALLEF To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Public Transport for his failure to ensure residents in Carrum Downs have access to adequate public transport in order to travel to their municipal base in Cranbourne.
- 66 MR MILDENHALL To move, That this House condemns the State Government for its failure to recognise the concerns of residents in Merinda Park regarding the Government's proposal for a Merinda Park Railway Station.

- MR LEIGHTON To move, That this House condemns the Member for Ivanhoe, the Honourable Vin Heffernan, for his failure to honour his commitment that the Liberal Government would restore full disadvantaged school program funding to schools in his electorate such as West Heidelberg Primary School and his advice to a parent of that school that there are no votes in West Heidelberg.
- MR THWAITES To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Health for her failure to ensure that mothers and babies in Knox are able to stay at least 5 days in maternity care following the birth of their child thus placing at risk the health and future well-being of these mothers and babies.
- 77 MR THWAITES To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Health for her failure to ensure that mothers and babies in Ringwood are able to stay at least 5 days in maternity care following the birth of their child to ensure that the health and future well being of the mother and baby is not at risk.
- MR COOPER To move, That this House calls on all members of the Opposition to disassociate themselves from the actions of the Honourable Member for Thomastown who, in his then role as State Secretary of the Australian Labor Party, orchestrated a campaign to mislead and defraud voters in the re-election for the Nunawading Province in 1985, and requests that all Opposition members publicly support the demand that the Honourable Member for Thomastown disclose to the House all of the facts relating to his involvement in this scandal.
- MS GARBUTT To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Community Services for failing to guarantee to parents in Ringwood an affordable and quality respite service for those children who have a disability.
- 80 MS GARBUTT To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Community Services for failing to guarantee to parents in Blackburn access to an affordable and quality respite service for children with a disability resulting in considerable financial hardship for these parents.

- MR HAERMEYER To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Police and Emergency Services for failing to provide sufficient funds to enable the Victorian Police to properly service the municipalities of Knox, Ringwood, Croydon, Sherbrooke, Healesville, Lilydale and Upper Yarra, particularly noting that the local community is being asked to foot the bill for a \$120,000 police caravan to adequately serve the very obvious policing needs of these communities.

- MR LONEY To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Sport, Recreation and Racing for his lack of commitment to ensure that people with an intellectual disability have access to appropriate sport and recreation activities as shown by the total defunding of the Victorian Sport and Recreation Association of Persons with an Intellectual Disability leaving people with an intellectual disability without a voice and a means to ensure that sport and recreation is available to all.
- MR BATCHELOR To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Public Transport for failing to provide an adequate level of public transport services over the Easter Holiday period as evidenced by customers being required to wait more than 45 minutes for a city-bound tram on the East Malvern route on the morning of Monday, April 4 1994.
- MR THOMSON (Pascoe Vale) To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Public Transport for his failure to ensure an adequate level of service for PTC customers who use the Broadmeadows railway line, as evidenced by the events of March 29, 1994 in relation to the 7.33 a.m. service from the City, when passengers were told when the train arrived at Essendon Station to board a bus for the rest of the trip, but passengers waiting at unstaffed stations further down the line were not told the train was not coming and had been replaced by a bus, and were left waiting on train platforms.
- 87 MR THWAITES To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Health for placing at risk the health of mothers and babies in Mitcham as a result of their early discharge from hospital following childbirth.
- MS GARBUTT To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Health for her failure to ensure that mothers and babies in Oakleigh South are able to stay at least five days in maternity care following the birth of their baby thus placing at risk the health and future well being of these Oakleigh South mothers and babies.

- 89 MR LEIGH To move, That this House condemns the Member for Springvale for his involvement in the previous Labor Government's decision to purchase a tip in Springvale South which is now owned by the Ministry of Planning and Development but which had been owned by Waverley Council and managed by Springvale Council and further condemns the Member for his involvement in ensuring that Victorian taxpayers would be responsible for the costs of containing and cleaning up the pollution caused by the Council's disgraceful management practices.
- 90 MR LEIGH To move, That this House calls on the Leader of the Opposition to sack his political adviser Mr P Reed, the Mayor of Springvale, for his attempts to pump polluted tip waters into Melbourne Water's Braeside Park thereby putting the park at risk.
- 91 MR HAERMEYER To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Health for her failure to ensure that mothers and babies in Knoxfield are able to stay at least five days in maternity care following the birth of their baby thus placing at risk the health and future well being of these Knoxfield mothers and babies.
- 92 MR SANDON To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Education for his cuts to education funding at the Richmond West Primary School that have resulted in the loss of 9.5 teachers, an 18% increase in average class sizes, a 50% reduction in specialist programs, a 50% cut in reading recovery program and reduced professional development and program evaluation.
- 93 MR LEIGHTON To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Community Services for closure of cottage homes which has led to an increased demand for foster places in Blackburn, without also addressing the need for an increase in reimbursement rates for potential foster parents in the Blackburn area, described by the Children's Welfare Association of Victoria as being totally inadequate, thus leaving children without permanent placement.
- 94 MS GARBUTT To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Community Services for budget cuts which have seen services to physically and intellectually disabled people severely reduced at Kew Cottages, with recreation programs cut by more than half and the staff-client ratio falling to dangerous levels with plans for more reductions, resulting in poor staff morale and increased trauma and stress for long suffering parents at Kew Cottages.
- 95 MR PANDAZOPOULOS To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Community Services for his Government policies that have led to a massive 100% increase in fees at the All Saints Pre-School which has denied children from migrant and low income families in the Nunawading area access to pre-school.
- 96 MR LEIGHTON To move, That this House refers to the Privileges Committee for examination and report the matter of whether the Minister for Industry and Employment, the Honourable Phillip Gude, has committed a contempt in that he deliberately misled the House in that -
  - In a question without notice on 31 March 1994 the Leader of the Opposition referred the Minister to a briefing to heads of statutory authorities at which Mr Ian Douglas, QC outlined the State Government's position on changes to the Federal Industrial Relations Act;
  - In answer the Minister for Industry and Employment stated in part that the meeting was not to provide a briefing on changes to the Federal Industrial

- Legislation nor was any reference made to any major changes to the Federal Industrial Relations Act;
- The agenda of the briefing to statutory authority heads which shows under item 2 "Employee Relations Minister for Industry and Employment" at 2(ii) "The Federal Legislation Implications and Options Ian Douglas";
- 4 Notes of the briefing to statutory authority heads of 15 March 1994 made available to the State Opposition which record the briefing given by Ian Douglas, QC on the Federal Legislation; and
- The response by the Minister for Industry and Employment on the adjournment debate of 31 March 1994 to the matter raised by the Member for Preston, where the Minister failed to alter the substance of his earlier response to the Leader of the Opposition.
- 97 MR THOMSON (Pascoe Vale) To move, That this House notes with concern that the Government has spent more money on advertising campaigns and self-promotion involving the Minister for Industry and Employment than it plans to spend on assistance for the Snow Brand Pty Ltd, milk products company in its investment in a new plant at Tatura.
- 98 MRS WILSON To move, That this House congratulates Vizy Board's \$50 million expansion of a Cardboard Box Factory at Dandenong which will create new jobs for people living in Dandenong, one of the hardest hit areas by unemployment.
- 99 MR LONEY To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Education for cuts in education funding which have led to reduced learning opportunities for students in Geelong North and a wastage of library resources in primary schools in Geelong North.
- 100 MR BATCHELOR To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Public Transport for his failure to provide adequate rail service to country Victoria over the Easter holiday period as evidenced by the poor level of service on the Melbourne-Swan Hill train including on the 1.30 p.m. service from Swan Hill on April 4th the air conditioning was not working properly so that it was extremely hot in passenger carriages and passengers were repeatedly told en route that the train would not stop at Sunshine, however it did, resulting in needless inconvenience for many passengers who had been led to believe that their only alternative was to disembark at St Albans or Spencer Street.
- MR ANDRIANOPOULOS To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Health for not addressing the urgent need for more funds to be made available for child and adolescent psychiatric services at the Maroondah Hospital Psychiatric Unit which has resulted in a 9 month waiting period for patients causing untold strain and risk on families in the outer east.
- MS GARBUTT To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Community Services for his failure to provide to parents in Frankston access to an affordable and quality facility-based respite service for their children who have a disability thus placing financial pressures on these Frankston families.

- 103 MR BATCHELOR To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Public Transport for failing to ensure the co-ordination of rail and bus services in the Watsonia area, as evidenced by local buses that stop at the Watsonia railway station not meeting trains arriving at the station, and drivers refusing to wait for disembarking passengers who wish to catch the bus.
- 104 MS MARPLE To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Community Services for his policies that have led to massive increases in fees at the Merinda Park Pre-school and that have left children at the pre-school without milk or excursions.
- MR HAMILTON To move, That the Minister for Youth Affairs be condemned for failing to ensure that at least one Koori Youth Organisation was funded through the office of Youth Affairs Grants Program and given that currently two Koori Youth Programs have been de-funded, the Minister is further condemned for his discrimination against the most needy youth in our community.
- MR DOLLIS To move, That this House condemns the State Government for its failure to ensure the completion of beach restoration works at McCrae and notes that without immediate action the future of the Rosebud Lifesaving Club is at risk and a long standing tradition of service to the Southern Peninsular community may end.
- MR SANDON To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Education for cuts to education funding that has reduced the allocation of L.O.T.E. staffing from 3 to 2 at Abbotsford Primary School and has put at risk one of the leading school language programs in Victoria and thereby reducing educational opportunities to families in Abbotsford.
- 108 MR MILDENHALL To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Local Government for misleading residents of Prahran and part of Malvern in comments that amalgamation would result in cuts in rates for Prahran and Malvern residents when in fact a meeting of councillors of the City of Prahran on the 18th of April indicated that the rate reductions promised will not be achievable.
- 109 **MS MARPLE** To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Community Services for failing to guarantee to parents caring for a child with a disability in Croydon access to an affordable facility based respite service which has resulted in severe financial hardship for parents in the Croydon area.
- 110 MR LEIGHTON To move, That this House in noting the outspoken comments in May 1992 by the Member for Ivanhoe, the Honourable Vin Heffernan MP, in support of continued state ownership of the historic Banyule Homestead in his Ivanhoe Electorate, including his statement that the people would have the final say at the next election, now condemns the Member for Ivanhoe for supporting the Government sale of the Banyule Homestead.

- MR THWAITES To move, That this House condemns the Member for Monbulk for his Government's failure to adequately fund the Sherbrooke Community Health Centre resulting in delays of up to two weeks for rehabilitation after discharge from hospital, and a two week waiting list for physiotherapy services, while supporting the Government's decision to spend \$9.1 million upgrading the Premier's and Treasurer's offices.

- 120 MR MILDENHALL To move, That this House condemns the Member for Mooroolbark for supporting the State Government's proposed cuts of \$127,000 to the Canterbury Family Centre which will result in a reduction in services to troubled families in the Croydon area, while supporting the Government's decision to spend \$9.1 million upgrading the Premier's and Treasurer's offices.
- MS GARBUTT To move, That this House condemns the Member for Bayswater for supporting the State Government's proposed cuts of \$127,000 to the Canterbury Family Centre which will result in a reduction in services to troubled families in the Ringwood area, while supporting the Government's decision to spend \$9.1 million upgrading the Premier's and Treasurer's offices.
- 122 MR MILDENHALL To move, That this House condemns the Member for Bendigo West for failing to support the Alexander Hospital in Castlemaine which will result in a reduction of health services to the people of the Castlemaine district while supporting the Government's decision to spend \$9.1 million upgrading the Premier's and Treasurer's offices.
- 123 MR COLE To move, That this House condemns the Member for Ripon for failing to support the Creswick Hospital and the Clunes District Hospital which will result in a substantial reduction in the health services available to the people of his electorate, whilst supporting the Government's decision to spend \$9.1 million upgrading the Premier's and Treasurer's offices.

- MR LEIGH To move, That this House condemns the Member for Clayton for (a) his failure to repay to the State of Victoria within due time \$7595.41 advanced to the Member from the Education Ministry after his entering a studentship agreement; and (b) his offers to repay \$20 per month over a period of 18 years in spite of letters from the Victorian Government Solicitor threatening legal action unless he complied with arrangements which are contained in the studentship agreement that he entered into; despite the fact that during his time as a MLA for Glenhuntly and Clayton he received salary and electoral allowances of almost \$1.5 M. and this House further requests the Member to explain to the people why he failed to honour arrangements that were entered into by the Member in the studentship agreement which he made and which was honoured by the State of Victoria but not honoured by the Member for Clayton.

- MR LEIGH To move, That this House condemns the Leader of the Opposition Mr J Brumby and Members of the Opposition for their failure to disassociate themselves from the activities of the Member for Clayton in his failure to repay in adequate time monies that he owed the Ministry of Education.
- DR COGHILL To move, That this House expresses the opinion that there is prima facie evidence of a contempt of the Parliament by the Honourable the Leader of the House in that he failed to make available for inspection all correspondence and other documents created since 26 October 1992, relating to any aspect of the review or reform of the structure, functioning, Standing Orders, procedures, practices or administration of the Legislative Assembly, the Legislative Council or the Parliament in any other respect including the rights and entitlements of Members received by him or sent by him or on his authority to the Speaker of the Legislative Assembly and the President of the Legislative Council either individually or jointly or any Officer or Officers of the Parliament, and all documents held by him relating to meetings, telephone conversations or other forms of communication or discussion in respect of the above matters in which he participated or which were held on his authority in response to Question No. 8 and that the matter be referred to the Privileges Committee for inquiry and report.
- 28 MR THOMSON (Pascoe Vale) To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Community Services for his action in cutting funding to the Dr Stanley Cochrane Pre-school in Mitcham, which has placed a heavy financial burden on many parents whose pre-school fees have risen from \$180 per year to \$480 per year.
- MR MICALLEF To move, That this House condemns the State Government for its continued failure to adequately secure the former Joseph Banks Secondary College site at Doveton, showing a disregard for the safety of local residents, allowing them to walk unhindered into an asbestos contaminated area and leaving a damage bill estimated at over \$60,000 some of which is to facilities which are to be retained by the community.
- 30 MR HAERMEYER To move, That this House notes with concern that as a result of Government policies fees at the Mordialloc Kindergarten have increased from \$50 per term in 1993 to \$110 per term in 1994, with parents expected to pay an additional \$30 levy for excursions, and consequently, enrolments at this kindergarten have decreased from 50 in 1993 to 30 in 1994 and this House urges the Minister to implement policies to ensure affordable and quality pre-schools are available to all families in the Mordialloc area.
- 31 MS GARBUTT To move, That this House notes with concern that on average preschool fees on the Mornington Peninsular have doubled this year from \$49 to \$99 and further evidence suggests that at least 44 children have been excluded this year because parents cannot pay fees, 15 children have moved to day care as they can obtain fee relief, 20 children are on waiting lists due to reduced sessions and groups lost.
- 32 MS GARBUTT To move, That this House expresses its concerns at the failure of the Minister for Community Services to guarantee that all families living in Blackburn are able to afford to have their children attend pre-school, including those 15% of children who have not enrolled this year due to massive increase of 140% in pre-school fees at Blackburn North Pre-school.

- 33 MS MARPLE To move, That this House notes with concern the failure of the State Government to require an environmental effects statement for the proposed redevelopment of the Crib Point Oil Facility despite the companies involved indicating that works will not proceed during 1994.
- MRS WILSON To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Fair Trading for her Government's actions in eroding the resources available to consumers for information and protection, through the closure of the regional offices of the Office of Fair Trading in Ringwood and Dandenong, thus making it difficult for people living in the outer suburbs to access these services.
- MR SEITZ To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Community Services for Government policies which have lead to an increase of kindergarten fees at Indra Pre-school in Blackburn South from \$180 to \$500 a year, resulting in severe hardships being endured by families of Pre-school children in the Blackburn area.
- 36 MR HAMILTON To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Public Transport for the appalling level of service for commuters travelling to Bairnsdale via Sale, since the abolition of the Rail Service between Bairnsdale and Sale, including the lack of shelter and passenger amenities at Bairnsdale and inconvenience caused by long delays in bus and train connections.
- 37 MR ANDRIANOPOULOS To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Public Transport for the premature introduction of driver only trains on the Alamein line, which because of 'blind spots' created by the design of station platforms along this line, has resulted in passengers being placed in great danger when boarding and alighting from trains, due to the inability of drivers to clearly see whether passengers are clear of the train before departing.
- 38 MR THOMSON (Pascoe Vale) To move, That this House condemns the Government for its massive increases in class sizes at Antonio Park Primary School which have led to a reduced quality of education at that school.
- 39 MR DOLLIS To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Planning for his intervention in the Knox Council decision regarding a proposed Fast Food Restaurant in Rowville as yet another example of this Government's overriding of Local Government Planning Schemes and decisions, thereby undermining the role of Local Government and showing complete disregard for the rights and wishes of Knox residents.
- 40 MR HAERMEYER To move, That this House condemns the Minister for School Education for Government Education Policies which have lead to massive increases in class sizes at Antonio Park Primary School whilst teaching staff numbers have been significantly reduced, resulting in dislocation of students and the inability of staff to provide the optimum level of quality education that Antonio Park Primary students so richly deserve.
- 41 MS MARPLE To move, That the House condemns the Minister for Community Services for his failure to provide an affordable pre-school at Croydon Central where due to the Minister's policies there has been a massive 88% increase in fees from \$160 in 1993 to \$300 in 1994.

- 42 MR SHEEHAN To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Education who, with the support of the Member for Mordialloc, has implemented policies which have resulted in the loss of 20 teaching positions from schools in the Mordialloc Electorate, while enrolments have increased by in excess of 60.
- 43 MR MILDENHALL To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Youth Affairs for cutting funding to the Nunawading Youth Adult Bureau by \$16,000, resulting in reduced outreach services to youth in the Nunawading area at a time when charitable organisations in Nunawading are experiencing a 100% increase in demand for their services, and youth unemployment remains at disastrously high levels.
- 44 MR SERCOMBE To move, That this House condemns the Government for its education policies which have reduced the quality of education for children in the Monbulk electorate.
- MS GARBUTT To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Community Services for Government policies that have led to a 88% increase in fees from \$45 to \$115 per term at the Greenhills Pre-school, resulting in severe financial hardship for many parents with pre-school children in the Greensborough and Eltham communities.
- 46 MR ANDRIANOPOULOS To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Education for failing to provide quality education to students at Bendigo Senior Secondary College due directly to government policies that have resulted in stopping the construction of a library and new classrooms at the school.
- 47 MRS WILSON To move, That this House notes with concern that the Minister for Education has failed to ensure a quality education for children at Cranbourne West Primary School, due to massive increases in class sizes at this school.
- 48 MR PANDAZOPOULOS To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Education for denying children at the Cranbourne South Primary School a quality education due to massive increases in class sizes at the school.
- 49 DR COGHILL To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Employment and Industry for failing to introduce a job creation scheme for people in the Bendigo area as promised before the election where the Bendigo District share of Jobs created under the said scheme would be over 800, such jobs providing a much needed stimulus to the Bendigo economy at a time when 8,444 people were receiving unemployment benefits from Social Security offices in Bendigo and Kangaroo Flat in February, 1994 being 14.73% more than in February, 1993.
- MR HAMILTON To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Youth Affairs for cutting totally funding to the Barwon Youth Information Service which has resulted in less information reaching young people in the Barwon area who are in desperate need of advice and support.
- 51 MR MILDENHALL To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Community Services for his action in cutting funding to the Gisborne Kindergarten, which has placed a heavy financial burden on many parents in the Gisborne area whose pre-school fees have risen by \$450 per child.

- MR PANDAZOPOULOS To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Community Services for Government policies that have cut funding to the Ontos Pre-school, which has lead to an increase in fees from \$30 per term to \$130 per term, resulting in severe hardship being endured by families for pre-school children in the Buchan Community.
- MS GARBUTT To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Community Services for his failure to provide an affordable pre-school at Mordialloc where due to the Minister's policies there has been a massive 100% increase in fees at the Elenora Pre-school causing extreme financial hardship for parents of pre-school children in the Mordialloc area.
- MS MARPLE To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Community Services for his actions in cutting funding to kindergartens in Bendigo which has placed an extra financial burden on parents whose fees have doubled at the Bendigo Kindergarten in 1994.
- MR BATCHELOR To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Public Transport for his failure to provide an adequate frequency of tram services from the City to West Preston and Mont Albert which has resulted in long delays for customers, as evidenced by patrons on Victoria Parade waiting up to 17 minutes for trams to the City on the Mont Albert route during the morning peak-hour on Thursday 17 March and Friday 18 March, 1994.
- MR PANDAZOPOULOS To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Public Transport for failing to ensure that services operated by the National Bus Company on route No. 256 between the City and La Trobe University run on time, as evidenced by delays of more than an hour between services on the afternoon of Thursday March 17, 1994.
- 57 MS GARBUTT To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Health for her failure to ensure that all mothers and babies in Bayswater are guarantied a minimum of 5 days in maternity care if they need it following the birth of a child.
- MR ANDRIANOPOULOS To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Education for his failure to provide a second Government school V.C.E. facility in Bendigo despite a pre-election promise of the Government to have a second V.C.E. facility "for the start of 1993" and his subsequent failure to have the said facility operational at the commencement of the 1994 school year.
- 59 MR SANDON To move, That this House condemns the Government for its failure to ensure all children at the Le Page School in Cheltenham are guarantied a quality education due to massive increases in class sizes at the school.
- 60 MR MILDENHALL To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Community Services for ordering closed the only two reception facilities for emergency child abuse cases in the Western Suburbs, namely Buckland House and St Joseph's, in the face of his department's figures showing a 159% increase in child abuse notifications since the introduction of mandatory reporting.
- 61 MR THOMSON (Pascoe Vale) To move, That this House censures Mr Speaker for his failure to allow the Member for Sunshine and other Honourable Members to raise matters on the Adjournment Debate on Thursday 24 March 1994, in breach of the entitlements of Honourable Members provided for by the Sessional Orders.

- 62 MR COOPER To move, That this House censures the Honourable Member for Bundoora for attempting to use the abuse and death of Daniel Valerio to score cheap political points, and calls on the Honourable Member for Bundoora to apologise to this House, the family of Daniel Valerio and the Victorian Community for her inconsiderate and insensitive behaviour.
- 63 MR BATCHELOR To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Public Transport for reducing the size of the Bendigo Railway Workshops workforce from 270 in October, 1992 to under 180 causing job positions to be lost in Bendigo, notwithstanding pre-election comments by representatives of the current Government that the workforce would increase.
- 64 MR THWAITES To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Health for Government policies that have put mothers and babies in Boronia at risk due to their early release from hospital following childbirth.
- 65 MR MICALLEF To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Public Transport for his failure to ensure residents in Carrum Downs have access to adequate public transport in order to travel to their municipal base in Cranbourne.
- 66 MR MILDENHALL To move, That this House condemns the State Government for its failure to recognise the concerns of residents in Merinda Park regarding the Government's proposal for a Merinda Park Railway Station.
- 67 MS MARPLE To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Health for her failure to ensure that mothers and babies in Croydon are able to stay at least 5 days in maternity care following the birth of their child.
- MR COOPER To move, That this House notes the involvement of the Honourable Member for Thomastown, in his then role as State Secretary of the Australian Labor Party, to manipulate the result of the Nunawading Province re-election in 1985 and his subsequent refusal to co-operate with the police investigation of this scandal, and calls on the Honourable Member for Thomastown to disclose the full facts of his and other Australian Labor Party members involvement.
- 69 MS MARPLE To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Agriculture for his lack of commitment to unemployed people in Bendigo by failing to relocate the Department of Agriculture to Bendigo and thus provide 130 jobs in Bendigo as promised by the Government.
- MR ROWE To move, That this House commends the Minister for Education for responding to the education needs of the Botany Park/Skye community in that he has recognised the need for additional facilities in the provision of additional building to the value of \$180,000, and commenced the process for the future expansion and rebuilding of Skye Primary School.
- 71 MR ROWE To move, That this House commends the Minister for Education for responding to the education needs of the Cranbourne South Community by the provision of \$180,000 in a new building which had not been provided by the previous government.

- 72 MR ROWE To move, That this House commends the Minister for Education for responding to the education needs of the Cranbourne community in addressing the urgent need for \$100,000 of maintenance works at the Lyndhurst Secondary College being part of the black hole backlog of maintenance totalling millions of dollars left by the previous Labor government.
- 73 MRS WILSON To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Local Government for the lack of input residents of the Borough of Eaglehawk have had into the proposed Local Government restructure, despite the fact that 70% of residents in Eaglehawk voted in the poll on the proposal and over 90% voted against amalgamation.
- MR PANDAZOPOULOS To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Local Government for his failure to take account of the overwhelming 70% vote by the Bendigo community against council amalgamations on 29 January 1994 and forcing amalgamation of the five municipalities in the Bendigo area.
- MR LEIGHTON To move, That this House condemns the Member for Ivanhoe, the Honourable Vin Heffernan, for his failure to honour his commitment that the Liberal Government would restore full disadvantaged school program funding to schools in his electorate such as West Heidelberg Primary School and his advice to a parent of that school that there are no votes in West Heidelberg.
- 76 MR THWAITES To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Health for her failure to ensure that mothers and babies in Knox are able to stay at least 5 days in maternity care following the birth of their child thus placing at risk the health and future well-being of these mothers and babies.
- 77 MR THWAITES To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Health for her failure to ensure that mothers and babies in Ringwood are able to stay at least 5 days in maternity care following the birth of their child to ensure that the health and future well being of the mother and baby is not at risk.
- MR COOPER To move, That this House calls on all members of the Opposition to disassociate themselves from the actions of the Honourable Member for Thomastown who, in his then role as State Secretary of the Australian Labor Party, orchestrated a campaign to mislead and defraud voters in the re-election for the Nunawading Province in 1985, and requests that all Opposition members publicly support the demand that the Honourable Member for Thomastown disclose to the House all of the facts relating to his involvement in this scandal.
- MS GARBUTT To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Community Services for failing to guarantee to parents in Ringwood an affordable and quality respite service for those children who have a disability.
- 80 MS GARBUTT To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Community Services for failing to guarantee to parents in Blackburn access to an affordable and quality respite service for children with a disability resulting in considerable financial hardship for these parents.
- 81 MR HAERMEYER To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Police and Emergency Services for failing to provide sufficient funds to enable the Victorian Police to properly service the municipalities of Knox, Ringwood, Croydon, Sherbrooke, Healesville, Lilydale and Upper Yarra, particularly noting that the

- local community is being asked to foot the bill for a \$120,000 police caravan to adequately serve the very obvious policing needs of these communities.
- MR HAERMEYER To move, That this House condemns the Member for Bayswater for failing to represent the interests of his constituents and to live up to his promise to "provide the Victorian Police with the resources it needs to protect the community", noting: (a) The member's failure to stand up for his community when his Government cancelled the contract to provide a new police station for Bayswater; and (b) The member's failure to act on behalf of the local community in response to demands that the local community foot the bill for a \$120,000 mobile police caravan that the community urgently needs.
- MR DOLLIS To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Planning for not consulting with Eltham residents or allowing them direct input into the Government's decision whether to allow 24 hour trading in residential areas, thereby further lessening the rights of Eltham residents to participate in planning issues which will affect their amenities and living conditions, as well as altering the nature of their neighbourhoods.
- MR LONEY To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Sport, Recreation and Racing for his lack of commitment to ensure that people with an intellectual disability have access to appropriate sport and recreation activities as shown by the total defunding of the Victorian Sport and Recreation Association of Persons with an Intellectual Disability leaving people with an intellectual disability without a voice and a means to ensure that sport and recreation is available to all.
- MR BATCHELOR To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Public Transport for failing to provide an adequate level of public transport services over the Easter Holiday period as evidenced by customers being required to wait more than 45 minutes for a city-bound tram on the East Malvern route on the morning of Monday, April 4 1994.
- MR THOMSON (Pascoe Vale) To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Public Transport for his failure to ensure an adequate level of service for PTC customers who use the Broadmeadows railway line, as evidenced by the events of March 29, 1994 in relation to the 7.33 a.m. service from the City, when passengers were told when the train arrived at Essendon Station to board a bus for the rest of the trip, but passengers waiting at unstaffed stations further down the line were not told the train was not coming and had been replaced by a bus, and were left waiting on train platforms.
- 87 MR THWAITES To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Health for placing at risk the health of mothers and babies in Mitcham as a result of their early discharge from hospital following childbirth.
- 88 MS GARBUTT To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Health for her failure to ensure that mothers and babies in Oakleigh South are able to stay at least five days in maternity care following the birth of their baby thus placing at risk the health and future well being of these Oakleigh South mothers and babies.
- 89 MR LEIGH To move, That this House condemns the Member for Springvale for his involvement in the previous Labor Government's decision to purchase a tip in Springvale South which is now owned by the Ministry of Planning and Development but which had been owned by Waverley Council and managed by

Springvale Council and further condemns the Member for his involvement in ensuring that Victorian taxpayers would be responsible for the costs of containing and cleaning up the pollution caused by the Council's disgraceful management practices.

- 90 MR LEIGH To move, That this House calls on the Leader of the Opposition to sack his political adviser Mr P Reed, the Mayor of Springvale, for his attempts to pump polluted tip waters into Melbourne Water's Braeside Park thereby putting the park at risk.
- 91 MR HAERMEYER To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Health for her failure to ensure that mothers and babies in Knoxfield are able to stay at least five days in maternity care following the birth of their baby thus placing at risk the health and future well being of these Knoxfield mothers and babies.
- 92 MR SANDON To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Education for his cuts to education funding at the Richmond West Primary School that have resulted in the loss of 9.5 teachers, an 18% increase in average class sizes, a 50% reduction in specialist programs, a 50% cut in reading recovery program and reduced professional development and program evaluation.
- 93 MR LEIGHTON To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Community Services for closure of cottage homes which has led to an increased demand for foster places in Blackburn, without also addressing the need for an increase in reimbursement rates for potential foster parents in the Blackburn area, described by the Children's Welfare Association of Victoria as being totally inadequate, thus leaving children without permanent placement.
- 94 MS GARBUTT To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Community Services for budget cuts which have seen services to physically and intellectually disabled people severely reduced at Kew Cottages, with recreation programs cut by more than half and the staff-client ratio falling to dangerous levels with plans for more reductions, resulting in poor staff morale and increased trauma and stress for long suffering parents at Kew Cottages.
- 95 MR PANDAZOPOULOS To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Community Services for his Government policies that have led to a massive 100% increase in fees at the All Saints Pre-School which has denied children from migrant and low income families in the Nunawading area access to pre-school.
- 96 MR LEIGHTON To move, That this House refers to the Privileges Committee for examination and report the matter of whether the Minister for Industry and Employment, the Honourable Phillip Gude, has committed a contempt in that he deliberately misled the House in that -
  - In a question without notice on 31 March 1994 the Leader of the Opposition referred the Minister to a briefing to heads of statutory authorities at which Mr Ian Douglas, QC outlined the State Government's position on changes to the Federal Industrial Relations Act;
  - In answer the Minister for Industry and Employment stated in part that the meeting was not to provide a briefing on changes to the Federal Industrial Legislation nor was any reference made to any major changes to the Federal Industrial Relations Act;

- The agenda of the briefing to statutory authority heads which shows under item 2 "Employee Relations Minister for Industry and Employment" at 2(ii) "The Federal Legislation Implications and Options Ian Douglas";
- Notes of the briefing to statutory authority heads of 15 March 1994 made available to the State Opposition which record the briefing given by Ian Douglas, QC on the Federal Legislation; and
- The response by the Minister for Industry and Employment on the adjournment debate of 31 March 1994 to the matter raised by the Member for Preston, where the Minister failed to alter the substance of his earlier response to the Leader of the Opposition.
- 97 MR THOMSON (Pascoe Vale) To move, That this House notes with concern that the Government has spent more money on advertising campaigns and self-promotion involving the Minister for Industry and Employment than it plans to spend on assistance for the Snow Brand Pty Ltd, milk products company in its investment in a new plant at Tatura.
- 98 MRS WILSON To move, That this House congratulates Vizy Board's \$50 million expansion of a Cardboard Box Factory at Dandenong which will create new jobs for people living in Dandenong, one of the hardest hit areas by unemployment.
- 99 MR LONEY To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Education for cuts in education funding which have led to reduced learning opportunities for students in Geelong North and a wastage of library resources in primary schools in Geelong North.
- 100 MR BATCHELOR To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Public Transport for his failure to provide adequate rail service to country Victoria over the Easter holiday period as evidenced by the poor level of service on the Melbourne-Swan Hill train including on the 1.30 p.m. service from Swan Hill on April 4th the air conditioning was not working properly so that it was extremely hot in passenger carriages and passengers were repeatedly told en route that the train would not stop at Sunshine, however it did, resulting in needless inconvenience for many passengers who had been led to believe that their only alternative was to disembark at St Albans or Spencer Street.
- 101 MR ANDRIANOPOULOS To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Health for not addressing the urgent need for more funds to be made available for child and adolescent psychiatric services at the Maroondah Hospital Psychiatric Unit which has resulted in a 9 month waiting period for patients causing untold strain and risk on families in the outer east.
- 102 MS GARBUTT To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Community Services for his failure to provide to parents in Frankston access to an affordable and quality facility-based respite service for their children who have a disability thus placing financial pressures on these Frankston families.
- MR BATCHELOR To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Public Transport for failing to ensure the co-ordination of rail and bus services in the Watsonia area, as evidenced by local buses that stop at the Watsonia railway station not meeting trains arriving at the station, and drivers refusing to wait for disembarking passengers who wish to catch the bus.

- 104 MS MARPLE To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Community Services for his policies that have led to massive increases in fees at the Merinda Park Pre-school and that have left children at the pre-school without milk or excursions.
- MR HAMILTON To move, That the Minister for Youth Affairs be condemned for failing to ensure that at least one Koori Youth Organisation was funded through the office of Youth Affairs Grants Program and given that currently two Koori Youth Programs have been de-funded, the Minister is further condemned for his discrimination against the most needy youth in our community.
- MR DOLLIS To move, That this House condemns the State Government for its failure to ensure the completion of beach restoration works at McCrae and notes that without immediate action the future of the Rosebud Lifesaving Club is at risk and a long standing tradition of service to the Southern Peninsular community may end.
- MR SANDON To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Education for cuts to education funding that has reduced the allocation of L.O.T.E. staffing from 3 to 2 at Abbotsford Primary School and has put at risk one of the leading school language programs in Victoria and thereby reducing educational opportunities to families in Abbotsford.
- 108 MR MILDENHALL To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Local Government for misleading residents of Prahran and part of Malvern in comments that amalgamation would result in cuts in rates for Prahran and Malvern residents when in fact a meeting of councillors of the City of Prahran on the 18th of April indicated that the rate reductions promised will not be achievable.

- MR LEIGH To move, That this House condemns the Leader of the Opposition Mr J Brumby and Members of the Opposition for their failure to disassociate themselves from the activities of the Member for Clayton in his failure to repay in adequate time monies that he owed the Ministry of Education.
- DR COGHILL To move, That this House expresses the opinion that there is prima facie evidence of a contempt of the Parliament by the Honourable the Leader of the House in that he failed to make available for inspection all correspondence and other documents created since 26 October 1992, relating to any aspect of the review or reform of the structure, functioning, Standing Orders, procedures, practices or administration of the Legislative Assembly, the Legislative Council or the Parliament in any other respect including the rights and entitlements of Members received by him or sent by him or on his authority to the Speaker of the Legislative Assembly and the President of the Legislative Council either individually or jointly or any Officer or Officers of the Parliament, and all documents held by him relating to meetings, telephone conversations or other forms of communication or discussion in respect of the above matters in which he participated or which were held on his authority in response to Question No. 8 and that the matter be referred to the Privileges Committee for inquiry and report.
- 28 MR THOMSON (Pascoe Vale) To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Community Services for his action in cutting funding to the Dr Stanley Cochrane Pre-school in Mitcham, which has placed a heavy financial burden on many parents whose pre-school fees have risen from \$180 per year to \$480 per year.
- 29 MR MICALLEF To move, That this House condemns the State Government for its continued failure to adequately secure the former Joseph Banks Secondary College site at Doveton, showing a disregard for the safety of local residents, allowing them to walk unhindered into an asbestos contaminated area and leaving a damage bill estimated at over \$60,000 some of which is to facilities which are to be retained by the community.

- 30 MR HAERMEYER To move, That this House notes with concern that as a result of Government policies fees at the Mordialloc Kindergarten have increased from \$50 per term in 1993 to \$110 per term in 1994, with parents expected to pay an additional \$30 levy for excursions, and consequently, enrolments at this kindergarten have decreased from 50 in 1993 to 30 in 1994 and this House urges the Minister to implement policies to ensure affordable and quality pre-schools are available to all families in the Mordialloc area.
- 31 MS GARBUTT To move, That this House notes with concern that on average preschool fees on the Mornington Peninsular have doubled this year from \$49 to \$99 and further evidence suggests that at least 44 children have been excluded this year because parents cannot pay fees, 15 children have moved to day care as they can obtain fee relief, 20 children are on waiting lists due to reduced sessions and groups lost.
- 32 MS GARBUTT To move, That this House expresses its concerns at the failure of the Minister for Community Services to guarantee that all families living in Blackburn are able to afford to have their children attend pre-school, including those 15% of children who have not enroled this year due to massive increase of 140% in preschool fees at Blackburn North Pre-school.
- 33 MS MARPLE To move, That this House notes with concern the failure of the State Government to require an environmental effects statement for the proposed redevelopment of the Crib Point Oil Facility despite the companies involved indicating that works will not proceed during 1994.
- 34 MRS WILSON To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Fair Trading for her Government's actions in eroding the resources available to consumers for information and protection, through the closure of the regional offices of the Office of Fair Trading in Ringwood and Dandenong, thus making it difficult for people living in the outer suburbs to access these services.
- 35 MR SEITZ To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Community Services for Government policies which have lead to an increase of kindergarten fees at Indra Pre-school in Blackburn South from \$180 to \$500 a year, resulting in severe hardships being endured by families of Pre-school children in the Blackburn area.
- 36 MR HAMILTON To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Public Transport for the appalling level of service for commuters travelling to Bairnsdale via Sale, since the abolition of the Rail Service between Bairnsdale and Sale, including the lack of shelter and passenger amenities at Bairnsdale and inconvenience caused by long delays in bus and train connections.
- 37 MR ANDRIANOPOULOS To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Public Transport for the premature introduction of driver only trains on the Alamein line, which because of 'blind spots' created by the design of station platforms along this line, has resulted in passengers being placed in great danger when boarding and alighting from trains, due to the inability of drivers to clearly see whether passengers are clear of the train before departing.
- 38 MR THOMSON (Pascoe Vale) To move, That this House condemns the Government for its massive increases in class sizes at Antonio Park Primary School which have led to a reduced quality of education at that school.

- 39 MR DOLLIS To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Planning for his intervention in the Knox Council decision regarding a proposed Fast Food Restaurant in Rowville as yet another example of this Government's overriding of Local Government Planning Schemes and decisions, thereby undermining the role of Local Government and showing complete disregard for the rights and wishes of Knox residents.
- 40 MR HAERMEYER To move, That this House condemns the Minister for School Education for Government Education Policies which have lead to massive increases in class sizes at Antonio Park Primary School whilst teaching staff numbers have been significantly reduced, resulting in dislocation of students and the inability of staff to provide the optimum level of quality education that Antonio Park Primary students so richly deserve.
- 41 MS MARPLE To move, That the House condemns the Minister for Community Services for his failure to provide an affordable pre-school at Croydon Central where due to the Minister's policies there has been a massive 88% increase in fees from \$160 in 1993 to \$300 in 1994.
- 42 MR SHEEHAN To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Education who, with the support of the Member for Mordialloc, has implemented policies which have resulted in the loss of 20 teaching positions from schools in the Mordialloc Electorate, while enrolments have increased by in excess of 60.
- 43 MR MILDENHALL To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Youth Affairs for cutting funding to the Nunawading Youth Adult Bureau by \$16,000, resulting in reduced outreach services to youth in the Nunawading area at a time when charitable organisations in Nunawading are experiencing a 100% increase in demand for their services, and youth unemployment remains at disastrously high levels.
- 44 MR SERCOMBE To move, That this House condemns the Government for its education policies which have reduced the quality of education for children in the Monbulk electorate.
- 45 MS GARBUTT To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Community Services for Government policies that have led to a 88% increase in fees from \$45 to \$115 per term at the Greenhills Pre-school, resulting in severe financial hardship for many parents with pre-school children in the Greensborough and Eltham communities.
- 46 MR ANDRIANOPOULOS To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Education for failing to provide quality education to students at Bendigo Senior Secondary College due directly to government policies that have resulted in stopping the construction of a library and new classrooms at the school.
- 47 MRS WILSON To move, That this House notes with concern that the Minister for Education has failed to ensure a quality education for children at Cranbourne West Primary School, due to massive increases in class sizes at this school.
- 48 MR PANDAZOPOULOS To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Education for denying children at the Cranbourne South Primary School a quality education due to massive increases in class sizes at the school.

- 49 DR COGHILL To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Employment and Industry for failing to introduce a job creation scheme for people in the Bendigo area as promised before the election where the Bendigo District share of Jobs created under the said scheme would be over 800, such jobs providing a much needed stimulus to the Bendigo economy at a time when 8,444 people were receiving unemployment benefits from Social Security offices in Bendigo and Kangaroo Flat in February, 1994 being 14.73% more than in February, 1993.
- MR HAMILTON To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Youth Affairs for cutting totally funding to the Barwon Youth Information Service which has resulted in less information reaching young people in the Barwon area who are in desperate need of advice and support.
- 51 MR MILDENHALL To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Community Services for his action in cutting funding to the Gisborne Kindergarten, which has placed a heavy financial burden on many parents in the Gisborne area whose pre-school fees have risen by \$450 per child.
- 52 MR PANDAZOPOULOS To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Community Services for Government policies that have cut funding to the Ontos Pre-school, which has lead to an increase in fees from \$30 per term to \$130 per term, resulting in severe hardship being endured by families for pre-school children in the Buchan Community.
- MS GARBUTT To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Community Services for his failure to provide an affordable pre-school at Mordialloc where due to the Minister's policies there has been a massive 100% increase in fees at the Elenora Pre-school causing extreme financial hardship for parents of pre-school children in the Mordialloc area.
- MS MARPLE To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Community Services for his actions in cutting funding to kindergartens in Bendigo which has placed an extra financial burden on parents whose fees have doubled at the Bendigo Kindergarten in 1994.
- MR BATCHELOR To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Public Transport for his failure to provide an adequate frequency of tram services from the City to West Preston and Mont Albert which has resulted in long delays for customers, as evidenced by patrons on Victoria Parade waiting up to 17 minutes for trams to the City on the Mont Albert route during the morning peak-hour on Thursday 17 March and Friday 18 March, 1994.
- MR PANDAZOPOULOS To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Public Transport for failing to ensure that services operated by the National Bus Company on route No. 256 between the City and La Trobe University run on time, as evidenced by delays of more than an hour between services on the afternoon of Thursday March 17, 1994.
- 57 MS GARBUTT To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Health for her failure to ensure that all mothers and babies in Bayswater are guarantied a minimum of 5 days in maternity care if they need it following the birth of a child.

- MR ANDRIANOPOULOS To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Education for his failure to provide a second Government school V.C.E. facility in Bendigo despite a pre-election promise of the Government to have a second V.C.E. facility "for the start of 1993" and his subsequent failure to have the said facility operational at the commencement of the 1994 school year.
- 59 MR SANDON To move, That this House condemns the Government for its failure to ensure all children at the Le Page School in Cheltenham are guarantied a quality education due to massive increases in class sizes at the school.
- 60 MR MILDENHALL To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Community Services for ordering closed the only two reception facilities for emergency child abuse cases in the Western Suburbs, namely Buckland House and St Joseph's, in the face of his department's figures showing a 159% increase in child abuse notifications since the introduction of mandatory reporting.
- 61 MR THOMSON (Pascoe Vale) To move, That this House censures Mr Speaker for his failure to allow the Member for Sunshine and other Honourable Members to raise matters on the Adjournment Debate on Thursday 24 March 1994, in breach of the entitlements of Honourable Members provided for by the Sessional Orders.
- 62 MR COOPER To move, That this House censures the Honourable Member for Bundoora for attempting to use the abuse and death of Daniel Valerio to score cheap political points, and calls on the Honourable Member for Bundoora to apologise to this House, the family of Daniel Valerio and the Victorian Community for her inconsiderate and insensitive behaviour.
- 63 MR BATCHELOR To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Public Transport for reducing the size of the Bendigo Railway Workshops workforce from 270 in October, 1992 to under 180 causing job positions to be lost in Bendigo, notwithstanding pre-election comments by representatives of the current Government that the workforce would increase.
- 64 MR THWAITES To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Health for Government policies that have put mothers and babies in Boronia at risk due to their early release from hospital following childbirth.
- 65 MR MICALLEF To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Public Transport for his failure to ensure residents in Carrum Downs have access to adequate public transport in order to travel to their municipal base in Cranbourne.
- 66 MR MILDENHALL To move, That this House condemns the State Government for its failure to recognise the concerns of residents in Merinda Park regarding the Government's proposal for a Merinda Park Railway Station.
- 67 MS MARPLE To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Health for her failure to ensure that mothers and babies in Croydon are able to stay at least 5 days in maternity care following the birth of their child.

- MR COOPER To move, That this House notes the involvement of the Honourable Member for Thomastown, in his then role as State Secretary of the Australian Labor Party, to manipulate the result of the Nunawading Province re-election in 1985 and his subsequent refusal to co-operate with the police investigation of this scandal, and calls on the Honourable Member for Thomastown to disclose the full facts of his and other Australian Labor Party members involvement.
- 69 MS MARPLE To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Agriculture for his lack of commitment to unemployed people in Bendigo by failing to relocate the Department of Agriculture to Bendigo and thus provide 130 jobs in Bendigo as promised by the Government.
- 70 MR ROWE To move, That this House commends the Minister for Education for responding to the education needs of the Botany Park/Skye community in that he has recognised the need for additional facilities in the provision of additional building to the value of \$180,000, and commenced the process for the future expansion and rebuilding of Skye Primary School.
- 71 MR ROWE To move, That this House commends the Minister for Education for responding to the education needs of the Cranbourne South Community by the provision of \$180,000 in a new building which had not been provided by the previous government.
- 72 MR ROWE To move, That this House commends the Minister for Education for responding to the education needs of the Cranbourne community in addressing the urgent need for \$100,000 of maintenance works at the Lyndhurst Secondary College being part of the black hole backlog of maintenance totalling millions of dollars left by the previous Labor government.
- 73 MRS WILSON To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Local Government for the lack of input residents of the Borough of Eaglehawk have had into the proposed Local Government restructure, despite the fact that 70% of residents in Eaglehawk voted in the poll on the proposal and over 90% voted against amalgamation.
- 74 MR PANDAZOPOULOS To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Local Government for his failure to take account of the overwhelming 70% vote by the Bendigo community against council amalgamations on 29 January 1994 and forcing amalgamation of the five municipalities in the Bendigo area.
- 75 MR LEIGHTON To move, That this House condemns the Member for Ivanhoe, the Honourable Vin Heffernan, for his failure to honour his commitment that the Liberal Government would restore full disadvantaged school program funding to schools in his electorate such as West Heidelberg Primary School and his advice to a parent of that school that there are no votes in West Heidelberg.
- 76 MR THWAITES To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Health for her failure to ensure that mothers and babies in Knox are able to stay at least 5 days in maternity care following the birth of their child thus placing at risk the health and future well-being of these mothers and babies.

- MR THWAITES To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Health for her failure to ensure that mothers and babies in Ringwood are able to stay at least 5 days in maternity care following the birth of their child to ensure that the health and future well being of the mother and baby is not at risk.
- MR COOPER To move, That this House calls on all members of the Opposition to disassociate themselves from the actions of the Honourable Member for Thomastown who, in his then role as State Secretary of the Australian Labor Party, orchestrated a campaign to mislead and defraud voters in the re-election for the Nunawading Province in 1985, and requests that all Opposition members publicly support the demand that the Honourable Member for Thomastown disclose to the House all of the facts relating to his involvement in this scandal.
- 79 MS GARBUTT To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Community Services for failing to guarantee to parents in Ringwood an affordable and quality respite service for those children who have a disability.
- 80 MS GARBUTT To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Community Services for failing to guarantee to parents in Blackburn access to an affordable and quality respite service for children with a disability resulting in considerable financial hardship for these parents.
- MR HAERMEYER To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Police and Emergency Services for failing to provide sufficient funds to enable the Victorian Police to properly service the municipalities of Knox, Ringwood, Croydon, Sherbrooke, Healesville, Lilydale and Upper Yarra, particularly noting that the local community is being asked to foot the bill for a \$120,000 police caravan to adequately serve the very obvious policing needs of these communities.
- MR HAERMEYER To move, That this House condemns the Member for Bayswater for failing to represent the interests of his constituents and to live up to his promise to "provide the Victorian Police with the resources it needs to protect the community", noting: (a) The member's failure to stand up for his community when his Government cancelled the contract to provide a new police station for Bayswater; and (b) The member's failure to act on behalf of the local community in response to demands that the local community foot the bill for a \$120,000 mobile police caravan that the community urgently needs.
- MR DOLLIS To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Planning for not consulting with Eltham residents or allowing them direct input into the Government's decision whether to allow 24 hour trading in residential areas, thereby further lessening the rights of Eltham residents to participate in planning issues which will affect their amenities and living conditions, as well as altering the nature of their neighbourhoods.
- MR LONEY To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Sport, Recreation and Racing for his lack of commitment to ensure that people with an intellectual disability have access to appropriate sport and recreation activities as shown by the total defunding of the Victorian Sport and Recreation Association of Persons with an Intellectual Disability leaving people with an intellectual disability without a voice and a means to ensure that sport and recreation is available to all.

- MR BATCHELOR To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Public Transport for failing to provide an adequate level of public transport services over the Easter Holiday period as evidenced by customers being required to wait more than 45 minutes for a city-bound tram on the East Malvern route on the morning of Monday, April 4 1994.
- MR THOMSON (Pascoe Vale) To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Public Transport for his failure to ensure an adequate level of service for PTC customers who use the Broadmeadows railway line, as evidenced by the events of March 29, 1994 in relation to the 7.33 a.m. service from the City, when passengers were told when the train arrived at Essendon Station to board a bus for the rest of the trip, but passengers waiting at unstaffed stations further down the line were not told the train was not coming and had been replaced by a bus, and were left waiting on train platforms.
- 87 MR THWAITES To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Health for placing at risk the health of mothers and babies in Mitcham as a result of their early discharge from hospital following childbirth.
- 88 MS GARBUTT To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Health for her failure to ensure that mothers and babies in Oakleigh South are able to stay at least five days in maternity care following the birth of their baby thus placing at risk the health and future well being of these Oakleigh South mothers and babies.
- MR LEIGH To move, That this House condemns the Member for Springvale for his involvement in the previous Labor Government's decision to purchase a tip in Springvale South which is now owned by the Ministry of Planning and Development but which had been owned by Waverley Council and managed by Springvale Council and further condemns the Member for his involvement in ensuring that Victorian taxpayers would be responsible for the costs of containing and cleaning up the pollution caused by the Council's disgraceful management practices.
- 90 MR LEIGH To move, That this House calls on the Leader of the Opposition to sack his political adviser Mr P Reed, the Mayor of Springvale, for his attempts to pump polluted tip waters into Melbourne Water's Braeside Park thereby putting the park at risk.
- 91 MR HAERMEYER To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Health for her failure to ensure that mothers and babies in Knoxfield are able to stay at least five days in maternity care following the birth of their baby thus placing at risk the health and future well being of these Knoxfield mothers and babies.
- 92 MR SANDON To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Education for his cuts to education funding at the Richmond West Primary School that have resulted in the loss of 9.5 teachers, an 18% increase in average class sizes, a 50% reduction in specialist programs, a 50% cut in reading recovery program and reduced professional development and program evaluation.

- 93 MR LEIGHTON To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Community Services for closure of cottage homes which has led to an increased demand for foster places in Blackburn, without also addressing the need for an increase in reimbursement rates for potential foster parents in the Blackburn area, described by the Children's Welfare Association of Victoria as being totally inadequate, thus leaving children without permanent placement.
- 94 MS GARBUTT To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Community Services for budget cuts which have seen services to physically and intellectually disabled people severely reduced at Kew Cottages, with recreation programs cut by more than half and the staff-client ratio falling to dangerous levels with plans for more reductions, resulting in poor staff morale and increased trauma and stress for long suffering parents at Kew Cottages.
- 95 MR PANDAZOPOULOS To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Community Services for his Government policies that have led to a massive 100% increase in fees at the All Saints Pre-School which has denied children from migrant and low income families in the Nunawading area access to pre-school.
- 96 MR LEIGHTON To move, That this House refers to the Privileges Committee for examination and report the matter of whether the Minister for Industry and Employment, the Honourable Phillip Gude, has committed a contempt in that he deliberately misled the House in that -
  - In a question without notice on 31 March 1994 the Leader of the Opposition referred the Minister to a briefing to heads of statutory authorities at which Mr Ian Douglas, QC outlined the State Government's position on changes to the Federal Industrial Relations Act:
  - In answer the Minister for Industry and Employment stated in part that the meeting was not to provide a briefing on changes to the Federal Industrial Legislation nor was any reference made to any major changes to the Federal Industrial Relations Act:
  - The agenda of the briefing to statutory authority heads which shows under item 2 "Employee Relations Minister for Industry and Employment" at 2(ii) "The Federal Legislation Implications and Options Ian Douglas";
  - Notes of the briefing to statutory authority heads of 15 March 1994 made available to the State Opposition which record the briefing given by Ian Douglas, QC on the Federal Legislation; and
  - The response by the Minister for Industry and Employment on the adjournment debate of 31 March 1994 to the matter raised by the Member for Preston, where the Minister failed to alter the substance of his earlier response to the Leader of the Opposition.
- 97 MR THOMSON (Pascoe Vale) To move, That this House notes with concern that the Government has spent more money on advertising campaigns and self-promotion involving the Minister for Industry and Employment than it plans to spend on assistance for the Snow Brand Pty Ltd, milk products company in its investment in a new plant at Tatura.
- 98 MRS WILSON To move, That this House congratulates Vizy Board's \$50 million expansion of a Cardboard Box Factory at Dandenong which will create new jobs for people living in Dandenong, one of the hardest hit areas by unemployment.

- 99 MR LONEY To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Education for cuts in education funding which have led to reduced learning opportunities for students in Geelong North and a wastage of library resources in primary schools in Geelong North.
- 100 MR BATCHELOR To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Public Transport for his failure to provide adequate rail service to country Victoria over the Easter holiday period as evidenced by the poor level of service on the Melbourne-Swan Hill train including on the 1.30 p.m. service from Swan Hill on April 4th the air conditioning was not working properly so that it was extremely hot in passenger carriages and passengers were repeatedly told en route that the train would not stop at Sunshine, however it did, resulting in needless inconvenience for many passengers who had been led to believe that their only alternative was to disembark at St Albans or Spencer Street.
- 101 MR ANDRIANOPOULOS To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Health for not addressing the urgent need for more funds to be made available for child and adolescent psychiatric services at the Maroondah Hospital Psychiatric Unit which has resulted in a 9 month waiting period for patients causing untold strain and risk on families in the outer east.
- 102 MS GARBUTT To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Community Services for his failure to provide to parents in Frankston access to an affordable and quality facility-based respite service for their children who have a disability thus placing financial pressures on these Frankston families.
- 103 MR BATCHELOR To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Public Transport for failing to ensure the co-ordination of rail and bus services in the Watsonia area, as evidenced by local buses that stop at the Watsonia railway station not meeting trains arriving at the station, and drivers refusing to wait for disembarking passengers who wish to catch the bus.
- MS MARPLE To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Community Services for his policies that have led to massive increases in fees at the Merinda Park Pre-school and that have left children at the pre-school without milk or excursions.
- 105 MR HAMILTON To move, That the Minister for Youth Affairs be condemned for failing to ensure that at least one Koori Youth Organisation was funded through the office of Youth Affairs Grants Program and given that currently two Koori Youth Programs have been de-funded, the Minister is further condemned for his discrimination against the most needy youth in our community.
- MR DOLLIS To move, That this House condemns the State Government for its failure to ensure the completion of beach restoration works at McCrae and notes that without immediate action the future of the Rosebud Lifesaving Club is at risk and a long standing tradition of service to the Southern Peninsular community may end.
- 107 MR SANDON To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Education for cuts to education funding that has reduced the allocation of L.O.T.E. staffing from 3 to 2 at Abbotsford Primary School and has put at risk one of the leading school language programs in Victoria and thereby reducing educational opportunities to families in Abbotsford.

- 108 MR MILDENHALL To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Local Government for misleading residents of Prahran and part of Malvern in comments that amalgamation would result in cuts in rates for Prahran and Malvern residents when in fact a meeting of councillors of the City of Prahran on the 18th of April indicated that the rate reductions promised will not be achievable.
- 109 MS MARPLE To move, That this House condemns the Minister for Community Services for failing to guarantee to parents caring for a child with a disability in Croydon access to an affordable facility based respite service which has resulted in severe financial hardship for parents in the Croydon area.
- 110 MR LEIGHTON To move, That this House in noting the outspoken comments in May 1992 by the Member for Ivanhoe, the Honourable Vin Heffernan MP, in support of continued state ownership of the historic Banyule Homestead in his Ivanhoe Electorate, including his statement that the people would have the final say at the next election, now condemns the Member for Ivanhoe for supporting the Government sale of the Banyule Homestead.
