

### TUESDAY, 15TH FEBRUARY 1870.

1. Assembly met pursuant to Proclamation of His Excellency the Governor bearing date the 25th day of January 1870, which Proclamation was read by the Clerk, and is as follows:-

### THE THIRD SESSION OF THE SIXTH PARLIAMENT OF VICTORIA.

#### PROCLAMATION

By His Excellency the Right Honorable John Henry Thomas Viscount Canterbury, of the City of Canterbury in the County of Kent, and Baron Bottesford, of Bottesford in the County of Leicester, in the Peerage of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland, Knight Commander of the Most Honorable Order of the Bath, Governor and Commander-in-Chief in and over the Colony of Victoria, &c., &c.

Whereas by The Constitution Act it is amongst other things enacted that it shall be lawful for the Governor to fix such places within Victoria, and, subject to the limitations therein contained, such times for holding the first and every other Session of the Council and Assembly, and to vary and alter the same respectively in such manner as he may think fit; and also from time to time to prorogue the said Council and Assembly, and to dissolve the said Assembly, by Proclamation or otherwise, whenever he shall deem it expedient: And whereas the said Legislative Council and Legislative Assembly, called "The Parliament of Victoria," now stand prorogued until Friday the twenty-eighth day of January instant, and it is expedient to fix the time for holding the next Session thereof: Now therefore I, the Governor of Victoria, in exercise of the power conferred by the said Act, do by this my Proclamation further prorogue the said Parliament of Victoria from Friday the twenty-eighth day of January instant until Tuesday the fifteenth day of February now next ensuing; and further, I do hereby fix Tuesday, the fifteenth day of February aforesaid as the time for the commencement and holding of the next Session of the said Council and Assembly, called the Parliament of Victoria, for the despatch of business, at Two of the clock in the afternoon, in the Parliament Whereas by The Constitution Act it is amongst other things enacted that it shall be lawful for the ment of Victoria, for the despatch of business, at Two of the clock in the afternoon, in the Parliament Houses, situate in Parliament place, Spring street, in the City of Melbourne; and the Honorable the Members of the Legislative Council and the Members of the Legislative Assembly are hereby required to give their attendance at the said time and place accordingly.

Given under my Hand and Seal of the Colony, at Melbourne, this twenty-fifth day of January in the year of our Lord One thousand eight hundred and seventy, and in the thirty-third year of Her Majesty's reign.

7. IMPOUNDING LAW AMENDMENT BILL .- Mr. MacPherson moved, That he have leave to bring in a Bill to amend an Act to consolidate the law relating to the impounding of cattle.

Ordered—That Mr. MacPherson do prepare and bring in the Bill.

Mr. MacPherson then brought up a Bill, intituled, "A Bill to amend an Act to consolidate the Law relating to the Impounding of Cattle," and moved that it be now read a first time.

Question—put and resolved in the affirmative.—Bill read a first time, ordered to be printed, and read a second time on Tuesday, 22nd February instant.

8. GOVERNOR'S SPEECH.—Mr. Speaker reported that the House had this day attended his Excellency the Governor in the Legislative Council, when His Excellency was pleased to make a speech to both Houses of Parliament (of which, to prevent mistakes, he had obtained a copy), which he read to the House, and is as follows:

Mr. President and Honorable Gentlemen of the Legislative Council:

Mr. Speaker and Gentlemen of the Legislative Assembly:

The financial requirements of the Public Service have rendered it necessary for me to call you together after an unusually short recess.

Mr. Speaker and Gentlemen of the Legislative Assembly:

The Estimates which will be submitted to you, while framed with a due regard to economy, make large provision for public works, the construction of which cannot be further delayed without serious inconvenience.

MR. PRESIDENT AND HONORABLE GENTLEMEN OF THE LEGISLATIVE COUNCIL:

MR. SPEAKER AND GENTLEMEN OF THE LEGISLATIVE ASSEMBLY:

The tenders for the Mail Service and the conveyance of passengers viâ the Cape of Good Hope have been fully considered by my Advisers, but they are unable to recommend the acceptance of any of them.

New Immigration Regulations have been prepared and will be laid before you, which will,

A Bill will also be laid before you for the purpose of providing for the Inspection of Mines, intended to secure greater precaution in mining operations, and thus prevent the frequent occurrence of serious and fatal accidents.

A Bill to give to workmen a lien over the work executed by them, and a Bill regulating the number of hours of labor to be exacted from young persons employed in factories, will be submitted

A Bill will be introduced, based upon the Act recently passed in the Imperial Parliament, for

dealing more effectually with the estates of Insolvent Debtors.

The existing condition of the works in connection with water supply to Castlemaine and Sandhurst, and the larger question of providing for the requirements of other populous districts, have been anxiously considered by my Advisers; and I entertain the hope that during the present Session a measure may be submitted to you for speedily utilizing the works in course of construction, and for the gradual extension of similar benefits to other districts.

The necessary steps for commencing the construction of the North-Eastern Railway have been taken: tenders for the earthworks have been called for; the Agent-General has been instructed, after consultation with certain eminent engineers, to invite tenders for the materials for the permanent way and the construction of passenger and goods engines. I hope and believe that when these tenders are received it will be apparent that further railway works can be undertaken for the benefit of other districts without injuriously disturbing the credit of the colony or imposing an unreasonable burden on its revenues.

The approaching withdrawal of the Imperial troops suggests for your consideration the establishment of a local military force, whose services, in addition to their ordinary duties, might be available for guarding prisoners employed in the construction of public works, such as breakwaters

and dredging operations, which would not otherwise be undertaken.

A Bill to establish a Marine Board, whereby the duties hitherto discharged by the Department of Ports and Harbors, the Pilot Board, and the Steam Navigation Board will be consolidated,

has been prepared for your consideration.

You will be invited to consider the questions of impounding and fencing, and the amendment of the law for the prevention of diseases in animals.

You will also be invited to consider a Bill containing provisions for punishing more effectually a certain class of criminals, including those guilty of offences against women and children.

A Bill to provide for the regulation and management of the Police Force will be submitted to you.

The question of Education has engaged the anxious deliberation of my Advisers, and they will be prepared to submit for your consideration a measure providing for the greater efficiency of the Public Schools and a more general and regular attendance thereat.

It is intended to submit for your approval a Bill for the Abolition of State Aid to Religion. I congratulate you on the flourishing condition of the country, and I earnestly hope that your deliberations, by the blessing of Divine Providence, will advance the prosperity and happiness of

Thanking His Excellency for informing us that the question of Education has engaged the anxious deliberation of His Excellency's advisers, and assuring His Excellency that we shall be prepared to give our best consideration to the measure which is to be submitted to us to provide for the greater efficiency of the Public Schools, and a more general and regular attendance thereat.

Assuring His Excellency that the Bill which His Excellency informs us is to be submitted for our approval for the Abolition of State Aid to Religion shall have our earnest attention.

That we join in His Excellency's congratulations on the flourishing condition of the country and in the earnest hope that our deliberations, by the blessing of Divine Providence, will advance the prosperity and happiness of the people.

Mr. Bates presented a petition from Richard Roberts, styling himself chief ruler, and John W. Clapham, styling himself secretary of the Rose of Denmark Tent of the Independent Order of Rechabites, praying that in the proposed Amending Act public-houses should be closed the whole of the Sabbath day; that the time public-houses are to be kept open should be restricted, so that in no case should they be open for ordinary business before 7 a.m. or after 11 p.m.; that no night-licenses under any pretence whatever should be granted; that greater regard should be had to the character of applicants for licenses; that the licensing power should be in the hands of commissioners specially appointed for that object, and directly responsible to the Parliament of the country; that in every neighborhood or district where it is proposed to license a public-house, means should be afforded for allowing a veto of a clear majority of the inhabitants who object, and that this should be conclusive; that where a license for a house has been refused, no application should be entertained on behalf of the said house for at least twelve months thereafter; that strenuous measures be adopted for putting an end to all the low class beer-houses, both in town and country; that dancing saloons and casinos be prohibited; that the license to grocers to sell wines, beer, and spirits by the bottle be withdrawn; that effective means be adopted for analysing all kinds of intoxicating drinks sold for the use of the public; and finally, that more extensive powers be conferred upon the police for ascertaining that in all cases the law is strictly attended to.

Pursuant to the provisions of section 36 of the Constitution Act, the Governor transmits to the Legislative Assembly the following amendment, which he recommends to be made in the Bill intituled "A Bill to amend the Mining Companies Limited Liability Act 1864 and for other "purposes," that has been presented to him for Her Majesty's assent :-

After Clause 1 insert a new clause, as follows :-

"2. And whereas doubts have arisen as to the meaning of the words 'elective body corporate' in the twenty-fourth section of the Mining Statute 1865: Be it declared and enacted that the said words shall be deemed to mean, and from the time of the coming into operation of the said Statute to have meant any partnership association company or body corporate registered under the provisions of any Act now or heretofore in force relating to the limitation of the liability of mining partnerships, associations, or companies, or of the shareholders therein."

Clause 5, line 26, after "thirty-four" insert "of the 'Shires Statute."

Clause 6, leave out this clause.

Clause 7, leave out this clause.

Clause 12, leave out this clause.

At end of Bill insert two new clauses A and B:-

"A. The seventh section of the 'Shires Statute' shall be read as if the words 'into a shire' had been inserted after the word 'borough' in the ninth line of the said section and this section of this

Act shall be read with and form part of the said seventh section."

"B. The one hundred and ninety-second section of the 'Shires Statute' shall be read as if the following proviso had been enacted therewith Provided further that it shall be lawful for the shire council of any shire with which a borough shall have been united to make special bye-laws for such borough so united, such bye-laws being framed in conformity with the provisions of the Act 33 Vic. No. CCCLIX or of any amending Statute thereof and this section of this Act shall be read with and shall form part of the said one hundred and ninety-second section."

And the said several amendments were read a second time.

On the motion of Mr. Wrixon, the Assembly disagreed to the said several amendments.

Ordered—That the Bill be returned to the Legislative Council with a Message acquainting them that the Legislative Assembly have disagreed to the said several amendments.

6. Mrs. Moran.—Mr. F. L. Smyth reported from a Committee of the whole a certain resolution, which was read, and is as follows:—

(13th July, 1870.)

Resolved—That an Address be presented to His Excellency the Governor, requesting him to cause a sum of £350 to be placed on an Additional Estimate for the Year 1870, as a gratuity to the widow of the late Owen Moran, formerly in the Penal department.

And the said resolution was read a second time and agreed to by the Assembly.

7. Captain Payne.—Dr. Macartney moved, pursuant to notice, That in the opinion of this House the appointment of Captain Payne to the office of Chief Harbor-master is unfair and injurious to the Civil Service of Victoria, and contrary to the spirit of The Civil Service Act.

Debate ensued.

Motion, by leave, withdrawn.

8. Purchasers under 12th and 13th Sections of Amending Land Act 1865.—The Order of the Day for the further consideration in Committee of the whole Assembly of the following resolutions:—

That, in the opinion of this House, provision should be made to enable persons who have purchased land selected under the 12th and 13th sections of *The Amending Land Act* 1865 to receive a refund of the amount which they may have paid as purchase-money and rent, over and above One pound per acre, or a certificate enabling such persons to select or purchase an area of land equivalent to the amount so paid over and above One pound per acre as aforesaid.

(2.) That provision should also be made to enable persons who have purchased land held under the 42nd section of *The Amending Land Act* 1865, to receive a refund of such amount as they have paid as purchase-money and rent, over and above the average upset price of land in their respective districts, or a certificate to enable such persons to select or purchase an area of land equivalent to the amount so paid over and above the aforesaid average upset price.

(3.) That an address be presented to His Excellency the Governor requesting that an appropriation be

made accordingly, and that a Bill be brought in for that purpose—having been read,

MR. SPEAKER,

His Excellency the Governor desires the immediate attendance of this Honorable House in the Legislative Council.

Accordingly Mr. Speaker and the House went to the Legislative Council, when His Excellency was pleased to give the Royal assent to the Public Bills following, viz. :-

- "An Act to apply a sum out of the Consolidated Revenue to the services of the year One thousand eight hundred and seventy and to appropriate the Supplies granted in this session of Parliament and for other purposes."
- "An Act to sanction the issue and application of certain sums of money from 'The Railway Loan Account' for Salaries Wages and Contingencies for the service of the year One thousand eight hundred and seventy."

  "An Act for taking an account of the Population and of the Live Stock in the year One thousand eight hundred and seventy-one."

  "An Act for the mount for of the Scalar Story."

"An Act for the prevention of the Scab in Sheep."

"An Act to authorize the raising of Money for Public Works and other purposes."

"An Act to amend the Mining Companies Limited Liability Act 1864."

- "An Act to amend an Act intituled 'An Act to amend and consolidate the Laws relating to Municipal Corporations."

- "An Act to extend the Powers of the Acting Inspector-General of Public Works."

  "An Act for amending 'The Waterworks Commissioners Act 1869."

  "An Act to sanction the issue and expenditure of certain sums from 'The Public Works Loan Account' for Salaries Wages and Contingencies for the service of the year One thousand eight hundred and seventy."
- And His Excellency was pleased to reserve the following Public Bill for the signification of Her Majesty's pleasure thereon:—
  - "An Act to provide for the Abolition of State Aid to Religion."
- 3. His Excellency's Speech.—After which His Excellency was pleased to make a Speech to both Houses of Parliament as followeth :-

Mr. President and Honorable Gentlemen of the Legislative Council:

Mr. Speaker and Gentlemen of the Legislative Assembly:

I am happy to be enabled to release you for the present from further attendance in Parliament. Although the Session has not been marked by much important legislation, several measures of

practical utility, which I need not enumerate, have passed into law.

I have to congratulate you on the settlement of the long-vexed question of the abolition of State Aid to Religion. If in effecting that settlement mutual concessions have been made, much has been gained thereby; and I trust that the zeal of the religious bodies, increased, as no doubt it will be, by the conviction of the necessity of complete self-reliance, will more than compensate for the loss of the grant from the State which they have been accustomed to receive.

I have, in accordance with the Constitution Statute, reserved this measure for the signification

of Her Majesty's pleasure thereon.

Mr. Speaker and Gentlemen of the Legislative Assembly:

I thank you on behalf of Her Majesty for the liberality with which you have granted Supplies for the requirements of the Public Service.

Mr. President and Honorable Gentlemen of the Legislative Council:

MR. SPEAKER AND GENTLEMEN OF THE LEGISLATIVE ASSEMBLY:

An essential of all practical and satisfactory legislation is that it be preceded by due enquiry and deliberation; it is therefore my intention, in accordance with the recommendation of my Advisers, to issue Royal Commissions to enquire into the state of the Public Service, the working of our Charitable Institutions, and into the condition and management of the Penal Establishments, with a view of utilizing convict labor; also into the important subjects of Federation and Intercolonial Legislation, which have already been partially dealt with by Committees of the Legislative Assembly.

My Advisers are deeply impressed with the necessity for removing all undue restrictions upon mining enterprise, and their earnest attention will be devoted to this subject during the recess.

An immediate and rigid investigation will be made into the state of the works for Water Supply, and my Advisers will have under their consideration a scheme for the extension and completion of such works by local bodies assisted by Government.

The works on the first four sections of the Railway to the Upper Murray are being prosecuted with vigour, and you will be glad to hear that tenders will speedily be invited for a further portion of this important undertaking. Orders are also in course of execution for rolling-stock, and it is intended to complete this undertaking with the least possible delay.

The Government will take such steps as may be necessary in order to give effect to the

resolutions agreed to at the recent Intercolonial Conference.

You will have learned from the papers which have been presented to you that Her Majesty's Imperial Government have determined upon the withdrawal, at an early date, of the troops now stationed in the Australian Colonies. My Advisers will give their attention to the question of our

defences in connection with the organization of a local force.

It is the desire of the Government that the recess shall be as brief as is consistent with the due preparation of the measures to be submitted for your consideration in the ensuing Session, and especially that the Estimates for the requirements of the public service after the expiration of the

present year may be laid before you as early as possible.

I now, in Her Majesty's name, declare this Parliament to be prorogued to Thursday, the

first day of September next, and it is hereby prorogued accordingly.

Every hearing of an application for an hotel tavern packet colonial wine temporary billiard table special or special entertainment license, and every application for the transfer or forfeiture of such license shall be deemed to be a judicial proceeding and shall be open to the public, and the licensing "magistrate" shall hear and determine such applications or objections thereto, and shall and may summon and examine on oath such witnesses as he may think necessary and as near as may be in the manner directed by any Act now or hereafter to be in force relating to the duties of justices in summary convictions and orders, and to grant to such persons who may be approved of by such magistrate certificates authorising the granting of such license as aforesaid: Provided that every application for a license under this Act, and every application for the transfer or forfeiture of a license shall be heard and determined by a licensing magistrate appointed for the district by the Governor; and such licensing magistrate shall wherever practicable be a police magistrate; and no justice of the peace, unless appointed a licensing magistrate, shall have jurisdiction in any application for a license or a transfer or forfeiture of a license: Provided that every application for a public entertainment license shall be made to the Governor who may grant or refuse the same, and if the Governor shall grant such application he shall give to the applicant a certificate in duplicate authorizing the issue of such license, provided that such license shall be subject to such regulations and conditions as shall be prescribed by the Governor and be endorsed on such certificates.

#### No. 5 .- Wines Beer and Spirits Sale Statute 1864 Amendment Bill .- Clause 3.

The following words, unless where the contrary appears from the context, are used in this Act with the meaning hereby assigned to them respectively:—
"Licensing magistrates" shall mean any police magistrate acting with at least one justice of

peace elected as hereinafter provided.

"Governor" shall mean the person administering the Government acting by and with the advice of the Executive Council:

"Brewer" shall mean any maker of fermented malt liquor or any fermented liquor made from sugar or other sacharine matter and termed beer ale or porter, or any maker of wine for sale, and shall include every vendor of fermented liquors or wine made in Victoria in quantities not less than two gallons:

"Liquor" shall mean any wine spirits beer ale porter cider perry or other spirituous or fermented liquor of an intoxicating nature:

"Spirituous liquors" shall mean any liquors exceeding in strength twenty-six per centum of proof spirit:

"Spirit merchant" shall mean any vendor of spirituous liquors wine or fermented malt liquors in quantities not less than one gallon, or any person who exposes the same for sale in any shop warehouse or premises "or sells the same from sample," except an auctioneer or a broker selling on account of a licensed spirit merchant brewer or hotel tavern packet colonial wine or special licensee declared to be the principal at the time of such sale:

But nothing in this Act shall apply to any person selling any spirituous or distilled perfume bonâ fide as perfumery, nor to any person who may sell wine cider or perry in quantities not less than two gallons at any one time the produce of grapes apples or pears respectively of his own growth and not to be consumed on the premises, nor to any apothecary chemist or druggist who may administer or sell any spirituous or fermented liquors for medicinal purposes, nor to any person who may sell or give wine or beer made from grapes or grain of his own growth or beer brewed by him for the use of his own establishment, nor to any person selling liquor in any refreshment room at the Houses of Parliament by the permission and under the control of the Houses of Parliament, nor to any military canteen established under the regulations of Her Majesty's service, nor to any person occupying any premises bonâ fide as a club.
