# **Government Challenges**

- ➤ Significant maintenance backlog



# **Financial Unsustainability**

- There is a growing structural deficit
- Operating costs now exceed revenue by 42 percent (even with the historical underinvestment in maintenance)



"... Public housing's operating model is unsustainable" (Victorian Auditor General – March 2012)

"The current situation has been developing over an extended period." (Victorian Auditor General – March 2012)

# Seven initiatives to address Housing's challenges from 2011

- 1. An independent review of the Housing and Community Building Division finances, including a Line by Line expenditure review.
- 2. Comprehensive property condition audit of the entire portfolio.
- 3. Better management of vacant stock reduced turnaround times by 10%.
- 4. Audit of vacant stock 1,000 properties returned to tenancy.
- 5. Commenced development of the new Housing Framework.
- 6. Commissioned evaluation of outstanding Nation Building projects which were 1,000 behind target when Coalition came to Government.
- 7. Better management of waiting list.

#### **Homelessness Action Plan**

- Reform of homelessness support services through release of the Victorian Homelessness Action Plan
- Innovative approaches to homelessness
- Early intervention and prevention
- Better target of resources
  - when and where most needed
  - what will make the biggest difference
- Focussed on outcomes not throughput
- Commitment of \$76.7 million
- \$25 million for innovative action projects over two years

### **Housing Framework**

- A three month consultation period on two discussion papers
- The two papers:
  - Pathways to a Fair and Sustainable Social Housing System
  - Social Housing Options to Improve the Supply of Quality Housing
- Auditor General's report Access to Public Housing found a legacy of poor asset management and financial unsustainably.
- Need a new approach. Status Quo is not an option.


"New directions must explore innovative options for public housing... so that access to public housing can be better managed and sustainable..." (Victorian Auditor General – March 2012)

"... need for greater focus on the financial viability of public housing and other social housing options. While the long-term, future financial viability of public housing remains unresolved, the housing needs of many low-income Victorians will continue to be unmet." (Inquiry into the adequacy and future directions of public housing in Victoria – Sept 2010)

### Shift in public tenant profile

The change over time in the profile of public housing tenants has resulted in:


- lower rental returns
- reduced turnover in public housing dwellings



# 2012-13 Budget Initiatives

- Extension of the Support for High Risk Tenancy Program for a further four years.
- Extension of Opening Doors program for a further four years.
- Commencement of the first Youth Foyer.







# **Major capital projects**

#### **New Norlane**

- Four-year, \$80 million public and private housing initiative.
- 320 new affordable low-density homes.
- Generating local jobs and investment for Geelong.

# **Housing Affordability Fund**

 \$175.3 million Commonwealth funding to build 547 new affordable rental homes in Fitzroy, Prahran and Richmond.

#### Westmeadows

- Five year \$160 million private and social housing redevelopment with \$56 million State contribution.
- More than 220 private homes.
- 110 social housing homes.
- 34 independent living units for older Victorians.
- 120 bed aged care facility.
- New parks, bike paths and green walkways.
- In partnership with Australand and Baptcare.
