

# Parliamentary Inquiry into sustainable employment for disadvantaged jobseekers – Department of Jobs, Precincts and Regions (DJPR)

## Questions on Notice

### 1. Evaluation of Jobs Victoria programs, including data on the number of JVEN participants still employed beyond 26 weeks, including after one year

The Department of Jobs, Precincts and Regions (DJPR) engaged the South Australian Centre for Economic Studies (SACES) at the University of Adelaide to evaluate the Jobs Victoria Employment Network (JVEN) in May 2017. The evaluation consists of a series of reports that are informing continuous improvement in JVEN’s program delivery, as well as a final report on the effectiveness and impact of the program. SACES is determining the percentage and distribution of JVEN participants still in employment after 26-weeks, including one year after. This is determined through a multi-method approach that includes analysis of SACES’ Provider Survey, Participant Survey, and data received from case study providers. The final report, incorporating this information, is due by the end of October 2019.
