Suburban Development 2020-21 Budget Outcomes



Suburban Development 2020-21 Funding

- \$20.2 million for **Suburban Revitalisation and Growth**
- \$3.1 million to extend the **Metropolitan Partnerships**

In addition to:

- \$9.4 million for **Suburban Revitalisation** in the Building Works Stimulus Package
- \$1.3 million for the **Let's Stay Connected Fund**

Key budget initiatives – Suburban Revitalisation

SUBURBAN REVITALISATION

The 2020/21 Budget is supporting areas of disadvantage and suburban activity centres

- The Suburban Revitalisation program recognises that local people best understand how to support recovery in their communities

- The program supports economic and social development in key activity centres across Melbourne by establishing locally-led Suburban Revitalisation Boards

- Each Revitalisation Board will develop a site-specific program of works to meet the needs of its local community



\$20.2 million over two years for suburban revitalisation and growth

- Ongoing support for Government's existing Broadmeadows and Frankston revitalisation projects

- Support for the delivery of infrastructure to revitalise six new sites in Boronia, Lilydale, Noble Park, Reservoir, Tarneit and Melton

- Improvements to the Altona sea wall to protect and improve community access to valuable open space at Altona Beach

Key budget initiatives – Metropolitan Partnerships

METROPOLITAN PARTNERSHIPS

The 2020/21 Budget ensures local voices are heard and are informing government decision-making

- The Metropolitan Partnerships have a key role to play in community-led economic and social recovery across Melbourne

- The Metropolitan Partnerships are engaging with local businesses and communities to share on-ground insights on COVID-19 impacts in their local areas

- They are also playing a key role in delivering place-based engagement for COVID-19 recovery planning



\$3.1 million to extend the Metropolitan Partnerships

- Funding to support the ongoing work of the Metropolitan Partnerships with a focus on the recovery of highly impacted cohorts CALD communities, women and young people

- Supporting Government by maintaining and strengthening the role that Metropolitan Partnerships can play in community-led COVID-19 recovery

- Supporting the Partnerships to take local action on regional priorities - jobs, housing, transport, social isolation, environment and health and recovery

Suburban Development 2020 achievements



METROPOLITAN PARTNERSHIPS - SUPPORTING MELBOURNE'S RECOVERY

- Seamless shift to online community engagement with a focus on local **COVID-19 impacts and recovery** for their regions, engaging over 800 Melburnians
- Partnerships hosted **Recovery Roundtables** bringing together Partnership members and key local stakeholders, focusing on regional recovery opportunities
- The Metropolitan Partnerships worked with local communities to identify **community priorities for economic and social recovery**



RESPONDING TO COMMUNITY PRIORITIES

- Community priorities for economic and social recovery include **jobs, housing, transport, social isolation, environment and health**
- The 2020-21 State Budget has responded to many of these key priorities through initiatives like:
 - \$5.3 billion **Big Housing Build**
 - \$868 million for **mental health**
 - \$34 million for economic recovery for **multicultural communities and young people**
 - \$6.7 million to address **social connection across generations**
 - \$1 billion for **TAFE and training**
 - \$58 million to expand opportunities for **apprentices and trainees**.



KEEPING COMMUNITIES CONNECTED

- The **\$1.3M Let's Stay Connected Fund** is supporting community organisations **tackling the impacts of social isolation** during the pandemic
- The Fund is supporting new ideas to **keep people feeling connected** during COVID-19 and beyond
- The Fund supports organisations who already do great work in their local communities across the state - to **help them adapt or expand their reach**, providing more people with the care and support they need.

Suburban Development 2020 achievements



SUBURBAN REVITALISATION PROGRAMS ARE SUPPORTING AREAS OF DISADVANTAGE

- The Suburban Revitalisation Program is supporting **local place-based initiatives** - accelerating recovery in suburbs facing economic and social disadvantage
- Building on the success of the **Frankston and Broadmeadows Revitalisation Boards**, we have expanded the model to six new sites in need of additional support
- As part of the Building Works Stimulus Package, the Government announced a **\$9.4 million** for Suburban Revitalisation across Melbourne
- We are also rolling out **20 minutes neighbourhood pilots** in three locations – **Sunshine West, Strathmore and Croydon South**



BUILDING WORKS STIMULUS - SUBURBAN REVITALISATION

- \$3 million for the **Neighbourhood Activity Centre Renewal Fund**, with grants for 31 local governments in metropolitan Melbourne and Mitchell Shire
- \$3 million for **new revitalisation projects at Lilydale, Boronia, Noble Park, Reservoir, Tarneit and Melton**
- \$1.7 million additional funding to **Frankston** and \$700,000 to **Broadmeadows** to continue the **ongoing revitalisation work** in these town centres
- \$500,000 to **revitalise Lalor shopping strip**, including new public space in the centre of May Road, and
- \$500,000 to **revitalise Thomastown's Central Avenue**, including outdoor dining and upgrades to Thomastown War Memorial.
