Reply

- The Long Jetty has been closed for public use since 2003, although Gippsland Ports
 has allocated a total of \$320,000 over the last five years for risk-mitigation works on
 the Long Jetty in order to maintain the integrity of the structure.
- 2. Please provide details of safety incidents occurring at Bastion Point and the boat harbour at Mallacoota over the last two years.

Reply

- Boating occurs at Mallacoota on two waterways the Mallacoota Inlet (a large lake which opens to the ocean from time to time); and the ocean. The Bastion Point Boat Ramp is the local ocean launching facility (there is no Mallacoota boat harbour).
- Over the past 2 years there have been 15 incidents in the Mallacoota region:
 - 5 incidents have occurred on the Mallacoota Inlet 3 vessel disablements and 2 vessel capsizings.
 - 3 incidents have occurred at Bastion Point in the immediate vicinity of the Bastion Point ocean access launching facility - 1 vessel disablement, 1 collision and 1 capsizing.
 - 7 incidents have occurred within 10 nautical miles of the Bastion Point ocean access launching facility 5 vessel disablements, 1 vessel capsize and 1 grounding incident which resulted in a fatality.
- 3. Please break down the proportion of the increase in container traffic over the last year into exports and imports.

Reply

- Total container throughput increased by 1.8% to 2.58 million Twenty Foot Equivalent Units (TEU).
- Full container imports increased 3.4% and full container exports decreased 3.0%.
- Empty container movements increased 6.5% to 555,000 TEU.

4. Please confirm the Victorian proportion of the nation's container trade, and indicate if this has grown or declined compared to the previous year.

Reply

- The Port of Melbourne is Australia's largest container and general cargo port, handling approximately 36% of container trade throughput by Australia's capital city ports.
- The Port of Melbourne's proportion of the nation's container trade has remained steady at 36% over the previous two years, growing from 35% in 2012-13.
