# Visit to Taiwan May/June 2024

#### Overview

Visited Taipei, Taiwan and met with senior representatives of the Ministry of Foreign Affairs, Republic of China (Taiwan) and senior representatives of the Ministry of Transportation and Communication, the Queensland Trade and Investment Commissioner – Taiwan, the Deputy Mayor and senior representatives at Hsinchu City Government, representatives of the Hsinchu Science Park Bureau, The Head of the Taiwan Office of the European Values Center for Security Policy, representatives of the Taiwan-Asia Exchange Foundation, and business representatives, and discussed technology, healthcare, biotech, energy and green energy, public transport, infrastructure, planning, decentralisation, housing, industry parks, trade and the economy.

Participated in briefings and discussions and held meetings where we exchanged ideas on the health system and preventative healthcare, trade, including minerals and resources, planning and industry parks, green energy and energy supply, public transport and transportation cards, high speed rail, housing, infrastructure projects and tunnels, and funding modes for transport infrastructure. Investigated and considered the application of a range of ideas and approaches for Victoria, across the areas of healthcare, transport, planning and housing.

Visited the National Palace Museum and visited Taipei 101 where I was briefed on the tuned mass damper system, which stabilises the building in extreme weather. Visted Lungshan Temple, Xia-Hai City of God Temple, and Hsinchu Chenghuang Temple and provided information on the religious and cultural importance of these Temples. Visited Hua Shan Park, the Huashan 1914 Creative Park and briefed how Huashan is the competitive stage of creative minds and their measures of success.

Met with Juna Ferrett, Queensland Trade and Investment Commissioner – Taiwan, Trade and Investment Queensland and discussed energy, technology, trade, minerals, and resources, and briefed on business and economic issues and opportunities. Participated in a discussion on the Public Health system in Taiwan, including preventative healthcare in Taiwan. Briefed on the structure and operations of the Queensland Trade and Investment Office.

Met with representatives of the LotRich Information company and provided a briefing of their operations in Taiwan. I learned about the welfare fund in the Taiwan lottery system, and how the fund supports employment services and social welfare programs for those in need.

Met with Deputy Director-General Mr. Hsu, Department of East Asian and Pacific Affairs, Ministry of Foreign Affairs, Republic of China (Taiwan) and with Deputy Director-General on Home Assignment Mr. Wang, Department of East Asian and Pacific Affairs, Ministry of Foreign Affairs, Republic of China (Taiwan). I was provided with an update of Trade figures and informed about the Economic Cooperation Agreement, a free trade agreement between the People's Republic of China and the Republic of China (Taiwan). This agreement aims to reduce tariffs and commercial barriers and improve cross-strait relations. We discussed a range of topics including transport, energy, health, and biotech, and I was briefed on the key issues and opportunities in Taiwan.

Met with Deputy Director Ti-Chi Hu, Department of Public Transportation and Supervision, Ministry of Transportation and Communications and for an extensive briefing and discussion on Taiwan's High Speed Rail, including planning, decentralisation, population and passenger numbers, land use, housing, and industry parks.

Meeting with Assistant Vice President Mr. Chiu, Business Strategy Planning Department, Corporate Planning Division, Taiwan High Speed Rail Corporation for a further discussion on Taiwan High Speed Rail. Provided information on station selection and models for generation of economic activity around stations. Discussed costs associated with infrastructure projects and tunnels. Briefed on rolling stock, and the TPass Transportation Card.

Meeting with Chief Secretary Ms. Chen, and Executive Officer Ms. Li, Railway Bureau, Ministry of Transportation and Communications (MOTC). Briefing on the organisation structure and operations of the High Speed Rail (HSR). Exchange of ideas on funding models for transport infrastructure. Discussion on station development and industry parks. Updated on future plans for extension of the HSR lines.

Meeting with Mr. Wu, Senior Specialist, Public Service Section, Public Relations Department, Public Affairs Division, Taiwan High Speed Rail Corporation. Guided Tour of the Taiwan High Speed Rail Museum, history, and construction.

Visited Taoyuan Station and discussed the transport network, passenger volumes and management, ticketing and Smart Card, the Mass Rapid Transport System (MRT), and the Airport MRT.

Travelled on Taiwan High Speed Rail (THSR) from Taoyuan to Hsinchu, where we had an expanded discussion on the construction and operations of the THSR. Briefing on the systems technology. Overview of the management by the Taiwan High Speed Rail Corporation.

Toured Hsinchu Railway Station and provided a history of the Taiwan Railways Administration, which became a state-owned corporation, Taiwan Railway Administration on 1 January 2024.

Meeting with Deputy Mayor Chiu, Hsinchu City Government, and with Director General of Civil Affairs Ms. Shih, Hsinchu City Government. Formal welcome and discussions on Hsinchu City being Taiwan's science and technology hub. Overview of the City demographics. Discussion on business and economic opportunities; the importance of research institutions; and the training of IT graduates. Further discussions on IT, Science and Technology and opportunities for further communication and cooperation between the two cities.

Meeting with Director Lee, Hsinchu Science Park Bureau, National Science and Technology Council, Investment Division, and meeting with Associate Researcher Mr Huang, Hsinchu Science Park Bureau, National Science and Technology Council, Investment Division. Presentation and briefing on the Hsinchu Science Park, including Industry outlook, Operation and strategy, Business model, and Future prospects. In depth briefing and discussion on the semiconductor industry; Biotech; AI; and Business Incubation at the Science Park.

Met with Marcin Jerzewski, Head of Taiwan Office, European Values Center for Security Policy. Briefing and discussion on the European Values Center for Security Policy activities and the work of the Center. Exchange of ideas on energy and renewable technologies, Transport initiatives, Share services, electric cars and hybrids, and Housing affordability. Discussion on Public Policy Issues and briefed on Disaster Response and Recovery.

Met with Meeting with Dr. Hsiao, Chairman and Senior Advisor to the President of Taiwan, meeting with Dr. Yang, Executive Director, Taiwan-Asia Exchange Foundation, and meeting with Ms. Hashmi, Postdoctoral Fellow TAEF. Presentation on the Taiwan-Asia Exchange Foundation work and achievements, followed by a discussion on opportunities to further develop relationships and partnerships.

Visited Dadaocheng District and received information on this historic district. Discussed the areas business mix, commercial importance, the use of night markets and festivals to generate economic activity.

#### **Key Learnings**

The visit to the Queensland Trade and Investment Office at the Australia Office in Taipei, Taiwan, and meeting with the Commissioner, provided an opportunity to compare and contrast the structure and operations of this office with Global Victoria Offices. When looking to partner with and support Victorian businesses, who are looking to expand their export capabilities, Global Victoria provides a range of professional and valuable programs and services. We can learn from other states and when considering trade missions, Taiwan could be included as an opportunity for Victorian businesses, who may wish to consider the opportunities to export.

The meeting with representatives from the LotRich Information Company provided the opening to learn about the welfare fund in the Taiwan lottery system.

#### Background:

The Public Welfare Lottery in Taiwan includes a Welfare Fund that serves specific purposes. Its scope includes employment services for vulnerable groups and social welfare. Specifically, the fund supports employment services and social welfare programs for those in need.

The management of the Welfare Fund in Taiwan's lottery system involves careful oversight and allocation. The key points are:

- 1. Allocation: The fund is allocated to specific purposes, such as employment services for vulnerable groups and social welfare programs.
- 2. Monitoring: Government agencies and relevant organizations monitor the fund's usage to ensure it aligns with its intended goals.
- 3. Transparency: Transparency is crucial. Reports on fund utilization are made public periodically, allowing citizens to track how the money is used.
- 4. Accountability: The issuing institute responsible for the lottery system ensures that the fund is managed responsibly and efficiently.

The Public Welfare Lottery in Taiwan allocates its funds to support both social welfare and employment services for vulnerable groups. The key points are:

- 1. Social Welfare: The lottery's net revenues (total sales minus prizes and administration expenses) are used for social welfare expenses, accounting for 50% of the funds.
- 2. Employment Services: The Feedback Fund generated by the lottery accompanies the selection criteria for the issuing institute. It supports employment services for vulnerable groups and social welfare programs.

This initiative could be adopted to create a fund from the lottery system here, to similarly support employment services and social welfare programs in Victoria. Further research and investigation are required to explore the application of this initiative and the benefits to Victoria.

The various briefings and discussions on Healthcare, and in particular preventative healthcare provided opportunities to further explore and adopt preventative healthcare measures.

Taiwan's healthcare system is renowned for its emphasis on preventative care, making it a model for other countries. Specifically in relation to preventative measures, Taiwan actively promotes preventative care, including regular health check-ups, screenings, and vaccinations. By detecting and addressing health issues early, they improve overall health and wellbeing. An example is employers providing an annual financial amount for employees to have monthly health checkups, and other checkups. Taiwanese people are very health conscious.

A focus on disease prevention and treatment, and interventions that help people lead healthier lives would enhance Victoria's health care system. Further research and analysis here could strengthen our existing public health programs and /or introduce innovative programs, with proven results.

Further study and a better understanding of preventative healthcare can be used to inform more effective policies, practices, programs, and interventions.

The briefings and discussions on the Taiwan High Speed Rail, the MRT Transport system, and the TPass Transportation card, provided an opportunity to examine the application of these ideas and systems and their benefits to Victoria. This briefing and information were timely and significant, given the direction and challenges facing Victoria in these areas.

This warrants further examination, analysis, discussion, and debate.

Furthermore, the dialogue, information, data, and knowledge shared on the costs associated with infrastructure projects and tunnels, was extremely helpful, valued, and important given the debate about infrastructure project priorities in Victoria and their associated costs.

There is an opportunity to learn more about funding models for transport infrastructure, to ensure Victorians are getting value for money, and oversight on major projects to make sure projects are delivered on time and on budget. A reference to a joint parliamentary committee for an inquiry to further explore these areas would be of benefit to the Victorian Parliament.

The meetings, discussions, and briefings on the Taiwan Taoyuan International Airport MRT (Mass Rapid Transit), commonly known as the Airport MRT, were important, useful, and constructive. The learnings and application will be useful in further exploring an airport rail link for Victoria, and the best solution with regards to route, stations, and connections.

The presentation, briefing, and in-depth discussion on the Hsinchu Science Park provided information and opportunities for innovation, research and development, and collaboration. The discussion on incubation and entrepreneurship provided ideas to further explore and examine, to foster and support venture startups and young entrepreneurs.

In addition, the science park industry-academia collaboration model is worthy of further study, to compare with our own industry-academia models, and where we might be able to learn and improve our practices and outcomes.

The meeting and discussion with senior representatives of The Taiwan-Asia Exchange Foundation (TAEF) provided the opportunity to further develop relationships and partnerships.

The discussion and information on The Taiwan-Asia Young Leaders Engagement, one of TAEF's Flagship Programs, could be further evaluated for use as a young leader's program in Victoria. I am grateful for the time and insights shared with me by Prof. H.H. Michael Hsiao, Chairman and Senior Advisor to the President of Taiwan, and by Dr. Alan H. Yang, Executive Director, Taiwan-Asia Exchange Foundation. Their knowledge, experience, and willingness to share ideas was greatly appreciated, and gave me new perspective across a range of issues.
