NOTICE OF MOTION

705* GEORGIE PURCELL — To move —

That this House —

(1) notes —

- (a) that dingoes are protected threatened wildlife under the *Wildlife Act 1975* and are listed as 'vulnerable' on the *Flora and Fauna Guarantee Act 1988* Threatened List;
- (b) since 2018, the unprotection Order in Council has allowed for the lethal control of dingoes to livestock on private land and within a three-kilometre buffer zone along the boundaries of public land in eastern Victoria;

(2) requires the Leader of the Government, in accordance with Standing Order 10.01, to table in the Council, within ten weeks of the House agreeing to this resolution, all documents relating to the dingo Order in Council, including but not limited to —

- (a) consultation or consultation reports in relation to decision-making, including with Traditional Owners;
- (b) reports from each review of the dingo listings under the *Flora and Fauna Guarantee Act 1988* in consultation with the Scientific Advisory Committee;
- (c) genetic health, population modelling trends and counts for each year, including all information and data that informed relevant numbers;
- (d) assessment of the impact of floods, fires, road strike, development and urban sprawl and any other matters that may affect populations;
- (e) the reasoning for the decision to —
 - (i) protect dingoes in Victoria's north-west;
 - (ii) renew the Order in Council announced on 24 September 2024;
 - (iii) end the wild dog bounty program;

- (f) compliance with conditions, restrictions and limitations in the Order in Council, including the number of reports and investigations of alleged illegal killing;
- (g) the number of dingoes killed using large leghold traps, confinement traps, net traps, poison baits, and firearms; and
- (h) the cost to the Government to operate the program.

NOTICES OF MOTION

541^φ DAVID ETTERS HANK — To move —

That this House —

(1) notes that —

- (a) Melbourne is experiencing a surge in growth with the population expected to exceed 6.5 million people by 2036 and the majority of new residents are settling in outer suburban growth areas;
- (b) public transport infrastructure has not kept abreast with population growth in growth areas, leaving residents with limited or no access to reliable public transport;
- (c) the lack of transport —
 - (i) forces people to rely on costly private transport alternatives, exacerbating cost-of-living pressures for families and young people;
 - (ii) prevents people from getting to work, school, medical appointments and participating fully in their community;
- (d) the Government's plans to build train infrastructure in growth areas will take decades to complete and require huge investment;
- (e) Infrastructure Victoria's 2023 report titled, *Fast, frequent fair*, recognised the critical role buses could play in servicing outer suburbs and new growth areas and recommended the Government —
 - (i) increase the frequency of bus services beginning with outer suburbs and growth areas;
 - (ii) update the Principal Public Transport Network to accurately align it with mass transit bus routes;
 - (iii) provide funding certainty for growth area buses, including direct funding to priority growth suburbs;
 - (iv) substantially reduce bus fares relative to other modes;

(2) calls on the Government to —

- (a) review bus networks, particularly in growth areas, to identify gaps in service; and
- (b) investigate the feasibility of a 12-month trial of free buses to ease cost-of-living pressures and enable residents to participate in their community.

704* GEORGIE CROZIER — To move —

That this House, pursuant to Part 9.6 of the *Mental Health and Wellbeing Act 2022* —

- (1) refers the status and outcomes of the implementation of the recommendations from the Royal Commission into Victoria's Mental Health System to the Mental Health and Wellbeing Commission, including —
 - (a) the current status of implementation of all recommendations contained in the interim and final reports, including recommendations the Government have reported as complete;
 - (b) the impact of delays and the implementation of recommendations on workforce and access to mental health care in Victoria's public mental health system since the Royal Commission handed down its interim and final reports;
 - (c) a detailed analysis of the impact of delays and the implementation of recommendations on access to and wait times for mental health support in community and in-patient settings;
 - (d) the impact of delays and the implementation of recommendations on the mental health workforce, including —
 - (i) changes to the quantum and composition of the mental health workforce by profession and those with lived experience;
 - (ii) current areas of workforce shortages by worker category and geographical region;
 - (iii) mental health worker satisfaction;
 - (iv) capacity of the current mental health workforce and supporting infrastructure to meet demand for mental health services in Victoria;
 - (e) inclusion of people with lived and living experience on the implementation of recommendations, including responding to past harm in the mental health system;
 - (f) detailed examination, audit and reporting of expenditure of the mental health levy and assessment as to whether this expenditure is in line with legislative requirements;
 - (g) any other relevant matter; and
- (2) requests that the Commission complete its report by March 2026.

498 GEORGIE CROZIER — To move —

That this House notes that —

- (1) Victoria's public hospitals are facing severe financial constraints due to savage funding cuts by the Allan Labor Government;
- (2) health services have enacted hiring freezes in response to the Government's demands to find large savings, with major hospitals not renewing doctors contracts after years of ongoing employment and some positions reduced from full-time to part-time;
- (3) peak health bodies have expressed serious concerns, including that —
 - (a) the Australian Medical Association has warned that patient care will be compromised as a result of recruitment freezes leading to job losses across the sector;
 - (b) the Victorian Healthcare Association is calling on the Government to reverse these cost-cutting measures that will leave clinical service delivery at risk;
- (4) the Government's budget cuts are driving doctors, nurses, paramedics and allied health professionals interstate to find work due to the uncertainty in securing employment in the Victorian health care system;
- (5) reducing staff will inevitably lead to surgery cancellations; and

- (6) the Government's savage funding cuts undermine the need to address critical workforce shortages at a time when Victorians are already struggling to access essential health care, facing long waiting times for surgery, emergency departments are overstretched and there are ongoing ambulance delays due to ramping.

600 JEFF BOURMAN — To move —

That this House notes that —

- (1) deer hunting is the premier hunting activity in Victoria, with over 48,000 game licences held for the express purpose of hunting deer, both by stalking and hound hunting;
 - (2) recreational deer hunting contributes over \$200 million a year to the Victorian economy and provides around 2,000 jobs, with 69 per cent of hunter expenditure coming from regional Victoria;
 - (3) recreational deer hunting is the dominant below snowline use of the Alpine National Park and the revenue from hunting tourism is vital to several regional communities;
 - (4) Victoria's recreational hunters kill around 140,000 deer annually, most of them female and most of them on public land;
 - (5) the recreational deer harvest in Victoria dwarfs that of Government sponsored control programs, all whilst providing triple bottom line benefits to the State;
 - (6) there are large tracts of public land that are National Parks that are not open to seasonal hunting by licensed deer hunters, with no sound rationale for their exclusion;
- and calls on the Government to open appropriate tracts of applicable National Parks at suitable times to recreational hunters to increase opportunities for Victoria's burgeoning recreational deer hunting community to engage in their chosen outdoor recreation.

REMAINING GENERAL BUSINESS

NOTICES OF MOTION

483 GEORGIE PURCELL — To move —

That this House —

- (1) notes that the Inquiry into Victoria's recreational native bird hunting arrangements found that —
 - (a) it is improbable for the Game Management Authority to enforce compliance with hunting regulations using the resources they have;
 - (b) ongoing wounding rates of native birds are unacceptable, and thousands of birds will be wounded in Victoria each duck shooting season even if improvements are implemented;
 - (c) duck shooting should be banned on public and private land from the beginning of 2024;
- (2) further notes that —
 - (a) it has been five months since the Victorian Government chose to ignore the main recommendation from its own inquiry report to allow recreational duck shooting to continue in Victoria;
 - (b) on 5 June 2024, the 2024 duck shooting season finally ended after eight weeks of carnage on Victorian wetlands and during that time —

- (i) protected native animals were illegally killed, and countless others were wounded but not retrieved;
- (ii) pits of shot and buried birds, including a protected grebe, were uncovered and reported to authorities;
- (iii) a record number of volunteer wildlife rescuers were banned from the wetlands for entering the water to help injured wildlife;
- (iv) sacred Indigenous trees were cut down and removed by shooters and important habitat was destroyed;

and calls on the Government to ban duck shooting.

484 GEORGIE CROZIER — To move —

That this House —

- (1) notes the Allan Labor Government's failure to adequately call out the flagrant display of toxic masculinity, and misogynistic and thuggish behaviour in the union movement and the Labor Party, including the failure to —
 - (a) condemn convicted harasser of women and friend of the Premier, Mr John Setka, and his intimidatory and standover tactics, particularly with respect to the Australian Football League;
 - (b) expel from the Australian Labor Party the Member for South Barwon, Mr Darren Cheeseman MP, and the Member for Ringwood, Mr Will Fowles MP, for alleged misconduct against women;
 - (c) call out the Assistant Treasurer, the Hon. Danny Pearson MP, for his belittling and name-calling of Opposition members;
- (2) further notes the new Parliamentary Secretary for Men's Behaviour Change has been silent in the face of those actions and comments; and
- (3) calls on the Premier to condemn all forms of misogynistic, belittling, demeaning, and thuggish behaviour.

485 SARAH MANSFIELD — To move —

That this House —

- (1) notes that access to healthcare should be a basic right of Victorians, regardless of what they earn or where they live;
- (2) requires the Legal and Social Issues Committee to inquire into, consider and report, by December 2025, on —
 - (a) the rationale and cost-benefit analysis for potential models of hospitals and health services amalgamations in Victoria;
 - (b) the available evidence regarding health service amalgamations from Australia and overseas;
 - (c) the modelling regarding potential changes to health service access across Victoria, including rural and regional areas, resulting from amalgamations;
 - (d) the potential workforce impacts of health service amalgamations;
 - (e) best practice public and health service engagement when implementing major health service reform like amalgamations;

- (f) the time and cost required to implement any amalgamations of Victorian health services; and
- (g) any other related matters.

486 MELINA BATH — To move —

That this House notes —

- (1) pork is the second most consumed meat in Australia and the Victorian pork industry is a vital part of Australia's food chain supply;
- (2) Victoria's pig industry is the most highly regulated animal industry in Australia;
- (3) Australia's pork industry is a world leader in research and training methods, such as ProHand;
- (4) Victoria's pork industry has demonstrated an ongoing commitment to improving animal welfare standards;
- (5) animal extremists intent on closing the meat industry should be held accountable for illegally trespassing on farms;

and calls on the Government to ignore the extremist elements in the report tabled today on pig welfare in Victoria.

487 GEORGIE CROZIER — To move —

That this House —

- (1) notes the increasing crime crisis in Victoria that is putting the lives of Victorians at risk; and
- (2) further notes that today's crime statistics include that crime is up over 10 per cent in Victoria, police numbers are down with nearly 1,000 vacancies and youth crime is out of control with a 20.1 per cent increase.

489 EVAN MULHOLLAND — To move —

That this House notes that —

- (1) the \$14 billion Metro Tunnel has run out of funding set aside for unexpected costs, with builders set to seek more taxpayer cash to finish the job;
- (2) the Metro Tunnel's budget has already blown out by more than \$3 billion, including more than \$1.7 billion coughed up by taxpayers, with sources familiar with the project saying a further injection of cash from the public purse would be inevitable;
- (3) an industry figure said mega project financiers had a renewed focus on the Metro Tunnel in recent weeks, raising concerns the budget had blown out again;
- (4) in 2022, the Auditor-General released a report on the construction of the tunnel and stations, which noted that 98 per cent of the project's \$740 million contingency funding was used or allocated;
- (5) the West Gate Tunnel has blown out by \$3.9 billion, the Metro Tunnel has blown out by \$3.1 billion and the North East Link has blown out by \$10.1 billion;
- (6) Labor cannot manage money, cannot manage major projects and cannot stand up to the CFMEU bosses, and it is Victorian taxpayers that are paying the price;
- (7) the Auditor-General's report advised the Metro Tunnel project will not meet its September 2024 completion and the State will need to spend more to finish the project;

and calls on the Allan Government to be up-front with Victorians and tell the truth about how much extra taxpayer money will be put into the Metro Tunnel project.

492 RACHEL PAYNE — To move —

That this House notes that —

- (1) on 24 June 2024 the Government published their response to the findings of the Economy and Infrastructure Committee’s Inquiry into the industrial hemp industry in Victoria;
- (2) in their response, this Government —
 - (a) supported every one of the Committee’s recommendations, either in full or in principle, and left one under review;
 - (b) stated that they will investigate a standalone piece of legislation for industrial hemp, and we will hold them to account on this commitment;
- (3) this comes in the wake of debate on Legalise Cannabis Victoria’s Hemp Industry Bill 2024 and suggests that this Government will finally undertake to legislate a standalone Act on industrial hemp; and
- (4) this would not have been possible without the tireless advocacy of members of the Victorian hemp industry, to which we give our thanks.

493 DAVID DAVIS — To move —

That this House —

- (1) notes the Hamas attack on southern Israel on 7 October 2023, and the killings, rapes and destruction perpetrated by the Hamas terrorist organisation;
- (2) further notes that up to 111 hostages still remain in Gaza, held by Hamas, some known to be alive, who have now been held for 297 days, and some dead; and
- (3) calls on Hamas to immediately release all hostages.

496 EVAN MULHOLLAND — To move —

That this House —

- (1) expresses concern at the failures of Labor Ministers to act on the Construction, Forestry and Maritime Employees Union’s (CFMEU) misconduct on taxpayer funded major projects, including —
 - (a) the Premier’s refusal to take action against the CFMEU, introduce robust anti-consorting and bikie laws, or take significant steps to clean up the union until it became a national media crisis and threat to her leadership;
 - (b) the Hon. Sonya Kilkeny MP, Minister for Planning’s claim that she would pass on information about CFMEU’s bad behaviour to the Fair Work Ombudsman, but later admitted that she did not follow through on this promise;
 - (c) the Treasurer’s attendance as a guest of honour at a CFMEU-organised event in 2022, where the union boasted that billions of dollars of work would flow to members and affiliated builders, raising serious questions about the integrity of the Government;
 - (d) the Hon. Danny Pearson MP, Minister for the Suburban Rail Loop’s failure to act and refusal to confirm the extent he knew about allegations of standover tactics and intimidation by contractors working on the \$220 billion Suburban Rail Loop;

- (2) expresses concern that the CFMEU's criminal behaviour, including intimidation, extortion and violence, has been allowed to fester due to the inaction and complicity of these Labor Ministers;
- (3) calls on the Allan Labor Government to —
 - (a) instigate a Royal Commission into the CFMEU; and
 - (b) establish an independent watchdog to oversee union activities and ensure transparency and accountability in the management of public projects.

499 GEORGIE PURCELL — To move —

That this House notes that —

- (1) most greyhounds killed racing in Australia die in Victoria, with the current on-track death toll at 29, 15 more than any other state;
- (2) on 17 June 2024, Chessmen broke his leg and was killed at Warrnambool;
- (3) on 20 June 2024, Aston Javier broke his leg and was killed at Shepparton, and two days later Paw Kronos was killed at Geelong after snapping his femur;
- (4) on 24 June 2024, Pretty Reef broke both legs and was killed at Shepparton;
- (5) on 28 June 2024, Son of Brock was killed at Bendigo;
- (6) on 11 July 2024, Speed Merchant was killed at Warragul, and four days later Sam's Mullet was killed at Sandown after dislocating his leg;
- (7) on 26 July 2024, Mighty Innings broke his leg and was killed at Healesville;
- (8) more dogs have died unreported, with Coalition for the Protection of Greyhounds counting at least 20 more dogs killed after suffering horrific racing injuries;
- (9) at least 1,925 greyhounds have been injured on Victorian racetracks since the beginning of 2024;
- (10) there have been 345 major greyhound injuries on Victorian racetracks this year;
- (11) despite the Government's investments in safety improvements, dogs continue to die;
- (12) this month, the NSW Government confirmed an independent inquiry into greyhound racing following ongoing animal welfare concerns and a damning report by the former chief veterinary officer;

and calls on the Government to support an immediate inquiry into Victoria's greyhound racing industry.

500 DAVID DAVIS — To move —

That this House —

- (1) expresses its serious concern at the Hezbollah rocket attack on the Druze village of Majdal Shans on Saturday, 27 July 2024, which tragically killed 12 teenagers and children playing on a football field; and
- (2) calls on Hezbollah to desist from its rocket attacks on Israel, particularly civilians in the north of Israel and the Golan Heights.

That this House notes the ongoing chaos and performance failures within Ambulance Victoria under the Allan Labor Government, highlighted by —

- (2) hardworking paramedics have not been being paid accurately or on time;
- (3) ambulance response times continuing to fall short of the Government's own targets; and
- (4) ambulance ramping continues on a daily basis at hospitals across the state.

That this House notes that —

- (1) jumps racing is the deadliest sport, killing one in every 38 horses raced last year;
- (2) every one in ten horses fell during a race last year, sustaining serious injuries;
- (3) jumps racing is 20 times more deadly for horses than flat racing;
- (4) Victoria remains the only state in Australia that has not ceased jumps racing;
- (5) a total of nine horses have been killed during this jumps racing season with five dying on track, two in trails and two during trackwork;
- (6) San Remo, Grand Promenade, Rebel Racer, Sivar, Mont Agel, The Rattlin Bog, Fatigues, Joffrey and Rider in the Snow each suffered horrific falls before being killed by the industry;
- (7) the Government is not only funding but profiting off this cruel and dangerous racing industry;

and calls on the Government to get a grip and ban jumps racing.

507 SARAH MANSFIELD — To move —

That this House —

- (1) notes that waiting lists for public dental health services across Victoria are unacceptably long and growing;
- (2) recognises that failure to recruit and retain a public dental health workforce is a key contributor to long waiting times;
- (3) further notes that public oral health workers are amongst the lowest paid in public healthcare and Victorian wages are one of the lowest among all states and territories; and
- (4) acknowledges that oral health is an integral aspect of greater bodily health and has significant implications for general health and wellbeing.

That this House —

- (1) condemns Labor Party donor and factional boss Mr John Setka for —
 - (a) brazen corruption which has treated both government and private sector construction in this state as a means to enrich himself and his union mates;
 - (b) bullying and intimidation of small business owners, Indigenous labour firms and those who stood in his way;
- (2) notes that the Premier has been responsible for the Big Build for ten years and in that time has —
 - (a) wilfully ignored reports given to her and her ministers about the actions of the CFMEU;
 - (b) attempted to shirk responsibility by passing responsibility for this to the federal government and the now abolished Australian Building and Construction Commission;

- (3) further notes that on this Premier's watch infrastructure projects in Victoria have seen blowouts of over \$40 billion;
- (4) recognises that every taxpayer dollar wasted on union graft and corruption is a dollar not spent on helping hard-working Victorians get home to their families sooner and safer;
- (5) condemns the Premier for —
 - (a) choosing to enrich and back the CFMEU instead of fighting for Victorians;
 - (b) not using every power available to clean up the CFMEU mess, including but not limited to —
 - (i) establishing a Royal Commission into CFMEU misconduct on Victorian government projects; and
 - (ii) supporting the Liberal and Nationals' Government Construction Projects Integrity Bill 2024.

That this House —

- (1) condemns the Allan Labor Government for its appalling mismanagement of Gippsland's rail service;

 - (a) Gippsland rail commuters have experienced service disruption for ten years for no net benefit;
 - (b) the Gippsland rail upgrade has not delivered a more reliable rail service;
 - (c) the train commute between Traralgon and Flinders Street Station takes over 40 minutes longer than it did in 1984;
 - (d) the Gippsland rail line has failed to meet its punctuality target between August 2015 and June 2024, except in January 2023 when the train service was not operating; and
- (3) calls on the Government to improve V/Line's reliability and punctuality on the Traralgon and Bairnsdale Line and provide a rail service that Gippsland commuters deserve.

- (1) notes the findings of the RACV's 2024 *My Country Road* survey, involving 7,000 Victorians, that 64 per cent of Victorian motorists identified potholes and poor road conditions as the top safety issue and this has increased from 46 per cent just three years ago;
- (2) further notes —
 - (a) that the 2024-25 Budget reveals a 96 per cent reduction in the level of maintenance undertaken on regional roads in 2023-24;
 - (b) a 75 per cent reduction in the area resurfaced or rehabilitated statewide next year compared with two years ago;
 - (c) that the Government reduced spending on resurfacing contracts across the state by 81 per cent, falling from \$201.4 million to just \$37.6 million in the previous Budget;
- (3) calls on the Government to —
 - (a) immediately increase funding for road maintenance and resurfacing to address the deteriorating road network;
 - (b) prioritise road safety by addressing the backlog of repairs and upgrades, particularly in regional areas; and
 - (c) get back to doing the basics of road construction correctly.

That this House notes that —

- (1) Australia has a gambling addiction, contributing to \$25 billion in annual losses which is higher than any other country in the world on a per capita basis;
- (2) gambling contributes to some of the highest rates of financial loss, as well as poor mental health, animal abuse and neglect, family violence and even homelessness and suicide;

 and calls on the Government to support an immediate inquiry into Victoria's greyhound racing industry.
