

Achievements 2023-24

Growing prosperity by creating more opportunities for people through skills and jobs

Create jobs and attract investment

- Facilitated the creation of 5,378 jobs and capital expenditure of \$805 million in Victoria's economy
- Secured a 10-year partnership with BioNTech to establish a clinical-scale mRNA manufacturing facility at La Trobe University's Bundoora campus and BioNTech's mRNA Innovation Centre to enable commercialisation of local research
- Employed 2,000+ apprentices and trainees through Big Build Projects
- Hanwha Defence Australia secured the contract with the Australian Department of Defence to provide 129 Redback Infantry Fighting Vehicles. Over 1,000 jobs and \$170 million in capital expenditure will be created over the lifetime of Hanwha's projects in Geelong
- Engaged with 1,507 firms to support investment, innovation linkages and insights into areas such as energy transition, supply chain and digital technology

Identify and address current and future workforce needs

- Delivered the 2023-24 Victorian Skills Plan which identified actions for a more inclusive VET system which responds to both state-wide and regional skill challenges
- Extended eligibility of Free TAFE and governmentsubsidised training to increase accessibility of courses, skilling priority sectors and equitable access
- Negotiated and signed the National Skills Agreement with the Australian Government
- Nominated 3,300 skilled migrants including 650+ migrants for work in Victoria's health, social services and education sectors
- Supported 2,200+ workers through Digital Jobs and Digital Jobs for Manufacturing to develop specialist digital skills and move into jobs in the digital economy
- Advised 25,000+ Victorians on joining the workforce, transiting roles, starting training, reskilling or upskilling through Skills and Jobs Centres

Achievements 2023-24

Building the productive capacity of our economy to help businesses and industries thrive

Strengthen the business environment and develop key industries

- Opened the Cremorne Digital Hub to drive the growth of Victoria's digital innovation ecosystem, including launching the online Digital Talent Pathways Platform
- Supported Victorian supply chains by launching the Made in Victoria Steel Supply Chain Directory and delivering Timber Supply Chain Resilience Package
- Strengthened the Fair Jobs Code by lowering the application threshold to \$1m, and issued a further 2,225 Fair Jobs Code pre-assessment certificates
- Supported small businesses to start, develop and grow by providing free business advisory and capability building to 6,460+ participants, including 170 Small Business Bus visits statewide
- Commenced construction of Stage 2 of the Ballarat West Employment Zone, building on the 130 hectares of industrial land supplied to date

Strengthen Victoria's global connections

- Supported 2,816 Victorian businesses to engage in international markets and generated over \$1 billion in export sales for the state, including through the delivery of 21 trade missions globally
- Established \$10 million Food and Fibre Export Program, providing support for new and established food and fibre exporters to enter and expand in priority markets
- Implemented Victoria's International Education Recovery Plan 2025 through delivery of international student wellbeing and support programs, advocacy for international student employment outcomes and improved global connections across offshore markets
- Reinforced Victoria's global engagement and connections through 425 international engagements, including with the diplomatic corps, bilateral chambers of commerce and foreign delegations, in addition to supporting 217 women from 194 companies to increase their trade capabilities

Build prosperous and liveable regions and communities

- Progressed delivery of the Nyaal Banyul Geelong Convention and Event Centre Precinct and the Twelve Apostles Precinct Redevelopment project
- Improved regional sporting venues, completing the \$142 million redevelopment of Kardinia Park Stadium and commenced planning and delivery of 15 new and redeveloped community sports venues
- Completed the \$140 million transformation of the Geelong Arts Centre, now Australia's largest regional performing arts venue
- Jobs Victoria supported 1500+ people experiencing long term unemployment into work, and a further
 2,500+ people in earn and learn jobs
- Delivered 18 events for the Festival of Big Ideas, 700+ participants across industry, government, education sector and community to plan for Gippsland's future
- Introduced regulatory reforms as part of government's response to the Select Committee Inquiry into Victoria's Recreational Native Bird Hunting Arrangements

Enhance participation in the creative industries, sport and recreation

- Achieved record setting attendance across major sporting events, including 1+ million at the Australian Open, 452,000+ at the Formula 1 Grand Prix and 3+ million at the MCG over the 2023 AFL season
- Distributed more than 31,500 Get Active Kids Vouchers supporting Victorian families with the cost of children's sport
- Supported 119 organisations via Change Our Game Community Activation Grants to support women and girl's participation in sport and active recreation
- Awarded \$59+ million in funding to 96 community sport infrastructure projects
- Welcomed **11.2 million visitors** to Victoria's Creative Agencies
- Delivered 30+ live music events in flood-impacted regional communities, supporting community recovery and boosting local business and creative jobs
- Film, television and digital games projects supported through VicScreen generated \$331 million and 6,970 jobs for Victorians in 2023-24

Support Aboriginal Economic Development

- Introduced a full tuition fee waiver for Skills First training for Aboriginal Victorians, with 1,930 Aboriginal Victorians accessing the waiver since introduction
- Launched the Victorian First Peoples Art and Design Fair concept at the 2024 Melbourne Art Fair
- Supported Aboriginal businesses to attend trade missions and key domestic events through the Yuma Yirramboi Program's Events and International Trade initiatives
- Supported the function of the Yuma Yirramboi Council, which guides DJSIR's approach to Aboriginal economic development and identifies areas for future reform
- Supported 2 Registered Aboriginal Parties to identify their visitor economy priorities and develop tourism plans through the First Peoples Tourism Pilot
- Established the Victorian Aboriginal Sporting Partnership Working Group

Contribute to the transition to a net zero economy

- Progressed implementation of the CarbonNet project, including delivering the initial engineering to enable costing and design of the construction stage to inform final investment decisions, and planning, scheduling and regulatory actions
- Facilitated training of 450+ electricians in electric vehicle charging infrastructure installation
- Published the Training for the Clean Economy the TAFE Network Clean Economy Prospectus 2024 showcasing current TAFE delivery and opportunities for industry partnerships
- Delivered the New Energy Priority Workforce Project in partnership with Jobs Victoria, Solar Victoria and Maxima to create new entry level jobs in Gippsland for priority cohorts – having established relationships with 170+ employers and industry partners and placed 91 jobseekers into employment to date
