



Best Start, Best Life: Workforce Strategy

2023: Launched Best Start, Best Life Workforce Strategy

During 2023-24:

- More than 900 early childhood teaching scholarships awarded
- More than 300 upskilling educators studying through our Innovative Initial Teacher Education initiative graduated
- More than 650 experienced teachers participated in the Effective Mentoring Program to support early career teachers
- Almost 700 grants awarded to support provisionally registered early childhood teachers to progress to full registration





Attendance

Victorian government schools have the best overall (Years 1 to 10) school attendance rates and rank first for secondary school attendance and Aboriginal student attendance.

Victorian Year 3 students ranked first in reading and numeracy for third consecutive year



Victoria had the smallest, or second smallest proportion of students who need additional support in 17 out of 20 domains across Years 3, 5, 7 and 9.



Over 70% of Year 3 and nearly 80% of Year 5 students achieved in the 'strong' or 'exceeding' proficiency levels for Reading.

Improving outcomes for First Nations students


 There is more work needed to close the learning achievement gap between First Nations students and their non-First Nations peers, but First Nations students are improving their literacy skills


