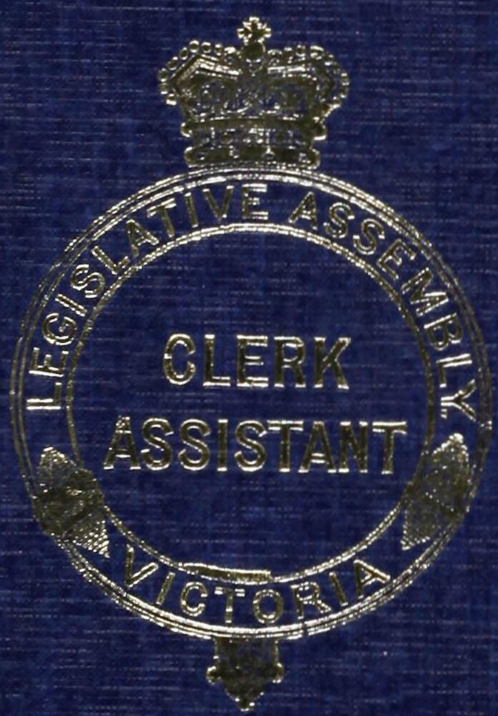

- ACTS INTERPRETATION:** Bill to amend the *Acts Interpretation Act 1958*—(Mr. Reid, Box Hill for Mr. Rylah).—Initiated and read a first time, 15 Sept., 1965, p. 13; motion, That this Bill be now read a second time—debate adjourned, 15 Sept., p. 13; debate resumed—Bill read a second time and passed remaining stages without amendment; concurrence of the Legislative Council desired, 22 Sept., p. 18; the Council's agreement notified, 5 Oct., p. 28. (Assented to 12 October, 1965. Act No. 7295.)
- ADMINISTRATION AND PROBATE (SURVIVING ACTIONS):** Bill to amend sub-section (3) of section 29 of the *Administration and Probate Act 1958* with respect to the survival of causes of action in tort against the estates of deceased persons—(Mr. Reid, Box Hill for Mr. Wilcox).—Initiated and read a first time, 15 Sept., 1965, p. 13; motion, That this Bill be now read a second time—debate adjourned, 15 Sept., p. 14; debate resumed—Bill read a second time and passed remaining stages without amendment; concurrence of the Legislative Council desired, 22 Sept., p. 18; the Council's agreement notified, 5 Oct., p. 28. (Assented to 12 October, 1965. Act No. 7296.)
- AERIAL SPRAYING CONTROL:** Bill intituled "An Act relating to the Spraying of Agricultural Chemicals from Aircraft and for incidental and other purposes"—(Mr. Balfour).—Brought from the Legislative Council and read a first time, 3 May, 1966, p. 129; motion, That this Bill be now read a second time—debate adjourned, 4 May, p. 131; debate resumed—Bill read a second time and passed remaining stages without amendment, 10 May, p. 138. (Assented to 17 May, 1966. Act No. 7403.)
- AGRICULTURAL COLLEGES (CADETSHIPS):** Bill to amend the *Agricultural Colleges Act 1958* with respect to the provision of cadetships for certain students, and for other purposes—(Mr. Balfour).—Initiated and read a first time, 15 Sept., 1965, p. 13; motion, That this Bill be now read a second time—debate adjourned, 22 Sept., p. 18; debate resumed—Bill read a second time and passed remaining stages without amendment; concurrence of the Legislative Council desired, 19 Oct., p. 40; the Council's agreement notified, 26 Oct., p. 47. (Assented to 3 November, 1965. Act No. 7302.)
- ALBERT PARK LANDS:** Bill relating to certain lands at Albert Park in the Cities of South Melbourne and St. Kilda—(Mr. Balfour).—Initiated and read a first time, 12 Oct., 1965, p. 31; motion, That this Bill be now read a second time—debate adjourned, 13 Oct., p. 34; debate resumed—Bill read a second time and passed remaining stages without amendment; concurrence of the Legislative Council desired, 20 Oct., p. 42; the Council's agreement notified, 17 Nov., p. 62. (Assented to 23 November, 1965. Act No. 7309.)
- APPRENTICESHIP (AMENDMENT):** Bill to amend the *Apprenticeship Act 1958*, and for other purposes—(Mr. Reid, Box Hill).—Initiated and read a first time, 15 Sept., 1965, p. 13; motion, That this Bill be now read a second time—debate adjourned, 22 Sept., p. 18; debate resumed—Bill read a second time and passed remaining stages without amendment; concurrence of the Legislative Council desired, 9 Nov., p. 52; the Council's agreement notified, 17 Nov., p. 62. (Assented to 23 November, 1965. Act No. 7312.)
- APPROPRIATION:** Bill to apply a sum out of the Consolidated Revenue to the service of the year ending on 30th June, 1966 and to appropriate the Supplies granted in this and the last preceding Session of Parliament—(Mr. Rylah).—Initiated on resolution from Committee of Ways and Means and passed without amendment; concurrence of the Legislative Council desired, 2 Dec., 1965, p. 80; the Council's agreement notified, 1 March, 1966, p. 92. (Assented to 21 December, 1965. Act No. 7371.)
- AUDIT (AMENDMENT):** Bill to amend the *Audit Act 1958*, and for other purposes—(Sir Henry Bolte).—Initiated and read a first time, 2 March, 1966, p. 95; motion, That this Bill be now read a second time—debate adjourned, 2 March, p. 96; debate resumed—Bill read a second time and passed remaining stages without amendment; concurrence of the Legislative Council desired, 15 March, p. 100; the Council's agreement to the Bill with an amendment notified, 30 March, p. 108; amendment considered and agreed to, 5 April, p. 112. (Assented to 14 April, 1966. Act No. 7377.)
- BARLEY MARKETING (AMENDMENT):** Bill intituled "An Act to provide for the Furnishing of certain Information under the 'Barley Marketing Act 1958', to increase Penalties under and extend the Duration of that Act, and for other purposes"—(Mr. Balfour).—Brought from the Legislative Council and read a first time, 3 May, 1966, p. 129; motion, That this Bill be now read a second time—debate adjourned, 4 May, p. 131; debate resumed—Bill read a second time and passed remaining stages without amendment, 10 May, p. 138. (Assented to 17 May, 1966. Act No. 7397.)
- BOILERS INSPECTION (AMENDMENT):** Bill to amend the *Boilers Inspection Act 1958*—(Mr. Reid, Box Hill for Mr. Wilcox).—Initiated and read a first time, 6 April, 1966, p. 113; motion, That this Bill be now read a second time—debate adjourned, 19 April, p. 117; debate resumed—Bill read a second time and committed; considered in Committee, 27 April, p. 126; further considered in Committee and reported without

amendment; Bill read the third time; concurrence of the Legislative Council desired, 3 May, p. 128; the Council's agreement notified, 11 May, p. 141. (*Assented to 17 May, 1966. Act No. 7413.*)

CARLTON (RECREATION GROUND) LAND: Bill to authorize the granting of leases of certain land at Carlton in the City of Melbourne permanently reserved as a site for a public park, and for other purposes—(*Mr. Balfour*).—Initiated, by leave, and read a first time, 19 April, 1966, p. 115; order for second reading read; Bill ruled a Private Bill; motion, by leave, That all the Private Bill Standing Orders be dispensed with and that this Bill be treated as a Public Bill—agreed to; motion, That this Bill be now read a second time—debate adjourned, 19 April, p. 117; debate resumed—Bill read a second time and passed remaining stages without amendment; concurrence of the Legislative Council desired, 26 April, p. 122; the Council's agreement notified, 11 May, p. 141. (*Assented to 17 May, 1966. Act No. 7412.*)

COLLUSIVE PRACTICES: Bill intituled "*An Act to prohibit certain Trade Practices and for other purposes*"—(*Mr. Rylah*).—Brought from the Legislative Council and read a first time, 1 Dec., 1965, p. 75; motion, That this Bill be now read a second time—debate adjourned, 1 Dec., p. 75; debate resumed—Bill read a second time and passed remaining stages without amendment, 8 Dec., p. 86. (*Assented to 14 December, 1965. Act No. 7353.*)

COMMITTEES (AMENDMENT): Bill to authorize the Public Works Committee and the State Development Committee to sit in places outside Victoria—(*Mr. Rylah*).—Initiated, by leave, and read a first time, 1 Dec., 1965, p. 74; Bill read a second time and passed remaining stages without amendment; concurrence of the Legislative Council desired, 1 Dec., p. 75; the Council's agreement notified, 2 Dec., p. 76. (*Assented to 7 December, 1965. Act No. 7329.*)

COMPANIES: Bill to amend the *Companies Act 1961* and for other purposes—(*Mr. Rylah*).—Initiated, by leave, and read a first time, 15 March, 1966, p. 99; motion, That this Bill be now read a second time—debate adjourned, 23 March, p. 106; debate resumed—Bill read a second time and committed; considered in Committee and reported with an amendment; as amended, considered and amendment agreed to; Bill read the third time; concurrence of the Legislative Council desired, 6 April, p. 113; the Council's agreement notified, 3 May, p. 127. (*Assented to 10 May, 1966. Act No. 7391.*)

COMPANIES (DEFAULTING OFFICERS): Bill intituled "*An Act to make provision with respect to the Examination of Officers of Companies to facilitate the Taking of Action against certain Officers, and for other purposes*"—(*Mr. Stoneham*).—Brought from the Legislative Council and read a first time, 27 April, 1966, p. 125.—Bill lapsed.

CONSOLIDATED REVENUE (BILL No. 1): Bill to apply out of the Consolidated Revenue the sum of £46,228,120 to the service of the year 1965–66—(*Mr. Rylah*).—Initiated on resolution from Committee of Ways and Means and passed without amendment; concurrence of the

Legislative Council desired, 21 Sept., 1965, p. 17; the Council's agreement notified, 29 Sept., p. 23. (*Assented to 30 September, 1965. Act No. 7294.*)

CONSOLIDATED REVENUE (BILL No. 2): Bill to apply out of the Consolidated Revenue the sum of £1,561,611 to the service of the year 1964–65—(*Mr. Bolte*).—Initiated on resolution from Committee of Ways and Means and passed without amendment; concurrence of the Legislative Council desired, 2 Dec., 1965, p. 78; the Council's agreement notified, 1 March, 1966, p. 92. (*Assented to 21 December, 1965. Act No. 7370.*)

CONSOLIDATED REVENUE (BILL No. 3): Bill to apply out of the Consolidated Revenue the sum of \$92,891,320 to the service of the year 1966–67—(*Mr. Rylah*).—Initiated on resolution from Committee of Ways and Means and passed without amendment; concurrence of the Legislative Council desired, 27 April, 1966, p. 124; the Council's agreement notified, 5 May, p. 132. (*Assented to 10 May, 1966. Act No. 7394.*)

CONSOLIDATED REVENUE (BILL No. 4): Bill to apply out of the Consolidated Revenue the sum of \$2,523,376 to the service of the year 1965–66—(*Mr. Balfour*).—Initiated on resolution from Committee of Ways and Means and passed without amendment; concurrence of the Legislative Council desired, 5 May, 1966, p. 136; the Council's agreement notified, 12 May, p. 143. (*Assented to 24 May, 1966. Act No. 7428.*)

CO-OPERATION (AMENDMENT): Bill to amend sections 69, 94, 95 and 96 of the *Co-operation Act 1958*—(*Sir Henry Bolte*).—Initiated and read a first time, 2 March, 1966, p. 95; motion, That this Bill be now read a second time—debate adjourned, 2 March, p. 96; debate resumed—Bill read a second time and committed; Message from His Excellency the Governor (No. 32) recommending an appropriation from the Consolidated Revenue for the purposes of the Bill; considered in Committee; resolution reported and agreed to; Bill considered in Committee and reported without amendment; Bill read the third time; concurrence of the Legislative Council desired, 15 March, p. 100–1; the Council's agreement notified, 29 March, p. 108. (*Assented to 5 April, 1966. Act No. 7374.*)

CO-OPERATIVE HOUSING SOCIETIES (AMENDMENT): Bill to amend section 59 of the *Co-operative Housing Societies Act 1958*—(*Mr. Manson*).—Initiated, by leave, and read a first time, 2 March, 1966, p. 96; motion, That this Bill be now read a second time—debate adjourned, 2 March, p. 96; debate resumed—Bill read a second time and passed remaining stages without amendment; concurrence of the Legislative Council desired, 5 April, p. 111; the Council's agreement notified, 3 May, p. 127. (*Assented to 10 May, 1966. Act No. 7388.*)

COUNTRY FIRE AUTHORITY (BORROWING POWERS): Bill to amend sub-section (2) of section 82 of the *Country Fire Authority Act 1958*—(*Mr. Rylah*).—Message from His Excellency the Governor (No. 31) recommending an appropriation from the Consolidated Revenue for the purposes of the Bill; considered in Committee;

resolution reported and agreed to and Bill ordered thereupon; Bill initiated and read a first time, 15 March, 1966, p. 100; motion, That this Bill be now read a second time—debate adjourned, 10 March, p. 102; debate resumed—Bill read a second time and passed remaining stages without amendment; concurrence of the Legislative Council desired, 5 April, p. 112; the Council's agreement notified, 26 April, p. 122. (Assented to 3 May, 1966. Act No. 7383.)

COUNTRY FIRE AUTHORITY (INTERSTATE FIRE BRIGADES): Bill to enable interstate fire brigades to assist in fire fighting operations in Victoria, and for other purposes—(Mr. Rylah).—Initiated, by leave, and read a first time, 22 March, 1966, p. 103; motion, That this Bill be now read a second time—debate adjourned, 23 March, p. 105; debate resumed—Bill read a second time and committed; considered in Committee and reported with an amendment; as amended, considered and amendment agreed to; Bill read the third time; concurrence of the Legislative Council desired, 5 April, p. 112; the Council's agreement notified, 27 April, p. 125. (Assented to 3 May, 1966. Act No. 7386.)

COUNTRY FIRE AUTHORITY (SERVICE OF NOTICES): Bill to amend section 41 of the *Country Fire Authority Act 1958* and for other purposes—(Mr. Rylah).—Initiated and read a first time, 10 Nov., 1965, p. 55; motion, That this Bill be now read a second time—debate adjourned, 10 Nov., p. 56; debate resumed—Bill read a second time and passed remaining stages without amendment; concurrence of the Legislative Council desired, 17 Nov., p. 61; the Council's agreement notified, 30 Nov., p. 72. (Assented to 7 December, 1965. Act No. 7318.)

COUNTRY ROADS (CADETSHIPS): Bill to amend the *Country Roads Act 1958* by making provision with respect to the granting of cadetships to certain students, and for other purposes—(Mr. Balfour).—Initiated and read a first time, 25 Nov., 1965, p. 69; motion, That this Bill be now read a second time—debate adjourned, 25 Nov., p. 70; debate resumed—Bill read a second time and committed; Message from His Excellency the Governor (No. 25) recommending an appropriation from the Consolidated Revenue for the purposes of the Bill; considered in Committee; resolution reported and agreed to; Bill considered in Committee and reported without amendment; Bill read the third time; concurrence of the Legislative Council desired, 1 Dec., pp. 74–5; the Council's agreement notified, 7 Dec., p. 86. (Assented to 14 December, 1965. Act No. 7347.)

COUNTRY ROADS (COLLECTION COSTS): Bill to amend section 39 of the *Country Roads Act 1958* and section 41 of the *Transport Regulation Act 1958*—(Mr. Meagher).—Initiated and read a first time, 29 Sept., 1965, p. 23; motion, That this Bill be now read a second time—debate adjourned, 5 Oct., p. 26; debate resumed—Bill read a second time and passed remaining stages without amendment; concurrence of the Legislative Council desired, 9 Nov., p. 52; the Council's agreement notified, 25 Nov., p. 69. (Assented to 30 November, 1965. Act No. 7313.)

COUNTY COURT (COMMON LAW JURISDICTION): Bill intituled "*An Act to amend section 37 of the 'County Court Act 1958'*"—(Mr. Wilcox).—Brought from the Legislative Council and

read a first time, 3 May, 1966, p. 127; motion, That this Bill be now read a second time—debate adjourned, 3 May, p. 128; debate resumed and adjourned, 11 May, p. 141; debate continued—Bill read a second time, on division, and passed remaining stages without amendment, 11 May, p. 142. (Assented to 24 May, 1966. Act No. 7420.)

CRIMES (DANGEROUS DRIVING): Bill to amend section 318 of the *Crimes Act 1958*—(Mr. Rylah).—Initiated and read a first time, 2 March, 1966, p. 95; motion, That this Bill be now read a second time—debate adjourned, 2 March, p. 96; debate resumed and adjourned, 22 March, p. 104; debate continued—Bill read a second time and committed; considered in Committee and reported with amendments; as amended, considered and amendments agreed to; Bill read the third time; concurrence of the Legislative Council desired, 23 March, p. 106; the Council's agreement to the Bill with amendments notified, 3 May, p. 128; amendments considered and agreed to, 10 May, p. 139. (Assented to 17 May, 1966. Act No. 7407.)

CUL-DE-SAC APPLICATIONS: Bill intituled "*An Act to make Provision with respect to Applications under Division Six of Part IV. of the 'Transfer of Land Act 1958' and Matters arising out of those Applications, and for other purposes*"—(Mr. Rylah).—Brought from the Legislative Council and read a first time, 30 Nov., 1965, p. 73; motion, That this Bill be now read a second time—debate adjourned, 1 Dec., p. 74; debate resumed—Bill read a second time and committed; considered in Committee, 7 Dec., p. 84; further considered in Committee and reported without amendment; Bill read the third time, 7 Dec., p. 84. (Assented to 14 December, 1965. Act No. 7334.)

DAYLESFORD SPRINGS LAND: Bill relating to certain land at Daylesford permanently reserved as a site for mineral springs and an ornamental lake and for the recreation convenience and amusement of the people, and for other purposes—(Mr. Balfour).—Initiated, by leave, and read a first time, 22 March, 1966, p. 104; motion, That this Bill be now read a second time—debate adjourned, 23 March, p. 105; debate resumed—Bill read a second time and passed remaining stages without amendment; concurrence of the Legislative Council desired, 6 April, p. 113; the Council's agreement notified, 5 May, p. 134. (Assented to 10 May, 1966. Act No. 7396.)

DECIMAL CURRENCY: Bill to amend the law of Victoria in consequence of the adoption of decimal currency in Australia, to make provision for carrying the adoption thereof into effect in Victoria, and for other purposes—(Mr. Bolte).—Message from His Excellency the Governor (No. 1) recommending an appropriation from the Consolidated Revenue for the purposes of the Bill; considered in Committee; resolution reported and agreed to and Bill ordered thereupon; Bill initiated and read a first time, 14 Sept., 1965, p. 11; motion, That this Bill be now read a second time—debate adjourned, 22 Sept., p. 18; debate resumed—Bill read a second time with the concurrence of an absolute majority of the whole number of Members of the Legislative Assembly and committed, 26 Oct., p. 44.

- DECIMAL CURRENCY.**—House resolved itself into the Committee of Ways and Means; resolution fixing decimal currency equivalents of existing charges reported and agreed to, 26 Oct., pp. 45–6.

- DRIED FRUITS (AMENDMENT):** Bill intituled "*An Act to amend the 'Dried Fruits Act 1958' to determine and clarify the Interpretation of certain Dried Fruits, to refix certain Penalties and for purposes consequential thereto*"—(*Mr. Balfour*).—Brought from the Legislative Council and read a first time, 17 Nov., 1965, p. 62; motion, That this Bill be now read a second time—debate adjourned, 18 Nov., p. 63; debate resumed—Bill read a second time and passed remaining stages without amendment, 7 Dec., p. 84. (*Assented to 14 December, 1965. Act No. 7337.*)
- ECHUCA STOCKYARDS RAILWAY CONSTRUCTION:** Bill to authorize the construction of a line of railway to connect the railway from Melbourne to the River Murray with stockyards at Echuca and for other purposes—(*Mr. Meagher*).—Initiated and read a first time, 15 Sept., 1965, p. 13; motion, That this Bill be now read a second time—debate adjourned, 15 Sept., p. 14; debate resumed—Bill read a second time and passed remaining stages without amendment; concurrence of the Legislative Council desired, 22 Sept., p. 18; the Council's agreement notified, 9 Nov., p. 53. (*Assented to 16 November, 1965. Act No. 7306.*)
- EDUCATION (COUNCIL OF ADULT EDUCATION):** Bill to amend sub-section (3) of section 66 of the *Education Act 1958*—(*Mr. Rossiter*).—Initiated and read a first time, 2 March, 1966, p. 96; motion, That this Bill be now read a second time—debate adjourned, 2 March, p. 96; debate resumed—Bill read a second time and passed remaining stages without amendment; concurrence of the Legislative Council desired, 16 March, p. 102; the Council's agreement notified, 29 March, p. 107. (*Assented to 5 April, 1966. Act No. 7372.*)
- ELECTRIC LIGHT AND POWER (INTERSTATE SUPPLIES):** Bill intituled "*An Act to make Provision with respect to the Supply of Electricity in Victoria by Local Government Authorities and other Corporate Bodies in New South Wales and South Australia*"—(*Mr. Reid, Box Hill*).—Brought from the Legislative Council and read a first time, 5 Oct., 1965, p. 27; motion, That this Bill be now read a second time—debate adjourned, 6 Oct., p. 28; debate resumed—Bill read a second time and passed remaining stages without amendment, 12 Oct., p. 32. (*Assented to 19 October, 1965. Act No. 7298.*)
- ESTATE AGENTS (AMENDMENT):** Bill to amend the *Estate Agents Act 1958*—(*Mr. Rylah*).—Initiated and read a first time, 30 March, 1966, p. 108; motion, That this Bill be now read a second time—debate adjourned, 19 April, p. 117; debate resumed—Bill read a second time and passed remaining stages without amendment; concurrence of the Legislative Council desired, 4 May, p. 131; the Council's agreement notified, 12 May, p. 143. (*Assented to 24 May, 1966. Act No. 7425.*)
- EVIDENCE (AMENDMENT):** Bill to amend the *Evidence Act 1958* and sections 29 and 35 of the *Coroners Act 1958*—(*Mr. Wilcox*).—Initiated and read a first time, 10 Nov., 1965, p. 55; motion, That this Bill be now read a second time—debate adjourned, 11 Nov., p. 57; debate resumed—Bill read a second time and committed; considered in Committee and reported with an amendment; as amended, considered and amendment agreed to; Bill read the third time; concurrence of the Legislative Council desired, 30 Nov., p. 72; the Council's agreement notified, 1 March, 1966, p. 92. (*Assented to 21 December, 1965. Act No. 7366.*)
- EVIDENCE (MEDICAL EVIDENCE):** Bill intituled "*An Act to amend Section Twenty-eight of the 'Evidence Act 1958'*"—(*Mr. Wilcox*).—Brought from the Legislative Council and read a first time, 3 May, 1966, p. 127; motion, That this Bill be now read a second time—debate adjourned, 3 May, p. 128; debate resumed—Bill read a second time and passed remaining stages without amendment, 11 May, p. 141. (*Assented to 24 May, 1966. Act No. 7418.*)
- EVIDENCE (REPRODUCTIONS):** Bill to amend the *Evidence Act 1958* to facilitate the use of reproductions of documents as evidence and for purposes connected therewith—(*Mr. Wilcox*).—Initiated and read a first time, 19 Oct., 1965, p. 39; motion, That this Bill be now read a second time—debate adjourned, 19 Oct., p. 39; debate resumed—Bill read a second time and passed remaining stages without amendment; concurrence of the Legislative Council desired, 9 Nov., p. 52; the Council's agreement notified, 1 Dec., p. 76. (*Assented to 7 December, 1965. Act No. 7324.*)
- EXTRACTIVE INDUSTRIES:** Bill relating to extractive industries and for other purposes—(*Mr. Darcy*).—Initiated and read a first time, 11 May, 1966, p. 140; motion, That this Bill be now read a second time—debate adjourned, 11 May, p. 142.—Bill lapsed.
- FIREARMS (AMENDMENT):** Bill to amend the *Firearms Act 1958*—(*Mr. Reid, Box Hill for Mr. Rylah*).—Initiated and read a first time, 15 Sept., 1965, p. 13, motion, That this Bill be now read a second time—debate adjourned, 15 Sept., p. 13.
- STATUTE LAW REVISION COMMITTEE.**—Motion, by leave, that the proposals contained in the *Firearms (Amendment) Bill* be referred to the Statute Law Revision Committee for examination and report—agreed to, 15 Sept., p. 13; report presented, 28 Sept., p. 21.
- Bill withdrawn, 9 Dec., p. 88.

HIS EXCELLENCY THE GOVERNOR’S SPEECH.—Mr. Speaker reported that the House had, that day, attended His Excellency the Governor in the Legislative Council Chamber, when His Excellency was pleased to make a Speech to both Houses of Parliament, of which Speech Mr. Speaker had, for greater accuracy, obtained a copy as follows:—

MR. PRESIDENT AND HONORABLE MEMBERS OF THE LEGISLATIVE COUNCIL:

MR. SPEAKER AND MEMBERS OF THE LEGISLATIVE ASSEMBLY:

You have been summoned to meet to-day to give consideration to important business of concern to the citizens of the State.

Indeed the Parliament is meeting at a time of great expectation arising from the discovery of reserves of natural gas off our coastline, and you will shortly be called upon to consider legislation relating to the development of this new source of fuel and power, and moreover of wealth. This discovery is possibly of as great economic importance to this State as was the discovery of gold over one hundred years ago.

My advisers, recognizing the implications of this discovery, have deemed it advisable to prepare legislation which will provide for the establishment of an office of Minister for Fuel and Power. It will be the duty of this Minister to co-ordinate the development and best use of all the resources of fuel and power available to Victoria.

At present officers of the Public Service are overseas examining problems associated with the development of natural gas resources in other countries so that we may be properly equipped to exploit our own gas fields with a minimum of delay and the maximum efficiency.

During the Parliamentary recess, Ministers of the Crown and other Members of this Parliament visited overseas countries and so extended their knowledge of trends in those countries and of the action being taken to resolve problems akin to our own.

Since the beginning of the previous Session we, in turn, have been honoured by a visit from Their Royal Highnesses the Duke and Duchess of Gloucester and I am proud to record that the people of Victoria again demonstrated their abiding loyalty to the Throne and their affection for the Royal Family by the warmth of the welcome given to Their Royal Highnesses.

It is with profound regret that I refer to the passing of the Honorable Sir Gordon McArthur, M.L.C., and the Honorable A. J. Fraser, M.C., M.L.A., each of whom rendered valuable service as a Member of this Parliament and as a Minister of the Crown. Sir Gordon McArthur will be remembered particularly for his service as the President of the Legislative Council.

It should be a matter of great pride to all Victorians that the people of this State contributed so generously to alleviate the distress and hardship caused by drought conditions in Queensland, New South Wales and East Gippsland. The Government records its gratitude to the people for this gesture and particularly to those who organized and contributed to "Operation Goodwill".

Fortunately, Victoria escaped the worst ravages of the drought and milk production for the year was again at record levels. Stock populations also increased and at the 31st March of this year, the number of grazing animals in this State was at the all-time record of 30,437,000 sheep and 3,316,000 cattle. These figures reflect improvements in stock and pasture management as well as the adoption of fodder conservation policies fostered by the Department of Agriculture.

An expansion of the research and extension work in these important aspects of our economy is planned.

Wheat production in 1964-65 was approximately 78 million bushels. This eclipsed the previous record of 76.3 million bushels established in the 1963-64 season.

Rainfall in the cereal districts although late has been satisfactory. The planned area of crop, some 3.3 million acres, has been sown and another high yield is possible if reasonable spring rains are received.

Good progress has been made on the Government's ten year dam construction programme and the Buffalo River Dam, commenced in May, 1964, is nearing completion and will be fully operative in the coming summer. Bellfield Dam in the Grampians will be completed early next year.

Completion of the Devilbend Dam in the Mornington Peninsula enabled the very large summer demand for water in the bayside towns from Dromana to Portsea to be met without the need for restrictions.

During the last financial year sixteen new town water supplies came into operation and the Geelong Waterworks Trust completed the West Barwon Dam which will provide additional water for the rapidly growing Geelong area.

My advisers are aware of the considerable demand which still exists for rural Crown Lands. While having regard to requirements for forests, water supply and other public purposes, the Government will continue to investigate the release of Crown Land which, for various reasons, has not been considered suitable for settlement in the past.

In continuance of the policy of ensuring that home seekers are assisted in every way, building blocks are being made available by the Housing Commission to young couples and to private builders on such terms and conditions as offer a real assistance to a low-income purchaser.

There is a continuing demand for the sale of Housing Commission houses and up to the 30th June last 20,500 houses had been sold.

The Commission has, in recent years, concentrated its metropolitan activity on slum reclamation. In the redevelopment of slum areas special emphasis is placed on the provision of open spaces to ensure that adequate recreational facilities are available for the younger generation.

The number of full-time pupils in all types of State schools this year has for the first time passed the half million mark. The increase in enrolments is being more than matched by the increase in the number of teachers, and staffing ratios to class sizes are improving each year.

Despite our heavy commitments at home, Victoria continues to provide teachers on loan to the Territory of Papua and New Guinea, and to Nauru, and to provide experts on teacher training to Commonwealth States in Africa. Each year groups of educationists from these States come to Australia for special courses and for tours of observation. In this, too, Victoria is doing her full share.

The Victoria Institute of Colleges has been established and the Interim Council is meeting regularly in its work of co-ordinating the work at tertiary level of technical colleges and other non-university tertiary institutions.

Extensions to Monash University are under construction and planning is well advanced for the early buildings at La Trobe University.

Works to meet the needs of education are again foremost in the current building programme, with major new schools in course of construction or to be built at Brunswick, Prahran, Flemington, and Bendigo. Science laboratories are being erected at numerous centres.

Other building projects in hand include the erection of new wards and extension of existing buildings for the Mental Health Authority, a proposed new Civil and Criminal Court building, a Fish and Wildlife Research Institute at Heidelberg, the Institute of Dairy Technology at Werribee, and a new office block at the Police Headquarters.

The Government has approved of the building of State Public Offices at Bairnsdale.

Work on the State Public Offices in the Treasury Reserve is proceeding according to programme. A combined laboratory and car-park building to accommodate approximately 200 vehicles will be erected within the same area.

The development of the port at Westernport for the accommodation of tankers of up to 100,000 tons is on schedule.

The demand for electric power continues to increase rapidly and the State Electricity Commission is involved in an immense programme of capital works designed to keep pace with the demand. Along with these major power developments there will naturally be considerable expansion of the main transmission and transformation grid. This will include the construction within the next five years of two 500,000 volt transmission lines between the Hazelwood power station and the metropolitan area.

Work on the second 330,000 volt transmission line linking Victoria's supply system with the Snowy Mountains Hydro-Electric Scheme has now commenced. It is scheduled for completion in 1967.

Over the past twelve months some 4,000 farms were connected to the State electricity supply system.

Railway traffic in the last financial year was a record. Interstate rail traffic was particularly buoyant. The total traffic carried on the Melbourne-Albury standard-gauge line amounted to nearly 1½ million tons, compared with just under one million tons in the first year of operation of the line. On the Melbourne-Adelaide line, it was necessary, during the year, to introduce a second daily express freight train to handle the tonnage offering.

That portion of the Princes Gate Project comprising the rearrangement and lowering of Princes Bridge Station and construction of the concrete deck and plaza, will be completed this financial year.

In pursuance of the Government's policy of expanding the electrified rail service as housing development proceeds, the one mile section of line between Lalor and Epping was re-opened and electrified and service to Epping was provided in November, 1964.

Outstanding devotion to duty was displayed by permanent and volunteer fire fighters last summer. They were untiring in their efforts and my Government desires to place on record its appreciation of the valuable services they rendered to the State in a time of emergency.

The Government is currently examining ways and means of providing better equipment and better organizational procedures to improve fire-fighting techniques in this State.

A permanent Chairman of the Country Fire Authority has now been appointed.

To reduce the considerable loss of timber sustained in forest fires, the Forests Commission is investigating and implementing modern techniques in forest fire fighting.

Pine plantations will be increased by nearly 6,000 acres this year. These plantations at present provide over 9 per cent. of the total output of saw-logs from State Forests.

To combat the heavy toll of the road in Victoria, the State-wide law enforcement drives now being conducted regularly will be intensified.

The new system of "on-the-spot" Traffic Infringement Notices will enable members of the Police Force to devote more time to road traffic duties.

Special road projects to be constructed in both the metropolitan area and on State Highways will also contribute to greater safety in motoring.

Grade separation work at busy level crossings will be continued by the Railways Department in conjunction with the Country Roads Board. Of the four principal projects expected to be completed during the year, three are located in the country and one in the metropolitan area. Work will be commenced or land acquired at seven other crossings during the year.

Whilst the Government is doing its utmost to promote safer motoring it nevertheless acknowledges that fundamentally the solution of the problem of road safety rests with the people themselves; in their attitude towards driving and in their observance of the laws of this Parliament.

The Government is planning to bring the Adoption Act into operation on 15th January, 1966. New regulations have been prepared and training of personnel is proceeding to enable this to be done.

All sections of the *Social Welfare Act* 1960 became operative as from 1st July, 1965. This signifies great progress in the provision of facilities for treatment of youthful offenders in youth training centres.

The Malmsbury Youth Training Centre is under construction and staff and some trainees have moved in.

The expansion of mental health services is continuing. Work will proceed on an early treatment centre at Bendigo; a building at Shepparton has been purchased for the establishment of a Goulburn Valley regional service and additional accommodation at Stawell, Kew Cottages and Janefield is being provided for mentally retarded children.

Treatment facilities for tuberculosis will be extended by the opening of a new Tuberculosis Clinic in Coburg.

Facilities for the training of medical practitioners are being increased. Extensions at the Royal Melbourne Hospital and the Queen Victoria Memorial Hospital will be followed by the provision of lecture rooms and other facilities at Prince Henry's Hospital and the establishment of a medical school at the Austin Hospital.

The hospital needs of country districts are being met by additional building works at various centres.

MR. SPEAKER AND MEMBERS OF THE LEGISLATIVE ASSEMBLY :

Detailed Estimates of Revenue for the financial year 1965-66 will be presented to you, together with the Supply Bill to make further provision for the Services for the year 1965-66.

Supplementary Estimates for the year 1964-65 will be submitted to you.

MR. PRESIDENT AND HONORABLE MEMBERS OF THE LEGISLATIVE COUNCIL :

MR. SPEAKER AND MEMBERS OF THE LEGISLATIVE ASSEMBLY :

Legislation covering a wide range of subjects will be submitted for your consideration.

Decimal Currency legislation complementary with that of the Commonwealth and the other States will be presented to provide for the introduction of decimal currency on the 14th February, 1966.

A Bill increasing the membership of the Apprenticeship Commission so as to afford wider representation of the various industrial interests to which apprenticeship is a matter of vital concern will be introduced.

You will be asked to consider amendments to the Motor Car Act to remove the limit of £2,000 under Third Party Insurance contracts in relation to passengers injured by the use of a motor car.

The Government proposes, this session, to begin a comprehensive revision of the Local Government Act. In addition, there will be a Bill incorporating further amendments to the Act to make it a more effective instrument in the expanding field of local government.

The Government intends to submit legislation to authorize the design and construction by a non-profit company, of a crossing over the Yarra River at Spotswood to link the western suburbs with the Melbourne area.

It is proposed to submit a Bill to amend the Melbourne Harbor Trust Act. This Bill will incorporate amendments arising from the recommendations of the Public Accounts Committee report of September, 1964.

The Government will place before you legislation to amend the Police Offences Act by creating a number of separate Acts dealing with the provisions of the present Act.

Other legislation to be submitted will relate to:—

petroleum prices; the activities of commercial agents, debt collectors and business agents; third party insurance; breaches of the Motor Car Act and the Road Traffic Act; appeals under the Town Planning Act; valuation of land; and the naming of places in Victoria.

In leaving you to the consideration of the matters I have outlined and others which will be placed before you I pray that the guidance of Almighty God will attend upon your deliberations.

- (3) by the Totalizator Agency Board from that part of the commission deducted by the Board from moneys derived from off-course doubles totalizators on races in Victoria seventeen fiftieths of the said part until the Treasurer certifies that such payment is no longer necessary to be paid into a trust account in the Treasury and applied for or towards recouping racing clubs for their contributions to the payment of the expenses of establishing the Board and thereafter nine twenty-fifths of the said part ;
- (4) by the Totalizator Agency Board from that part of the commission deducted by the Board from moneys derived from off-course doubles totalizators on interstate races seventeen fiftieths of the said part until the Treasurer certifies that such payment is no longer necessary to be paid into a trust account in the Treasury and applied for or towards recouping racing clubs for their contributions to the payment of the expenses of establishing the Board and thereafter nine twenty-fifths of the said part.

“AA. (1) A person other than a registered psychologist shall not except with the consent in writing of the Minister advertise—

- (a) that he is skilled in the practice of psychology ;
- (b) that he is willing to practise psychology ;
- (c) that he is competent to teach the practice of psychology ;
- (d) that he is willing to instruct in the practice of psychology ; or
- (e) that he seeks or requires human subjects for any investigation or research involving the practice of psychology.

(2) In this section “advertise” includes the publication of any statement or claim in any newspaper notice hand-bill pamphlet card or circular and the broadcasting of any statement or claim by means of radio television or cinematograph.

Penalty : \$500.”

(a) to any applicant who is not in receipt of a pension under any law of the Commonwealth relating to pensions or other benefits or who would cease to be entitled to receive a pension under any such law if a supplementary pension were granted unless the Board is of the opinion that the applicant should be granted a supplementary pension of at least \$1 per week ; or

(b) to any other applicant unless the applicant satisfies the Board that the grant of the supplementary pension will provide the applicant with a net effective increase in gross income of at least 20 cents per week.”

On the motion of Mr. Rylah, and after debate—Suggested amendment made.

Ordered—That the Bill be returned to the Legislative Council with a Message acquainting them accordingly.

28. **ADJOURNMENT.**—Motion made and question—That the House, at its rising adjourn until to-morrow, at half-past Ten o'clock (*Mr. Rylah*)—put and agreed to.

“AA. (1) A person shall not keep or exhibit any animals in connexion with the conduct of any circus except subject to and in accordance with the regulations made under this section.

(2) The Governor in Council may make regulations for regulating and controlling the conduct of circuses and in particular, without limiting the generality of the foregoing, for or with respect to—

- (a) the licensing of any person who keeps or exhibits any animals in connexion with the conduct of a circus ;
- (b) imposing any conditions limitations or restrictions on such licences ;
- (c) prescribing fees not exceeding \$20 to be paid in connexion with the issue of any such licence ;
- (d) prescribing forms for the purposes of this section ;
- (e) prohibiting the keeping of any type or species of animal in a circus ;
- (f) regulating the construction of buildings fences cages and other means for keeping animals in confinement in circuses ;
- (g) the provision of food and drink for animals kept in confinement in circuses ;
- (h) requiring the treatment of sick or disabled animals by veterinary surgeons ;
- (i) prescribing penalties not exceeding \$500 for any contravention of or failure to comply with such regulations ; and
- (j) prescribing any matter which is authorized or required or necessary or expedient to be prescribed for carrying this section into effect.”

And the said amendments were read a second time and, after debate, agreed to by the House.

Ordered—That a Message be sent to the Legislative Council acquainting them that the Legislative Assembly have agreed to the said amendments.

4. ‘184. An inspector under the *Boilers Inspection Act* 1958 shall for the purposes of this Division only be an inspector under this Act.

184A. (1) For the purposes of this Division there shall be a Board of Examiners for engine-drivers and boiler attendants.

(2) The Board shall consist of—

(a) the Chief Inspector of Boilers and Pressure Vessels appointed under the *Boilers Inspection Act* 1958 (who shall be chairman); and

(b) two other persons having a thorough knowledge of the operation of steam engines and boilers appointed by the Governor in Council (in this Division called “the appointed members”).

(3) The appointed members shall be appointed for a term of not more than five years and shall be eligible for re-appointment but may at any time be removed by the Governor in Council.

(4) In the event of a vacancy in the membership of the Board or the temporary absence of a member of the Board the Minister may appoint a person having a thorough knowledge of the operation of steam-engines and boilers to act as a member of the Board during such vacancy or absence.

(5) Any person appointed to act as a member of the Board shall be deemed to be a member of the Board holding office in the place of the person in whose stead he is appointed to act.

(6) The appointed members of the Board shall be paid such fees and travelling allowances as are prescribed.

(7) The members of the Board shall not as such be subject to the provisions of the *Public Service Act* 1958.

(8) Subject to the regulations, the Board may regulate its own proceedings.

- (b) Any general election made pursuant to paragraph (d) of sub-section (4) of section 13 by such an officer shall unless revoked in accordance with the provisions of that paragraph continue to have effect so long as that person remains an officer ;
- (c) Such an officer shall not be entitled to receive a pension so long as he remains an officer.”

- (i) any river canal navigable stream dock or basin or a quay wharf or warehouse near or adjoining thereto or a street highway or avenue leading thereto ;

 - (iii) a place adjacent to a street or highway—
with intent to commit a felony or misdemeanour ;
- (g) has in his custody or possession without lawful excuse (the proof of which excuse shall be on such person) any picklock-key crow jack bit or other implement of housebreaking ;
- (h) is found disguised or has his face blackened with an unlawful intent ;
- (i) is found without lawful excuse (the proof of which excuse shall be on such person) in or upon or within the precincts of a building or structure or in a garden or enclosure or in or on board a ship or other vessel in any port harbor or place within Victoria or in or upon a mine or claim within the meaning of the *Mines Act 1958* ;
- (j) fraudulently manufactures or aids in the manufacture of any spurious or mixed metal or substance or fraudulently sells or offers for sale as unmanufactured gold or as gold in its natural state any metal or mixed or adulterated metal or other substance whether partly composed of gold or not—

shall be guilty of an offence.

Penalty : For a first offence—imprisonment for two years ; For a second or subsequent offence against this section (whether under the same paragraph or not)—imprisonment for three years.

(2) In proving intent to commit a felony or misdemeanour for the purposes of paragraph (f) of the last preceding sub-section it shall not be necessary to show that the person charged was guilty of any particular act or acts tending to show his intent, and he may be convicted if from the circumstances of the case and from his known character as proved to the court before which he is charged it appears to such court that his intent was to commit a felony or misdemeanour.

For Division 9A of Part I. of the Principal Act there shall be substituted the following Division :—

‘ DIVISION 9A—PLANTATION AREAS.

151A. In this Division unless inconsistent with the context or subject-matter—

“ Forest tree ” means any species of tree of value in commerce for its sap bark or timber.

“ Land Utilization Advisory Council ” means the Land Utilization Advisory Council under Division 1 of Part III. of the *Soil Conservation and Land Utilization Act 1958*.

“ Lease ” means lease granted under this Division for the growing of forest trees for commercial purposes and “ lessee ” and “ leasing ” have corresponding interpretations.

“ Minister ” means the Minister of Lands.

151B. (1) Subject to this section the Governor in Council may by proclamation published in the *Government Gazette* proclaim any unalienated Crown land to be available for leasing for the growing of forest trees of specified species for commercial purposes and may at any time revoke or from time to time amend or vary any such proclamation.

(2) Land shall not be proclaimed pursuant to this section as available for leasing for the growing of forest trees of any species unless the Minister is satisfied—

(a) that the land taken generally is suitable for the growing of forest trees of that or those species ; and

(b) that the removal of any existing trees and vegetation on the land and the planting in their place of forest trees of the said species would not be contrary to the public interest—

and recommends that the land be proclaimed.

(3) For the purposes of sub-section (2) the Minister may if he thinks fit request the Land Utilization Advisory Council to furnish to him a report in writing with respect to the suitability of any land for the planting of forest trees and the species of forest tree (if any) for which it is suitable and the Land Utilization Advisory Council shall furnish a report to the Minister accordingly.

(4) Any land proclaimed pursuant to this section shall be deemed to be unclassified and no provision of this Act relating to the classification of lands or limiting the area value or price of any land in accordance with the classification shall extend or apply to land so proclaimed.

(5) An area of land proclaimed under this section shall upon the grant of a lease thereof under this Division be a plantation area.

The Principal Act shall be amended as follows :—

(a) For section 82 there shall be substituted the following section :—

‘ 82. (1) Every petrol shop shall be closed and kept closed—

(a) on Good Friday during the whole day ; and

(b) on **Christmas Day and Anzac Day** until the hour of two o'clock in the afternoon.

(2) **Nothing** in sub-section (1) shall render unlawful—

(a) the opening at any time of any shop or premises at which motor cars are garaged for the purpose only of the egress or ingress of motor cars from or to the shop or premises ; or

(b) the sale at any time of petrol benzine or other motor spirit from any automatic coin-operated pump or machine which may lawfully be used under the *Petrol Pumps Act 1958* or the sale at any time of motor oil from any automatic coin-operated pump or machine so long as neither the shopkeeper nor any person on his behalf is in attendance to operate or supervise the operation of the pump or machine.

(3) Any provision in any existing or future lease or assignment of a lease of or agreement relating to the leasing of a petrol shop that the lessee shall keep the shop open for a total period of more than seventy-seven hours in any week shall be absolutely void.

(4) Any person who—

(a) gives a lease or assignment of a lease of a petrol shop which lease or assignment (as the case may be) contains or is subject to a provision or condition requiring the lessee to keep the shop open for business for a total period of more than seventy-seven hours in any week or agrees to give such a lease or assignment ; or

(b) refuses to give a lease or an assignment of a lease or to consent to an assignment of a lease of a petrol shop except upon a condition that the lessee or assignee shall keep the shop open for business for such a total period in any week ; or

- (c) renews a lease of a petrol shop upon a condition that the lessee shall keep the shop open for such a total period in any week or refuses to renew a lease or give a fresh lease of any such shop except upon such a condition ; or
- (d) directly or indirectly induces or attempts to induce any person to take or agree to take a lease or assignment or renewal of a lease of a petrol shop upon such a condition ; or
- (e) agrees to supply any commodity to the lessee of a petrol shop upon a condition that the lessee shall keep the shop open for business for such a total period in any week or refuses to supply any commodity to the lessee except upon such a condition or stops the supply of any commodity to the lessee because the lessee refuses to keep or agree to keep the shop open for business for such a total period in any week ; or
- (f) directly or indirectly induces or persuades or attempts to induce or persuade the occupier of any petrol shop to keep the shop open for business for such a total period in any week—

shall be guilty of an offence against this Act and liable to a penalty of \$500.

(5) Where a lessee of a petrol shop is not entitled to require the lessor to renew the lease of the shop or to give a fresh lease thereof and the lessor refuses to renew the lease or give a fresh lease except upon terms or conditions requiring the lessee to keep the shop open for business for a total period of more than seventy-seven hours in any week and the lessee is in consequence obliged to give up possession of the shop the lessee shall be entitled to recover damages from the lessor in any court of competent jurisdiction as if the lessor had committed a breach of a covenant to renew the lease for the same term and upon the same conditions as are provided for by the lease.

(6) Any person who agrees to supply any commodity to the occupier of a petrol shop (not being a lessee) upon a condition that the occupier shall keep the shop open for business for a total period of more than seventy-seven hours in any week or refuses to supply any commodity to the occupier except upon such a condition or stops the supply of any commodity to the occupier because the occupier refuses to keep or agree to keep the shop open for business for such a total period in any week shall be guilty of an offence against this Act and liable to a penalty of \$500.

(7) Unless inconsistent with the context or subject-matter—

- (a) in this section “ lease ” includes lease sub-lease tenancy sub-tenancy and licence to use or occupy whether or not they are in writing, and “ leasing ” “ lessor ” and “ lessee ” have a corresponding meaning ; and
- (b) in this Part “ petrol shop ” means shop for the sale of petrol benzine or other motor spirit motor oil or accessories or spare parts for any motor car within the meaning of the *Motor Car Act* 1958, including any place or premises on or in which a pump for supplying motor spirit is installed and any such pump itself ; and

(b) In sub-sections (1) and (2) of section 80 after the words “ Fifth Schedule ” there shall be inserted the words “ and petrol shops ”.

—(Mr. Wilcox.)

Further amendment proposed—That the words “ that the lessee shall keep the shop ” in sub-section (3) of proposed new section 82 be omitted with the view of inserting in place thereof “ or agreement for the supply of any commodity to the occupier of a petrol shop requiring the shop to be kept ”.

MINUTES OF THE PROCEEDINGS
OF THE
JOINT SITTING
HELD IN THE
LEGISLATIVE ASSEMBLY CHAMBER

WEDNESDAY, 11TH MAY, 1966.

The Members of the Legislative Council and the Members of the Legislative Assembly having, pursuant to resolutions of the two Houses, assembled in the Legislative Assembly Chamber—

1. ELECTION OF PRESIDENT.—Vernon Christie, Esquire, M.L.A., Deputy-Speaker of the Legislative Assembly, moved—That the Honorable Ronald William Mack, M.L.C., President of the Legislative Council, be appointed President of this Joint Sitting, which motion, being seconded by the Acting-Premier, the Honorable A. G. Rylah, C.M.G., E.D., M.L.A., was resolved in the affirmative.

The Honorable Ronald William Mack, M.L.C., having expressed his acknowledgments for the honour conferred upon him by the Joint Sitting, then took the Chair.

2. COUNCIL OF THE VICTORIA INSTITUTE OF COLLEGES.—The President read the relevant provision of section 7 of the *Victoria Institute of Colleges Act 1965*, viz. :—

“ The Council shall consist of not more than twenty-eight members and shall be constituted as follows :—

- (a) Three members who shall be Members of the Parliament of Victoria who have been recommended for appointment by a joint sitting of the Members of the Legislative Council and the Legislative Assembly conducted in accordance with rules adopted for the purpose by the Members present at the sitting ;”.

3. RULES OF PROCEDURE.—The Acting-Premier, the Honorable A. G. Rylah, C.M.G., E.D., M.L.A., submitted the following rules of procedure for the consideration of Honorable Members, and moved that they be adopted as the rules of procedure of this Joint Sitting :—

1. On any debate arising the same shall be conducted according to parliamentary usage.

2. A Member, addressing himself to the President, shall propose a Member to be recommended for appointment to the Council of the Victoria Institute of Colleges and such proposal shall be duly seconded. When any Member is so proposed his proposer shall state that such Member is willing to be so recommended for appointment, if chosen.

3. If only three Members be proposed and seconded, the President shall declare—“ That have been chosen to be recommended for appointment to the Council of the Victoria Institute of Colleges ”.

4. If more than three Members be proposed and seconded, the Members to be recommended for appointment shall be chosen by ballot in the following manner :—

5. The President shall announce the names of the Members proposed and shall cause each Member present to be provided with a ballot-paper initialled by the Clerks of the two Houses.

6. Upon such ballot-paper the Member receiving it shall write the names of the three Members he wishes to be recommended for appointment ; and if any ballot-paper contains a larger number of names it shall be rejected. Having marked his ballot-paper as provided, the Member voting shall deposit it in a ballot-box provided for the purpose.

7. The President shall appoint three Members to be scrutineers, who, with the Clerks, shall ascertain the number of votes for each Member ; and the three Members who shall be reported to have the greatest number of votes shall be deemed to be duly chosen to be recommended for appointment. In any case of doubt arising through two or more Members having an equality of votes, the scrutineers by drawing lots shall determine which of such Members shall be chosen to be recommended for appointment.

8. No informal vote shall be taken into account.

9. The President shall be entitled to a vote.

10. As soon as the ballot is concluded the President shall declare—" That have been chosen to be recommended for appointment to the Council of the Victoria Institute of Colleges ".

11. The records of the proceedings and the ballot-papers shall be retained by the Clerk of the Parliaments, who shall be the custodian thereof, and shall keep the ballot-papers safely for one year and thereafter destroy them.

The Honorable C. P. Stoneham, M.L.A., seconded the motion.

Question—put and resolved in the affirmative.

4. MEMBERS PROPOSED AND CHOSEN TO BE RECOMMENDED FOR APPOINTMENT TO THE COUNCIL OF THE VICTORIA INSTITUTE OF COLLEGES.—The President announced that, the rules having been adopted, he was now prepared to receive proposals from Honorable Members with regard to the Members to be recommended for appointment to the Council of the Victoria Institute of Colleges.

The Honorable A. G. Rylah, C.M.G., E.D., M.L.A., proposed Alexander William Taylor, Esquire, E.D., M.L.A., for recommendation for appointment to the Council, and stated that Mr. Taylor was willing to be recommended, if chosen, which proposal was seconded by the Honorable M. V. Porter, M.L.A.

The Honorable C. P. Stoneham, M.L.A., proposed the Honorable Samuel Merrifield, M.L.C., for recommendation for appointment to the Council, and stated that Mr. Merrifield was willing to be recommended, if chosen, which proposal was seconded by Frank Noel Wilkes, Esquire, M.L.A.

The Honorable G. C. Moss, M.L.A., proposed Thomas Campion Trewin, Esquire, M.L.A., for recommendation for appointment to the Council, and stated that Mr. Trewin was willing to be recommended, if chosen, which proposal was seconded by Bruce James Evans, Esquire, M.L.A.

The President, having asked if there were any further proposals and there being no further proposals, thereupon declared that Alexander William Taylor, Esquire, E.D., M.L.A., the Honorable Samuel Merrifield, M.L.C., and Thomas Campion Trewin, Esquire, M.L.A., had been chosen to be recommended for appointment to the Council of the Victoria Institute of Colleges.

5. NOTIFICATION TO THE HONORABLE THE MINISTER OF EDUCATION.—The Acting-Premier, the Honorable A. G. Rylah, C.M.G., E.D., M.L.A., moved—That the President inform the Honorable the Minister of Education that Alexander William Taylor, Esquire, E.D., M.L.A., the Honorable Samuel Merrifield, M.L.C., and Thomas Campion Trewin, Esquire, M.L.A., have been chosen to be recommended for appointment to the Council of the Victoria Institute of Colleges which motion, being seconded by the Honorable C. P. Stoneham, M.L.A., was resolved in the affirmative.

6. VOTE OF THANKS TO THE PRESIDENT.—The Acting-Premier, the Honorable A. G. Rylah, C.M.G., E.D., M.L.A., moved a vote of thanks to the President, which motion was seconded by the Honorable C. P. Stoneham, M.L.A., and carried unanimously.

The President, having returned thanks, declared the Joint Sitting closed.
