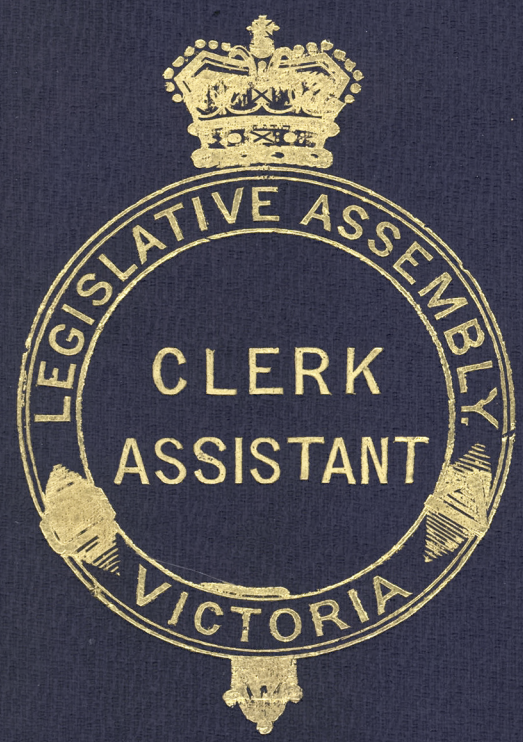

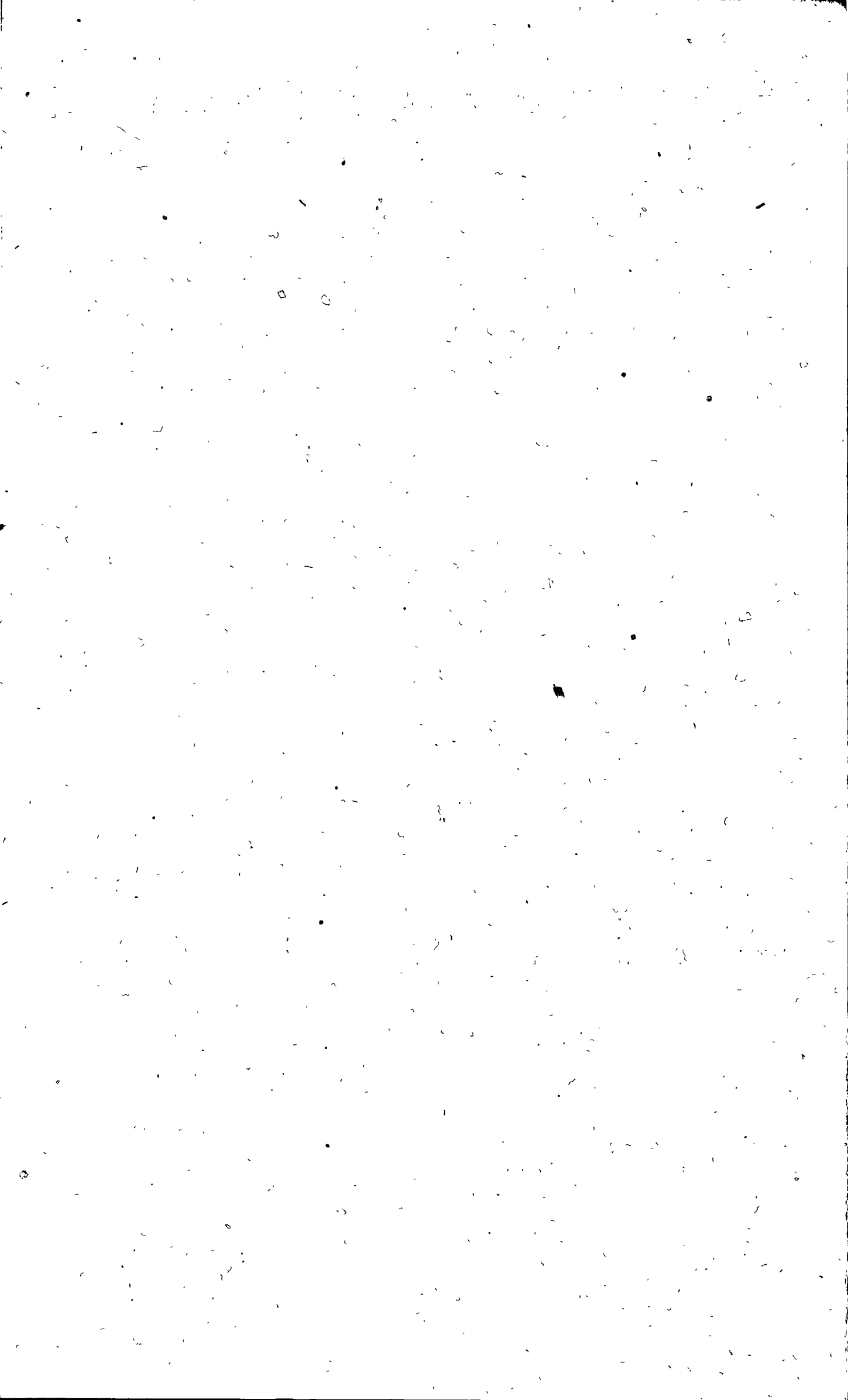

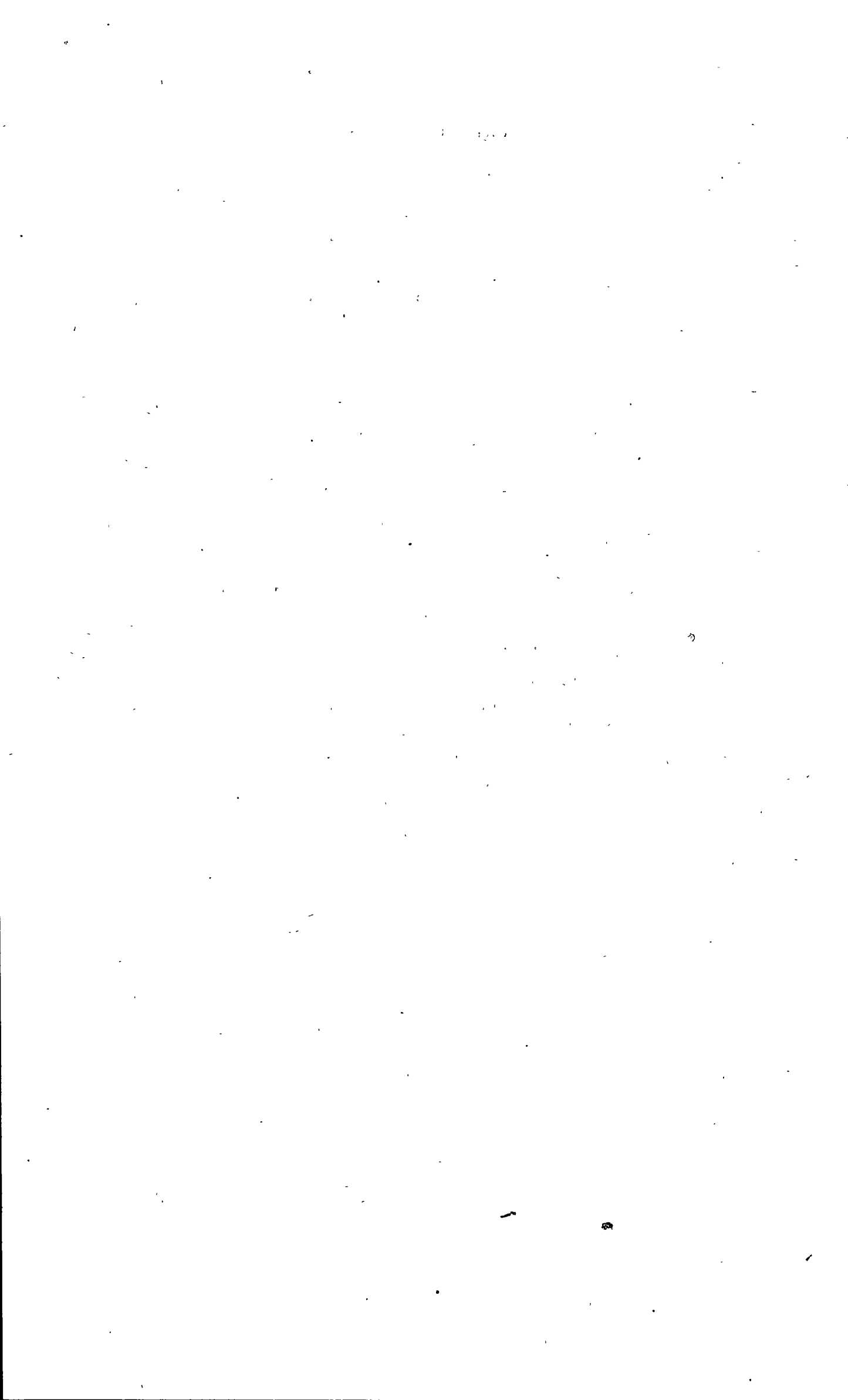

1. MR. WARDE: To ask the Honorable the Acting Premier—

1. If his attention has been drawn to a statement contained in the leading article of the *Age* newspaper of 10th August instant, in which it is stated, dealing with the Metropolitan Gas Company, that "We find a clause in the old Charter Act, for instance, that specifically forbids the company to carry to the reserve fund in any one year any sum equal to more than 3 per cent of the paid-up capital of the company. No prohibition could be more precise, yet within the last few days, in bold defiance of it, the company appropriated to its reserves a total sum of £77,000 for the half-year, an amount equivalent to more than 6 per cent. on the paid-up capital."
2. If the statement is correct, what steps, if any, does he intend to take to compel the company to obey the law.

2. MR. STANLEY: To ask the Honorable the Acting Premier if he will obtain the advice of the Crown Law Department as to whether the Metropolitan Gas Company has violated the terms of its charter in paying more than 3 per cent. into the reserve fund in one year; and, if so, will the Government take steps to cancel the said charter.

3. MR. MCLACHLAN: To ask the Honorable the Minister of Railways—

1. If it is a fact that the Heyfield railway station has been reduced from Class 8 to Class 9; if so, has this reclassification been general throughout the State.
2. If it is not a fact that the returns at the Heyfield railway station have been increasing annually of late years; if so, why has this step been taken.
3. If it is the intention of the authorities to erect a new railway station at Heyfield next year.

4. MR. PRENDERGAST: To ask the Honorable the Minister of Railways—

1. If he is prepared to recommend an amendment of the *Railways Act* 1896, section 11, subsection (6), so that any employé who appeals to the Appeal Board against punishment, including fine, shall have the right to employ an agent or solicitor on his behalf.
2. If it is intended that casual employés who received an increase in their rate of pay owing to the issue of Regulation 54 should be paid the increase as from the 1st June last; as promised by the Treasurer during the debate on the Address in Reply, as per *Hansard*, Session 1911, No. 2, page 65; and, if so, why has this not been done.
3. If the Government has decided to grant to casual employés the privilege of the four common holidays each year, or their equivalent on full pay; if not, is he prepared to recommend that such privilege be granted to these men.
4. If he will recommend to the Commissioners that the camping-out allowance should be paid to casual employés in the Works Branch of the Department, such as men in bridge gangs, &c., who are required to regularly undertake duty away from their head-quarters.
5. If he will explain why the clerks employed within the metropolitan area, outside of the Spencer-street offices and the Melbourne goods sheds, have not been visited by the Clerks' Board with a view to the reclassification of their positions.

5. MR. ROBERTSON: To ask the Honorable the Acting Chief Secretary if he will inform the House—

1. If painters, bootmakers, and tailors in the Hospitals for the Insane are paid lower rates for similar work than is fixed by the Wages Boards for those trades outside the service.
2. Are the conditions and hours of work similar.
3. If bootmakers and tailors in these institutions do the work of foremen, and what rates of pay do foremen in these trades get under the Determinations of the Wages Boards.

6. **MR. WALL** : To ask the Honorable the Minister of Railways if he will inform the House—

The Police Magistrate said there was no intention to defraud, but he strongly condemned the custom of the factories in sending their stamp to customers, as no furniture should leave the factory without a stamp, and no other person but the maker should stamp the furniture."

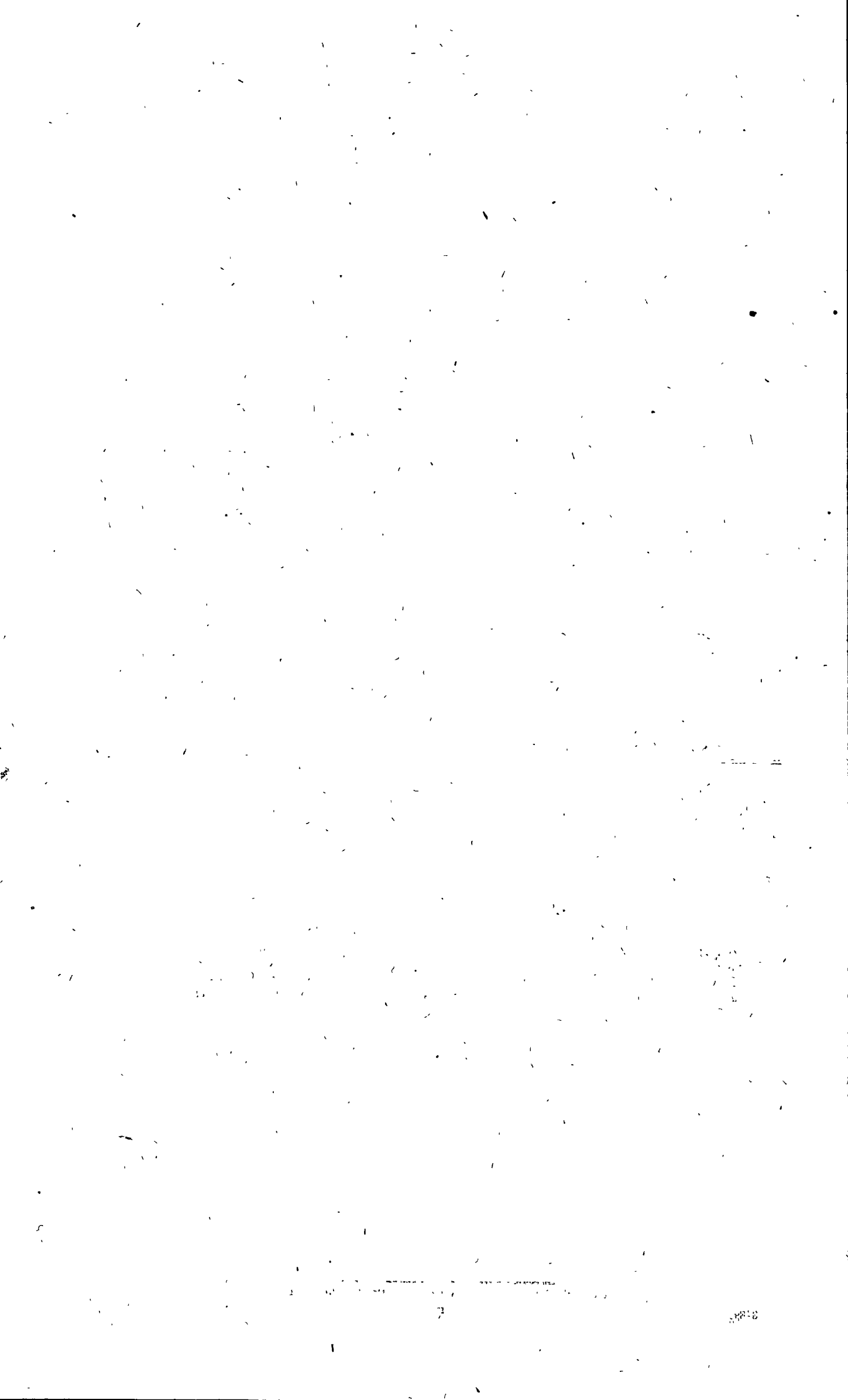
