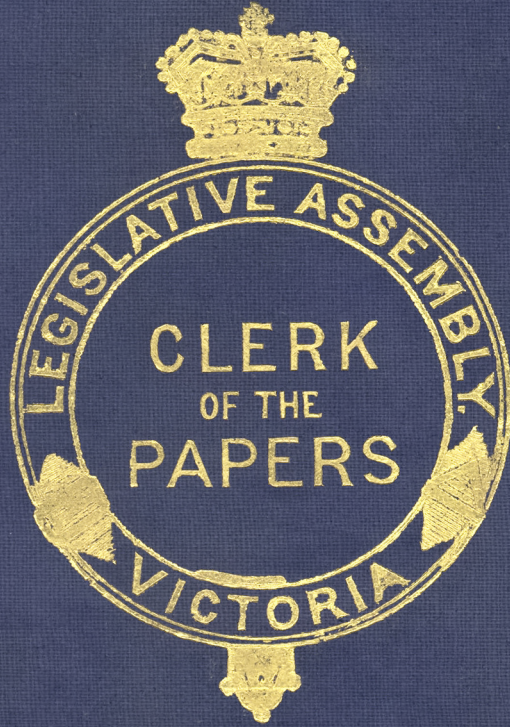

## Notices of Motion and Orders of the Day.

No. 1.

TUESDAY, 4TH JULY, 1939.

### Questions.

1. LIEUT.-COL. KNOX: To ask the Honorable the Attorney-General—

1. If his attention has been drawn to the remarks of His Honour Judge Stretton in general sessions on 6th June, 1939, as reported in the *Herald* newspaper of that date, and entitled "Complaints of Officialdom," concerning the complaints of a barrister as to restrictions imposed upon him to freely interview his client, an accused person awaiting trial.
2. What action has been taken or instructions given to provide that there will be no repetition of such restrictions.
3. If he is now perfectly satisfied that every accused person awaiting trial or charged with any offence has full and free rights to see his legal adviser if he so desires prior to facing his trial.

2. MR. CAIN: To ask the Honorable the Minister of Forests—

1. How many lives were lost during the months of December, 1938, and January, 1939, as a result of the bush fires in this State.
2. What was the number of fires that were known to be burning in December, 1938.
3. Where were they, and how many were extinguished.
4. What amount has been expended by the Forests Commission since 1st July, 1935, from—  
(a) amounts voted annually by Parliament; (b) amounts raised by loans; (c) Commonwealth grants for forestry and the proportion contributed by the State; and (d) other money for unemployment relief.
5. How much money was expended on—(a) roads, tracks, and firebreaks; (b) fire-detection look-outs; (c) fire-fighting equipment; and (d) employment of fire-detection officers and employees.
6. Whether any works were undertaken that were not recommended or approved by the Forests Commission; if so, where, and the amount expended.
7. How much revenue has been received by the Forests Commission since 1st July, 1935, and the amount received each year respectively.
8. What steps are being taken by the Government to ensure that there will not be a recurrence of the recent devastating bush fires in this State.

3. MR. BARRY: To ask the Honorable the Premier if, in view of the fact that closing the babies' ward at the Children's Hospital was contemplated, he will arrange for a full inquiry to be made with a view to the Government grant being substantially increased, so that the suffering poor and sick can receive the necessary medical treatment.

4. MR. CAIN: To ask the Honorable the Premier—

1. If he will institute inquiries with a view to providing the necessary medical services in isolated areas in the State.
2. Whether it is a fact that the Murrayville Cottage Hospital was recently left without the services of a doctor, and that no other medical man was prepared to accept the practice.
3. If such was the case, will he make representations to the Hospitals and Charities Board with a view to action being taken so that people residing in isolated areas in the State may receive the necessary medical attention when required.

5. MR. CAIN: To ask the Honorable the Premier if he has received the report of the State Economic Advisory Committee which is investigating the drift in railway finances; if so, what action does the Government intend taking in regard to the report, and whether the report will be circulated to Honorable Members.

6. MR. CAIN: To ask the Honorable the Minister of Transport if he will lay on the table of the Library the file with reference to the acceptance of the tender for the supply, delivery, and erection in buffet cars at Newport Workshops of two sets of refrigerator cabinets and equipment.

  8. Whether the Melbourne Harbor Trust has had any previous business relations with the successful tenderer; if so, what.
  9. If it is a fact that a dredge now known as the "G.F.H. Suction Dredge," purchased in Bombay in 1926, was acquired for the purpose of excavating the Appleton Dock; if so, why it is not being used.
  10. What was the cost of that complete equipment.
9. **MR. ZWAR** : To ask the Honorable the Premier if the Government will bring in a Bill this Session to relieve the Melbourne and Metropolitan Tramways Board of all statutory payments.
10. **MR. ZWAR** : To ask the Honorable the Premier—
1. If, in view of the increasing cost of living, the Government will increase rates of sustenance proportionately to such increased cost of living.
  2. Whether the Government will take steps to review the permissible income regulations, with a view to making them more liberal.
  3. If the Government will allow the 8s. per week rental allowance on rentals of over 15s. per week.
11. **MR. HOLLAND** : To ask the Honorable the Chief Secretary if he will inform the House—
1. The registered bed accommodation at each of the public hospitals in the metropolitan area.
  2. The number of beds occupied by patients in each of these hospitals at present.
  3. The number of persons on the inmates waiting list at each hospital.
  4. The extra bed accommodation which will be available in the near future as the result of proposed building operations.
  5. The daily average number of out-patients at each hospital.

The first part of the document discusses the general principles of the law of contract. It is essential to understand that a contract is a legally binding agreement between two or more parties. 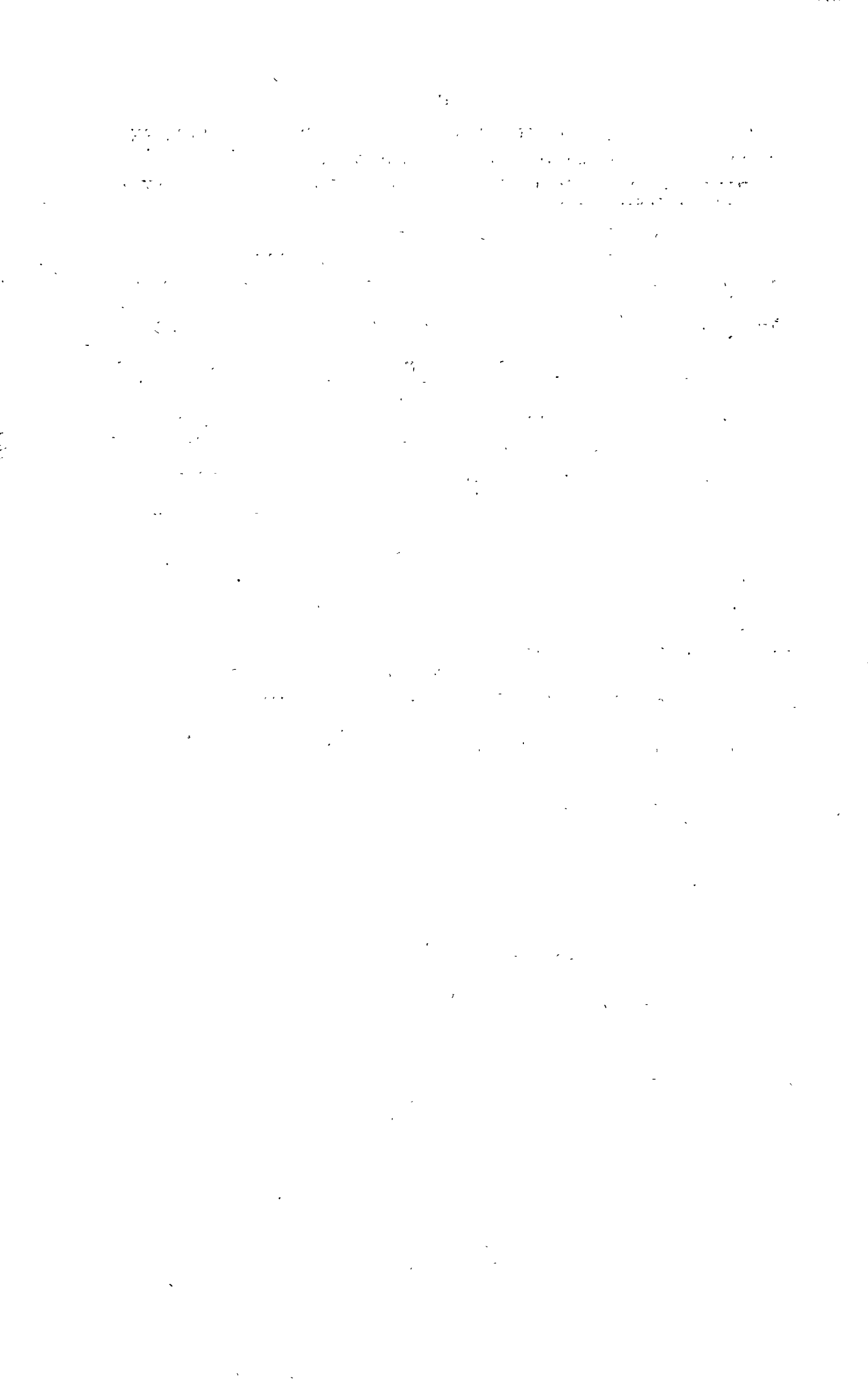

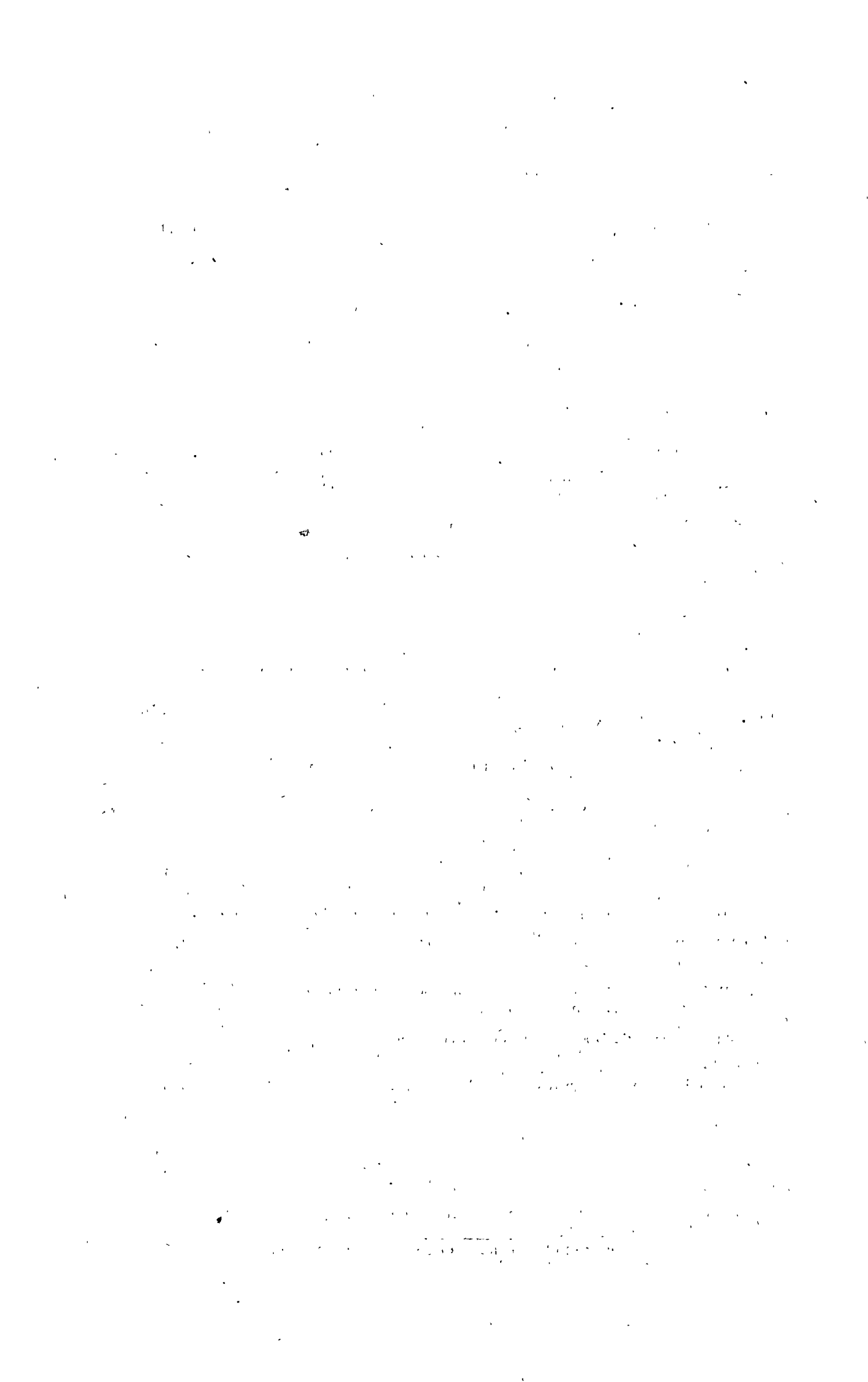
