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

# WEDNESDAY, 2ND JUNE, 1886.

#### Questions.

1. Mr. McIntyre: To ask the Honorable the Attorney-General—
(1.) Is it correct that under an order of the Governor in Council public servants over sixty years of age, although capable and in good health, can only be retained if their duties cannot be undertaken by the officers next in seniority and merit.

- (2.) Does the Act really necessitate the compulsory retirement of all other public servants over the age of sixty years; if so, will he bring in a Bill for its immediate amendment, so as to provide against the State being burdened with the cost of compensation and the maintenance of pensioners in thorough sound health, and whose experience renders them exceptionally competent to continue in the discharge of their duties as public servants.
- 2. Dr. Quick: To ask the Honorable the Chief Secretary whether it is proposed to make provision for the payment of coroners' juries.
- 3. Mr. Rees: To ask the Honorable the Minister of Railways when tenders will be called for construction of the line of railway from Bacchus Marsh to Ballan.
- 4. Mr. Bailes: To ask the Honorable the Minister of Mines if he has any power to regulate the hours which miners should be allowed to work underground; if so, will he insist that a longer period than eight hours underground be not permitted.

5. Mr. McIntyre: To ask the Honorable the Premier-

(1.) If it is a fact that the late Government had arranged for the appointment of either Mr. Morral, Secretary for Lands, or Mr. Le Cren, Secretary for Public Works, to the office of Audit Commissioner, and that the late Government was prevented from doing so in consequence of the Public Service Board nominating another gentleman for the position.

(2.) Did the late Government consult the Public Service Board on the subject.

- (3.) Does the appointment of Audit Commissioners pertain to the duties of the Public Service Board.

  (4.) If it does, why did the late Government interfere in the matter; and, if it does not, why were the Public Service Board consulted (if they were) in regard to it.
- 6. Mr. Ferguson: To ask the Honorable the Commissioner of Crown Lands and Survey if he will consider the advisability of amending the 32nd section of the present Land Act in the direction of the 19th section of The Land Act 1869.
- 7. Mr. LAURENS: To ask the Honorable the Minister of Railways if the canal now being cut in the West and North Melbourne swamp is to be ultimately utilized for shipping purposes.
- 8. Mr. McIntyre: To ask the Honorable the Attorney-General if he will endeavour to make arrangements by which titles for the transfer of land and other documents requiring to be registered can be received by Government officers in the several inland towns having such officers, with the view of having such transfers and other documents transmitted every mail after receipt to the Titles Office in Melbourne for registration, and thus tend in some degree to lessen the cost which country residents are put to under the existing system of centralization.
- 9. Mr. Bailes: To ask the Honorable the Minister of Mines if he will take the necessary steps to excise all residence areas held under miners' rights to a depth of 50 feet from the surface from mining leases, so that the holders thereof may become (if so desirous) the owners of such residence areas in fee simple.
- 10. Mr. Toohey: To ask the Honorable the Attorney-General if he will appoint a Clerk of Petty Sessions, in accordance with the request of the Borough Council of Koroit, as early as possible.
- 11. Mr. McIntyre: To ask the Honorable the Minister of Railways when it is intended to proceed with the construction of railway workshops in the inland towns, for the erection of which the money has been so long available.
- 12. Mr. Toohex: To ask the Honorable the Minister of Railways if instructions have been given to Mr. Campbell, who is in charge of a survey party from Camperdown to Curdie's River, to report on the deviation, in accordance with the request of the residents of Scott's Creek.
- 13. Mr. Murray: To ask the Honorable the Premier whether, in view of the danger to life and limb of allowing small and very light and weak boys to ride in public races, he will bring in a measure to make it illegal for any horse to carry less than seven stone in a public race, or jockey to ride whose bodily weight is less than six stone ten pounds.

# TUESDAY, 16TH NOVEMBER, 1886.

#### Questions.

- 1. Mr. Shackell: To ask the Honorable the Premier whether the Government will, during the recess, take into consideration the advisability of introducing a Bill during the next Session of Parliament to amend the Act 35 Victoria, No. 451, intituled An Act for the Prevention of Diseases in Stock (1872), with the view of stamping out the disease in cattle known as "pleuro-pneumonia," which disease is now becoming so prevalent throughout the colonies.
- 2. Mr. Sands: To ask the Honorable the Minister of Railways if he will cause the last train leaving Sandhurst to call at Gisborne.
- 3. Mr. Woods: To ask the Honorable the Premier whether he will consider the advisability of removing the Powder Magazine from its present site to a suitable and safe one.
- 4. Mr. Russell: To ask the Honorable the Commissioner of Crown Lands and Survey if he will cause to be published in the Ballarat local newspapers the result of the experiments made by Mr. Pearson, the Agricultural Chemist, in treating the California thistle in the Bungaree district, and any other suggestions made by him as to the best means of checking it when making its first appearance.
- 5. Mr. OUTTRIM: To ask the Honorable the Postmaster-General-
  - (1.) If he is aware that Post Offices in country districts are being continually filled by supernumerary letter-carriers, to the very great detriment of the public.
  - (2.) If he will take steps to appoint permanent letter-carriers, so that the duties may be efficiently and expeditiously performed.
- 6. Mr. Jones: To ask the Honorable the Commissioner of Crown Lands and Survey whether his attention has been called to the non-payment of a person called White, who was employed by the Department, through the agency of Mr. Knipe, when Mr. Longmore was Minister, to take charge of land bought for the purposes of a cemetery; and, further, when it is probable that the reasonable claims of Mr. White will be met.
- 7. Mr. Outtrim: To ask the Honorable the Attorney-General if the Government has considered the effect of the decision of the Full Court in the case of *Browne* v. *The Queen*, whereby the rights of officers under Act No. 160 were preserved; and whether such rights preserved do not include rights to receive the increments under Act No. 160.
- 8. Mr. Peirce: To ask the Honorable the Minister of Railways if he is aware there is a stated age at which railway employés are debarred from further advance in wages and position.
- 9. Mr. GAUNSON: To ask the Honorable the Premier-
  - (1.) Are civil servants allowed (without requesting and obtaining permission from the Government of this colony) to take remuneration for the performance of duties outside of the duties of their public offices.
  - (2.) Is the Agent-General of this colony the Chairman of the London Board of Directors of the City of Melbourne Mercantile Bank, or is he a director or otherwise connected with the management of any other bank; if so, has he obtained the permission of the Government of this colony.
  - (3.) What remuneration does he receive for his services as a bank director.
  - (4.) Is it expected that the Agent-General for this colony shall devote the whole of his time to the performance of the duties of his office.
  - (5.) Is the salary attached to his office £2,500 a year.
  - (6.) Is he entitled to any commission on sums of money received by him on behalf of this colony, or to any fee or perquisite of any kind arising out of the performance of the duties of his office.
- 10. Mr. Jones: To ask the Honorable the Minister of Railways whether his attention has been called to the fact that men are working on railway stations more than nine hours per day, and in some cases as much as from eleven to sixteen hours in the twenty-four; and to inquire whether it is not possible to give relief in such cases without over taxing the department.

The provisions of section one hundred and twenty-eight of The Land Act Limitation of provisions of 1884 which authorize travellers within the meaning of that Act to depasture their sheep and cattle upon any unsold Crown lands within one quarter of a mile of any road saturing travelor track commonly used as a thoroughfare shall not apply to the counties enumerated in large cattle. the Schedule hereto or to any counties or districts added thereto as hereinafter provided; but such travellers may within such counties and districts depasture their cattle upon any unsold Crown

lands within one quarter of a mile of any surveyed road.

The Governor in Council may from time to time by proclamation published in the Government Gazette add any counties or districts in such proclamation named and described to the list of counties in the Schedule hereto and may at any time annul any such proclamation, notice whereof shall be published as aforesaid; but no proclamation made under the provisions of this section shall be of any force or effect until one month after such publication thereof.

lines 6 to 8, strike out all the words from and inclusive of the word "distance" to the end of the clause.

Clause 6, line 13, strike out the word "person" and substitute "persons."

\* Clause 7, lines 28 to 30, strike out the words "that all great cattle are to be driven every "day not less than eight miles and all other cattle every day not less than "five miles towards the place of destination," and substitute the words "the "distance which great cattle and other cattle are respectively to be driven "daily."

New Clause to follow Clause 7.

Every person to whom a permit to travel with cattle has been granted shall drive Distance to be travelled. all such cattle as are great cattle every day a distance of not less than eight miles, and all such cattle as are not great cattle every day a distance of not less than five miles towards the place of destination.

New Clause to follow Clause 8. C. Every person holding a permit under this Act and driving or travelling with Production of cattle, shall produce such permit upon demand to every justice and member of the police force, and to every herdsman and manager of a common, and to every occupier of any land through which or along the boundary road of which such cattle are travelling.

Clause 9, line 45, strike out the word "another" and substitute the words "a substituted

" permit."

Clause 10, line 5, after the word "thereof" add the words "or by refusing or otherwise failing "or neglecting to produce his permit to persons by this Act authorized to demand "such production."
