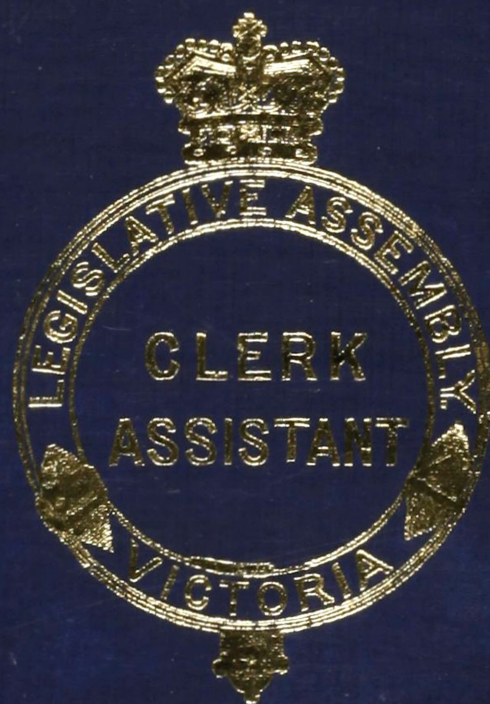

PROCLAMATION

By His Excellency the Administrator of the State of Victoria and its Dependencies in the Commonwealth of Australia, &c., &c., &c.

I, THE Administrator of the State of Victoria, in the Commonwealth of Australia, do by this my Proclamation fix Tuesday, the first day of August, 1961, as the time for the commencement and holding of the First Session of the Forty-second Parliament of Victoria, for the despatch of business, at the hour of Eleven o'clock in the forenoon, in the Parliament Houses, situate in Spring-street, in the City of Melbourne : And the Honorable the Members of the Legislative Council and the Members of the Legislative Assembly are hereby required to give their attendance at the said time and place accordingly.

Given under my Hand and the Seal of the State of Victoria aforesaid, at Melbourne, this twenty-sixth day of July, in the year of our Lord One thousand nine hundred and sixty-one, and in the tenth year of the reign of Her Majesty Queen Elizabeth II.

2. MESSAGE FROM COMMISSIONERS.—The following Message from the Commissioners appointed by His Excellency the Administrator of the Government to open the Parliament was delivered by the Usher of the Black Rod :—

GENTLEMEN OF THE LEGISLATIVE ASSEMBLY :

The Commissioners from His Excellency the Administrator of the Government request the presence of the Members of the Legislative Assembly in the Legislative Council Chamber to hear the Commission read for the commencement and holding of this present Session of Parliament.

Accordingly, the Members of the Legislative Assembly went to the Legislative Council Chamber, where the Honorable Mr. Justice Barry said—

HONORABLE MEMBERS OF THE LEGISLATIVE COUNCIL :

MEMBERS OF THE LEGISLATIVE ASSEMBLY :

His Excellency the Administrator of the Government, not thinking fit to be present in person, has been pleased to cause Letters Patent to issue, under the seal of the State, constituting us his Commissioners to do in his name all that is necessary to be performed in this Parliament. This will more fully appear from the Letters Patent, which will now be read.

Then the said Letters Patent were read as follows :—

ELIZABETH THE SECOND by the Grace of God of the United Kingdom, Australia and Her other Realms and Territories, Queen, Head of the Commonwealth, Defender of the Faith :

WHEREAS by Proclamation issued the twenty-sixth day of July, One thousand nine hundred and sixty-one, by His Excellency the Honorable Sir Charles John Lowe, Knight Commander of Our Most Distinguished Order of Saint Michael and Saint George, Administrator of Our State of Victoria and its Dependencies in the Commonwealth of Australia, &c., &c., &c., Tuesday, the first day of August, One thousand nine hundred and sixty-one, was fixed as the time for the commencement and holding of the next Session of Our Parliament of Victoria, at the hour of Eleven o'clock in the forenoon, in the Parliament Houses, in the City of Melbourne : AND forasmuch as for certain causes the said SIR CHARLES JOHN LOWE cannot conveniently be present in person in Our said Parliament at that time : NOW KNOW YE THAT WE, trusting in the discretion, fidelity, and care of Our trusty and well-beloved the Honorable SIR JOHN VINCENT BARRY and the Honorable ROBERT VINCENT MONAHAN, Judges of Our Supreme Court of the State of Victoria, do give and grant by the tenor of these presents unto you the said JOHN VINCENT BARRY and ROBERT VINCENT MONAHAN or either of you, full power in Our name to begin and hold the said Session of Our said Parliament, and to do everything which for and by Us, or the said SIR CHARLES JOHN LOWE shall be there to be done ; commanding also by the tenor of these presents all whom it may concern to meet Our said Parliament, and the said SIR JOHN VINCENT BARRY and ROBERT VINCENT MONAHAN or either of them, that they diligently attend in the premises and form aforesaid. In testimony whereof We have caused the Seal of Our said State to be hereunto affixed.

Witness Our trusty and well-beloved SIR CHARLES JOHN LOWE, Knight Commander of Our Most Distinguished Order of Saint Michael and Saint George, Administrator of Our State of Victoria and its Dependencies in the Commonwealth of Australia, &c., &c., &c., at Melbourne in Our said State this first day of August, One thousand nine hundred and sixty-one, and in the tenth year of Our reign.

MEMBERS OF THE LEGISLATIVE ASSEMBLY :

We have it in command from His Excellency to let you know that, later this day, His Excellency will declare to you in person, in this place, the causes of his calling this Parliament together ; and, as it is necessary before you proceed to the despatch of business that a President of the Legislative Council and a Speaker of the Legislative Assembly be chosen, His Excellency requests that you, in your respective Chambers, will proceed to the choice of proper persons to be such President and Speaker.

The Lieutenant-Governor, Sir Edmund Herring, who has been overseas, will return to-morrow and assume the Vice-regal office until the Governor-General designate is sworn in, and His Excellency the Governor resumes his duties.

Following the recent widespread rains the seasonal outlook for the whole of the State is most promising, and good spring rains should ensure increased production of major primary products.

It has been proposed that when the additional Supply has been granted there should be an adjournment for a short period to enable the Government to prepare its legislative programme for the Session.

The Standing Orders Committee has the honour to report to your Honorable House as follows :—

The Committee has considered the question of the introduction of groups of children within the precincts of the Legislative Assembly and has agreed to the following recommendations :—

1. That, as from the termination of the 1961 sittings of the House, groups of children visiting the Legislative Assembly for the purpose of being shown over the Parliament Building or attending in the Strangers Gallery be limited to twenty in number and be restricted to those who have completed the sixth grade standard of education or the equivalent thereof.

2. That each such group be accompanied by a teacher, or a responsible adult other than the Member introducing the group.

Tax on the taxable value of land or lands used for other purposes shall be calculated at the average rate that would have been applicable had the combined taxable value been the taxable value of the land or lands used for other purposes.

Provided that where the owner of land is an absentee the duty of land tax provided in the foregoing provisions of these Tables shall be increased by twenty per centum and for purposes of this proviso—

- (a) "Absentee" means a person who does not reside in Australia and includes a person who has been absent from Australia for at least twelve months immediately prior to the time when the ownership of his land for the purposes of the Principal Act is determined unless he satisfies the Commissioner that he resides in Australia ; but does not include a public officer of the Commonwealth or the State who is absent in the performance of his duties ;
- (b) if at least three-fifths of the entire beneficial interest in any land is owned by absentees or if (where the land is owned by a body corporate) at least three-fifths of the issued share capital of that body corporate is held by absentees, that land shall be deemed to be wholly owned by absentees.

() Notwithstanding anything contained in sub-section (5) of this section, that sub-section shall not prevent a corporation (in this sub-section called ‘the trustee corporation’) that is, or is deemed by virtue of sub-section (5) of section six to be related to—

(a) a banking corporation ;

(b) a corporation authorized to transact life insurance business under the law of the Commonwealth relating to life insurance ; or

(c) a corporation authorized by the law of a State or Territory of the Commonwealth to take in its own name a grant of probate or of letters of administration of the estate of a deceased person—

from being appointed, holding office or acting as trustee for the holders of debentures of another corporation (in this sub-section referred to as ‘the other corporation’) by reason only that—

(d) the other corporation owes to the trustee corporation or to a corporation that is deemed by virtue of sub-section (5) of section six to be related to the trustee corporation—

(i) moneys that (after deducting therefrom moneys referred to in sub-paragraphs (ii) and (iii) of this paragraph) do not exceed, at the time of the appointment or at any time within three months after the debentures are first offered to the public, one-tenth of the amount of the debentures proposed to be offered to the public within that period and, at any time after the expiration of that period, one-tenth of the amount owed by the other corporation to the holders of the debentures ;

- (ii) moneys that are secured by, and only by, a first mortgage over land of the other corporation, any debentures issued by the other corporation to the public or any debentures to which the trustee corporation, or the corporation so deemed to be related to the trustee corporation, is not beneficially entitled; or
- (iii) moneys to which the trustee corporation, or the corporation so deemed to be related to the trustee corporation, is entitled as trustee for holders of any debentures of the other corporation in accordance with the terms of the debentures or of the relevant trust deed; or
- (e) the trustee corporation, or a corporation that is deemed by virtue of sub-section (5) of section six to be related to the trustee corporation, is a shareholder of the other corporation in respect of shares that it holds beneficially if the shares in the corporation held beneficially by it and by all other corporations that are deemed by virtue of sub-section (5) of section six to be related to it, do not carry the right to exercise more than one-tenth of the voting power at any general meeting of the other corporation."

Mr. Speaker said—

There are several points that arise from the proposed motion, the first being the question of urgency. I point out to the Leader of the Opposition, and to all honorable members who may consider submitting motions such as the one now before the Assembly, that the question of urgency really demands that the matter be brought to the House as early as is practicable. As the House has been in session for a couple of weeks, the question of real urgency does not arise. However, I would be prepared to waive that argument on the assumption that the Leader of the Opposition is supported in his motion.

On the other aspect—the question of anticipation—the matter is not so simple. The Chief Secretary has given notice in the House that he proposes to submit a Bill to amend sections of the Country Fire Authority Act, and I ask the honorable gentleman to advise me on two points: First, can he give me, and the House, an assurance that the subject-matter contained in the proposed amending Bill will offer scope for debate comparable with the opportunity that would be afforded honorable members under the motion moved by the Leader of the Opposition? Secondly, when does the Chief Secretary propose to introduce the amending Bill in this House? As I see it, the question resides in two facts: The first is whether Parliament is assured of a sufficient opportunity to debate the subject-matter of the motion; and, secondly, whether it is assured that such opportunity for debate will arise within a reasonably short period.

MR. RYLAH (Chief Secretary).—The answer to your first question, Sir, is "Yes", and to the second, "Next Tuesday."

MR. STONEHAM.—Will the Chief Secretary indicate the sections of the Act which it is proposed to amend.

THE SPEAKER.—The Chief Secretary may answer that question if he desires to do so. If the Chief Secretary gives the House an assurance—he has done so—that the scope of the Bill will be sufficiently wide to encompass the debate now indicated by the Leader of the Opposition, I shall not regard it as obligatory on the Chief Secretary to answer the question in regard to the sections of the Act to be amended.

MR. STONEHAM (Leader of the Opposition).—On a point of order, I submit that it is beyond the competence of the Chief Secretary to anticipate precisely what suggestions we intend to make for improved methods of fire fighting, and therefore he cannot give an assurance that the debate on the Bill which he proposes to introduce will encompass what we intend to submit to-night.

THE SPEAKER.—The Leader of the Opposition certainly has a point, but I give him the assurance that, when the proposed Bill is debated, he will be permitted to advance proposals for the improvement of the legislation.

MR. STONEHAM.—I seek your guidance, Sir, as to what matters affecting the Country Fire Authority may be traversed in the debate. I presume that the Chief Secretary does not intend to submit a Bill to supersede all existing provisions of the Act, and I submit that any provisions of the legislation outside the proposed amendments should be open to debate now, because when the amending Bill comes before the House the debate will be restricted, in accordance with previous custom, to discussion of those particular provisions which it covers. Unless the proposed Bill relates to the whole of the existing Act discussion should be allowed on the remaining provisions and therefore we should be permitted to discuss appropriate matters to-night.

THE SPEAKER.—I gave the Leader of the Opposition an assurance, which I repeat, that when the amending legislation proposed by the Chief Secretary is before the House—

MR. STONEHAM.—I had in mind a discussion to-night of those matters that would not be covered in the proposed Bill.

THE SPEAKER.—I do not propose to allow any debate to proceed to-night.

6. SCHEDULE.

1. Subject to the particular provisions of this Schedule the duty payable shall be calculated as follows:—

- (a) Where the final balance passes to the widow, widower, children who have not attained the age of 21 years, wholly dependent adult children or wholly dependent widowed mother of the deceased.

Where part only of the final balance so passes the duty shall be that proportion of the duty that would have been payable had the whole of the final balance so passed which the part that so passes bears to the final balance.

2. (a) The duty chargeable on the final balance of the estate of a deceased person who dies domiciled outside Victoria shall be a sum equal to that proportion of the duty that would be chargeable on the total value of all property wheresoever situated which would be or would be deemed to form part of the estate of the deceased if it were situated in Victoria less the total value of all debts due and owing by him at the time of his death and all other deductions that would be allowed under this Bill (in this clause called the "total estate") which the final balance bears to such total estate.

(b) In calculating the duty which would be payable on the total estate for the purposes of this paragraph the provisions of this Bill and of this Schedule shall apply as if the total estate were the final balance.

(c) No duty shall be chargeable under this paragraph where the final balance does not exceed £100.

(d) Where any part of the total estate is devised or bequeathed or passes by gift *inter vivos* or under a settlement in such a manner that if the total estate were in Victoria a deduction under clause twenty-one of this Bill would be allowed then unless the will of the deceased or the instrument of gift or settlement provides otherwise, the devise bequest gift or settlement shall be deemed to be made from property in Victoria.

(e) For the purpose of this paragraph the Commissioner may require the person who files the statement in respect of the deceased person's estate to furnish the Commissioner with such valuations certificates and other information (including certificates from any taxation or other public authority outside Victoria) as he deems necessary to determine the value of the total estate.

3. Where the duty calculated under this Schedule is less than Ten shillings the duty chargeable shall nevertheless be Ten shillings.

4. Where a proportional calculation is required to be made for the purposes of applying or calculating an addition to or a reduction or apportionment of duty as between different parts of an estate, then for the purpose only of such application or calculation no account shall be taken of any addition or reduction of duty under this Bill.

5. For the purposes of calculating duty payable under this Bill—

"Brothers or sisters" includes brothers or sisters of the half-blood.

"Children" includes—

- (a) children adopted under any law for the time being in force in Victoria or in any other State of the Commonwealth or (if the adoption would be recognized by the law of Victoria) under any other law;
- (b) where the deceased person was a woman the illegitimate children of such person; and
- (c) the step-children of the deceased person.

"Wholly dependent adult children" means—

- (a) children in respect of whom an invalid pension is being paid under any Commonwealth Act relating to Social Services; or
- (b) children who have been wholly engaged in keeping house for the deceased for at least two years out of the three years immediately preceding his death.

"Wholly dependent widowed mother" means the widowed mother of the deceased person who is not in receipt of an annual income greater than the maximum rate of pension payable under any Commonwealth Act in force from time to time relating to Old Age, Invalid and Widow's Pensions, and who was receiving assistance from the deceased.

the council shall not cause the plan to be sealed without the consent of the Country Fire Authority or, in any case where the Country Fire Authority has failed or refused so to consent, of the Governor in Council.”

3. Clause 4, at the end of the clause insert the following sub-clause :—

“() After paragraph (z) of sub-section (1) of section one hundred and ten of the Principal Act there shall be inserted the following paragraph :—

‘(za) authorizing and regulating the making of notices by the Authority for the purposes of paragraph (d) of sub-section (5) of section five hundred and sixty-nine of the *Local Government Act* 1958.’”

And the said amendments were read a second time and, after debate, agreed to by the House.

Ordered—That the Bill be returned to the Legislative Council with a Message acquainting them that the Legislative Assembly have agreed to the said amendments.

“Provided further that where it is proved that the value of the property the subject-matter of the gift or any property which represents or has in any way been substituted for the property the subject-matter of the gift *inter vivos* has been increased between the date of the gift and the date of the death of the donor—

(a) by reason of improvements made by or on behalf of the donee ; or

(b) by the exercise of the independent judgment or skill of the donee—

the Commissioner shall allow as a deduction the value of such improvements and the amount by which.”

3. Clause 7, sub-clause (1), paragraph (d), page 8, line 40, after “donor” insert—

“Provided further that notwithstanding the provisions of sub-paragraphs (ii), (iii), and (iv) of this paragraph where the Commissioner is satisfied that the donee has within the said period of three years had substantial possession and enjoyment of the gift *inter vivos* the property comprised therein shall not be or be deemed to form part of the estate of the deceased person but there shall be included in the final balance of the estate of the deceased person an amount equal to the value of any beneficial interest or right retained or enjoyed by the deceased from the date of the gift *inter vivos* to the date of the death of the deceased to the extent that full consideration in money or money's worth was not given by the deceased to the donee for such right or interest.”

4. Clause 7, sub-clause (1), page 10, paragraph (m), line 17, after "deceased" insert—

" Provided that—

- (a) this paragraph shall not apply to any agreement entered into for a *bona fide* full consideration in money or money's worth in the course of a *bona fide* commercial transaction or business dealing; and
- (b) where the consideration for any such agreement consisted of a covenant or promise which remained unperformed at the date of the death of the deceased the onus of establishing for the purposes of this proviso that the consideration was a *bona fide* full consideration in money or money's worth shall lie upon the administrator or other person liable to pay the duty."

5. Clause 7, sub-clause (2), paragraph (a), page 11, line 4, after "deceased" insert—

" Provided further that this paragraph shall not apply in relation to any gift *inter vivos* made by the deceased the subject-matter of which was an interest as tenant in common in any property."

6. Clause 7, sub-clause (2), paragraph (b), line 6, after "had" insert "at any time since the coming into force of the *Administration and Probate (Estates) Act 1951*".

7. Clause 7, page 11, line 47, insert the following sub-clause to follow sub-clause (3):—

" () Where more than one person are or are deemed to be in control of a company—

- (a) the Commissioner shall determine in which person or persons the effective control of the company was vested in relation to any particular issue of shares or debentures or in relation to the declaration or payment of any particular dividend; and
- (b) if the Commissioner determines that more than one person were in effective control of the company in relation to any such particular issue declaration or payment only such proportion of the value of the shares debentures or dividends as one bears to the total number of persons who were in effective control of the company shall be deemed to be property the subject-matter of a gift by the deceased."

8. Clause 10, page 19, sub-clause (4), paragraph (c), lines 26-27, omit "unless such debt was" and insert "to the extent that such debt was not".

9. Clause 10, page 20, line 11, insert the following sub-clause to follow sub-clause (6):—

" () Notwithstanding anything in this Act no property shall be or be deemed to form part of the estate of a deceased person and no amount shall be included in the final balance of the deceased person by reason only of the issue of any shares or debentures or the declaration or payment of any dividends by a company to a person (not being a body corporate and not being related by blood or marriage to the deceased) made *bona fide* in recognition of services rendered by that person as an employé of the company who was at and during the period of three years immediately prior to the issue declaration or payment continuously and solely engaged in full-time employment with the company."

10. Clause 16, paragraph (b), line 21, after "contemplated" insert—

" Provided that in determining the value of any such stocks or shares the Commissioner shall allow the costs that would be involved in the liquidation of the company including any liability to tax under the Commonwealth Act known as the *Income Tax and Social Services Contribution Assessment Act 1936-1961* or any corresponding subsequent enactment that would be incurred by the company on its liquidation."

‘Land used for primary production’ means land as to which the Commissioner is satisfied that it has been continuously used by that person or the wife or husband or any descendant or ancestor of that person exclusively for the business of primary production, but does not include land given or accruing to an uncertain person or on an uncertain event, or land devised for a term of years (other than an interest for the life of the beneficiary) or an annuity or bequest secured by or charged upon land or any interest in land derived from a deceased person and held by that person as a shareholder in a company or as a member of a partnership or as a joint tenant or tenant in common.”

14. Clause 25, page 35, line 18, insert the following sub-clause to follow sub-clause (5) :—

“() Notwithstanding anything in this section where an administrator or other person liable to pay the duty under this Act has made to the Commissioner a full and true disclosure of all the material facts necessary for the assessment of the duty payable in respect of the estate of the deceased person and an assessment is made after that disclosure no amendment of the assessment increasing the liability of the administrator or other person liable to pay the duty shall be made except—

(a) to correct an error in calculation ;

and no such amendment shall be made after the expiration of six years from the date upon which the duty became due and payable under that assessment.”

No. 1.—*Crimes (Breath Test Evidence) Bill*—Clause 2.

After section four hundred and eight of the Principal Act there shall be inserted the following section:—

“ 408A. (1) Where the question whether any person was or was not under the influence of intoxicating liquor at the time of an alleged offence is relevant—

- (a) upon any trial for manslaughter or negligently causing grievous bodily harm arising out of the driving of a motor car; or
- (b) upon any trial or hearing for an offence against sub-section (1) of section three hundred and eighteen or sub-section (1) of section three hundred and nineteen of this Act; or
- (c) upon any hearing for an offence against sub-section (1) of section eighty-two of the *Motor Car Act 1958*—

then, without affecting the admissibility of any evidence which might be given apart from the provisions of this section, evidence may be given of the percentage of alcohol indicated to be present in the blood of that person by a breath analysing instrument operated by a person authorized in that behalf by the Chief Commissioner of Police and the percentage of alcohol so indicated shall subject to compliance with the provisions of sub-section (2) of this section be evidence of the percentage of alcohol present in the blood of that person at the time his breath is analysed by the instrument.

(2) As soon as practicable after a sample of a person's breath is analysed by means of a breath analysing instrument the person operating the instrument shall sign and deliver to the person whose breath has been analysed a statement in writing of the percentage of alcohol indicated by the analysis to be present in his blood (which may be by way of an indication on a scale) and of the date and time at which the analysis was made.

(3) (a) A certificate purporting to be signed by the Chief Commissioner of Police that a person named therein is authorized by the said Chief Commissioner to operate breath analysing instruments shall be admissible in evidence of the authority of that person.

(b) Evidence by a person authorized to operate a breath analysing instrument pursuant to this section—

- (i) that an apparatus used by him on any occasion pursuant to this section was a breath analysing instrument within the meaning of this section;
- (ii) that the breath analysing instrument was on that occasion in proper working order and properly operated by him;
- (iii) that in relation to the breath analysing instrument all regulations made under this section with respect to breath analysing instruments were complied with—

shall be *prima facie* evidence of those facts.

(4) (a) Where a member of the police force believes on reasonable grounds that a person has been while driving a motor car or while in charge of a motor car within the meaning of section eighty-two of the *Motor Car Act 1958* under the influence of intoxicating liquor to such an extent as to be incapable of having proper control of the motor car he may require that person to furnish a sample of his breath for analysis by a breath analysing instrument and that person shall, subject to the provisions of paragraph (b) of this sub-section, furnish a sample of his breath by exhaling directly into the instrument.

(b) A person who is required as aforesaid to furnish a sample of his breath for analysis shall not be obliged to do so except—

- (i) within two hours after the driving or being in charge of the motor car in respect of which the member of the police force has such belief as aforesaid; and
- (ii) at or in the vicinity of the place where his said driving or his said being in charge of the motor car occurred or at the police station nearest to that place.

(5) (a) A person who is required pursuant to sub-section (4) of this section to furnish a sample of his breath for analysis and who refuses to do so shall, unless the court is satisfied that there was some reason of a substantial character for his refusal other than a desire to avoid providing information which might be used as evidence against him, be guilty of an offence against this section and liable upon summary conviction to a penalty of not more than Twenty pounds.

(b) A person shall not be convicted of an offence under this sub-section if it is proved that within the time specified in sub-section (4) of this section for the furnishing of a sample of breath he elected to have a sample of blood taken from him in accordance with the provisions of section four hundred and eight of this Act and—

- (i) that a sample of blood was so taken from him; or
- (ii) that he was at all times during the period specified in sub-section (1) of the said section four hundred and eight ready and willing to have a sample of blood so taken from him.

(6) In this section 'breath analysing instrument' means apparatus of a type approved for the purposes of this section by the Governor in Council by notice published in the *Government Gazette* for ascertaining by analysis of a person's breath what percentage of alcohol is present in his blood.

(7) Any approval or authority given pursuant to this section by the Governor in Council or the Chief Commissioner of Police respectively may be revoked at any time in the manner in which it was given and upon such revocation shall cease to have any effect.

(8) (a) The Governor in Council may make regulations for or with respect to the maintenance and use of breath analysing instruments used for the purposes of this section and the methods to be employed for ensuring that such breath analysing instruments give accurate results.

(b) All such regulations shall be published in the *Government Gazette* and shall be laid before both Houses of Parliament within fourteen days after the making thereof if Parliament is then sitting and if Parliament is not then sitting then within fourteen days after the next meeting of Parliament; and a copy of all such regulations shall be posted to each member of Parliament."

(1) After section two hundred and sixty-one of the Principal Act there shall be inserted the following section :—

“ 261A. (1) Every person who or the directors of any body corporate which on or after the date of issue and before the return of the writ for any election for the Council or the Assembly *wilfully* prints publishes issues circulates or distributes—

- (a) an electoral advertisement notice handbill pamphlet or card (other than an advertisement in a newspaper) unless the name and address of the person authorizing the same appears at the end thereof;
- (b) a printed electoral advertisement notice handbill pamphlet or card (other than an advertisement in a newspaper) without the name and place of business of the printer being printed at the foot of it;
- (c) any electoral advertisement notice handbill pamphlet or card containing any representation of a ballot-paper or any representation apparently intended to represent a ballot-paper and having thereon any directions intended or likely to mislead or improperly interfere with any elector in or in relation to the casting of his vote; or
- (d) any electoral advertisement notice handbill pamphlet or card containing any untrue or incorrect statement intended or likely to mislead or improperly interfere with any elector in or in relation to the casting of his vote—

shall be guilty of an illegal practice :

Provided that nothing in paragraphs (c) and (d) of this section shall prevent the printing publishing or distribution of any card not otherwise illegal which contains instructions how to vote for any particular candidate or candidates so long as those instructions are not intended or likely to mislead any elector in or in relation to the casting of his vote.

(2) Every person who, on or after the date of issue and before the return of the writ for any election for the Council or the Assembly, inscribes any electoral advertisement or notice or posts any electoral advertisement notice handbill or card—

- (a) on any property belonging to the Crown or to any public statutory authority or on any structure on any public highway; or
- (b) on any house or building or any wall fence lamp-post or gate without the consent of the occupier, or without the consent of the owner if there is no person in actual occupation thereof—

shall be guilty of illegal practice.

(3) Any member of the police force may destroy remove or deface or cause to be destroyed removed or defaced any poster containing electoral matter which contravenes the provisions of sub-section (2) of this section.”

(2) In paragraph (a) of sub-section (2) of section two hundred and sixty-seven of the Principal Act the words “ circular pamphlet ‘ dodger ’ or other printed matter ” (where twice occurring) shall be repealed.

(a) one shall be appointed on the nomination of the Australasian Steamship Owners Federation ; and

(b) one shall be selected from a panel containing the names of three persons who have been resident in Victoria for at least five years submitted by the Oversea Shipping Representatives' Association after consultation with every person who is the proprietor of a refinery in Australia and is engaged in shipping to or from or to and from ports in Victoria petroleum products in excess of one hundred thousand tons per annum ;

(ii) the words “ Two shall be elected by the registered owners of ships registered at any port in Victoria whose names appear upon the roll of shipowners for the time being in force ” shall be repealed.

(b) In section twenty-seven for the word “ January ” there shall be substituted the word “ March ”.

(c) Sections twenty-eight and twenty-nine shall be repealed.

(d) In section thirty after the words “ in any port of Victoria ” there shall be inserted the words “ and who have applied to the secretary to be enrolled on the roll of certificated engineers ”.

(e) In section thirty-one after the words “ in any port in Victoria ” (where first occurring) there shall be inserted the words “ and who have applied to the secretary to be enrolled on the roll of masters or of seamen respectively ”.

(f) For section forty-six there shall be substituted the following section :—

“ 46. The president and members of the Board shall severally be paid out of the Consolidated Revenue (which is hereby appropriated accordingly) such remuneration as is from time to time fixed by Order of the Governor in Council published in the *Government Gazette*.”

(g) In paragraph (j) of section fifty-three for the words "in any port" there shall be substituted the words "in or on any Victorian coastal or inland waters".

(h) Section fifty-four is hereby amended as follows:—

(i) For paragraph (g) there shall be substituted the following paragraph:—

"(g) For the conduct of the examination of persons desiring to obtain certificate of competency as masters or mates of river and bay ships or as third-class engine drivers and as to the qualifications to be possessed by such persons, and prescribing fees to be paid by applicants for examinations not exceeding Ten pounds";

(ii) For paragraph (t) there shall be substituted the following paragraph:—

"(t) for requiring and regulating the use of wireless and radio telephony within any port;".

- (c) any other action in respect of which jurisdiction is given to the court by this or any other Act.”
