# PROCEEDINGS ON BILLS.

ADOPTION OF CHILDREN (AMENDMENT): Bill to amend the Adoption of Children Acts—(Mr. Mitchell).— Initiated and read a first time, 27 Aug., 1952, p. 75; motion, That this Bill be now read a second time—debate adjourned, 9 Sept., p. 79.

STATUTE LAW REVISION COMMITTEE.—Motion, by leave, That the proposals contained in the Adoption of Children (Amendment) Bill be referred to the Statute Law Revision Committee for examination and report, agreed to, 9 Sept., p. 79.—Bill lapsed.

APPROPRIATION: Bill to apply a sum out of the Consolidated Revenue to the service of the year ending on the 30th day of June, 1952, and to appropriate the supplies granted in this and the last preceding session of Parliament — (Mr. McDonald, Shepparton). — Initiated on resolution from Committee of Ways and Means and passed without amendment; concurrence of the Legislative Council desired, 6 Dec., 1951, p. 23; the Council's agreement notified, 6 Dec., p. 23. (Assented to 18 December, 1951. Act No. 5619.)

Barley Marketing (Amendment): Bill to amend the Barley Marketing Act 1948—(Mr. Moss).—Initiated and read a first time, 1 Oct., 1952, p. 92; motion, That this Bill be now read a second time—debate adjourned, 7 Oct., p. 95.—Bill lapsed.

BOOKMAKERS: Bill relating to the registration of bookmakers and bookmakers' clerks, to amend the Stamps Acts, and for other purposes—(Mr. Dodgshun).—Initiated on resolution from Committee of Ways and Means and read a first time, 7 Oct., 1952, p. 95; motion, That this Bill be now read a second time—debate adjourned, 8 Oct., p. 97; Message from His Excellency the Governor (No. 28) recommending an appropriation from the Consolidated Revenue for the purposes of the Bill; considered in Committee; resolution reported and agreed to, 14 Oct., p. 99.—Bill lapsed.

BUILDING OPERATIONS AND BUILDING MATERIALS CONTROL: Bill intituled "An Act to amend the Building Operations and Building Materials Control Acts"— (Mr. White, Allendale).—Brought from the Legislative Council and read a first time, 15 Oct., 1952, p. 103; motion, That this Bill be now read a second time—debate adjourned; debate resumed—Bill read a second time and passed remaining stages without amendment, 21 Oct., p. 106. (Assented to 31 October, 1952. Act No. 5650.)

CHARITABLE TRUSTS: Bill relating to certain charitable trusts—(Mr. Mitchell).—Bill initiated and motion made, pursuant to Temporary Standing Order No. 264D for the Restoration of Lapsed Bills, That this Bill be now advanced through all its stages up to the

transmission of the Bill to the Legislative Council—question resolved in the affirmative; Bill read a first time and passed without amendment; concurrence of the Legislative Council desired, 20 Nov., 1951, p. 4.—Bill not returned from the Legislative Council.

COAL MINE WORKERS PENSIONS (AMENDMENT): Bill to amend the Coal Mine Workers Pensions Act 1942 -(Mr. Moss).—Message from His Excellency the Governor (No. 10) recommending an appropriation from the Consolidated Revenue for the purposes of the Bill; considered in Committee; resolution reported and agreed to, and Bill ordered thereupon; Bill initiated and read a first time, 1 July, 1952, p. 39; motion That this Bill be now read a second time debate adjourned, 2 July, p. 42; debate resumed— Bill read a second time and committed; considered in Committee and reported with an amendment; as amended, considered, and amendment agreed to; Bill read the third time; concurrence of the Legislative Council desired, 30 July, p. 54; the Council's agreement notified, 26 Aug., p. 74. (Assented to 2 September, 1952. Act No. 5626.)

Consolidated Revenue (Bill No. 1): Bill to apply out of the Consolidated Revenue the sum of £11,980,164 to the service of the year 1952-53—(Mr. McDonald, Shepparton).—Initiated on resolution from Committee of Ways and Means and passed without amendment; concurrence of the Legislative Council desired, 30 April, 1952, p. 36; the Council's agreement notified, 1 July, p. 37. (Assented to 6 May, 1952. Act No. 5620.)

Consolidated Revenue (BILL No. 2): Bill to apply out of the Consolidated Revenue the sum of £4,130,962 to the service of the year 1951-52—(Sir Albert Lind)—Initiated on resolution from Committee of Ways and Means and passed without amendment; concurrence of the Legislative Council desired, 16 July, 1952, p. 50; the Council's agreement notified, 30 July, p. 54. (Assented to 5 August, 1952. Act No. 5621.)

CONSOLIDATED REVENUE (BILL No. 3): Bill to apply out of the Consolidated Revenue the sum of £12,563,020 to the service of the year 1952-53—(Mr. McDonald, Shepparton).—Initiated on resolution from Committee of Ways and Means and passed without amendment; concurrence of the Legislative Council desired, 21 Aug., 1952, p. 71; the Council's agreement notified, 27 Aug., p. 75. (Assented to 2 September, 1952. Act No. 5629.)

CONSOLIDATED REVENUE (BILL No. 4): Bill to apply out of the Consolidated Revenue the sum of £13,954,645 to the service of the year 1952-53—(Mr. McDonald, Shepparton).—Initiated on resolution from Committee of Ways and Means and passed without

amendment; concurrence of the Legislative Council desired, 15 Oct., 1952, p. 103; the Council's agreement notified, 28 Oct., p. 109. (Assented to 31 October, 1952. Act No. 5655.)

CO-OPERATIVE HOUSING SOCIETIES (GUARANTEES AND INDEMNITIES): Bill to amend sections 61 and 62 of the Co-operative Housing Societies Act 1944—(Mr. McDonald, Shepparton).—Message from the Deputy for His Excellency the Governor (No. 19) recommending an appropriation from the Consolidated Revenue for the purposes of the Bill; considered in Committee; resolution reported and agreed to, and Bill ordered thereupon; Bill initiated and read a first time, 26 Aug., 1952, pp. 73-4; motion: That this Bill be now read a second time—debate adjourned, 27 Aug., p. 75; debate resumed—Bill read a second time and passed remaining stages without amendment; concurrence of the Legislative Council desired, 10 Sept., p. 81; the Council's agreement notified, 1 Oct., p. 92. (Assented to 7 October, 1952. Act No. 5638.)

COUNTRY FIRE AUTHORITY: Bill to amend the Country Fire Authority Act 1944 and for other purposes— (Mr. Dodgshun).—Initiated and read a first time, 10 Sept., 1952, p. 81; motion, That this Bill be now read a second time—debate adjourned, 23 Sept., p. 86; debate resumed—Bill read a second time and passed remaining stages without amendment; concurrence of the Legislative Council desired, 1 Oct., p. 92; the Council's agreement to the Bill with amendments notified, 15 Oct., p. 100, amendments considered—one agreed to and the other agreed to with amendments, 15 Oct., p. 103; the Council's agreement to the amendments made by the Assembly on the amendment of the Council notified, 21 Oct., p. 106. (Assented to 31 October, 1952. Act No. 5651.)

COUNTRY ROADS (AMENDMENT): Bill to amend the Country Roads Act 1928—(Sir Albert Lind).— Initiated and read a first time, 2 July, 1952, p. 41; motion, That this Bill be now read a second time—debate adjourned, 23 July, p. 52; debate resumed and adjourned, 30 July, p. 55; debate continued—Bill read a second time and passed remaining stages without amendment; concurrence of the Legislative Council desired, 5 Aug., p. 57; the Council's agreement notified, 7 Oct., p. 93. (Assented to 7 October, 1952. Act No. 5640.)

COUNTY COURT (AMENDMENT): Bill to extend the jurisdiction of County Courts, to amend the County Court Acts, and for other purposes—(Mr. Mitchell). -Initiated and read a first time, 2 July, 1952, p. 41; motion, That this Bill be now read a second timedebate adjourned, 2 July, p. 42; debate resumed—Bill read a second time and committed, 23 July, p. 52; motion made, by leave, That it be an instruction to the Committee that they have power to consider a new clause relating to contempt of court by witnesses-Mr. Speaker having ruled the proposed instruction out of order as being irrelevant to the subject-matter of the Bill as read a second timemotion, by leave, That the Standing Orders be suspended so far as to allow the proposed instruction to be considered-agreed to; question, That it be an instruction to the Committee that they have power to consider a new clause as aforesaid—agreed to; Bill considered in Committee and reported with an amendment; as amended, considered, and amendment agreed to; Bill read the third time; concurrence of the Legislative Council desired, 29 July, p. 54; the Council's agreement to the Bill with amendments notified; amendments considered and agreed to, 26 Aug., p. 74. # PROCLAMATION.

By His Excellency the Governor of the State of Victoria and its Dependencies in the Commonwealth of Australia, &c., &c., &c.

WHEREAS the Parliament of Victoria stands adjourned until Friday, the ninth day of November, 1951: Now I, the Governor of the State of Victoria, in the Commonwealth of Australia, do by this my Proclamation prorogue the said Parliament of Victoria until Tuesday, the thirteenth day of November, 1951, and I do hereby fix Tuesday, the thirteenth day of November, 1951, aforesaid, at the hour of half-past Ten o'clock in the forenoon, as the time for the commencement and holding of the next Session of the said Parliament of Victoria, for the despatch of business, in the Parliament Houses, situate in Spring-street, in the City of Melbourne: And the Honorable the Members of the Legislative Council and the Members of the Legislative Assembly are hereby required to give their attendance at the said time and place accordingly.

One hundred years ago to-day the first meeting of the Legislative Council of Victoria was held in St. Patrick's Hall, Melbourne.

Victoria acknowledges, thankfully, the debt owed to those who have served with such devotion in this Parliament during the past century.

The achievements of our predecessors inspire us to emulate their work. It is the earnest hope of my advisers that the next century of Parliament will be marked by wider development of the State, a fuller appreciation of the responsibilities of

citizenship and a greater degree of co-operation and goodwill in the community.

My Ministers join with me in thanking the members of the Commemoration Committee and all other citizens associated with the many special events held throughout the State during this year.

The citizens of Victoria were looking forward with delight to the visit next year

of Their Majesties the King and Queen and Her Royal Highness, Princess Margaret.

With feelings of profound regret they heard that His Majesty, on the advice of His Physicians, had reluctantly been constrained to abandon the visit.

We rejoice that His Majesty is gaining strength and it is our earnest prayer that soon he will be fully restored to health. His Majesty has asked Their Royal Highnesses The Princess Elizabeth, Duchess

of Edinburgh, and the Duke of Edinburgh to visit Australia and New Zealand next year. Their coming is eagerly awaited.

Arrangements are being made to ensure that as many as possible, particularly school children and young people, will have the opportunity of joining in demonstrations of loyalty and affection.

My advisers will introduce Bills to complete the programme of legislation announced

earlier in the year.

Provision was made last session, by temporary Standing Orders of both Houses of Parliament, to enable Bills which were introduced into Parliament but not finally disposed of to be advanced in the present session without further amendment or debate to the stage which they had reached.

These Bills, together with other important measures, will be submitted to you

as early as practicable. I now leave you to your deliberations and pray that under Divine Providence your labours may advance the welfare of the State.

  - Mr. Mibus (Chairman of Committees) reported that during the debate on Supply the question of funeral benefit associations was raised, and that he had ruled, on a point of order, that the discussion was out of order on the grounds that the matter was sub judice. With the approval of the Committee he sought Mr. Speaker's opinion on his ruling.

#### And, after debate-

Mr. Speaker said, "I gave my ruling on this subject on a point of order raised earlier to-day. It was based on two rulings which are recorded in Sir T. Erskine May's Parliamentary Practice, both of which had the same effect, except that on page 380 of the fifteenth edition it is indicated that matters under consideration by a court of law should not be brought before the House by a substantive motion or otherwise. May then indicates that the rule does not apply to Bills. I presume the reason for that exclusion of Bills is that it may be necessary for an Act of Parliament to be passed to deal with a specific matter, which could not be done if that rule were strictly enforced. I have always held the very that the ruling in May besed on House of Common practice, was desired to protect the that the ruling in May, based on House of Commons practice, was designed to protect the interests of justice, that when somebody was on trial the issue should not be prejudiced by remarks made in Parliament any more than by comments being published in the newspapers. A line of demarcation must be drawn to allow the fullest possible freedom of speech, while at the same time not interfering with the administration of justice. I was not present during the debate in Committee on this subject and, except in a general way, I am not aware of the form the discussion took. I should be the last person to say that because some particular matter, in a very broad sense, was before a court any reference to it in this Chamber should be barred. I think that would be carrying the rule too far. On another occasion recently a similar problem arose, and, according to press reports, the Chairman of Committees permitted a certain matter to be discussed and I thoroughly agreed with him, although exception was taken by outside interests, on the ground that the matter was sub judice. If discussion on any subject that is even remotely before the courts is to be barred, I think that would be going too far. As far as I can see the Chairman of Committees should be the best judge of whether a subject matter is being discussed in a way that would interfere with the administration of justice. He must ensure, as must the Speaker, that nothing is said that will interfere with the administration of justice. Whether any reference to funeral benefits should be debarred because one section of the Act relating to that question is the subject of a legal action must be considered. I do not know how this subject is being dealt with by the courts, and I cannot see why members should be debarred altogether from referring to it, merely because one section of the Act is being challenged. I think the Chairman of Committees can be entrusted with the regulation of the discussion according to the way in which the subject matter is raised in Committee. I cannot rule that a discussion of the whole subject of funeral benefit associations will be out of order but I do rule that aspects likely to affect the course of justice in any shape or form must not be debated. The Chairman of Committees must decide which matters come within the limits that I have prescribed."

Whereas by The Constitution Act it was amongst other things enacted that it should be lawful for the Governor to fix such places within Victoria and, subject to the limitation therein contained, such times for holding the first and every other Session of the Council and Assembly, and to vary and alter the same respectively in such manner as he might think fit; and also from time to time to prorogue the said Council and Assembly, and to dissolve the said Assembly, by Proclamation or otherwise, whenever he should deem it expedient: And whereas the said Council and Assembly, called "The Parliament of Victoria", stand prorogued until Wednesday, the twelfth day of November, 1952: And whereas it is expedient to dissolve the Legislative Assembly: Now therefore I, the Governor of the State of Victoria, in the Commonwealth of Australia, in exercise of the power in me vested in this behalf, do by this my Proclamation discharge the Honourable the Members of the Legislative Council from their meeting and attendance on Wednesday, the twelfth day of November, 1952: And I do dissolve the No. 855.—10543/52.

- (2) Any organization which is in the opinion of the Minister representative of producers may submit a panel of not less than three and not more than five names of producers for consideration for appointment by the Governor in Council pursuant to the provisions of sub-paragraph (iii) of paragraph (a) of the last preceding sub-section.

No. 1.-Land Tax Bill-Clause 2.

Subject to the Land Tax Acts there shall in the case of each owner of land be charged levied and collected by the Commissioner and paid for the use of Her Majesty in aid of the consolidated revenue for the year ending on the thirty-first day of December One thousand nine hundred and fifty-three a duty of land tax upon land of one penny for every pound of the unimproved value thereof as assessed under the Land Tax Acts:

Provided that the minimum amount of tax payable for the said year by any taxpayer assessed under the Land Tax Acts shall be Five shillings.

—(Mr. Dodgshun.)

Amendment proposed—That the following further proviso be added to the clause:-

"Provided further than in the case of land or lands not used for primary production where under the Land Tax Acts (apart from the operation of this proviso) the amount of tax payable for the said year would be less than £2 1s. 10d. then no tax shall be charged levied or collected upon such land or lands."

No. 1.—Police Offences (Firearms) Bill—Clause 2 as amended.

(1) After Division five of Part VII. of the Principal Act there shall be inserted the following Division:—

"Division 6.—Firearms.

222. (1) In this Division unless inconsistent with the context or subject-

- 'Firearm' means any lethal firearm or other weapon of any description from which any shot bullet or other missile can be discharged and includes any such firearm or weapon from which for the time being any shot bullet or other missile cannot be discharged because of the absence or defect of any part or because of some obstruction but which, if such part were replaced renewed or repaired or such obstruction removed, would be capable of discharging a shot bullet or other missile.
- 'Primary production' means farming agricultural horticultural viticultural pastoral or grazing operations, and without affecting the generality of the foregoing includes dairy farming poultry farming and bee farming operations.
- 'Shot-gun' means any smooth bore shot-gun and includes any such shot-gun from which for the time being any shot bullet or other missile cannot be discharged because of the absence or defect of any part or because of some obstruction but which, if such part were replaced renewed or repaired or such obstruction removed, would be capable of discharging a shot bullet or other missile.
- (2) The Governor in Council on being so requested by the council of any municipality may by order published in the Government Gazette—
  - (a) declare that the provisions of this Division shall not apply in relation to a person carrying using discharging or having in his possession—
    - (i) any firearm whatsoever; or
    - (ii) a shot-gun-

on or over land within the municipal district in whole or part of such municipality;

(b) revoke any such Order-

and every such Order shall have effect accordingly.

- 223. (1) No person shall on or over any land which is used in connexion with primary production carry use discharge or have in his possession any firearm except with the consent of the occupier of such land.
- (2) Any person who contravenes the provisions of the last preceding sub-section shall be guilty of an offence and liable for a first offence to a penalty of not more than Twenty pounds or to imprisonment for a term of not more than one month and for a second or any subsequent offence to a penalty of not more than Fifty pounds or imprisonment for a term of not more than six months.
- (3) Any member of the police force who has reasonable grounds for believing that a person has committed an offence under this section may—
  - (a) search such person or any vehicle hut tent or place in the possession or control of such person;
  - (b) seize any firearm or ammunition in the possession or control of such person;
  - (c) arrest such person.
- (4) In any information or other legal proceeding under this Division the burden of proof of consent of the occupier of any land concerned shall be upon the person charged.
