

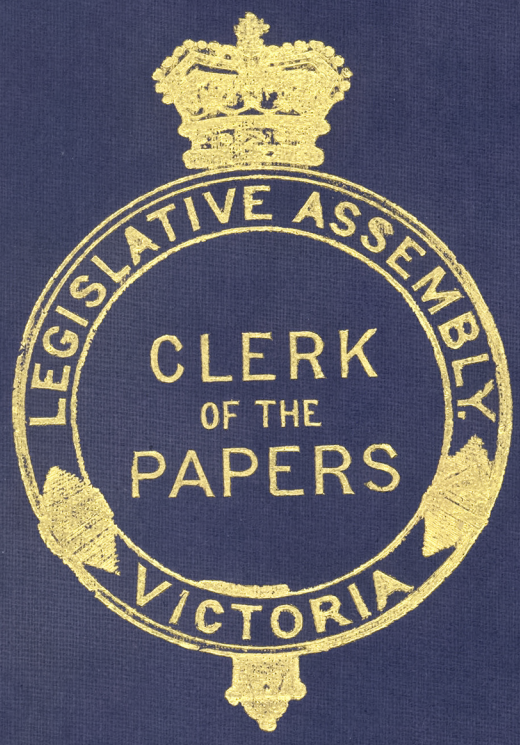

If his attention has been drawn to the following extract from *The Shepparton Advertiser* of 18th June, 1936 :—“ Now, states our Melbourne correspondent, the Secretary of the United Australia Organization (Mr. McLean) is believed to be making overtures to branches of the U.A.P. in regard to a new party. Already, it is stated, four branches in St. Kilda have been approached and ‘ unlimited ’ funds have been promised. A figure in the vicinity of £100,000 has already been mentioned, it is said If this new party is not just a blind to give the U.A.P. another lease of life under a new name, its first plank should be legislation to reveal the source of its party funds. £100,000 from thin air takes a lot of explaining.”
 2. If he will introduce legislation to compel the National Union, the United Australia Party, the Young Nationalists, and the Australian Women’s National League to publish audited balance-sheets disclosing the sources from whence they derive their funds.

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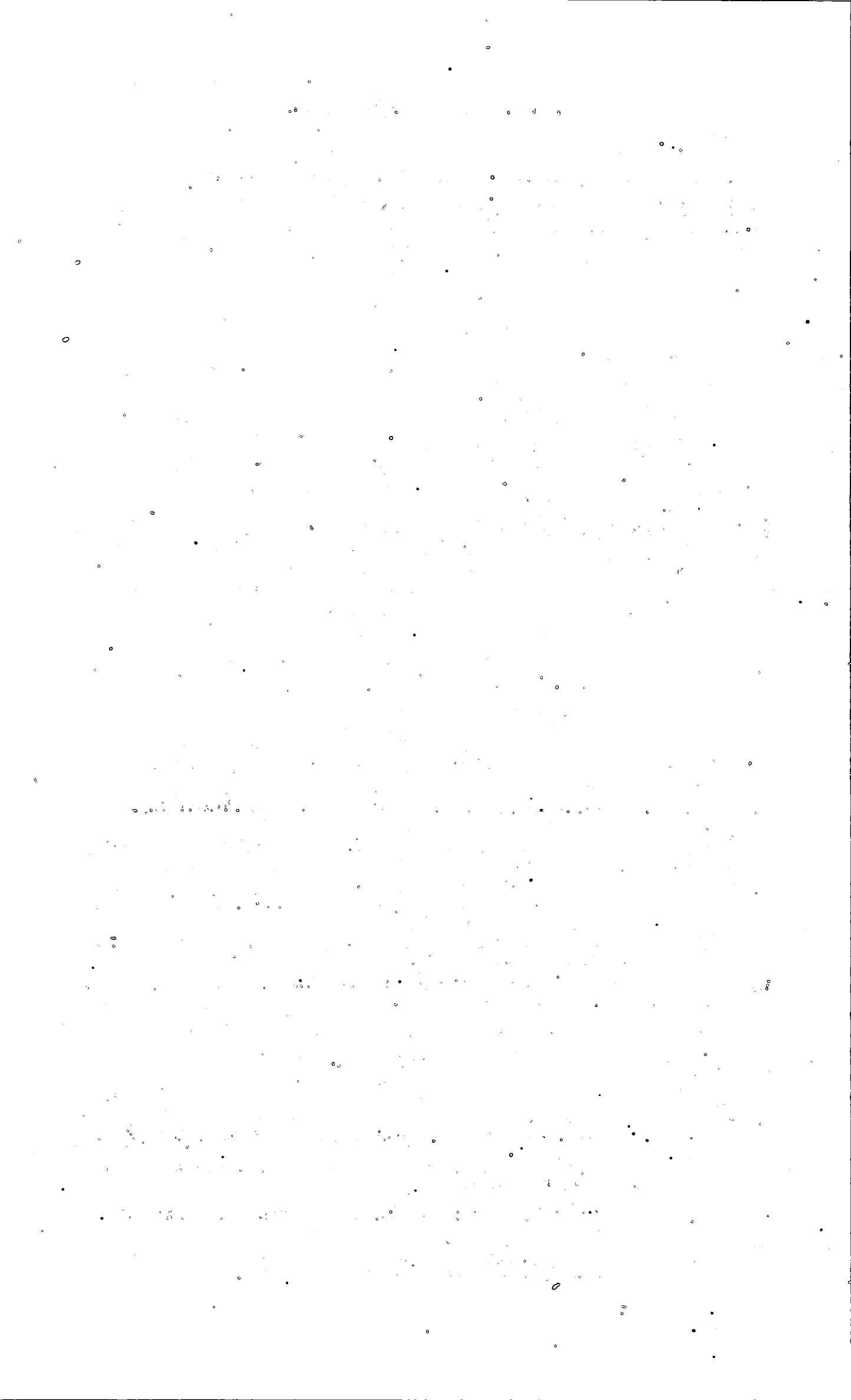

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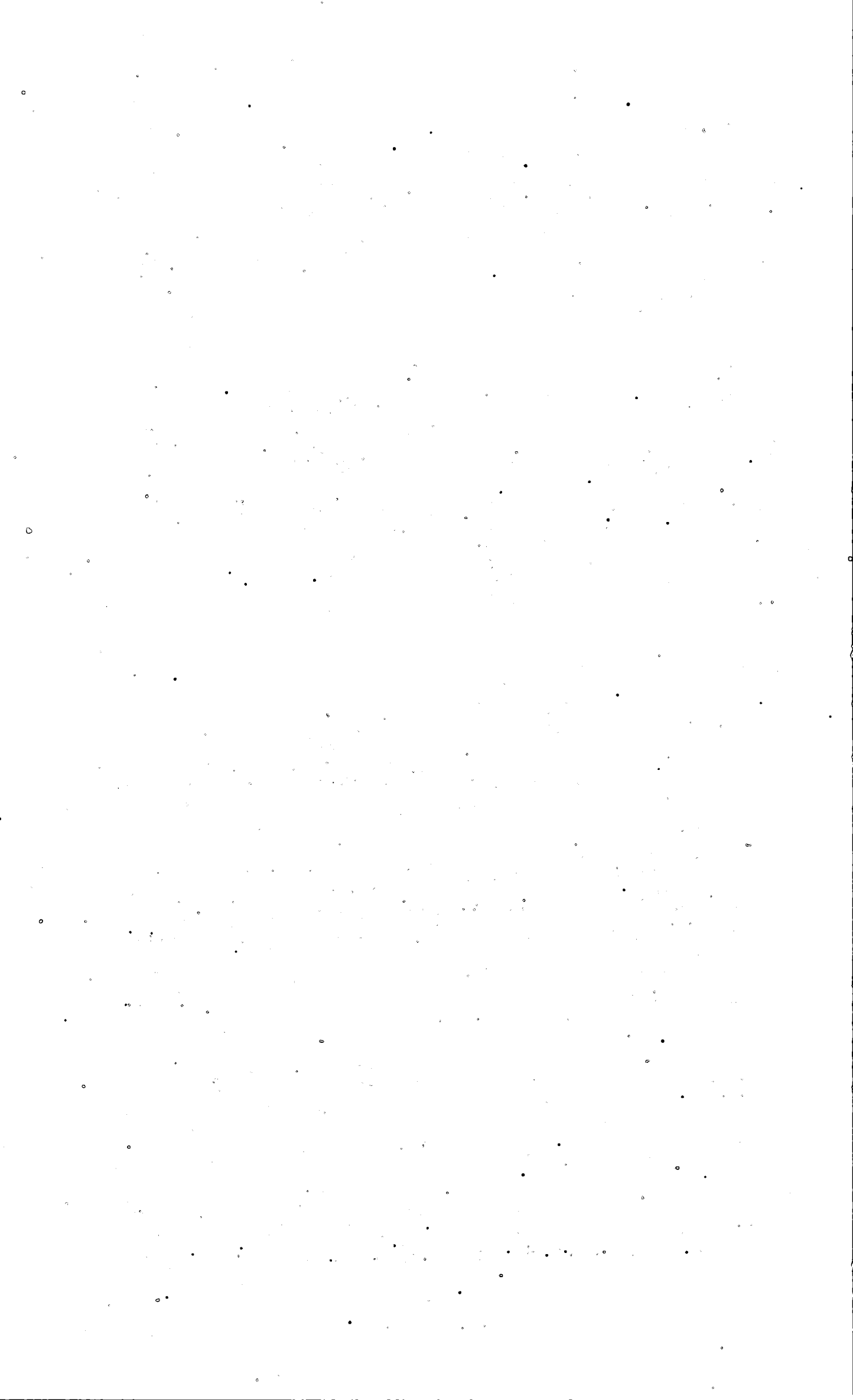

 2. If he will, in the interests of fruit and berry growers, have this matter investigated, with a view to stopping such a deception, and, where such mixing of fruits or vegetables exists in jams, will cause the labels to clearly and openly indicate such mixture.

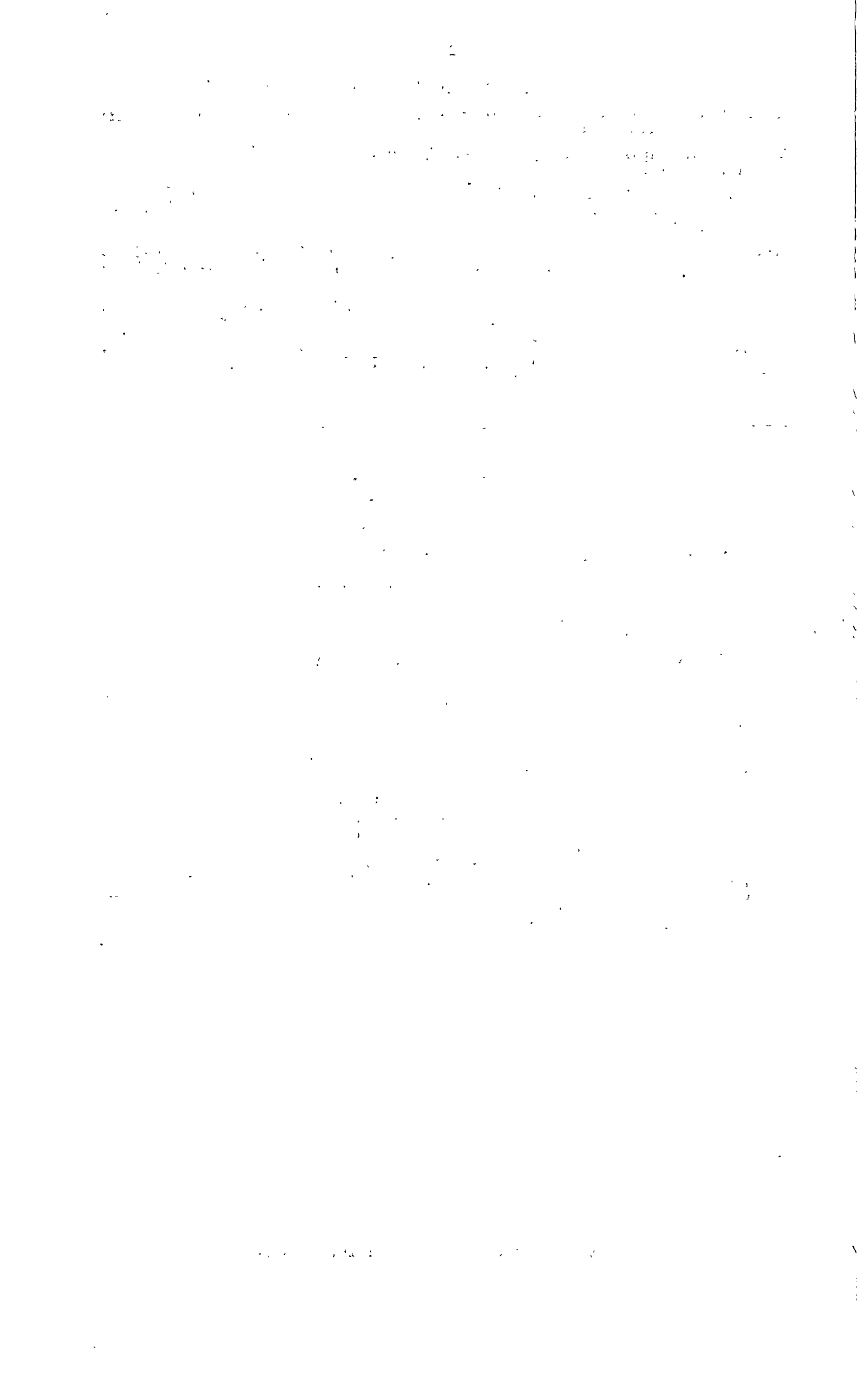

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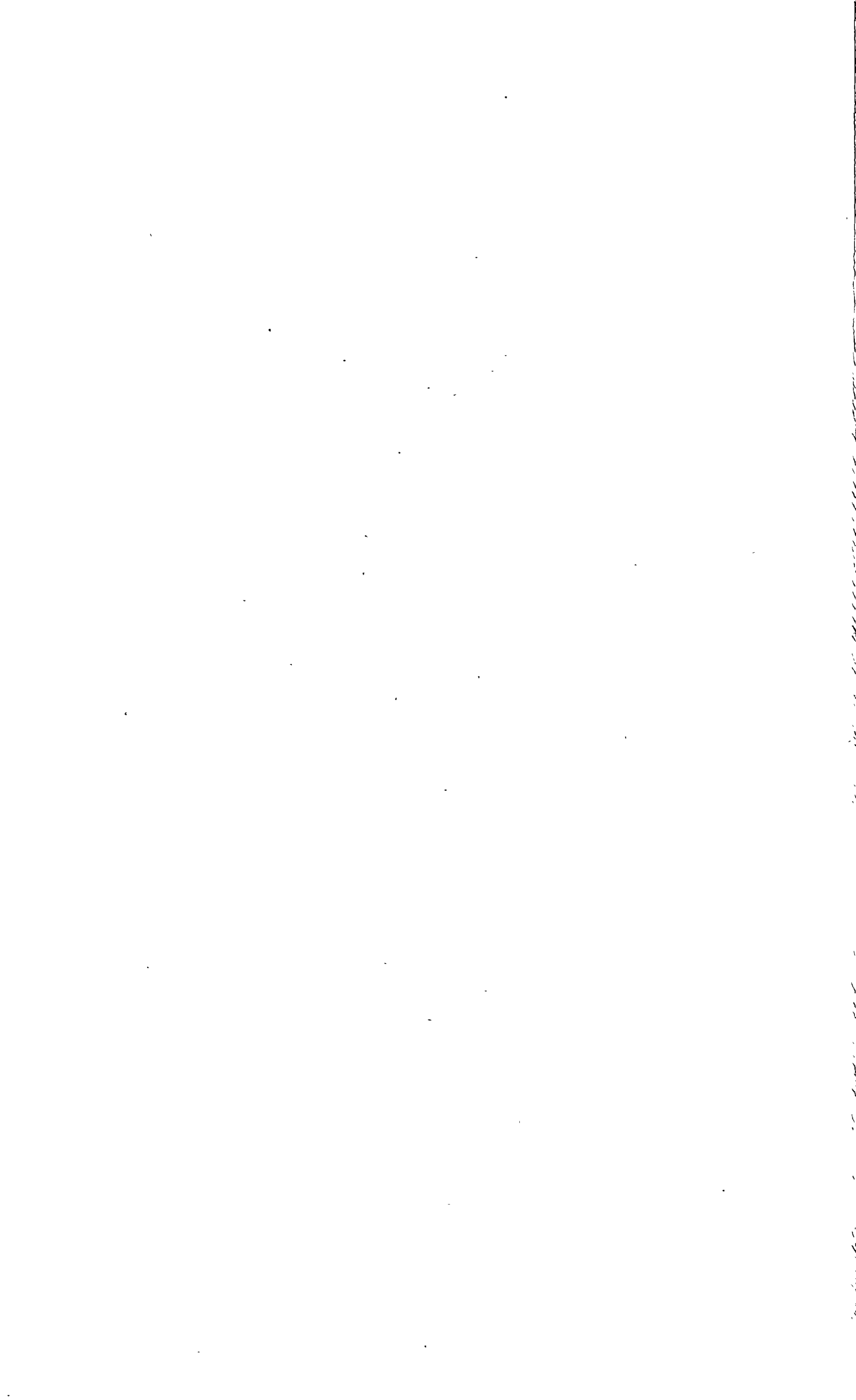
