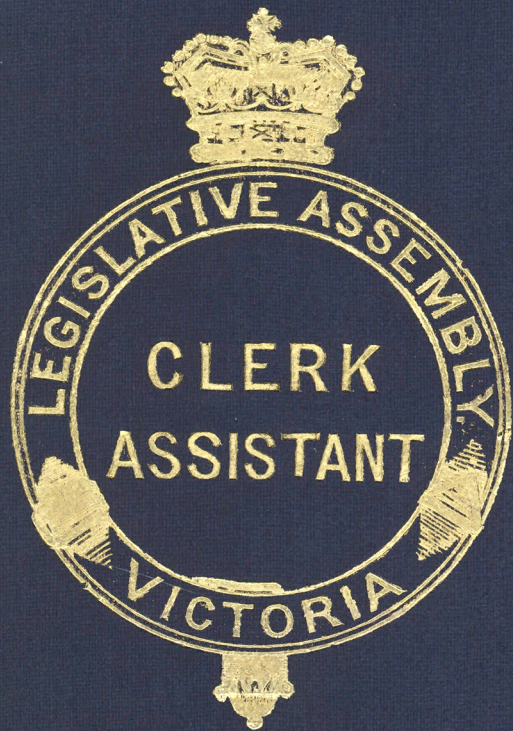

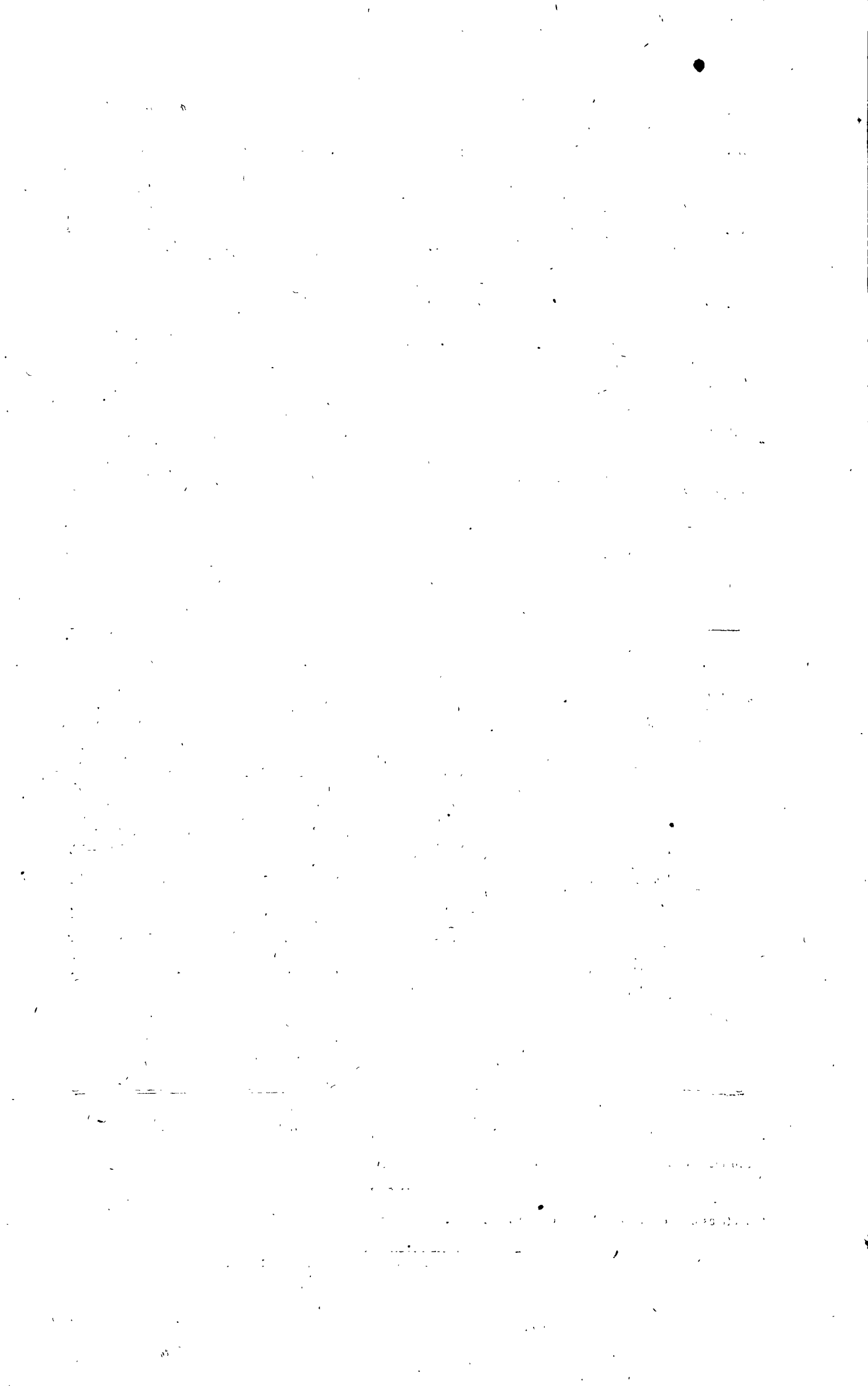

2. MR. OUTTRIM : To ask the Honorable the Acting Premier if it is his intention to re-appoint the Select Committee upon the efficacy of vaccination and upon the operation of the vaccination laws of the State; if so, when.
3. MR. RO : ERS : To ask the Honorable the Acting Premier—
 1. If he has read the remarks in the *Argus* newspaper of Wednesday, 9th July instant (page 5), attributed to Judge Box when hearing a case against the Bay Excursion Company for alleged negligence of a servant of the company—"There ought to be legislation to deal with this sort of thing. You never saw such a thing as the ordinary shipping ticket. They ought to be stopped and made to issue them in a reasonable way. There should be legislation on the subject"
 2. As the said tickets are issued with a proviso that "The company is not responsible for accidents or perils of the sea, or the neglect or default of the pilot, master, engineers, or other servants of the company, or any consequences arising therefrom," and as the plaintiff in the case was non-suited in consequence of the wording on the ticket—which is similar in all cases—will the Government take immediate steps to introduce legislation on the lines indicated by Judge Box.
4. MR. TUNNECLIFFE : To ask the Honorable the Minister of Mines—
 1. If he has seen a statement in the *Age* newspaper of 1st July instant, made by Mr. Jude, in which he stated—"The officers had been informed that the Virginia management had asserted that they did not mind a strike, as there was sufficient repairing work to be done underground to keep non-unionists employed for three months."
 2. Whether he has seen a letter in the *Age* newspaper of 3rd July instant, signed by A. J. Dalhousie, Eaglehawk, commenting on the above statement, and stating—"On inquiry I find this statement only too true, as the main shaft is in a deplorable state and a positive danger to the men going on and off shift. I have good reason to believe that many other parts of the mine would benefit by being more often inspected by those qualified and paid to do so, &c., &c."; if so, will he have inquiries made without delay to determine the truth or otherwise of these statements.

5. **MR. SNOWBALL** : To ask the Honorable the Minister of Public Instruction if his attention has been called to the statement that in some districts State schools are closed during the coursing season to allow the children and teachers to attend coursing matches, where great cruelty to animals takes place ; if so, will he take steps to stop this practice.
6. **MR. SWINBURNE** : To ask the Honorable the Acting Premier—
1. If his attention has been drawn to the case of an appeal for damages heard before His Honour Judge Box in the County Court on Tuesday, the 8th July instant, wherein a lady was injured on the s.s. *Ozone* as the result of negligence of one of the company's employes, but damages could not be given because the company had printed on its ticket "that it would not be liable for negligence on the part of its servants."
 2. Will he, as His Honour advises, at once bring in legislation to deal with the matter, seeing the shipping company is responsible for negligence in the case of goods and should be with regard to passengers.

As the said tickets are issued with a proviso that "The company is not responsible for accidents or perils of the sea, or the neglect or default of the pilot, master, engineers, or other servants of the company, or any consequences arising therefrom," and as the plaintiff in the case was non-suited in consequence of the wording on the ticket—which is similar in all cases—will the Government take immediate steps to introduce legislation on the lines indicated by Judge Box.

I have good reason to believe that many other parts of the mine would benefit by being more often inspected by those qualified and paid to do so, &c., &c."; if so, will he have inquiries made without delay to determine the truth or otherwise of these statements.

“The company may demand and take for every passenger travelling upon the tramway or any part thereof including tolls for the use of the tramway and the carriages and for motive power and every other expense incidental to such conveyance any tolls not exceeding the fares specified in the Third Schedule.

“The company shall on being served with a requisition in that behalf by the Tramways Board run upon any line of tramway open for public traffic and specified in such requisition two or more carriages every morning (except Sundays and public holidays) between the hours of six and seven o'clock and two carriages every evening between the hours of half-past five and half-past six for workmen at an uniform fare of Three half-pence for each journey. Provided always that the tolls herein specified shall be subject to revision by Act of Parliament at any time after the lapse of ten years from the completion of twenty miles of the tramways to be constructed under this Act, without the company or the person or body corporate replacing the company being entitled to any compensation in consequence of such revision.”

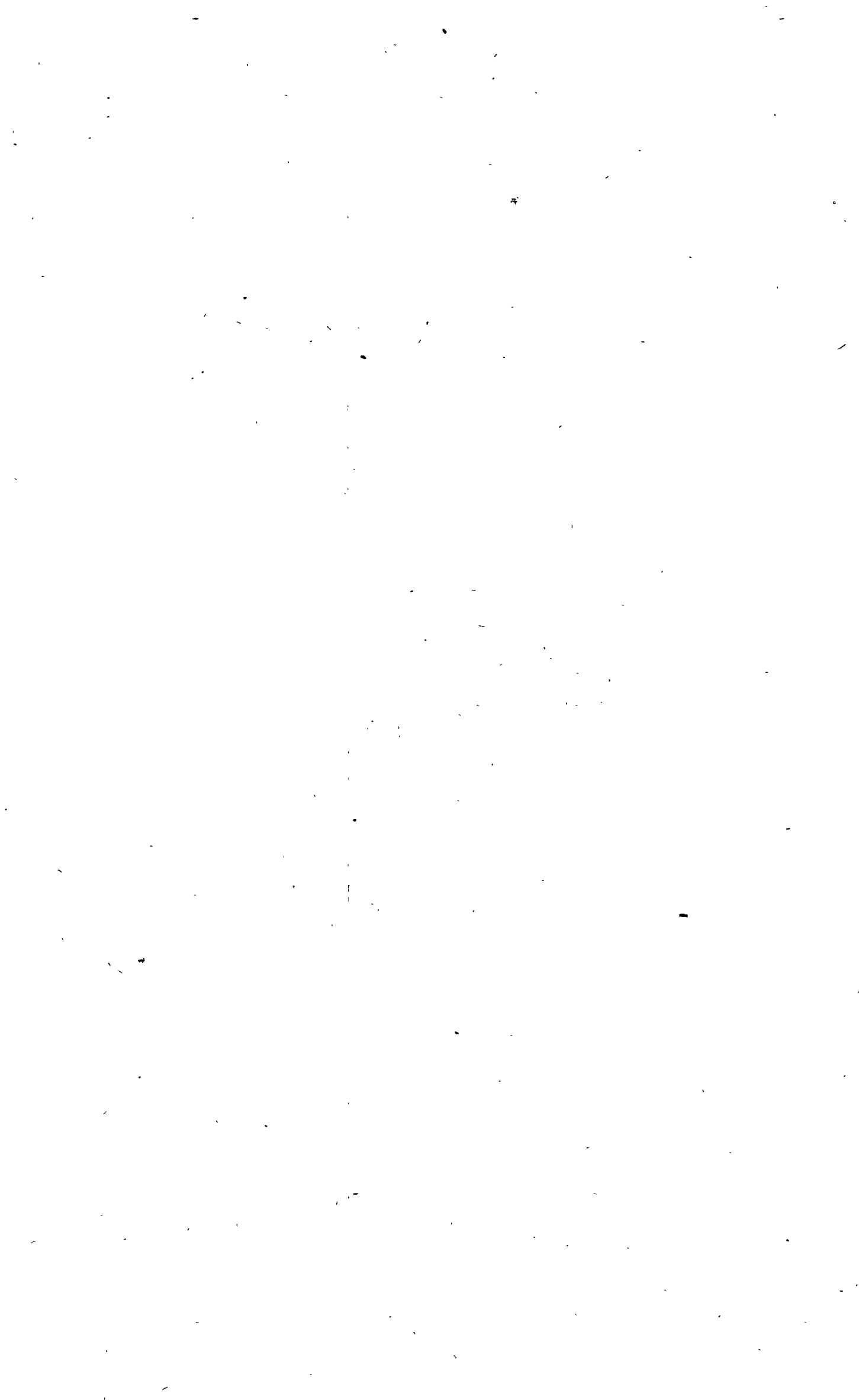

1. MR. McLACHLAN: To ask the Honorable the Minister of Railways—
 1. If he thinks that bountiful rains and consequent good crops in the country have anything to do with the railway surplus.
 2. If the privately-owned and municipal trams and 'buses in Melbourne and suburbs are paying any rent to the State.
 3. If he hopes to make the railways pay in the future, and give reduced freights and fares to country people and increased wages to the railway employés when 44 per cent. of the people in this State, viz., the people in Melbourne and suburbs who are benefiting financially in some degree by the efforts of the country producer and country railways, are using private or Melbourne and suburban municipal-owned trams and 'buses.
 4. If he thinks that it is time the street railways or trams and the 'buses were taken over by the State.
 5. If unwilling to recommend that the trams and 'buses in Melbourne and suburbs be taken over by the State, would he be prepared to recommend that the profits from the country railways be distributed amongst country municipalities to improve the conditions existing therein and reduce the rates on the properties within those municipalities.
 6. If he thinks that Melbourne and suburbs can legitimately claim a share of the profits of country railways if they continue to support the private trams and 'buses.
 7. If he thinks that the undeveloped portions of Victoria have a hope of getting developmental railways when the general railway revenue of this State is seriously diminished by the financial support which Melbourne and suburban people give to street railways and 'buses.
 8. If he is prepared to recommend that street railways be laid down and 'buses provided in the city and suburbs by the State for the convenience and benefit of thousands of country people who daily visit Melbourne and who are compelled to make use of the present privately-owned system in the absence of a State one.
 9. If he thinks it is a good policy which allows privately-owned trams and 'buses to annex the revenue which, some may maintain, ought to flow into the State channel.
 10. If he thinks it is time to review the whole position which allows private people and metropolitan municipalities to run street railways and 'buses.
2. MR. ROBERTSON: To ask the Honorable the Commissioner of Crown Lands and Survey if he will cause the evidence given before the Royal Commission to investigate certain Complaints *re* Closer Settlement to be printed and circulated to Members.
3. MR. HAMPSON: To ask the Honorable the Premier if he is aware of the alarming report presented to the Huntly Shire Council by their Health Officer (Dr. Park) on 2nd October instant, wherein it is declared that "there is no chance of any contagious disease being stamped out in the district while the present system of the disposal of night-soil from Bendigo is continued"; if so, will he take steps to introduce a Bill so that the Bendigo City Council may proceed with their proposed sewerage scheme.
4. MR. HANNAH: To ask the Honorable the Premier if he will inform the House when he proposes introduce the Bill he referred to as already drafted when replying to the recent deputation from charitable institutions in relation to the will of the late Charles Lamond Forrest, formerly a Member of this House.

5. MR. MACKEY : To ask the Honorable the Minister of Labour—

4. If he has considered what effect his non-compliance with section 178 of the Act would produce upon the minds of others bound to comply with the Act.

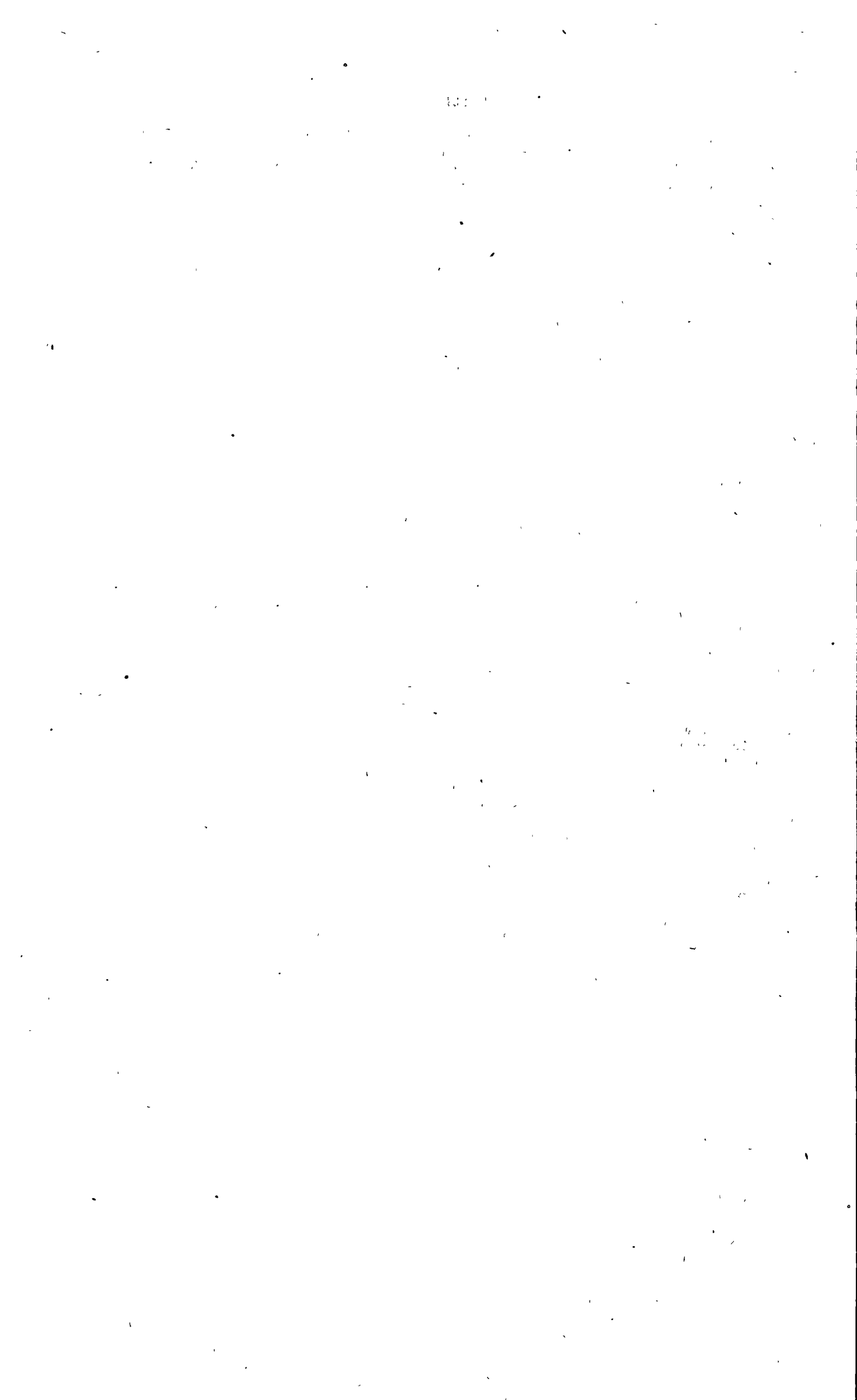

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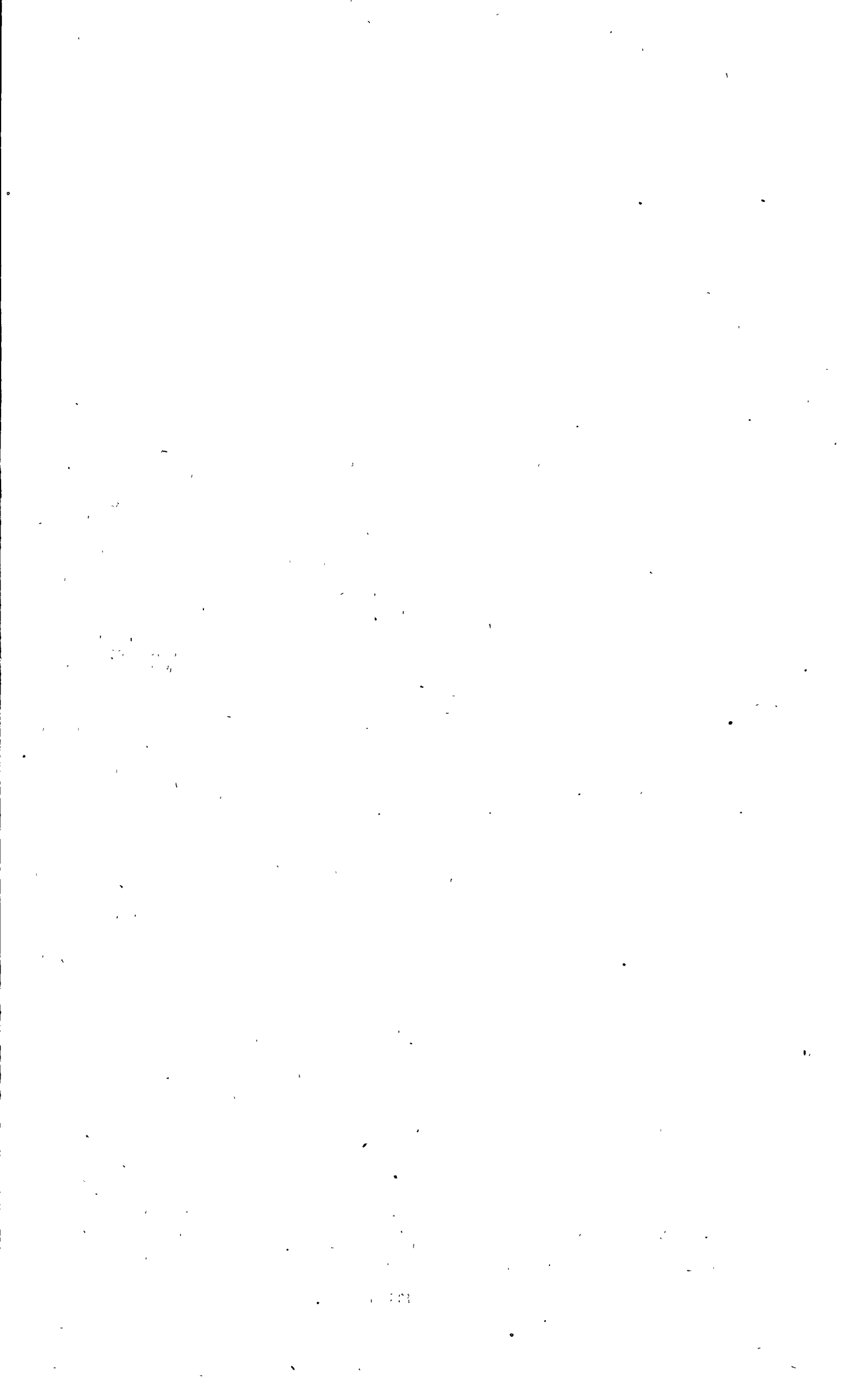
