

17. HIS EXCELLENCY THE GOVERNOR'S SPEECH.—Mr. Speaker reported that the House had that day attended His Excellency the Governor in the Legislative Council Chamber, when His Excellency was pleased to make a speech to both Houses of Parliament, of which Mr. Speaker said he had, for greater accuracy, obtained a copy, as follows:—

Mr. President and Honorable Gentlemen of the Legislative Council:

Mr. Speaker and Gentlemen of the Legislative Assembly:

I have called you together for the consideration of important public business.

On this, the first occasion of my meeting Parliament, I am glad to be able to congratulate you on the general well-being of the community.

Notwithstanding the drought of last summer, the bountiful rains that have fallen all over the State give promise of a good season.

Though the returns of State enterprises, such as the railways, were adversely affected by the drought, the country is prosperous, and business is advancing along sound lines.

During the summer devastating bush fires occurred in many parts of Victoria, and culminated in one of the most disastrous outbreaks in the history of the State. The fires were most destructive in the dense forests of the Dividing Range. It is regretted that 31 lives were lost, and that several townships and much property were destroyed. This disaster evoked a demonstration of spontaneous and generous sympathy in the community; and in a few weeks a sum of over £180,000 was raised for the relief of the sufferers. The relief fund is being administered by a committee of citizens under the Lord Mayor of Melbourne. Working in co-operation with them, a committee composed of some of my Advisers has directed measures of relief given by the State. While nothing can obliterate the horror of the calamity, my Advisers feel that everything humanly possible was done to meet the wants of the sufferers, and that those who organized these remedial efforts deserve the thanks of the community for their energy and the good results of their work.

The administration of the State has been carried on with the prudence and efficiency characteristic of Victoria.

Special efforts have been made to promote economy in the public services. A committee of my Advisers made an exhaustive examination of the finances. An expert has been appointed to inquire into and report upon the organization of the departments, and to make recommendations with a view to the prevention of any defects which may be found to exist.

Considerable progress has been made in the developmental policy of the State.

The first instalment of the construction of railways in the Riverina district of New South Wales was completed in April on the opening of the railway to Balranald. The railway to Stony Crossing and bridges across the Murray River are being built.

In Victoria 25 miles of railways have been opened during the year; and 18 miles are under construction. The further development of the metropolitan railways system is being specially considered.

The State Rivers and Water Supply Commission has in progress works which in a few years will raise the storage capacity of its undertakings from 950,000 acre-feet to 2,000,000 acre-feet.

The Country Roads Board, while continuing its activities in relation to main and developmental roads, has begun its work in connexion with State highways. A sum of £2,000,000 per annum is being expended by this Board in country districts.

Loan moneys recently made available to the Forests Commission have enabled it to pursue a progressive policy. The recent bush fires emphasize the need for strengthening the legislation as to forests, and a Bill for that and other forest purposes will be introduced.

The Department of Agriculture, in addition to discharging its duties in regard to exports and its other functions, is carrying on extensive research and educational work for the assistance of those engaged in agricultural pursuits.

The recent legislation relating to dried fruits has greatly assisted in the marketing of these products, and in relieving the difficult situation in which the growers were placed.

In furtherance of their developmental programme my Advisers will submit to you a measure for the establishment of a Rural Bank.

The construction of new school buildings in centres of growing population and the reconstruction and improvement of existing school buildings have been systematically continued.

My Advisers, having regard to the importance to the community of safeguarding the public health, have taken steps to carry out an effective health policy.

Sanatoria have been commenced at Janefield and Mont Park; and increased accommodation for consumptives at Heatherton is under consideration. A special hospital for the treatment of venereal disease is nearly completed, and a further clinic is to be established almost immediately.

An area of 450 acres has been acquired for a colony for the care and training of mental defectives; and provision is being made for residential institutions for the education of backward children.

The strength of the police force has been increased by making 130 additional appointments.

A system has been inaugurated for the better classification of prisoners, and the more individual treatment of youthful delinquents; and, in order to promote these objects, arrangements have been made for the accommodation of a number of prisoners, under indeterminate sentence, in Beechworth Gaol, which has been remodelled for the purpose.

Mr. Speaker and Gentlemen of the Legislative Assembly:

The Estimates of Expenditure for the current financial year, which will in due course be laid before you, have been framed with such regard for economy as is consistent with efficiency.

Mr. President and Honorable Gentlemen of the Legislative Council:

Mr. Speaker and Gentlemen of the Legislative Assembly:

In furtherance of the Imperial Migration Agreement, my Advisers have submitted several schemes to the Government of the Commonwealth. These provide, in the main, for the settlement of immigrants in groups. It is hoped that a number of immigrants may be received under these conditions.

My Advisers view with grave concern the far-reaching disorganization of the finances of the State that must be brought about if the present financial proposals of the Government of the Commonwealth are carried into effect.

The proposed referendums for the amendment of the Constitution of the Commonwealth are engaging the careful attention of my Advisers. They regard with apprehension the possibility of the industrial policy of the State, including matters of such importance to the State as wages boards, being in effect removed from the control of the Parliament of Victoria.

The report of the Royal Commission relating to outer ports, and the report of the Royal Commission relating to the State Electricity Commission are being carefully considered; and any measures required to deal with matters arising out of the recommendations made therein will be brought forward.

The Bill to provide for the redistribution of seats for the Legislative Assembly, the second reading of which was carried last session, will be again submitted.

My Advisers have had to deal with a number of intricate metropolitan problems which have accumulated during the past few years, and for which legislation is necessary. Early in the session Bills will be introduced dealing with The Melbourne and Metropolitan Board of Works, metropolitan main roads and bridges, metropolitan drainage and rivers, The Melbourne Harbor Trust, The Melbourne and Metropolitan Tramways Board, The Metropolitan Gas Company, and the regulation of the supply of gas. The question of the removal of the cattle saleyards from Newmarket, which will involve the expenditure of several millions of money, is being carefully considered, and a decision will shortly be made.

A Bill to amend the Local Government Acts will be laid before you. Measures for the more adequate taxation of heavy commercial vehicles and the taxation of horse-drawn vehicles throughout the State will be brought forward.

Proposals for extending the powers of the Commissioners of the State Savings Bank so as to enable them to deal more effectively with housing problems will be submitted.

There will be laid before you a Bill to provide for the care, treatment, and training of mental defectives, and also a Bill dealing with intermediate hospitals.

You will be gratified to learn that His Honour Sir Leo Cussen, with characteristic public spirit, has again undertaken to prepare a general consolidation of the Statutes; and it is hoped that this may include the Acts passed during the present session.

 - (ii) The second reading of the Bill;
 - (iii) The Committee stage of the Bill;
 - (iv) The remaining stages of the Bill;

and the order with regard to the time allotted to the Committee stage of the Bill may, out of the time allotted, apportion a certain time or times to a particular clause or clauses, or to any particular part or parts of the Bill.

- (b) When Estimates of Expenditure are being considered a Minister may at any time declare that the Estimates are of an urgent nature, and move "That the Estimates of Expenditure be considered of an urgent nature"; and if twenty Members thereupon rise in their places as indicating approval of the motion being put such motion shall be put forthwith—no debate or amendment being allowed; and on such motion being agreed to a Minister may forthwith, or at any time during any sitting of the Committee, but not so as to interrupt a Member who is addressing the Committee, move a further motion or motions specifying the time which (exclusive of any adjournment or suspension of sitting, and notwithstanding anything contained in any other Standing Order or any Sessional Order) shall be allotted to each or any Department of, or to the whole of, the Estimates.
- (c) When any motion of any kind whatsoever has been moved a Minister may at any time declare that the motion is an urgent motion, and move "That the motion be considered an urgent motion"; and if twenty Members thereupon rise in their places as indicating approval of the motion being put such motion shall be put forthwith—no debate or amendment being allowed; and on such motion being agreed to a Minister may forthwith move a further motion specifying the time which (exclusive of any adjournment or suspension of sitting, and notwithstanding anything contained in any other Standing Order or any Sessional Order) shall be allotted to the motion.

- (d) Upon such further motion or motions with regard to the allotment of time being moved no debate thereon shall be allowed for more than one hour, and in speaking thereon no member shall exceed ten minutes. If the debate be not sooner concluded then forthwith upon the expiration of that time the Speaker or the Chairman shall put any questions on any amendment or motion already proposed from the Chair.
- (e) For the purpose of bringing to a conclusion any proceedings which are to be brought to a conclusion on the expiration of the time allotted under any motion passed under any of the preceding paragraphs of this Standing Order, the Speaker or the Chairman shall at the time appointed under the motion for the conclusion of those proceedings put forthwith the question on any amendment or motion already proposed from the Chair; and, in the case of the consideration of any Bill in Committee or on any of the remaining stages, shall then put any clauses and schedules and any amendments and new clauses and schedules desired by the Government-copies of which have been circulated by the Government among Members two hours at least before the expiration of the allotted time—and any other question requisite to dispose of the business before the House or Committee. - (iv) The remaining stages of the Bill;

and the order with regard to the time allotted to the Committee stage of the Bill may, out of the time allotted, apportion a certain time or times to a particular clause or clauses, or to any particular part or parts of the Bill.

- (b) When Estimates of Expenditure are being considered a Minister may at any time declare that the Estimates are of an urgent nature, and move "That the Estimates of Expenditure be considered of an urgent nature"; and if twenty Members thereupon rise in their places as indicating approval of the motion being put such motion shall be put forthwith—no debate or amendment being allowed; and on such motion being agreed to a Minister may forthwith, or at any time during any sitting of the Committee, but not so as to interrupt a Member who is addressing the Committee, move a further motion or motions specifying the time which (exclusive of any adjournment or suspension of sitting, and notwithstanding anything contained in any other Standing Order or any Sessional Order) shall be allotted to each or any Department of, or to the whole of, the Estimates.
- (c) When any motion of any kind whatsoever has been moved a Minister may at any time declare that the motion is an urgent motion, and move "That the motion be considered an urgent motion"; and if twenty Members thereupon rise in their places as indicating approval of the motion being put such motion shall be put forthwith—no debate or amendment being allowed; and on such motion being agreed to a Minister may forthwith move a further motion specifying the the time which (exclusive of any adjournment or suspension of sitting, and notwithstanding anything contained in any other Standing Order or any Sessional Order) shall be allotted to the motion.

(d) Upon such further motion or motions with regard to the allotment of time being moved no debate thereon shall be allowed for more than one hour, and in speaking thereon no member shall exceed ten minutes. If the debate be not sooner concluded then forthwith upon the expiration of that time the Speaker or the Chairman shall put any questions on any amendment or motion already proposed from the Chair.

(e) For the purpose of bringing to a conclusion any proceedings which are to be brought to a conclusion on the expiration of the time allotted under any motion passed under any of the preceding paragraphs of this Standing Order, the Speaker or the Chairman shall at the time appointed under the motion for the conclusion of those proceedings put forthwith the question on any amendment or motion already proposed from the Chair; and, in the case of the consideration of any Bill in Committee or on any of the remaining stages, shall then put any clauses and schedules and any amendments and new clauses and schedules desired by the Government—copies of which have been circulated by the Government among Members two hours at least before the expiration of the allotted time—and any other question requisite to dispose of the business before the House or Committee. No other amendments, new clauses, or schedules shall be proposed.

(f) On any day on which any proceedings are to be brought to a conclusion under this Standing Order no dilatory motion on such proceedings, nor motion for an instruction to the Committee on a Bill which is the subject of such proceedings, nor motion to postpone a clause, nor motion to recommit the Bill shall be received unless moved by a Minister, and the question on any such motion shall be put forthwith without amendment or debate, and no motion for the adjournment of the House under Standing Order No. 8B shall be entertained.

(g) Standing Order No. 78c (Closure of Debate) shall not apply to any proceedings in respect of which time has been allotted in pursuance of this Standing Order.

- (h) Where any time has been specified for the commencement of any proceedings in connexion with any business under this Standing Order, when the time so specified has been reached the business, whatsoever its nature be, then before the House or Committee shall be postponed forthwith, and the first-mentioned business shall be proceeded with, and all steps necessary to enable this to be done shall be taken accordingly—put and agreed to.

Clause 4, sub-section (2), after line 37 insert the words—"On the happening of any of the events referred to in this sub-section or until such an arrangement as aforesaid has been made no provision of this Act (except sections two six thirteen twenty-one twenty-two twenty-three twenty-four twenty-five and twenty-seven) shall apply to any registered film or to any picture from any registered film unless the contrary is expressly provided by this Act."

Clause 8, sub-section (2), line 34, after the word "or" insert the words "(in the case of films relating to diseases or disorders peculiar to male persons only or to female persons only)."

Clause 9, sub-section (1), line 39, before the word "under" insert the words "or by the imposition by him of any condition."

sub-section (2), page 6, line 2, at the end of the sub-section add the words "and to examine any film."

Clause 11, line 15, at the end of the clause add the words:—

"Provided that the censor's approval shall not be unconditionally refused in the case of any film which in the opinion of the censor—

- (a) in good faith and with artistic merit reproduces or adapts any work of recognized literary merit; or
- (b) in good faith and with artistic merit represents any scriptural historical traditional mythical or legendary story."
- Clause 15, sub-section (1), line 7, after the word "Act" insert the words "and every person exhibiting a picture from a registered film."

On the motion of Dr. Argyle the following further amendment was made in this Bill:-

Clause 22, sub-section (1), at the end of the sub-section after the words "advertising purposes" insert the words "If at any exhibition of cinematograph pictures in any theatre there is exhibited more than the length of film required to be exhibited under this section in the case of pictures produced within the British dominions or (as the case may be) Australia, then, in calculating the length of film required to be exhibited under this section at exhibitions in such theatre during the period of four weeks beginning with the date of the said first-mentioned exhibition, the excess over the length of film so required to be exhibited shall be taken into account as if such excess length were exhibited at a subsequent exhibition or exhibitions of cinematograph pictures in such theatre during such period."

Mr. Blackburn offered the following new clause to be added to the Bill :-

Insert the following New Clause to follow Clause 8:-

A. (1) If the Minister has reason to believe that a picture from any registered film is not suitable for exhibition before a child under the age of sixteen years he may by writing under his hand direct such person or persons as he thinks fit to cause such film to be submitted to the censor for his approval.

(2) The provisions of section five of this Act shall apply to any person so directed.
(3) If the censor decides that a picture from such film is not suitable for exhibition before a child under the age of sixteen years he shall certify such decision in writing to the Minister and to the applicant and shall approve such film subject to a condition that any picture from such film is not to be exhibited before any child over the age of six years and under the age of sixteen years and thereupon the provisions of sub-sections (3) and (4) of section eight of this Act and the provisions of sections nine and twenty-six of this Act and of the appropriate regulations and of the Schedule to this Act shall apply to such film.

(4) The censor shall not in any case refuse approval of a registered film or approve a registered

film subject to any other condition than as in the foregoing sub-section provided.

(5) This section shall not apply when any arrangement under section three of this Act is in operation.

And the said clause was read a second and third time and added to the Bill.

Ordered—That the Bill be returned to the Legislative Council with a Message acquainting them that the Legislative Assembly have agreed to the same with amendments, with which they desire the concurrence of the Legislative Council.

(ii) where such income exceeds Five hundred pounds—

for every pound sterling of the taxable amount thereof up to Five hundred pounds, Ninepence;

for every pound sterling of the taxable amount thereof over Five hundred pounds and up to One thousand pounds, Elevenpence;

for every pound sterling of the taxable amount thereof over One thousand pounds and up to One thousand five hundred pounds, Thirteenpence; and

for every pound sterling of the taxable amount thereof over One thousand five hundred pounds, Fifteenpence;

- (c) In the case of any person (not being a company) there shall be payable an additional tax as follows:—
 - (i) Where the income, whether from personal exertion or the produce of property or both, exceeds Eight hundred pounds but does not exceed One thousand pounds—

an amount equal to ten per centum of the total amount of tax otherwise chargeable;

(ii) Where the income, whether from personal exertion or the produce of property or both, exceeds One thousand pounds but does not exceed One thousand two hundred and fifty pounds—

an amount equal to twelve and a half per centum of the total amount of tax otherwise chargeable;

- (iii) Where the income, whether from personal exertion or the produce of property or both, exceeds One thousand two hundred and fifty pounds but does not exceed Two thousand two hundred pounds
 - an amount equal to fifteen per centum of the total amount of tax otherwise chargeable;
- (iv) Where the income, whether from personal exertion or the produce of property or both, exceeds Two thousand two hundred pounds but does not exceed Five thousand pounds—

an amount equal to twenty per centum of the total amount of tax otherwise chargeable; and

(v) Where the income, whether from personal exertion or the produce of property or both, exceeds Five thousand pounds—

an amount equal to twenty-five per centum of the total amount of tax otherwise chargeable;

- (d) On the income of a company (other than a mutual life assurance company)—for every pound sterling of the taxable amount thereof, Sixteenpence;
- (e) On the income of a mutual life assurance company—
 - (i) with respect to its mutual life assurance business only, for every pound sterling of the taxable amount of income, Twelvepence; and

(ii) with respect to its other business, for every pound sterling of the taxable amount of income, Sixteenpence:

Provided that, where the articles of association of a life assurance company provide that a percentage of its profits is to be distributed among the life assurance policy-holders of the company, then, for the purposes of this resolution, the rate for every pound sterling of the amount represented by the like percentage of the taxable amount of the income of the company from life assurance business shall be Twelvepence and the rate for every pound sterling of the taxable amount of the remainder of the income of the company shall be Sixteenpence:

Provided further that a person (not being a company) whose income from personal exertion and the produce of property during the year immediately preceding the year of assessment did not exceed Two hundred pounds shall not unless otherwise provided in the Income Tax Acts be liable

Provided further that where any person (not being a company) derives income both from personal exertion and from the produce of property and the total income so derived exceeds Five hundred pounds, then for the purposes of this resolution the rate for every pound sterling of the taxable amount of income derived from each source shall be the same as if the income from each such source exceeded Five hundred pounds.

Notwithstanding anything in the foregoing provisions of this resolution, where a person would, apart from this provision of this resolution, be liable to pay income tax of an amount less than Five

shillings the tax payable by that person shall be Five shillings.

And the said resolution was read a second time and agreed to by the House.

No. 7.—Electoral Districts Bill.—Clause 5.

- (1) In making any proposed redivision of the State of Victoria into electoral districts under
 - (a) the Commissioners shall provide for "twenty-four" metropolitan and "forty-one" urban and country electoral districts on the basis approximately of the following quotas:—
 - (i) twenty-one thousand five hundred electors for each metropolitan district; (ii) "fifteen thousand" electors for each urban district; and

 - (iii) ten thousand electors for each country district:

Provided that the Commissioners may adopt a margin of allowance to be used whenever necessary, but the quota shall not be departed from to a greater extent than one-fifth more or one-fifth less:

Provided further that-

(i) in case of any proposed urban electoral district the Commissioners may adopt a greater margin of allowance if they consider that any portion of any existing urban electoral district would be more properly included in any proposed country electoral district or districts; and

- (ii) the Commissioners may depart from the quota in the case of any proposed country electoral district where the greater part of the area thereof is mountainous and sparsely populated.
- (2) In making any such proposed redivision the Commissioners shall give due consideration

to-

(a) the distribution of the numbers of electors for the Legislative Assembly throughout the State and the likelihood of any changes in the distribution of electors within any localities in the State;

(b) community or diversity of interests;

(c) means of communication;

- (d) physical features;
 (e) existing boundaries of electoral districts and subdivisions; and
 (f) Commonwealth electoral boundaries.
- (3) Subject to this section—
 - (a) the areas of proposed metropolitan electoral districts shall comprise those of the existing electoral districts mentioned in Part I. of the Schedule to this Act;
 - (b) the areas of proposed urban electoral districts shall comprise those of the existing
 - electoral districts mentioned in Part II. of that Schedule; and
 (c) the areas of proposed "country" districts shall comprise those of the existing electoral districts mentioned in Part III. of that Schedule.
- "(4) In order to carry into effect the purposes of this section the Commissioners may include in any proposed electoral district any portion of any such existing electoral district whether of the same class or not. "—(Dr. Argyle.)

Amendment proposed—That the word "twenty-four," in line 1 of paragraph (a) of sub-section (1), be omitted with a view of inserting in place thereof the word "twenty-six."—(Dr. Argyle.)
