

Amongst other methods and pretexts resorted to for the purpose of thwarting the will of Parliament, and rendering abortive the law of the colony, a system of usury has been established, the object and effect of which is so to entangle and embarrass those whom the law has placed in possession of areas of land under stated conditions that the occupants are forced to part with the interest they have acquired in such areas, in order to satisfy the exorbitant and unjust demands of the aforesaid usurers.

(3.) The practices of these usurers are attended with the most deplorable consequences, so far as their victims are concerned, and with many and serious evils, deliberately planned and plainly

directed against the common weal.

(4.) The financial necessities of those whom the State has placed in possession of specified lands has been used, and is now being used, as an excuse for evicting the population placed by law on certain lands, and putting those lands to a purpose different to that contemplated by Parliament and embodied in its Acts.

(5.) The present Parliament is morally bound either to repeal the existing Act regulating the terms, conditions, and extent of individual settlement, or to take prompt and effective measures to carry out the spirit and intention of the violated Acts of Parliament, and to put a stop to the evictions

now in progress.

(6.) In order to attain this object, to foster and protect settlement on the lands in accordance with the existing law, and to prevent the dangerous aggregation of extensive areas of land contrary to the stipulations and conditions of Parliament, this House deems it desirable to establish a National Bank of Issue and Deposit, with a circulating capital equal to half the present market value of all the unsold land in Victoria (reserves excepted), and with power to advance money on the security of the unimproved value of lands at a fixed rate of interest.

(7.) Contingent on the foregoing resolutions being adopted by this House, That the Honorable the Premier be requested to prepare and submit for the consideration of Parliament a measure which will

embody and give effect to the same.



 - (1.) The number of titles examined and the general work done by each of the Examiners of Titles during the last twelve months.
 - (2.) The salary paid to each Examiner, giving names.
 - (3.) The total number of requisitions made on titles by each Examiner during the year.
 - (4.) The total cost of examining titles for the last year, including the cost of all clerks and others assisting the Examiners, and the interest on the value of the land and the capital expended in buildings.
 - (5.) An estimate of the area and value of land not yet brought under the operation of the Act.
- 10. Mr. McInte: To move, That a statement be laid before this House, showing the total expenditure incurred by the Government in connection with Wood's continuous brake, giving detailed particulars of the amount of labor and material, the cost of each, and the names of the officers and timekeepers by whom the same are certified; also, the cost of its application to each carriage and to each engine respectively; and, further, that this House be informed whether any arrangement has been entered into between the Government and the proprietors of the patent for the future use of the brake, or if any arrangement is pending between them; and, if so, what.
- 11. Mr. McIntyre: To move, That there be laid before this House a return of all free passes issued to travel upon the Government Railways from June 30th 1877 to date; showing by whom issued, to whom given, by whom requested, to and from what stations, and for what purpose; also, the number of special passenger trains run during the same period, by whose order, and for what purpose.
- 12. Mr. McIntyre: To move, That there be laid before this House a return showing the total amount paid for advertising (outside of the Government Gazette) by the several departments of the Public Service for each month of the year 1877; giving the names and localities of the newspapers advertised in, and the sums paid to each.
- 13. Mr. Dwyer: To move, That their Honors the Judges of the Supreme Court of Victoria, should make such alterations in the rules of the Supreme Court, dated the 3rd December 1872, framed under the Act 15 Vict. No. 10, as shall further integrate the legal professions, and give equal audience, rights, and privileges to, and impose equal liabilities on, all barristers, attorneys, solicitors, and proctors respectively of the said Court.
- 14. Mr. Purves: To move, That there be laid before this House a return of all appointments to the Public Service made by the Government since January 1st 1878.
- 15. Mr. Dwyer: To move, That instructions be issued to the police, or to such other persons, as the Government may think proper, to cause (and by instituting legal proceedings if necessary) the removal of all fences on public roads in Victoria.
- 16. Mr. Dwyer: To move, That all appointments to be in future made by Government shall be made in accordance with, and subject to the following rules, and not otherwise:—
 - (1.) Merit alone shall determine which of the applicants for any appointment shall receive it.
 - (2.) Before any appointment is made on the professional or clerical side of the Civil Service, and whether to the classified or unclassified branches, notice of intention to make it, and that applications will be received for it during the ensuing fortnight shall be first published in the Government Gazette.
 - (3.) Applicants who have passed the Civil Service examination shall be taken to be of superior merit to applicants who have not.
 - (4.) In future the number of marks which any person shall have obtained at any Civil Service examination shall be set after his name, and the maximum number of marks for every Civil Service examination shall be always the same.
 - (5.) The marks obtained by examinees at any Civil Service examination shall be considered indicative of the merits of the examinees.
 - (6.) Any person who has passed any Civil Service examination may present himself for examination at any other such examination, and the marks obtained by him at any such subsequent examination shall be the marks indicating his merit.
 - (7.) Any applicant who at any Civil Service examination shall have obtained a greater number of marks than any other applicant shall be considered as of superior merit to such last-mentioned applicant.
 - (8) If two or more of the applicants of greatest merit are on an equality as regards marks, the examiners for the Civil Service shall further examine, in such manner as they may determine, the candidates whose merits are on such equality, and shall determine their respective merits.
- 17. Mr. Gaunson: To move, That it is the imperative duty of the Government, and essential to the welfare of Parliamentary Government, that accurate and substantial reports of the proceedings and debates of the Victorian Legislature be published daily.
- 18. Mr. Tytherleigh: To move, That plans be prepared showing all the unsold lands of the colony, and the lands held under lease or under rental; that the unsold lands shall appear as white on such plans; that leaseholds shall appear as red; and that lands held under rental shall appear as blue; and that so soen as the respective holdings shall pass from the one stage to the other, they shall be colored accordingly; and every District Surveyor shall be instructed to color such plans, and have the same open to public inspection in his office.

- 19. Mr. Cooper: To move, That there be laid before this House a return showing how many Members of Parliament selected or took up land before Payment of Members became law, the number of acres secured by each Memoer, and the amount paid per acre.
- 20. Mr. Richardson: To move, That this House will, to-morrow, resolve itself into a Committee of the whole to consider the propriety of presenting an Address to His Excellency the Governor requesting him to cause a sum of £ to be placed on an Additional Estimate for the purchase of the Statue of Her Majesty the Queen now in the National Gallery.
- 21. Mr. Munro: To move, That there be laid before this House a return showing the amount of money paid to Mr. Pridham for services rendered in drafting a Bill in connection with the Friendly Societies Commission.
- 22. Mr. Brophy: To move, That this House will, to-morrow, resolve itself into a Committee of the whole to take into consideration the Report of the Select Committee appointed to consider the case of the Alma Consols and Mr. Edward O'Farrell, with a view to present an Address to His Excellency the Governor, requesting him to cause to be placed a sum of money upon the Estimates to carry out the recommendation of such Committee.
- 23. Mr. Bell: To move, That an arbitration clause be inserted in Government contract conditions, in case of dispute between contractors and Government officers.
- 24. Mr. Munro: To move, That there be laid before this House a return showing how much money has been spent by the Government on the Stony Creek Waterworks (irrespective of reticulation) by contract and day labor since the 2nd of August 1871, distinguishing the amounts spent prior to the employment of Messrs.
