

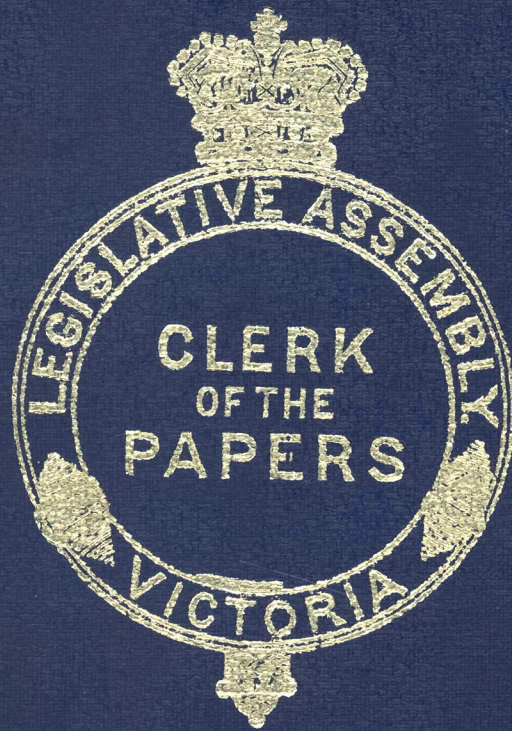

WEDNESDAY, 9TH JULY, 1958.

Questions—

1. MR. MITCHELL: To ask the Honorable the Premier whether the Government will introduce, early this Session, legislation to remove all restrictions at present applying to the carriage on public transport of guide dogs for blinded persons and to the entry of these dogs into shops, cafes, and places of public entertainment.
2. MR. MITCHELL: To ask the Honorable M. V. Porter, for the Honorable the Minister of Health—
 1. What infant welfare centres were granted more than the usual Government subsidy of £2,250 since 28th May, 1955, and what was the amount granted in each case.
 2. Whether these increased amounts will be granted to other centres.
3. MR. MOSS: To ask the Honorable the Premier—
 1. How much money has been made available to the Tourist Development Authority since the Tourist Act was assented to on 8th December, 1957.
 2. What amount was spent by the Authority during the last financial year.
4. MR. MOSS: To ask the Honorable the Commissioner of Public Works—
 1. How much money was spent in the metropolitan area by the Country Roads Board during the financial year 1957-58.
 2. How much money was granted out of the Country Roads Board Fund during the financial year 1957-58 to municipalities in the metropolitan area.
5. SIR HERBERT HYLAND: To ask the Honorable the Premier—
 1. Whether any grants from Government funds were made during the last three financial years towards the expenses of conducting the "Moomba" festival; if so, to whom or to what organizations the grants were made and what was the amount of each grant.
 2. Whether any grants of money have been made or other financial assistance given to the City Development Association during each of the last three financial years.
6. SIR HERBERT HYLAND: To ask the Honorable M. V. Porter, for the Honorable the Minister of Transport—
 1. Whether an agreement has been signed between the Victorian Railways Commissioners and the Victorian Employers' Federation regarding the development of the site of the Princes Bridge railway station; if so, whether he will lay the agreement on the table of the Library.
 2. Whether the Government is satisfied that the Victorian Employers' Federation can meet the estimated cost of £7,500,000 for proposed works on this site.
 3. What annual rental will be paid for this site.
7. SIR HERBERT HYLAND: To ask the Honorable M. V. Porter, for the Honorable the Minister of Transport, what automatic cost of living adjustments were made to salaries and wages of Victorian Railway employees—(a) from 27th June, 1950, to 28th October, 1952; (b) from 17th December, 1952, to 28th May, 1955, and (c) from 28th May, 1955, to the present time, and what was the annual cost to the Government of the increases granted in each of these periods.
8. SIR HERBERT HYLAND: To ask the Honorable the Premier, what action (if any) has been taken to stimulate the sale of whole milk and milk products, following the conference convened by him (the Premier) of representatives of the dairying industry.
9. MR. BARCLAY: To ask the Honorable the Minister of Electrical Undertakings what would be the respective estimated annual costs to the State Electricity Commission of the fixation of uniform charges throughout Victoria for electricity supplied for—(a) domestic purposes; and (b) industrial purposes, based on the charges now applicable in the metropolitan area.

 5. How many applicants were housed by the Commission during the twelve months ended 30th June, 1958, on account of evictions from their previous dwellings.
11. **MR. LOVEGROVE** : To ask the Honorable the Premier—
1. What action the Government is taking to stimulate dwelling construction at low interest rates by private enterprise.
 2. What negotiations have been conducted by the Government with reference to the proposed construction of flats over the railway line at Jolimont, and when construction of these flats will be commenced.
12. **MR. LOVEGROVE** : To ask the Honorable the Premier what action the Government is taking for relief of unemployment in view of the huge increase in unemployment in Victoria during the past three years.
13. **MR. LOVEGROVE** : To ask the Honorable the Minister of Labour and Industry—
1. How many outworkers in the clothing industry are licensed by the Department of Labour and Industry.
 2. What action the Department is taking to prevent sweating and underpayment in this industry.
14. **MR. LOVEGROVE** : To ask the Honorable the Premier whether the Government proposes to increase fares and freights on public transport.
15. **MR. CLAREY** : To ask the Honorable M. V. 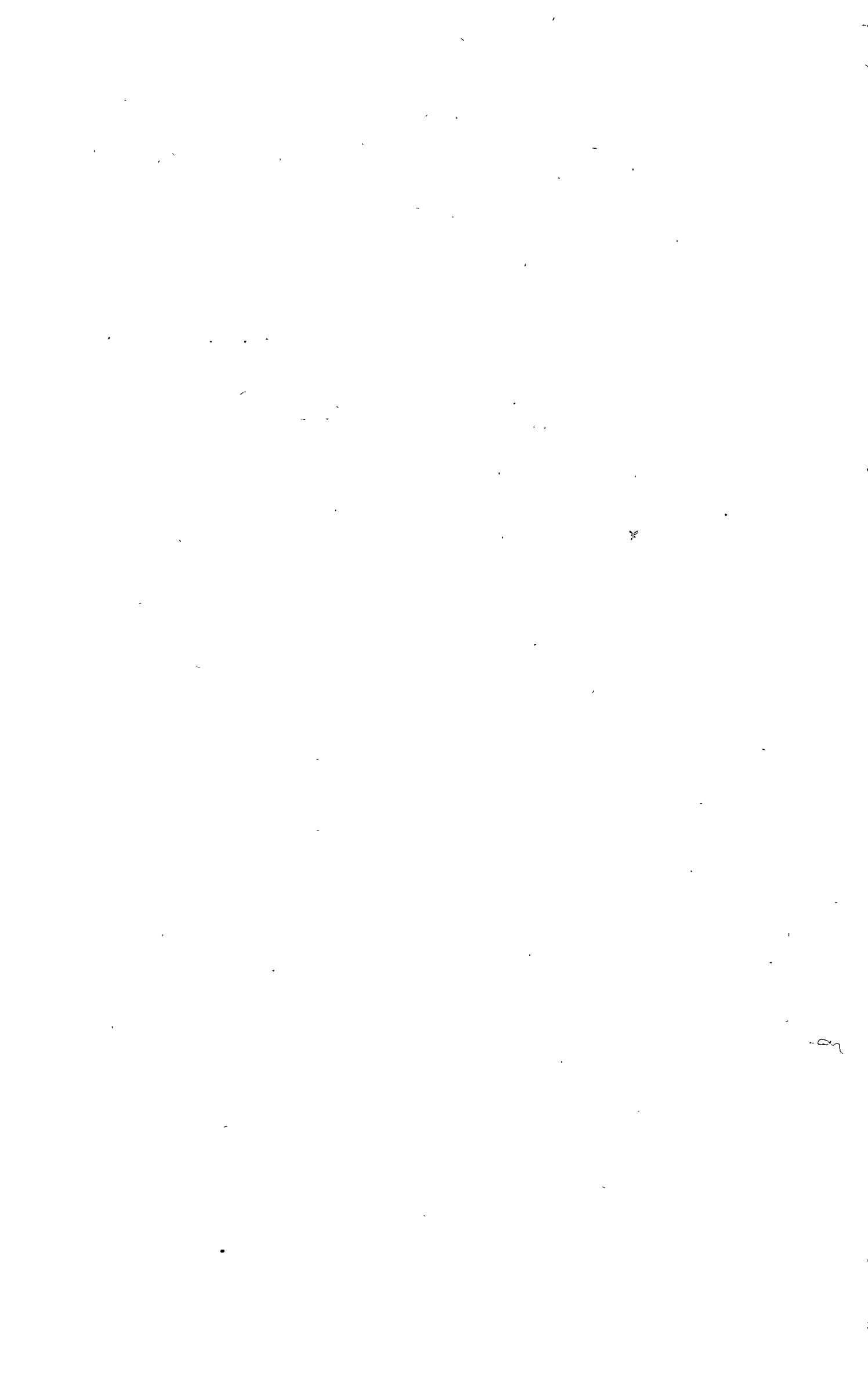

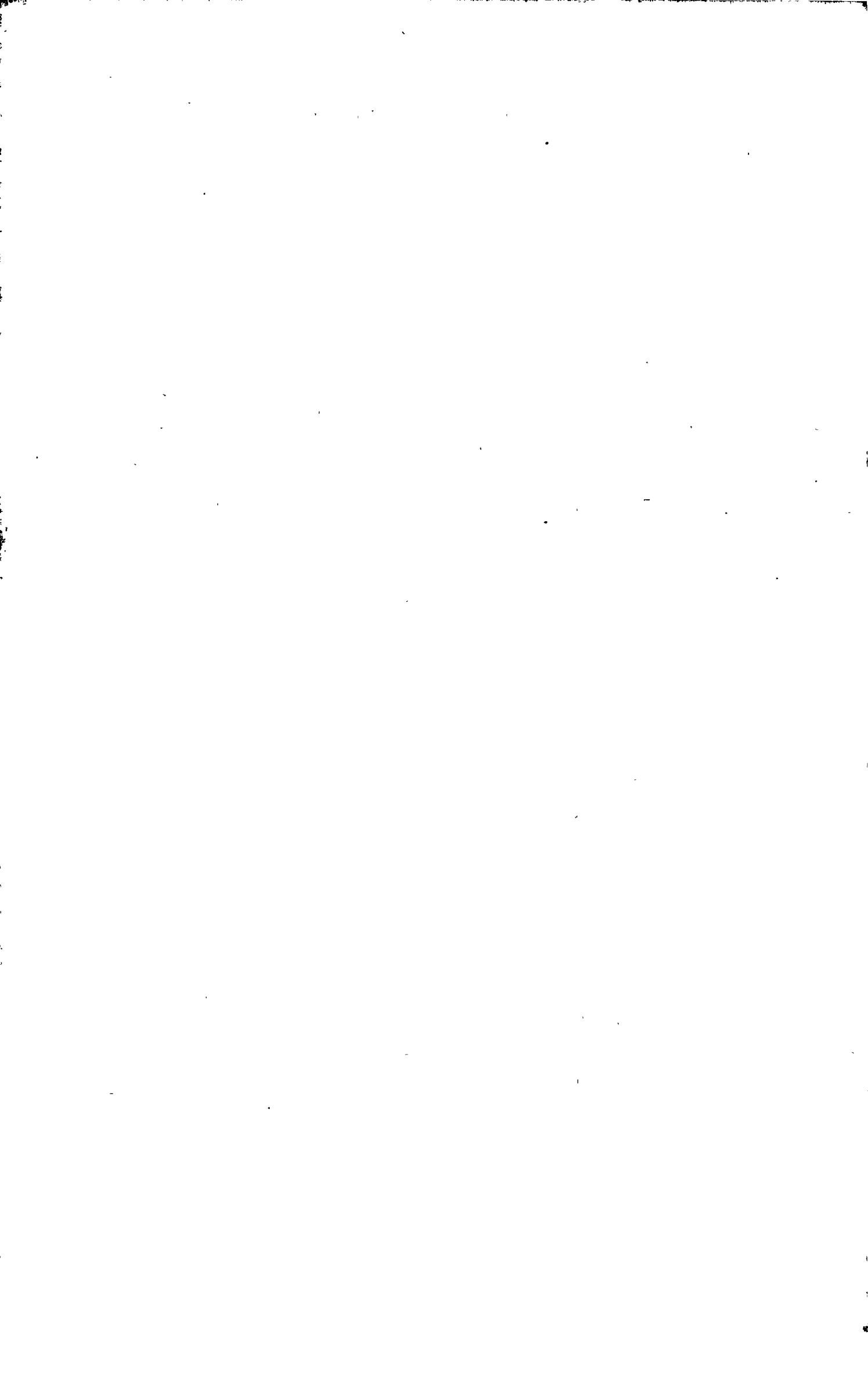

REPORT OF THE COMMISSION

Presented to the General Assembly of the United Nations at its twenty-second session, New York, 1967

CHAPTER I

The Commission on the Status of Women was established by the Economic and Social Council in 1946. It is the only international body devoted exclusively to the advancement of women. The Commission's mandate is to study, monitor and promote the progress of women in all spheres of life, and to advise the United Nations on measures to be taken to improve their status.

CHAPTER II

The Commission has held several sessions since its inception, and has produced a series of reports and recommendations. In its early years, the Commission focused on the legal status of women, particularly in the areas of marriage, divorce, and inheritance. Over time, its work has expanded to include a wide range of issues, including employment, education, health, and political participation. The Commission has also been instrumental in the development of international instruments, such as the Convention on the Elimination of All Forms of Discrimination Against Women (CEDAW), which was adopted by the General Assembly in 1979.
